HJTA Complaints Against Cities and Counties

Howard Jarvis Taxpayer Association (HJTA), California's leading taxpayer advocacy group named for the author of Proposition 13, is suing cities and counties for violating the rights of citizens.

In July, HJTA filed a lawsuit against the County of Los Angeles for “gross misconduct” when it “illegally spent” close to \$1 million in taxpayer funds on political advertising. The lawsuit seeks reimbursement to the county treasury and civil penalties.

County officials spent the money on a campaign consultant and political advertising to promote Measure H, a sales tax measure in March 2017. The advertisements on television and radio in English and Spanish, praised homeless programs that Measure H would pay for, using the tag line, “Measure H, Real Help Lasting Change, Vote March 7.” The ads never mentioned that Measure H was a proposed tax increase.

Marysville, Ca

Supervisory Candidate Alton Wright and his followers decided that they would cause trouble for Supervisory Candidate John Mistler, owner of the Territorial Dispatch. They discussed on Mr. Wright's facebook page the possibilities of boycotting the advertisers but one individual decided it would be more politically advantageous to force the TD out of the post offices. Upon a call from Wright or one of his supporters, the post offices of Browns Valley and Brownsville have decided to strictly enforce the office code barring any publications from being on postal property. The papers were confiscated without conversation with Mr. Mistler. The complaint states: "This needs to be addressed quickly as the advertising affects the November election. (Wright's action was clearly politically motivated.) The Postmasters of these two Post Offices were politically duped by candidate Wright. He filed the complaint the same day that his full page ad appeared in the TD; thus preventing anyone else's ad from being seen. In addition on the same date, Wright filed a complaint with Yuba County to remove the TD from other government property. In a letter to Wright; Yuba County Counsel states **"... the U.S. Supreme Court has defined communicative activities broadly, so that first amendment protection extends to the right to distribute or circulate newspapers."** Yuba County Counsel further stated, "the county finds that permitting The Territorial Dispatch to engage in **protected activity** of distributing and circulating its newspaper of general character at the County's Government Center serves a substantial public interest". Wright's complaint was denied. Yuba County does not oversee the Post Office however; they both have to abide by the 1st Amendment.

The Territorial Dispatch is the only newspaper in the foothills of Yuba County and it is free. This situation presents an abridgement of the 1st Amendment due to the remote nature, lack of convenience and availability to provide free press, including government required legal notices, to this rural population.

Congress shall make **no law** respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; **or *abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press;** or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

The action of the two Post Offices is outlined by Postal Office codes, **not the law**. Postmaster's have the ability to adjust to the needs and desires of the community. A quote from Sacramento Postal Office to one of the post offices states that we have received a complaint, "Please investigate and resolve to the best of **your** abilities." (The discretion of the Postmaster)

In his desire to game the system Mr. Wright's action also caused the two Postmasters's to **eliminate the public bulletin boards**. In a quick check it appears that Brownsville and Browns Valley are the only two Post Offices in Rural Northern California to be enforcing the office code.

The Territorial Dispatch is now available in all businesses in Brownsville and additional papers have been put in the Browns Valley 76 Gas Station/Mini Mart, the Gold Eagle Market in Loma Rica and the Loma Rica Store. Mr. Mistler said, "For political reasons Alton Wright has hurt and inconvenienced the people of the foothills, the only way to correct it is to have the Postmasters of Browns Valley and Brownsville relax their position."

Marvsville, Ca.

The Yuba County Board of Supervisors Tuesday authorized its attorneys to initiate litigation against PG&E as an important step towards recovery from the Cascade Fire, one in a set of the most destructive wildfires in California history. Yuba County joins Sonoma, Napa, Lake, and Mendocino counties, which previously authorized the national law firm of Baron & Budd and the California Fire Lawyers to represent them for the significant damages sustained as a result of the historic North Bay Fires.

CalFire identified PG&E equipment as the cause and

origin of the devastating Cascade Fire, which caused damage to County property and resources.

The five counties suffered some of the greatest losses in California wildfire history. Yuba County alone is facing millions of dollars in costs related to emergency response, recovery efforts, infrastructure damages, injury to natural resources, loss of tax revenue, and other significant losses. The resulting litigation will not address losses to private property.

“This lawsuit is intended to seek compensation from those entities responsible for the fires: costs that

should not be shouldered by Yuba County, which is still recovering from the devastation,” said County Counsel Courtney Abril. “Legal action is a necessary step to help restore our resilient community.”

