Caltrans Set Gold Standard with Green District Office

Marysville Building Marks 10 Year Anniversary

Marysville, Ca.

You might say Caltrans set the gold standard when it opened the doors to a state-of-the-art green office building in Yuba County a decade ago.

The 220,000-square-foot Leo J. Trombatore State Office Building, home to Caltrans District 3 in Marysville, uses nearly 40 percent less water and is more energy efficient than 95 percent of similar office buildings. Its water savings are almost enough to supply the annual water needs of two households.

Moreover, it boasts high-efficient air filters to remove airborne contaminants that can aggravate breathing problems such as allergies and asthma. The cleaning staff uses green cleaning products that are biodegradable and free of phosphates and ammonia. It features charging stations for zero-emission electric and hybrid plug-in vehicles. And last year, Caltrans added electricity-generating

solar panels in the main parking lot at the six-acre complex – providing enough power to cover 25 percent of the building's energy needs.

To mark these achievements, District 3 – one of the largest employers in Yuba County – will celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the opening of the five-story office building, which replaced an adjacent aging, cramped 70-year-old structure. Former Caltrans employees, local elected officials and the building contractor, Turner Construction Co., have been invited to attend a short celebration.

“We are proud that our District Office has been at the forefront of Caltrans' sustainability efforts,” said District 3 Director Amarjeet S. Benipal. “This building embodies our goal to preserve and enhance the state's environment and prosperity by meeting our current demands and improving the quality of life of Californians without compromising the ability of future genera-

tions to meet their needs.”

The LEED Gold-certified building was some 40 years in the making. Its design incorporated suggestions from Marysville city leaders and community members.

The facility, home to more than 700 employees, provides for the operational needs of Caltrans District 3 and its North Region, which administers the design, construction and maintenance of the state's highway systems in 22 Northern California counties.

Caltrans District 3 maintains more than 4,385 lane miles of state highway in 11 Sacramento Valley and Northern Sierra counties: Butte, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, Sierra, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba. Update Officer Involved Shooting N Beale Rd, Linda



Additional details are available following a preliminary

investigation into Monday's officer involved shooting in Linda that left a robbery suspect dead. The male suspect was identified as 45-year-old Jahmal Derrick Stewart of Marysville, Ca. On 1/14/19 at approximately 3:30 p.m., a Yuba County deputy responded to a 911 call of an assault in progress with an unknown weapon in the 1400 block of N Beale Road. The assault was later determined to also be a strong-arm rob-

bery of an elderly man. The first arriving deputy made verbal contact with a man who matched the description of the assault suspect, later identified as Stewart, as he was walking westward from location of the assault in the 1400 block of N Beale Rd in Linda. Upon contact with Stewart, the deputy advised him to remove his hand from his coat pocket, and that for officer safety the deputy was going to pat Stewart down for weapons since he matched the description of the suspect that had committed an assault with an unknown weapon just minutes prior. As soon as the deputy began the pat down, Stewart started to pull away and attempted to flee. The deputy attempted to place a control hold on Stewart, when Stewart became violent and grabbed the deputy's holstered duty

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Money Down the Drain

It's not a happy day when citizens watch government workers killing time and bureaucrats bungling away their hard-earned tax dollars.

As Marysville City government campaigned twice to finally get a 1% sales tax increase to shore-up slumping revenues in 2016, residents then learned that the City Services Director neglected to file twelve Water Resources quarterly reports. The state fined the city \$3 million. The Director is now comfortably retired after his misdeed with no personal consequences.

The City's attorneys Rich Fuidge Lane and Bordsen, on retainer for about \$10,000 a month, then hired an outside attorney to negotiate a deal with the state. In June 2017, the state agreed to a reduced \$288,000 fine with one-half going to improve the water quality of Ellis Lake. Now 2019, there is no sign of Ellis Lake progress.

Last week, City Attorney Brant Bordsen notified the Council of another settlement, this time to pay RGW Construction \$575,000 from monies in the sewer fund --- not for completing a waste water project but for not finishing it.

The Council approved the payment. With Marysville households making sewage payments of \$36.80 per month the settlement equals 15,625 payments for government malfeasance. That combined with Cal Water Service rates 300% higher than Linda, Olivehurst and Yuba City is a joy buster.

RGW was hired on February 9, 2015 to connect the Marysville sewage infrastructure to the Linda Water Treatment Plant. The contract was for \$5,230,975. “During the course of the project the City encountered delays in obtaining necessary permits from the Corps of Engineers. As a consequence, RGW was delayed in its ability to proceed with the project. Ultimately, the City determined it was in its best interest to terminate the contract with RGW for its convenience,” wrote City Attorney Bordsen.

