Gold Eagle Market Destroyed

Owners, "We will rebuild"

On Friday morning June 1st. the Brownsville Gold Eagle Market burned to the ground, leaving residents without a market and no gas station.

The fire is under investigation but the owners believe it was an electrical problem. The insurance adjuster will be on scene on Tuesday and then the cleanup will begin followed by the rebuilding process. Rose Garcia the manager of the market said, "Seventeen employees have lost their job, and while it looks like clean up has begun, it is a case of the fire department moving debris around to get to the hot embers."

Roger and Linda Williamson were on scene Saturday morning wondering if the gas station part of the complex could be opened up? The owner replied that all of the electrical to the pumps have been destroyed and they would not be able to isolate that portion of the damage.

According to Yvonne

Scroggs of Books and More the biggest problem for residents will be transportation to get their groceries. There have been efforts to contact the Food Bank to see if drop off points could be made closer to Brownsville. The residents have been asked, "if you can help supply a ride to other grocery stores, please call Yvonne at 530-675-3275.

Nearby grocery stores are

in Clipper Mills, Dobbins, Oregon House and Loma Rica. The Gold Eagle Market in Loma Rica is still open.

The Foothill Fire Department was first on scene and assisted by mutual aid from fire districts in Smartsville, Camptonville, Dobbins/Oregon House, Butte County Fire and Cal-Fire. There were no injuries reported.



District 10 Residents Organize

Is Caltrans Project Really A Safety Improvement?

The residents of District 10 in Yuba County have great concerns that the Caltrans Safety Project for Highway 70 will make the highway less safe; as the plan calls to widen the highway to five lanes, They have formed a committee "Keep 70 Safe" to help Caltrans see the issues that should be addressed in an impact report.

In a meeting on May 22nd, chaired by Pam Warmack, the committee expressed their concerns that historically the widening of 9 miles of highway 70 would create more traffic and the danger would increase for the 200 driveway owners along the hwy 70 corridor. In addition both sides

of 70 are orchards and agricultural businesses; it is very dangerous for a loaded truck and trailer to go across five lanes and get their speed up to the speed limit.

The loss of farm land is also a concern however the true safety of the project is the main issue. Caltrans did not do a full blown impact study on the project before they began to implement it. After the initial meeting with Caltrans, Caltrans agreed to do a full blown impact study. Results of the study should be made public this summer.

The "Keep 70 Safe" committee has proposed a by-pass around Marysville as a solution to the safety issue and adding additional benefits of an

evacuation route from flooding and decreasing the traffic congestion in Marysville. The City of Marysville has given the committee support for the by-pass which would relieve traffic congestion in and increase financial opportunities for Marysville. A representative from Teichert Gravel was at the May 22nd meeting and relayed to the committee that the gravel company would be interested in being involved in the by-pass planning and may have some money available to add to the \$104.6 million of state and federal money already allocated for the safety project.

Pam Warmack said, "We don't want a band aid on the problem we want to fix it right the first time."

The Workings of Government

If you noticed moisture in the gutters near government buildings it's not a broken sprinkler but council people and supervisors' drool over Marysville doubling its expected take from increasing the sales tax rate from 7.5% to 8.5%. How else could Marysville spend \$12,000 to talk about how to spend our money? Watch for all adjacent jurisdictions to launch sales tax increase ballot measures this November.

Economist Walter Williams says, "Three-fifths to two-thirds of the federal budget consists of taking property from one American and giving it to another. Were a private person to do the same thing, we'd call it theft. When government does it, we euphemistically call it income redistribution, but that's exactly what thieves do -- redistribute income."

A tweaker came in my garage last week to help himself. He left the government middleman out. We caught and released him saving the city and the county going through the trouble.

Plumas Lake people need more taxes and bonds like a 30-year toothache. Here is a breakdown from one property tax bill there. Basic tax on property is 1,871.70. Then Yuba College Bonds - A \$12.72, B \$21.90, C \$12.82, Wheatland High 2016 Bond \$41.66, TRILIA Bond \$177.86, OPUD CFD 2002-\$600, Reclamation District 784 \$60.44, Plumas Lake Improvements \$467.76, Plumas Elementary School District \$320.00, and Agency Taxes \$89.10 for another \$1715.16. Total comes to \$3586.86. Then you pay the principal and interest for your loan.

If Measure G passes then it will add a minimum of \$216 per year for most homes for 30-years. Nice community Plumas Lake, but who would want that financial ball and chain when there are much cheaper options?

