Illegal Cannabis Cultivation Search Warrant Service



Marysville, Ca.
On the morning of 5/16/19 at approximately 7:00 a.m. The Yuba County Sheriff's Department Marijuana Enforcement Team (METYU) with the assistance of the California Fish and Wildlife Department, served a search warrant in the 13000 block of McMenamin Way in Dobbins, Ca at a large illegal outdoor Cannabis grow site.

The site was previously discovered approximately

one month ago during regular flyovers done by the METYU team. Upon arrival to the property, Deputies located and eradicated 963 Marijuana plants being illegally grown in unpermitted makeshift tarp greenhouse structures. Nobody was located at the site at the time of the search warrant service, however a campsite and RV trailer were located at the site with evidence of people actively living at the grow. Various unpermitted struc-

tures with plumbing and electrical had been constructed; as well as various chemicals located and seized for analysis to determine the legality of the products being used and to confirm what, if any, toxic elements were at the site.

The investigation into the person or persons responsible for the illegal grow remains active and ongoing.

Search Warrant Served in Dobbins



The morning of 5/15/19 at approximately 10:00 a.m. Yuba County Sheriff's Department with the assistance of Yuba Sutter SWAT, served a search warrant on a multi-residence property on Colton Way in Dobbins, Ca. The search warrant was the result of a burglary investigation from 5/11/19 on Indiana Ranch Road in Dobbins in which the suspects returned later in the weekend and confronted the victim while brandishing a gun. The two suspects were identified and

determined to be living at the Colton Way property. Due to their violent history, Yuba-Sutter Regional SWAT was utilized to make initial contact for service of the warrant.

Upon search of multiple dwellings and outbuildings on the property, 26 guns and thousands of rounds of ammunition were located and seized. Both suspects are prior felons and cannot legally possess guns or ammunition. Research is underway into whether any of the located guns were stolen. Neither of the suspects were

home at the time but are subject to arrest when located. To protect the integrity of the ongoing investigation, we are not releasing the suspects' identities at this time.

Child Protective Services was notified that children were living on the property with access to multiple firearms; and will be conducting a separate child welfare investigation. The children were not present during the search warrant service.

Armed Forces Day

"When we assumed the Soldier, we did not lay aside the Citizen; and we shall most sincerely rejoice with you in the happy hour when the establishment of American Liberty, upon the most firm and solid foundations shall enable us to return to our Private Stations in the bosom of a free, peacefully and happy Country." — George Washington (1775)

If it weren't for the will to fight and die for freedom there would be no United States of America. From the beginning with those fleeing religious persecution in Europe and the Revolutionary War with England to now, there has been one conflict after another to secure the American Way.

For those whose parents served in WWII it's often thought of in hindsight as a 4-5 year battle for the United States. However, for those alive then there was no end date. It was victory at any cost or lose every freedom and liberty described in our Constitution.

This last Saturday, May 18th, was Armed Forces Day, an annual observance dedicated to the brave ones currently serving in the United States Armed Forces. It is celebrated on the third Saturday in May and is one of the several holidays that are part of National Military Appreciation Month. Each year, Armed Forces Day centers on a unique theme designed to highlight the hard work and dedication of our service members.

The 2019 theme is "For the Nation. For the People." The first Armed Forces Day was on May 20, 1950, and the theme was "Teamed for Defense." The theme that year was selected to show that all branches of the military had been united under one department of the government.

This 1950 inaugural observance was celebrated with parades, receptions, open houses and air shows. Approximately 10,000 American troops marched past the President in Washington D.C., while 33,000 people in New York City commemorated.

The Gift of Failure

Some feel that Jon Brower Minnoch (September 30, 1941 – September 10, 1983) was the fattest person on earth. He was an American man who, at his peak weight, was estimated to be 1,400 lbs. This was a close estimation because his extreme size, declining health, and lack of mobility prevented use of a traditional scale.

At 12, Minnoch weighed 294 lbs. and by 22 he was 6 ft. 1in weighing 500 lbs. Though hard to imagine, he was once a baby born of a woman. As a child it could be assumed that Jon had the dreams of a youngster, was free to move, contribute and create.

