Local School in Film Festival

A film created by Yuba Environmental Science (YES) Charter Academy staff and students will be featured at the Wild & Scenic Film Festival. Wonder Plant Woman vs the Invasive Plant Monster is an imaginative retelling of Yuba Environmental Science Charter Academy's 3rd and 4th grade students' study of native plants. In the course of their class project, developing a native plant trail around their 10-acre campus, they studied the plants of the Oak Woodland habitat, added native plants to the trail, encountered invasive blackberry, and started the removal process. They aspire to bring awareness and appreciation of native plants to their audience through education and humor. They issue a call to ac-

tion to remove invasive plants and to preserve and plant native plants.

The film was written and produced by Louise Miller, YES Charter Academy principal, and filmed and edited by Radu Sava, YES Charter Academy photography/videography teacher. Actors in the film are current and former YES Charter Academy students. "It's an honor to have a film selected for the Wild & Scenic Film Festival. It's the largest one of its type," said Radu Sava. "I'm proud of the work our staff and students have done," said Louise Miller. "We empower students to become leaders through project based learning."

The Wild & Scenic Film Festival partners with schools to screen high quality films for Kindergarten through High School age students. Vehicles Pursuit Leads to Mail Theft Suspect



Smartsville, Ca.

Just before midnight 12/27/18; a Yuba County Deputy on patrol on Timbuctoo Place in Smartsville attempted to conduct a traffic stop on a Jeep Cherokee with obstructed plates, that matched the description of a vehicle suspected of involvement in recent mail thefts from the Yuba County foothills. The driver failed to yield and a pursuit ensued south-east on Timbuctoo Place at approximately 50 mph, then onto Hwy 20 eastbound toward Nevada County at speeds up to 80 mph. The suspect vehicle then made a U-turn and

proceeded west bound Hwy 20, turning south onto Hammonton-Smartsville Rd toward Smartsville, where it continued onto southbound Chuck Yeager Rd before turning east onto Daughtery Rd then south onto Mosswood Ln, where it crashed near the intersection of Boulder Way and Mosswood Ln, Smartsville.

The single vehicle accident caused the suspect vehicle to flip, leaving a male driver and one female passenger trapped as smoke began to come from the overturned Cherokee. The pursuing Deputy was able to pull both subjects from the vehicle prior to it catching fire. The driver, identified as 29-year-old Damien Cooper appeared unconscious and the female passenger, identified as 25-year-old Kerstin Toutjian, was conscious but complained of knee and head pain.

Driver Cooper was transported by air to a Sacramento area hospital where he did not appear to have any injuries but was being evaluated; and Passenger Toutjian was transported by ambulance to a local hospital for evaluation. The pursuit was over a distance of six miles and

lasted approximately 8 minutes.

The suspect vehicle was searched at the scene of the accident and contained over 50 pieces of suspected stolen mail from various addresses in Loma Rica, Browns Valley, and Smartsville. A bicycle also located in the suspect vehicle was reported stolen from Oakland, Ca. Suspect Damien Cooper, a parolee, was wanted for violating his parole.

The mail thefts remain under active investigation and have been referred to the US Postal Inspectors. Cooper is expected to be booked into the Yuba County Jail upon his release from the hospital, with initial charges of violation of parole, felony evading, and possession of stolen property.

Update:

Damien Cooper was flighted from the accident in Smartsville, following the pursuit, to a Sacramento area hospital. He was discharged from the hospital without the knowledge of the Yuba County Sheriff or parole's; and fled. He remains wanted at this time.

FPPC and Measure K

There is an uptick in news about sales tax measures and bonds being promoted by government to bail-out politicians and budgets. These efforts are temporary fixes to overspending since the real problems are a corrupt state pension system and unaffordable government-run healthcare. Another seldom noted nemesis is a Calizuela state government that is adding mandates while bleeding tax money from poorer rural counties.

Read the informative article by Jon Coupal, President of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association in this paper and a Cal Matters Dan Walter's piece "Finally, a crackdown on misuse of taxpayer money" in the Appeal Democrat.

