Yuba County Academic Decathlon

The Yuba County Academic Decathlon was held on Saturday, February 2nd at Marysville High School. Teams from Lindhurst, Marysville, Wheatland and Yuba City Charter High School tested their knowledge of the 1960's. Thirty-three Decathletes arrived at 7:00 a.m. Saturday morning to begin a series of 30-minute timed tests in Mathematics, Language & Literature, Art, Music, Science, Social Science and Economics. The students were interviewed before a panel of judges and gave an impromptu speech. Earlier in the previous week, the decathletes wrote an essay that was judged and scored dur-

ing the competition. The day ended with an exciting Super Quiz where parents and loved ones cheered on their favorite team. Many community leaders volunteered their time as judges and proctors. Marysville High School came out on top with the highest overall points per school totaling 36,127.56, Lindhurst High School had a total of 28,281.05, Yuba City Charter School ended with 26,160.32 points and Wheatland High School with 16,553.49. Isabella Sorensen a senior at Marysville High School who competed in the Honor Division won gold medals in Speech, Interview, Music, Language & Literature and was the overall winner in the

Honors Division; winning a total of nine medals. Sean Simeroth, a sophomore at Marysville High School who competed in the Scholastic Division won medals in Math, Science, Art, Economics, Social Science, Language & Literature; winning a total of fourteen medals. Christopher Moyer a senior at Marysville High School competing in the Varsity Division won twelve medals in Speech, Science, Art, Interview, Economics, Essay, Language & Literature; winning a total of eleven medals.

The Academic Decathlon relies on volunteers from the community to judge each event. Colonel Robert Clement, Commander of the 9th Maintenance Group along with twenty other Beale Air Force volunteers were exponential in making this event so successful. We also had the support from community leaders including Chief Sachs from the Marysville Police Department and Sheriff Anderson from the Yuba County Sheriff's Department.

Marysville High School will compete at the California Academic Decathlon in Sacramento on March 22nd - 23rd.

GJ Secrecy Protects Wrong-Doers

In a June 25, 2018 letter addressed to judges Brian Aronson and Sarah Heckman, the Sutter County Grand Jurors resigned in protest saying "... we were prevented from fulfilling our duty as watchdog for Sutter County."

Their 2017-18 report due by the end of June had twice been rejected and edited by Judge Aronson, so 17 members of the Grand Jury (GJ) walked-out after refusing to sign the Aronson version. The GJ report traditionally is released to the public before June 30 following jury members signing the document and before a new jury is impaneled.

Judge Aronson took the oversight of the jury from Judge Sarah Heckman mid-stream as troubles developed with the unsavory content of the report. Meanwhile, Judge Aronson was running for another four-year term on the Superior Court bench.

Being unopposed, Aronson won the June primary but just 120 days later after twice refusing to approve the Grand Jury's version of its investigations withdrew from serving his fifth four-year term beginning January 1, 2019. Minus the GJ fiasco, the "retirement" would be considered strange and erratic short of a major health crisis. What changed for the judge in 120 days?

The Aronson move certainly deprived the voters of the opportunity to choose the next judge.

The official massaged explanation for the GJ report not being released to the public (the little people) was that jury

Today's Barbarians

Liberals seem to be competing for the title of most committed baby killer. At one time in America there was no right to kill a small human. It was a crime.

Then, the 1973 Supreme Court ruled it could happen sometimes and then expanded the "right" to kill to all the time up to and during birth. Not to be outdone, former California Senator Barbara Boxer said that possibly the right to end the life of a newborn should extend 1-2 weeks after birth. Parents may experience birthing remorse.

In 1993, ethicist and later Princeton Professor Peter Singer shocked many Americans by suggesting that no newborn should be considered a person until 30-days after birth and that the attending physician should kill some disabled babies on the spot.

In 1979 Singer wrote, "Human babies are not born self-aware, or capable of grasping that they exist over time. They are not persons"; therefore, "the life of a newborn is of less value than the life of a pig, a dog, or a chimpanzee."

