The Donnebrough Mine was developed in the mid 1850's after gold was discovered in Browns Valley. The mine is a hard-rock quartz mine and is one of seven that were located in Browns Valley. Multiple owners labored for one hundred years and removed around \$10 million of gold from the mine. It is 1800 feet deep and has been flooded since the mid 1950's when the mine was permanently closed.

Restoration is ongoing to ensure that the mine retains its historical relevance for the community.

Rice farmers expect good demand for new crop

Prospects for the new California rice crop look good, according to farmers as they see their harvests accelerate. Growers in the Sacramento Valley say they expect harvest to reach peak levels in the next two or three weeks. Rice marketers say they anticipate strong demand

for the crop, noting that carryover stocks of California rice have been mostly depleted. California farmers will harvest rice from about 500,000 acres of land this year.

Projects aim to benefit 'specialty' crops

Dozens of California-based projects to promote the production and marketing of "specialty crops" will benefit from

government grants announced Tuesday. The projects aim to benefit growers and consumers of specialty crops such as fruits, vegetables and nuts. The 83 new projects include programs to promote consumption and encourage access to specialty crops, to protect crops from pests and diseases, and to train new and current farmers.

Coalition seeks new federal urban-agriculture program

Pointing out the unique needs of farmers in urban and suburban regions, a coalition of agricultural and urban groups has urged Congress to include new urban-agriculture initiatives in the 2018 Farm Bill. A conference committee has been working to finalize the new farm-policy bill. Supporters of a proposed federal Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production say it could help foster food production in ways that would benefit cities and rural areas alike.

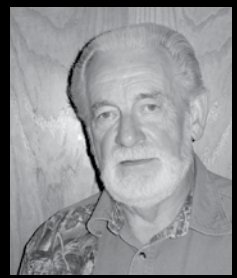
Central Valley farms provides fruit for Jewish holiday

Citrus fruit called the etrog citron fills an important part in commemorating the Jewish holiday of Sukkot--and a Central Valley farm has become the nation's only known commercial producer of the fruit. Lindcove Ranch in Tulare County produces etrogs from a grove certified by rabbis and carefully monitored to assure the fruit remains kosher. Etrogs used during Sukkot--which begins at sundown Sunday--must be free of blemishes and have their stems intact.

The name of the game is "SALMON" with fish swimming all over rivers at this time. Limits of salmon are common on the Feather River, with the Sacramento River right behind angler's success. The size of the fish is running from 10 to 30 pounds and is hitting spinners and plugs. We are told, and we can vouch for same, that limits are being caught within an hour after dropping your spinner or flatfish in the water. Most of the salmon are in excellent shape.

Lakes in the high country are starting to put on nice trout at this time. The cooler weather has been given the credit along with the time of year. Fall is officially here as of last weekend and as you all know, October brings the big trout to shore searching for the food they will need for the upcoming winter.

The kokanee salmon bite is on the verge of ending and the fish are turning color for the annual spawn and will begin to travel up streams in October which enter the lakes and reservoirs. Valerie and I will be in Lake Tahoe the middle of October and will be going to Taylor Creek to see the migration of the kokanee as they spawn. Another treat for this stream is the mallard ducks that are there for their share of eggs. In addition, if

you are there at the right time you will see a bear or two as they also come to the area to feast on the land locked salmon. If you want to go, Taylor Creek is located off State Route 89 about five miles from South Lake Tahoe. If you keep an eye out for signs you will not have any trouble seeing the entrance. Also, this is an area which has trails, observation areas, rest rooms and plenty of parking and there is no fee.

Those traveling to deer hunt in the X zones around or near Eagle Lake should plan on fishing there. Report tell us eagle lake trout are being taken in the 2 to 3 pound range trolling in 15 feet of water.

Fishing has picked up at Lake Almanor. Slow trolling with night crawlers at the east end of the lake is producing some

nice fish, including a mix of salmon, browns and rainbow trout.

From the Golden Gate to the Big Mac

A movie came out a few years ago about two old men who had a "Bucket List" of things they wanted to do before they were going to leave the good earth. The term has come into popular use. Before the movie, a similar effort might have been called a "Pilgrimage".