Breitbart News had a May 29th article titled "Foreign Drug Cartels Targeting Legal Marijuana States." The noted states were Colorado, California and Washington. Yuba County was mentioned along with Sacramento, Calaveras, Placer, San Joaquin, El Dorado, and Amador counties where multi-agency raids were conducted and cartel houses and assets seized.

Local and federal law enforcement officials raided 74 marijuana grow houses in the Sacramento region during an operation carried out in April. The actions led to the seizure of millions of dollars of property — much of it owned by Chinese organized crime groups.

U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions called it "one of the largest residential forfeiture actions" in U.S. history.

Legal recreational marijuana states where enforcement of growing regulations has been hit-and-miss have provided cover for transnational criminal organizations (TCO) who now appear to be investing big money in real estate to get even larger returns.

The TCOs are typically Chinese, Cuban, or Mexican groups that are purchasing or renting hundreds of homes to carry out their grow

America is unique. The wealthier we get, the poorer we become, and the more we like to kill our young. While we are learning from the Chinese about marketing fetal body parts, Americans are slower to add them to their diet.

On June 1, liberals, black race hustlers and La Raza revolutionaries suffered horrible news. Although the stock market was predicted to crash after the election of President Trump the Dow closed at the nose-bleed level of 24,635.21. 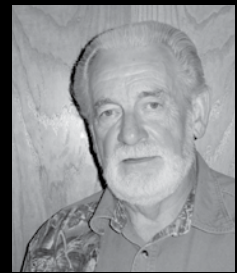

We decided to purchase a new travel trailer, something a little more comfortable than the toy hauler. Two weeks later my sons, Ted and Dan, Jr. both decided the old man could not outdo them and both purchased a new or newer rig.

My son Ted, his wife Holly and Val and I decided to take the new rigs for a weekend "shakedown" run. Ted checked out the close camp sites and decided on the Sycamore Ranch area. The camp ground is located off of State Highway 20 just past the Marysville Road turnoff on the way to Grass Valley.

The camping area is located next to Dry Creek about a couple hundred yards above where the creek enters the Yuba River. The area has full hookups and was quite nice camping right next to Dry Creek. Now the reason for this story appearing in a fishing column.

We had just finished setting up camp last Friday Afternoon when a very loud splash was heard right in front of our camp. My son Ted yelled, "Did you see that?" I responded with a negative note but yelled to him that I had heard the splash and saw the ripples. We did not know what kind of fish it was until Saturday morning, which did not stop me from throwing a line tipped with a whole night crawler. Ted got a good look at the fish when it jumped again. He advised it was a black bass and the next thing I observed was his fishing pole in hand and a fine cast right where the fish had been feeding. I was close behind him and plugged the area, changing lures

while in the process.

We attempted to lure the big boy into hitting one of our lures and finally on Saturday evening Ted had a strike, but lost the fish after a short fight.

The creek is wide, about thirty yards or so with deadfall in certain parts of the banks. This was a perfect place for both large and small mouth bass as well as perch and catfish. Along about dusk an angler came down the stream in a kayak, one of those with peddles for power, like a bicycle and fished the hole where we had seen the big bass feeding. He final gave up and left heading back upstream empty handed.

Ted and I fished for that bass until we left on Sunday morning and never got even a nibble except for Ted's pull down on Saturday.

Sycamore Ranch Campground is run by Yuba County and is well kept and sits in a grove of trees and brush. We enjoyed the visit, got our new rigs checked out, and had a blast trying to catch the "Big One."

We were entertained by all kinds of wildlife, including ducks, geese, turtles, a lone kingfisher, cranes, miscellaneous wild birds and pelicans. The highlight of the trip was the herd of deer that appeared just before dark on Saturday night and then a single doe on Sunday Morning all directly across from our camp.

operations. They have had their way in Yuba County's hills and flatlands.

Although retired Department of Forestry firefighter and longtime hill resident Buck Weckman pled repeatedly with county supervisors to increase enforcement and declare a state of emergency supervisors did little until two sheriff deputies were shot by a felon at a marijuana farm.

Even then, 5th District Supervisor Randy Fletcher declared his district safe. Residents disagreed, and provided plot maps and Google Earth photos of grows, illegal wells, banned farm chemicals, and unpermitted buildings. Some estimate there are more than 1,000 illegal pot farms in Yuba County.

County supervisors and local deputies are no match for cartel forces.

Yuba County's eventual declaration of a state of emergency so far has been too little and too late.