However, Minnoch's weight continued to increase steadily until his hospitalization in March 1978 at age 36 due to cardiac and respiratory failure. Minnoch was diagnosed with massive generalized edema, a condition in which the body accumulates excess extracellular fluid. Endocrinologist Dr. Robert Schwartz estimated that over 900 lbs. of Minnoch's body mass was retained fluid.

Transportation for Minnoch was difficult. Moving or getting out was nearly impossible. It took over a dozen firemen and rescue personnel and a modified gurney to transport him to University of Washington Medical Center in Seattle. There, he was placed on two beds pushed together, and it took 13 people to simply roll him over for linen changes.

Minnoch lost much of his freedom due to his obscene size, equaling more than eight 170 lb. men. He certainly consumed the natural resources, medical care and public services equivalent to the total of many people. His ability to contribute to society was stunted by his need to consume to maintain his way of life.

The United States government is the equivalent of Jon Brow-

FISHIN’ TALK

Lake Oroville is now at capacity and the fishing could not be better. Rains these past days have raised rivers, streams and reservoirs. All the rain has also either muddied up the water or has made it murky.

The opening of Eagle Lake is just around the corner and we expect a large turnout as usual. Make sure you bring warm clothes for this one as usual, but more so this year. We are told the fish will be cooperating and should be in the two to four pound range. These feisty trout, a strain all their own, are a kick to catch and are wonderful eating.

Conditions in the high country tell us different tactics may be needed for success on the trout stream. Close the fly box or wallet and fish with live bait. The famous earthworm is always a good choice. Look in the water for other insects, including hellgrammites, which are killers on any stream. Grubs may be found if you use a screen to catch the insects. Sometimes size is important as well as color. I always used a gob of trout worms when the water was not clear. Remember, when fishing with bait it must be on the bottom. Using a small weight, even a couple of split shot will do the trick. I have even caught trout on the skeleton of may flies which can be found on the side of exposed rocks and boulders when nothing else will produce. We also must not forget the hardware, such as spoons, spinners, jugs and plugs. In addition, salmon eggs are popular,

although I prefer other baits as a first choice.

I don’t know how many of you out there rely on the phases of the moon but this is a proven way to score with any type of fishing. According to charts the best day to fish in May is the 31st between 10 A.M. and 12 Noon. Into June the best days are the first to the 6th with early afternoon fishing is best from the 4th to the 6th.

We talked to our weather source. He advised the month of May has always been wet on occasion in past years. He also recalls snow in the Sierra Nevada Mountains in almost all months of the year during past spring and summers.

He also told me to expect a warm summer this year but it will be shorter than past years bringing wet weather to the valley floor and the mountains as early as September.

For those who fish the lakes and reservoirs we suggest, on windy days to drift with the wind while trolling. Turn off the motor and just drift with the wind. You might be surprised what you catch and also the enjoyment and relaxation this type of fishing provides.

Closing thought: *“Fishing is a great sport, but remember to crimp the barbs on the hook when you catch and release.”*

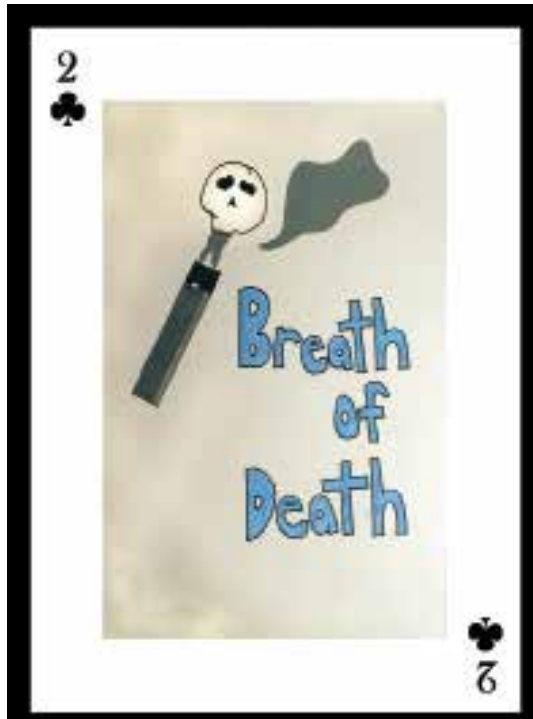
“Art to End Tobacco” An Art for Social Change Project

Marysville, Ca.

