## Swan Sightseeing

Reclamation District 10 is a 40-square-mile land reclamation project established in 1914 in the flood basin of the Feather and Yuba rivers just north of Marysville. The flooded post-harvest rice fields of District 10 provide ideal temporary wetland habitat for thousands of Tundra Swans, huge flocks of White-faced Ibis, geese, ducks, shorebirds, hawks, and bald eagles. Expert birders and biologists from the CA Department of Fish and Wildlife lead a car-pool/caravan tour along the back roads in District 10 to see the birds and learn about the compatibility of rice growing and waterfowl conservation.

### Swan Tours

Before winter takes hold in

the Arctic, more than 100,000 tundra swans migrate along the Pacific Flyway from their remote and solitary breeding grounds to spend winter in California. The swan tour offers participants a spectacular opportunity to encounter these stately, elegant birds, which weigh more than 20 pounds with a 5.6 foot wingspan.

The tour explores an area called District 10, a 23,000-acre expanse of privately-owned rice fields and restored habitat. This area boasts one of the largest seasonal concentrations of Tundra Swans in the Central Valley, as well as a wide variety of other species, including ducks, geese, shorebirds, herons, egrets and raptors.

Each tour lasts about 2 hours, and is led by natu-

ralists who will share their knowledge and enthusiasm for nature with the group. Where: Yuba County, north of Marysville.

When: Saturdays at 9:30 am, and 1:00 pm - November through January.

Each tour is limited to 30 participants.

Tour groups will caravan around the site on county roads, stopping for wildlife viewing opportunities—little walking is required.

Dress for the weather and bring drinking water and snacks. Binoculars and field guides are recommended. A restroom is available at the meeting/staging area.

## CHP “Saddled Up” for the Rose Parade

Sacramento, Ca. California Highway Patrol (CHP) Commissioner Warren Stanley grabbed the reins to ride with Deputy Commissioner Scott Silsbee, Assistant Commissioner Nick Norton, and the CHP’s Mounted Patrol Unit for the 130th Rose Parade on January 1, 2019.

This year marks the third appearance for the CHP’s all draft horse equestrian unit, which was chosen to participate in this year’s celebration from among hundreds of applicants; however, this will be a first for the Commissioner and members of his executive staff.

“The CHP is honored to be a part of the New Year’s Day tradition,” said Commissioner



Stanley. “Scott, Nick, and I are excited to join the CHP’s elite team of equestrian riders along the parade route this year; it is an opportunity of a

lifetime.”

enforcement and security assignments.

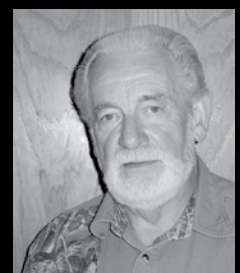
Next year, 2019, will mark the 90th anniversary of the CHP and the 32nd anniversary of the Department's Mounted Patrol Unit.

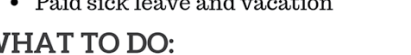

relevant is that the caravan organizers were aware that California is a "sanctuary" state, and immigration judges in San Diego (border city to Tijuana) are far more likely to grant asylum than judges in Texas and nearly anywhere else in the country except New York City.

The caravan members weren't aware of this but their organizers and financiers understand the system, how to beat it and hand-held the group the whole way.

The other factor is that Tijuana is a huge city where thousands of migrants could be absorbed, and lawyers on both sides of the border are finding loopholes in the immigration system left by previous administrations. If illegals hap-

pen to skirt America's defenses California is also safer than Texas.

Does it seem odd to Americans that so many killers, child molesters, general criminal types and gang members are in this daily onslaught? These are not your Asian whiz kids bound for college or salt-of-the-earth types with a trade seeking opportunity.

The odd aspect is that the average American would never think of violating another country's laws, avoid the visa process and crash their border. So, why are people here so passive about being a Sanctuary City or State while watching relatives and friends get stabbed, shot, molested and run over by illegal foreigners?