Since marijuana was legalized in Colorado highway seizures of the drug headed to other states is up by 43 percent. "Columbia is to cocaine as Colorado is to marijuana," DEA (Drug Enforcement Administration) Agent Randy Ladd said. These states are "absolutely turning a blind eye to it."

Local multi-agency raids have been on pause lately. In discussions with a former cartel worker last week, the cartels are not only growing marijuana in massive quantities and delivering pot nationwide,

but also regularly bring hundreds of kilos of heroin and humans across the southern border.

Since Donald Trump took office 24,000 federal jobs have been cut carrying out his promise to drain the swamp and shrink the size of government. Unfortunately, now state (by 2,000) and local (by 6,000) bureaucracies have expanded. The growth represents what taxpayers hate about government, too big, too expensive, unwanted and lousy service.

Finally, for all of you interested in social justice how about Walter William's definition, "I keep what I earn and you keep what you earn. Do you disagree? Well, then, tell me how much of what I earn belongs to you - and why?"

tal Program for Women, Infants and Children was created in 1974 during the "War on Poverty." In 2017, 7.3 billion people needed neighbors to pop for their nutrition. There is no such thing as low inventory.

When a group of "experts" all fall for; then repeat the same misconception I have to smirk if only a little bit.

The latest exhibit of a deficient grasp of how all things money work finds itself at the doorstep of the National Association of Realtors (NAR) where in their February 13th 2018 article entitled 'Housing inventory hit all-time low in Q4 2017: NAR' they state:

"...a majority of the country saw an upswing in buyer interest at the end of last year, which ultimately ended up putting even more strain on inventory levels and prices," Inman.com demonstrated they too suffered from a deficiency in economic understanding by stating in their January 9th, 2018 article entitled "Low inventory will be a huge challenge in 2018" saying: "Economists say tight supply remains a thorn for brokers, developers and homeowners as new year approaches".

I don't know where all these groups are getting their economists but apparently many of them skipped Econ 101 which starts the potential student of economists by having them learn the basics of supply and demand as it relates to price. Pricing directly reflects supply and demand levels, which are the often touted "inventory levels" used by the NAR and other real estate media spins.

In economic reality there is no such thing as an inventory problem. Inventory levels are symptom of a problem, not a problem in itself.

Inventory levels are always seeking balance in a free market because high prices tends to cures high prices and low prices tend to cure low prices and that's accomplished by the dynamics of the supply.

Sounds confusing but it's not. Suppose a bottle

of juice sells for a dollar and people buy so much of it, the juice companies can't keep up and therefore the supply tightens (low inventories). Seeing a high demand, companies figure out they can raise their price and do so. If demand continues to deplete inventories, the companies can continue to raise their price and hence continue to increase profits.

Adding to this gear is the fact that more companies will enter the market to capitalize on the higher profit, make more juice and increase inventory levels still more.

As the price increases, demand starts to drop and that coupled with rising inventory returns the market and inventory to a more normal range. Presto, low inventory levels are no more.

Conversely if the price of anything goes too high eventually fewer people will be able to afford it, causing an inventory glut as sales drop. Some companies will then find they can't sell enough, and the mechanism works in reverse. Companies will go out of business, prices will drop causing more sales and the symptom of high inventory levels will dissipate just like low inventory levels did.

The underlying problem is a mispricing problem in relation to demand. Inventory levels are just the signpost telling you it has occurred.

The economic truism is that there is no such thing as low inventory or high inventory as a permanent problem in itself. Inventory levels are merely a symptom of the mispricing of assets pure and simple. Price adjustment is the solution to inventory imbalances now and always. Simplifying the message: Low inventory can always be easily rectified by raising prices while high inventory levels will tend to cause prices to drop.

In the case of real estate and the claim of our so called experts, they are as misguided as those that believe a high fever is an illness. Fevers are only a symptom of an illness just as inventory levels whether too high or too low are a symptom of a pricing problem.

The problem is manifested by whoever is

pricing the asset. They are pricing it too low if inventories are tight or setting the price too high if inventories are high. In the case of real estate, those "tight inventories" means home prices are too low in relation to its demand.

It also means that whoever is pricing the asset does not understand the relationship between price and demand and supply which is a basic economic premise.

That a majority of real estate experts claim low inventories are going to be an ongoing problem is tantamount to saying there's an overpopulation of deer with no solution. The solution in the case of the deer is not the NAR but the NRA, whose members could easily solve the problem with a handful of culling licenses to hunt down a few.

That these experts can't figure out that they could easily solve the low inventory problem by properly pricing the asset to correct the imbalance is scary, especially if they were pricing my house for sale, which they won't be.

