Remy Green of MCAA

Will Receive Award at Carnegie Hall

Marysville Charter Academy for the Arts senior Remy Green will miss her graduation ceremony this year in order to travel to New York City to receive two national awards for her artwork. Remy was one of nineteen MCAA students to receive regional awards in the annual Scholastic and Writing Awards competition. Sponsored locally by the Yuba Sutter Arts Council and the Community Memorial Museum of Sutter County, the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards is the nation's longest running and most prestigious scholarship and recognition program for creative teens. For the regional competition, students in grades 7-12 from seven counties (Colusa, Placer, Nevada, Sierra, Sutter, Yolo, and Yuba) submitted art and writing entries in 29 categories. Remy received three Gold Keys and an American Visions Award at the regional level for her Digital Artwork, all of which were then submit-

ted to the national competition level. This year over 340,000 entries were submitted from every state in the nation. Of these, 2,700 received national recognition. Remy's submission entitled "Contemplation" received both a gold medal and an American Visions Medal. She will receive her awards at a special ceremony at Carnegie Hall.

Remy who is also an accomplished musician, has been creating art for as long as she can remember. She has gone through many phases in her artistic development but her creativity really expanded when she was given a digital tablet in the 8th grade. She says she is self-motivated and enjoys the creative process. Her favorite subject these days are portraits of interesting characters including turning cartoon figures into real people.

When asked about Remy, her art teacher at MCAA Glen Weisgerber said, "As an edu-

cator, it has been exciting to work with Remy and watch as her skills in drawing and painting have developed over the past few years. She has a remarkable knowledge of the human face and human form. Although Remy is modest and does not like to bring attention to herself, she works extremely hard in developing new skills and continually pushes herself. As an artist, Remy has always been accepting of critiques, understands quickly, and works to better herself with every new drawing or painting."

An excellent student with a 4.0 grade point average, Remy will attend Yuba College next year with a goal of transferring to CSU Sacramento. She's not pleased at having to miss such an important event as her high school graduation but she is definitely looking forward to exploring New York City with her father and will especially enjoy the awards ceremony at Carnegie Hall.

Don't Excrete Where You Eat

People familiar with the Bible smile as science "discovers" a record of a king and kingdom or an aspect about the universe when the information was noted in the Bible long ago.

Early man thought of the earth as flat, but Is. 40:22 referred to its shape as circular. Job 26:7 says the earth is suspended in space. However, the ancient world thought that it must be supported by something.

Before the telescope was invented, people believed they could count the stars. Even astronomer Johann Kepler numbered the stars at just over one thousand. Not until modern times did man realize that counting the stars is impossible. Jeremiah 33:22 says, "As the host of heaven cannot be numbered, nor the sand of the sea measured."

God instructed (Lev. 13:45-46) Israel to quarantine those with infectious diseases. This procedure was unique among people groups at the time and is used today.

The children of Israel were forbidden to drink water from small or stagnant pools or from water that had been contaminated by coming into contact with dead animals or meat (Lev. 11:29-36). However, even with no knowledge of germs, many ancient civilizations had an understanding of the need for careful sewage disposal, but this insight was lost or ignored in the Middle Ages in Europe. The result was terrible sanitary conditions, polluted waterways, and periodic outbreaks of dis-

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College Graduates Know The Three Stooges

The Second Amendment of the United States Constitution reads: "A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed." The Amendment was included to protect the citizenry from a tyrannical government like the one ruling over us today. The Founders wanted people equipped to take back their government.

Last week, the Yuba County Sheriff's Department (YCSO) announced online concealed weapon applications where one can now have 5 instead of just 3 guns listed. Husband of Marysville Child Care Provider Arrested on Child Molestation Charges

Marysville, Ca.
On 4-16-19, a mother brought her 5 year old daughter to the Marysville Police Department to report that she had been molested. The 5 year old had been attending a local day-care "Leonor Family Child Care" in the city of Marysville for approximately 2 years. The 5 year old had informed her mother the night before that the business owner's husband, Luis Ubias (45 yrs old) of Marysville, had touched her inappropriately several times.