Baron & Budd, P.C. is a national law firm, and part of the California Fire Lawyers consortium, which has a demonstrated track record in representing public entities in recovering from disasters. The fires have been vigorously litigated over the last year in the San Francisco Superior Court before Judge Curtis E.A. Karnow.

Was the Gridley City Council under a spell when they agreed to pay Chief of Police “Diamond” Dean Price \$332,743 or \$27,728 per month for his 2018-2019 salary / benefits? That nearly made him the top paid state law enforcement official.

His contract blocked the city from reducing his pay unless all employees got a reduction. The city actually paid his \$300 gym membership since it was too much to expect him to tend to his own “wellness.”

Did the council confuse the top cop with an entertainer or elite athlete?

The city's administration is also well-heeled for managing just 2.08 square miles of cityscape and its 6,074 residents. Gridley's City Administrator Paul Eckert receives \$206,672 for 2018-2019 or \$34 per person annually for his services. Public Works / Electric Director Daryl Dye collects \$301,730, Russell Hawes - Electric Supervisor \$185,803, and Finance Director Juan Solis \$178,876.

The city has its own Electric Company that the city draws more than a million dollars from annually to compensate their top 6 or 7 staff members. The citizens pay taxes and then have their utility rates tapped when the city runs short. Most people think that taking "surplus" from a municipal utility to float the city budget is assessing an illegal tax. However, cities and counties have sticky fingers nowadays regardless of law or ethics.

In September, "Diamond Dean" suddenly announced his retirement to avoid being dismissed. His last day was October 30. Maybe he will find work elsewhere. Hired to replace him is Interim Chief Allen Byers who retired in May from leading Oroville Police Department.

Byers comes with 20-years of experience and credentials. The good news in Gridley is that he'll receive only \$9,166 in salary/benefits each month versus "Diamond Dean's" \$27,728 for a monthly savings of \$18,562.

Many people liked Chief Price. Did the council wake up from its financial snooze or did the Chief stumble? Hopefully the council members are realizing that tomatoes are not \$10 a pound and see about recruiting some lower priced officials to rule the town.

With cities and counties unable to fund promised pension and health benefits and Cal PERS unable to function honestly and remain solvent local politicians seem stuck. They blame the state for their demise.

In spite of plenty of blame to go around local "leaders" make the deals with employee unions that raise the pay and let the taxpayers pick-up the pension contributions. As Billy Sunday said, "There is a payday someday." Politicians and administrators just hope they get theirs and retire to another state when the "someday" arrives.

Politicians and administrators have mismanaged jurisdictions into a financial hole and then try to shame the public into coughing-up more cash. These rulers have no red faces, making \$100,000, \$200,000 and \$300,000 as they drain utility funds and ask households earning less than \$50,000 to give more more, and some more to fund the government's future.

Raising sales taxes and gas taxes have the most negative impact on the very poor, taking a higher percentage of their monthly earnings. They cannot avoid taxes on fuel and cars. Liberals always have an answer though – offer them more “free” benefits funded by the rich and middle class.

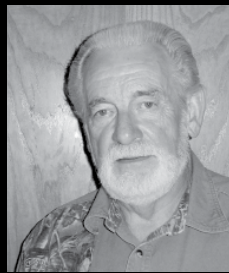

We returned from Lake Tahoe last week. The day we planned to fish was windy which made for ocean type water on the lake. I have been on Lake Tahoe in these kinds of conditions and it is common for someone on board to get sea sick. Anyway, we decided to take a rain check on fishing this last time. Speaking of fishing at Tahoe, we have reports the mackinaw lake trout have started their pre-winter binge with fish being caught at around 250 to 350 feet down. Most fish are in the three to five pound range with a few dropping the fish scale at around 14 pounds. Rainbow and brown trout are also available near shore and in the shallower waters.

We hear from up high at Gold Lake. The trout fishing here is outstanding and will continue to be good for the next couple of weeks. Now is the time to go because we are told you can limit out with no problem using just about any lure, spinner or bait.

Our weather source tells us to expect cloudy and cooler days for the next week or more. He also advises the night temperatures in the valley will remain about the same. As far as rain goes he says he is looking into the first part of November with no rain in sight.

Steelhead is showing in the Feather River. Salmon have really

slowed down in the areas where the season is still open. Be aware of the low water levels in the river. We highly recommend leaving props home and go, if possible with a jet boat.