Some people are motivated by religious reasons, and others are inspired by a sense of adventure. Thousands come to our area for religious activities; however, there are happenings at big and small towns all over the world that generate a keen interest for others.

Such is an activity in which I had a special interest. I asked my good friend and Vintage Tractor Fan Jim Escherman to go with me. We were pleased to have our wives, Karen and Norma, join us.

This is the eleventh year of the internationally famous Vintage Tractor Drive over the Mackinac Bridge which joins the two peninsulas of Michigan. Lake Huron is on one side and Lake Michigan on the other.

The structure is a graceful architectural wonder that is five miles in length and the top of the towers rise 552 feet above the water. The cables total over 42,000 miles in length and tip the scales at about 11,940 tons. Construction began in 1954 and cost about \$99,800,000. The two inner lanes are steel grating to lessen the effects of the wind, but you can see the water below. Annual crossings average 5,000,000 vehicles. Because of the grating and the rather steep incline coming from the south, some rate it in the top ten of scary bridges in the



world.

The organizers closed openings at 1,500. Some tractors had poor tires, low to no oil pressure and other old tractor problems. 1,342 I am told was the actual number that made the crossing. If you were not there it is hard to imagine that many tractors parked in a field. Many different makes, modifications, colors, and yes rust! A sight to behold! The included picture is only one quadrant of the compass to give you a small glimpse of what it looked like. Having done a lot of horse shows, rodeos and tractor shows the problem of getting that many exhibitors out of a field, onto a four lane freeway, over the bridge into another town, and parked seemed like a Herculean task the show manager, Bob Baumgras, is the man who took charge, knew what he was doing and orchestrated the task with a high level of skill. He is to be commended and honored. He had great support from his family as we purchased our mementos. He was one of many who treated us like special guests. We were honored to be placed 5th and 6th in line! That support was enhanced by a cadre of helpful enthusiastic volunteers

Being neophytes to the area it took us a while to understand that Mackinac and Mackinaw names were influenced by the British and French possession in its past history of the area.

The idea of this adventure began in December of 2017. I called a friend from whom I had purchased tractor parts (Steiner Tractor) and asked who to contact to be involved. He gave me a lead and

that led me to the Heart of Michigan Tractor Club and Bob Baumgras. I joined the club to acquire insurance as did Jim. I placed an ad in their newsletter for someone to lend us, rent us, or trade for California time, a tractor. It wasn't long before I received a telephone call from Alan Awalt. He had a tractor that had done the drive four times but because of health he would not be able to participate this year and offered me his tractor. Shortly thereafter, I received a call from Jim Farley who offered one of his to Jim Eschelman. Wow we had tractors! We got some wonderful assistance from Jim Eschelman's daughter, Jamie, who arranged the flights, rental car and motels. Jamie did an excellent job as we had no problems. Having a GPS was also helpful.

We landed in Detroit, got our car and found the first motel. The following day we headed north stopping by to see Alan. We found his farm and met his fabulous wife Edna. When he opened the garage door to let me see the Allis, it took my breath away. A gorgeous 1952 Allis WD parked like a jewel in a treasure chest

The WD was built from 1948 to 1953. It followed the WC. They had a dry and wet clutch in the drive system. The Drawbar testing demonstrated 30.23 hp and the belt was rated at 34.63hp. Original cost was in the \$1,800 range. Present value for a nice restoration is in the \$4,000 to \$5,000 spectrum. Non-restored would be from \$1,500 to \$3,000. The driving and running of the WD was in harmony with its appearance as it ran like a Swiss Clock.

We traveled on north and in a few hours we reached the parking field near Mackinac City on the south side of the bridge. We soon found Jim Farley, or maybe he found us in the sea of old iron. He took us to his tractor, a very nice 1978 International 84 Hydro. These units were built in England from 1978 to 1983. The power was supplied by a four - cylin-

der diesel and boasted a Hydrostatic Drive system. Drawbar hp was rated at 42.90 and the PTO measured 58.73hp. 501 were built in 1978 and sold in the range of \$23,000. Present restored units with a cab and front loader are advertised for \$5,500 to \$9,000. Running but not restored can be purchased from \$3,900 to \$4,500. A very pleasant addition to the tractor was the sign on the back which read "From the Golden Gate to the Big Mac". His daughter, Maylynn Crowell, hand painted the sign and it was a hit with us and the large crowd.

