# Tax Revolt 1978 a Winner

Golden State people don't get too excited about being overtaxed these days. Maybe they remain here due to a career, grandchildren or they are too old to start over elsewhere.

The highest income, sales and gas taxes in the nation combined with extortion-like DMV fees and hundreds of other charges make you wonder if residents don't have Stockholm syndrome. However, there was another era where taxes erupted like a plague. It occurred under Governor Ronald Reagan.

Reagan inherited budget deficits from Governor Edmund "Pat" Brown (father of the current Governor Jerry Brown). Reagan later calculated the state was overspending by \$1 million a day. This calculation actually underestimated the problem. Reagan's solution was to balance the books with a tax increase.

David Doer, a tax specialist who worked on the plan said, "Basically, the legislature taxed everything that moved." Sales taxes were increased; liquor taxes went up, as did inheritance taxes. But the key to the largest tax increase in California history was the income tax. Rates were increased, brackets were narrowed, and exemptions were replaced by tax credits. The income tax was made extremely progressive. Doer concluded with regret, "It became a money making machine."

Reagan thought by increasing income taxes they could comeup with property tax relief. However, once the tax and spend spigot was on, Reagan could not stop it. For the five years between the defeat of a Reagan tax-cut initiative to Proposition 13's tax revolt in 1978, state spending increased 12.5% a year while state revenues went up 18.4% a year. Money was coming in so fast the government couldn't spend it all.

Jerry Brown (his first term) inherited the state's massive surplus from Reagan while property taxes were spiking and infuriating the public. Then, the Proposition 13 property tax revolt erupted led by Howard Jarvis and Paul Gann. Property tax horror stories abound.

Howard Jarvis told of watching an elderly lady suffer a heart attack while at the Los Angeles assessor's office when she couldn't convince the authorities to change her tax bill.

The Newhall Signal newspaper described a retired couple living near a new apartment house. The assessor refigured their property at the land's highest and best use, as if their land would host a motel. Their small home was taxed at \$1800 a year. The total income of the couple was \$1900 a year. This incident occurred in 1968, 10-years before Proposition 13 passed. Thousands were losing or facing selling their homes.

Another tax victim told of an empty house at the end of their street, which was routinely flipped by speculators. No one ever moved in, but every time it sold, all the houses in the neighbor-

# Hidden Taxes, Solvency and the Supreme Court

Californians, today, are paying taxes for every move they make and don't make. Money is forcefully taken and then laws and codes are manipulated to take more and more. For the bureaucrats it's like angling at the fish farm. The fish are trapped.

There is a case before California's Supreme Court questioning the legality of transfers of monies from city-owned utilities to the general fund of that same city. Citizens have accused the City of Redding of creating an unconstitutional tax by diverting surplus electric revenues (\$6 million annually) to the general fund. The move was not approved by the voters. The strategy is called "payments in lieu of taxes" (PILOT or PILT) to rescue city budgets.

Californians have repeatedly amended the Constitution to keep politicians from taking their homes and belongings via taxation beginning with Proposition 13 in 1978. These efforts however have not prevented local governments from devious practices to take more cash.

Proposition 13 stopped assessors from reappraising property values routinely to raise more revenue. The measure established a new controlled method of property appraisals and taxation and how future taxes would need to have voter or legislative approval.

Local governments responded by relabeling taxes as special taxes as fees. In 1996, California voters passed Proposition 218 to again amend the state constitution to require that new special taxes be approved by two-thirds of those voters subject to the proposed tax, with the exception of fees for gas or electrical service.

In 2010, Left Coasters passed Proposition 26 closing another loophole by stopping cities from raising electricity and gas rates to pay for the utility-to-general fund transfers without voter approval, or without showing that the higher rates are necessary to cover reasonable utility costs.

"The City of Redding owns a municipal utility to provide electrical service to homes and businesses within the city. The city council approved a rate increase, then, six months later imposed a "payment in lieu of taxes" to "obtain funds" to cover general city budget items," according to the Pacific Legal Foundation (PLF). Citizens say this is a hidden and unconstitutional tax. The Supreme Court soon will decide.

The City of Gridley in Butte County has been using the same tactic by annually drawing \$1.6 million, then in 2016-2017 / 2017-2018 \$1.5 million yearly and a proposed \$1.4 million in 2018-2019 from its electric revenues. The shrinking transfer is due to maintaining the solvency of the electric operation which is the Goose providing Golden Eggs to keep the Gridley General Fund in the black.