Both articles address the fact that though there are laws to prevent an abuse of power by government usurping the Constitutional rights of its citizens, if there is no enforcement of the law then the law is impotent and rights are lost.

The FPPC (Fair Political Practices Commission) recently voted unanimously to impose a \$7,500 fine on BART (Bay Area Rapid Transit) for not reporting its spending on a bond issue as a campaign contribution. The violation involves the pitching of a \$3.5 billion bond issue to voters. The fine is chump change to BART and an encouragement to ignore the law once again.

The FPPC asked the State Attorney General and Bay Area district attorneys to prosecute BART for violating the law prohibiting the use of public funds for political campaigns. Earlier, Los Angeles County was also cited by the FPPC for misuse of taxpayer funds in an election campaign.

Locally, numerous Yuba County citizens filed complaints with the FPPC accusing County Supervisors of inappropriate use of public funds for the Measure K campaign to raise sales taxes to 8.25%. The initial FPPC response was to request evidence

More Rules for Calizuelans

Each January, Calizuelans are notified that their legislators have made nearly 1,000 new laws as aspects of our lives are discovered that they don't control. This year, 1,016 bills were signed into law of the 1,217 sent to Governor Brown.

If you think in terms of 10 years that's about 10,000 more state laws each decade to keep us under subjection. For some reason that seems more ominous than by the year. And to think we started with just 10 rules.

You remember...Worship only God. No graven images or idols. Don't cuss using God's name. Honor the Sabbath day. Honor your father and mother. Don't murder. Don't commit adultery. Don't steal. Don't slander your neighbor. And, don't covet.

Lawmaking has gone downhill from there. The Supreme Court in 1857 ruled thought Black people could be owned, bought and sold like property. Dred Scott, an enslaved African American man, unsuccessfully sued for his freedom and that of his wife and two daughters. Nope, can't have that.

Then after that decision was corrected another Supreme Court found that killing unborn babies was the right thing to do In 1973, the Supreme Court ruled that states could not criminalize or restrict access to abortion.

In 1966, Republican Supreme Court Justice Harry Blackmun's 19-year daughter Sally, a sophomore in college, became pregnant. The family was embarrassed and Sally then married the boyfriend. Three weeks after the marriage, she had a miscarriage. The couple divorced after 6 years and the ordeal delayed Sally's pursuit of a law degree. We can't have that.

Blackmun sought the opinion of Sally and his wife Dorothy in his effort to legalize abortion. A strategic family's time of difficulty led to the killing of 50 million babies so far. Laws often come to us for un-Godly reasons.



FPPC and Measure K

to support accusations of those residents filing complaints. That information has now been submitted.

If the FPPC finds Yuba County at fault in its advocacy of Measure K then who will enforce and prosecute this violation - the FPPC, The Attorney General (AG), the Yuba County District Attorney (DA)?

The FPPC can fine but in Yuba County's case will taxpayers' funds be used to pay the amount? That public loses again. In LA County there is a request to prosecute supervisors individually. Per capita, Yuba County spent more money on its measure than did LA.

The AG's office has not been a factor in helping when requested in our rural counties. Would the DA's office pursue Yuba County for misuse of public funds? Not likely, since DA Pat McGrath (now retired) was a spokesperson for Measure K.


Some have confused the lawsuit filed against the county to stop Measure K with the FPPC's role in legally critiquing the campaign. The legal action by Bell, McAndrews & Hiltachk questions the legality of the content of the Measure K ordinance. The FPPC will evaluate the "free speech" violation where government is forbidden from using public funds in a political campaign to raise taxes.

Counties, cities and

iurisdictions up and down the state have violating been election laws to financially save their mismanaged ship. Will they be held accountable or will the public lose again?

Prop 218 and Prop 13 requirements on how taxes are raised may go the way of the Brown Act, being useless unless they are sincerely and honestly enforced along with deterrent- level penalties. The Ralph M. Brown Act was passed in 1953 to ensure the public's right to openness in government and to keep politicians from avoiding public scrutiny. Since the Act has no enforcement powers it has had little to no impact.