We talked about trout plants last week. The only area being planted this week is the Bay Area and vicinity.

We remind folks who fish of the "Save our Fisheries dinner" which will be held at the main hall of the Yuba Sutter Fairgrounds on Saturday, November 3, 2018 starting at 4:30 P.M. On line tickets are available at

The trout plant we talked about at Collins Lake happened last week with more plants being planned up until Thanksgiving Day. This program really turns out local anglers who have great fishing practically in their back yards. If you want a bunch of trout for dinner now is the time to head up to Collins Lake and dip a line.

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

Sutter County Mobile Alert Code Red

Sutter County recently purchased a mass emergency notification system, Code Red, that will be used for emergency notifications in every city and unincorporated area of the county. It is the same robust system used by our emergency management partners in Yuba County, Butte County, and Nevada County.

While every hard landline telephone in Live Oak, Yuba City, and the rest of Sutter County will be entered into the system automatically, you will need to take at least one of the following actions to receive text or voice messages on your cell phone:

You can register your cell phone, and others in your household, and connect it to your home address to receive emergency notifications specific to your neighborhood, city, or region; and/or

You can download an app for your smartphone to receive notifications of emergen-

cies wherever you are located in Sutter, Yuba, Butte, or Nevada counties.

You will need to register your cell phone with Code Red even if you previously registered your cell phone to receive emergency notifications from Sutter County. Sutter County no longer utilizes the Nixle platform for emergency notifications.

Halloween is a time when thousands of trick-or-treaters dressed up in their favorite costumes will be out and about having a good time collecting candy. For other adults, that means heading to local bars, restaurants or house parties to celebrate the holiday.

With so many people hitting the streets Oct. 31, the Yuba City Police Department wants to remind those participating in events where alcohol may be involved to celebrate Halloween responsibly.

In partnership with the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS), the Yuba City Police Department is encouraging everyone to not put yourself and others at risk by choosing to drink and drive. If you plan to drink, plan a sober ride home.

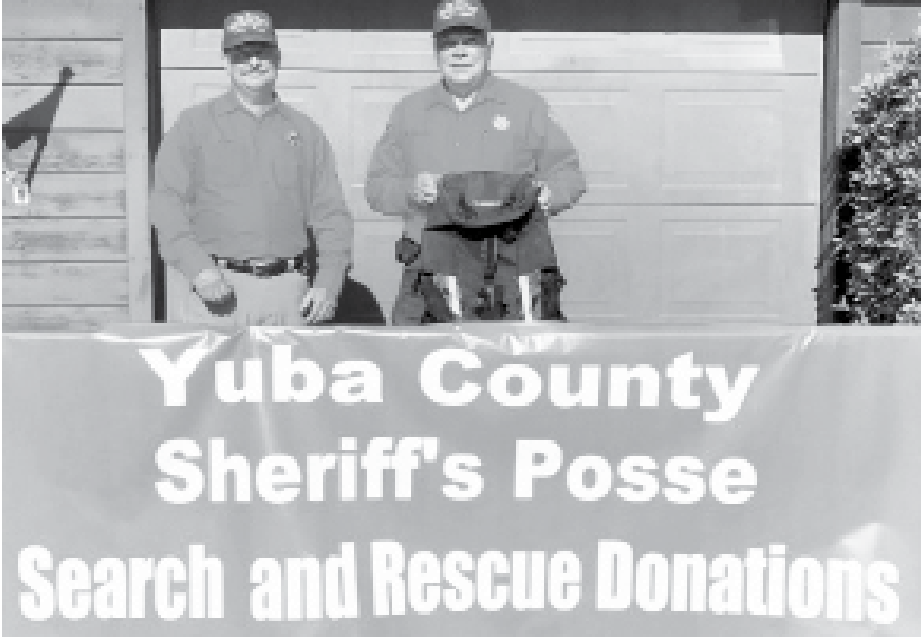
"Halloween should be a fun night for kids and adults," Sgt. Kim Slade said. "By planning ahead, abiding by the rules of the road and driving sober, everyone can enjoy a safe night out."

Unfortunately, Halloween night is also when there is an uptick in drunk-driving related crashes. Between 2012 and 2016, there were 168 drunk-driving deaths on Halloween night. Forty-four percent of all people killed in crashes on Halloween night were in crashes involving a drunk driver, according to data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Younger drivers (21-34 years old) pose the greatest risk, accounting for nearly half of all deaths in drunk-driving crashes on Halloween night in 2016.