There is nothing new about the use of art, in all its many forms, to help bring about social change. Yuba Sutter Arts has partnered with ETR, a non-profit dedicated to improving health and education outcomes for all communities, and the California Clean Air Project to create a student art project in order to engage, educate and prevent tobacco use among young people.

ETR representatives visited art classes at Yuba City, River Valley and Marysville High Schools and provided information about the inherent dangers of various tobacco products. Yuba Sutter Arts' Artist-in-Residence, Lila Rivera, explained the art component of the program. Students were encouraged to create a 2D, 11" x 15" piece of artwork with an anti-tobacco theme. Lila provided some examples and ideas for this portion of the project. Students were given one month to complete their works of art based on the “Art to End Tobacco” theme.

ETR has worked extensively with organizations, governmental entities and individuals in California and nationally to provide resources and services to improve the health of youth, adults and communities impacted by alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. They offer evidence and science-based prevention programs that target



tobacco prevention (both smoking and smokeless) and give youth skills to avoid drug use and resist peer pressure.

Thanks to the great support of arts educators Pam Nowak, Alexandra Sprowls and Joe Lloyd, nearly 200 students submitted artwork for the project. In addition to the art being displayed during a May gallery show, Yuba Sutter Arts has taken the artwork and created decks of playing cards using all the different student work as the images on the cards. Four different and distinct decks of cards have been created to accommodate all the entries. Each participating student will receive a deck of cards.

Additional decks of cards will be sold with profits donated back to Yuba Sutter Arts to assist in funding our annual Art

Educator of the Year program. The exhibit will be on display until May 31.

Gallery hours are Wednesdays from 11-6, Thursday and Friday from 11-4. The Gallery is also accessible by appointment at other times by calling 749-8065. The location is The Gallery at Yuba Sutter Arts, 624 E Street in Marysville. There is plenty of free street parking and in the parking lots at Umpqua Bank and Bank of America directly adjacent to the theater. Come support this project and help us demonstrate a very relevant example of art for social change.

Community Museum Gets New Name

Yuba City, Ca.
The Sutter County Board of Supervisors, recognizing the old moniker wasn't making it easy for the public to understand what it is, has renamed its regional history museum.

Gone is the name, “Community Memorial Museum of Sutter County.” It is being replaced with, “Sutter County Museum.”

On Tuesday, May 14, the Board unanimously approved a recommendation from Museum Director/Curator Jessica

And the words ‘Community Memorial’ make the museum sound like a health care facility or retirement home.”

She told the Board that by definition the museum memorializes the community, and the story of its pioneers and veterans. "That's

what The Museum Trust Fund and Museum Association have agreed to pay for new signage, along with the minimal cost associated with updating collateral materials. The name change will have no impact on the County's General Fund.

The museum exhibits have been closed since January for the first extensive overhaul since the museum opened in the mid 1970s. A Grand Re-Opening, featuring a Frida Kahlo exhibit, is scheduled for Saturday, June 15, from 10 a.m. to 2p.m..

The museum is located at 1333 Butte House Road, Yuba City, on property donated by the Harter Family for the purpose of providing a community memorial to honor early pioneers and settlers, and members of the military, and for the siting of a museum.

The park the museum is located on will continue to carry the Harter family name.

Capitalism Competition *Corrects greed and income inequality*

Famous investor Warren Buffet, in a recent article in the New York Times entitled: "Warren Buffett's Case for Capitalism", claims a capitalistic society is the best system for America. "I'm a card carrying capitalist" said Buffett.

In recent years, capitalism at least in some circles has been blamed for income inequality, the rise of excessive corporate greed and the plight of the American worker.

On the surface, the negatives to our capitalistic system seem valid. The average worker is finding it harder and harder to make ends meet as the stock market hits all-time highs. The polarization of the two seems clear and it's easy to draw the cause and effect conclusion that one has led to the other.