Detectives conducted an investigation, gathering enough evidence to arrest Ubias. Ubias was arrested on 4-17-19 on a variety of Felony charges. The California Department of Social Services-Community Care Licensing Division was also notified, this is the department that

issues home child care licenses. They will be conducting their own investigation into the incident in regards to the facilities license status. Parents of children that have attended this child care facility in the past are encouraged to contact the Marysville Police Department. This is an ongoing

investigation and there may be more potential victims that may come forward.

Fly Fishing Traditions is an educational guide service focusing on improving the skills of every angler. Fly Fishing Traditions offers floating full day clinics on the Lower Yuba River to help improve nymphing, dry fly techniques or Spey techniques. Clay has also worked with various fly

fishing clubs to provide workshop on the Lower Yuba River. These workshops are offered for groups of 6-8 anglers. Clay is the past President of the Gold Country Fly Fishers of Grass Valley for 3 years. Clay is currently serving as Vice President of Communications for the Northern California Council of Fly Fishing International. The program, The Lower Yuba through the Seasons" will cover fly fishing tactics associated with the 5 seasons of the Yuba.

1. The Fall – September, October and November
2. The Winter – December and January

Many were hopeful the Sacramento River would have dropped by now, but is still running high with water from the bottom of the levee. The clarity of the water has cleared up a bit, but striper fishing has been tough. However, on the Feather River, if you do not mind wall to wall boats in the water and a traffic jam in regard to trucks and boat trailers at the ramps, as well as a parking problem, the fish are on the move here.

The opening of the general trout season is right in front of us. Keep in mind when you go to expect high water conditions in streams and rivers in the foothills and mountains. Also, as you pass by the foothills and into the mountains be aware of wildlife on the roadways, especially deer, which tend to move around this time of year more often and do not seem to understand that two or three tons of metal and plastic which make up the modern car or pickup can cause them serious harm and/or death if the animal gets in front of a moving vehicle.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife have planted catchable trout in the following waters. BUTTE COUNTY: DeSabra Reservoir; EL DORADO COUNTY: South Fork of the American River at Coloma; PLUMAS COUNTY: Jamison Creek

and the North Fork of the Feather River-Beldon; SIERRA COUNTY: North Fork of the Yuba River. In addition, Collins Lake has an ongoing planting schedule.

Our source at Lake Tahoe advises the browns and mackinaw trout were not cooperating with few fish brought in last week. Expect the bite to pick up and continue to be strong as we head into late spring and early summer.

We are told the kokanee salmon at Bullard's Bar are now in the shallow water and will be

found in the upper ten feet of water. This is also true for bass at Camp Far West where the fish are in the pre-spawn mode and can be found to 10 to 15 feet of water. The same thing is going on at Lake Oroville, which has improved some as far as fishing goes, with bass hanging out near the surface. Expect the spawn to take place as soon as the weather warms up.

Stonyford Rodeo Gets a New Roping Chute

Much to the delight of our cowboy competitors, the Stonyford Rodeo has upgraded its old orange roping chute with a beautiful new, Priefert blue, Model 98M chute. This chute supports the team roping, steer wrestling, and tie-down roping events.

Priefert is the gold standard in roping chutes. Priefert says that the Model 98M is the most widely used roping chute in the country. It is the official chute of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) and its National Rodeo Finals, along with other major roping organizations. It is also the quietest, most durable chute on the market.

The old chute made its

first appearance twenty-six years ago, in 1993, and replaced the wooden chute used since the arena was rebuilt after the 1960 fire. It had a good life but had grown clunky and loud towards its end, last year. The rodeo ropers and riders--and stock--will surely appreciate the smooth, quiet operation of this new chute.

