## National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

### 77th Anniversary of the Attack on Pearl Harbor

The Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 948 of Marysville is holding its 3rd annual Pearl Harbor Celebration on December 7, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. at the Marysville Veterans Memorial Center, 211 17th Street in Marysville.

This year they will have the honor to have Rear Admiral Bonnie Potter as the guest speaker.

Rear admiral Potter was born and raised near Oakland California graduated from UC Davis with a BS in Animal Science, and received her MD degree from ST.

Louis University School of Medicine. She completed medical school on a Navy scholarship, and came on active duty as a Lieutenant in 1975. She spent the first 20 years as a clinician and teacher of internal medicine, advancing to the rank of Captain. Following a tour as Chief Medicine/Residency Program Director at National Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, and Director of Medicinal Services, USNS Comfort during Operations Desert Shield/Storm, she transitioned into Executive Medicine. In 1997, she was promoted to Rear Admiral (lower half), becoming the first female physician in the military to be selected for "Flag" rank (Admiral or General). She served as Commander, National Naval Medical center, Bethesda, MD, lead Agent for Tricare Region 1, and Chief of the Navy Medical Corps. In 1999, she received her second star, and subsequent duties included Fleet Surgeon, US Joint Forces Command and

Medical Advisor to Supreme Allied Commander, Atlantic. She retired from active duty in 2003.

Rear Admiral Potter is board certified in Internal Medicine, with additional qualifications in Geriatrics, and she is a fellow if the American College of Physicians. She is the President of the Placer County Council of the Navy League, spent nine years as a member of the Northern California Retired Officers Community Boards of Directors, and six years as President of the Alpaca Owners Association Board of Directors. In 2012 she was awarded the Daughters of the American Revolution Ellen Hardin Walworth Medal for Patriotism and the President's Volunteer Service Award for service on the Sacramento medical Reserve Corps. She is married to August Anema, and the live in Auburn, California where they raise Alpacas.

A Camp Fire photo of burned cars, big rigs and a school bus strewn helter-skelter on and off a roadway near Paradise looked like a Hollywood science fiction set, total destruction and no survivors.

Where did the people go, what happened? Did the fire burn over the road killing everyone and leaving this surreal look?

One bus load of 22 Ponderosa Elementary School children plus adults made it through the inferno with smoke billowing into the bus and embers sweeping across the line of gridlocked traffic. Fire, heat and fumes became so threatening that the group considered abandoning the bus to flee on foot.

Recently hired bus driver Kevin McKay who gathered the passengers, gave wet pieces of his shirt for breathing masks and courageously stayed the course is being called a "hero" and the "bus driver from heaven" by passenger and teacher Mary Ludwig.

McKay even provided refuge to a disoriented woman on the roadside who also happened to be a teacher. Ludwig said that the rescued teacher kept saying she was convinced she was going to die, and that the pair of educators prayed together as they continued on the journey to safety.

The bus survived the trek through Paradise "Armageddon" to reunite all passengers with loved ones.

Now, the desperation, fear and panic are understandable, but being employed at a government institution, Ludwig should not refer to McKay as the "bus driver from heaven" and teachers just cannot be praying together on the school bus. Isn't it a violation of some state education code? Even calling Mr. McKay a "hero" may hurt the feelings of fellow drivers who work hard each day, as well.

Twenty-four hours prior to encountering what appeared to be the fires of hell in Paradise, teachers could not acknowledge God, forbade prayer on campus and told children they evolved from monkeys. ## Laura J. Davis Appointed to Judgeship in the Sutter County Superior Court

Laura J. Davis, 44, has been appointed by Governor Jerry Brown to a judgeship in the Sutter County Superior Court. Davis will fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Judge Brian A. Aronson on December 31, 2018.

Davis has served as the Sutter County Court's sole research attorney since 2005. In this position, she has provided legal research, analysis, writing, and assistance across all case types to the court's five sitting judges, as well as retired judges Rob-

ert Damron, H. Ted Hansen, and Christopher R. Chandler. Since 2007, as a Judge Pro Tem, she has regularly presided over Traffic Infraction cases, and Civil matters as requested. Davis is responsible for drafting and publishing the court's local rules, maintaining the court's legal research materials, and providing legal counsel to the Court Executive Officer. She served on the new courthouse committee, was instrumental in implementing the court's paperless case management system and electronic filing processes, and works closely with the Judicial Council on labor issues. Prior to joining the court, Davis was a litigation associate at Seyfarth Shaw LLP from 2003-2005, and at Folger Levin & Kahn LLP from 2001-2003. She also taught Advanced Legal Research and Writing at Cal Northern School of Law in 2015 and 2016.