In an effort to crack down on those who choose to put others at risk by driving impaired, the Yuba City Police Department will be conducting saturation patrols Halloween night between 6:00 pm and midnight.

The Yuba City Police Department also supports efforts from the OTS that aims to educate all drivers that "DUI Doesn't Just Mean Booze." If you take prescription drugs, particularly those with a driving warning on the label, you might be impaired enough to get a DUI. Marijuana can also be impairing, especially in combination with alcohol or other drugs, and can result in a DUI.

• Avoid driving through residential areas where

• This is a night with heavy foot traffic and another reason to slow down, be extra cautious and obey all traffic signs and signals.

• Watch for children in costumes that may be harder to see at night. Look out for trick-or-treaters who may cross the street mid-block, or from behind parked cars.

• Parents should plan their trick-or-treat route ahead of time and avoid busy streets.

• Have your children wear visible costumes that are easy to walk in and see. Light-colored costumes are best. Use retro-reflective tape.

• Carry a flashlight so drivers can see you.

Whether by bicycle, car, motorcycle or on foot, the Yuba City Police Department encourages everyone Halloween night, and every other night, to go safely.

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Food and Farm News

Active farmland helps replenish groundwater

In orchards, vineyards and fields around California, farmers are spreading water on their land in projects aimed at replenishing underground aquifers. Researchers monitoring the projects want to be sure they benefit groundwater without harming crops. The projects aim to take advantage of water when it's available by storing it underground. On-farm recharge projects are underway in crops including grapes, nuts and alfalfa.

Moderate water stress may help walnut trees

University researchers say a tool called a pressure bomb can help walnut growers determine the best time to irrigate their trees. The pressure bomb measures a tree's water needs. University of California specialists used them in an orchard near Red Bluff, and say they found that walnut trees may benefit from postponing initial irrigation. The UC Davis researchers say walnut trees perform best when under moderate water stress.

Cotton harvest begins with high quality

Signs appear positive for the quality of the California cotton crop as the harvest enters its early stages. Initial reports show higher yields and fewer insect problems than farmers experienced a year ago. California farmers planted fewer acres of cotton this year, in part due to water availability. Farmers remain concerned about how the ongoing trade dispute with China might affect markets for their cotton crop.

Pumpkin crop looks plentiful

With Halloween coming next week, the U.S. Agriculture Department reports that California has had a healthy pumpkin crop this year. California ranks second in the nation in pumpkin production, behind Illinois--where most of the pumpkins are grown for pie filling. Nearly all the pumpkins grown and harvested in California are sold fresh. So far this season, USDA says, pumpkin prices have been slightly higher than last year.

Bad Times at the El Royal

Starring: Jeff Bridges, Cynthia Erivo and Dakota Johnson.

A small hotel in Lake Tahoe is visited by a pack of nefarious characters that mash up in a chaotic scene of mayhem. While some are searching for a quiet place to sleep and others seek forgotten treasure or escape from the consequences of bad choices made. The El Royal offers no safe haven for its guests and tries to hide a sordid past of its own.

Bad Times at the El Royal, earns two out of five, Game Playing Monkeys. This is a nicely shot film that keeps you interested in the events taking place and the characters depicted. The acting is very well done and all of the players fill the roles the director made for them. Three issues keep this film from being worth a forty dollar trip to town to see in the big movie house. First, is odd plot pacing and second, is a chopped up story telling style that distracts more than it informs. The last thing it lacks is a great story. This is an okay story but the themes are more cliché, than they are unique stories of unique individuals.

Bad Times at the El Royal is a great movie to see with a \$13.99 a month Netflix subscription, not so much for spending twice that amount for one movie and three items from the concession stand. However, taking time out of your day to spend a few hours with a loved one sharing a movie experience is worth much more. Even a bad movie experience.

Yuba Water Agency Supports Education of Youth About Fish, the Watershed

Marysville, Ca.
For nearly 25 years, Greg and Kathleen Payne have been teaching Yuba County elementary school students about the life cycle of fish and the importance of a healthy watershed. That program received a boost today, with a grant from Yuba Water Agency to fund new equipment for this unique program.

As a part of the California Aquatics Education Program, often referred to as Fish in the Classroom, students set up aquariums in their classrooms and observe the early days of salmon or steelhead eggs. They maintain the water temperature to mimic river conditions and observe the different life stages before releasing them into the river

to continue the journey on their own.