RGW then submitted claims for the delays in construction and costs connected to the termination of the contract. As RGW and the City could not reach an agreement RGW filed a lawsuit in Yuba County Superior Court.

RGW sought \$1,138,101.29 and settled in mediation for \$575,000 prior to going to trial. To the lowly taxpayer, two government entities, the City and/or the Corps of Engineers failed them miserably. Was any government employee dismissed? Who takes responsibility? No apology, nothing.

What was the \$575,000 in the sewer fund to be used for? Were citizens being overcharged on sewage rates? And will sewage rates now be increased to reward government incompetence?

It is amazing that high paid City administrators, consultants and City attorneys cannot execute a contract with its appropriate permits without taxpayers being penalized \$575,000. Maybe we need another 1% sales tax increase for public safety.

We talked about sturgeon the last week or so and we have reports of sturgeon being taken in San Pablo bay. Best bets are the mouth of Petaluma River and Sonoma Creek. Those with success were baiting up their hooks with grass shrimp with keeper stripers hitting on mud-suckers. Some of the bass caught last week ranged from 20 to 26 inches. Crabbing at Bodega Bay has been picking up even with the storms and the choppy waters. When the beaches are empty due to high waves and lousy weather you can still score with crabs and perch by fishing at Doran Beach and inside the entrance to Tomales Bay. The best idea is to fish between storms.

Up Lake Davis way there is four or five inches of ice at the dam. It will not be long before ice fishing takes off on this body of

water. Just be careful out there.

Reports from Lake Tahoe tell us the best bet for Mackinaw Lake Trout is on the North Side. We suggest if you decide to go to take your chains and call ahead for a charter boat.

The weather this past week has made it a challenge to hit the water. Those who have been

determined have found some success on local rivers, but the catch for sturgeon and stripers has been few and far between on the Sacramento and Feather Rivers.

What do a Swiss Colony, a Migrant Labor Camp, a Japanese Assembly Center and an old air strip, have in common? Well they were all in a small area of Yuba County near the Feather River called “Arboga”.

Arboga was settled in 1911 by Swedish immigrant farming families and was first called the Arboga Colony. In 1935 the area became the 1st Migrant Labor Camp here

locally and housed over 900 dust bowl refugees. After the attack at Pearl Harbor 1941 the camp was quickly converted to a West Coast Japanese Assembly Center with over 2,000 detainees. Today almost all traces of these places are gone, but not the history or stories of those who came, lived and worked at Arboga.

Bonds are I. O. U's

Before the November elections I received the absentee ballot package along with the explanations and descriptions of the items we were to consider and then pull the handles for.

As an economic conservative and one who has quite a lot of experience in studying how all things money work, I can't help but wince every time this mailer arrives.

As always and painfully so, at least for me, a whole lot of bonds were on the ballot.

Such is the case every voting November. I knew some of them would pass, making economic life even harder for many Americans. But I try not to blame the ones voting yes for all these bonds.

Most people don't know what a bond is. I know this as I give seminars on investments and I start the seminar with a bond talk and ask how many people in the audience know what a bond is. Usually less than five percent of those in attendance raise their hand and it goes without exception at every seminar.

Bonds are simply IOU's. The borrower, usually the county or state but they can also be private companies, floats a bond and investors buy them. In the case of many government bonds the borrower pays interest and also pays back the bond with tax dollars.

There are revenue bonds that pay from an income source such as a stadium or toll road but that's a story for another day. Program intends to protect beehives

As part of an effort to safeguard honeybees, a California program will require beekeepers to register hive locations. Known as BeeWhere, the program intends to protect bees by improving communication among beekeepers, pest control advisors and county agricultural commissioner's. By knowing better where bees are, farmers

can schedule crop treatments to avoid affecting native colonies. The program may also help prevent beehive theft and other problems.

January weather may help orange growers

Recent rains and chilly temperatures give orange growers hope of being able to send more large-sized fruit to market. Hot summer weather last year put trees under

stress and helped reduce the size of individual navel oranges. That, in turn, has cut orange prices, because buyers generally prefer larger fruit. Growers say the oranges remain of high quality, and that January weather has helped the fruit gain size, color and sweetness.

Study looks at how drought affects forests

Forest health during dry summers depends on water stored underground--and calculations by University of California researchers could help land managers evaluate tree health and where to thin overstocked forests. UC Merced specialists say California forests appear especially dependent on water stored in the root zone to carry them through dry summers. Drought depletes that water, causing stress for trees.

Food marketers explore e-commerce options

As commerce moves online, farmers and food marketers try to harness the technology to sell more fresh and perishable items. Marketers say perishable foods have been slower to adapt to e-commerce, because people often want to choose their produce themselves. That's changing, for example, as a number of retailers now offer "click and collect" services that allow shoppers to order foods online and pick up their purchases at the store.