Davis grew up in Oroville, California, where she performed in community theatre, competed in gymnastics and speech contests, and sang in the choir at St. Thomas Catholic Church. She

worked at her parents' small party rental business while attending Oroville High School, and put herself through college at University of California, San Diego, by working as a nanny, in food service, and as a children's theatre program leader. After graduating with degrees in Communication and Theatre, she worked as the program manager at the Fox television affiliate in Chico for two years. In 2001, she received her law degree from Stanford Law School.

Davis has volunteered at the Butte Humane Society, the Bidwell Park and Chico Creek Clean Up event, the Almond Bowl Run benefitting student athletes, and Chico High School Sober Grad Night. She has been involved with youth sports in Chico, and helped chair the Chico High Baseball Dinner and Dance fundraiser for four years. Davis is a single mother of two boys. Evan, 16, is a junior at Chico High School, and Houston, 18, attends Butte College.

Davis's start date has not been determined.

# This Month In Your Garden

## BALD MOUNTAIN NURSERY

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December is here and the 21st of December is the first day of winter. We never know what kind of weather it will bring. But whatever the weather, it is usually a busy month for nursery workers. Many different things become available at nurseries because it is the dormant season for so many trees and plants making them easier to ship without causing them damage.

December is a month that doesn't require too much effort in the yard, though there are some things that are needed. The most important of those is the second spraying of dormant spray to keep the fungal infections at bay, and that should be done in late December. As mentioned in November, curl leaf on peaches and nectarines is the main target, and it is useful on a host of other things which can be found on the directions for use. December usually brings cold enough weather that we need to be alert for the possibility of frosty and/or freezing cold nights. All citrus trees are quite vulnerable to the cold weather because they are evergreen and sub-tropical. A light frost will likely damage the leaves of the plant, whereas a hard freeze will cause much leaf damage and fruit damage as well – best to be ready for it. An old blanket can be placed over a plant as long as it isn't apt to rain causing it to get wet and heavy. A blanket would be best used by putting

them on at night and taking them off daily in order to be exposed to the sunlight. I've seen large cardboard boxes sheltering plants. Frost cloth is not expensive, works well, can be held in place by tucking it under a few of the pots so wind can't displace it, and it can be saved and re-used – just fold or roll it up and put it with other gardening supplies. It also has the advantage of being permeable enough to water plants with it in place. Adequate sunlight also reaches the plants. Plastic should not be used directly on a plant. It has no insulation quality, in fact it can direct the freezing temperature directly to the leaves. Make a temporary frame work with a few stakes several inches from the foliage of a plant and put the plastic over it as a covering, tee-pee style. Or, three to four stakes can be driven a little way into the ground to create an enclosure over which to put the plastic covering. The dead air space within has insulating quality. Time was that a light bulb could be hung in the enclosure and provide warmth, but the newer, more efficient bulbs do not emit much heat. If you have any of the older bulbs, or any strings of the old Christmas decoration lights, they can be used to keep plants warm when the weather forecasts suggest that it will be especially cold. For containerized plants, be sure that they have been very well watered when

especially cold weather has been forecasted. A dry plant will freeze more quickly than a wet one. The moisture in a potted plant will freeze at 32 degrees and roots won't get colder than that because of their insulating blanket of ice. Dry cold can be much colder and damaging. Of course, any delicate foliage on the plant will need to be covered.

Are you interested in bare root fruit trees? Bundles of them will start coming in soon. It takes a bit of time to get them all organized once they arrive, but we are usually ready to offer them for sale by late December. Roses will also be here soon. If you are interested, we have availability lists to help you make choices. Oregon stock with live Christmas trees and dogwoods and other Oregon stock usually comes in late November, so should be here and ready for sale. You can see that there are lots of possibilities for the gardeners. Many of them are also good Christmas gift possibilities as well.

