Chill on ICE Detainee Accusations

A “hunger strike” that began with 46 ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) detainees at the Yuba County jail to protest jail conditions lasted for 6 days (Feb 10-15). “No-borders” activists who want all prisoners in ICE detention centers set-free offered the typical exaggerated rhetoric and sound-bite inaccuracies as fodder for the media.

Autumn Gonzalez of Norcal Resist said, “A lot of people say Yuba is the worst experience they’ve had. It’s really hard on people emotionally and mentally.” Most inmates would disagree with Gonzalez.

A deported former inmate who lost his case called from Central Mexico last week. Unaware of the protests he described his experience being incarcerated at Yuba County as life changing. He received daily care for his diabetes and attended numerous classes and religious services over his nearly one year stay.

Rhonda Rios Kravitz with the inmate activist group Alianza says “She can’t speak to the criminal history of all of the detainees, but does say they have served their sentences as provided by the criminal justice system and should be released into their communities here in the United States. That includes two gang members convicted of murder.”

Criminal history facts are of no concern to Kravitz since she believes noncitizens who commit crimes should be released in the U.S. after serving a sentence. However, that is not what immigration law says. Only U.S. citizens get that privilege. Non-citizens committing crimes may forfeit their permission to be in America.

Local public defender Katie Finch at a Sacramento rally said, “We believe that no human is illegal and no human who enters a jail facility loses their humanity.” This straw man argument is nonsensical and double-talk. Is Finch saying no person is illegal but just the act of killing someone is illegal? OK then. So what? Should we come-up with a new term for people who are in this country violating immigration law or “illegally?”

No one is contradicting Finch to argue that people indeed forfeit their humanity when incarcerated in America? However, few housed at Yuba County would prefer a stay in their home country’s jail. Forfeiting your humanity does occur in Russia, China, Vietnam, Mexico, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Chile

Prosecutors Care Less About Corruption

Patrick McGreevy’s article in the LA Times last week continues to draw attention to the lawlessness exhibited by agencies, along with city and county governments when it comes to using the taxpayers’ money for political campaigns.

Alice Germond, chairwoman of the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC), and other FPPC members are requesting to expand their prosecutorial powers so they can act when district attorneys do not.

“We want the opportunity to take action when public money is misused,” Germond said. “Californians expect our tax dollars to be used appropriately and when that is not the case, I want to be able send a strong message on behalf of our citizens. And I want to set a clear precedent that such behavior is unacceptable.”

An FPPC study indicated that since 2015, the agency received 34 allegations of public agencies misusing taxpayer funds for campaign purposes, including mass mailings. However, “The Enforcement Division is not aware of any actions brought by state or local prosecutors related to those cases,” said the re-

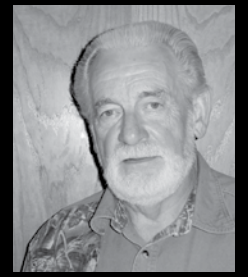

Recent Storms and more to come have muddied up local reservoirs and rivers in the Sacramento Valley and foothills. Waters are running high in streams, creeks and rivers with boat ramps closed on the Sacramento River. Fishing has also suffered with murky and dirty water along with cold water temperatures.

Sturgeon are all over the Sacramento River at this time but are not cooperating with anglers due to the cold water. We have reports of sturgeon being found in the Feather River at the mouth of the Bear River as well. Stripers are also in the system since the planting of steelhead smolts at Boyd's Pump below Yuba City. The release of these small steelhead has always brought up the strippers from below to gorge on a good meal.

The kokanee salmon at Bullard's Bar Reservoir have moved out of the main body and are now in the back arms of the lake. This is due to the warmer water in these areas. Both boat ramps are open but we advise caution due to the large amount of debris floating on the surface.

We checked with our weather person and he advised us to expect more rain with a drying out period this week. He also said the rains are not over and will return, but probably not as severe as the past weeks. Expect wind to be a part of upcoming storms.

