Three Day Operation on Illegal Cannabis Grows

Yuba County, Ca.

On July 29th, 30th and 31st, the Yuba County Marijuana Enforcement Team (METYU) assisted by Nevada County Sheriff's Department, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, California State Water boards, NET-5, California National Guard Counterdrug, and the California Department of Food and Ag Cal Cannabis Cultivation Licensing, executed fifteen search warrants in regards to environmental violations due to cultivation of marijuana. These locations focused around cultivation sites in close proximity to South Honnessee Creek, and Dry Creek in the foothills of Yuba County.

As a result of the investigation, 5104 marijuana plants were eradicated, 53 lbs in processed marijuana was seized, and 10 people were arrested and/or cited. 28 Fish and Wildlife and water violations were discovered, including diverting creeks and pumping from the creeks to the cultivation sites. Additionally, violations totaling over 15 million in potential fines were noted by the California Department of Food and Ag CalCannabis Cultivation Licensing at the targeted properties.

Measure K Hokey Pokey

Yuba County Administrator Robert Bendorf and his County Supervisors wanted their cake and eat it too when it came to the Measure K Sale Tax. Their private lobbying, town hall meetings, mailers, social media postings and signage sold the Measure as a Public Safety Special Tax that would be restricted to a special fund.

However, a "special" tax requires a two thirds passage by voters according to Prop 13 and 218 laws. The funds then are legally restricted to in this case public safety. But Measure K's funds can be used for anything, contrary to what voters were told. Yuba officials wanted to use the sales pitch of a public safety "special" tax to curry the voters' favor but they did not want to risk failing to reach the two-thirds vote threshold of the "special" tax.

Selling Measure K as a General Fund Tax to be used for anything would have met resistance because people are put-off by the exorbitant entertainment-style salaries of county officials, 'Cadillac' pension / health plans and the mismanagement of CalPERS (government employee retirement fund). Voters see rich salaries / pensions and poor quality public services. After paying county personnel, there is little left to go toward improving the county. Most of Measure K's revenues now will be utilized for the runaway unfunded pension debt.

Some agency leaders were alarmed when learning that Measure K monies could be diverted from public safety. Bendorf assured them that he would take care of it in the fine print of the ordinance. What does that mean?

The funds are restricted or they aren't. Years ago, a Transit Occupancy Tax on hotels was put to voters with officials saying that the funds would be used to boost tourism in the county. It passed and the funds disappeared into the General Fund black hole.

County-hired attorneys Colantuono, Ruderman, and Harkins are selling a mirage that it was a General Fund Tax in order to preserve the government's simple majority win. This is a "special tax" pig with lipstick. In a December 16, 2017 email to Supervisor Mike Leahy from Crystal Martin, the county's

In June 2018, the Sutter County Grand Jury (GJ) refused to sign a severely edited version of their work and resigned. Therefore, no GJ report was available for the public.

Sutter County Superior Court Judge Brian Aronson, after taking over GJ supervision from Judge Sarah Heckman who was unable to manage the controversial testimony given the jury, did his best to bury the information gleaned about troubled District Attorney (DA) Amanda Hopper and County Counsel Jean Jordan.

Next, Aronson resigned his position on the bench after just being elected to a fifth 4-year term of office. Hopper was reelected to her second term and Jordon was given an extension on her contract by the Board of Supervisors.

Former DA lead investigator Jason Parker, also of interest to the GJ, was fired and his dismissal upheld by county supervisors even after an Administrative Law Judge ruled the county had no grounds to dispose of Parker. Both Parker and investigator Dave Williams were repeatedly attacked by Hopper in Appeal Democrat newspaper articles questioning their credibility and character.

The 2017-18 Grand Jury received numerous complaints regarding Hopper's office that led to its inquiry. The complaints included a "hostile work environment, retaliation, listening to an illegal wiretap, and violating the county vehicle use policy."

