Active Shooter Training Yuba County Sheriff

Marysville, Ca.
Yuba County Sheriff's Office sponsored an active shooter and mass casualty exercise on July 17, 2019. This exercise provided participants with an opportunity to assess capabilities, plans, policies, and procedures. It focused on decision-making, coordination, and integration with other organizations during an active shooter and mass casualty incident. The expected outcome

of the exercise was evaluating the training, response, communication and lifesaving abilities of the participating agencies.

From 2000-2014 *In 64 incidents where the duration of the incident could be ascertained, 44 (69.0%) of 64 incidents ended in 5 minutes or less, with 23 ending in 2 minutes or less.*

Speedily moving towards engagement with the shooter

should be the primary guideline when teaching active shooter response tactics.

The drill was held at the Toyota Amphitheater in which an Active Shooter event occurred during a simulated concert. The threat was not revealed until the event went active and involved personnel reacted under basic guidelines provided to their individual groups.

Yuba Water Agency Provides Funding for Communications Rescue Equipment

Marysville, Ca
Three Yuba County first-responder agencies will purchase new equipment with the help of Yuba Water Agency's Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program.

Each of these agencies provide emergency and rescue services for areas near Yuba Water Agency's facilities and for people enjoying the recreation at New Bullards Bar and along the Yuba River.

Grant funding from Yuba Water Agency will be used to purchase the following equipment:

Yuba County Ru-

ral Fire Joint Powers Agency - \$10,000

This grant will fund battery backup systems for the radio repeaters in the foothills, which will be critical to ensuring fire response during power outages.

A radio repeater is a combination of a radio receiver and a radio transmitter that receives a signal and transmits it, so that two-way radio signals are able to cover long distances.

PG&E Public Safety Power Shutoff program, which requires shutting off power during periods of extreme fire danger, recommends backup

power for the five radio repeater sites for up to five days. The current battery backup systems only last up to 24 hours.

The Yuba County Rural Fire Joint Powers Agency includes the Camp-tonville Volunteer Fire Department, Dobbins/Oregon House Fire Protection District, Foothill Fire Protection District, Loma Rica/Browns Valley Fire District and Smarts-ville Fire Protection Dis-trict.

Smartsville Fire Protection District - \$10,000

This funding will help the Smartsville Fire Protection District purchase new communication equipment.

The district's current communication equip-ment is in rough shape and nearing the end of its life, and this grant will provide funding towards 20 handheld radios, 20 spare batteries, 20 pagers and six vehicle mounted radios.

Camptonville Fire Department - \$10,000

This grant will cover the costs to purchase wildland fire suppression and protective equipment for the Camptonville Vol-unteer Fire Department.

The fire department is in short supply of these necessary items, and these funds will allow the department to buy wild-land hoses, nozzles and protective equipment.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife is busy planting catchable trout all over the Golden State. In addition to plants in the Southern part of the state the following waters up north received trout last week. LASSEN COUNTY: Clear Creek, Goodrich Creek and the Upper and Lower Susan River. NEVADA COUNTY: Fuller Lake. PLUMAS COUNTY: North Fork of the Feather River near Lake Almanor. SHASTA COUNTY: Upper Bailey Creek, Clear Creek above Whiskeytown Reservoir, North Battle Creek Reservoir and Whiskeytown Reservoir. SIERRA COUNTY: Packer Lake. TEHAMA COUNTY: Deer Creek.

Collins Lake has slowed on the trout bite but some anglers are having success catching catfish at this time. Best bet is to fish on the bottom with bait but we have reports of a six pound catfish being taken while trolling in the middle of the reservoir.

The landlocked king salmon at Lake Oroville have slowed down on the bite considerable at this time but the spotted bass are still cooperating for those who can find the fish.

Reports from Lake Tahoe tell us the mackinaw fishing has improved dramatically since the bite slowed considerably last week. Two fish limits are com-

mon at this time with fish running between 3 and 9 pounds. Both the North and West shores are the best bet. Kokanee Salmon are also being taken with fish ranging up to 14 inches.