That would hold true if our system was truly capitalistic. And although the American economy does retain some aspects of a capitalistic system sadly, many of the most important checks and balances of capitalism have been removed or compromised by meddling governments over the decades.

Those hating on capitalism largely get their information from the many news media outlets, most of which also don't understand capitalism and hence don't report on the important aspects that are missing in today's America. Without such education and hence media exposure, Americans are left to only misinformation about their economy, and hence push unknowingly to destroy it.

Capitalism is not synonymous with corporation greed and income inequality. In fact, capitalism will correct most of both corporate greed and income inequality as well as many of the other negatives we see in today's American economy.

To begin to understand these concepts, know that at its roots, capitalism is nothing more than someone going to the store and buying something with their own money at the price they find acceptable and from someone who is willing to

sell that something for a price that is acceptable to them.

Everything else the economy functions on are just offshoots of this basic premise. Some of the basic concepts of capitalism include free choice, the right to private property, the right to work and the right to negotiation. Sounds logical, and it is.

Left alone capitalism allows for and protects these basic premises. Start tweaking capitalism and distortions arise. Think of a tire that is perfectly round and each tweak of capitalism adds a lump in the tire. The tire now starts to wobble and its efficiency wanes. The more you tweak it (add more lumps) the worse it rolls.

Such is the result of the interference in capitalism, which is usually caused by a central government.

Capitalism isn't perfect. No system is. But it is the best system. All others are worse, and some economically fatal.

But in the imperfection that mankind and our world is by nature, some think they can improve on this reality.

Of all the imperfections that is our physical world, the economic reality with the most effect is economic truth known as scarcity.

Simply put, there is not enough to go around for everyone to have everything they want. That some won't accept this fact is delusional. It's a fact, and no amount of hoping, wishing or economic manipulation will change that fact.

Enter Capitalism, the most efficient method for distributing the inherent scarcity of goods. It's not a perfect system, but it's proven to be the best there is. A perfect system would have to eliminate the reality of scarcity, but scarcity is an economic fact and it cannot be eliminated.

To accomplish the distribution of scarcity in the fairest way possible, free will must be maintained. Only the voluntary construction of goods for an agreeable exchange allows the continuance of the economy.

Introduce mandate or remove incentive and the system eventually collapses. Incentive is simply the reason people work and hence produce. Remove the incentive and forced labor by some means is the only alternative. Either that or starvation, neither of which is an improvement over scarcity. Scarcity isn't perfect, nor is it always comfortable, but it is a fact. There will always be scarcity. And instigating any system that removes incentive will lead to more scarcity. For without incentive,

some will not work, and hence not produce.

Capitalism maintains incentive at its highest and therefore allows for the most production of goods and services, which minimizes scarcity the most over other economic systems.

It's the best we have.

Specifically, in capitalism, excessive profits are throttled by competition (without cost to entry which is usually increased by government), and although owners will always make more than workers (there's that incentive we talked about to start a business) income inequality is reasonable by maintaining sound money where as unsound money (inflation) which increases income inequality, is brought about by government.

Reasonable employment opportunity is maintained by the healthy economy brought about by the previous two mentions and maintained by incentive (if thou shall not work, thou shall not eat). Again we find government at contributory fault as government has a tendency to remove incentive through taxation and entitlement programs (free money). Criminality is punished in a capitalistic system unlike today where our lobby system and the big money get-out-of-jail card is fostered by and encouraged by government and their cronies.

The few holes in the capitalistic system (environmental and monopolies) can be easily monitored by a minimal (MINIMAL mind you) central government.

Capitalism is not a perfect system, but it's the best we have.

Its premise is liberty, which is free will and the right to perform, or not perform, as the choice may be.

You have the right to do what you want, as long as it doesn't infringe on the rights of another. Pretty simple stuff. All the other systems they're proposing are merely pipedreams.

Not surprising considering what they're allowed to smoke nowadays.