Current and past employees interviewed described working in a "hostile work environment." Vulgarity, profanity, juvenile behavior and inappropriate text messages were noted as common place and condoned by the DA. The GJ found the accusations credible while the DA considered the behavior acceptable since the employees were adults.

Hopper is quoted, "I'm never going to tell an adult human being in my office, you know, hey we're having a conversation, watch your mouth. No, that's not what would happen." The GJ report said this gave staff the impression that vulgarity and profanity were acceptable.

An illegal recording of a private conversation with Anu Chopra, former attorney in the DA's office was presented by a citizen to DA Hopper. Chopra had been fired from the office, then sued the county for unlawful dismissal and was considering opposing Hopper for re-election.





Worldwide citrus production to increase

There will be more citrus fruit on the market around the world this year. The U.S. Agriculture Department says worldwide orange production will rebound to the highest level in eight years, accompanied by record global crops of tangerines, mandarins. lemons and limes. The U.S. is among the nations producing more citrus. California leads the U.S. in fresh oranges, tangerines, mandarins and lemons, with larger crops expected for all except lemons.

Farmers report benefits from soil-health activities

Case studies released Tuesday indicate actions to improve soil health can help farm profitability as well as the environment. American Farmland Trust worked with farmers in California and three other states, reviewing practices such as composting, use of cover crops and other soil-health techniques. 
In 2018, a new program was launched, designed to collect cash donations so that the local food closets and food bank could purchase the nutritious foods they need to fill in gaps in their inventories.

Links and Lores Let's Celebrate Part I by Carol Withington

Once more, the journey continues as we discover the connection between the African American pioneers of Yuba, Sutter and Nevada Counties. Of the African American Grass Valley and Nevada City. On April 7, 1870 One of the "grandest" Emancipation Proclamation events took place

Although January 1, 1867 was described as "dull" in the "Marysville Daily Appeal", the local African Americans gave it life with the first ever recorded celebration in the community. It was reported that an equal number of whites and African Americans were in attendance during the **Emancipation Proclama**tion event in the District Courtroom in Marvsville. The affair included music by the Excelsior Band and readings by Jesse McGowan and S.P. Clanton.

The Rev. James H. Hubbard's opening address was such a success that the entire text was published on the front page of the Marysville newspaper. Rev. Hubbard, a Marysville pioneer, once served as pastor of the local Bethel A.M.E. Church. He later settled in Grass Valley. Over the years, Rev. Hubbard was known as "one of the distinguished African American ministers" in California.

But this would not end the many celebrations

residents of Marysville, Grass Valley and Nevada City. On April 7, 1870 one of the "grandest" **Emancipation Proclama**tion events took place in Marysville. It became even more special because African American males had finally been given voting rights under the ratification of the Fifteenth Amendment. A canvas of eligible voters in both Marysville and Yuba County revealed around 120. Of this amount, about one third voted during the 1870 election.

Among those voters listed in a Marysville newspaper were James Monroe, Romeo and Solomon Breeden; James and Phillip Churchill, Edward Parker Duplex, and the Rev. Thomas Randolph with ages ranging from 31 to 73.

The main exercises were held in the City Hall. Duplex was selected "President of the Day" with Jesse McGowan and Isaac Watkins assisting him. Once againthe Rev. Hubbard spoke to the huge crowd. The "Marysville Daily Appeal" described his presentation as "one of the most eloquent and learned addresses it has been our pleasure to hear

in this state. . ."

And not to be outdone, on April 12 the African American communities of Grass Vallev and Nevada City also gathered to celebrate Emancipation Proclamation Day Neither snow nor mud would hinder it, according to journalist Jennie Carter in her column for the "Elevator" newspaper in San Francisco. The procession to the theater in Nevada City headed by her husband's band "can't be beat" Carter noted. Here the children sang and never was "America" "warbled forth sweeter".

Nathaniel Ford, a Nevada City barber, was the President for the occasion and the oration by the Rev. Hubbard was described by Carter as "killing". She was overwhelmed. George Cantine, a former Marysville resident, was a Reader for the event. All in all, the day "proved to be pleasant" as residents awaited a grand ball in Grass Valley.