This liberal thought is a return to "When in Rome, do as the Romans do." A low view of human life was one of Rome's pagan depravities. At the advent of the early church, Greeks and Romans were infamous for infanticide. Those born deformed or frail were often killed by drowning and others more brutally.

Plutarch (A.D.46-120) mentions that Carthaginians "offered up their own children, and those who had no children would buy little ones from poor people and cut their throats as if they were so many lambs or young birds; meanwhile the mother stood by without a tear or moan." Infant girls were especially vulnerable where for instance in Greece it was rare for even wealthy families to raise more than one daughter.

Large families were atypical in Greco-Roman society in part due to infanticide. So common was the practice that Polybius (205?-118 B.C.) blamed the population decline of Greece on it.

Infanticide was also practiced in India, China, Japan, the Brazilian jungles and also among the Eskimos. James Dennis

Adoption Event Rescheduled

ALTURAS, Ca. The Modoc National Forest has placed 128 horses from the 2018 gather since mid-November, leaving approximately 121 horses at

the Double Devil Wild Horse Corrals near Alturas, Calif still in need of placement.

All these horses are available for adoption and those more than 10 years old are

also available for sale with limitations. <https://go.usa.gov/xQ3r3>. An "Online Adoption Event" is scheduled for Feb. 11-15, 2019. Adopters and buyers will be able to pick out their horses anytime during the event and make appointments for pickup.

At times other than specific adoption events, adopter/purchaser viewing, selection and pickup opportunities are by appointment on Wednesdays and Fridays every week and the first Saturday of every month. Appointments must be confirmed at least seven days in advance after filling out the "Viewing and Pickup Scheduling" request form at <https://go.usa.gov/xQ3r3> and submitting it to modoc_info@fs.fed.us.

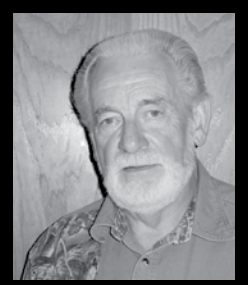

FISHIN' TALK

There is no need to froth at the bit while stuck indoors during the winter months. The urge to go fishing can happen all months of the year. So far this year we have seen lots of rain, snow and cold, not to forget winds that have come and gone and those which will hit us in the coming months.

Fish which reside in the waters of the Sacramento valley and the foothills which surround it do not leave when the storms, high water, strong winds and colder water take place during the winter months. Some of the fish who are in these waters year round are catfish, blue gill, crappie, small mouth and largemouth bass, spotted bass, resident striped bass and trout in the reservoirs.

We must remember fishing during the winter months is different from spring, summer and fall. For instance, largemouth bass could be just about anywhere in the shallows or down deep. By the same token small mouth bass, when presented with high, muddy or murky water will be found in rivers and streams where they will have the least resistance. This will usually find them close to the bank where the current is slower. However, in still waters target deep holes and check for underwater protection such as fallen trees.

Rainbow and brown trout differ in regard to where they will be found.

With high and cold water rainbows will hug the shoreline to find the least resistance to the current. When the water is at normal temperature and not running high they will be found in faster water such as ripples and choppy water. Brown trout will tend to stay out of the faster water until the stream or river gets back to normal.

Steelhead, which are actually rainbow trout which live in the ocean and move upstream to spawn, are in the rivers at this time. They will be active and can be found by concentrating your fishing in deep pools and water with moderate flow. Excellent areas can be found at the low ends of rivers. Steelhead will feed on the way upstream as well as on the way back to the ocean. Keeps this in mind when planning an outing for this ocean going trout.

Striped bass basically do not live in rivers but migrate upstream each

year to spawn. However, you should keep in mind that not all striped bass head back to the ocean after spawning. Many stick around all year long. These fish are called resident fish and can be found throughout the river systems of the Sacramento Valley. The best time to fish for stripers is during the runs upstream in the spring due to the huge amount of fish available.

No matter where you fish or what species you are after we strongly advise to check local regulations. Only in this way can you be sure you are legal and are following the rules in regard to preserving our natural fisheries. Remember this time of year to be patient, slow down the retrieve, dress warm and find the fish, which will more than likely be swimming in different areas than you are used to fishing.