Historic Bridgeport Covered Bridge Restoration Project Is A Go!



The longest, historic covered single span wood bridge left in the world, located right here in Nevada County, is about to be fully restored! The Project, located in the South Yuba River State Park, is fully funded, all permits are in place, a qualified contractor (the Spectra Company) has been selected with a signed and approved contract and the Notice To Proceed (NTP) issued. Mike Brown, Project Manager for the Bridge Project, California Department of Parks and Recreation, (DPR), reports: ... "that (the) contract has been executed by both DPR and Spectra. This means our agreement is finalized and we can look forward to beginning the submittal process."

Submittals by the contractor for the materials to be used and the processes to be employed in the restoration will begin, with actual construction work to start in the Spring of 2019, with a completion date set for the end of 2019. There are many factors that may impact this specialized Project, such as weather and river levels, condition of the structure as it

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is disassembled and the availability of the materials needed to restore the Bridge to its original historic condition.

We have come far, accomplishing much overcoming many challenges over the past seven years with the support of the whole community. Nevada County District 4 Supervisor Hank Weston comments "I am happy to see all the hard work by everyone will soon be accomplished and I look forward to crossing the covered Bridge as member of the community knowing all the hurdles we had to overcome." We are indeed excited to finally see this iconic structure restored. We will Save Our Bridge!

Planning is already underway for a multi-day celebration once the Bridge is restored and ready for public access. We look forward to many future generations of visitors experiencing what it was like to cross the wild Yuba River on this unique Bridge, built in 1862, to carry them on their way to the gold and silver fields in California and Nevada.

Over 30 years ago, Yuba Feather Communities Services (YFCS) was formed as a Non-Profit Corporation. The stated mission was to develop Health Services, Fire Protection and Recreation to the area communities. These communities included: Brownsville, Forbestown, Rackerby, Challenge and Clipper Mills. Initially, the YFCS Board of Directors obtained use of the closed California Department of Forestry (CDF) Fire Station in Brownsville and 50 plus nearby acres of Bureau of Land Management (BLM) vacant land. Close cooperation with CDF, BLM and Yuba County was an integral part of this effort. Yuba County continues this cooperation by providing the lease mechanism with BLM.

The CDF Fire Station garage provided housing for Brownsville's first fire engine. The CDF barracks was used as the location for our current Health Center. That was a long time ago, but YFCS's efforts was one of the catalysis that evolved into our first rate Fire Department and Health Center. We owe YFCS our gratitude.

The vacant BLM land, still managed by YFCS, now has a large Community Center, two baseball fields, amphitheater, basket ball court, tennis courts, hiking trail, children's play ground and picnic areas. These facilities did not just magically appear; they were the result of years of hard work by YFCS. Certainly the Board of Directors had considerable support from local volunteers and businesses such as Ray's Hardware and Soper Wheeler Logging Company. The Community has enioved the fruits of these efforts through hundreds of Little League Baseball Games, Music Festivals, Theater Arts Presentations, Public Meetings, no cost holiday dinners and so many other benefits. This has been a major accomplishment for these small mountain communities. Recreation, the Com-

Promises Made ... Promises Kept

Hoping you enjoyed last week's "step off the political train" with the rendering of Johnny Cash's "Christmas Guest. Have a Joyous and Prosperous New Year.

Every once in a while we hearken to other more accomplished journalists for some insights "from the horse's mouth." Here is a recent writing, in part, from Marc A. ThiessenTheWashington-PostWritersGroup.

Donald Trump may be remembered as the most honest president in modern American his-President Trump does, however, stretch the truth sometimes. He said that he "enacted the biggest tax cuts and reforms in American history" (actually they are the eighth-largest) and that "our economy is the strongest it's ever been in the history of our country" (which may one day be true, but not yet). In part, it's a New York thing — everything is the biggest and the best.

But when it comes to the real barometer of presidential truthfulness keeping his promises Trump is a paragon of honesty. For better or worse, since taking office, Trump has done exactly what he promised he would do.

