Welcome to Brown Town

California Water Service (CWS) says it has served Marysville since 1930. However, no one at city hall could confirm that or find any official agreement with CWS.

CWS is a private corporation versus a municipal utility like Yuba City, Linda and Olivehurst. In recent years CWS has routinely raised rates to the place where most all of their residential accounts (3,800 total Marysville customers) have discontinued any outdoor watering. It's just too expensive. As a result Marysville has become Brown Town.

The CWS bill is usually the biggest utility payment for those daring to irrigate outdoors. That's something when PG&E rates are 60% higher than average power and gas costs in the nation.

Marysville's water rates have been up to 200% higher than adjacent communities. Even the City of Marysville cannot afford to water the parks. It's not due to a lack of water. During the statewide drought the water table in Marysville remained robust and steady. CWS pays nothing for the water it extracts via Marysville wells to deliver to patrons.

Baby boomers from Marysville can remember the time when

Liberal Policy Devastation

Everyone is talking about wild fires in the West and debating the cause, Global Warming, the End Times, a weather outlier or mismanagement of our forests. Genesis 2:15 says, "The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." Everything for survival was in the garden but it was incumbent on the residents to be good stewards.

An observant person can note well-cared-for businesses, children, farms and schools and of course for many generations our forests and range lands. Farmers, foresters and ranchers believed they had a duty to care for and nurture the land and took pride in that trust.

Over the course of a century, through a series of homesteading acts – beginning with the Homestead Act of 1862, and up to and including the Stock-Raising Homestead Act of 1916 – the federal government solicited and encouraged the settlement and use of the resources out West. Rugged Americans established successful ranching and other enterprises out of the wilderness and lawless lands of earlier times. They should be revered for their bravery, resilience and hard work.

The 1916 act increased plots up to 640 acres except in lands that could be irrigated. However, in the arid West, even with available water, 640 acres lacked the capacity for raising enough stock to support a family. Ranchers needed to use forage on adjacent "unsettled" federal lands to graze livestock.

The Taylor Grazing Act of 1934 created grazing allotments on such lands so ranchers could legally acquire property rights and interests in the forage and water and use the timber for improvements on the allotment.

However, after the turbulent sixties, Vietnam and Watergate, a surge of environmentalism evolved and in its extreme form considered mankind's enterprises a violation and blight on nature. Extremists wanted the West to be literally "rewilded," no people allowed.

In 1976, the Federal Lands Policy Management Act (FLPMA) was a declaration of war on ranchers, miners, loggers and settlers that were in generations past recruited by the same government to tame the West to utilize and manage its resources.

Unelected federal bureaucrats waged legal and regulatory war on honest Americans who in many cases had been living on, using and caring for the land for generations. With the deep pockets of the feds, government attorneys began suing, nullifying agreements and creating egregious rules to bankrupt or break the spirit of these salt-of-the-earth type people.

Many families after fighting for decades in court went broke, sold-out, or were evicted leaving the lands some had been on for over 100 years. Others ended their lives. For bureaucrats these victories were celebrated as notches on their "save-the-earth" belts.

Although thousands of families have been devastated most people are now familiar with the Dwight and Steven Hammond families in Oregon, the Bundy and Hage families of Nevada and the politi-

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Final Update of Operation "Green Wave"

During the weeks of July 8th- July 21st, The Yuba County Sheriff's Office along with the

California National Guard Counter Drug Task Force, Siskiyou County, Calaveras County, Trinity County, Department of Fish and Wildlife Biologists and Law enforcement, California State Water Board and Water Rights Division, Yuba Sutter Net-5, Yuba County Code Enforcement, and several other co-operating agencies began serving a series of criminal search warrants throughout the State in the above mentioned counties. The search warrants were part of a month's long operation into the illegal cultivation of marijuana/cannabis and directly associated environmental crimes and water violations.

This operation demonstrates the cooperation between allied agencies working together in a concerted effort along with the

California National Guard Counter Drug Task Force to investigate for prosecution those persons or organizations responsible for committing criminal acts and environmental damage in Yuba County with far reaching effects to the state's most valuable resources such as land and water. As previously noted in other similar investigations, due to the nature of our watershed systems in Yuba County, the environmental damage that begins in the mountains and foothills of Yuba County has significant impacts into other portions of California. During this operation, a significant number of environmental crimes were discovered. Those environmental crimes

included damage to the watersheds and waterways, and use of banned and illegal chemical pesticides and rodenticides, among other violations.