“This program allows the students to become bonded with nature and it helps them understand the importance of fish, the watershed, and how their everyday lives can impact the health of the river,” said Kathleen Payne, program organizer.

This \$2,500 grant will allow the program organizers to purchase new fish chilling units necessary for keeping the classroom aquariums at the appropriate temperature for fish to grow, as well as transportation to and from the river to release the fish.

“This is one of my favorite programs to sponsor, said Yuba Water Agency General Manager Curt Ai-

kens. “It’s so impressive when you hear the students recite all of the life cycles of the fish, and to know that they are developing an appreciation for the river and the fish at such a young age is great.”

Yuba Water Agency has supported the Fish in the Classroom program for more than 20 years by helping fund the maintenance and costs of the aquarium chillers and transportation.

Presidential Order Restores Western Water Supplies

SCOTTSDALE, AZ - Today’s order by President Trump will provide welcome relief to Western farmers, cities, rural communities and wildlife refuges that have struggled under water supply rules that are long overdue for an update. Prioritizing national interest and the value of California food production, the president’s order requires the re-consultation of the biological opinions to be completed and fully implemented by August 2019. The deadline will bring to a close the review of rules governing the long-term operation of the federal Central Valley Project and California State Water Project. The review has been underway since August 2016, a process today’s order requires to be concluded by Aug. 31, 2019.

The president’s action today fulfills his campaign commitment to help solve the state’s water supply shortages and will greatly benefit Central Valley communities and the environment. Since 1992, water supply restrictions have caused severe economic consequences for farms and the people who depend on them for work. Many of the state’s most disadvantaged communities have suffered due to scarce water supplies. Wildlife refuges that are a critical component of the Pacific Flyway have had insufficient water to meet the needs of millions of ducks, geese, shorebirds, songbirds and endangered animals in large parts of the Central Valley and the Klamath Basin. An ongoing review of the rules governing these critical water supplies only delays the ability of these important areas to recover.

This action will also help address water shortages that have occurred across the West as the result of federal regulations overseen by multiple agencies. It offers hope to farmers and ranchers served by federal water projects in the Pacific Northwest, including the Columbia Basin and the Klamath Basin. The president’s order places the responsibility of operating the federal water projects with the Department of the Interior, to be supported by the National Marine Fisheries Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The action prohibits any impacts to threatened or endangered species protected under the

federal Endangered Species Act.

This issue has been scrutinized by the Executive Branch as far back as 2011. At that time, President Obama observed that the Interior Department is in charge of salmon while they’re in freshwater, but the Commerce Department handles them when they’re in saltwater. Those overlapping jurisdictions have only slowed efforts to help the fish.

A committee convened by the National Research Council also studied this matter a few years ago. The NRC found that the lack of a systematic, well-framed overall analysis between the two services is “a serious scientific deficiency, and it likely is related to the ESA’s practical limitations as to the scope of actions that can or must be considered in a single biological opinion.”

Improved coordination between federal agencies will promote more efficient, effective and coordinated management of all ESA responsibilities for anadromous and freshwater fish in Western watersheds, from the highest reaches of our headwaters to the Pacific Ocean.

“This action is an important and common-sense move that will benefit Western farmers and ranchers whose livelihoods depend on federal water projects,” said Dan Keppen, executive director of the Family Farm Alliance. “It’s a practical and assertive change to Western water management and species recovery that our membership strongly supports.”

California’s GOP congressional delegation from the Central Valley played an important role in identifying the problems in the state’s water system and worked closely with the Trump ad-

ministration to produce a solution that is consistent with federal law and will improve the water delivery system.

“There’s no question that the Central Valley has lagged behind the economic recovery experienced in other parts of the state. We’re optimistic that these changes will not only help improve water supplies for farms, farm-related businesses, and disadvantaged rural communities, they will provide the incentive to put science-based solutions to work to help recover iconic native fish species that have suffered under the existing regulatory approach,” said Mike Wade, executive director of the California Farm Water Coalition.

“This is a common-sense improvement to a process that has been abused in the past by regulatory agencies seeking to impose a scientifically-unsound regime on water users that ultimately, by design, de-irrigates some of the highest quality farmland in the world. This move by the Administration simply ensures that the process of revising the rules governing Delta water operations will be less vulnerable to regulatory abuse,” said Tom Nassif, president of the Western Growers Association.