Trump kept his promise to move the U.S. Embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem, something his three immediate predecessors also promised yet failed to do He promised to "crush and destroy ISIS," and two years later he is on the verge of eliminating Islamic State's physical caliphate. He promised to impose a travel ban on countries that he saw as posing a terrorist threat. and after several false starts the final version of his ban was upheld by the Supreme Court.

Trump pledged to nominate Supreme Court justices "in the mold of Justice (Antonin) Scalia," and now Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh sit on the high court. Trump also pledged to fill the federal appellate courts with young, conservative judges, and so far the Senate has confirmed 29 - more than any recent president at this point in his administration.

Trump promised to cancel President Barack Obama's Clean Power Plan, withdraw from the Paris climate accord, approve the Keystone XL and Dakota Access pipelines, and open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to exploration. He fulfilled all of those pledges.

On trade, he kept his promise to withdraw from the Trans-Pacific Partnership and impose tariffs on steel and aluminum. He also com-

mitted to renegotiating

Trade Agreement and the U.S.-Korea Free Trade Agreement — and recently signed new deals with Mexico, Canada and South Korea. He committed to imposing tariffs on China to force it to open its markets and stop its theft of intellectual property — and is following through on that pledge. Whatever one thinks of Trump's trade policies,

he is doing exactly what

he said.

Where Trump has failed to keep promises, such as building the wall or repealing Obamacare, it has not been for a lack of trying. Only in a few rare instances has he backtracked on a campaign pledge — such as when he admitted that he was wrong to promise a complete withdrawal of U.S. forces from Afghanistan and reversed course.

But whether one or disagrees agrees is not the point. When Trump says he will do something, you can take it to the bank. Yes, he takes liberties with the truth. But unlike his predecessor, he did not pass his signature legislative achievement on the basis of a lie ("If you like your health care plan, you can keep it") — which is clearly worse than falsely bragging that your tax are helping is crazy." cut is the biggest ever.

More Insight on **Tijuana Border Chaos**

An activist group that escorted thousands of Central Americans the U.S. border is under fire from allies and some of the migrants themselves. They say the organization downplayed the dangers of the trek and misled them about how long they would have to wait around to apply for asylum. Pueblo Sin Fronteras, or People Without Borders, made up of about 40 U.S. and Mexican activists, is defending itself, saying the migrants made their own decision to press on to-

ward the United States. Thousands of Central Americans journeying toward the United States were 2,500 miles from their destination in October when they reached a moment of decision: Should they press on toward the U.S. border? Or should they stop and put down roots in Mexico, where the government offered to let them stay? Pueblo Sin Fronteras, warned the migrants that the offer might be too good to be true and

called a voice vote on

whether to continue. "Let's keep going!" the crowd yelled amid applause.

And they kept going. Thousands are now in Tijuana on the U.S. border, where they are likely to be camped for months or longer with no easy way to get into the United States, creating what is fast becoming a humanitarian crisis in this overwhelmed city. Adelaida Gonzalez, 37, of Guatemala City, who joined the caravan with her 15-year-old son and neighbor, said that now that she is in Tijuana, she wishes she had accepted Mexico's offer to stay and work in the southern Mexican state of Chiapas.

"We were never told along the way that it would be this hard," said Gonzalez, after seeing the border wall topped with razor wire and the long waiting list for asylum seekers.

A Pueblo Sin Fronteras leader, Irineo Mujica, emphatically rejected the criticism.

"Our commitment first and foremost was protecting the lives of migrants and giving them as much information as possible," Mujica said. "To blame the people who

Pueblo Sin Fronteras The fact is, in his first maintains it simply accompanies the migrants clearly plays an essential role: It helped charter the route, arrange bus transportation and negotiate with Mexican officials to provide protection. It also raised more than \$46,000 online for emergency housing and food.

> But traveling with the caravan was not without risks. One migrant was killed when he fell off a truck. Another was run over and killed on a highway. Two were stabbed and strangled after leaving a Tijuana shelter. Others have been attacked with rocks by local residents angry over the mass arrival. "There is no reason to make these inhumane journeys."