In America, prisons, most schools, nuclear power plants, military bases and many governors’ mansions are protected with walls and barriers. Most homes have fences to keep people and creatures out and in. Enough already about fences not working or being immoral.

The provocative aspect of the border controversy is that a large percentage of border crashers are criminals. They again violate the law entering the country and they continue ignoring laws and regulations once here. Gang members, drug and sex traffickers, child molesters, murderers and thieves are flooding in. International terrorist groups have compounds in Mexican border cities, as well.

Americans are not angels. However, this society is far more law abiding than where the average illegal alien hails from. They live differently than here.

Mexico is looking out of control lately as journalists and politicians are routinely assassinated, nationally-owned fuel supplies are being sabotaged and stolen so much so that gas is in short supply. People are abducted off the street, held for ran-

som and shortly shot if the cash is not forthcoming. Teens, rather than working at fast foods can package heroin, cocaine and meth in factories.

Some of the nations with the highest 2017 murder rates are contributing their residents to America. Ranked by the murders per 100,000 people, rated 1 to 3 are El Salvador - 108.64, Honduras - 63.75 and Venezuela 57.15. Number 9 is Guatemala at 31.21 and number 12 is Brazil 26.7. Mexico at 16.35 is 20th in the world.

Gang activity is credited for 6 of 10 murders in El Salvador. In Honduras, gangs are a factor, but also violence against women and LGBT groups is often normalized as part of a “machista” culture.

Caracas, the capital of Venezuela, is known as one of the most dangerous cities in the world. Gang activity and drug trafficking are major problems leading to Guatemalan homicides.

The Mexican border city of Tijuana scored a record 2,506 murders in 2018. With 1.8 million residents TJ is one of Mexico’s most violent cities. Law enforcement says most of the deaths are related to the drug trade.

Of the 198 nations

rated by World Atlas the United State was 81st with 4.88 murders per 100,000 people.

Finally, Amnesty International claims 6 out of every 10 female caravan members headed to the U.S. through Mexico encounter sexual abuse. In the six month period between September 2008 and March 2009, 9,758 migrants were kidnapped, many of whom said that public officials and police officers were either involved or complicit in the kidnapping. What?

Not only are migrants the targets of abuse, kidnapping, and human trafficking, but migrant defenders are also targeted as they try to protect the human rights of this at-risk population.

Does the U.S. want to welcome just anyone from a culture willing to sexually assault vulnerable women and children travelers on the road or even once they are detained by the border patrol? Could you envision 60% of a caravan of ladies and minors moving through the U.S. to Mexico being kidnapped and/or sexually assaulted in route by Americans? Think about it.

Do you lock your doors at night? Why? Maybe you like to vet whoever knocks.

Volkswagon’s New Electric Car Plant Lands in Chattanooga

Volkswagen chose its Chattanooga, Tennessee, manufacturing plant for the company’s first electric vehicle facility in North America, state officials announced Monday, January 14, 2019.

The \$800 million project by the German automaker is expected to generate 1,000 additional jobs. Volkswagen expects to roll out its first Volkswagen electric vehicle from the Chattanooga facility in 2022.

“The shift toward electric vehicles is a trend that can be seen worldwide, and Volkswagen’s decision to locate its first North American EV manufacturing facility in Chattanooga underscores Tennessee’s manufacturing strength and highly-skilled workforce,” Gov. Bill Haslam said.

The Volkswagen announcement comes as Tennessee’s auto sector defies international trends and gains employment. Volkswagen expects to sell 150,000 electric vehicles by 2020 and 1 million by 2025.

Scott Keogh, the newly appointed CEO of Volkswagen Group of America, said in Nov. 2018, a new plant was needed to build an electric vehicle, priced between \$30,000-\$40,000, that is due in 2020.

An electric car that could take on Silicon Valley’s Tesla Inc is part of the massive investment in electric vehicles that Europe’s largest carmaker plans to make.

Volkswagen announced last November it would spend almost 44 billion euros (\$50 billion) on developing electric cars, autonomous driving and new mobility services by 2023.

Volkswagen employs 3,500 people in Tennessee and at year end will have invested \$2.3 billion in the facility. The Chattanooga plant produces the midsize Atlas SUV and Passat sedan and will begin building the Atlas Cross Sport, a five seat version of the model, this year.

“The U.S. is one of the most important locations for us, and producing electric cars in Chattanooga is a key part of our growth strategy in North America,” said Volkswagen AG CEO Herbert Diess. “Together

with our ongoing investments and this increase in local production, we are strengthening the foundation for sustainable growth of the Volkswagen brand in the U.S.”

The sector received a boost from President Donald Trump’s corporate tax cut and a lift in overall economic activity.