The Yuba County portion of

the Green Wave Operation resulted in 16 search warrants with 6,534 marijuana plants eradicated, nine arrests and one citation, 1,000 lbs. of processed marijuana, 40 lbs. of finished "BHO" Butane Honey Oil, 1 "BHO" Lab, and 2 grams of Heroin. There were 14 water quality violations, 88 Department of Fish and Wildlife violations, and 14 water rights violations. Asset seizures included \$1,000.00, two vehicles, and one firearm. YCSO receives annual grant money from the DEA through DCESP (Domestic Cannabis Eradication / Suppression Program) which funds the majority of marijuana investigative efforts by the Sheriff's Office. This money is utilized exclusively for METYU (Marijuana Eradication Team Yuba) and was the source of funding for the Yuba County Sheriff Department's involvement in this multi-agency operation. The money from this grant funds overtime, equipment, aerial reconnaissance, and ancillary costs associated with the marijuana operations. The DEA has strict guidelines on how the money can be spent and YCSO works within those guidelines to maximize the benefits. YCSO also receives additional funding from the USFS for marijuana eradication in the National Forests located within Yuba County

Vance will provide breakfast meeting attendees with an insight of what to expect for the 2018 salmon season. He is well known by the rec-

reational as well as by commercial fishermen as an expert on salmon. As a native northern Californian born to outdoor enthusiast parents, he spent his early years sharing in fishing and hunting. Vance was recruited by John McManus, President of the GGSA, to contribute his expertise as a member of the Board of Directors. Although Vance no longer is a fishing guide, he regularly fishes for salmon and is in regular contact with the salmon fishing community via the many resources of the GGSA. For those unfamiliar with the GGSA, their mission is to protect and restore California's largest salmon producing habitat comprised of the Central Val-

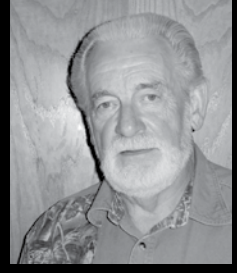
ley rivers that feed both the Bay-Delta ecosystem and the communities that rely on salmon as a long-term, sustainable commercial, recreational and cultural resource.

We have reports of salmon being caught in the Feather River above Boyd's Pump boat ramp after the release of water at Oroville raised the river around four feet. Fish being caught are clean and silver beautiful fish. Congratulations go out to **Annika Johnson**, who caught a beautiful 20 pound salmon while fishing on the Feather River. She was here visiting family with her husband TJ and son. They came all the way from Nashville Tennessee to fish for salmon and show off their new baby son Haagen, who by the way is my Great Grandson.

The small mouth black bass are reported to be on the bite at Lake Almanor. Fish are ranging up to 4 pounds. Finding the fish will result in limits.

The landlocked king salmon are still on the bite at Lake Oroville. The fish are holding at 60 feet and are hitting plugs, spoons and spinners.

Reports from Lake Tahoe tell us the kokanee are being taken all over the lake. Mackinaw lake trout are also being caught early in the morning at around 120 feet

with the fish moving into deeper water as the sun hits the surface. By mid-morning the big fish are down to 300 feet.

Surface water temperatures have slowed down the trout bite on all reservoirs. Best bet, if you go fishing is to fish for catfish or bass using night crawlers for bait.

Best time to fish is at night.

If you go to Folsom Lake be aware that the reservoir is dropping a half a foot each day with fishing being slow at this time.

ily of the Year by the Nevada County Fair's Board of Directors. The Board chose the Prechter Family for their ongoing commitment to and participation in the livestock program at the Nevada County Fair.

Mark and Michelle, who met and married in Montana, moved to Nevada County in 2000. Mark, who had grown up showing in 4-H, took Michelle to the Nevada County Fair and they immediately fell in love with the tree covered grounds, the friendly atmosphere and Treat Street. Michelle remembers that first Fair, where she was pregnant with their first child, and “eating her way through Treat Street.” After buying some property and a small herd of cattle, they quickly became involved in agriculture and soon the Nevada County Fair.

That involvement increased as they had children. Today, they have helped at the Fair in the show arenas, volunteered at the Foundation Station, served as leaders in the barns, and are strong advocates for youth in agriculture. They also spend countless hours in the livestock barns helping their two girls prepare their animals for the Fair.

