

# Yuba-Sutter **Political Notes**

Yuba-Sutter residents should be concerned about their government, once thought to be of the people, by the people, and for the people.

After being deceived by the City of Marysville's campaign that a 1% sales tax increase would be dedicated to police and fire, \$12,000 was spent last week for a one-day retreat for the city council. This is a rags to riches bunch. One minute they're broke and the next minute they can afford someone to make a to-do

The city is essentially broke for the next 25-years paying off \$17 million in bonds but then leased 19 new vehicles. Police cars are looking stylish but don't try this accounting at home.

Yuba-Sutter politicians and government leaders went to Washington DC on a junket. The social media photos looked like they all had a really nice time. A Yuba City council member reported that citizens paid a stunning \$6,000 per Yuba City traveler. That kind of took the fun out of it for the folks that remained home to work and pay taxes.

The Yuba County Water Agency (YCWA) that in the 80s had a director and a couple of clerical staff in a cramped office in the courthouse has come a long way baby. Nowadays, they are in their own comfortable accommodations selling hundreds of millions of dollars in power and water.

Lots of money does funny things to people. An arrangement to sell water from New Bullards Bar Dam to Southern California water districts has been a windfall for the agency and about 100 farm operations in Yuba County. However, most Yuba County citizens would probably agree that if anybody owns the water or power being sold from the Dam it is them and not a handful of farmers or YCWA directors.

What started out as wonderful opportunity to benefit the citizens who risked their properties to build the Dam now has More on Page 6

# Trump Shrinks **Dept of Ed**

If liberal political prophets were living in Old Testament times, they would be stoned to death for repeatedly missing the mark. President Trump was supposed to ignite a WW III nuclear disaster with North Korea. Lefty seers were heartbroken when North and South Korean leaders met to make peace not war following Secretary of State Mike Pompeo's secret visit. Who would have

Lib leadership warned the stock market would crash with a Trump Presidency. Candidate Trump said off-shore businesses would actually return to the homeland. Nonsense, mocked President Obama during a town hall meeting. The market has been booming while businesses and billions of dollars are coming home since Trump's prediction.

Last week, Trump's decision to wind down the US Department of Education was another fulfillment of a campaign promise. President Jimmy Carter advocated for the creation of the cabinet level department in 1979. Today, it has nearly 4,000 employees with a proposed 2019 budget slightly smaller compared to the \$68 billion spent in 2016.

Carter expanded government to rule over education in spite of conservative and libertarian protests. The new department is unconstitutional and illegal with no federal authority to interfere with local control over training children. Who pays attention to the Constitution anyway?

In general, individual educational achievement was higher while costing much less without a federal and state bureaucracy and teacher's union dominance. That may be because freedom of the press and literacy were prominent in the minds of the Founders and the colonies.

# **Sutter Union High**

Brings Active Shooter Training to Mid-Valley

Union High Sutter School and the ALICE Training Institute have teamed up to bring ALICE Training Instructor Certification to Sutter, California on July 9-10, 2018.

This two-day instructor course is designed to teach proactive survival strategies for violent intruder or active shooter incidents. The goal of the program is to provide

individuals with survivalenhancing options for those critical moments in the gap between when a violent situation begins and when law enforcement arrives on the scene. The price of the training is \$595 and registration can be completed online at www.AliceTraining.com.

ALICE stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and Evacuate and is a useful strategy for everyone: law enforcement, schools. universities. hospitals, businesses and places of worship. Completing the ALICE Training Instructor Certification Course provides individuals with certification of ALICE and allows them the opportunity to bring the strategies back to their places of work.

Alice is in line with recommendations from the Department of Justice. Department of Homeland Security, Department of Health and Human Services, Federal **Emergency Management** Agency, White House, and Department of Education, Federal Bureau of Investigation and some Federal and State agencies.

Sutter Union High School has pioneered this program in the Yuba-Sutter Area for the past two years. With two certified Instructors, Sutter trains all its staff members annually and will start training its student population in the fall of 2018.