In December 2017, the city council voted 3-2 to increase electric rates by 18% since the electric fund now had a deficit of \$400,000. The deficit was caused by annually siphoning off millions and suffering some bad outcomes on speculative power purchases.

Not one community member attended the meeting to comment, according to the Gridley Herald newspaper. The rate increase meant a \$25-\$35 bump to the average homeowner's bill said City Manager Paul Eckert. Without the increase Eckert and the council discussed options including bankruptcy.

The annual transfer of electric monies appears illegal according to Proposition 26 and the Pacific Legal Foundation. The solvency of California cities using these tactics may be threatened if the Supreme Court rules for the citizens of Redding.

What is Gridley thinking? While its hired staff says all is well, Chief of Police "Diamond" Dean Price makes more than any law enforcement leader in Northern California at \$ 332,742 regardless of the city size, including San Francisco. City Manager Paul Eckert is at \$206,672 for 2018-19. That's over a halfmillion dollars for just two employees. Finance Director Juan Solis makes \$178,876.

So, Gridley is running low on

cash and raising electric rates with no vote of the constituents to cover overspending. That was supposed to be illegal.

Gridley covers 2.08 square miles and has 6,074 residents. Some of Bell, California's DNA must have made it this way noting the notorious city salaries and monetary shenanigans for this Hiccup on Hwy 99.

Bell's leadership went to jail, were fired or resigned for their nefarious management policies. The term "Bell" is now synonymous with government rippingoff the public like "Going Postal" describes the violent actions of a disgruntled employee.

# **Improved Security** at Boat **Ramps**

Sutter, County, Ca.

The Sutter County General Services Department is actively pursuing security enhancements at three of the four boat ramps it operates.

General Services Director Megan Greve said the plan is to install security fencing, on-line or credit card payments, and a gate lock system to reduce vandalism and thefts at boat ramps at Boyd's Pump and the Yuba City Boat Dock on the Feather River, and at Tisdale Weir on the Sacramento River.

Improvements are expected to be in place this fall. Greve said.

In the interim, Greve said, boaters will not be required to pay the daily use fee. The County is removing the cash boxes used to collect boat ramp use fees because the boxes have been destroyed a multitude of times and money from the boat fees stolen. The enhancements will allow for the safe and secure collection of fees that are to be used to provide annual maintenance of the docks. Over the past two years, the revenue collected has been reduced by over \$10,000 due to theft and vandalism.

"These security enhancements are what many boaters have been asking Sutter County to provide," Greve said. "We'll provide a more secure parking lot while boaters are out on the water."

# FISHIN' TALK

The cool weather last week was discussed by many who were surprised this was happening in July. A change in the hot weather in July does happen occasionally. I have even seen it rain and snow in July. Of course the snow was up in the sierras and took place above 5000 feet in elevation in the middle of July in 1986.

I recall another time years ago which also took place in July during a cool spell. I had called my fishing buddy, Bill and asked him if he wanted to go after black bass. Back then it was largemouth black bass which was so popular. Now with the introduction of the spotted bass they seem to have taken over what the bass anglers go after.

Bill did not hesitate in saying he would go so I picked him up Saturday Morning at 4 A.M. and we headed out of Marysville on Highway 20 and arrived at the dredger ponds the other side of Hallwood. I had a key and permission to go into the ponds and Bill and I had fishing the area for years, catching lots of bass with an occasional catfish or perch.

We decided to fish the second pond that morning. This pond was a duck pond and had a duck blind on each side. The wooded structure was great for casting all over the pond due to most of the water edge being full of brush and lily pads which saturated the surface from the shoreline out several feet from the rocky edge. I stopped at the first blind and Bill went over to the other one.

It was a cool morning and the surface of the pond was still, without any ripples. In other words the surface of that pond was like glass. I

tackle box on the wood floor and stood there looking all over the area before me. Bill and I agreed not to throw a lure or plug, but to watch for movement on the surface of the water awhile. After about ten minutes I rigged my line with a hula popper with a frog pattern and made the cast across the pond right in front of a large bush which was hanging over the edge of the water. As the lure made its noise as it hit the water and the ripples slowly ran the distance of the pond I saw movement next to the brush. My popper sat there not moving as I watched the movement continue a couple feet towards the lure. I waited for another minute and suddenly flicked my rod tip and the lure gulped. After a couple of seconds I raised the rod and danced the lure across about four feet of the surface, stopping abruptly and then a wiggle of the lure. The bass hit the lure so hard he missed it and the popper was airborne before it hit the surface again. That is when the fish struck again, this time taking the

lure far enough into its

carefully placed my small

hook on the bottom of the lure found flesh as well as the trailer single hook in its white skirt.