The 2019 rodeo is a three-day event, May 3, 4, and 5. 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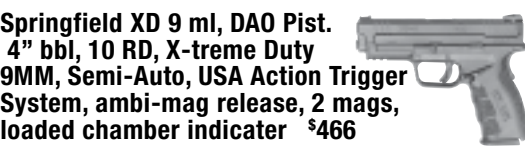

ease. One of the greatest advances of the modern era was the recognition that disease could be caused by pathogens, and that poor sanitary conditions were a prime culprit in the spread of disease. Sanitary engineers in the nineteenth century were in the forefront of the development of sewer systems that protected the public from epidemics of cholera and other water-borne illness. A survey conducted by the British Medical Journal in 2007 asked a group of experts and doctors what they considered the greatest medical advance since 1840. The answer, preferred over antibiotics and modern surgical methods, was sanitation. Liberal think is now understood to be a mental illness. See No Evil ... Hear No Evil ... Speak No Evil For Their Agenda

There are specific awards handed out for major achievements in different industries... like the Oscars for Movies, the Grammys for recording artists, the Pulitzer Prize for newspapers, etc., etc. Our "Energetic Bunny" President Trump almost from the Git-Go of the start of his presidency came up with his nickname for newspapers and TV media that twist the truth the way they feel they should interpret the news rather than reporting the facts and letting the reader or listener determine what to believe...the "Fake News". So why not have a Three Monkey Award (See No Evil...Hear No Evil...and Speak No Evil for their agenda) for those newspaper and TV media outlets that determine not to print or air certain articles that do not fit their particular ideology...that would fall into their category of "No News"...just don't print it or air it. This award certainly goes to the vast majority of print and TV media that address the immigration problem on our southern border in their very narrow and prejudiced view. They scream to high heaven of the "manufactured crisis" by the Open Borders crowd and pooh-pooh the idea of a humanitarian crisis. Here is a perfect example of "No News" in an article produced by Sharyl Attkisson who is an Emmy Award winning investigative journalist from The Hill publication in Washington, D.C. And this article appeared seven months ago on Sept. 19, 2018... so tack on another 10% to the "frightening" statistics because they are culled from a five year period from 2011 to 2016 (almost 3 years ago). It's a mystery to me why this attentive observer missed this "bombshell" article...**No News Monkeys???** From Sharyl: "New: little-reported statistics seem to prove two competing points in the illegal immigration debate. First, it's true that most illegal immigrants are not imprisoned for committing additional crimes (beyond coming here illegally) in the United States. One might fairly deduce that most are otherwise law-abiding. But "criminal aliens" — those who engage in other criminal acts — do make up a disproportion-

ate number of inmates in our prisons and jails. Seeing the numbers, **one might also fairly deduce that they commit serious crimes at a significantly higher rate than those in the U.S. legally.** Here's how the latest numbers break down. The U.S. population is around 328 million. It's estimated that about 11 million — or one in 30 — are illegal immigrants. Yet criminal aliens account for more than one in five federal prison inmates. Even assuming a pretty radical margin of error for the sake of argument, that would still mean illegal immigrants are drastically over-represented among the criminal population. And the actual picture may be worse, since the government says it has no way to be notified of all imprisoned illegal immigrants. So, instead, it counts a subset of them that it learns about through identifiers such as an FBI number. The latest information is included in a recent report from the Government Accountability Office (GAO). The summary by the leader of GAO's Homeland Security and Justice team, Gretta Goodwin, **seems oddly written to try to put a positive spin on the grim findings.** It highlights this figure: From 2011 through 2016, the criminal alien proportion of the total estimated federal inmate population generally decreased, from about 25 percent to 21 percent. Stop there and you might think we're on a good path. But dig into the actual report and footnotes — and it's difficult to sugarcoat the findings. For starters, 91 percent of federal criminal aliens were citizens of Mexico, Honduras, El Salvador, Dominican Republic, Colombia or Guatemala. There were more than 730,000 criminal aliens in U.S. or state prisons and local jails during the period measured. They accounted for 4.9 million arrests for 7.5 million offenses. (The numbers, according to the GAO: 197,000 criminal aliens in federal prisons, arrested 1.4 million times for 2 million offenses, between 2011 and 2016; 533,000 in state or local facilities between 2010 and 2015, representing 3.5 million arrests for 5.5 million offenses.)