> Alejandro Solalinde, a Mexican priest recognized for his work with migrants, said of the caravans. Esmeralda Siu, a Tijuana shelter manager, said many caravan members knew nothing about the difficulty in getting asylum. "They come in desperation and so they hear what they want to hear," she said. As for their escorts, "it seems like they are putting the migrants at great risk."

> Corona, Pueblo Sin Fronteras' founder, said that the caravans served their purpose but that he doesn't foresee the organization accompanying any more of them.

Follow the (Climate Change) Money

The first iron rule of American politics is: Follow the money. This explains, oh, about 80 percent of what goes on in Washington.

Shortly after the latest "Chicken Little" climate change report was published last month, I noted on CNN that one reason so many hundreds of scientists are persuaded that the sky is falling is that they are paid handsomely to do so.

I said, "In America and around the globe governments have created a multibillion dollar climate change industrial complex." And then I added: "A lot of people are getting really, really rich off of the climate change industry." According to a recent report by the U.S. Government Accountability Office, "Federal funding for climate change research, technology, international assistance, and adaptation has increased from \$2.4 billion in 1993 to \$11.6 billion in 2014, with an additional \$26.1 billion for climate change programs and activities provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act in 2009."

This doesn't mean that the planet isn't warming. But the tidal wave of funding does reveal a powerful financial motive for scientists conclude that the apocalypse is upon us. No one hires a fireman if there are no fires. No one hires a climate scientist (there are thousands of them now) if there is no catastrophic change in the weather. Why doesn't anyone in the media ever mention this?

But when I lifted this hood, it incited more hate mail than from anything I've said on TV or written. Could it be that this rhetorical missile hit way too close to home?

How dare I impugn the integrity of scientists and left-wing think tanks by suggesting that their findings are perverted by hundreds of billions of dollars of taxpayer handouts. The irony of this indignation is that any academic whose research dares question the "settled science" of the climate change complex is instantly accused of being a shill for the oil

and gas industry or the Koch brothers. Apparently, if you take

money from the private sector to fund research, your work is inherently biased, but if you get multimillion-dollar grants from Uncle Sam, you are as pure as the freshly fallen snow. How big is the cli-

mate change industrial complex today? Surprisingly, no one seems to be keeping track of all the channels of funding. A few years ago, Forbes magazine went through the federal budget and estimated about \$150 billion in spending on climate change and green energy subsidies during President Obama's first term.

That didn't include the tax subsidies that provide a 30 percent tax credit for wind and solar power — so add to those numbers about \$8 billion to \$10 billion a year. Then add billions more in costs attributable to the 29 states with renewable energy mandates that require utilities to buy expensive "green" energy. Worldwide the num-

bers are gargantuan. Five years ago, a leftist group called the Climate Policy Initiative issued a study that found that "global investment in climate change" reached \$359 billion that year. Then to give you a sense of how money-hungry these planet-saviors are, the CPI moaned that this spending "falls far short of what's needed" a number estimated at \$5 trillion.

For \$5 trillion we could feed everyone on the planet, end malaria, and provide clean water and reliable electricity to every remote village in Africa. And we would probably have enough money left over to find a cure for cancer and Alzheimer's.

The entire Apollo project to put a man on the moon cost less than \$200 billion. We are spending twice that much every year on climate change.

This tsunami of government money distorts science in hidden ways that even the scientists who are corrupted often don't appreciate. If you are a young eagerbeaver researcher who

decides to devote your life to the study of global warming, you're probably not going to do your career any good or get famous by publishing research that the crisis isn't happening.

But if you've built bogus models that predict the crisis is getting worse by the day, then step right up and get a multimillion-dollar grant.

Now here's the real scandal of the near trillion dollars that governments have stolen from taxpayers to fund climate change hysteria and research. By the industry's own admission, there has been almost no progress worldwide in combatting climate change. The latest reports by the U.S. government and the United Nations say the problem is getting worse, and we have not delayed the apocalypse by a single day.