ALICE training is the original options-based response program that was designed to replace an inadequate secure-in-place mandated response plan. ALICE addresses the fallacies of a one-size-fits-all response plan by explaining the truths and realities of Violent Intruder events. The reality is that extremely tragic outcomes in these events can be mitigated. They are very much survivable. Through training and empowerment citizens can apply the ALICE strategies and improve survival chances in any environment where they may find themselves confronted by an active shooter or violent intruder. ALICE strategies are now mirrored and recommended by many Federal and State official guidelines.


Several times over the years I have advised about the danger of our local rivers. One of the dangers I talked about is placing and pulling anchor. This is often done before first light or after dusk as well as throughout the day in between. This is the time when there is a danger of falling overboard due to a person being at the bow of the boat, standing off balance and the boat is usually moving, especially when dropping the anchor. I have always

advised wearing a life jacket when performing this task. All it takes is to fall into the water, which is cold, very cold, suck in a mouthful of water and fight the weight of the clothes you are wearing. which more than likely will include a jacket in the early morning hours. The worse thing of all is for the other anglers, hearing the splash in the water will assume it is the anchor noise so familiar to those who fish our rivers, not a human being in trouble. We must also consider the speed of the current, the undertow and underwa-

second or two to put on that life jacket. The insurance, if you or one of your buddies falls in, is a no brainer. Think about this and please be careful and safe on any river any time of the day.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife has been busy planting trout for last week's opener. It is very probable that your favorite trout stream or reservoir has lots of fish left from the plant.

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
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

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






# **75th Annual Stonyford Rodeo**

A sleepy, backwater community for most of the year, Stonyford will come alive on May 4-6, 2018, when an estimated five thousand people crowd into town to view the 75th Annual Stonyford Rodeo. "But I'm not a rodeo fan," you say, "What does Stonyford have for me?" Fishing, camping, dirt bike riding, hiking in the great

celebrating its 75th year as an annual event—its 43rd as a professional, PRCA event. The first rodeo was held at a local ranch in 1943; in 1944-1948, the event was held in a vacant town lot; in 1949 it was first held on the present acreage, where it continues until the present day. In 1964 the rodeo became a member of the Western

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
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tor is the Bridwell Pro Rodeo Company (formerly Growney Bros), out of Red Bluff, California.

Unfortunately, there are no close-by motels—the nearest are 30-40 miles away in Willows, Williams, or Colusa—but the camping is great. There is a large campground behind the arena. Here you will find a congenial group of rodeoloving campers, many of whom come to this great rodeo every year. There are two lakeside campgrounds nearby, the closest being two miles south of the rodeo grounds, and the other eight miles east-both are along different parts of the large East Park Reservoir. Tickets are available now at the Horsemen website: www.stonvcreekhorsemen.org. Or, you can get them at any of these area locations: Stonyford General Store, Stonyford; Carl's Feed, Willows; Boot Barn. Chico. Anderson & Yuba City; Bucke's Feed & Grain, Orland; Marie's Lakeshore Feed, Clearlake; Rainbow Ag, Lakeport; Ace Hardware, Arbuckle; and Hust Bros., Colusa (formerly, Colusa Motor Sales). Pre-rodeo tickets purchased online or from any of the businesses listed above are \$10 for adults and \$6 for children 7-12 years and older- children 6 years and under are free. Tickets purchased at the gate are \$15 and \$7. May 2nd is the last day that you can get presale tickets. So get'em early and save money!



When farmer Charlie Mathews argued that the lucrative water deals should be shared with all the people he was cast as an evil man. The farmer/pumpers contributed about \$150,000 to stop a ballot initiative Mathews wanted Yuba County folks to vote on and to also write their

Then, the YCWA filed a legal action against Mathews' initiative before Yuba County Elections Clerk Terry Hansen could certify the signatures. A Sacramento judge said the YCWA should add the title and summary for the ballot rather than Hansen. The YCWA then refused to add title and summary making it too late to start over, essentially blocking the initiative.

About \$120,000 of the political contributions was spent for attorneys and public relations to deprive the citizens a vote. The rest of the pumper cash was then diverted to campaign against Mathews in his run for YCWA director against Tib Belza. However, Mathews' slogan "Your Water, Your Money" made sense to voters who elected Mathews after their right to vote for the water initiative was undermined.

YCWA chairman Brent Hastey now accuses Mathews of not wanting public debate on the water sales after Mathews resigned from the water committee. Mathews said committee chairman Doug Lofton would not call a meeting to at-

What seems clear is that other than Mathews YCWA directors want to maintain the status quo which is a cash cow for them.