As usual this time of year we recommend

calling ahead if you plan on fishing reservoirs above 4000 feet. Many reservoirs and lakes are snowed in at this time with most roads closed or not plowed.

Collins Lake received a trout plant last week from the Department of Fish and Wildlife. (DFW). This plant will be the kickoff

for more plants in February and into spring and summer by the Lakes penned trout along with occasional plants by the DFW.

Closing thought: When we replace- "why this happening to me," -with "what is it this trying to teach me?" Everything shifts.

etc. But, most all inmates prefer US detention for a chance to win the national lottery of freedom and cradle to grave entitlements here.

Sacramento activist Ruth Ibarra makes the bizarre claim that "ICE offers perverse incentives for struggling communities like Yuba County to house detainees in substandard conditions for financial benefits." Ibarra twists the truth and forgets that in the real world money buys food and care.

When Yuba County first offered space for ICE inmates it was at the completion of a new jail expansion in early 1995. The fact is detention centers and jails are located in communities up and down the state that take ICE detainees.

No protesting detainee really got hun-

gry. Inmates began by refusing their 3 meals-per-day but ate commissary foods instead. Then, those that had court out of town during the week ate lunch there as well. This is not fasting here but rather making a show by turning down the jail cuisine that is highly regarded by inmates and that correctional officers eat as well.

As for medical and dental, where can the common citizen go for help under Obamacare to compare with the 24 hr. medical service for inmates and if necessary Adventist Health a few blocks away?

What is ignored in media coverage and in the comments of activists is the fact that most if not all of these inmates can be released if they agree to deportation. They have served time for criminal

acts and now what is in question is their legal status to remain in the U.S. They are here until their court proceedings are complete which can be months or years of waiting and appealing.

One inmate living locally after serving 3 years federal time for transporting kilos of heroin and then 8 months in Yuba County Jail appealing her immigration case said Yuba was a great place to be held, officers treated her like a person and she was able to start a new life.

Sheriff Wendell Anderson distributed a detailed news release listing crimes by category of ICE detainees in custody. If they had not committed these crimes they would not have deportation issues.

Of 177 ICE inmates the following are some of the crimes they served time for - Murder (12), Attempted murder (3), Aggravated assault (14), Robbery (14), Burglary (11), Theft (9), Weapons (7), Auto theft (9), Child molest (5), Child abuse (2), Sexual exploitation of minor or indecency (3), Drug trafficking (12), DUI's 1 or more (15), Domestic violence (9), Rape (2), Sexual assault (3), Kidnapping (1), Weapons (7).

Many say that ICE is broken. That responsibility resides with Congress. President Trump wants to hire many more judges to expedite the long judicial waits.

The Obama Administration stopped ICE inmates from being trustees. That ruling made their stay more difficult, more restrictive and needs reversing. Finally, Ice / Homeland security employees are embedded in the jail specifically to serve the needs of those inmates.

The objective of activists and protests is to eliminate borders and what we know as citizenship. Any opportunity is taken whether at detention facilities or in assaults on the border using children as pawns to make common immigration rules seem unjust.

Prosecutors Care Less About Corruption

port. Numerous Yuba County taxpayers submitted complaints to the FPPC about county government using hundreds of thousands of dollars for political mass mailings, robo-calls, biased signage etc. during the Measure K tax increase campaign.

The FPPC has appeared double-minded as it rejected and then accepted then stopped and now restarted investigations into the pro-Measure K abuse of tax dollars. The Governor's, Attorney General's and FPPC offices were all pointing fingers at each other for whom is

responsible to prosecute theft from the public treasury for political gain.

According to the FPPC, it looks like the one key group that universally passes on prosecuting wrong-doing has been local district attorneys who benefit from government largess. Certainly as mentioned in an earlier column FPPC penalties averaging less than \$5000 per incident will never dissuade wrong doing when the benefits of lawlessness add up to millions each year. In Measure K's case the district attorney actually promoted the effort.