Funding to Offset Property Tax for Butte County

The Senate Budget & Fiscal Review Committee passed a measure to provide \$31.3 million for Butte and Lake Counties to offset property tax

revenue loss from recent wildfires. This measure moves to the full Senate for its consideration on Monday, February 11. If passed by the Legislature and approved by the Governor, Butte and Lake Counties will receive this funding for four years. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), Vice Chair of the Senate Budget & Fiscal Review Committee, issued the following statement:

"Three months ago today, the Camp Fire raged through Butte County, killed 85* people and devastated thousands of lives.

"Homes and properties were decimated to rubble. Their lives will never be the same.

"This proposed funding by the Legislature and the Governor is needed and much appreciated."

*On February 7, the fatality count dropped from 86 to 85 because remains previously thought to be two individuals were discovered as the same person.

Black History Month at Yuba Sutter Arts

Marysville, Ca. Black History Month, also known as African-American History Month in the United States, is an annual observance also celebrated in several other countries. It began in the 1970s as a way for remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. It started in the 1970s and is celebrated annually in the United States in February.

On Saturday, February 16th from 1-3pm at its Burrows Theater, 630 E Street in Marysville, Yuba Sutter Arts will host a tribute to the arts. The event will show the many diverse ways Africa and African Americans have contributed and influenced literature, music of different genres and various styles of dance. Paintings by local artists will be on display and the artists will be on hand to discuss their work and their inspiration. There will be an "open mic" with spoken word poetry and prose readings and recitations. The Bethel AME Choir will perform.

On Thursday February 21st at 6pm, again in the Burrows Theater at 630 E Street Marysville, guest speaker, Rachane Jackson, will present "Justice Pending" which was created to shed light on the historical connection and depth of the current #BlackLivesMatter movement as it relates back to the Civil Rights Movement. Sponsored by the Tri-County African-American Alliance, "Justice Pending" is a presentation and community conversation with law enforcement that will address any misunderstanding and miscommunication that may exist on either side. Rachane will elaborate on the concept that injustice for one is injustice for all.

Rachanee is a Yuba City native, who obtained a Bachelor of Psychology Degree from Sacramento State, graduating Summa Cum Laude. Since returning to her hometown, Rachanee has dedicated herself to bettering her community. She has been working in the local schools in various capacities for the last 6 years where she is currently a substitute teacher. She has worked with the Yuba-Sutter Literacy Program, taught and served with different churches, works with a non-profit



out of Sacramento that teaches urban youth about growing their own food, sustainable living and what's going on with our environment. She's a member and former club president of Toastmasters International, co-chair of the Black History Month Committee, member of the Tri-County African American Alliance and a licensed

insurance agent. These events are being held in collaboration with the Yuba College Umoja Community, the Sutter County Library and the Sutter County Memorial Museum.

Groups ask Congress to tackle rural infrastructure

Congress should move quickly to enact bipartisan infrastructure legislation, which should address the specific needs of rural communities, according to a coalition of 200-plus organizations. In a letter

to congressional leaders, the coalition said rural communities have unique needs for drinking water, transportation, power, broadband and other facilities. The California Farm Bureau Federation and other California organizations are part of the coalition.

Rose growers concentrate on year-round sales

With Valentine's Day approaching, California rose growers say the holiday has become only a minor part of their business. Imported red roses dominate the market so, to stay in business, California farmers have diversified. Most now grow roses in whites, pinks and other less traditional colors, and depend on sales for use at weddings and other special events during the year.

Tomato growers assess 2019 plans

Plantings of processing tomatoes apparently will remain stable in California. The partial government shutdown delayed an official estimate of planting intentions, but the California Tomato Growers Association estimates farmers will produce 12 million tons of tomatoes for use in salsa, ketchup and other products. In addition, groups that promote tomato products and avocados plan a joint marketing campaign to underline the combined benefits of the crops.