# The Demise of Small Business in the Timber Industry

The United States Forest Service, hereinafter referred to as USFS, acting in concert with their chosen ones, have, with malice, systematically eliminated the truly small business from the forest product industry because of their unfair and egregious timber sale policy. The USFS, in a con-

effort, began certed decades ago putting up timber sales in such a large amount that the small sawmills and small timber companies in the area could not purchase the advertised timber, causing the demise of dozens of small companies engaged in the timber business in this area.

Importantly, there were once several small sawmills and timber operations within twenty miles of this small community of Clipper Mills. California, employing hundreds of employees. There was full employment in the foothill and mountain areas, and employers even had to search for enough employees to fill the available jobs. Sadly, today there are no operating sawmills in this area. Many people had to resort to welfare, unemployment insurance or they just moved to other locations, some being out of state. Additionally, as a result of this massive unemployment, many local businesses had to close their doors

pristine and turned communities into slumlooking areas with high unemployment. As one can readily see, the loss of these jobs had a devastating effect on the economy of both Marysville and Oroville, California. Both cities were once flourishing communities but, due to USFS policies against small business, they are now an economic disaster.

Very importantly, see-

ing the egregious dis-

crimination by the USFS

and what was happening to the foothill communities and the treatment of truly small business, I decided years ago as a layman to do what I could to rectify the situation. I took time off from work and traveled to San Francisco and met with the USFS Regional Forester and the assistant Regional Forester. Shortly thereafter I met with a United States Senator in Chico, California, and related to him the egregious actions of the Forest Service as it pertained to timber sales regarding truly small business. My efforts, along with the efforts of others, were not in vain because not long thereafter a program was started by the USFS and the Small **Business Administration** called the Special Salvage Timber Sale (SSTS) program for companies with 25 employees or less that remains in effect to this day.

This program was put into effect by the USFS and for several years employment was on the rise, and dead and dying trees were eliminated from the forest reducing the fire hazard and preventing the massive forest fires that has ravaged our forests. Additionally, the revenue from harvesting the dead and dying trees went into a fund to reduce fire danger and into the Federal Treasury.

In a further act of discriminating against truly small business the USFS has eliminated this extremely worthwhile program. It certainly was not for a lack of man power because they have over twenty-eight thousand employees. The cost of implementing this program would be a mere pittance compared to the benefits of the program. It would provide hundreds of jobs, revitalize local communities and help alleviate the horrific forest fires that have devastated your forests. The cost of suppressing these fires cost taxpayers over two billion dollars in 2017.

In the interest of justice, more jobs and fewer forest fires this disgraceful discriminatory policy by the USFS against small business engaged in the timber industry should must come to an end.

# Gallagher Pushes for Independent Oversight of Dam Safety

Sacramento, Ca. Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) is pushing legislation to restructure the management and operation of the State Water Project. Under current law, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) owns and operates facilities that are part of the State Water Project, like Oroville Dam. The same department is also responsible for overseeing dam safety. Gallagher's Assembly Bill 3045 would move the operation and maintenance of the State Water Project from DWR to an independent body.

"The Department of Water Resources is both the owner/operator and state regulator of Oroville Dam. This is a clear conflict of interest. We don't allow any other industry to regulate itself, and state government shouldn't be exempt," said Gallagher. "We also need greater independent oversight and transparency when it comes to the operation of the State Water Project," Gallagher continued.

Gallagher's legislation would create a new State Water Project Commission to operate the State Water Project independently and in a more transparent manner. It would also include experts in riskmanagement, engineering, and water rights, as well as a representative recommended by Butte County to represent the interests of downstream communities that bear the most risk of Oroville

Dam. AB 3045 passed out of the Assembly Water, Parks, and Wildlife Committee on a bipartisan vote of 15-0 today. The bill now heads to the Assembly Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

# Sutter County Board Approves \$255,891 it's share of Animal Control costs

The Sutter County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, April 24, approved payment of \$255,891 to Sutter Animal Services Authority as its share of the 2018-2019 Animal Control budget. Under a Joint Powers Agreement between Sutter County, Live Oak, and Yuba City, the City of Yuba City operates the animal shelter and is

the employer of record

for the staff. In a formula based on population, Yuba City is responsible for 69 percent of the cost of Animal Control Services, Sutter County 22 percent, and Live Oak nine percent. Yuba City's contribution in 2018-2019 will be \$820,160. The overall budget of \$1,334,634 is an increase of \$37,960.