The arrests include allegations of more than 1 million drug crimes, a half-million assaults, 133,800 sex offenses and 24,200 kidnappings. Even more serious, the imprisoned illegal immigrants, over a five-year period, had been arrested for 33,300 homicide-related offenses and 1,500 terrorism-related crimes. In terms of cost, federal taxpayers shelled out more than \$15 billion during the period studied — or \$2.5 billion a year — to keep criminal aliens behind bars in federal, state and local facilities. Many are repeat offenders. Of about 146,500 criminal aliens who finished a federal prison term, about one in six — around 24,800 — already had been imprisoned again at least once. Why hasn't this made headlines? It could be the way the GAO presented the results as a positive improvement. It took me some time to sort through and analyze what was really being reported. In addition, though they squabble publicly, some among both major political parties have a vested interest in keeping the status quo. Even when a single party has held both houses of Congress and the presidency, they haven't really changed much to address illegal immigration one way or another. If politicians ever truly get serious about reforming our immigration system — whether it's offering legal status to illegal immigrants and allowing more to come into the United States, or tightening the borders and enforcing existing laws to deport those who technically aren't allowed — it would seem either process should start with an honest look at the stats."

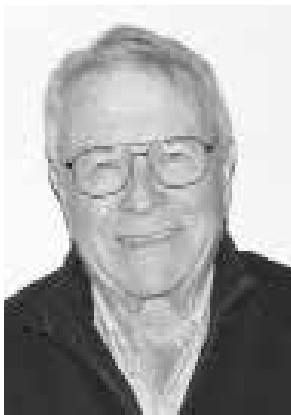
Samuel Adams wrote that the nation’s freedom would be secure so long as “virtue and knowledge are diffused among the people.” However, the tank is near empty of both attributes.

Yuba Water Agency Funds Marysville Ring Levee Design Work

Marysville, Ca.

The next phase of construction on the Marysville Ring Levee will remain on schedule with the help of a \$20,520 grant from Yuba Water Agency to the Marysville Levee Commission.

The funding will be used by the commission to hire MHM, a local engineering and surveying firm, to design a replacement pipe that runs through a portion of levee at one of the pump stations located near Highway 70 at the south side of Marysville.

The project is being built by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, with the Marysville Levee Commission as the local sponsor. The Corps asked the levee commission to design the replacement pipe, so the project will be ready to go out to bid this summer, for construction starting in 2020.

“This is an example of the partnerships it takes to make a project of this magnitude happen,” said Curt Aikens, Yuba Water Agency general manager. “There’s still a lot of work to be done before this project is complete in 2023, and it takes all of us doing our part to get us to the finish line.”

“The ring levee project is crucial to reducing the risk of flooding for the city and Yuba County residents,” said Yuba Water Agency Director Mike Leahy. “As we invest in making our community a better place to live, public safety has to be our number one priority.”

This design will also support the criteria necessary for the City of Marysville to obtain certification from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the state of California.

FEMA’s certification would document that the

levees meet or exceed the requirements for 100-year levees, meaning there is a 1-in-100 chance in any given year that a storm could come along that is larger than those levees were designed for. California has a stricter standard for urban levees and requires 200-year certification, meaning a 1-in-200 chance of overtopping in any given year.

“Once the entire Marysville Ring Levee project is complete, it is expected that it will provide Marysville with greater than 200-year level of protection,” said Aikens. “That would place the city among the best protected urban areas at risk of flooding in California’s Central Valley.”

MHM will begin designing the replacement pipe immediately to ensure the project stays on schedule.

Food and Farm News

Bill would aid tracking of rural crime

Aiming to slow rural crime and collect more data about the problem, a bill in the state Legislature would create a new category in the Penal Code: agricultural grand theft. Fines collected from persons convicted of agricultural grand theft would support rural crime-prevention programs. A California Farm Bureau policy advocate says the new category would also allow better tracking of crimes affecting farms and ranches.