The President has a

Constitutional mandate to protect US citizens from illegal crossings of our border and from immigrants we don't want here. He has kept his campaign promise to work at that.

Interestingly, the President has no support from liberals and little from conservative politicians who take a similar oath. And, judges who swear to uphold the Constitution and the law are actually blocking Trump from performing his immigration duty.

The big immigration crisis now is with asylum seekers. It is the newest strategy to clog the system, pray for a catch and release into the US and then disappear, hoping to be forgotten. Asylum seekers claim to be victims of domestic violence, former gang members, homosexuals, political activists etc. The problem is that all of these reasons are quite difficult to vet.

In 2018, the number of migrants demanding asylum at the U.S. border rose by 67% according to Homeland Security, to nearly 93,000 people. Roughly a third arrived at ports of entry without permission, and another 14% were caught crossing the border illegally before fil-

ing for asylum.

There is no country today nor has one ever existed that is as generous and welcoming as the United States. It isn't even close. However, we have lost our senses on border control and immigration.

We need a border wall and more agents. We need to capture illegals, jail them and deport them without a court process. Those noncitizens here legally that violate laws need to be processed quickly through the courts to be deported or kept here.

Trump is on the right track to protect Americans first. That is his job.

On December 17th I received a request for a book and the customer asked that it be delivered prior to Christmas. So I took it to the Marysville post office on the 18th and was told it would be delivered on the 20th; plenty of time for it to be delivered before Christmas. After all, the cus-

tomers' location was in Grass Valley; just a short jaunt east on Hwy 20.

I didn't have any concerns about the shipment but I decided to check tracking on December 21st just to make sure it had been delivered. I learned that it had gotten to Los Angeles on the 19th! That means it was sent 424 miles the wrong direction.

On the 22nd I rechecked and found that the shipment had made it to San Francisco; a distance of 343 miles from Los Angeles. At least it was (kind of) going in the right direction.

On the 23rd tracking showed it was in transit. To where? I was not sure at all!

I checked tracking

again the night of December 24 and, happily, found that the parcel had been delivered!

I know that this time of year the USPS is greatly stressed and, even though the package arrived later than estimated, it did get there by Christmas.

However, instead of the 37 mile journey that I had envisioned the package took a 950 mile route. Was it more cost efficient taking that route? It's hard to imagine that it was.

But at least I can say that my \$2.66 cost paid for a long sightseeing tour of Southern California and the California Coast for that little package. I am sure it appreciated it.

The report, “The Fiscal Burden of Illegal Immigration on United States Taxpayers,” examines the cost of illegal immigration through a detailed analysis of federal, state and local programs that are available to the nation’s illegal immigrant population, their U.S.-born children, or accessed via fraud. The study tallies the impact on education, medical, justice/enforcement, welfare and other government programs. The report notes that the \$116 billion cost of illegal immigration falls on state and local taxpayers disproportionately – by a ratio of roughly 2 to 1 – with state and local expenditures totaling \$88.9 billion and Federal expenditures totaling \$45.8 billion, with only approximately \$19 billion recouped in taxes. “Clearly, the cost of doing nothing to stop illegal immigration is far too high,” said FAIR executive director Dan Stein. “President Trump has laid out a comprehensive strategy to regain control of illegal immigration and bring down these costs,” said Stein. “Building the wall, enhancing interior enforcement and mandating national E-Verify will go a long way in bringing these ridiculously high costs under control,” he said.

pastors, religious leaders and removing displays of Christmas along with crosses from churches. Some church buildings have been bulldozed over.

There is a renewed insistence that members of the Communist Party (China’s political class) renounce any faith in God, enter a re-education camp or resign. ### General Motors the Business

In Money and Markets December 7, 2018 article entitled "Appalling: GM CEO collects 22 million while cutting 15,000 jobs", the issue of a company's right to pay whatever salary they wish to whoever they wish regardless of performance is brought into question.

The premise of the article is a simple one: should General Motors CEO Mary Barra be allowed a 22 million dollar salary while she authorizes firing 15,000 of her employees?