The Prechters, who will celebrate their 18th wedding anniversary this year, have two daughters – Maddie and Rylee – who are also active in the Fair. Both girls have been competing at

the Fair since they were five years old showing everything from pygmy goats to market eggs to entering the ugliest cake contest. The last several years the girls have shown market steer, and this year Rylee will show a market lamb and Maddie will show a market steer and Angus Heifers. Both girls have their own breeding stock and have placed in the top 10 with the California Junior Livestock Association. Maddie graduated this year and will attend Butte College to study Animal Science and Ag Business, and Rylee is a Sophomore at Bear River who also loves volleyball.

“The Fair is important to us because it has taught our girls to stay humble when they win and to be gracious when they lose,” says Michelle. “Raising livestock and having the opportunity to show animals at the Nevada County Fair has taught them responsibility, given them confidence, and, most importantly, how to work together as a team.”

When asked about their favorite memory at the Fair, Michelle says there are several. “Being at the Fair is a vacation in a crazy kind of way. It’s our time together and it’s us working alongside our friends and community. We look back on all the years we’ve been at the Fair and we realize what a significant impact it’s had on our lives

Additionally, both have served as 4-H Leaders and as Nevada County Beef Advisors.

Welcome to Brown Town

It was shocking to see a brown lawn anywhere in the city. It was a sign of abandonment or neglect. Parks were pristine with healthy trees lining the streets. Today, hundreds of dead or sickly trees blight city thoroughfares.

A June 2013 Territorial Dispatch article stated, "Since 2003, Californian Water Service (CWS) has bumped rates nearly every year for a net cumulative 121.80% over ten years -- an average 12% annually. Additional increases are proposed -- 18.4% in 2014, 20.1% in 2015 and 9.4% in 2016 or another 47.9 % over 36 months."

Although the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) did not grant the total increases requested above the CPUC routinely awards higher rates to assure the company a guaranteed return on investment. Dividends have been paid to stockholders for the last 73 years. CWS is great to invest in but horrible to

buy water from if you are concerned about money.

Now, CWS is applying for a 16.9% increase over three years (2020, 2021, and 2022). They claim the "typical bill in Marysville of \$50.84" will see \$3.53, \$1.41 and \$1.61 monthly increases. Not knowing whether \$50.84 is an average or a mean figure, if accurate what is known is the bill reflects people using little water and not irrigating outdoors, just drive around town for a look. People cannot afford the water. New residents are shocked after they move in and receive their water bill.

Many residents could save enough money in a year of lower water bills by relocating across the river to cover a month's rent payment.

CWS is currently asking CPUC to continue their Water Rate Adjustment Mechanism (WRAM) which charges the customer an amount above the basic service fee and usage to cover CWS costs if the customer does not

use enough water. CWS knows Marysville residents cannot afford the water and will be using less, not due to drought or meager supply but due solely to unaffordable usage rates.

CWS is fond of saying the CPUC governs its rates and is a real taskmaster in its role to protect the ratepayer. The problem is that the commission protects utilities and not the people.

Columnist Thomas Elias writes extensively on California utilities and the corrupt nature of the relationship between the commission and utilities. Consumer-advocate attorney and former city attorney for San Diego Michael Aguirre has acquired via court order previously withheld CPUC emails.

These emails from several months in 2014 describe meetings routinely occurring among the top four big energy and water agencies called the Energy Principals and included members of the PUC,

Energy Commission, Air Resources Board, Water Resources Control Board, operators of the electric grid and coordinated out of the governor's office. No Brown Act public notices were ever filed.

Emails revealed that meetings were conducted in Warsaw, Poland, at former CPUC president Michael Peevey's house in LA and in the home of air board chair Mary Nichols in LA. The CPUC has been caught cutting deals with PG and E regarding their gas explosion costs in the San Bruno disaster and with Southern California Edison Co. for their mismanagement of and costs to close San Onofre nuclear power plant. In short, consumers were stuck with billions of expenses for utility company malfeasance.

Governor Brown's office says no public notice was required for these meetings, nothing to see here. Bottom line -- expect higher water rates in Marysville.

Food and Farm News

Wildfires cause agricultural losses

As firefighters work to control massive Northern California wildfires, farmers and ranchers assess the agricultural impact. In Shasta County, the Carr Fire has burned rangeland, and local officials say it's too early to know the full extent of losses. Evacuations due to the Mendocino Complex fires closed a pear packinghouse in Lake County, delaying harvest. The University of California says rangeland at its Hopland research center was "hit hard" by fire.