Factors combine to reduce onion supplies

Rainy winter and spring weather has slowed onion season along the California-Oregon border, and a national group predicts short sup-

plies this spring. Farmers in the Klamath Basin say they would typically start planting onions this week, but fields have remained too muddy. The National Onion Association says it expects tight supplies for the next few months, due to factors including weather problems in the U.S., reduced imports and increased demand.

Census provides data on California farms, ranches

Use of solar panels and other renewable-energy systems on California farms and ranches more than doubled in five years, according to the new U.S. Census of Agriculture. California leads the nation in on-farm renewable energy. Among other data, the census shows about 37 percent

of the state’s farmers and ranchers are female; about 10 percent are military veterans; and the great majority of farms and ranches are owned by individuals, families or partnerships.

Satellite imagery could be harnessed for fire warnings

It wasn’t feasible a few months ago, but a University of California professor now believes it’s possible to create an early-warning system for wildfires, using existing satellite imagery. The UC Berkeley professor says data from a weather satellite and other systems can now be synthesized into a single application that could alert public-safety agencies and residents to wildfire movement.

Sutter County To Replace 13-Year-Old Voting System



The Sutter County Elections Department conducted an open house at the Sutter County Veteran's Memorial Building March 5 with two vendors seeking to provide a new voting system to Sutter County. Elected officials, members of local partisan political organizations, members of the Sutter County Grand Jury, and experienced election workers had a chance to try out the systems prior to a recommendation being made to the Board of Supervisors by Clerk-Recorder Donna Johnston.)

At the recommendation of Clerk Recorder Donna Johnston, the Sutter County Board of supervisors Tuesday, April 9, approved the purchase of a new voting system to replace a 13-year-old system that needs to be replaced due to technology and voting laws, and is no longer certified by the California Secretary of State. The Board of Supervisors approved a contract with Democracy Suite Systems to provide a touch screen voting system with 35 booths and touch screen units, a system server, high speed scanning equipment, work stations, software, printers, and other peripheral equipment, along with training support, for \$625,737. The Elections Department reviewed several

voting systems over the past two years, and sent an Information Technology staff member to DefCon, a voting system hacking event, to gain further knowledge prior to recommending a system. On March 5, the Elections Department held an open house with two vendors whose machines are certified as meeting requirements of the Secretary of State. Attendees included a mix of local elected officials, members of local partisan political organizations, members of the Sutter County Grand Jury, and experienced election workers. Attendees had an opportunity to see the two systems at work. Clerk Recorder Johnston said her recommendation to the Board was a combination of the Elections Depart-

ment research and overwhelming support for Dominion's system. Also, on March 5, the California Secretary of State's Office decertified Sutter County's existing system, purchased in 2005. The California Secretary of State's Office has awarded Sutter County a grant of \$313,000 toward purchase of a new system. The Clerk Recorder said the system should allow ballots to be counted quicker because it has a ballot adjudication function that will allow faster processing of problematic ballots, such as overvotes. The Clerk Recorder stated, "we are excited to utilize this new voting system which will be more secure, produce faster results while being cost effective, and ensure a transparent process".

Bonds “opportunity cost”

One the most difficult concepts for investors to understand is the relationship between bonds and interest rates. Know first that bonds are just IOU’s, and although many investors can’t describe exactly what a bond is, it as easy as rereading the last sentence over again.

A bond is an IOU and being such means when you buy a bond, you are loaning money to someone. For the loan, you’ll hopefully get your money back (in lieu of a default where you lose some or all of your money) and get paid a “gratuity” of sorts for loaning out your cash. That gratuity is really just the annual interest rate you’ll be paid, either periodically (installment payments paid usually quarterly, semi- annually or annually) or at the end of the loan, where you’ll get your money back and your interest for the entire loan.

When interest rates move in the general economy, it can affect the price of certain bonds more than others because of a mechanism called “opportunity cost”.

