## Voting with Their Feet

Humans have been on the move since the beginning, after the Creation, at the Tower of Babel, following The Flood, when famine hit Canaan land, and when God delivered millions of Israelite slaves from Egypt.

People relocate for many reasons --- wars, persecution, economics and a yearning to be free to name a few. In America, people pack-it-up for many causes, but high taxes, egregious regulations and better opportunities elsewhere top the list.

Since 2008, more than 1,700 companies are confirmed ex-Californians. The usual complaints of high taxes and heavy regulations have expanded recently to include the high cost of housing making it difficult to attract and retain workers.

Some high profile refugees include Toyota that moved its U.S. headquarters from Torrance to Plano, Texas; Occidental Petroleum relocated its headquarters from Los Angeles to Houston; and Nestle USA food conglomerate headquarters fled Glendale for Rosslyn, Virginia.

Now, Texas and California media are reporting that the second largest enterprise in California, the McKesson Corp. (pharmaceutical giant sixth on the Fortune 500 list) is preparing to move its headquarters from San Francisco to Texas.

McKesson is looking at the former NEC Corp. of America office complex on State Highway 114 in Irving, real estate brokers say. The two office buildings contain more than a half million square feet of space that could house more than 1,000 workers.

Apple is the only California company bigger than McKesson. McKesson had 75,000-plus employees and \$198 billion in annual revenue last fiscal year.

Why would McKesson leave? McKesson stood to be the biggest loser from San Francisco's Nov. 6 homeless tax. To fund another expansion of homeless programs, Measure C imposes a gross receipts tax on San Francisco-based companies which have \$50 million or more in annual revenue. The tax (about .5%) is not on profits but on sales whether you make a profit or not.

McKesson is by far the highest-grossing San Francisco-based firm. Measure C is expected to generate \$300 million a year, adding to the \$380 million City Hall already spends for homeless people annually.

If Governor Brown feels anything for displaced businesses it is disdain. He says they lack the intellect to run the minefield of California taxes, fees and shackling regulations.

People are also moving. Brown and his comrades scoff that there are millions around the world that will replace them. Renting one-way outbound moving trucks is at a premium. Renting a moving truck earlier this year from Las Vegas to San Jose was about \$100. In the opposite direction, the same truck will cost 16 times that, or nearly \$2,000.

Golden State residents are doing the once-unthinkable, leaving. Why? Soaring taxes, unaffordable home prices, stifling regulations, horrible roads and schools and being tired of being told what to do. Those leaving are seeking freedom, financial and personal.

## Yuba Water Agency Begins Discussion Transferring Property Tax Revenue to County

Marysville, Ca. — Yuba Water Agency will move forward with plans to further consider a transfer of property tax revenue to Yuba County, which is approximately \$500,000 per year.

For decades, Yuba Water Agency has received a small portion of the county's property tax revenue to help with the cost of business outside of power and reservoir operations, which were paid by Pacific Gas & Electric. The property tax funding covered the cost of things like recreation facilities, general management, flood risk reduc-

tion projects, water supply, and more.

In 2016, the agency's contract with PG&E expired and the water agency began receiving the revenue from power generation, as well as taking responsibility for the associated expenses. That property tax funding is now a small percentage of the agency's annual revenue.

"Timing is everything. And for many years, that portion of the property tax revenue helped run the agency," said Yuba Water Agency Vice-Chairman Randy Fletcher. "Today, with the

revenue coming in from power generation, it is only appropriate that it go to the county, which can use it to substantially help the community in ways the water agency would not be able to do."

Before Yuba Water Agency can proceed with the transfer of property tax revenue to Yuba County, the agency is required to hold a specific public hearing and adopt a resolution in support of the transfer. Yuba County will then need to hold a subsequent public hearing, adopt a resolution of its own and file it with the county auditor to appropriately adjust the tax revenue allocation.

The board directed agency staff to begin the process, with the caveat that the transfer would expire after ten years, at which time it would be reconsidered.

## Ranchers assess impact of Camp Fire

The extent of agricultural damage from the Camp Fire in Butte County will take some time to assess. Cattle ranchers report losses to grazing land, winter feed and fences, but say cattle and other livestock remained on higher-elevation rangeland untouched by the fire. Beekeepers and orchards may also have suffered fire-related losses. Farm organizations have created relief efforts to benefit rural disaster victims.

## Federal agencies seek to enhance forest management

As crews work to contain wildfires in California and elsewhere, two federal cabinet secretaries say they want expanded authority to engage in

forest management. In a conference call with reporters Tuesday, U.S. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue and Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke said they would seek the authority from Congress. Perdue said he wants to expand Good Neighbor Authority, which allows local governments to cooperate in management of federal forestland.

## U.S. turkey production remains stable

This is the time when many people think about turkey, and the U.S. Agriculture Department says Americans consume about 16 pounds of turkey per person each year. That figure has stayed stable--and so has turkey meat production. California ranks eighth in the nation in turkey production, with

about 11.5 million birds marketed last year. USDA says wholesale turkey prices have been trending lower in 2018 compared to a year ago.