“With 157,000 jobs created in July, including 37,000 in manufacturing, this report shows tax reform and regulatory relief are continuing to deliver for America’s manufacturing workers,” according to Carolyn Lee, executive director of the

National Association of Manufacturers’ Manufacturing Institute.

Indeed, economic data shows that U.S. manufacturers are producing near record levels.

Last year, U.S. manufacturers produced about \$6 trillion in gross output, according to the Bureau of Economic Analysis. The biggest categories were food, beverages and tobacco products (\$1 trillion), chemical products (\$837 billion) and motor vehicles and parts (\$701 billion).

The Labor Department’s index of labor productivity for manufacturing is more than double what it was at the beginning of 1987, likely reflecting an economy-wide investment in machinery, a more educated workforce and a rebirth in technology and big data, helping companies improve performance in a variety of tasks, ranging from assembly to tailored marketing and advertisement.

A new caravan of migrants, 2,000 at this point, Thursday, January 17th, are building up as they trek across Guatemala. Another caravan is forming in Honduras and was expected to head northward sometime last Sunday.

California Farm Bureau Welcomes Ag Immigration Bill

Calling it "an important first step," the California Farm Bureau Federation welcomed today's introduction in Congress of new legislation to provide legal status to immigrant farm employees in the United States.

The Agricultural Worker Program Act, introduced by Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., and Rep. Zoe Lofgren, D-San Jose, would grant legal "blue card" status to immigrants who have worked in agriculture for at least 100 days during the previous two years.

CFBF President Jamie Johansson said the bill addresses a critical component of comprehensive immigration reform.

"We're encouraged by the bill's introduction in both chambers and appreciate the leadership of our California legislators to begin tackling this issue at the beginning of the new Congress," Johansson said. "Farm employees and farmers need legislation that addresses legal status for employees and their immediate family members who are in the

country now.

"Though this legislation is an important first step, CFBF supports comprehensive immigration reform that would allow future employees to migrate more easily to and from their home country, as well as to move from farm to farm for employment," he said.

"We encourage Congress to address the broader needs of farmers and their employees through comprehensive immigration reform," Johansson said.

weapon. The deputy took Stewart to the ground in an attempt to gain control; but the suspect, who was much bigger in physical stature than the Deputy, was continually trying to remove the deputy's duty weapon from the holster while he physically resisted the deputy. While the deputy and suspect continued to struggle, a backup deputy arrived on scene. As the backup deputy approached the active fight to assist, the backup deputy heard the first deputy call out "he's got my gun!". Both deputies reported that they then heard one shot fired from the duty weapon that the suspect had been trying to unholster. It was at that time the backup deputy, who was estimated to have been a few feet away, fired 3-5 shots, killing the suspect. Investiga-

tors have interviewed several independent witnesses that also reported seeing the struggle between the original deputy and suspect; and corroborated that the suspect was continuously trying to get the deputy's duty weapon. Due to the type of holsters carried by our deputies, a duty weapon will not fire when fully holstered; leading us to believe that the suspect had successfully taken the weapon far enough out of the holster for the duty weapon to fire. As part of this investigation, it was discovered that Stewart had an active felony no bail warrant out of Sacramento and was on active PRCS probation for various weapons violations. Stewart has spent time in prison for multiple felony convictions and has a history of violence including child

abuse, domestic violence, aggravated assault, and multiple arrests for resisting arrest and battery on a peace officer. The two deputies involved, one with 16 years as a peace officer and the other with 3 years of service, were placed on paid administrative leave pending the outcome of the Officer Involved Shooting investigation per normal protocol. An autopsy for the decedent is scheduled for Thursday 1/17/19 to determine official cause and manner of death. Details as to how many times and where the suspect was struck with gunfire will not be available until the completion of the autopsy, which will also include toxicology results. The investigation remains active and ongoing at this time.

The A introduced a hydraulic lift and featured a belt drive device as well as a PTO. The horizontal two-cylinder engine produced 18.72 horsepower at the Drawbar and 24.71 on the Belt. It had a four-speed transmission and weighed about 4,000 pounds. There were fourteen versions of the A so the needs of a wide variety farming requirements could be met. The A was manufactured all the way to 1952 with improvements and horsepower increases

during the manufacturing run. About 300,000 A's were built.

The B was about a third the size of the A. These two tractors assisted John Deere to become a premier provider and remain the only totally American tractor company.

My daughter came up with name the name "Tractorologist" and "Tractors for Humanity.

I recently returned from Arcata with a late 40s Willis Jeep for my son, Rodger and Grandson, Travis. I spent the night with my Nephew, Tim, who has a Cub, Massy Harris Pony and a Farmall A. My Daughter has a Farmall 230 one Grandson has a Farmall BN and the other have Fords. My wife owns the famous pink Ford. My son, John, drives a restored Farmall A. 