We went through several downpours of rain on Wednesday, Thursday found us touring the famous Mackinac Island with the stately Grand Hotel by horse drawn wagons and the sky was a clear blue. We went to the island by jet ferry and our route took a circle under the bridge. Awesome!

Friday morning we departed the parking area and got on the route to and over the bridge. While Jim and I were at the crest of the bridge, a large ore ship passed under us. Our biased anticipation quickly vaporized as the experience was exhilarating. We pulled into St Ignace to our wives who were joined by several thousand smiling waving people. A several mile tour through the town soon found us at the local community center where we were marked

Saturday had a variety of events culminating with a double round tour on the main road of St Ignace

The police department of Mackinac City and St. Ignace as well as the two fire departments

along with the Michigan Highway Patrol were fabulous. Just imagine ,1342 Vintage Tractors being mixed with normal traffic on a four lane bridge and it flowed smoothly. Thanks guys and gals!

We continued our journey back to Dearborn and went through the Ford Museum. It can take a few hours or a few days depending on the decisions you make.

Alan had another jewel in his chest, his grandson Hunter. This delightful young man hauled his Grandpa's tractor and Jim Barley's several hundred miles, ate with elderly people he did not know nor may never see again, helped to load and unload, hauled our wives around and shuttled them for optimum viewing, and I never saw him once on his phone unless it was for useful communicating. The cell phone is an addiction defying common courtesy in today's world which is a pet peeve of mine.

I was asked near the end if it was what I expected and I replied no. She became quiet and had a somewhat quizzical look on her face. I continued on to explain. The food in that

tourist area was good and fairly priced, the weather was great. The townsfolk were welcoming, northern Michigan was beautiful. Forget the negative TV about Flint and Detroit. The motels were in excellent numbers. I can recommend Northern Michigan as a region you should put on your list to visit.

This recommendation is validated by the large number of visitors from states like Alaska, Arizona and even California.

While all of the above was wonderful it still is not the Crown Jewel, that is reserved for the new friends we made. We were treated like celebrities and life - long friends to become. Many knew we would be there and we were greeted with warm handshakes and smiles with invitations to return. Cordial anticipation of our convenience was met with joy. Sincere requests to return were plentiful. I am sure regular phone calls will follow.

We were blessed to have such an experience and be enriched with the knowledge of new friends.

Exploratory Drilling at New Bullards Bar Dam

Marysville, Ca. – Exploratory drilling began Monday, Sept. 24, people traveling across New Bullards Bar Dam and recreating on the reservoir will see heavy machinery mobilizing in the parking lot on the east side of the dam, in preparation for exploratory work related to Yuba Water Agency’s plans to design and build a \$160 million secondary spillway at the dam.

Large drills will be positioned on both the water and downstream sides of the reservoir to obtain samples to determine the strength of the underlying rock, ultimately influencing how the planned spillway tunnel and foundation will be designed.

Traffic is not expected to be impacted, but caution is advised when traveling across the dam as large trucks and machinery may occasionally be entering the roadway. No major impacts are expected for those recreating on the reservoir.

“New Bullards Bar Dam is in great shape and this exploratory drilling is not to address any safety concerns,” said Yuba Water Agency General Manager Curt Aikens. “Obtaining core rock samples is one of the first steps in designing the secondary spillway, a project that will significantly reduce flood risk in the region and enhance the dam’s safety, as well.”


This phase of the project is estimated to take up to a few months.

The planned secondary spillway will reduce flood risk by having gates lower on the dam, making it possible for Yuba Water Agency to release more water from the reservoir before large, threatening storms, when there is enough downstream channel capacity to handle the flows. That will free up space in the reservoir to hold back the peak of the flows when the storm arrives. Additionally, having an alternative spillway enhances dam safety by ensuring the ability to release water in case of a problem with the primary spillway.

The permitting and design phase is estimated to wrap up in 2021, with construction beginning in 2022.

Exploratory Drilling at New Bullards Bar Dam

Picking Winners

The general direction of the market has been fairly flat of late, with the most watched index, the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) being stuck in a trading range in the mid 20,000's.