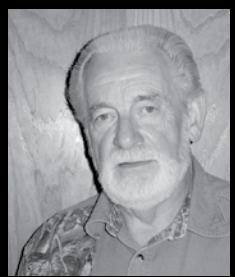
## Christmas tree farms prepare for season

Christmas tree prices should hold steady this year, according to the National Christmas Tree Association. Many choose-and-cut tree farms open the day after Thanksgiving. The association says sales of natural, locally grown trees have enjoyed a renaissance, thanks to buyers from the millennial generation. Data from the credit card-processing firm Square indicate tree prices fluctuate during the holiday season, reaching their low point--not surprisingly--on Christmas Eve.

We hope all had a Happy Thanksgiving Day and all of you who fish and enjoy the outdoors have said a prayer for the people in Paradise, California. Keep in mind that this community is so close to the Yuba Sutter area as well as most of the area those who trout fish pass through on their way to the high country. I have driven through Paradise so many times I cannot count them and I am horrified for what has happened to the community up there. God bless each of you who lost everything and let those most unfortunate who perished rest in peace.

As a small boy I was introduced to the world of fishing. My Father, who was one of the most devoted people to fish for trout, taught me how to fly fish, to bait fish and to spin fish for the elusive trout. It did not matter if it was a rainbow, a brown, brook or one of that no one at the time could identify, we always had a wonderful time camping and enjoying the outdoors and the challenges and the streams we fished.

I was fortunate to have been able to fish for trout before it was invaded by many anglers. I was fortunate to have been able to fish for all varieties of trout in streams which were basically untouched by humans. I was also lucky to have been able to catch native trout all morning long, releasing most, but saving the injured ones for a

great breakfast of freshly caught trout, bacon and eggs. We appreciated the magic of Mother Nature and always released most of what we caught. In some streams it was not uncommon to catch and release a hundred trout a day, always being careful to catch and release them unharmed.

I have returned to many of the rivers and streams I fished as a young lad with my Dad always nearby, keeping a keen eye on me so I would not stray and get lost or fall in the water and drown. He always was there and as I grew up it was me and my

own sons who fished the streams and rivers of the Sierra Nevada Mountains. It was me who looked out for them and who showed them the way to success in fishing.

In closing, except for the closing thought this week, I say a prayer to a friend who has departed and is now fishing in the Kingdom of Heaven. God bless you Buster Eugene Foster. You will always be "Buck" to me and to all our friends and associates. Rest in Peace, my lifelong friend.

## Bonds and Interest Rates

For the second time in as many years, conservative investors holding bonds are sweating bullets and seeing red in balances as bonds tanked a few weeks back. This also means interest rates conversely rose with some reasonable velocity as the two move opposite of each other. The last time this happened was right after Trump was elected in the fall of 2016.

The speed at which fixed income (investments with a fixed return as a prerequisite) fell in late 2016 caused news headlines to shout things like "carnage" in an otherwise mundane area of investing, the bond market.

Now once again the rout made headlines. In their Oct 8, 2018 article entitled "Bonds in \$916 Billion Wipeout Spark Fear of Worst Run Since 1976", the author goes on to highlight the eye-popping amount

trimmed off aggregate bond prices which is the 916 billion mentioned in the title.

No doubt some conservative investors, thinking their portfolios held investments that were safe and therefore shouldn't move much, likely put calls into their advisors or twisted up their brokerage statements as the bond rout became reality in the form of declining portfolio balances.

The strong U.S. economy, rising inflationary pressure and the Federal Reserve's statements on continuing expected increases in a key rate called the "Fed Funds Rate" may be some of the reasons for the bond sell off. Bond prices generally move opposite of interest rates, whereas if rates rise, bonds will tend to fall. The duration of the bond (maturity) determines how much the bond will react to interest rates moves.

Generally speaking, markets hate surprises and fast jerking prices in either direction in bonds or stocks can disrupt an otherwise calm market, which some may argue was the climate in stocks and bonds prior to the beginning of the bond sell off.

Bonds are IOU's from whoever, meaning there exists corporate, state

or federal bonds as well as a plethora of others. They offer different yields and maturities and even have a few different ways that they can pay you.

They are also rated from investment grade to junk and all levels in between and the description is self-explanatory. What investors may not know is the "junk" is sometimes added to the cream (the better bonds) to boost returns on funds that might have names like "income fund" or "high yield funds".

These funds won't use the name junk of course, but do have to reveal the rating on everything they hold in their financials. Usually bonds hanging around the "junk" moniker have a tendency to move more violently than the higher graded stuff and all of them move in opposite of maturity. This means the longer the maturity date (expiration date) the more susceptible they are to rate movements and therefore are usually more volatile.