Lilacs do well in our area and don't require lots of care, but they are especially happy in very cold climates. The flowers they produce are generally larger clusters than those grown in our more temperate climates. To compensate for the lack of very cold weather, try putting ice cubes around the base of the plants several times during the winter to keep the roots colder, as they would be in snowy climates. Poinsettias are a frequent gift at this time of the year. They seem to bloom and fit right into the season with the festive red flowers. If you are given one or buy one, and the pot has a lovely foil wrapping on it, before you water it cut out a circle of the wrap on the bottom of the container, then place the plant on a saucer with a layer of pebbles to hold it out of any standing water – then water when needed. The wrap won't become a reservoir to waterlog the plant and you will enjoy its beauty longer. We wish everyone a Joyful Christmas.

# Celebrate the Holidays Responsibly

With the holiday season fast approaching, the Yuba City Police Department wants to remind everyone to be responsible and not drive after drinking or take drugs that affect your ability to operate a vehicle.

To help keep our roadways safe, the Yuba City Police Department will be conducting saturation patrols and DUI checkpoints beginning Nov. 23. The DUI checkpoint will be con-

ducted on Friday Dec. 14. The enforcement efforts coincide with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Buzed Driving is Drunk Driving campaign, which runs from Nov. 23 to Dec. 12.

"The holidays are a time to enjoy the company of family and friends, but also a time to be extra careful on the roads," said Sgt. Kim Slade. "Sadly, the holiday season leads

to an increase in drivers who shouldn't be driving. It's important for us to let people know that if you feel different, you drive different."

During the 2017 Thanksgiving (Nov. 22-26) and Christmas (Dec. 22-25) holidays, 99 people were killed and nearly 4,500 people were injured on California roads. Of those deadly crashes, nearly 35 percent involved alcohol.

With holiday parties taking place, it's important to plan ahead and make sure everyone has a sober ride home. Even if you've had only one drink, play it safe and designate a sober driver or use a ride-share service to get home. If you plan on drinking, don't plan on driving.

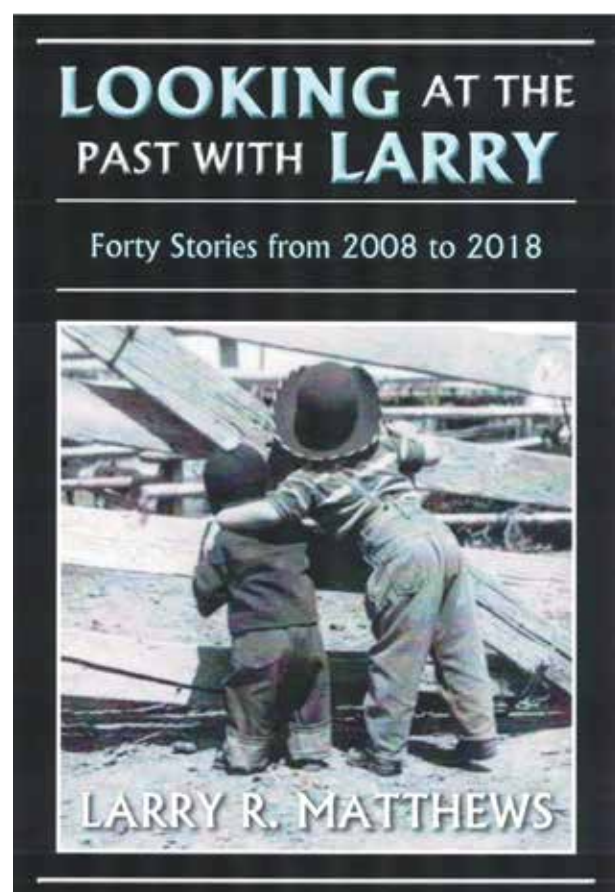
The Yuba City Police Department also supports efforts by the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) to inform drivers that "DUI Doesn't Just Mean Booze." Prescription drugs, over-the-counter medications and marijuana can also be impairing, especially in combination with alcohol or other drugs, and can result in a DUI.

"Don't spoil the holiday and put yourself and others at risk by driving impaired" said Sgt. Kim Slade. "People need to understand that the only time they should be driving is when they are sober."

Funding for holiday season enforcement operations are provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

## God Out of the Bag

Even the nonprofit Red Cross people stopped victims and community volunteers from praying together at the Sutter-Yuba Fairgrounds. Red Cross founder Clara Barton would be dismayed at their callousness.