Mob Rule by Motorcycle Gangs Terrorize Venezuelans

Venezuelan society has accelerated its downward spiral into mobocracy and anarchy by motorcycle gangs rampaging unimpeded throughout the country. It has contributed to the erosion of the once-rich country into a dire humanitarian catastrophe. Four years ago the population of Venezuela was over 31 million people. In the last 3 years, over 4 million people have fled the country as refugees due to the failed socialistic policies of President Maduro. At this writing, the inflation rate has risen to over 10,000 in the country.

Hollie Mackay of Fox News reported the following article on Wednesday, May 15th.

The notion of masked men on no-license-plate motorcycles shooting down citizens to rob them for their bread, emptying magazines of bullets into crowds of anti-government protesters or lurking at the door with threats for an outspoken journalist has become commonplace in Venezuela.

These groups are known as the collectives - or “collectivos” in Spanish - and function as carrying out the dirty work for embattled President Nicolas Maduro.

But aside from aiding Maduro to stay in power in the face of growing opposition and international condemnation, many of the groups are also intent of waging their own campaigns to win back – or sustain – the support of Venezuela’s most vulnerable.

“A small majority of the population still believe and support Maduro’s regime because they trust and believe in Chavez’s ideology. Governments before Chavez never took into account those poor people living in the barrios and rural areas,” James Durling, Operations Director for the Colombia-based security firm, D4C Projects, told Fox News. “Chavez gave them active participation in politics and they feel that they are important to the regime, so they trust in them because they are loyal to what they believe is good for the country.”

Inspired by the leftist urban rebel gangs of the Cuban Revolution and founded more than 50 years ago, the various colectivo groups financed their “social justice” missions mostly through criminal activity and robbing banks. After coming to power in 1999, then President Hugo Chavez armed them as “guardians of the revolution” but in the ensuing years they went increasingly rogue, morphing into brutal bandits.

Disguised by masks and dark clothing, their identities not known, collectivos publicly rep-

rimand accusations of violence. The collectivos themselves are divided up into groups with different powers and functions.

“They are criminals, hardcore Chavistas on the frontlines as the armed defense of Maduro’s regime. The most powerful Collectivos are known as the Carapaicas, Tupamaros, La Piedrita, Alexis Vive, and the Gran Polo Patriotico,” said Johan Obdola, president of Latin America-focused global intelligence and security firm IOSI and former Venezuelan counter-narcotics official. “Their biggest numbers are in the main cities of Venezuela – Caracas, Valencia, Maracay, and Maracaibo.”

According to Obdola, they initially received training from Colombian rebel group FARC, then eventually the Venezuelan Army and National Guard, but more recently the Cuban military.

While hard data is impossible to obtain, some analysts estimate that the collectivos maintain control of as much as 30 percent of Venezuela’s towns and cities and endeavor to augment that at any outlay. The exact number of members too is murky, yet analysts estimate there could be anywhere from 10,000 to 100,000 of these irregular gang members operating with impunity throughout the impoverished country.

And it’s not all about crime, drug trafficking, methodical abductions, and stealing. Many of the collectivos, sources on the ground tell Fox News, continue to operate something of a “heart and minds” game to try and win over the support of the most vulnerable.

“One of these things happening is that such armed groups are seeking to gain the sympathy of the people who live in the places, even when they are creating a war environment,” said one Venezuelan humanitarian researcher, who can only be identified as Martina, who works on the border near Colombia.

Around a year ago, some from the San Antonio area recalled, collectivos joined forces with local guerilla groups to help dispose of the trash that had accumulated in the streets as the economic meltdown saw the shutting down of basic services.

“Some will paint houses at Christmas time, help families,” one local activist, Jose, explained.

Such pro-Maduro outfits are also quietly permitted by the government to be involved in, and sometimes participate in the delivery of the infamous CLAP food aid boxes distributed under the socialism umbrella, Martina noted.

“It is to generate sympathy, sometimes they will deliver notebooks or propaganda magazines,” she continued. “And even those who don’t have sympathy for them, have come to understand it simply as a way of life. They are trying to survive.

Indeed, for many, they are simply a staple of order in an ever-fragmenting society.

Venezuelans regret gun ban, 'A declaration of war against an unarmed population.'