Bullard's Bar Reservoir is still the place to go for Kokanee Salmon but the fish are down and are holding at around 50 feet. Best bet is to work your way down to catch those that are not as deep. We recommend jigging for these fish using any

lure that shines such as a castmaster .

A phone call to Old Station up near Lassen Park told us the fishing in Hat Creek is good but the campgrounds are full or almost full in the vicinity of the Caves. The brook trout are running up to 14 inches with a few smaller rainbows in the mix. Expect this area to be very busy until school starts.

Farm groups evaluate changes to agricultural visa program

A proposal from the U.S. Department of Labor to modify the existing agricultural visa program has been met with initial support from farm leaders. California Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson says he's encouraged by the administration's efforts to improve the system, known as H-2A. Johansson says farmers also need congressional action on wider improvement to immigration laws, to help address chronic employee shortages.

Irrigation districts recharge groundwater aquifers

Wet winters such as the one California just had help replenish underground water supplies, and a number

of irrigation districts help the process along through a technique called "conjunctive use." The method coordinates use of surface water and groundwater supplies within a region. One Fresno County water district says it has been using the technique for 100 years, moving water into recharge basins to percolate into underground water tables.

Rural areas suffer from lack of broadband service

Many urban residents now take broadband internet service for granted, but it remains scarce in some rural areas. An estimated one-quarter of rural Americans lack sufficient broadband service, including many in California. Farmers say more-reliable service would allow them

to adopt technology to improve precision of water and fertilizer use and animal care. Fitful internet availability also hampers delivery of public services in rural regions.

Longtime farms, ranches to be honored

Eighteen farms, ranches and agricultural organizations that have been in continuous operation for at least 100 years will join the California Agricultural Heritage Club Wednesday. The California State Fair inducts new members into the club each year. Two farms or ranches will be honored for 150 years of operation. The Grohl Family Ranch in Stanislaus County and Wilbur Ranch in Sutter County each started in 1869.

Is Your Pet Protected?

If there were a contest for the most hated organism in human history, the mosquito would at least make it to the finals. The annoying buzzing mosquito harbinger of diseases such as malaria, yellow fever, and West Nile virus, has another feather in its cap—heartworm.

Heart disease is something we associate with growing older, not with mosquitoes. But, for our dog and cat companions, heart disease as a result of a parasitic infection is a risk every time a mosquito bites. Once infected, the worm completes a complex lifecycle in the furry mammal host. Eventually the adult worms reside in the chambers of the heart and the large blood vessels around the heart. At this advanced stage, even with treatment, the heart damage can be irreversible, resulting in chronic disease and death. Despite the seriousness of this infection, heartworm infestation in the early stages is silent, causing no symptoms that can be seen at home or during a physical exam. Fortunately, a simple blood test that is available at most veterinary clinics

can diagnose the infection before the parasite's presence causes clinical heart disease

Heartworms are one of the most misunderstood parasites in the veterinary clinic. Many people are surprised to hear that mosquitoes can bite our dogs and cats, even through their furry coats. Indoor pets are at risk too. How many of us have employed our ninja skills to smash that pesky mosquito that just won't leave us alone in the house? Both the American Heartworm Society and the FDA recommend year-round heartworm prevention for indoor and outdoor pets, even for those of us who live in areas with cold winters.

Many mysteries surrounding treatment and testing recommendations make sense when we consider the lifecycle of the heartworm. Heartworm is a contagious disease of dogs, but it cannot pass directly from dog to dog. First, a mosquito must bite an infected dog. As it slurps up its meal of blood, it also ingests the baby heartworms, called microfilariae, which are floating through the infected dog's bloodstream. Once inside the mosquito, the microfilariae molt several times before migrating to the mosquito's mouthparts, where it can pass into an uninfected dog or cat when the mosquito feeds. Once transferred to the skin of a new host during a mosquito bite, the worms migrate through the tissues, continue to molt and grow, and eventually end up in the heart and large vessels. This is where female worms produce new microfilariae to circulate in the bloodstream, who wait for another mosquito to bite and slurp them up. This process, from infection by the mosquito to a mature adult, takes about 6-9 months.