Has there ever been such a massive government expenditure that has had such miniscule returns on investment? After three decades of "research" the only "solution" is for the world to stop using fossil fuels, which is like saying that we should stop growing food.

Really? The greatest minds of the world entrusted with hundreds of billions of dollars can only come up with a solution that would entail the largest government power grab in world history, shutting down industrial production (just look at the catastrophe in Germany when they went all in for green energy), and throwing perhaps billions of human beings into poverty? If that's the remedy, I will take my chances on a warming planet.

President Donald Trump should tell these so-called scientists that "you're fired." And we taxpayers should demand our money back.

FPPC Ups the Ante on Illegal Expenditures

Over the last several years, this column has exposed multiple instances of government entities using taxpaver dollars for political advocacy, a practice that is illegal under both state and federal law. Because progress in stopping these violations has been difficult, taxpayers will be pleased to hear that on December 20th, California's campaign watchdog agency, the Fair Political Practices Commission, conducted a hearing on illegal activity by the Bay Area Rapid Transit District (BART).

The FPPC stated that BART used public funds to pay for a campaign of "YouTube videos, social media posts, and text messages to promote Measure RR, which authorized BART to issue \$3.5 billion in general obligation bonds." Under California law, spending money on a political campaign to pass the bond measure caused BART to qualify as an "independent expenditure committee" and required it to file campaign finance reports, but the transit agency ignored the requirement.

"BART failed to timely file two late independent expenditure reports in the 90-day period preceding the November 8, 2016 General Election; failed to timely file a semi-annual campaign statement for the period covering July 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016; and failed to include a proper disclosure statement in its electronic media advertisements," the FPPC said. The FPPC imposed

a fine of \$7,500, which critics of BART, including Senator Steve Glazer. rightfully complained was inadequate and no deterrent to future misconduct with taxpayer funds. In fact, the minimal fines may incentivize illegal activity because the ROI (return on investment) is frequently in the millions, if not billions, of dollars. Not only that, because the fines themselves are paid with taxpayer dollars, there are rarely any real-world consequences imposed on public officials who misappropriate public funds for political advocacy.

But things may be different now. In addition to imposing the fine on BART, the FPPC also directed its staff to prepare a letter to the California Attorney General and local District Attorneys asking for criminal prosecution of these cases.

It's about time.

The Free Speech clauses of the federal and state Constitutions prohibit the use of governmentally compelled monetary contributions (including taxes) to support or oppose political campaigns because "Such contributions are a form of speech, and compelled speech offends the First Amendment." Smith v. U.C. Regents (1993) 4 Cal.4th

843, 852. Moreover, "use of the public treasury to mount an election campaign which attempts to influence the resolution of issues which our Constitution leaves to the 'free election' of the people

(see Const., art. II, § 2) ... presents a serious threat to the integrity of the electoral process." Stanson v. Mott (1976) 17 Cal.3d 206, 218.

While taxpayer organizations have been successful in several lawsuits challenging these illegal expenditures, they haven't fully deterred lawbreaking by the state or local governments. The recommendation of the FPPC to prosecute these cases under criminal statutes could be just the shock that public officials need to bring them into compliance.

The FPPC letter in the BART case could also prove to be a real headache for Los Angeles County. In March of 2017, the county placed Measure H, a sales tax hike, on the ballot. The County's use of nearly a million dollars of public funds for the political campaign unquestionably crossed the line into political advocacy and the FPPC found probable cause to charge L.A. County, as well as the individual members of the Board of Supervisors, with 15 counts of campaign finance viola-

tions. Taxpayers are hopeful that California's Attorney General and District Attorneys take the FPPC letter recommending criminal prosecution seriously. Much lip service is paid to protecting the integrity of California's election process. Here's an opportunity for those charged with enforcing the law to do something meaningful to protect both election integrity as well as taxpayer dollars which should never be spent taking sides in

Happy New Year! There are many things to look forward to in the new year and the everchanging landscape of water policy. Some of the biggest topics to keep an eye on are the ongoing Bay-Delta negotiations and the proposed voluntary settlement agreements.