The 22 million paycheck is 295 times higher than GM's average employee wage. The perceived offense is amplified by the fact that the U.S. government bailed out GM with billions in taxpayer funds during the 2008 crisis and basically rescued it from an almost certain bankruptcy filing.

The outcry is both aisles wide with Democrats and Republicans alike calling "foul".

The issue here is multifaceted. To start with, this analyst was and still is against bailouts of any kind to for-profit enterprises.

It's not what taxpayer funds are for. Additionally the "creative destruction" from businesses failing to survive whatever happens to them that causes them to assume the four feet up position of a bankruptcy is a natural progression of capitalism.

Basically, if a company succumbs to a chapter 7 or 11 filing, it SHOULD go away. It just wasn't good enough to survive and that means it should be allowed to fail and make way for a better company to take its place.

It's the brutal but necessary world of competition and it makes for a better world in the process. Many won't agree of course but an in-depth understanding of economics yield little argument in my opinion.

Another obvious sore spot in this whole thing is the enormous difference in what CEO Barra makes and what the average worker makes. A 295 multiple sounds egregious and maybe it is. Or maybe it isn't.

Running a company like GM is a job suited for few people.

Like very few. GM built plants in Mexico and China to turn more of a profit. In this analyst's opinion, some of the blame falls on the unions and other vocal groups vying for more comps, more vacation and more freebies.

Also a fault are the "living wage" proponents that advocate some sort of

standard ought to be set for everyone as to the size of their paycheck. Nobody can seem to agree as to exactly how much that should be mind you, but the general belief is higher than many companies currently pay.

The prognostication of what happens when perks and wages are forced upon a company is easily detailed way in advance of what has now come to pass. Basically that these policies cause people to lose their jobs.

That it HAS come to pass is now the companies fault?

The phrase "we told you so" comes to mind.

Force higher costs on a for-profit company and it will flee to friendlier (and cheaper) shores. And so it has.

American activists and unions have pushed for higher wages and more perks and detractors warned it would cost American jobs. And now it has.

China and Mexico are trying to survive, grow and employ its populace and have little in the way of wage mandates, and therefore can build GM cars cheaper.

Since the monetary goal of private business is to enhance shareholder profit, one can hardly blame GM for wanting to build its cars wherever it can for the lowest cost. Keep in mind GM is not a charity but a business. Those calling for allowances to enhance the benefit of non-owners (employees) should reread the last sentence. Call me uncompassionate but stating fact doesn't necessarily mean I support that fact and want people fired and no, I don't agree with the move GM made.

But GM is a business, a shareholder business, and that makes its owners first and foremost on the ladder of preferred monetary enhancement. Sounds harsh but in the true sense of the word business, it is goal is that simple: make money for the owners.

Small or large business, the mission is the same.

Throw out that premise and you throw out the entire capitalistic system, and with it free will and choice, and although

many might advocate such a thing, there is not a replacement system that maintains free will and individual liberty as succinctly.

Few understand that capitalism at its root is nothing more than two people agreeing to make a transaction freely and without outside interference. The rest of the capitalistic system and its machinations are just offshoots of this basic transaction.

That a shareholder owned, for-profit business elects to pay CEO Mary Barra a 22 million paycheck while laying off thousands may seem immoral, it's the right of the company to do so.

Barra has one mission: make profits for shareholders. And in performing this mission, she has decided it is in the best interest of the shareholder to lay off workers.

So be it.

Complain and protest all you want, but you'll be doing it from the unemployment line. Labor activists wanted higher wages and now you have no wages at all. Just like it was predicted.

Perhaps instead of scratching our head wondering how such a thing could come to pass, in reality, making what must have been a very difficult decision and knowing how much flak she would probably take for doing it, may be the reason she's worth the paycheck.

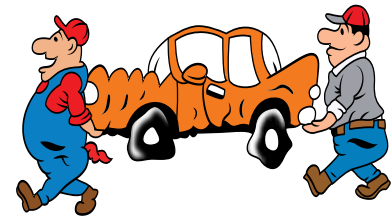