That largemouth bass put up a great fight and I thought I would lose him several times when I lost control of the situation and the fish made it into several brush piles. But luck was with me and as I laid that big boy up on the bank next to the duck blind I got goose bumps from what I saw. He was a beauty and ended up weighing five and a half pounds and was measured on my old de-liar scale at 23 inches.

Bill and I caught our limits of five each that morning and were home in time for lunch. All the fish were smaller than the big one. Most were in the two and a half to three pound range. This was not an unusual day for us due to our catching limits on a regular basis in the dredger ponds. The big bass however was a once in a lifetime beautiful fish and was caught at first light, on the surface of the

water, in the month of July. Closing thought: we would spread love as quickly as we spread hate what an amazing world we



# Tax Revolt 1978 a Winner

hood were reassessed upward.

The story that best describes the nonsensical nature of the property tax debacle is set in San Francisco prior to the passage of Prop 13. The San Francisco assessor was taking bribes to keep business property taxes down. He eventually went to jail.

The new assessor used computers to insure valuations were correct and fair. When a property sold, all adjacent parcels received tax bills reflecting a new market value, resulting in huge and frequent increases in taxes for everyone. Property taxes went up so quickly in San Francisco that bumper stickers soon appeared pleading: "Bring back the crooked assessor!"

Politicians and bureaucrats believed homeowners were making wild profits from the housing price boom with some properties being assessed with 50%-100% increases in value. However, for those not selling their homes, these "paper profits" could not be used to pay real inflated tax bills. Retirees who had lived in their homes for decades

now could not pay their property taxes.

On June 6th, 1978, nearly two-thirds of California's voters passed Prop 13, reducing property tax rates on homes, businesses, and farms by about 57%. The amended constitution said property tax assessments could not exceed 1 percent of the property's market value and future valuations couldn't grow by more than 2% per year unless the property sold.

In addition, Prop 13 required that all state tax rate increases be approved by a two-thirds vote of the legislature and that local tax rates also have to be approved by a vote of the people. The people's right to vote on taxes is a key protection in Prop 13.

Today, politicians knee-jerk blame Prop 13 for all of society's ills and are doing their best to undermine it. However, government revenues and salaries are at record levels judging by real constant dollars compared to 1978. Watch for a proposition on the November 2018 ballot that at least will try to remove commercial property from Prop 13 protections.




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# **Discover Malakoff! Diggins Hike with Hank Meals**

July 14, 2018, 9 am-1 pm



The Friends of North Bloomfield & Malakoff Diggins, in cooperation with the Sierra Gold Sector of California State Parks, will present a very special hike with Hank Meals on July 14, 2018. The hike is the latest in the Discover Malakoff! monthly events and activities initiated by the Friends of North Bloomfield & Malakoff. The intent of the Discover Malakoff! series is to bring new visitors to the remote state park throughout the entire year, and to ignite interest and support for the wide spectrum of resources and activities at the historic park, home to the still-standing "ghost town" of North Bloomfield, and site of the largest hydraulic mine in the country.

What to bring: Water (2 liters), sack lunch, hat, sunscreen, camera, shoes suitable for uneven ground and wet (muddy) crossings. Bring a small backpack for your food and water. Please leave your dogs at home for this event, since dogs are not permitted on this trail.

Hike Description: From downtown North Bloomfield to the Diggins Trail and back is about a 3.5 to 4 mile loop trail in a unique environment. The Diggins Trail offers a good close look at the industrial landscape created by the Malakoff mine and to what degree nature is reclaiming the place. In addition to the fascinating history of the hydraulic mine, there is an artistic dimension in the fantastic pallet of colors in the exposed gravel banks. Our hike should last about three and a half hours.

Cost: Free for the tour; \$10 state park day use fee Transportation: Carpooling is encouraged. We will meet at the museum/park headquarters. Accessing the park from Highway 49 and Tyler Foote Road is recommended, as the shortest route via North Bloomfield Road is very rough, and unpaved from Edwards Crossing.



# **Food and Farm News**

## Wildfire burns rangeland

The ongoing County Fire in Napa and Yolo counties has burned thousands of acres of rangeland used for grazing animals. Reports of damage are still being collected, but farmers of irrigated crops in the region say those crops should be safe from fire. Firefighting helicopters have used irrigation reservoirs on farms as sources of water to pour on the flames.