### Sutter Co Board **Approves Road Projects**

The Sutter County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday approved contracts for an asphalt overlav of three sections of Pleasant Grove Road in southern Sutter County, as well as a 500 foot section of guard rail on a curve in Pass Road in the Sutter Buttes.

The Board awarded a contract to Teichert Construction Co. of Roseville for \$833,751. Teichert was the lowest of nine responsible bidders, coming in \$180,000 below the highest bidder, Escheman Construction. The contract is for an asphalt overlay on three segments of Pleasant Grove Road, for a total of 3.3 miles of overlay: from Sankey Road to Keys Road, from Howsley Road to Catlett Road, and from Kempton Road to Betz Road.

The Board awarded a contract to Highway Specialty Company Inc. of Redding, for \$22,900, the lowest of four bids, for 500 feet of guardrail in a curve on Pass Road in the Sutter Buttes, about a mile from Lemenager Road. The highest bid was for \$146,650 by Swierstok Enterprise Inc.

# Trump Shrinks Dept of Ed

in every story of the development of the United States. However, a free press is impotent without an audience for what is printed. Only a literate population makes the right to a free press powerful.

That's why Thomas Jefferson said that a free press wasn't enough to guarantee a healthy democracy. As he wrote to Charles Yancey, a prominent Virginia legislator, in 1816, "Where the press is free, and every man able to read, all is safe."

University of Montana scholar Kenneth Lockridge's book, 'Literacy in Colonial New England, makes the case that among white New England men, about 60 percent of the population literate between 1650 and 1670, and rose to 85 percent between and 1762, and

to 90 percent between 1787 and 1795. In cities such as Boston, the rate had come close to 100 percent by century's end. However, literacy figures for women, slaves or free blacks lagged behind white males.

Slaves were purposely kept illiterate to keep them ignorant, disoriented and therefore less apt to flee the plantation. However, there were exceptions where owners and the clergy felt an obligation to educate them.

Thomas Sowell writes that most free blacks in America were literate by 1850 despite being excluded from public schools in many parts of the country and despite being forbidden to organize their own schools in much of the South.

Free blacks and most white Americans achieved a high level of literacy with few funds through efforts at home, a fact that is lost on those that are anti-home school today. Early Americans valued the printed page and the ability to read it.

President Trump's "Education Federalism Executive Order," launch a 300-day review of Obama-era regulations and guidance for school districts and directs Education Secretary Betsy DeVos to modify or repeal measures she deems an overreach by the federal government.

"For too long the government has imposed its will on state and local governments. The result has been education that spends more and achieves far, far, far less," President Trump said. "My administration has been working to reverse this federal power grab and give power back to families, cities [and] states — give power back to localities."

Trump said that previous administrations had increasingly forced schools to comply with "whims and dictates" from Washington, but his administration would break the trend.

"We know local communities know it best and do it best," Trump said. "The time has come to empower teachers and parents to make the decisions that help their students achieve success."

There is no evidence that the Department of Education has done anything but establish an expensive bureaucracy giving more power to lobbyists and unions and less freedom for parents and their children. Hopefully, Trump can drain the education swamp under his influence and be an example for states to do the same.

# **East Area Rapist**

The crimes initially centered on the thenunincorporated areas of Carmichael, Citrus Heights and Rancho Cordova, all east of Sacramento, where at least fifty women were raped between June 18, 1976, and July 5, 1979. Earlier incidents in Visalia, attributed to the "Visalia Ransacker", are now thought to be connected. In 2001, several of the Northern California rapes were linked by DNA to murders in Southern California. All of the Northern California DNA-linked assaults occurred in Contra Costa County, but the distinctive (MO) of the rapist makes it very likely the same man was also responsible for the attacks in the Sacramento area. His last known crime, the only one after 1981, took place in 1986.