Commissioner Brian Hatch said the illegal

activity is widespread. "There has been plenty of it, but they choose not to bring charges," he said of county prosecutors.

Jon Coupal, president of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association (HJTA), said he has been complaining about the issue for three decades.

"It is so epidemic, we do not have the resources to track and respond to every one," Coupal said, adding that district attorneys and the state attorney general are busy with violent crimes that are a higher priority for them. "If the FPPC steps up, that would be a good thing for taxpayers and, quite frankly, good for transparent government."

HJTA filed a complaint that resulted in the FPPC conducting an investigation and issuing a finding of probable cause in 2018 that Los Angeles County failed to properly report paying to run television ads in support of a homeless services tax ballot measure the year before.

Since the FPPC says it lacks jurisdiction to prosecute for misuse of public funds, it found that members of the Board of Supervisors violated a separate law by not reporting political expenditures for advertising supporting Measure H, a quarter-cent increase in the sales tax.

Meanwhile, the California State Association of Counties sued to challenge the FPPC's authority to pursue enforcement action. And, the Los Angeles County district attorney's office has not announced any action on the allegations, and declined to comment on whether it is investigating.

Coupal is not surprised, "The district attorney gets their budget from the county and the county was the defendant," he said.

The FPPC needs a two-thirds vote by the legislature to add to its responsibilities and prosecutorial powers.

Meanwhile back in Yuba County, Tuesday February 19th was a deadline for Yuba County to respond to a citizens' lawsuit contesting the legality of the Measure K Ballot language according to postings in the newspaper.

All is well until it isn't.

Although reining in the national deficit is all but vanished from Government speak nowadays, the problem is still a problem. With the first trillion in U.S. debt taking somewhere about 220 years to amass, beginning notation upon our founding in 1776, now we run up that amount or more each and every year. Talk about an overspending family member. From the lips of Dick Cheney in 2003 came the infamous quote and now apparently common belief in Washington: "Reagan proved that deficits don't matter".

In a Washington Times column, "Putting America's finances in order," he states "it is abundantly clear that neither of the two major U.S. parties is fiscally responsible. Republicans focus primarily on tax cuts, while Democrats focus on spending — and neither party focuses on the bottom line or long term".

Senator Issues Statement Regarding Governor's State of the State Speech

Governor Gavin Newsom presented his first State of the State to the Legislature. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), who represents Wheatland, CA and the region devastated by the Camp Fire, issued the following statement:

Storms affect strawberry supplies

Winter storms have slowed strawberry production in Southern California, tightening supplies during the key marketing period before Valentine's Day. Most California strawberries come from Ventura County at this time of year, where farmers report their pre-Valentine's Day production declined because of rain. Despite the harvest interruptions, farmers describe the rain as a long-term benefit for future irrigation supplies.

NASA leader describes technology for agriculture

Data from space helps farmers make on-the-ground decisions daily, and NASA

Administrator Jim Bridenstine says the agency plans to expand its agricultural services. Speaking Tuesday at the opening of World Ag Expo in Tulare, Bridenstine said NASA is working with California researchers to provide more precise, accurate information about plant water use. He said NASA resources also help with crop monitoring, snow-pack measurement and other activities.

Equipment expo opens for 52nd year

Planners expect more than 100,000 people to attend the three-day World Ag Expo in Tulare, which continues through Thursday. Considered the largest event of its kind, the expo features nearly 1,500 exhibitors

who display farm equipment, supplies and technology. Attendees also participate in farm tours and go to seminars on irrigation, dairy production, marketing and other topics.

Study shows scope of world crop losses

Pests and plant diseases cut yields for five top food crops by 10 to 40 percent worldwide, according to a new report. A University of California scientist who helped prepare the study says it shows the world continues to lose a large amount of food to pests and diseases at a time when food production needs to increase. The report looked at wheat, rice, maize, potatoes and soybeans grown in 67 countries.