Like most things in medicine, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. There are several effective heartworm preventatives that are available; however all of them have one important caveat. The preventatives only kill heartworms that are in the circulating bloodstream at the earliest

stages of development—approximately 1-2 months after the mosquito first infects the host. Once the immature heartworms are older, a preventative will no longer kill them, and the patient must undergo a more risky treatment to eliminate the heartworm infection.

The tests available to detect heartworm disease can only detect adult worms six months post-infection. A heartworm detection test is usually required before going on prevention for heartworms, with an exception for dogs younger than six months of age. This exception exists because even if the puppy were infected on the first day of birth, the test would be negative until it was at least six months of age. Thus, puppies younger than six months of age are started on prevention without a test. Dogs older than six months are tested before starting prevention, but likewise, any infection that was acquired in the last six months cannot be detected, and will not be treated by the prevention. A second test performed at least six months after the start of prevention will detect any of these early infections acquired in the six months prior to starting prevention.

The heartworm's preferred host is the dog. Cats, ferrets, and other furry mammals can get heartworm disease; however, the worms do not like these hosts as well as the dog, and the developing worms tend to die at higher rates in these less-favored hosts. Infected cats with adult worms can suffer from heart disease, or have disease associated with dying maturing worms in the lungs. Preventative medication is especially important for cats because there is no treatment for cats infected with the adult worms.

Treatment for dogs is expensive and carries significant risk, including death. Testing for heartworm disease in dogs, and using preventatives in dogs and cats year-round, can save a lot of worry when the mosquitoes inevitably show up as unwelcome houseguests.

Church Shopping

What do you do when your church leaves you? Many years ago I was on the board of a church where my wife, Marilyn, and I were members. Then one day the churches' California leadership made a decision that caused some of that denomination's churches to split apart leaving many congregations in a quandary. This caused them to go "church shopping" to find new homes.

Shopping for a new church home is one kind of "church shopping" but that is not really what this article is about. It's about people.

Now fast forward to the year 2018 when Marilyn and I had been attending a local Yuba City church for many years. Marilyn contracted a disease with symptoms similar to other outbreaks that occurred as caravans were arriving at the southern border and homeless populations were climbing. It took her life on August 28th of 2018.

This became the most difficult time of my life, not just because of the grieving, but because our Christian friends had changed. Books on losing a spouse all say that the friends we enjoyed as a couple may not be the same after a spouse passes. Friends may not see the surviving spouse the same way as before and visa-versa.

When it comes to my Christian friends, it has been the best of times and it has been the worst of times. Some have remained good friends while others have said or done things that were extremely painful.

Only those who have lost a spouse and grieved could fully understand the feeling. In fact, the books say that the surviving spouse should make new friends and find others who have also lost spouses.

Therefore, to make new Christian friends it would make sense to visit other churches. Maybe I shouldn't have called it "church shopping" but "people shopping." You see, "the church is a people not a place" as Seth Halpern pointed out in a June, 2019, Ambassador front page article, "Don't Go To Church Unless..."

Contrary to what some believe, I have not been looking for a new church, nor have I been giving letter grades to the pastors and praise music groups. However, I did learn a lot about people and didn't we agree that the church is about people? Perhaps I've been doing something that pastors would never consider doing.

It seems that God puts us in situations for a reason and perhaps mine is to tell this story. I really saw things from a couple's perspective until Marilyn passed away and now I see everything as a single spouse. So as Paul Harvey would say, now "The rest of the story."

There are two kinds of people in every church; those with spouses and those without. The fact is that one of the spouses in every married couple will become single again someday unless both spouses die simultaneously in an accident or something.

The most common question people ask me is, "how are you doing?" I'm thinking, are you making small talk or do you really want to know about my physical, mental and spiritual struggles? These are the basic needs of a grieving spouse and finding help for one is no help unless there is help for all three.

Losing a spouse is like being adrift in the ocean with nothing but water in sight. Survival is not a sure thing if you are alone at sea too long. My mother and father divorced when I was seven and mom never remarried. Like many, she spent the rest of her life alone and died of loneliness.

Although many local churches have men's groups, women's groups, kid's groups, and senior's groups, only two had single's activities for those who have lost spouses, been through a divorce or were never married.

