Scaffolding's Ready, Let's Go To Work

A scaffolding and shoring crew from SkyLine Scaffolding arrived in Smartsville bright and early on April 1. By the end of the week the building's bell tower was fitted with scaffolding and ready for restoration workers.

Damaged wood that has been exposed to the weather must be removed and replaced above the double front doors, consequently the weight of the bell tower above the doors must be securely supported until the wood is replaced. This shoring work is crucial for worker safety.

Skyline crews also installed scaffolding so that restoration workers can safely work high up on the cupola where the church bell resides. In addition, scaffolding allows workers to replace siding and paint the entire front of the bell tower. Although it hardly looks so large, the cupola is the size of a small bedroom. Louvers on the four openings of the octagonal cupola are boards one-inch thick!

John Bales and Molly Greenhouse, the Project Superintendent and Crew Leader also arrived on April 1 and have spent their first weekend getting ready for restoration to begin. John is a highly skilled woodworker with 30 years' experience in historic building restoration. Molly manages the volunteer helpers and makes sure the materials are in-place. Both John and Molly are regulars with HistoriCorps, our bell tower restoration partners, a nonprofit corporation that preserves and protects historic structures all over the U.S.

Construction will be in progress through May and therefore Smartsville's Pioneer Day, on Saturday April 27, will be a little different this year. Yes, we will still have music on stage, mining tours, arts and crafts vendors, good food, and kids' activities. And no construction work will be taking place on that day. But the church will look different, some things may be in different locations, and entering the church through the front

doors will not be possible.

We have asked John and Molly if they will share some of their experiences with visitors at Pioneer Day and we expect their presentation will be in the form of a question and answer session as part of our Timbuctoo Theater schedule.

So, be assured that Pioneer Day will be as great as ever. Be prepared to witness our historic former Catholic Church being made beauti-

ful again. Activities begin at 9am with an authentic Catholic gold-rush Mass conducted by retired Fr. Dan Madigan, followed by enough entertainment to make Pioneer Day worthy of the title "Best Small-Town Gold Rush Festival in California."

Going Broke by Borrowing

Those that run late paying bills are in financial trouble. However, debt-laden families can reduce their spending and look for new ways to earn money to meet their obligations in a timely fashion.

If families have incurred credit card debt (overspent) and cannot pay-off the card each month or have borrowed money for cars or projects, they are paying interest and therefore a premium to make purchases prior to being able to afford them. Some call this practice living above our means.

Since 2015, GOBankingRates has asked Americans how much they have in savings. Each year, the survey results have shown that a majority of adults don't even have \$1,000 in a savings account and are thus living paycheck to paycheck.

That's bad news and bad thinking. If workers become unemployed for just a short time it will mean disaster.



There has been lots of activity on the Feather River boat ramps, including Boyd's, Yuba City and Star Bend. In fact, there have been so many boats fishing for the striper run that if you do not get there early there will be no place to park. If this situation is happening on week days just think of the chaos on weekends.

We have a report of fishing success on the Feather last Friday. The wind was blowing and there were boats everywhere with most boats coming in with one striper or none at all. Just about all was used, including pile worms, cut bait, flies and streamers and also drifting with minnows.

The reason for the big crowd on the Feather River is because of the condition of the Sacramento River. Once it stabilizes and the water drops a bit some of the pressure on the Feather will move to the Sac.

Another problem on the Feather River was the way the Department of Water Resources cut of the flow at Oroville Dam. The water was dropping last week so fast if you were anchored you could actually see the water drop along the banks. This problem has been addressed in the past and apparently the problem has met with deaf ears at the state level.

Collins Lake, up above Browns Valley, is putting out some nice rainbow trout. A report told us the fishing pressure here is light during the week. On weekends fish have been caught, with the largest fish being a 7 pound 12 inch rainbow which was

Spring planting for vegetables underway despite rain

Vegetable growers around California are planting their spring crops, even though some are running late because of late-season rain. New food and nutrient data system provides deeper look

The U.S. Department

of Agriculture has released a new food and nutrient data system that integrates five types of data in one place. FoodData Central, intended for researchers, health care providers, policy makers and consumers, builds upon existing USDA data to help users understand the variability in nutrient values of foods, and how factors such as climate and agricultural practices can affect nutritional profiles.

Avocados could have potential in Sacramento Valley

The Sacramento Valley holds promise for growing the ever-popular avocado, according to a University of California Cooperative Extension farm advisor. In a recent talk in Winters for interested farmers, she noted the flat land, water supply and interest in local foods as benefits, and highlighted the GEM avocado variety as one with potential. Pollination is the primary problem for regional growers to overcome, requiring a pollinator variety and honeybees.