Three years later, Carter would attend the Emancipation Day in Marysville. Part 2 of Let's Celebrate in the September issue will reveal this event through the eyes of this popular journalist.

Our Free Speech Crisis

The First Amendment to our Constitution was proposed by the 1788 Virginia Ratification Convention during its narrow 89-to-79 vote to ratify the Constitution.

Virginia's resolution held that the free exercise of religion, right to assembly, and free speech could not be canceled, abridged, or restrained. These Madisonian principles were eventually ratified by the states on March 1, 1792.

Gettysburg College professor Allen C. Guelzo, in his article "Free Speech and Its Present Crisis," appearing in the autumn 2018 edition of City Journal, explores the trials and tribulations associated with the First Amendment.

The early attempts to suppress free speech were signed into law by President John Adams and became known as the Alien and Sedition Acts of 1798.

The liberal Left continue to push their radical agenda against American values. The good news is there is a solution.

Later attempts to suppress free speech came during the Civil War, when President Abraham Lincoln and his generals attacked newspapers and suspended habeas corpus.

It wasn't until 1919, in the case of Abrams v. United States, when the U.S. Supreme Court finally and unambiguously prohibited any kind of censorship.

Today, there is growing contempt for free speech, most of which is found on the nation's college and university campuses.

Guelzo cites the free speech vision of Princeton University professor Carolyn Rouse, who is chairperson of the department W of anthropology.

Rouse shared her vision on speech during last year's Constitution Day lecture. She called free speech a political illusion, a baseless ruse to enable people to "say whatever they want, in any context, with no social, economic, legal or political repercussions."

As an example, she says that a climate change skeptic has no right to make "claims about climate change, as if all the science discovered over the last X-number of centuries were irrelevant."

Rouse is by no means unique in her contempt for our First Amendment rights.

Faculty leaders of the University of California consider certain statements racist microaggressions: "America is a melting pot"; "America is the land of opportunity"; "Everyone can succeed in this society, if they work hard enough"; and "There is only one race, the human race." The latter statement is seen as denying the individual as a racial/cultural being.

Then there's "I believe the most qualified person should get the job." That's "racist" speech because it gives the impression that "people of color are given extra unfair benefits because of their race."

Other seemingly innocuous statements deemed unacceptable are: "When I look at you, I don't see color," or "Affirmative action is racist." Perhaps worst of all is, "Where are you from, or where were you born?"

We should reject any restriction on free speech.

We might ask ourselves, "What's the true test of one's commitment to free speech?"

It does not come when people permit others to say or publish ideas with which they agree. The true test of one's commitment to free speech comes when others are permitted to say and publish ideas they deem offensive.

The test for one's commitment to freedom of association is similar. Christian Americans have been hounded for their refusal to cater same-sex weddings.

For those who support such attacks, we might ask them whether they would seek prosecution of the owner of a Jewish delicatessen who refused to provide services for a neo-Nazi affair.

Should a black catering company be forced to cater a Ku Klux Klan affair? Should the NAACP be forced to open its membership to racist skinheads? Should the Congressional Black Caucus be forced to open its membership to white members of Congress?

The true test of a person's commitment to freedom of association does not come when he permits people to associate in ways he finds acceptable. It comes when he permits people to voluntarily associate in ways he deems offensive.

I am afraid that too many of my fellow Americans are hostile to the principles of liberty. Most people want liberty for themselves. I differ. I want liberty for me and liberty for my fellow man.

Potential Break-up of PG&E Looking Less Likely

Eight months after the head of the California Public Utilities Commission suggested it was time for a radical shake-up of Pacific Gas & Electric, the state's largest power utility appears to be at much less risk of a hostile takeover or being broken up into smaller utilities.

While Gov. Gavin Newsom has been sharply critical of PG&E for years for fires and disasters blamed on its lax practices, the former San Francisco mayor has offered no encouragement to London Breed, the city's current mayor, who is interested in taking over some PG&E assets and using them in a municipal power utility.