To illustrate, assume an investor agrees to lend out his money for a day and buys an IOU called a “day bond”. The issuer of the bond (the borrower, also known as the issuer of the bond) agrees to pay back the bond tomorrow. In exchange for this one day bond, the borrower agrees to pay 5% interest on top of the money he borrowed. Assuming he borrowed \$100, he will

pay back \$105.00, the extra five dollars being the interest.

Now assume interest rates are increased for whatever reason (of which there are many) and causes interest rates to rise everywhere (usually the case). One day bonds now pay 6%.

The effect on the buyer who bought yesterday’s one day bond at 5 %?

Probably nothing as the loan is only for a day and tomorrow the buyer can buy a new bond at the new rate of 6%. No harm-no foul.

Assume now the buyer decides the next day to buy an IOU with a ten year payback. The “term” of the bond (maturity date) is now not one day but TEN YEARS. Assuming the interest rate is 10% because the lender (bond buyer) has to go without his money for ten long years instead of a day (hence the higher interest rate).

Once again let’s assume for whatever reason the interest rises in the general economy (causing once again rates to rise on everything), and now ten year bonds, whose interest rates rose as rates rose around them, now pay 15%.

Here is where the pain part in bond investing comes in. Since new ten year bonds now pay 15%, and the original buyer is only getting 10%, this buyer is now locked in for ten years at an interest rate that is lower then everything offered now that rates have risen.

In essence the income of the bond to the buyer is 10%, but had he not bought the bond, he could now get 15%. His “opportunity cost” is therefore 15% while he is only getting 10%.

He is now losing 5% every year. If he needed to get his money out for some unforeseen reason, and had to sell his bond, no one would buy it as it only pays

ten percent while current IOUs (bonds) pay 15%.

The fact is he could sell his ten year bond, but since it pays less than current bonds, he has to sell his bond at a discount to entice a buyer.

Since the new buyer will lose 5% in “opportunity cost” because he is buying a bond paying ten percent when he could buy a bond paying 15%, he demands the bond be sold under its face value. If it was a 10,000.00 bond, he might only pay \$5,000.00 for it.

He will get paid the full value of the bond of \$10,000.00 which sounds great (paying \$5,000.00 and getting paid back \$10,000.00) but in reality, over the ten years he lost that much in opportunity cost. In other words, got five percent less interest than he could have by buying a current bond paying 15%.

In a nutshell, because new bonds are issued all the time, anytime that an interest rate moves in the general economy, the price of bonds can rise or fall. The longer the maturity (time to payback) the more the move in the bond when interest rates move (remember our “one day” bond example).

Although the math to calculate how much of a loss or gain will be if interest rates move is complicated, the understanding how and which way a bond moves is easily condensed.

The longer the bond (longer time to payback also known as the term or maturity), the more the price of the bond will move in response to interest rates. If rates rise, longer term bonds will fall more than short term bonds, and if rates fall, the opposite will occur.

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The Horses Are Out of the Barn

Wow, it's the 15th Annual Vintage Tractor Show in Oregon House. How time flies!

As time has passed, the show has become known for some special characteristics.

One being a tractor show where you may see some things you may not see at other farm shows. Another, would be that it is an activity you can take your family to and not spend a bunch of money, have fun, being safe, and help in the education of all who attend. It is a venue that families can take their tractors and go on drives, play games and every member of the family can participate.

A unique display will appear this year which I don't believe has ever appeared anywhere.

The trio includes interest for the tractor fans, car buffs and the public at large. A nicely restored 1966 Ford Mustang "Driver" will be framed by a Massey Harris Pony and a Massey

Harris Mustang!

The Massey Harris Pony was introduced in 1947 and the production run lasted till 1954. It was an answer to the competition from the Farmall Cub, John Deere L, and the Allis Chalmers G. The Industrial version was the Model 14. The engine was a Continental four cylinder producing a whopping 10 horsepower. The unit utilized a three speed transmission and a PTO was available. It was aimed at the small farm and the "Truck Garden" operation. Woods made a belly mower and might be seen in a cemetery or golf course. The popular little tractor was manufactured in Woodstock, Ontario.