## Nutria threaten crops, water systems

Farmers along the San Joaquin River remain on the lookout for nutria--an invasive rodent that damages crops, wetlands and water systems. State wildlife officials have confirmed nutria in six counties and are working to determine the extent of the problem. The rodents burrow into levees and canal banks, causing flooding and other damage. They eat vegetation-about a quarter of their body weight daily.

## Malting barley makes a comeback

The popularity of microbreweries has revived production of malting barley in California. Farmers in the Sacramento Valley are harvesting the grain for sale to a malthouse in Alameda, which in turn sells the malt to breweries and distilleries around the state. A variety of barley developed by the University of California suits growing conditions here and has become the preferred strain for farmers growing the crop.

## Grants aim to reduce food waste

Three "food rescue" projects in Northern California will benefit from grants announced Tuesday by the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery. Waste-management agencies in Alameda, Contra Costa and Napa counties will partner with food banks to recover edible food that would otherwise go to waste. The department says diverting food and other green waste from landfills reduces methane emissions.



The grants will be for short-term communitybased projects that must be completed by June 30, 2019. All projects must include a measurable outcome that aligns with First 5 Yuba's strategic plan goals. In addition, all recipients must submit a final evaluation report at the end of the project.

Examples of ways the grants can be used include conducting neighborhood support groups for parents of young children, building enrichment activities for toddlers, creating a community partnership to make the community safer for children, or simply purchasing materials that will encourage parents to increase the amount of time they read, play or

interact with their baby.

To apply, interested parties must attend a mandatory individual application meeting and complete the grant application prior to April 30, 2019. Awards are available until the current fiscal year's budgeted mini-grant funds are depleted. ## Assemblyman Dahle

Call for Wildfire Conference Committee

Governor Jerry Brown and California's legislative leaders agreed to Assembly Republican Leader Brian Dahle's (Bieber) request for a joint conference committee to address California's wildfire crisis. The committee will hear Senate Bill 901, which legislators will amend to ensure the bill prepares the state to deal with the increasingly devastating wildfires throughout California.

"There's a lot at stake

for California and we need to get this right," said Dahle. "In my district, where thousands of people are at risk of wildfires, we need immediate action to keep them safe and keep insurance affordable. By moving these negotiations to a public forum, we can develop a responsible plan that will protect Californians from future wildfires, provide stability to the marketplace and protect consumers."

Last year, California wildfires killed 43 people and damaged more than 10,000 structures. The Tubbs Fire that hit Santa Rosa was the most destructive fire on record, destroying or damaging more than 5,600 homes and killing 22 people.

The joint conference committee will focus on the issues of wildfire prevention and safety, insurance liability, and utility accountability.

Yuba County Water Agency will invest up to \$300,000 for water conservation measures, which will be combined with PG&E's Energy Savings Assistance investment for energy saving measures for low-income residences in the Linda County Water District service area.

Through this pilot program, local contractors will provide water and energy conservation assessments for up to 1,000 households, and when necessary, install new water efficiency devices including faucet aerators, low-flow shower heads, shower timers and highefficiency toilets.

"This is a great way for us to be able to invest in Yuba County in a way that's within our water supply reliability mission, but that really affects people's lives and pocketbooks directly," said Terri Daly, Yuba County Water administrative Agency manager. "Partnering in this pilot program gives us the opportunity to help the people who live in Yuba County, one household at a time, and conserve a lot of groundwater doing it."

PG&E, with help from its program administrator, Richard Heath and Associates, has successfully implemented its ESA weatherization program in Yuba County for over 15 years, improving the energy ef-

efficiency program for ficiency for low-income Now, PG&E and RHA

are partnering with water agencies to provide both energy and water conservation assessments in the same household visit.

RHA will manage all of the aspects of the program, from securing and training local contractors, to providing extensive data on the number of households served, water efficiency measures implemented and estimated

water savings. Linda County Water District has additionally agreed to partner in this program, to help meet the district's water conservation targets and ensure quality data for measuring

the program's success. "This program has the ability to save a lot of money for some of Yuba County's poorest families,' said Andy Vasquez, Yuba County Water Agency director. "We've invested millions in reducing flood risk and improving our water supply over the years, and it's great to see this investment in water conservation that directly impacts our people in a way that can give them a little boost." The program will begin

in August, 2018, and run until Dec. 31, 2019.