With some stocks going up one day and others going down the next, its likely investors have seen fairly uninspiring portfolio movement. In a diversified mix of stocks and fixed income, it's to be expected sometimes portfolios just go nowhere fast.

Unless the stock picker advisor picks some individual winners, which is his hope and yours, with mixed markets come stagnant balances. Investor and advisors alike strive and desire for upward movement but that can be a difficult task to accomplish but it's not impossible.

Money is always flowing out of one sector and into another, even in times of market upsets. Picking winning stocks in flat markets is possible, it just takes careful observation and an astute analysis. A little bit of luck also always helps. Keep in mind the market is not actually a science but a sociological event. Its movement is wholly dependent on the daily decisions of millions of investors, all acting on

their belief of what will happen next.

Picking stock winners yields many methodologies, none of them fool proof. Some advisors buy value, picking up beaten down securities, specific areas or industries. The problem here is who is to say that beaten up can't get more beaten up.

Many mom and pop investors buy the "story" such as a great company making great products, or maybe they heard something new is going to hit the pipeline. Usually these types of buys don't end well. What people don't realize is the "story" is already priced into the stock.

There are a variety of other methods to picking winners, or at least in the hope to, and none are fool proof. I've seen seasoned professionals get creamed and novices make lots of money. Those kind of examples leads one to think picking winners has more to do with luck then skill. In actuality however, in my opinion, the more in tune with what is happening in the financial world around us, the better your results may be.

World events can influence markets as a whole, and an earth shaking global event which can be caused by a variety of reasons, if bad enough, can also shake the worlds markets in masse. This is why it is very important to establish portfolio protection strategies.

The reason being although company fundamentals or news can rise or rock individual stock prices, bad things happening on the global stage can rock every-

thing, regardless of what a company is doing.

Picking winners is no doubt difficult, but a winning strategy may also include protecting your money against horrific losses when world markets implode.

Rather than concentrate on picking winners although a noble quest, a true winner in the investing world also pays equal amount of attention to the damage the downside can do to a portfolio. You can pick all the winners you want and even make a ton of money doing so. But it won't amount to a hill of beans (or a hill of money) if you get wiped out in the firestorm of a down drafting market.

Whatever method you use, or person you select to manage your funds, make sure some time is spent on a strategy of protecting what you have and that means a variety of hedges and exit plans should be considered as well as looking for winning stocks.

Expect Delays on Highway 20 Near Smartsville

Yuba County, Ca. Motorists should allow extra travel time over the next weeks when driving on State Highway 20 through the Smartsville area due to construction of a Caltrans safety project.

Construction crews will be doing drainage work along the highway and intermittent minor rock blasting off the roadway from 6:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays through the end of next week. Motorists can expect up to 15-minute delays.

Later this fall, motorists and local residents

can expect major rock blasting operations to take place intermittently and cause traffic delays of up to one hour.

Major blasting activities will take place between 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The schedule will vary from week to week. Portable roadside message boards will alert motorists and residents in advance of specific blasting dates. Weather or unexpected events can postpone or prolong construction activity.

Motorists are advised to allow additional travel

time or take alternate routes. Residents living several miles away from the construction area can expect to hear loud explosions.

The \$28.5 million safety project calls for realigning a segment of highway to straighten and flatten roadway curves, widening shoulders, constructing a new bridge, improving drainage and adding turn pockets between McGanney Lane in Yuba County and Mooney Flat Road in Nevada County. The project is expected to be completed in 2020.

If they answer yes to those questions, and you truly support them, I would expect you to at least consider doing what THEY say will benefit them.