The bill passed by the state Legislature this month at Newsom's behest to create a \$21 billion account jointly funded by utilities and ratepayers to help deal with the high cost of wildfires included provisions that gave the CPUC more power to control the fate of PG&E assets. It also specified that any new owner of a utility cannot reduce the number of employees for three years, which analysts saw as an attempt to discourage a takeover.

Mayors blast part of wildfire legislation

Breed, San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo, and Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf sharply criticized these provisions in a letter to Newsom and legislative leaders. They "set a dangerous precedent by limiting local government autonomy over its own employee relationships," the mayors wrote.

Newsom also effectively sided with PG&E in opposing the attempt by utility bondholders to force the utility to change its present plan to emerge from the Chapter 11 bankruptcy it filed for in January because of \$30 billion in expected claims over wildfires blamed on the utility's equipment. PG&E wants to use a portion of its earnings and cost savings to issue tax-exempt bonds to pay for wildfire costs. Bondholders back a complex alternative plan that would sharply reduce the equity of shareholders.

PG&E, which has 16 million customers, must finalize and file its reorganization plan with federal bankruptcy court by Sept. 29. To qualify for assistance from the \$21 billion state wildfire relief fund, it must be out of bankruptcy by June 30, 2020.

Meanwhile, the CPUC president who blasted PG&E in December is likely in his final weeks on the job. Michael Picker announced in May that he would retire this summer but would stay on until Newsom chose his replacement.

Picker has long faced criticism for the perception that the utilities commission was too protective of the state's three giant investor-owned utilities – PG&E, Southern California Edison and San Diego Gas & Electric.

New scandal was last straw for CPUC chief

But a turning point came in December when the CPUC staff presented evidence that PG&E knowingly followed unsafe practices in maintaining and inspecting natural gas lines for five years after a natural gas explosion killed eight people in San Bruno in 2010.

"This process will be like repairing a jetliner while it's in flight," he said. "The keystone question is would, compared to PG&E and PG&E Corp. as presently constituted, any of the proposals provide Northern Californians with safer natural gas and electric service at just and reasonable rates."

Picker subsequently said the CPUC and state leaders should consider a state takeover or having the utility broken up into smaller components.

The new scandal and Picker's remarks helped drop PG&E's stock price from over \$23 a share in mid-December to under \$7 a month later. The share price had rebounded to \$18.70 as of the close of the market on Friday, reflecting analysts' confidence that PG&E will survive Chapter 11. The Sutter County Board of Supervisors Plan Could Add Six New Firefighters to the Sutter County Fire Department

Sutter County, Ca. In a special meeting Friday, the Board of Supervisors granted the Sutter County Fire Department authority to apply for a Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response (SAFER) grant from the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency (FEMA). If the County is successful in acquiring \$1.1 million in federal funds, the County would be committed to paying a local share of cost of \$707,311 over the course of three years.

The Sutter County Fire Department is responsible for 254 square miles outside the city limits of Yuba City between the Feather River and the Sutter Bypass, including the Sutter Buttes. The Department staffs fire stations in Sutter, Live Oak, and Oswald-Tudor, with just 14 fulltime firefighters and some two dozen volunteers. The Fire Department has suffered from low staffing levels for several years and has experienced staffing difficulties due to injuries and related increases in workers compensation costs.

The County has been investigating possible funding measures to increase revenues to the Fire Department. In late

June, the Sutter County Grand Jury reported on the critical condition of the Sutter County Fire Department's budget and its impact on firefighter safety and response times. The Grand Jury recommended the Board conduct community outreach to alert the 22,500 Sutter County residents served by the Fire Department about the condition of the budget, and to consider funding options, including reassessing a Special Fire Tax that has gone unchanged since its inception in 1997.

County Fire Departments are uncommon. The Live Oak, Sutter, and Oswald-Tudor Fire Departments were formerly stand-alone fire departments, but growth in the County and the need for more professional firefighting capacity forced a merger into a countywide agency funded by a Special Fire Tax, in addition to a small portion of property tax that generates about one cent for every dollar of property tax generated.