For Maduro, who the U.S. and other countries mandate is no longer a legitimate official, they are something of a lifeline. For more than three years, the socialist policies of the Venezuelan regime have seen the once oil-rich nation erode into a dire humanitarian catastrophe.

“I admire them. They are organizations created for the good of the community. The collectives work for society, for the sick, for peace, and against crime,” Maduro declared last week, just hours after members opened fire on rallying anti-government Venezuelans. “They have been around 20 years as a form of organization for the people.”

Flights Suspended To Venezuela

According to the New York Post:

The US suspended all flights to Venezuela on Wednesday, May 15th, amid political turmoil and violence in the South American country.

The Department of Transportation ordered the halt as the Department of Homeland Security warned in a letter that “conditions in Venezuela threaten the safety and security of passengers, aircraft, and crew traveling to or from that country.”

In addition to US airlines, a small group of Venezuelan carriers that offer service to Miami will be affected. American Airlines, the largest carrier into and out of Venezuela, had already discontinued its flights to Venezuela in March because of security reasons.

Many international flights to Venezuela have already stopped service to the country due to the safety concerns and disputes with the country’s embattled leader Nicolas Maduro.

A large portion of the international community, including the US, has recognized opposition leader Juan Guaidó as the country’s president.

In April, the Federal Aviation Administration prohibited US air operators from flying below 26,000 feet in Venezuela’s airspace.

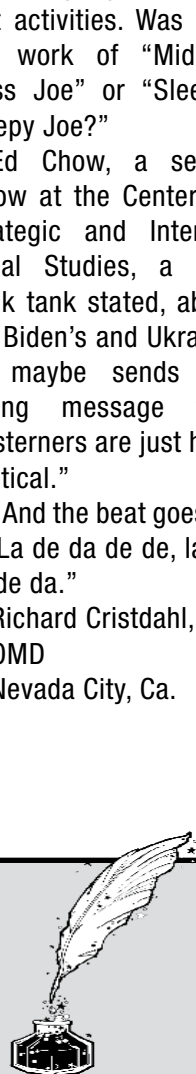

PG&E Responds CAL FIRE Announcement

San Francisco, Ca. Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) issued the following statement in response to the release of information by the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) regarding the November 2018 Camp Fire:

CAL FIRE announced today that it has determined that PG&E electrical transmission lines near Pulga were a cause of the Camp Fire. PG&E accepts this determination.

Our hearts go out to those who have lost so much, and we remain focused on supporting them through the recovery and rebuilding process. We also want to thank the brave first

responders who worked tirelessly to save lives, contain the Camp Fire and protect citizens and communities.

While we have not been able to review CAL FIRE's report, its determination that PG&E transmission lines near the Pulga area ignited the Camp Fire on the morning of November 8, 2018, is consistent with the company's previous statements. We have not been able to form a conclusion as to whether a second fire ignited as a result of vegetation contact with PG&E electrical distribution lines, as CAL FIRE also determined. PG&E is fully cooperating with all ongoing investigations concerning the Camp Fire.

We remain committed to working together with state agencies and local communities to make our customers and California safer. We are actively working toward this commitment through our comprehensive Community Wildfire Safety Program, which includes:

- * Real-time monitoring and intelligence
- * Enhanced vegetation management practices
- * Re-inspections of our critical electric infrastructure in high fire-threat areas
- * Building a more resilient electric system
- * Proactively shutting down power based on extreme conditions

Sutter County Agriculture Harvests \$1.48 Billion

Yuba City, Ca. Sutter County agriculture pumped \$1.48 billion into the local economy in 2017 and supported more than 6,800 jobs, Agricultural Commissioner Lisa D. Herbert announced as she released the first-ever comprehensive economic analysis of one of the county's dominant industries.

"This study goes beyond our annual crop and livestock report," said Herbert. "It captures not just the direct effects of farm production, but also the ripple effects of agricultural businesses. During these uncertain economic times, it's important to better understand how and where agriculture contributes to our economy and to local employment."

To put the contribution in perspective, Sutter County agriculture pumped roughly \$4.1 million into the county economy per day, or just over \$169,000 per hour.