The Massey Harris Mustang was also known as the Model 23 replacing the 22. Its production run was from 1952 to 1956. It was powered by a Continental four cylinder engine that produced 27 horsepower. Weight ranged from 2,928 to 4,522 pounds. This particular

Mustang has been modified for pulling with larger tires than normal, an aluminum radiator, and a few motor mods.

The center place gem is a nicely restored 1966 Mustang to be used as a driver not necessarily a show car. Much of the interior is original and the paint had a little extra yellow to enhance the Chinese Red. The 289 was replaced with a crate 302 fueled by Edelbrock and dual pipes.

The Mustang concept began in 1962, evolved in 1963, and was introduced in April of 1964. The design credit goes to John Najjar with a push from the Assistant General Manager of Ford at that time, Lee Iacocca. The idea of the long hood and short back became popular almost immediately. Ford expected to sell 100,000 the first year and in the first 18 months sales had exceeded 1,000,000. The popularity continued and by 2018 ten million Mustangs have been



sold. The original had a Six Cylinder, then a 260, and by 1965 a 289 could be had. The 302 was included by 1968, Basic types were the coupe, fastback, hatchback and a convertible.

The march to style improvements and power increases continue to today. The new Mustangs have a great sound and power we could have

only imagined in 1964.

The Mustang created a major force in the automobile industry and gave rise to the Camaro, Firebird, Javelin, Barracuda, and later to be introduced the Challenger, Celica, and Capri.

So come on up to Oregon House on May 4th and 5th and see Vintage Tractor Days.

Hear a "Hit and Miss",

go on a hay ride, play in a bounce house, visit a vendor, drive a pedal tractor, watch some fun tractor games, or learn how people food and farm animal food was produced. The Sierra foothills are beautiful, the folks are friendly, and the crowd and exhibitors will be having a ball.

Pasty Luncheons at Empire Mine

Served with a tasty difference

The traditional Cornish pasty has gone from humble to haute for the 2019 luncheon season. For the last eight years, specially-arranged Pasty (pronounced "pass-tee") Luncheons have been served outside Empire Mine's prestigious 1905 Clubhouse for organizations such as Hospice of the Foothills, teachers groups, book clubs, car clubs, hiking and dog-walking groups, as well as bus-tour groups.

"These weekday luncheons feature a traditional Cornish pasty, coleslaw, ice tea, lemonade, a cookie and ice cream," said Coordinator Jane Bland. "Served on bone china by do-cents in early 1900s' attire, each luncheon is a unique experience that could also include a special group tour of Empire Mine State Historic Park."

Few other meals can claim popularity that has spanned centuries the way pasties can. Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, published in 1387, mentions them; and then in the 1840s, Cornish tin miners introduced the pasty to the U.S.

"They were certainly a favorite with hard-rock gold miners here at Empire Mine," explained Deli Coordinator Troy Hammer. "Tasty and practical, the crust acted as insulation, helping to keep its savory contents nice and warm," he explained. The thicker, crimped border on one side acted like a disposable handle. Since the miners' hands were, most likely, far from clean, they could hold this part and eat the rest without contamination. Once they'd eaten the section filled with meat and vegetables, they could throw the remain-

ing crust rest away.

"Times have changed," said Bland, "and today the pasty is seen as a flavorful meal, rich in character and history – particularly the ones we'll be serving this season." For the first time, local market SPD will be providing luncheon pasties, made from authentic recipes. Deli Coordinator Heather Hare explained, "We make them in-house, with fresh ingredients, such as raw potatoes, onions and garlic. We'll be offering a choice of classic tri-tip, turkey, broccoli and cheese (with a hint of exotic curry), as well as a vegetable option. We've worked closely with Empire Mine for many years, and we're looking forward to enhancing their luncheons."

From May to September, groups of 12 to 50 people are welcome to enjoy these Cornish Pasty Luncheons – as well as the history behind each serving. The luncheon cost is \$20 per person (plus \$7 per person for admission to the Park). A private tour of the Park may also be scheduled for an additional \$4 per person.