Plum growers reach height of season

It's the peak of plum season in the San Joaquin Valley. Farmers report a normal-sized crop, despite some weather concerns earlier in the season. But the ongoing trade dispute between the U.S. and China could affect markets. China has been the top export market for California plums, but the nation placed retaliatory tariffs on the fruit and a number of other U.S. farm products. California produces 100 percent of U.S.-grown plums.

Solar heat protects crops from pests

Hot weather in California's desert farming regions gives farmers a good opportunity to kill pests and weeds, by heating the soil. Farmers use soil solarization: spreading clear plastic tarps over fields that will be planted with crops later in the year. The tarps heat the ground and kill soil-borne pathogens, insects and many weed seeds. Farm advisors say placing the plastic sheets on the soil for four to six weeks appears effective.

Research looks at natural habitat near farms

Having natural habitat near farms can benefit growers by attracting natural enemies of crop pests. But a new study indicates there can be negative effects on crop yields, as well. The study, headed by California researchers, looked at evidence from 31 countries, and found highly variable results. The lead researcher says natural habitat may not always help with pest control, but can help farmers with pollination and other benefits.

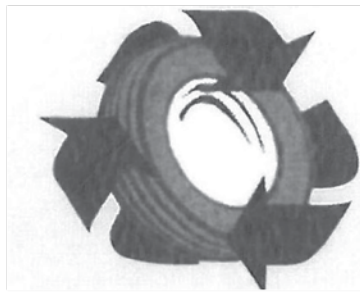

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A Look at Annuities

I wasn't a big fan of annuities for the longest time. I saw too many of them with high fees, complicated terms and so many hooks I had to get out my tackle box to house them all. That said, when I started offering annuities to clients with specific needs and desires not too long ago, I reviewed literally hundreds of them and in the pile I have found a few I thought advantageous.

First off, the description of annuity I like to use is a contract between an insurance company and a person that stipulates in return for a sum of money paid by the client, the company will promise payments over a period of time or even a lump sum at the conclusion of the contract. Annuities have all sorts of versions and terms but just know the contract is a promise to pay. How, when and how much depends on the contract.

The promise is as good as the company making it so realize they are not guaranteed by the U.S. government in any way, shape or form. You can pay the company a sum of money in a lump or over time. The annuity can be tied to a moving target such as a stock index or be just a fixed rate of return. There are other variations and they literally come in all shapes and sizes.

Without getting too technical, annuities can have a tie up period where the client has to commit to leaving at least some of the money with the company for a specified length of time. Some allow a portion of money to be taken out at certain times at the clients option and most have a hardship clause that allow for special

circumstances such as a death of the primary person(s) specified in the contract.

I find that investors who want a stream of income later in life that won't go away or cannot stomach the ups and downs of markets are primary candidates for annuities but know that annuities are not for everyone nor should they be offered up carte blanche to all investors.

Certain investors will ask me for an annuity and others have to be explained as to how they work. As an advisory, I am approached by annuity companies trying to get me to offer their particular version but honestly, I find all but a handful of annuities way too complicated for most investors. Sure I could place a complicated annuity with a client but I wouldn't do that knowing the client doesn't fully understand how they operate. Truthfully some are so complicated I have to study them for an hour or two in order to fully understand them myself and I'm in the business!

The annuities I lean towards are the ones that are straight forward and simple. The terms are clear and usually there are not a whole lot of them compared to others. My thinking is if I can explain it to a client and they understand how it works, it will be better for all concerned, which is the investor, the advisor and the insurance company writing the contract.

The regulations and oversight on annuities is severe and very strict and protection to the consumer is a lot better than it was decades ago where annuities were sometimes regarded one of the black boxes of fi-

nancial products.

Not so today. Many are simple, easy to understand and perform as promised. The importance of understanding them by both the client and advisor is tantamount to a successful placement and an honest and straight forward conversation by both parties is the cornerstone of that success.

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Better Deal?

As many of you have already figured out, I'm not a big proponent of the Safety Tax. I haven't said "no" yet, but I lean that way.

This said, and since the ordinance will be on the November ballot, I think it's critically important that it be the best possible deal for the taxpayers, especially if it passes.

An interesting term was used to describe the Safety Tax to me - It's a "bridge." This metaphor resonates with me because it better positions some of the ideas (i.e., changes, additions) that I believe the voters would want to see in the ordinance as it's currently proposed. Some of these have actually been suggested by you, the voters.