The Sutter County Fire Department sought a 100 percent grant due to economic hardship, but Fire Chief John Shalowitz told Board members he was notified last

week FEMA had denied the County economic hardship status.

Interim County Administrative Officer Steve Smith told the Board the money for the local match would likely come from the County's general fund, although if any other sources of revenue were available they would be used first.

Board members voted unanimously to the funding promise, but noted the grant is a short-term solution to a long-term problem—chronic underfunding of the Sutter County Fire Department as the result of an old funding formula, rising costs, and fewer volunteer fire fighters.

Board members indicated general support for some form of tax measure to increase revenues and appealed to firefighters who attended the meeting to actively support such a measure if placed on the ballot. Board members and County staff would be precluded by law from spending county time actively campaigning for approval of such a measure. However, community meetings can be held where County staff explain current funding and possible funding solutions.

HJTA Appeals San Francisco Ruling Denying Need for Two-Thirds Vote on Taxes

The Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association has filed an appeal of a San Francisco Superior Court ruling that special tax-increase measures submitted to the voters last year needed only a simple majority to pass instead of a two-thirds vote.

thirds vote applied only to tax increases proposed by government entities.

"We argued that Upland never reached this issue. And we argued that this creates a two-

care, early education, and salary increases for preschool teachers. A November measure, also called Proposition C, imposes a gross receipts tax on larger businesses to raise \$300 million for homeless housing and services. It received 61 percent voter approval. Proposition 13, approved by California voters in 1978, requires a two-thirds vote of the electorate to pass a tax increase for any special purpose. "The Legislative Analyst's Office, California League of Cities, and numerous other local governments have agreed that all local special taxes require two-thirds voter consent," Dougherty said. "The San Francisco Superior Court formally disagrees and has created a huge loophole."

"This is a brand new loophole contravening the voters' intent in Propositions 13 and 218 that all local special taxes require two-thirds voter consent," said HJTA president Jon Coupal.

The Court based its ruling on a California Supreme Court opinion in a 2017 case, California Cannabis Coalition v. City of Upland. But that case did not involve whether a tax increase proposed by voter initiative needed a two-thirds vote to pass, nor decided if the twomargin system. Now, when the politicians themselves use the citizens' initiative process, they can ignore the requirement of two-thirds voter consent," said HJTA attorney Laura Dougherty, "This violates the traditional understanding of the law over the past forty years and leads to absurd results."

I suspect that for most gardeners the month of August is a month of maintenance rather than starting projects in the yard. It is generally one of the hottest months of the year and does not necessarily invite lots of physical activity for many of us, including me. Just keeping things watered, keeping weeds at bay and flowering plants dead headed, lawns mowed, and planning what projects you might have in mind as the cooler weather of fall approaches can keep one busy.

A vegetable garden requires considerable attention. The ripened fruit needs to be harvested regularly to keep it coming through the summer and into the fall. Keeping an attentive eye on the plants in order to keep them insect free is needed to maintain healthy, productive plants. If you have pumpkins and/or melons in your garden, don't let them lie on soil that is wet from irrigating - either move them (without detaching them), to a nearby spot that doesn't get wet, or place a board or anything else that will keep the underside dry so the outside rind won't spoil and possibly rot. Apply vegetable food once a month to keep the plants green and productive. The fertilizer should not be higher in nitrogen - the first number- than in the other two. Nitrogen creates lots of green growth, but does not contribute much toward creating fruit, Phosphorus and Potassium are needed for that. Most citrus fruit ripens sometime near the winter months, and citrus trees require regular fertilizing to bear fruit. Use a formula specifically for citrus and apply it as directed on the container, which is usually, but not necessarily, every three months. If the leaves are vellowish with the veins green, they need iron. If you have fruit trees, any fallen and possible rotting fruit should be raked up and disposed of so that it doesn't invite wild critters and because the rotting fruit can create an unpleasant odor and might harbor some harmful fungi. Keep up with the deep watering on newly planted trees and young trees until the weather