Being a single spouse in a congregation of couples is a very uncomfortable feeling. It's a feeling of being out of place and simply not wanting to be there.

I have even left in the middle of a church service when I felt that I couldn't take the discomfort any longer. Being surrounded by couples in church triggers memories of when Marilyn and I enjoyed being in church together and now it's painful to be alone.

Attending Church should not be a painful experience for any Christian, but in most of the churches I visited there is no way for single spouses to know each other. If so, maybe they wouldn't have to attend services alone. Those churches that have activities for single spouses seem to be doing the right thing and also the biblical thing.

Jesus Christ gave us the two great commandments:

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart

and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets."

After spending over eight months visiting churches and letting the world know that I was "church shopping," not even one person asked if I would accompany them to a Sunday service at their church.

One explained that you don't need to be accompanied; just show up and greeters will welcome you and find you a seat. I found this is the limited extent to which many churches go to help single spouses.

After Marilyn passed away I expected our Christian friends to be there as before, especially those we have helped or supported financially, but not so (with a couple of exceptions). When I needed their help they were simply not available. Maybe I expected too much from those who carry the title "Christian."

Antifa Terrorist Shot/Killed by Police In Attack at Tacoma ICE Detention Center

Willem Van Spronsen armed with a rifle, fire bombs attacking ICE Detention Center fatally shot by police.

The 69-year-old armed man shot by Washington state police as he attacked a local Immigration and Customs Enforcement detention center Saturday, July 13th sent a manifesto to friends the day before the assault in which he wrote "I am Antifa," and was being lionized by members of the leftwing group as a "martyr."

The group Seattle Antifascist Action described assailant Willem Van Spronsen a "good friend and comrade" who "took a stand against the fascist detention center in Tacoma" and "became a martyr who gave his life to the struggle against fascism."

A friend, Deb Bartley, told the Seattle Times, that Van Spronsen was an anarchist and anti-fascist who, she believed, attacked the detention center intending to provoke a fatal conflict.

Van Spronsen was armed with a rifle and incendiary devices when he launched his assault on the Northwest Detention Center in Tacoma around 4 a.m. Saturday, according to the Tacoma Police Department. Employees reported he was throwing 'incendiary devices' and setting vehicles on fire and the first officers on the scene said he was wearing a satchel and carrying flares.

Van Spronsen was trying to ignite a propane tank when he was confronted by the officers, who opened fire. The Pierce County Medical Examiner's office said he died of multiple gunshot wounds.

Several friends of Van Spronsen said they received a manifesto from him Friday calling the facility "an abomination" and asking "those burdened with the wreckage from my actions" to "make the best use of that burden."

In the manifesto, obtained by KIRO7, Van Spronsen said he wanted to make a statement at the facility.

"I regret that I will miss the rest of the revolution," he wrote. "Doing what I can to help defend my precious and

wondrous people is an experience too rich to describe. I am Antifa."

Bartley told the Times she and other friends of Van Spronsen got letters in the mail "just saying goodbye," in addition to the manifesto.

"He was ready to end it," Bartley said. "I think this was a suicide. But then he was able to kind of do it in a way that spoke to his political beliefs. I know he went down there knowing he was going to die."

Van Spronsen was arrested last year for assaulting a police officer during a June 26 protest outside the same detention center, according to court records.

According to court documents, he lunged at a cop and wrapped his arms around the officer's neck and shoulders while the officer was trying to detain a 17-year-old protester, The News Tribune reported. When police handcuffed Van Spronsen they found he had a collapsible baton and a folding knife in his pocket, according to court documents.

Van Spronsen pleaded guilty to a charge of obstructing police and was released from custody in October.

This broad based initiative is designed to expand the pace and scale of CAL FIRE's vegetation treatment targets in State Responsibility Areas

(SRAs) to 250,000 acres per year by streamlining CEQA review.

This is one of the state's multi-pronged solutions to respond to the wildfire crisis in the Wildland-Urban Interface and focuses on protecting natural resources, reducing risk to lives and property, and reducing fire suppression costs when responding to a wildfire.