Unless of course they are pricing houses too low on purpose. Think they don't know lower prices means faster and more sales? Given their knowledge on the "problem" of low inventory, maybe not. But don't count on it. Right now they're selling houses because of the "low inventory" condition and that means houses are likely selling faster than ever.

They say Ignorance is bliss, and on occasion, highly profitable.

CVP water supply inches upward

Water supplies have improved in the federal Central Valley Project, but some of its customers express disappointment with the amount. The agency that operates the CVP says it will now deliver 45 percent of contract supplies to farm customers south of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. But a group representing water agencies in the region points to above-average reservoir storage and says the restricted supply will bring "enormous hardships."

Sales of California wines rise slightly

Even with what one analyst called "rapid and broad" changes among wine drinkers and retailers, sales of California

wine in the U.S. increased last year. The Wine Institute reports California wine sales rose 1 percent in volume and 3 percent in value, as American shoppers bought more premium-priced wines. The number of locations that sell wine has risen 20 percent in the past decade, reflecting changes in the grocery and restaurant sectors.

U.S. protests wine restrictions

Restrictions on wine sales in British Columbia have led to a trade complaint from the United States against Canada. A rule in British Columbia allows only wine made in the province to be sold on grocery store shelves there. The U.S. Department of Agriculture calls the

practice discriminatory. An organization representing California wineries, the Wine Institute, says it "greatly appreciates" the U.S. action.

'Agtech' investments reach \$10 billion

Investments in food and agricultural technology have surged so far this decade, according to a University of California report. The study says venture-capital funding in "agtech" reached more than \$10 billion last year - and that California leads the nation in such investments. The UC report says many of the investments focus on incorporating robotics, information technology and remote sensing technology in the food chain.

June 22, 2016: WikiLeaks begins publishing embarrassing, hacked emails from Clinton campaign and Democratic National Committee.

June 27, 2016: Attorney General Loretta Lynch meets privately with former President Bill Clinton on an airport tarmac in Phoenix, Arizona.

Major "Cash for Food" Drive Underway

Unbeknownst to many people, the need for food for families in need is high in the summertime as donations to our local food closets drop. Yet, the demand actually rises as kids are out of school.

Each year, the Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way runs a major food drive at the start of summer, last year raising some 35,000 pounds of food.

This year, Y-S-C United Way has introduced a major change as it is moving from collecting non-perishable foods to a "Cash for Food Drive" event with a dollar goal of \$15,000.

"The concept of raising money for local food closets is receiving great reviews from the food closets which collect and dispense foods as the cash donated allows the food closets to purchase what is needed to round out their summer inventory, instead of taking just what product is donated," said Bob Harlan, Executive Director of Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way.

"In addition, if we raise our goal of \$15,000, the equivalent number of pounds could reach

75,000 because of the food closet's buying power with cash. That's double the poundage from last year!" Harlan said.

Harlan stressed that no one will take any cash off of the top. 100% will go to 11 local food closets and the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank to purchase nutritious non-perishable foods for individuals and families in need this summer.

The participating food organizations are: Catholic Ladies Relief Society; Christian Assistance Network (CAN); Foothill Food Pantry; Marysville First United Methodist Church; The Salvation Army; St. An-

drew Presbyterian Church; St. Vincent de Paul; Twin Cities Rescue Mission; The Yuba-Sutter Food Bank; First Presbyterian Church, Colusa; Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church and St. John's Episcopal Church in Colusa.

Dahle Bill to Tackle Hazardous Waste from Electric Vehicles

The Assembly approved legislation by Assembly Republican Leader Brian Dahle (Bieber) that will ensure the state has a plan for dealing with discarded electric vehicle batteries. Currently, there are more than 450,000 electric vehicles on the road, yet there is no plan for dealing with these batteries when they eventually reach the end of their useful life. Assembly Bill 2832 received bipartisan

support, passing on a 66-0 vote.

"There are currently hundreds of thousands of electric vehicles on California's roads. Eventually, there will be millions," said Dahle. "That's a lot of batteries that we will have on our hands. I'm simply asking for a responsible plan to protect our environment."

All batteries are considered hazardous waste in California when discarded. Assembly Bill

2832 will require the Department of Toxic Substances and Control to work with stakeholders to identify a plan to reuse or recycle batteries from electric vehicles at the end of their useful life. The plan will need to be submitted to the Legislature by July 1, 2020.

The bill now heads to the California State Senate for approval.

The Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission announced that on May 22, 2018, the Nevada County Board of Supervisors accepted the Commission's recommendation and designated the Truckee Memorial Masonic Arch as a historical landmark.