Americans have been eating more cheese, and dairy processors have been making more--but the supply has been outpacing the demand. Cheese stocks have risen to record levels nationwide. 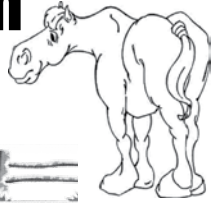
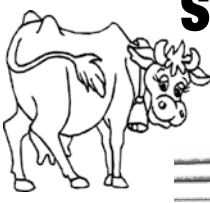

Farm Bureau Sues to Block River Flows

A plan for lower San Joaquin River flows misrepresents and underestimates the harm it would cause to agricultural resources in the Central Valley, according to the California Farm Bureau Federation, which filed suit today to block the plan.

Adopted last December by the State Water Resources Control Board, the plan would redirect 30 to 50 percent of "unimpaired flows" in three San Joaquin River tributaries—the Stanislaus, Tuolumne and Merced rivers—in the name of increasing fish populations in the rivers. The flows plan would sharply reduce the amount of water available to irrigate crops in regions served by the rivers.

In its lawsuit, filed in Sacramento County Superior Court, Farm Bureau said the flows plan would have "far-reaching environmental impacts to the agricultural landscape in the Central Valley," and that

More forest management efforts could be in the works for the Yuba River Watershed with the help of a grant approved by Yuba Water Agency.

The \$235,000 grant will provide matching funds to double the impact of a collaboration between the South Yuba River Citizens League and Camptonville Community Partnership. The groups are jointly applying for a grant from the California Department of Conservation, so they can fund a full-time watershed coordinator position.

The watershed coordinator will work with public and private landowners to plan and coordinate projects within the watershed, including a biomass facility

those impacts had been "insufficiently analyzed, insufficiently avoided and insufficiently mitigated" in the board's final plan.

"The water board brushed off warnings about the significant damage its plan would cause to agricultural resources in the Central Valley, labeling it 'unavoidable,'" CFBF President Jamie Johansson said. "But that damage can be avoided, by following a different approach that would be better for fish and people alike."

The Farm Bureau lawsuit says the water board failed to consider reasonable alternatives to its flows-dominated approach, including non-flow measures such as predator control, food supply and habitat projects for protected fish, and said it ignored "overwhelming evidence" that ocean conditions, predation and lack of habitat—rather than river flows—have been chief contributors to reducing

in Camptonville and a forest health project in the north Yuba watershed. Yuba Water Agency's grant will provide enough funding to hire an additional watershed coordinator for an estimated four years.

"The impacts of a wildfire in the Yuba Watershed would be severe," said Yuba Water Agency Chairman Brent Hastey. "We really are serious about being the first sustainably managed watershed in California, and this is a big step in that direction."

The watershed coordinator position will provide governance and coordination to improve watershed-scale planning efforts. Yuba Water Agency can contribute grant funds for this because of the direct impact

fish populations.

The water board's analysis of impacts on agricultural resources "is inadequate in several respects," Farm Bureau said. The lawsuit says the board plan fails to appropriately analyze its impact on surface water supplies and, in turn, how cutting surface water would affect attempts to improve groundwater under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act—all of which would cause direct, indirect and cumulative effects on agricultural resources.

"California farmland is a significant environmental resource, providing food, farm products and jobs for people throughout the state, nation and world," Johansson said. "Before cutting water to thousands of acres of farmland for dubious benefit, the state must do more to analyze alternatives that would avoid this environmental harm."

GJ Secrecy Protects Wrong-Doers

members refused to sign the document. That's kind of like saying she got pregnant from using the drinking fountain. However, Sutter County department heads, Supervisors, City of Yuba City officials and a few privileged ones, the local aristocracy, got a copy.

GJ members swear an oath of confidentiality or secrecy regarding the proceedings and that is currently restraining them from exposing wrong-doing, unethical and possible criminal behavior on the part of local officials.

Is that the purpose of the oath and should people be manipulated by oaths to conceal criminal or crooked acts? Not some, but all

jury members resigned rather than sign Aronson's "doctored" report.

The Valparaiso University Spring 1989 Law Review, "Grand Jury Secrecy v. The First Amendment: A Case for Press Interviews of Grand Jurors" gives numerous reasons why GJ secrecy should not be ironclad.