All The Progressive Plotters

Right after the 2016 election. Green Party candidate Jill Stein—cheered on by Hillary Clinton deadenders-sued in three states to recount votes and thereby overturn Donald Trump's victory in the Electoral College. Their chief tool was a strange new sort of presidential assassination chic, as Madonna, David Crosby, Robert de Niro, Johnny Depp, Snoop Dogg, Peter Fonda, Kathy Griffin, and a host of others linguistically vied with one another in finding the most appropriately violent end of Trump—blowing him up, burning him up, beating him up, shooting him up, caging him up, or decapitating him. Apparently, the aim—aside from careerist chestthumping among the entertainment elite-was to lower the bar of Trump disparagement and insidiously delegitimize his

presidency. When that did not work, during the president's first year in office, the Democrats and the media at various times sought to invoke the 25th Amendment, claiming Trump was so mentally or physically impaired that he was not able to carry out the duties of president. At one point, congressional Democrats called Yale University psychiatrist Dr. Bandy X. Lee to testify that Trump was unfit to continue. offered arguments from

27 psychiatrists and other mental health experts. In May 2017, acting FBI Director Andrew McCabe and Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein met secretly in efforts to poll Trump cabinet members to discover whether they could find a majority to remove Trump from office again on grounds that he was mentally unbalanced. According to McCabe, Rosenstein offered to wear a wire, in some sort of bizarre comic coup attempt to catch Trump off-guard in a confidential conversation.



If you are a creditor or a contingent creditor of the decedent, you must file your claim with the court and mail a copy to the personal representative appointed by the court within the later of either (1) four months from the date of first issuance of letters to a general personal representative, as defined in section 58 (b) of the California Probate code, or (2) 60 days from the date of mailing or personal delivery to you of a notice under section 9052 of the California Probate Code.

Other California statutes and legal authority may affect your rights as a creditor. You may want to consult with an attorney knowledgeable in California Law.

You may examine the file kept by the court. If you are a person interested in the estate, you may file with the court a Request for Special Notice (form DE-154) of the filing of an inventory and appraisal of estate assets or of any petition or account as provided in Probate Code section 1250. A Request for special Notice form is available from the court clerk.

Going Broke by **Borrowing**

Wasting money, overspending and paying thousands of dollars in interest reduces wealth. Many owe far more than they earn and have in assets. Owing more than you are worth is considered being bankrupt. For the wealthiest nation in the world, many fami-

lies and government being in horrible financial shape is a tragedy. Often, through a change of course an individual or family can right the financial ship. However, government does not have the will to change its ways. Government does not produce goods

but takes money from the citizens via taxes, hundreds of them, to operate. And, a massive bureaucracy has an interest in keeping the status quo. If enough taxes cannot be raised to satisfy the spending whims of politicians then borrowing funds

to burden later generations is the strategy. Presuming that the future will be financially brighter is foolish and will lead to bankruptcy and ruin. Borrowing makes a mismanaged government appear affordable. If borrowing was forbidden spending would come under much greater scrutiny. Nothing

sharpens the mind as having to face the full cost of one's choices with limited resources. Borrowing creates a gross injustice burdening those too young to vote and the unborn. As environmentalists rightly argue that we should leave the earth in better shape than we found it, we are leaving a toxic financial

future for our children.

Governments like Yuba County hide the fact that they are broke, being consistently unable to meet financial obligations with cash flow. In fact, it wasn't until 2012 that the unfunded debt owed for employee pensions was mandated by state accounting standards (GASB #68) to be included in the books. Prior to 2012, millions in debt was hidden from the taxpayers per the politicians and union leadership.

Appeal Democrat writer Chris Kaufman noted on March 28, 2019 that Yuba County was to borrow \$9 million from the Yuba County Water Agency to fund road repairs. Not a whimper was heard from citizens who feel impotent when it comes to stopping shortsighted politicians from plundering the county coffers.

This \$9 million isn't one of these short-term 12month loans to pay down runaway pension debt. It has a 10-year payback with more than \$1.1 million in interest according to Kaufman. So, if the \$9 million for roads is wisely spent then taxpayers paid \$10.1 million for \$9 million in road work. Taxpayers lose \$1.1 million of their hard-earned money as a penalty for bad management.

This is lousy stewardship no matter whether county supervisors created a sweet interest rate at the water agency or not. Taking 10-years to pay for a road is crazy, but crazy has become the norm for government. What will the condition of the repaired roads be in 10years when the payments are complete? Do we borrow once again?

In 10-years the current supervisors and bureaucrats will be gone while leaving the debt burden for a future generation. Borrowing leads to more mismanagement, poor spending scrutiny and an expanding government bureaucracy.



This year there will be three displays that have not been shown in Oregon House or any place else.

One of the fun things about the Vintage Tractor Hobby is the teasing that go on between friends. Such as," If it ain't red, keep it in the shed. (Sorry to my high school English teacher) Friends don't let friends drive red tractors."

One of my buddies has a special kind of sickness," IH Fever". He likes RED. I have pity for his poor judgment. Not only does he like red tractors, the affliction goes deeper than that. He will spend years and money on anything International.

International Harvester was formed in 1902 by representatives of the JP Morgan Law Firm. They combined five companies including two major rivals, McCormack and Deering. The conglomer-

ate produced farm equipment, construction equipment, trucks, automobiles, household items and an array of commercial products.

Their first truck ap-

peared on the market in 1907 and remain in the large truck market today known as Navistar International. Manufacturing of pick-

A Look at Socialism

I have written about the socialistic movement in many recent columns, reacting to the increased interest in this flawed but seductive economic model so many people seem to be biting on.