I sent these ideas to Robert Bendorf, the County Administrator. While

I would prefer to be far more conservative with the suggested changes, I'm being realistic in hopes the County may adopt them into the ordinance language. Here's what I proposed based on what I heard from some of you:

- A 25% allotment for Fire Safety (an increase of 5% from current allotment);
- A Five-Year Sunset Clause (forces the County to come up with a long-term solution quicker; It's currently set at ten years);
- A financial oversight rule that would reduce the tax by .25% should a majority of the Citizen's Oversight Committee find abuse or misuse (gives the Oversight Committee more teeth)
- A separate, publicly-available, easy-to-understand, annual accounting detailing what the tax pro-

vided/accomplished (i.e., # of deputies hired/trained, # of fire volunteers trained, equipment purchased, etc.);

• A serious commitment to finding other revenue opportunities (i.e., commercial Cannabis revenue or casino revenue) and when identified and phased in, the Safety Tax is phased out equivalently;

While not ordinance-specific, I also suggested spending cuts, like senior-level pay adjustments and BoS pay reduction.

So, again, while I'm not yet a supporter of the Safety Tax, I believe it's important to make what we will vote on better.

Fire Protection? "Not Our Problem!" says NYWD

It is the end of July 2018 and Oregon House and Dobbins still have no water. All other districts have received and continue to receive their full allotments and they all use the same watershed that we do. No repairs have been made to our ditch. All the water that was pouring over the Taco Bell bridge (approximately 80 cfs) has long since flowed downstream and is gone (<https://oregonhousedobbins.wixsite.com/water/about>). Our ditches and ponds are dry, even as we watch in silent horror as Redding and Carre burn. The horror was ours last year as the Cascades fire roared through our community and we witnessed our neighbors and friends losing their lives and their homes. We are praying very hard, that a terrifying event such as that, does not happen this year.

NYWD board and General Manager maintain that they are not obligated to

provide any water for fire protection; however, a review of the 1270 Permit for Dry Creek states that we have a: "...right to the use of the water of Dry Creek in Yuba County tributary to Yuba River thence Feather River thence Sacramento River for the purpose of Irrigation and Fire Protection". At the May 2018 Board meeting, President Don Ferguson, stated that NYWD was NOT obligated to provide water for fire protection. He stated that - as a firefighter himself - water in Oregon House and Dobbins ponds and ditches was NOT needed. Was he speaking on behalf of Calfire and out local fire departments? This is in direct opposition to what Calfire firefighters said when visiting one of our residents this year. The firefighters were extremely concerned to find out that the ponds they had relied on during the Cascades fire last year-were empty and

would remain empty.

What is NYWD's end goal? To kill our communities, so they can keep all of our water and sell it for power generation? After all- NYWD has been paid over \$33 MILLION in the last few years thanks to the 2005 agreement with South Feather Water and Power. You read that right- thirty-three million dollars- where has that money gone? It sure isn't going into taking care of its customers.

What is NYWD's real reason for denying us water? We know it isn't any of the five reasons they publicly gave as those have been disproven. Why have they gradually eroded away all transparency and accountability to the public? Why have all decision-making powers been essentially transferred to the General Manager? Why does the General Manager appear to be in charge of the Board, rather than the other way

California's Transportation Future

California has the highest gas tax in the nation—and it is going to go up another 72 cents on January 1, 2020, thanks to cap and trade. We might get a small benefit on November 6, if we repeal the 12 cent gas tax increase. Yet, look at the way we spend the gas tax money.

"An excellent analysis of FHWA data is produced every year by the Reason Foundation. Earlier this year they released "23rd Annual Highway Report," ranking each state's highway system in 11 categories, including highway spending, pavement and bridge conditions, traffic congestion, and fatality rates." Highlights from this study can offer in-

sights into how efficiently California is spending its highway dollars compared to other states through using the following logic: How does California rank in terms of how much it spends per mile, compared to how California ranks in terms of the condition of its roads.

Overall California is ranked 43 among the 50 states "Total Disbursements per mile." California is ranked 41 in "Capital & Bridge Disbursements per mile," 47 in "Maintenance Disbursements per mile," and 46 in "Administrative Disbursements per mile." In terms of road condition, California is ranked 33 in "Rural Interstate Pavement Condition," 45

Levee Districts, SBFCA Consider Funding Options for Levee Operations & Maintenance

The Sutter Butte Flood Control Agency (SBFCA) recently repaired approximately 37 miles of levee along the west Feather River. To date, the state has committed \$262 million toward the repairs on the condition that local agencies maintain the improved levees in compliance with state and federal guidelines. The state can withhold up to 10 percent of project funding, or almost \$19 million, until this condition is met.