Antelope Wells Crossings Increasing

The weekend just before President Trump's El Paso, Texas rally on Monday, Feb. 11th, Steny Hoyer (2nd in command behind Speaker Nancy Pelosi in Washington, D.C.'s People's House) headed a contingent of Democrats to inspect the immigrant problem at the border town of El Paso. Hoyer appeared on some TV news shows saying, in part, "There's no problem in El Paso...it is safe and secure." Those quotes were echoed by other Democrats in Hoyer's group. They were absolutely correct. El Paso was safe and secure because of a Sturdy, Safe Wall...part of the Sturdy Wall that snakes through the border towns of El Paso and Juarez, Mexico.

Jim Acosta, the CNN News Clown (can't bring myself to call him a journalist) tried the same trick a few weeks earlier when he was at a border wall and also said, in part, "Hey, there's no problem here, the border is safe and secure." Here again, I have to agree with Jim...it's because of a Sturdy Wall, STUPID. I guess I have to lump Hoyer and his bunch into that characterization and pluralize it into "Stupids."

While President Trump was speaking at the El Paso Rally, there were two large contingents of illegals making their moves across the border at about the same time...the first from right across the border from El Paso, across the Rio Grande River, in Sunland Park, New Mexico (close enough to be a suburb of Juarez...and another group about 100 miles away as the crow flies at Antelope Wells, New Mexico...way beyond the end of the barrier (wall) in the El Paso sector.

Sunland Park

Officials with the U.S. Border Patrol said they took over 300 undocumented immigrants into custody Monday night Feb 11th, in Sunland Park, New Mexico.

Border Patrol agents said shortly after midnight agents noticed a group of 311 undocumented immigrants making their way around a pedestrian fence and took them into custody.

Border Patrol said this is the first large group of people apprehended in Sunland Park this year.

The group consisted of primarily Central American families and unaccompanied juveniles, according to Border Patrol.

Antelope Wells

The Border Patrol's El Paso sector announced Monday Feb 11th, that its agents had taken 330 migrants into custody, hours before President Trump was to visit the sector to make his latest pitch for a wall along the U.S.-Mexico border.

The migrants were arrested shortly after midnight at the Antelope Wells entry point in southern New Mexico, which is part of the Border Patrol's El Paso sector. U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) said in a statement that the group was composed primarily of "Central American families and unaccompanied juveniles" and was the 28th group of 100 (2,800) or more of migrants to be apprehended in the El Paso sector since the beginning of October.

"Criminal organizations continue to exploit innocent human lives in order to enhance their illicit activities without due regard to the risks of human life," CBP said in a statement. "In most cases these smugglers never cross the border themselves in order to avoid apprehension."

This marks the second large group to be arrested near the port in less than a week. On Friday Feb 8th, agents arrested 290 Central Americans who entered the country illegally.

Nonetheless, Antelope Wells remains as one of 43 official ports of entry along the international line dividing the U.S. and Mexico and has the distinction of being the least-used legal crossing on the southern border... **but the illegal migrant traffic seems to be accelerating.**

The international border on both sides of tiny Antelope Wells, in southwestern New Mexico, is open desert with no fence. New Mexico has almost no security fencing along its international border — just two miles of a corrugated metal barrier in Sunland Park, a city in New Mexico's southeastern corner.

In President Trump's State of the Union address he explains some of the problems at our southern border, in part;

"As we speak, large, organized caravans are on the march to the United States. We have just heard that Mexican cities, in order to remove the illegal immigrants from their communities, are getting trucks and buses to bring

them up to our country in areas where there is little border protection. I have ordered another 3,750 troops to our southern border to prepare for the tremendous onslaught.

No issue better illustrates the divide between America's working class and America's political class than illegal immigration. Wealthy politicians and donors push for open borders while living their lives behind walls and gates and guards.

Meanwhile, working class Americans are left to pay the price for mass illegal migration — reduced jobs, lower wages, overburdened schools and hospitals, increased crime, and a depleted social safety net.