Just recently I was contacted by a movie producer who gleaned one of many ideas put forth in my articles that intrigued him to the point where he wants to make a documentary on the subject with yours truly at the forefront. I'm flattered of course. It won't be the first documentary on me and hopefully won't be the last.

The thing that caught his attention in my articles was one particular psychological allure of socialism I theorized and to date I honestly have not seen any other columnist take this tact.

The basic premise of the socialist economic model is well known and well publicized in the propaganda supporting it and it goes like this:

The capitalistic system is flawed, the worker is taken advantage of, and a central government needs to take control of things to level the playing field. Offshoots of the capitalistic criticism encompasses the belief that the rich are greedy and uncompassionate, that they put profits before people, and over time the wealth concentrates in the hands of a very few, while more and more average Joe's are economically ground up under the wheels of capitalistic greed.

The conclusion drawn is a socialistic based economy would benefit the worker and even out the playing field.

Humm, where have we heard that before?

I don't think there's much argument from socialism's supporter on these statements. Note I didn't say realities. The statements are the familiar catcalls of socialists now and in the past and if they were true, perhaps the socialists would have valid point or two. The drawbacks and realities of how socialism really works is for another day

however. What caught the ear of the movie producer was my claim that the sharpest hook of socialistic propaganda is more of a psychological one then economic.

And here is what I said: "Socialism reaches out to the very core of ones beliefs and taps into deep rooted self-blame and self-esteem issues that might haunt one's mind. The opinion of oneself is often based on being able to support oneself and earn a decent living.

Socialism replaces that doubt with a new and more palatable concept. One's economic plight is not the result of bad choices, bad luck or lack of work ethic. Instead it's the systems

Keep in mind it is a difficult reality one faces when they can't earn a decent living. It touches the core of ones self-esteem, their view of themselves and their self-worth image.

Regardless of how one arrived at where they're at, not being able to afford their preferred lifestyle is a gut wrenching reality and can be a demeaning one. The appeal of socialism lifts the self-criticism inherent is being not making enough money and introduces the concept "it's not my fault where I'm at but the fault of greedy corporations, a profit based, inherently uncompassionate system and all the things that go along with socalled capitalistic greed.

The seduction of socialism gives validation to one's plight, shifts the blame to others and away from one's self. It restores self-esteem and redirects it into anger. Anger toward the system, the people that have more, and of course the "evil corporations".

In one quick and easy swallow, the socialistic pill cures all self-doubt, eliminates the concept of responsibility and unites you with others who fall under the belief:

It's not me, it's the system.

In plain English, it's the system that made me poor, I knew all along it wasn't me, and I'm no longer responsible for where I am at. Someone else is. It restores ones view of themselves, buffers it with anger, and gives them a target to aim at. And all with a happy ending where everyone has a home, a new car, can sit at the river all day and write poetry and sing songs in a big circle after a dinner of grey gruel and dry biscuits.

(Just kidding about the last part, although the last part is the only truism in the whole paragraph)

Socialism indeed has its enticements. They run deep into one's psyche. Its attracts people to bite on the lie. And bite they are. By shifting the responsibility of one's life choices onto somebody else, then promising the best of all things paid for by someone else, the words "someone else" are the key components. Socialism looks outwardly for one's satisfaction in life and also its blame. Personal responsibility is set aside and replaced by the incrimination of anyone but self.

Sadly, its promised solutions will never be, and have never been. Either the people go broke under the weight of the expense, or the government does.

Now that the rain is finally subsiding and Spring is in the air, there is an abundance of beauty to enjoy and be a part of with the various docent led walks offered at the South

Yuba River State Park. Wildflower Walks are offered at least into mid-May every Saturday at 10am and Sunday at 11am. Docent led hikes last about 1.5 hours. The Buttermilk Bend trail is an easy 2 mile hike out and back. The Buttermilk Bend Trail, which winds above the wild and scenic South Yuba River, is highly regarded for the many species that bloom on its hills and slopes. Each season

with an everchanging tableau of spring color. Early season walkers may find Western Buttercups, Zigzag Larkspur, Shooting Stars. By midseason, the hills usually turn gold and purple with Tufted Poppies and a variety of lupine. Mid to late season floral treats can include Fairy Lanterns, Chinese Houses, Birds-eye Gilia. Docents will share facts, legends and the many uses of the flowers and plants along the trail.

Bird Walks will take place on April 13, April 26, May 3 and May 11 all at 8am. Anticipate seeing birds common to a wood-

land/riparian habitat such

as Towhees, Dippers, Var- Sunday ious Wood Peckers, Blue Birds, Kinglets, Phoebes, Quail, Bald Eagles during the winter breeding season and the many spring migrants in the park (Warblers, Grosbeaks, Swallows and more). All bird walks are also docent led and last about two hours.

To make your visit complete, bring picnic lunch and allow time to take in the park Visitor Center, check out the covered bridge (while is it under renovation) and barn (both built in 1862), and the restored 1920's information.