Investors can lessen the volatility of their bond portfolio by choosing shorter duration and higher graded holdings but with this adjustment also comes lower yields. There are no free lunches it is said.

For now at least, the bond market could be said to be in turmoil, at least for those investors holding the longer term ones.

Of course with pain for some also comes pleasure for others. As is usually the case in markets, when somebody loses money, others are happily picking it up on the other side of the trade.

Sound advice for all investors is to remain calm, be patient and if necessary or nervous, review your holdings to make sure you are not over exposed in any one area. Market upsets don't last forever and running with a stampeding panicked herd can be hazardous to one's portfolio health.

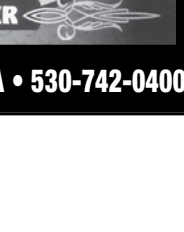

## It's Time to Unmask the "Stop the Dump" Smear Campaign

In response to Russia's efforts to meddle in the 2016 Presidential Elections, Facebook is requiring more information on individuals who are paying for advertising content on their social media platform. Not only will this new application ensure greater transparency during the election season, but will also unmask homegrown conspirators, many of which are business competitors who manipulate the political process in order to choose winners and losers in the marketplace.

This kind of drama is unfolding here in Yuba City. Our family-owned business, Recycling Industries, would like to expand its recycling and transfer station operation by adding a mere 1-acre to our present 3-acre site. Not only would a new transfer station provide the city new jobs and tax revenue, it would also provide the residents of Yuba City the convenience and savings of having a local facility.

Such a project should not be perceived as controversial. However, an anonymous group of so-called concerned citizens called "Stop the Dump," has launched Facebook ads warning neighbors that a dump (landfill) is coming to their neighborhood. Not

only is this not true, the Appeal Democrat's editorial board said it best, "If you need to bolster opposition by calling it something worse than a transfer station...maybe the transfer station isn't that bad?"

Fortunately, this campaign of misinformation is falling on deaf ears. When I invited over 200 immediate neighbors to my place of business to introduce my proposed project, not one neighbor attended. Quite frankly, the lack of concern is not surprising. My family's business is located in an industrial zone, nestled between a saw mill and the city sewer treatment plant, and not located in a residential neighborhood. What's more, all transfer activity of garbage will occur inside an enclosed building, built on a concrete foundation and transferred to a landfill within 48 hours. It is by no means a dump (landfill).

While there are those who profess to be on and off again architects of Stop the Dump's Facebook campaign, they are only puppets in a scheme to mislead the public. I believe their puppeteer is most likely a competitor who stands to lose some market share if our transfer station is approved.

One major competitor

is Recology. According to public documents, Recology's lobbyist, Smart Marketing, is pressuring the city council and staff to deny my project, and even sue the city if their intimidation tactics do not work. At this point if Recology is not behind the "Stop the Dump" campaign, I would call upon them to denounce the actions of "Stop the Dump," as they are well aware that the proposed transfer station is NOT a dump.

I am confident that the city will do the right thing. The project is properly zoned for an industrial center and an extensive environmental review found that the enclosed nature of the project would not have any measurable impact on the community in terms of smell or traffic. It's time for the public to recognize that "Stop the Dump" is not a citizen led group. The longer they ignore this reality, political pressure will mount on the city council to vote against the public's best interests. This is something residents cannot afford.

## Tijuana Residents: "We Don't Want You Here"

Some remarks by many of the over 300 Mexican residents of Tijuana, Mexico recently protesting the massive amounts of mainly Central American people clogging up their border town are rather enlightening...and complete vindication of President Trump's border policies.

## YWA Grant Helps Wheatland Police

Wheatland police officers will be better protected while on duty with the help of a grant from Yuba Water Agency.

The \$5,000 grant, approved today by the water agency as a part of the Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, will help the Wheatland Police Department purchase seven new bulletproof vests.

"The men and women in blue put their lives on the line every day to protect us," said Yuba Water Agency Board Director Gary Bradford, whose district includes

Wheatland. "This funding will allow the department to provide better protection for the officers keeping our communities safe."

The Wheatland Police Department provides general law enforcement services to the community of approximately 4,000 people, and responds to issues around the agency's dams and hydropower facilities through mutual aid agreements. Each bulletproof vest has an expiration date and the majority of the current vests are coming up for replacement, so this funding will relieve a significant financial burden for the department.

This is another agen-

cy to benefit from Yuba Water Agency's Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, which was created in January, 2018. These grants are designed for first responder agencies in Yuba County and will cover the one-time costs of up to \$5,000 per applicant annually, associated with the purchase of rescue equipment or specialized personnel training. The grant program was the idea of, and is named after, an employee who survived a potentially life-threatening injury, and who was extremely grateful for the emergency responders who helped save him.

## New Groundwater Rules Will Cost Kern 24,000 Jobs

Groundwater is an issue and important resource—maybe if he allowed the building of dams, we would not have to use as much groundwater. Again the Brown policy has caused the loss of jobs.