Human traffickers and sex traffickers take advantage of the wide open areas between our ports of entry to smuggle thousands of young girls and women into the United States and to sell them into prostitution and modern-day slavery.

The savage gang, MS-13, now operates in 20 different American States, and they almost all come through our southern border. Just yesterday, an MS-13 gang member was taken into custody for a fatal shooting on a subway platform in New York City. We are removing these gang members by the thousands, but until we secure our border they're going to keep streaming back in.

My administration has sent to the Congress a commonsense proposal to end the crisis on our southern border.

It includes humanitarian assistance, more law enforcement, drug detection at our ports, closing loopholes that enable child smuggling, and plans for a new physical barrier, or wall, to secure the vast areas between our ports of entry. In the past, most of the people in this room voted for a wall — but the proper wall never got built. I'll get it built.

This is a smart, strategic, see-through steel barrier — not just a simple concrete wall. It will be deployed in the areas identified by border agents as having the greatest need, and as these agents will tell you, where walls go up, illegal crossings go way down."

Massive New Diversity Initiative at San Diego State Combats Faculty Microaggressions, Bias

For several million dollars San Diego State University will have a faculty and Administration that is diverse—by nationality, immigration status, gender, sexual orientation and maybe even left handed vs. right handed people. "Some examples of trainings will include unconscious and implicit bias, racial/gender microaggressions, teaching practices for underserved students, cultural competency, and becoming a Hispanic serving institution," Wood stated in his email.

The impetus for the initiative is a University Senate resolution approved in February 2018 "to create a campus-wide diversity plan," according to the email from Wood, which added the resolution required individual diversity plans be developed for all academic and administrative divisions.

Want indoctrination? Go to San Diego State. Want an education that is diverse—Hillsdale College and other schools that educate, not indoctrinate.

Three Counties Have a Plan for Area's Troubled Youth New Tri-County Juvenile Hall is in The Works

Just like every California resident, counties up and down the state – especially rural counties – often struggle to accomplish required tasks in a system that continually finds ways to direct county money away to non-county initiatives. In its effort to address issues associated with our troubled youth, Yuba and Sutter counties had to get creative to make things work.

Over the past few years, it became evident that the resources available to maintain a two-county operation at standards required by law were scarce, so Yuba and Sutter counties began working with Colusa County to explore other solutions.

Since 1976, Yuba and Sutter counties have worked together to increase successes for probation youth in the local communities through a number of effective partnerships, including an arrangement for a shared Juvenile Hall program. For more than 40 years, new programs were implemented and existing programs expanded in order to meet growing needs of the young population.

The Maxine Singer Youth Guidance Center "Camp Singer," located adjacent to the Juvenile Hall, was established in 2001 as a program for developing an alternative for the placement of youth coming from outside our area, as well as for extended Juvenile Hall stays. The very next year in 2002, a secured housing unit was built that could house 15 youth, as well as periodically house juvenile offenders being prosecuted in adult court.

Throughout the years, Yuba County took the lead in operating the facilities and programs, which include the program design, staffing, medical care, and all other functions at the institution. The costs were shared equally by Yuba and Sutter counties.

As the aging youth facilities at the western end of 14th Street in Marysville reached the end of their usefulness, it became necessary to look toward establishing a modern juvenile hall to serve the region; a task

significantly hampered by limited available funding. County leaders needed to get creative in developing a solution.

In 2014, the Yuba and Sutter counties partnered with Colusa County and entered into the Tri-County Joint Powers Agreement. This regional approach permitted Colusa to transfer their awarded \$5.7 million SB 81 Local Youthful Offender Rehabilitation Facilities Construction Grant to the development of the Tri-County Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility.

Building on that success, Yuba County was able to obtain approximately \$9.6 million in additional SB 81 funding, bringing the total to \$15.3 million for a new three-county juvenile hall. The three county partnership clears the way for replacement of an inefficient old facility and overall improvements that better-serve the interests of our juvenile population.