Maybe these God-free schools have an exception to the rules for when tragedy strikes or when the odds of dying are high? Is there a God lesson plan under lock and key not to be opened until lives are threatened or trauma occurs? If the dead simply become dust with no consciousness then why sweat the end?

Is permission granted by schools to cry out to God when your friend's warm blood and brain matter are spattered on your face from a gunshot to the head? Are there exceptions when being held hostage or facing incineration?

People under duress (in warfare, prison, drowning, being murdered, facing fire and flood) often violate secular protocol and man's rules prohibiting calling on God.

In the book of Jonah such a violent storm arose that a ship threatened to break apart. Gnarly veteran sailors were so shaken that each "cried out to his own god." It was so desperate that they dumped the cargo overboard to lighten the ship. The ship captain confronted Jonah saying "Get up and call on your god! Maybe he will take notice of us so that we will not perish."

Amazing how a person can be motivated to pray and get focused on what's important when facing death or serious harm. It's also sobering how authoritarian, controlling and lost schools have become all while posing to really care for children.

When students are brain-washed that there is no God, then they face life's tragedies and confusion without the most important resource available to them. They don't know what they don't know. Essentially, government schools blind children to the truth.

Fortunately, the occasional pants-messing tragedy lets God out of the bag.

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## The Seduction of Socialism

Among economic models, socialism could be said to be a fad model, falling in and then out of favor as economic models go through a somewhat predictable cycle.

I am of the opinion very little can bring about a civilizations downfall. Not a pandemic, or war, or even an atomic blast or two. Just look at Japan and their stunning recovery from being a burnt out and defeated nation at the conclusion of WW2 and then became one of most powerful economies in the world in a little more than 3 decades.

Economic collapse however has over time, buried more civilizations than any other single event.

From Alexander Fraser Tytler:

"A democracy is always temporary in nature; it simply cannot exist as a permanent form of government. A democracy will continue to exist up until the time that voters discover that they can vote themselves generous gifts from the public treasury. From that moment on, the majority always votes for the candidates who promise the most benefits from the public treasury, with the result that every democracy will finally collapse due to loose fiscal policy, which is always followed by a dictatorship.

The average age of the world's greatest civilizations from the beginning of history has been about 200 years. During those 200 years, these nations always progressed through the following sequence:

Breaking that down, it means eventually a democratic system, because of the majority vote stipulation of democracy, means the populace will always vote in the majorities best interests, "best interests" being the key word here.

The reason for the ultimate collapse is monetary inflation. By inflating the money supply (printing money) the prices of most if not all things will rise in price of whatever the currency is being printed. Think U.S. dollars here in the United States or Mexican Peso

in Mexico.

Monetary inflation is always caused by the authority of the currency, basically the government of whatever country is in question. Inflation is not necessarily a bad thing except for one economic truth:

Wages always lag price increases.

This means the more inflation you have, and the longer you have it, the "Affordability Gap" will relentlessly widen. As prices rises, wages fall further and further behind. As the wage gap (affordability gap) continues to widen, more people "fall under the bus", meaning they have a harder and harder time making ends meet. The result is the wealth concentrates into the hands of fewer and fewer people. Sound familiar?

If that wasn't bad enough, as more people find it harder to pay their bills, the calls for government assistance get louder and louder. This results in the candidates promising the most benefits getting elected while those vying for a return to a sound economic model (the cessation of printing money) get voted out.

This results in more and more elected officials towing the party line of ever increasing government assistance, which in turn results in more money printing, which results in more inflation which causes even more people to need help.

Because the cause and effect of monetary inflation is not widely understood, the very policies the masses cry for (more and more public assistance) make the situation worse and never better.

It's a vicious cycle as well as a deceptive one. The concentration of wealth is also predicted and a natural byproduct of this process. Because wealth is in essence never destroyed, the decrease in wealth in the masses also means that wealth moves up the food chain. The more people who go broke, the more money moves up. The result is the wealth continues to concentrate in the hands of fewer and fewer people.

This happens because inflation hurts the lower incomes but actually enriches the higher incomes. Imagine a family making 30,000 with no assets seeing a 5% annual inflation rate. They see their expense rise by 5% (losing \$1,800 in buying power due to the inflation) and have no way of making it up.