The study was conducted for the Agricultural Commissioner's Office by Drs. Jeff Langholz and Fernando DePaolis of Agricultural Impact Associates, a consulting

firm specializing in agricultural economics.

- Of the \$1.48 billion in total economic contribution, \$835.6 million came from direct economic output via production and processing, representing 13.9% of the county's total direct economic output, about one out of every seven dollars.
- An additional \$645.1 million came from expenditures by agriculture companies and their employees.
- Of the 6,869 total jobs agriculture supported, 5,849 were direct employees in production and processing. This represents 13.8% of all jobs in the county or about one out of every seven jobs. The remaining 1,021 jobs were made possible through expenditures by agriculture companies and their employees.
- Economic diversification with agriculture has held steady over the past decade and continues to provide critical economic stability to the industry and county.

"This report shows the importance of Sutter County agriculture as both an employer and

a powerful economic engine," said Christine Ivory, President of the Yuba-Sutter Farm Bureau. "Every dollar earned creates ripples that support a healthy local economy."

The report, "Economic Contributions of Sutter County Agriculture", was released today at a briefing at the Agricultural Commissioner's Office Conference Room at 142 Garden Highway in Yuba City. Drs. Langholz and DePaolis presented their findings to the news media, public officials, agricultural industry members, and the general public.

Attendees included Mat Conant, Chairman of the Sutter County Board of Supervisors, Assemblyman James Gallagher's Office, Janine Hasey, UCCE Tree Crops Farm Advisor and County Director, Shon Harris, Mayor of Yuba City, Christine Ivory, President of the Yuba-Sutter Farm Bureau and many others.

- What makes you think that smoking pot and driving is not a big deal? Los Angeles reports DUI arrests are up 32% all because of marijuana. Farm Bureau Welcomes Lifting Tariffs

The California Farm Bureau Federation supports President Trump's removal of steel and aluminum tariffs on Mexican and Canadian imports and urges swift ratification of the U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement.

"With Canada and Mexico agreeing to lift their retaliatory tariffs on many California agricultural products, it will provide a boost in exports and have a ripple effect throughout the farm and rural econo-

my," CFBF President Jamie Johansson said. "The president's action today to remove steel and aluminum tariffs on two of our trading allies eliminates a major obstacle to USMCA moving through Congress."

The next step is for the president to submit USMCA to Congress for approval.

"We urge our California senators and representatives to work together for quick passage of USMCA," Johan-


sson said. "This could be a bipartisan achievement resulting in a big victory for the family farm."

Canada represents the second-largest market for California agricultural exports, with sales of more than \$3.3 billion in 2016, according to the California Department of Food and Agriculture. Mexico is the No. 5 foreign market for California farm products, with sales of more than \$1 billion in 2016.

“TICK, TICK, TICK” REVISITED

50 years ago a motion picture called “Tick, Tick, Tick” was filmed in our area. Although primarily filmed in Colusa County, there were also shooting locations in Yuba and Sutter Counties. Since its release on January 9, 1970, it has continued to be well respected as a good piece of entertainment and local folks should be justifiably proud of it.

The movie follows the story of a white Sheriff who has lost an election and must relinquish his job to an African American. Keep in mind that the movie takes place in the deep south and it is the first time an African American had been elected to the post in the fictional, Colusa County.

In spite of the fact that it never earned an Academy Award, some of those in the cast had

earned several Oscars for their stellar work in prior films.

Co-starring as the mayor was Fredric March. March had been making movies since 1921 and had won two best actor awards for his work in “Dr. Jeckyll and Mr. Hyde” (1931) and “The Best Years of Our Lives” (1946). This movie was his next to last film role.

Another Oscar winner was George Kennedy who played the outgoing Sheriff. Kennedy had won a best supporting actor award for his work in “Cool Hand Luke” (1967).

Rounding out the main cast was football hero Jim Brown in his first starring role. He played the lead part as the Sheriff. His previous movie appearances were in supporting roles in “The Dirty Dozen” (1967) and “Ice Station Zebra” (1968).

There are several story lines here. One is how the white Sheriff handles his responsibility to the community and family after he is ousted. Another story is how the African American Sheriff handles his new job. The third story line is how the community reacts to the new Sheriff. Will they

retain their prejudices or support the new regime?