The State Water Resources Control Board has proposed flow requirements for rivers that feed the Delta based on a percentage of 'unimpaired flows', which would require a large portion of each watershed's total flow to be dedicated to the Delta. If approved, this 'unimpaired flows' approach would have significant impacts on farms, communities

We join many other water agencies in our belief that alternative measures, specific to different rivers and areas of the region, can achieve California's coequal goals of water supply reliability and ecosystem protection, finding balance among the diverse interests of local, state and federal agencies, as well as farmers and environ-

mental groups. We recently agreed with the Brown administration on a framework, following months of negotiations and years of work, that would provide water supply reliability for fisheries and our local farmers, and ensure significant fish and wildlife habitat restoration for many years to come.

Our proposal for the lower Yuba River includes releasing more water to the Delta, habitat restoration, and new funding to improve conditions for salmon and steelhead.

Representatives from the California Department of Water Resources and Department of Fish and Wildlife presented this framework to the state water board on Dec. 12 as part of a

package of agreements from water agencies throughout the region, as an alternative to burdensome regulatory require-

election contests.

ments. We have specifically proposed to release up to 50,000 acre-feet of water annually for fisheries, the restoration of up to 100 acres of habitat at a cost of up to \$10 million, and an annual \$520,000 investment for a new Bay-Delta watershed science program. This innovative agreement would allow us to receive compensation for releases to the Delta, estimated at \$80 million over the term of the agreement. That critical funding could do a lot to further reduce flood risk here in Yuba County.

The state water board's actions in December opened the door for their consideration of these voluntary agreements as they determine the best way ahead. The board will take action on this issue in March, so stay tuned for some big news.

Uncle Dale's A

One afternoon I received a phone call from my cousin Matt Brugmann who is a cousin on my mom's side of the family. He said, Doug, I have a tractor that needs to belong to you. "Having no idea what he was thinking I said, "What are you talking about Matt." He knew I had an interest in farming, tractors, and equipment that dates back to when I was a little boy. I grew up next to my maternal grandparent's farm and spent many days with my grandpa, better known as "Papa", and my Uncle Buster on the farm. Before I was legally able to drive, after school and on weekends, or on summer days, I would wait in the front yard for Papa to drive by. He would stop and I would jump in his pickup not knowing where we were going, but farming was usually involved. Sometimes there was a quick trip to town for an ice cream. When I was in high school, as soon as classes were done for the day, I would drive directly to the fields and jump on a tractor or harvester. I loved those days, and love spending time with Papa and Uncle Buster, and the equipment

used in farming. Back in the 1960's and 19/0's I can remember tak- his retirement years. Uning trips with my parents to North Highlands, California

to visit my uncle Dale and Aunt Pat. Uncle Dale was my dad's oldest brother. Dale and Pat owned Highland Sales, a salvage business that carried hardware, tools, building supplies and just about anything uncle Dale could find at auctions, close outs, and the like, Dale loved his business and loved purchasing boxes to see what was in them. Dale and Pat later owned the hardware store at Elkhorn Blvd and Watt Avenue in North Highlands. Somewhere along Dale's travels he acquired a 1948 John Deere AW 42, serial number 607122. I can remember Uncle Dale using the tractor to take care of his acreage in North Highlands. Several years ago Uncle Dale passed away.

After some time, Aunt Pat started spending time with a family friend named Ray Dirks. Ray was a little like Uncle Dale in the fact that he liked attending auctions and trading to find the next treasure. Somehow along the way, Ray ended up with the John Deere A. Ray owned some property in Sutter, California that he began to divide up and sell during known to me at the time, Ray hired my cousin Matt to build a house pad on one of his parcels. Being the trader Ray was, Matt ended up with my Uncle Dale's A as part of the payment for building the house pad. So now Uncle Dale's A is owned by my cousin on my mom's side of the family. Matt spent some time working on the tractor before he decided to make the phone call to me. When Matt first received the tractor the engine was locked up. He was able to break it free. He opened up the crankcase, cleaned it thoroughly, added some fresh oil and a new filter. The mag was not producing a spark so a rebuilt mag was purchased and put on the tractor. Matt said he was able to get the old A to fire off and run.