Crape myrtle bushes or trees are lovely and are available in several colors. They can be encouraged to re-bloom by cutting off the spent flower heads. When the flowers are gone they begin making round seeds. Just cut that sprig off and usually more blooms will come. Dead heading is definitely needed to keep roses blooming. The spent bloom should be clipped off next to the nearest three leaf leaflet. That leaflet should be growing toward the outer edge of the plant, rather than toward the center of

cools and we get rain.

the plant. If dead heading is not done, they will form the round "Rose Hips". Since the hips are the seed pod for roses, they have done their duty for the year and they are ready to rest! This is true for most plants, but we keep interfering with their work by trimming off the bloom that would otherwise create seeds to carry on the species, so they bloom again in an effort to perpetuate their species. Nature is amazing!

Perennials can be planted now. Many will give you late blooms now and some may not, but they should all provide color in the yard next spring and summer. Various ones are available in many sizes from six packs and up. They can be done from cuttings, too. It is a good idea to put some kind of identification near it since it will die back and it can easily be lost in the midst of other sprouting plants next spring.

August is a hot month, but it is also the prelude to the fall season with its hints of color and cooler temperatures and we can look forward to that after a long hot summer.

Hopper listened to the recording. Since this GJ was not a criminal GJ they could not bring a legal action against her, but described it as "unseemly." If proven, this would be the District Attorney herself violating the law.

The GJ found that the DA ignored the county's Vehicle Use Policy. The county policy forbids transporting passengers except for county business purposes. The complaint was that the DA used her county vehicle routinely for personal use and also requested DA office personnel to retrieve her children from school or the dentist's office in county vehicles while employees were working. The DA admitted she had done so. This could be considered a theft of public funds.

The GJ says County Counsel Jean Jordan violated confidentiality and the law by attending a closed hearing on December 15, 2017 and then reporting the information to DA Hopper. The GJ was investigating the DA's office, Jordan had recused herself from advising the GJ but attended the meeting anyway. Others present were Judge Aronson, a representative from the State Attorney General's office, the GJ Foreman and the GJ Pro-Tem. The judge ordered the hearing records sealed and confidential.

On February 9, 2018, DA Hopper admitted to the GJ that Jordan leaked information to her. On March 8, 2018 the GJ interviewed Jordan about passing the information and concluded Jordan was not telling the truth.

The GJ recommendation regarding the Jordan incident was that the Superior Court consider contempt of court proceedings ordering the Sutter County Counsel to show cause why she should not be held in contempt for disclosing confidential information obtained in a closed court session regarding the Sutter County District Attorney.

After manipulating GJ findings and suppressing the report, depriving residents of the GJ testimony, Judge Aronson will be remembered for covering wrong-doing of government officials and disrespecting the work of 19 Sutter County jury members.

Hopper and Jordan escape unscathed after Hopper threatened to sue the GJ for its findings. Jordan, contrary to state law, told jury members that the county would not provide a defense for them if sued by Hopper.



On August 1, 2019, at approximately 8:16, Jared Russell and passenger Kelli Zanon were traveling eastbound State Route 20 near the Colusa City Limit in a 1997 Honda accord which was a confirmed stolen vehicle. An off duty officer recognized the Honda while he was traveling home from work and called in for marked police units to intercept. Units from Colusa Sher-

iff's Office and Colusa Police Department located the Honda while still eastbound on State Route 20 near State Route 45 on the outskirts of the City of Colusa. As soon as the driver, Jared Russell, was aware of law enforcement vehicles behind him, he increased his speed to 100 miles per hour plus. The units pursued Russell until he attempted to pass vehicles on the Sutter By-

pass bridge. Russell began traveling eastbound in the westbound lane and ran head on into a westbound big rig truck.

Both Russell and Zanon sustained fatal injuries as a result of the collision. Russell was pronounced dead at Rideout Hospital in Marysville and Zanon was pronounced dead at UC Davis in Sacramento.