"Not only has our partnership saved taxpayers millions of dollars, but more importantly we

have been able to leverage local resources that have redirected hundreds of our youths' lives," said Yuba County Probation Chief Jim Arnold.

In 2015, an amended Joint Powers Agreement was crafted that established how the three counties would share costs related to operation of the new facility. Yuba and Sutter will each cover 44 percent of those costs, while Colusa County will be responsible for the remaining 12 percent.

"Youth who were previously sent to group homes out of the area have been able to participate in a camp program in their own community, along with their families, while also giving back to the community with extensive community service," Sutter County Chief Probation Officer Donna Garcia said.

Construction of the new three county Juvenile Hall facility is expected to begin as early as next year across the street from the current hall on 14th Street in Marysville.

National Guard Pulled from Border

New Deployment; Dealing with Illicit Narcotics

On Monday, 2/11/19, Governor Gavin Newsom signed a General Order rescinding previous authorization for California National Guard operations at the U.S. – Mexico border that allowed California National Guard personnel to perform duties traditionally undertaken by the federal government. At the time of the Order, approximately 360 members of the California National Guard were deployed at the border at the request of the White House to provide support for the federal government in border operations.

Last week, President Trump announced he will be deploying 3,750 U.S. military personnel to the U.S. – Mexico border. Governor Newsom's General Order cites this development as the primary reason for California to reprioritize its National Guard deployment.

Governor Newsom's General Order redeploys personnel to focus on other threats facing the state by:

- Authorizing 110 personnel to prepare for the upcoming fire season by supporting CAL FIRE in fire prevention and fire suppression efforts;

- Authorizing the expansion of the California National Guard's statewide Counterdrug Task Force by at least 150 personnel; and,

- Authorizing 100 personnel to conduct counter narcotics search and seizure operations targeting transnational criminal organization around ports of entry.

Of concern to the Rural County Representatives of California (RCRC) is the deployment of National Guard personnel to address illegal cannabis production and other illicit narcotics. The Governor's office indicates that much of the National Guard's efforts in this aspect of the draw down will occur on the state's public lands.

According to the Governor's office, the National Guard will begin making preparations to carry out the order immediately and have the draw down in effect by March 31, 2019.

Ceramics for Veterans is Back Introduction to Wheel Throwing

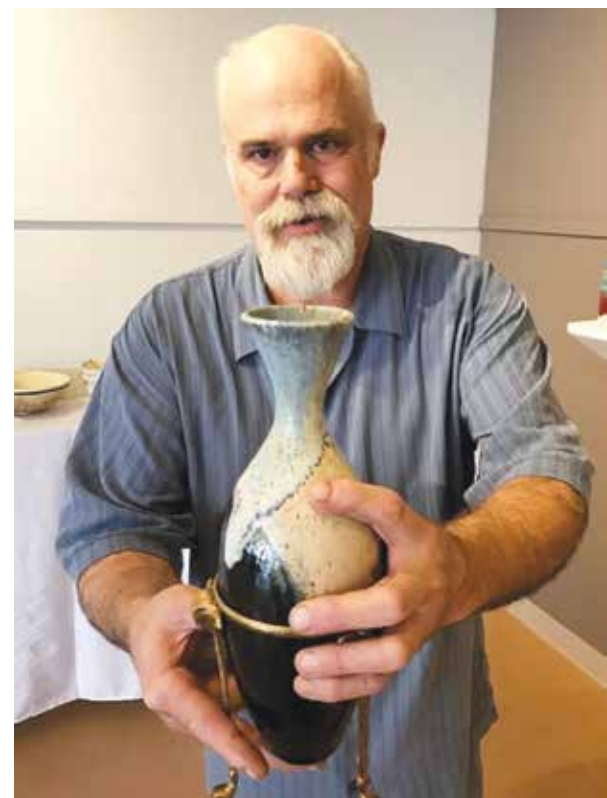

Titled, "An Introduction to Wheel Throwing," the classes will be offered at the studio of teaching artist and Chris Thompson's studio in Sacramento.