Locally, operations and maintenance (O&M) is conducted by levee districts 1 and 9. While SBFCFA has legal and financial reasons to assist the districts in adequately funding long-term levee O&M, public safety is the primary motivation. The benefits of repairs could easily be lost over time, or during the next flood event, if the districts fall short of needed funding. Assistance to the districts is well within the scope of SBFCFA's mission.

The districts will meet August 6 to consider forming a joint powers authority to study funding options. In California, property assessments are the most common form of funding levee O&M. Assessments are

subject to Proposition 218, which protects taxpayers by providing opportunities for input including public meetings, a public hearing and a vote. It requires agencies to disclose long-term budgets and limits annual collections. Proposition 218 is sponsored by the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association.

Turning over O&M to the state is unlikely. Recognizing local efficiencies, the state has a longstanding policy of turning over O&M to locals. In fact, the state recently requested that Levee District 1 assume O&M of the State maintenance area located south of the district. Further, it is not clear that the state's maintenance programs are less costly or more effective than local options. In fact, during times of high water, the State relies on local agencies to help floodfight state-maintained levees. Another consideration is that Proposition 218 does not apply to the state. The state sets assessments without any vote of property owners, is not required to budget for future years, and is not limited on how much it can charge year-to-year.

The state cannot avoid

liability for levee protected areas simply by turning over O&M to a levee district. In the landmark Paterno court decision following the 1986 Linda levee break, the state was found to have total liability. This follows from the fact that the state provides assurances to the federal government that levees are adequately operated and maintained.

The underlying goal is to ensure the levees provide protection from flooding, now and into the future. Moving forward, the levee districts – with the proposed support from SBFCFA – will continue to evaluate funding options for operations and maintenance, including a cost comparison between state and local services. This process will begin if and when LD1 and LD9 agree to form a joint powers authority. Property owners and the public will have ample opportunity to review and comment on the process and as always, we will share information as it is developed.

Misleading

The August 1 letter to the editor signed by the chairs of the Sutter Butte Flood Control Agency and Levee Districts 1 and 9 contains many misleading and/or unclear statements.

In the first paragraph is stated they have repaired 37 miles of levee along the West Feather River Levee. They failed to mention they have not repaired miles of levee in the lower section that will not get 100 year flood protection as was promised to the voters.

In the second paragraph they stated that locally operations and maintenance is conducted by levee districts. They did not state that all of the operations and maintenance of the West Feather River Levee in Butte County, the Sutter County levee down to Paseo Road and the lower section of the levee below Starr Bend is conducted by the State Department of Water Resources Sutter Maintenance Yard.

In the third paragraph is stated there will be a meeting on August 6. The place and time were not included.

In addition, it is stated that SBFCFA has legal and financial reasons to assist Levee Districts 1 and 9 and it is well within the scope of SBFCFA's mission. The existing levee benefit assessment is to be used to repair the levees. Nothing is mentioned about giving the levee districts a quarter of a million dollars for a Proposition 218 election to increase assessment fees.

In the fourth paragraph there are many unclear statements. It is stated that turning over operation and maintenance to the state is unlikely. However, the reclamation district for the Live Oak area turned over operation and maintenance of that levee to the state. The lowest section of the West Feather River levee was taken over from a reclamation district and maintained by the state because of repeated levee breaks.

The letter states that it is not clear that the state's maintenance programs are less costly or more effective than local options. The current assessments

for Levee District 1 are extremely high compared to the state maintenance area assessments. The state goes through a public process for assessments.

The DWR Sutter Maintenance Yard has well trained and experienced workers who can immediately respond to high water events. The state has immediate access to heavy equipment for flood fighting. They provide better public safety. The Sutter DWR yard has never lost a levee. Levee districts and reclamation districts in Sutter County have. Levee districts rely on volunteers and they own minimal equipment.

The levee districts do not need to provide operation, maintenance, repair, rehabilitation and replacement. The property owners in the LD 1 and LD 9 benefit areas don't have to have a Proposition 218 election. The levee districts need to turn over their sections of the levee to the state to provide OMRR&R.