Now imagine an individual who has 30 million in assets (regardless of what he makes). His assets also see a 5% inflation rate. His net worth will increase six million (5% of 30 million). Whereas the family making 30K only finds it harder to pay their bills, the rich person has actually gotten a heck of lot richer.

Also remember his six million came from somewhere, and using the \$1,800 in loss wages figure from above, the 6 million increase in wealth means 3,333 families went under (6 million divided by \$1,800) to make this one guy richer. Now that's a fast path to the concentration of wealth!

The ugly truth is the Cycle of Failure is caused by monetary inflation. The monetary inflation is caused by governments. The monetary inflation is demanded by the very people it will devastate, mainly those in the lower income brackets. And because that bracket will get larger and larger over time, they will eventually vote themselves the "generous gifts" referred to in Tytler's quote and the cycle will progress.

Put in another way, the rich LOVE inflation, and they LOVE when there are calls for more help, because it makes them that much richer.

Most people don't realize voting for more government assistance will just do more damage.

But like a drug, monetary inflation is also addictive. To stop using it and go back to a healthy economic model means the withdrawal will be massively painful. And it will be so for the very same people that call for it. And like a drug, we continually need more and more of it. Think minimum wage increases and how many times it's been raised.

As for the rich, they probably hope the masses keep calling for more assistance through more government freebies because it enriches them. But don't expect the masses to understand this phenomenon. From Upton Sinclair: "It is difficult to get a man to understand something, when his salary depends on his not understanding it."

**Costa Rican Lad Abandoned at the Desert Border**

I'm generally up-to-speed on the national political scene and especially all the arrows zinging at President Trump and his policies. I was curious about how many Costa Ricans in Central America were in the caravans of "illegals" headed for the United States (that have reached over 6,000 caught in a logjam at Tijuana as of Thursday, Nov. 28th). Authorities think the child was recently abandoned since they found the minor in good condition despite the 100-plus degree weather. Customs and Border Patrol (CBP) took the boy for further processing in Tucson and contacted the Costa Rican consulate for help reaching the boy's family.

Mabel Segura, the Consul General of Costa Rica in Los Angeles, flew down to Tucson yesterday and joined Carmen Bermúdez, the Consul General in Tucson, to help with the case. Bermúdez and Segura visited the boy this morning and said he's doing well.

"He was calm and told us he was watching movies," Segura told The Tico Times in a phone interview. "He said that they were feeding him and he had everything he needed.

"He also used that time to call his mother and spoke to her for some time."

The boy's mother lives in New York and Segura said she has a "very unique immigration status" but didn't elaborate further. Segura says U.S. authorities told her their goal is to reunite the child with his family, but further processing is required before that happens.

Segura says the boy will be moved to a shelter while U.S. authorities investigate the mother's socioeconomic status to make sure it's a safe environment for the child."

**Water Management**

This week, Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will invest \$449 million in a water storage project in the Sacramento Valley. A USDA press release said the Department's Community Facilities direct loan program is investing in the Maxwell Water Intertie (MWI) to increase water management flexibility and improve water supply resiliency in rural California.

The project would connect the Tehama Colusa Canal (TC Canal) and the existing Glenn Colusa Irrigation District's (GCID) main canal. This new pipeline would connect water from the Funks Reservoir to the GCID system. Once the waterway is completed, it will funnel water from the Sacramento River to the Sites Reservoir at Folsom Lake. The site was visited this week by Secretary Perdue along with Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke and Representatives Jeff Denham (R-Stanislaus), David Valadao (R-Kings), Jim Costa (D-Madera), and John Garamendi (D-Yolo).

**Farm Bill Update**

Congress has reached an agreement on the 2018 Farm Bill and Republicans are expected to release the text of the final legislation in the coming days. Leaders of the House and Senate Agriculture Committees, who led the negotiations, issued a joint statement on Thursday announcing a deal had been reached. After the final text is released, House and Senate negotiators will fight for limited time on the legislative calendar to force a floor vote on the 2018 Farm Bill before the 115th Congress concludes on December 13, 2018.

The final text of the 2018 Farm Bill has not been released as of yet, but Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Pat Roberts (R-Kansas) and Ranking Member Debbie Stabenow (D-Michigan) hinted the forestry title could be spun-off as a separate bill. The forestry title of the 2018 Farm Bill was among the last pieces of the bill to be finalized, and it is unclear if a final agreement was reached. In previous years, Congress has passed the forestry title separately from the Farm Bill when negotiations stalled over certain forestry provisions.