The entire community of Carmichael, Citrus Heights and Rancho Cordova were in fear of the East Area Rapist, Joseph DeAngelo. Gun sales went through the roof. It was well known that many households slept with guns under their pillows, and the crime rate in this area went to a record low.

# This Month In Your Garden by Cecilia M. Rice BALD MOUNTAIN NURSERY

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May is a favorite month in the garden for most people. The weather is usually perfect - not too hot, not too cool but just right. Enjoy it, because we all know that the summer heat is on its way. That's not bad since it is great for many summer activities that we pursue. Gardening during the mid-day in the summer takes much more endurance than the usual lovely May weather does . Take advantage of lovely May.

If April didn't put you in the mood already, it is a good time to plant flowers from seeds or from bedding plants. Plant now and enjoy the colors in the yard all summer. Some of them will likely need to be trimmed and all will need fertilized occasionally to encourage new growth and more blooms, but the response of the plants to that care is part of the gratification of gardening. Use a fertilizer that is lower in nitrogen and higher in phosphorus and potassium. Nitrogen will help with lots of new green foliage, the other two help with flowering, so choose based on what kind of growth you are looking for. Plant either annuals, which are plants that grow for only one season, then die (petunias alyssum, pansies), or perennials (Shasta daisy, rudbeckia,etc.) that die back at the season's end, but come up on new growth the next spring. Both need some care at the end of the season, either pulled up for the annuals or cut back for the perennials but both can be satisfying plants for adding color - vibrant or subtle - all spring and

summer long.

As we go into the warmer weather we encounter pesky insects that will be encountered

all summer long, and they will need to be controlled. Aphids are very common and they appear in what seems like overnight They are commonly controlled by being sprayed with an insecticide, though that is not the only means of control. Controlling the ants in the same area helps to control aphids. Ants like the sticky honeydew left behind by aphids. Ants will move aphids to different places, thus starting new colonies of them. They can be hosed off with a strong stream of water or sprayed with an insecticidal soap or Neem oil, all of which are non- toxic and will usually need to be repeated occasionally. If you have citrus trees, watch carefully for little white spots occurring on the limbs and in the crotches of the limbs. They are likely to be the first sign of mealy bugs that spread and look more like a cottony scale than they do an insect. Most insecticides will get rid of the problem, but be sure to add a few drops of liquid detergent to the spray solution which will help it penetrate the fuzzy outer coating. It will need to be repeated about every seven to ten days to eradicate any newly hatched insects. Lady bugs are very good helpers at controlling insects. Praying Mantis are one of the best natural controls for insects so welcome them to your yard, even if they might be a bit scary to kids, considering the size they can be with those big eyes and head that can turn.

As we approach winter each year we usually suggest that the basins that were created during the past summer to help keep trees well watered need to be cut to allow them to drain and negate the pos-

sibility of root rot during winter because of the lack of drainage. Now would be the time to repair the basin walls to help deep water the trees during the summer heat. While checking your fruit trees, also look at them to see if thinning the fruit is needed to in order to help develop larger fruit. There should be abo six inch spacing between the developing fruits. It is pretty much optional on older trees, but on young trees some of the limbs are not yet strong enough to bear the weight of a bumper crop of fruit. It can be hard to pick off perfectly good, not yet ripe fruit that will ripen to very good fruit. It is definitely disappointing to find a limb full of fruit broken off the tree when it could have done well with a little bit of thinning. it will be almost necessary to have a routine for irrigating in our vards to be sure that everything is getting what it needs to flourish during the hottest part of our year in California. Some folks are fortunate to have irrigating systems to take care of it, but even they may need checking if they haven't recently been used. If you don't have an irrigating system at all, a simple one is pretty easy to do and saves a lot of time. The plastic tubing and the little sprinklers or drippers that you plug into it are readily available, easy to use, and not very expensive. You can be quite innovative once you get started. A simple one is a worthy project and makes life a little easier.

# Area African-American Pioneers – 1848-1900

In the Spring of 1858. news reached California that gold had been discovered on the Fraser River in British Columbia. During that time, many African Americans were beginning to feel insecure in California. The Fugitive Slave Law, passed in 1852, protected only the rights of the slave-owner. As an example, this Law allowed for temporary residence of slaveholders, who could bring slaves to work in California, sell these slaves or return South with them. In addition, anyone who

arrived in California before statehood as either a slave or a runaway was still regarded a slave. And although the Fugitive Slave Law expired in 1855; unfortunately, many African Americans were carried back into slavery. And It was not until 1858, that the status of freedom from bondage of California African Americans was upheld. For this was the year that produced California's last and most famous fugitive slave case which revolved around a young African American by the name of Archy Lee.