I had seen this film when I was in the Navy back in 1972 but had forgotten about most of it. A recent viewing refreshed my memory that many, still recognizable locations were used in the filming.

The Colusa Police Department at 260 6th Street serves as the police department in the film. The building was originally a Carnegie library.

The Court House, with its distinctive cupola, is located across the street from the police department. It is prominently featured in the film, as are various churches and residences on Market and Jay Streets. The Court House was also featured in 1962’s “To Kill a Mockingbird”.

There is a confrontation scene in the movie between the Sheriff and a mob planning to release one of his prisoners. That scene was filmed at a bridge in Sutter County at the west end of Franklin Road where it crosses the Wadsworth Canal.

According to Jerry Orr of the Sutter County Public Works department, the old bridge there was

removed about 2003. Jerry was kind enough to provide me with a photo of the old bridge and I was surprised to see that, except for the roadway, it looked very little like the bridge in the movie.

The bridge in the movie was a high, steel structure while the actual bridge was just concrete with wooden fence rails along its sides. Was a fake structure built on the old bridge for the movie? Or was the upper structure created by special effects back at the studio?

Vallejo resident Dave Padilla was 9 at the time of the filming. He lived near the bridge on Franklin Road. He states, “They built it. It was wood, painted to look like a steel trestle bridge. It

was built over the existing structure that was concrete”.

Other shooting locations were two bars in Linda; Pete’s Bar on Feather River Boulevard and Ruby’s Joynt on Riverside Drive.

Dub Taylor opens this movie by frying an egg on a hot sidewalk. His career would span 6 decades. Possibly his most memorable part was as Ivan Moss in “Bonnie and Clyde” (1967).

Other prominent character actors were used in the film. Karl Swenson and Anthony James would go on to have long careers in the movies and both played parts in 1971’s “Vanishing Point”.

Several local people

were used as extras in the film. Even my wife’s uncle Harvey McCann can be seen in a bar room scene.

Not all movies filmed in our general area are as well regarded as “Tick, Tick, Tick”. There is the sad tale of the similarly themed “The Klansman” that was filmed in Oroville in 1974. With big names such as Lee Marvin, Richard Burton and Cameron Mitchell involved, people had high hopes for a quality product. I saw some of it filmed in downtown Oroville. Sadly, the film turned out to be a big embarrassment. A movie that is best forgotten, if you are fortunate enough to be able to blot it out of your mind.

Food and Farm News

Honey supply looking up

California beekeepers may bring more honey to market this year, though exactly how much won't be known for a while. One keeper in Imperial County credits the winter rain with giving his bees plenty of forage and looks forward to a significant production boost. In Tulare County, beekeepers report a hit-and-miss citrus bloom, leading to uncertainties about honey supply. California is among the nation's top 10 honey-producing states.

Predicted almond acreage in California for 2019 breaks record

Almonds continue to be a popular crop in California, with acreage forecasted to reach a new record this year of 1.17 million bearing acres. Production is predicted to reach 2.5 billion pounds in 2019, a 9.6% increase over the previous year. An extended bloom period this spring helped compensate for disruptions from significant rainfall. The crop appears to be sizing well, leaving farmers optimistic.

Growers making hay of uncertain alfalfa market

With dairies still struggling financially, California alfalfa-hay growers say their biggest customers can't afford their product, leaving future prospects of the forage unclear. Harvest is ramping up, but acreage has been trending down. Farmers harvested 620,000 acres last year, the lowest on record. Growth in exports has helped, but an ongoing trade dispute with China and its retaliatory tariffs since last summer have reduced shipments to one of California's key offshore markets for alfalfa hay.

Scientists aim for tastier tomato

Your supermarket tomato might soon get a flavor boost. Scientists have constructed the pan-genome for the cultivated tomato and its wild ancestors, which includes genes from 725 different varieties and nearly 5,000 previously undocumented genes. The information can help breeders quickly develop new varieties for commercial production that retain both richer flavor profiles and traits important to growers such as yield, shelf life, disease resistance and stress tolerance.