Cannabis Banking Update
from RCRC

In a change of course this week, Senate Banking Committee Chairman Mike Crapo (R-Idaho) said he would hold a hearing on the cannabis banking legislation known as the SAFE Banking Act in the near future. Chairman Crapo has resisted a hearing on cannabis banking, arguing instead the issue should be addressed in the Senate Judiciary Committee through federal legalization.

In April, Senator Crapo stated “as long as cannabis is illegal under federal law, it seems to me to be difficult for us to resolve this.” Chairman Crapo expressed a change of heart this week in an interview with American Banker where he said he is “looking into” cannabis banking and that

a hearing could be held “relatively soon.”

Some reports suggest the Senate Banking Committee could schedule a hearing before the August recess. Chairman Crapo’s reversal is the latest sign of momentum behind the advocacy push to resolve the cannabis banking issue that prevents banks from providing financial services to cannabis related businesses. The Chairman’s interview with American Banker was released a day after the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security held a hearing on “Marijuana Laws in America: Racial Justice and the Need for Reform.” The hearing addressed the issue of marijuana reform more generally, but several

members highlighted the prohibition on cannabis banking. There was bipartisan consensus throughout the hearing that Congress should enact legislation to resolve the conflict between state and federal cannabis regulation but members remain divided on the best path forward. Progressive Democrats are arguing for comprehensive reforms that legalize cannabis at the federal level, support minority owners of marijuana businesses, and reduce penalties for criminals with marijuana convictions. In general, Republicans are more supportive of the SAFE Banking Act and the STATES Act, a bill that would grant states autonomy to impose their own cannabis policy.

Marysville Police Awarded Grant

Nonetheless, a bold new lie has gained popularity: that we're on the cusp of a tech-driven energy revolution that not only can, but inevitably will, rapidly replace all hydrocarbons. Oh please! We need more than innovative software.

Even world renowned investor Warren Buffet, big into bird blenders, says he's in it for the tax credits since it will never generate a profit on its own. That means the wind industry exists today because your money was taken and given to wind mill companies.

An article by Mark Mills for the Manhattan Institute - "The 'New Energy Economy': An Exercise in Magical Thinking" says "The energy needed to move a ton of people, heat a ton of steel or silicon, or grow a ton of food is determined by properties of nature whose boundaries are set by laws of gravity, inertia, friction, mass, and thermodynamics—not clever software."

His paper highlights "the physics of energy to

illustrate why there is no possibility that the world is undergoing—or can undergo—a near-term transition to a 'new energy economy.'"

No nerd or high roller can fathom a cheaper, more powerful, stable, safe and more abundant energy source than fossil fuels. This means that spending \$1 million on utility-scale wind turbines, or solar panels will each, over 30 years of operation, produce about 50 million kilowatt-hours (kWh)—while an equivalent \$1 million spent on a shale rig produces enough natural gas over 30 years to generate over 300 million kWh.

For solar, the era of ten-fold gains is over. It isn't in the physics cards. The physics boundary for silicon photovoltaic (PV) cells, the Shockley-Queisser Limit, is a maximum conversion of 34% of photons into electrons; the best commercial PV technology today exceeds 26%. No more belt loosening here.

The same bad news exists for wind pow-

er gains. The physics boundary for a wind turbine, the Betz Limit, is a maximum capture of 60% of kinetic energy in moving air; commercial turbines today exceed 40%. Wind power is a big loser for the taxpayer.

Oh, and no sun or wind, no power. Hold that thought.

The shocker for you battery lovers is that the annual output of Tesla's Gigafactory, the world's largest battery factory, could store three minutes' worth of annual U.S. electricity demand. It would require 1,000 years of production to make enough batteries for two days' worth of U.S. electricity demand. Meanwhile, 50–100 pounds of materials are mined, moved, and processed using fossil fuels for every pound of battery produced.

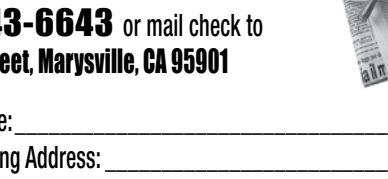