House Republicans are pushing forest management language that is similar to legislation that repeatedly passed the House but later failed in the Senate. Republicans argue forest management policies that expand categorical exclusions in addition to other reforms of the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) and the Endangered Species Act (ESA) would improve forest resiliency to wildfires. Democrats and environmental groups paint these arguments as excuses to expand private logging on federal forest land. Senate Democrats have opposed similar Republican forestry proposals in the past including most recently the Resilient Federal Forests Act of 2017 (HR 2936).

**Food and Farm News****Loan aids water project**

Water management in the Sacramento Valley will benefit from a \$449 million federal loan. U.S. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue announced the loan during a visit to the future Sites Reservoir Tuesday. The loan would aid a project to connect two existing canals in order to enhance the flexibility of water management in the region. Perdue and Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke also met with farmers and ranchers for a roundtable discussion.

**Rangeland suffers from Camp Fire**

Early estimates indicate the Camp Fire burned 30,000 to 40,000 acres of rangeland in Butte County.

Ranchers say most cattle remained on higher ground during the fire, and were not affected. But the ranchers will need to find other sources of feed to replace the scorched rangeland. The Butte County agricultural commissioner says he has also heard of fire damage to orchards and nurseries, but that specific loss estimates can't yet be made.

**Resources help bird owners protect poultry**

Keeping birds safe from infectious poultry diseases requires care, whether the birds live on farms or in backyard chicken coops, and government agencies have enhanced online resources to help bird owners. A U.S. Agriculture Department program called

Defend the Flock provides videos, fact sheets and other materials. In Southern California, officials are tracking outbreaks of virulent Newcastle disease in backyard poultry.

**Restaurant preferences undergo changes**

The restaurant landscape continues to shift with the emergence of "fast casual" restaurants. A government study says fast-casual restaurants have increased their share of the quick-service restaurant market. Quick-service establishments--where customers order food at a counter--have grown in number by 20 percent since 2000, and now account for more than half of the restaurants in operation nationwide.

## PG&E May Get A Legislative Lifeline to Extend Wildfire Liability Relief

A new bill could allow the utility to raise bonds to cover this year's deadly Camp Fire – and avoid potential bankruptcy.

Pacific Gas & Electric could soon get a legislative lifeline to help manage the threat of multi-billion-dollar liabilities from this month's Camp Fire, a move that could be critical to shield the utility from the looming threat of bankruptcy.

The bill from California Assemblyman Chris Holden, would amend a critical provision of state law SB 901, the wildfire omnibus bill passed in September. Among its provisions, SB 901 will allow PG&E to issue bonds to pay for the potential liabilities of the deadly wildfires of 2017 – but it didn't extend that option to fires this year.

Holden's proposed bill would extend this provision to 2018, giving PG&E the option to raise bonds to cover the potential liabilities it faces in the wake of the Camp Fire. With 85 deaths confirmed to date, the fire

has become the state's most destructive in history.

PG&E has not been found responsible for either the Camp Fire or the Tubbs Fire, both of which are still under investigation.

## Paradise Lawmakers Call Utility Proposal Premature

Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama) and Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) issued the following joint statement today in response to reports of a new legislative proposal to provide financial protections to PG&E:

"There will be time in the weeks and months ahead to discuss policy proposals ensuring accountability and the future viability of utilities in California.

"But to do so now is irresponsible and premature.

"The first order of business when the Legislature reconvenes must be to aid Butte County families who are suffering and to assist a Town that is reeling from one of the worst disasters in our nation's history. This is the priority. We welcome and encourage our legislative colleagues to assist in this effort."

## U.S. Supreme Court Rules ESA Critical Habitat Must Be Actual Listed Species Habitat

In a big departure from previous interpretation of the federal Endangered Species Act, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that critical habitat designated for a threatened or endangered species must be

actual habitat for that species, not simply adjacent habitat or areas that may be suitable for habitat.

Currently, critical habitat may include areas that are not occupied by a listed species, but may

be designated if the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service determines the areas are "essential for conservation of the species." The ruling not only limits the Service's ability to designate critical habitat in the future, but also opens up challenges to past designations that have economic impacts on the regulated community.