A Truckee landmark for over 100 years, the Arch harkens back to Truckee's earliest days, first as an outpost and then as a town. The Arch is all that remains of the historic Masonic Lodge #200 building, one of the oldest established lodges in the United States. Built in 1909 and destroyed by fire and explosion in 1993, it reportedly was the only lodge to have had a chiseled, Sierra granite entrance-way. Following the explosion, the Arch was destined for a landfill along with the rest of the building's debris, but thanks to the Truckee Masons, Truckee's citizenry and the Truckee-Donner Historical Society, the stones were saved after the explosion.

In 2007, the Arch was reconstructed on the grounds of the Truckee-Donner Historical Society's Old Jail Museum. Framing the Jail's historical garden, the 3,000-pound Sierra granite Arch pays tribute to the early Masonic builders and pioneers who were instrumental in putting together the foundations of California. The Old Truckee Jail, itself one of the few surviving 19th century jailhouses of its kind in the West, was used continuously from 1875 to May 1964 and was able to withstand the many fires that swept through Truckee in its early days.

The Truckee Memorial Masonic Arch will be added to the Commission's interactive map and e-guide. The e-guide is an electronic book available for any smartphone or tablet from Apple, Amazon, or Barnes and Noble. Go to You Bet Press (youbetpress.com)

Area African-American Pioneers - 1848-1900

As African Americans began to build new lives in Yuba and Sutter counties as well as surrounding areas, they became anxious to obtain their own land. However, under the California Homestead laws passed in 1851 and later in 1860, they were not allowed homestead rights.

According to Delilah Beasley in her publication--The Negro Trail Blazers of California, the wording of the Homestead law designated that "a colored man could not acquire a homestead plot of land". Ironically, an African American could purchase a home; but if a white person should claim the land, the home owner could not go into Court and testify in his own behalf. But this was about to change, thanks to a test case involving an area African American.

BENJAMIN BERRY

A native of Kentucky, Benjamin Berry, a slave, was brought to California from Missouri by John Holloway in the summer of 1850. During the next few years, Berry was able to perform services in the equivalent of \$3,000 in order to purchase his freedom. On December 27, 1853, a document was filed and recorded in Sutter County which pertained to Berry's emancipation.

He had now been granted freedom for the remainder of his life "in consideration of the faithful services and good conduct rendered. . ."

Berry settled in Yuba County on public land in the West Bear River Township, according to Thompson and West's History of Yuba County. While on this land, he was able to make improvements and around 1860, he married. However, as Berry entered his late 60s, his life would take a drastic turn.

On May 30, 1863 the Pacific Appeal, a San Francisco newspaper, printed copies of a transcript which contained correspondence between A.J. Snyder, Register of the Land Office at Marysville and Joseph S. Wilson, Acting Commissioner of the General Land Office at Washington D.C. regarding rights of public domain for African Americans. Since Snyder had several similar cases in Yuba County, in his estimation, "these ought to be allowed".

According to Snyder's letter, dated February 3, 1863, "certain parties, taking advantage of (Berry's) legal disabilities have attempted to acquire title to the land claimed by him through the State as a portion of the five hundred acre grant". Berry feared that he would be ejected by an action in the State Courts.

The letter further related that "Berry, who has settled and improved this public land in good faith, may be protected in his improvements and occupancy".

By March 12, 1863, Snyder received an answer from the General Land Office in Washington D.C.. The letter reads in part that "covering an affidavit of Edward E. Thurman and in relation to the Case of Benjamin Berry, a free man of color, . . . I have to state that the Attorney General of the United States in an elaborate opinion published the 29th of November, 1862,

upon the subject of rights of free persons of color to citizenship under the Constitution of the United States, declares":

The free man of color, if born in the United States, is a citizen of the United States.

The letter continued that the "administration of the business of this department will conform to the above opinion. . ."

"The man Berry, upon making proper proof of his being a free man and born in the United States, will be entitled to the benefit of the Preemption Laws as also of the Homestead Laws. . ."

The editor of the Pacific Appeal newspaper also noted that "under this straightforward and just ruling, Berry will be able to secure his rights and maintain possession of the land he has improved and occupied for so many years". It is important to remember that before the ruling on this test case, African Americans were forcibly expelled from portions of the public domain despite the improvements made or taxes paid. Also, the swift action of this ruling is also significant as it occurred during the Civil War. But most of all, it was a major triumph for Benjamin Berry and so many other African Americans who had settled in California.