“Implementation of the Endangered Species Act can be better for both species and people, and the president’s action moves us in that direction,” California Farm Bureau Federation President Jamie Johansson said. “It’s time to grow beyond the culture of conflict that has governed California water for too long. We need streamlined solutions that benefit species and that benefit both the farmers who provide California-grown food and farm products and everyone who depends on those products.”

We hope that you will understand that these steps were done for only one reason: to keep you and your family safe by helping to reduce the risk of wildfire.

HJTA Complaints Against Cities and Counties

While California law allows public funds to be spent providing voters impartial information regarding the pros and cons of a proposed ballot measure, it does not allow government to “take sides” in election contests or bestow an unfair advantage on one of several competing factions” (Stanson v. Mott (1976) 17 Cal.3d 206, 217). It is a free speech violation.

In August, HJTA filed suit in the San Francisco Superior Court challenging the city’s illegal special tax on commercial property owners. The tax is a punitive gross receipts tax which may reduce commercial property values in the city by 11-12%.

Proceeds from the tax, if implemented, will fund early childhood education programs. Since the tax was stated to be for a special purpose, it required a 2/3 vote of the city’s electorate according to both Propositions 13 and 218. But it did not pass by that margin. The proposal, designated as Measure C, received only a 50.87% vote but city leaders celebrated the victory anyway.

“The California Constitution could not be more clear,” said Jon Coupal, President of HJTA. For 40 years, special taxes at the local level have required a two-thirds vote of the electorate. “Moreover, the two-thirds vote threshold mandated by Propositions 13 and 218 remain very popular in California notwithstanding the fact that the state has drifted leftward in the last couple of decades,” Coupal said.

The City of Roseville lost a case to HJTA over similar violations. Yuba County is violating laws

concerning the use of public funds to promote Measure K, a 1% sales tax increase. The county has also promoted the measure as a public safety special tax needing to pass by a 2/3 majority but wrote the ballot measure declaring only a simple majority win is necessary. HJTA informed Yuba County that they are in violation.

Now, HJTA has received a response about its Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) complaint against L.A.’s Measure H. The FPPC found “probable cause” to charge L.A. County, as well as the individual members of the Board of Supervisors, with 15 counts of campaign finance violations. Not only is the “probable cause” finding by the FPPC welcomed by taxpayer advocates, it is timely.

California is a week away from the November 6 election and many local governments in California are illegally using taxpayer funds for political advocacy and failing to report the same as

political contributions according to Jon Coupal. The free speech clauses of the federal and state Constitutions prohibit the use of governmentally compelled monetary contributions (including taxes) to support or oppose political campaigns since “Such contributions are a form of speech, and compelled speech offends the First Amendment.” Smith v. U.C. Regents (1993) 4 Cal.4th 843, 852.

Moreover, “use of the public treasury to mount an election campaign which attempts to influence the resolution of issues which our Constitution leaves to the ‘free election’ of the people (see Const., art. II, § 2) ... presents a serious threat to the integrity of the electoral process.” Stanson v. Mott (1976) 17 Cal.3d 206, 218.

You shouldn’t need a law degree or to retain legal services to preserve your rights as a citizen but that is where we are as a country. That taxpayer’s are being defrauded by their elected officials.

Yuba County Walnut Buying Period

Starts November 5, 2018

Yuba County Agricultural Commissioner Stephen Scheer announced today the Walnut Buying Period will begin November 5, 2018 pursuant to the County's adopted nut crop theft ordinance. The Walnut Buying Period is the declared conclusion of harvest of the Chandler variety of walnuts by the Agricultural Commissioner, after consultation with a committee of walnut growers, during which non processing walnut buying operations within Yuba County may lawfully purchase and receive walnuts that have not been dried or processed.

Walnuts are the highest valued agricultural

commodity in Yuba County. According to the Yuba County 2017 Crop Report there were 18,096 harvested acres in Yuba County with a market value of approximately \$74,000,000. The walnut industry has been vulnerable to theft due to the manner in which the nuts are harvested. Typically the walnuts are shaken from the trees and left in windrows until they are collected by harvesting equipment. Unfortunately some people steal them from orchards and sell the walnuts illegally, the Walnut Theft Ordinance is intended to deter such activities.

On September 22, 2014, the Yuba County

Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted the ordinance pertaining to the purchase and sale of walnut crops. In addition to establishing the buying period, the ordinance also establishes requirements regarding the transportation and identification of walnuts as well as requiring "proof of ownership" documentation for possessors and buyers of walnuts.