I picked up the A in June of 2017. It was not in running condition, but not far from being able to run again. The seat cushions were missing, the tires had rotted off, and of course, the paint was in terrible condition. The first thing I noticed was a missing fuel bowl. I purchased a new authentic fuel bowl and installed it. I put some gas in the tank, and checked for leaks. I hooked up a battery and gave the starter a try. The tractor engine cranked

over but would not fire. I checked for spark and there was none. I opened up the mag and gave the points a cleaning. Cranked on the starter again and all I could get was a pop. Well, it is a Johnny Popper! I took the carburetor off, disassembled it and gave it a good cleaning. After re-installing the carburetor, I cranked on the starter and the old John Deere A came to life. Fantastic! She runs! Time to make her look good again.

The disassembly of the tractor for cleaning, prepping, and painting started in January of 2018. I worked on the tractor on weekends, after work, and any time I could get to the shop. I had set a goal. I wanted the A to be at tractor days in Oregon House in May. I wanted to take my dad to tractor days, he had never been. I also wanted my dad to drive his late brother's tractor on its' first drive at tractor days. So off to work I went. I used a steam cleaner to clean the years of oil, grease, and dirt build up. The steam cleaner worked so well it even removed the old paint. It was a slow process but I took the time to make sure the A was thoroughly cleaned. The tractor and all of the parts were prepped and primed in John Deere Buff primer. Then came the John Deere classic green paint. Wow! Looking like a proud green John Deere again. The wheels were sand blasted, coated with Buff primer and then some John Deere yellow. Time to re-assemble the tractor.

Much care was taken during the re-assembly process. I didn't want any scratches on the new paint. All of the parts went back together very well. New decals were installed as well as new lights, seat cushions, and new tires. A new battery was put into the battery box. The tractor looked like a brand new 1948 John Deere A. Ready to start the engine and take a drive. Or so I thought. I engaged the starter, the tractor engine fired up, and blew all of the oil out of the oil bath air cleaner. The oil traveled back up the air pickup tube, all over the hood of the newly painted tractor and all over the under-side of the hood as well. My heart sank. This is one week before tractor days and the old A has a serious illness. After cleaning up the oil mess, I went home feeling a bit defeated. I was also troubleshooting in my mind. For the oil to be pressured out of the air cleaner and back up the intake tube, there was only one possible answer. There has to be a stuck intake valve. But how? The engine was running so well before disassembling the tractor. Ah! Steam cleaning. I thought I had sealed up everything very well before steaming on the tractor. Somehow, water must have found its' way into one of the intake valves and rusted up the valve guide. The next day the valve cover was removed and sure enough, a stuck intake valve. I was able to use some lubricant on the valve guide and some pressure to move the valve back and forth to free the valve. Didn't take much - just enough to break the hold the rust had on the valve stem. Back together and the engine was once again running. The old John Deere A sounded really good. That defeated feeling now turned into excitement. Tractor Days here we come!

On the side of the tractor frame was a magnetic sign that said, "Dale's A," 1948 John Deere AW 42. The "W" meaning the tractor has a wide front, the "42" meaning the rear tires are a tall 42 inch tire. The John Deere A was loaded onto a trailer and hauled to Oregon House for tractor days on Friday, May 4, 2018. Saturday morning the tractor was wiped down and ready for the first drive. I showed my dad how to run the tractor with a hand clutch (which he had done before but he is 80 and it has been a long time since using a hand clutch). I drove my 1948 John Deere M and dad followed with the 1948 John Deere AW 42, wearing his farming hat and a big smile. After the drive, my dad shared with me that he thought his brother Dale would be very proud to look down and see his tractor living again. I had met my goal. Yes a lot of work, and a few frustrations, but worth

every minute.