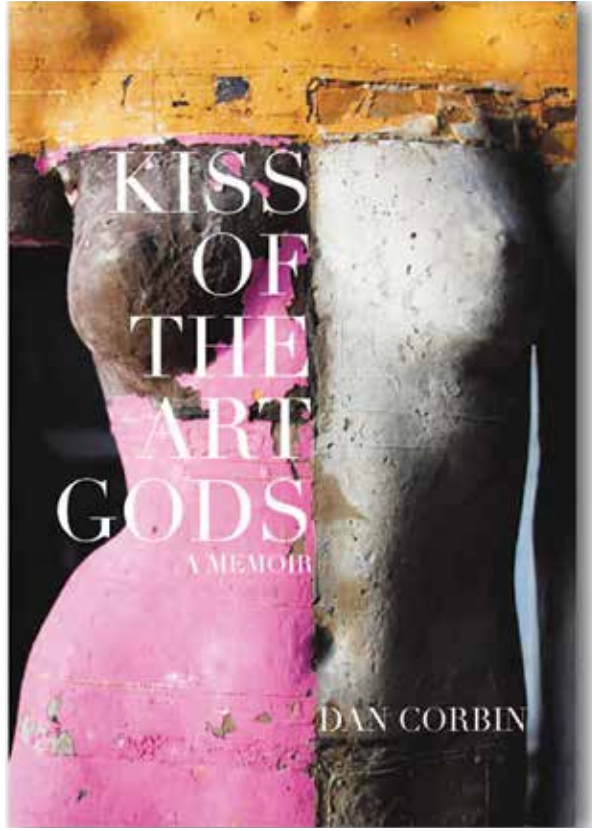

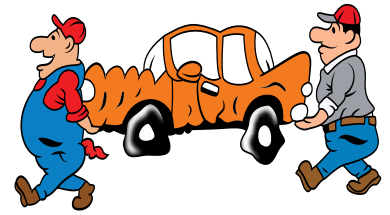

intoxicating.

New law says participants must have food handler training, be open for inspections and cannot sell over \$50,000 annually. If you are too successful, politicians want more of your flesh.

For those who have traveled to foreign countries and appreciate people selling their specialty dishes and drinks from food carts Governor Brown did California street vendors a solid. He signed Senate Bill 946, legislation that allows and regulates street vending practices statewide. Also known as the Safe Sidewalk Vending Act, the law requires cities and counties to maintain rules when interacting with street vendors. In other words they cannot forbid them.

Violent felons are being pardoned, cash bail has ended, felons in jail can vote and selling tamales on the street may no longer be a crime. Thank you Jesus!

The law says that California cities cannot ban vending in parks. Cities cannot specify

where vendors locate unless there is a health, safety, or welfare concern. Street vendors don’t need to ask permission from adjacent businesses to operate.

There has been a war on street or sidewalk vendors in many jurisdictions. This new law does not eliminate the ability of cities and counties to make it difficult on vendors. Politicians could treat them like strip clubs and force

them into undesirable locations. That would be shameful and a violation of the spirit of the new law. But, politicians routinely violate ordinances they don’t like.

Many wildly successful businesses started from a cart or out of a garage. Given maximum freedom by cities and counties this new perspective on street vendors and cooks could give entrepreneurs and start-ups an opportunity for success.

Carts provide customers a quick fix for their hunger or thirst when they don’t have time to sit down at a restaurant and aren’t near a drive through. In cities, people can just walk outside their office for service.

Whether plastic straws, home cooking for cash or running a food cart, the government has its nose in every single aspect of your life. Let’s see how these laws work out.

Annual Yuba River Cleanup

Marysville, Ca.

Yuba County Community Development and Services Agency and the South Yuba River Citizens League (SYRCL) joined forces to bring dozens of volunteers to participate in the annual Yuba River Cleanup in Marysville, on Saturday, September 15.

Near the E Street Bridge, this high-priority site was one of 32 locations across the Yuba Watershed. Yuba County has been organizing the cleanup at this site for more than 18 years. They coordinated with SYRCL so more volunteers across the watershed could be recruited to help at the confluence of the Yuba and Feather rivers. Melinda Booth, SYRCL's Executive Director was one of them, as well as Yuba County supervisors

and Yuba Water Agency directors Randy Fletcher, Gary Bradford and Mike Leahy, and approximately 30 employees and family members from the Yuba Water Agency, including Chairman Brent Hastey and General Manager Curt Aikens.

"I met dozens of committed volunteers at the Marysville Cleanup site, where we partnered with Yuba County and Yuba Water Agency," said Melinda Booth, SYRCL's Executive Director. "Seeing local communities caring for their stretch of the watershed is the best part of the Yuba River Cleanup. From the Yuba's headwaters down to the confluence with the Feather River, the outpouring of labor and love reminded me how vital our waterways are to our

quality of life and sense of place."