"Attempting to justify grand jury secrecy from the defendant's view-point, such as the protection of individuals groundlessly accused, is unconvincing. Grand jury secrecy is not designed for the benefit of the defendant. In England, the argument that the grand jury might protect the accused

from oppression was not convincing enough to keep the grand jury from being abolished. In America, the press routinely reports on individuals named in lawsuits or charged with criminal offenses, despite the fact that many of these actions do not result in the assessment of liability or a criminal conviction." (America's Grand Jury was modeled after England's.)

"Perhaps this reporting occurs partly because our judicial system is founded on the concept that everyone is innocent until proven guilty. A grand jury indictment (or finding - author added) is nothing more than an accusation. Obviously some individuals ignore this concept. When all considerations are taken into account, however, the attempted protection of falsely accused individuals is insufficient to warrant maintaining such a hard line on secrecy that press interviews of grand jurors are forever prohibited."

The Valparaiso Review then addresses abuse and manipulation by prosecutors, "One of the major reasons for advocating press access

to grand jurors is to combat the well-documented and numerous instances of abuse that strict secrecy has produced. The grand jury, often esteemed as a bulwark of freedom, is commonly and unethically manipulated by prosecutors in order to benefit his or her own personal motives."

"Recognizing the potential for abuse, Supreme Court Justice Douglas included in a dissent former U.S. District Court Judge Wil-

liam Campbell's telling statement: 'Any experienced prosecutor will admit that he can indict anybody at any time for almost anything before any grand jury. Thus, secrecy is a tempting invitation to prosecutors to indict whomever they choose and thereby make a mockery of justice. Recognizing these problems, the Supreme Court has stated that the Constitution should not tolerate the transformation of the grand jury into an in-

strument of oppression. This warning has not stopped the abuse."

In Sutter County's case the GJ's investigation of the District Attorney and the County Counsel's misbehavior along with other governing misdeeds are the crux of Judge Aronson's move to conceal, manipulate, protect, and oppress, thus bringing a mockery to Sutter County governance.

in the 1890's wrote that it was a common practice in regions of Africa and was well-known among the indigenous people of North and South America before European settlers with Christian values outlawed it.

Along with the common practice of abortion Christians considered Greco-Roman infanticide to be murder. These early societies also practiced child abandonment where infants were tossed in rivers, manure piles, dumped on roadsides, offered to prey or left where others might take them up.

Historical data reveals that rather than poverty being the cause for a high Roman abortion rate it was that honor and respect for marriage was gone among Romans. "Marriage, depraved of all moral character was no longer a sacred bond, and alliance of souls."

When early Christians came to Rome from Jerusalem and parts of Asia Minor they defied Rome's pagan disregard for life. Romans considered the person valuable only if he could contribute to the political arena and benefit the state.

Christians, like their Jewish ancestors saw humans as the crown of God's creation; believing mankind was made in the image of God. Human life was not cheap and expendable but was to be honored and protected at all costs regardless of its form or quality. Christians rescued and raised discarded infants.

Today, many western nations are not birthing enough children to replenish their populations. Singapore and Russia are now offering bonuses for births to bolster their shrinking numbers. China recently reversed its one child policy because families

aborted their females preferring a male. Now, there is a severe shortage of females for marriage leading to the trafficking of ladies from nearby nations.

However, in contrast to modern states, but in keeping with its Biblical roots, Israel is having a baby boom. It has the highest per capita rate of population growth in the developed world. Jewish families have an average of 3.1 children compared to 1.7 in other developed countries (US 1.9).

Israel's policy is pro-child and pro-family. At this birthrate, by 2050 Israel's population will increase from 8.7 million to 15 million. Israelis want to keep a demographic dominance in the region and replace the 6 million Jews murdered in the Holocaust.

While the U.S. media and the political left celebrate the murder of vulnerable babies, Israel is promoting life.

Yuba Water Agency will be better able to accommodate its growing business needs with the purchase of additional office space, just blocks from the agency's current headquarters in Marysville.

This week, the agency approved moving forward with the purchase of the 4,500 square foot former American Automobile Association building located at 1205 D Street at a cost of \$730,000.