"It was such an inspiration to see so many people working together to take care of Yuba County's greatest asset," said Brent Hastey, chairman of the Yuba Water Agency Board of Directors. "I saw people ranging from 6 to 70 years of age, of all different backgrounds, all with one focus – protecting and preserving the Yuba River."

One of the largest Cleanups in the Sierra, the Yuba River Cleanup encompasses more than 85 miles of rivers and creeks within Nevada, Placer, Sierra and Yuba counties. Volunteers hauled out 15,000 pounds of garbage and recycling on September 15.

REALTOR® Support Flood Insurance Reform

Program (NFIP) has been renewed 41 times since 1998, with six short-term extensions coming in the past year. You overlook that the National Association of REALTORS® has been a vocal supporter of comprehensive reforms to the NFIP, both during this and previous extension bills.

REALTORS® publicly spoke out last fall in support of the 21st Century Flood Reform Act, specifically advocating for reforms to gradually phase out NFIP subsidies; better align rates to risk, particularly for inland and lower-value properties and address repeatedly

flooding properties, which account for 2% of NFIP policies but 25% of claim payments.

Current law calls for subsidies for high-risk properties to be phased out entirely, a policy which has been publicly supported by the NAR and would be accelerated under the 21st Century Flood Reform Act. The bill passed the House but is stalled in the Senate.

We have never used the words "inalienable human right" to characterize flood-insurance subsidies. On the contrary, one of our reform principles states, "Premiums should be more

accurately priced to the property specific risk, but any rate increases should be gradual and phased in over many years." We have and will continue to stand firm in our support of the NFIP's ability to protect current and future generations of U.S. property owners.

We recognize those protections will vanish if the program remains on its current path. That's why Realtors® at the Yuba-Sutter Association of Realtors® will continue fighting for sustainable reforms as the next NFIP reauthorization discussions continue.

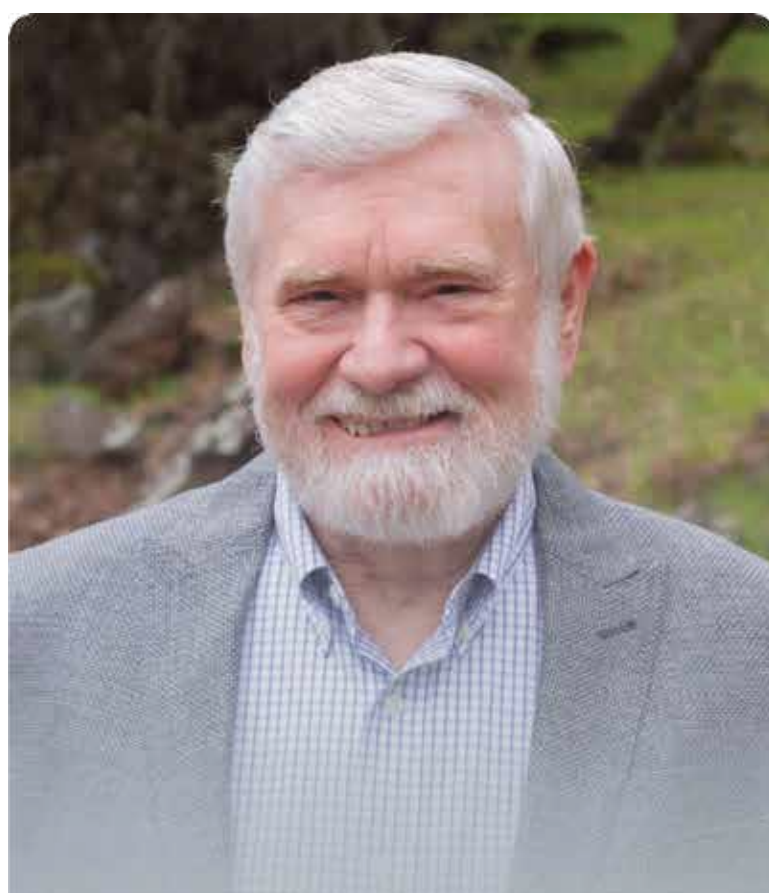