#### THE ARCHY LEE CASE

Lee, age 18, migrated from Mississippi in 1857 with his owner Charles Stovall. When Stovall attempted to send him back South, Lee refused to leave. It appears he had previously "mingled" with the free African American community in Sacramento where Lee was urged to flee from Stovall. Upon his escape, Lee was arrested by police as a fugitive.

Lawyers were then hired to defend Lee. Ed-

ward D. Baker became the chief attorney on his defense team. Baker, a Republican leader in California, was the perfect defender, as he was also a personal friend of the President

After much debate, Lee

eventually received his

freedom. Unfortunately, the notoriety of his case showed the degree to which the freedom of African Americans in California was subject to abuse. Many began to feel insecure and looked for other locations to build a new life. And with the news of the gold discovery, it is estimated that over 400 African Americans left California to settle in Canada, where they could be free from prejudice and legal restrictions. According to research, the majority settled in Victoria and on Saltspring Island. Archy Lee was one of them.

#### THE MOVE TO BRITISH COLUMBIA

Among the few area residents who looked for new opportunities upon hearing of the Frazer River gold strike were family members of James and Elizabeth Segee. The Segees first arrived in San Francisco from Florida in 1852 and soon after settled in Marysville where they opened a laundry.

In 1853 they were joined by Mary and Julia Hernandez, sisters of Elizabeth, who were also from Florida. When news of the gold strike reached them in 1858, both Mary and Julia decided to go to British Columbia where they served as cooks at a wage of \$100 a week.

Later the Segees sent their daughter Emma to Canada to be with her aunts and also be educated in the public school where they resided.

According to Delilah Beasley in her account in "The Negro Trail Blazers of California", Emma remained in Canada for seven years. When she returned to Marysville, she married a Mr. Washington and was given a position as the "first colored public school teacher" in that city.

Although many found success in Canada, a few African Americans chose other countries to make a new life. John P. Williams, a New Jersey-born African American barber from Marysville, went with his wife to Haiti in 1861. Unfortunately, conditions were so bad that his wife died of a tropical disease and Williams returned in ill health to New York. He once wrote to an Eastern black weekly, where he warned others about Haiti and how he found employment opportunities "nonexistent".

With the exception of Williams, the African American barber community remained virtually intact in Marysville during the Victoria and Haiti migrations. And although life moved along at a contented pace, there were still obstacles to overcome for area African Americans including the "the right of testimony" and homestead rights.

# Cattle ranchers report improved rangeland condition

Green grass on California pastures encourages cattle ranchers, who say late winter and spring rains will help them rebuild their herds. Many ranchers reduced their herds during the state's multi-year drought, and feared they might have to make further reductions before late winter and spring rains revived grasses. Ranchers say they will also need to monitor availability of drinking water for cattle on mountain rangeland during the coming sum-

# Water projects raise supply allocations

The late surge of precipitation in California has led to improved water supplies, though reservoir managers remain conservative. The State Water Project said Tuesday it has increased supplies to 30 percent of customers' requests, up from the previous 20 percent. The federal Central Valley Project had earlier announced it would raise allocations to 40 percent for agricultural customers south of the delta, and provide full supplies for northern customers.

#### Farmers monitor onceflooded farmland

Farmers whose orchards and vineyards flooded during the heavy rains of 2017 report mixed results as they monitor their land a year later. One Sacramento County farmer who lost walnut trees due to riverbank seepage says he has planted safflower on the land to help it recover before planting new trees. A San Joaquin Coun-

ty farmer whose young almond trees drowned has replaced them with grapes, and says a mature vineyard that flooded appears to have recovered fine.

# Report outlines impact of Chinese tariffs

California has been one of the main states affected by Chinese tariffs on agricultural products, according to a new report. China imposed the tariffs earlier this month in a dispute about U.S. tariffs on imported steel and aluminum. The organization Farmers for Fair Trade says California products such as tree nuts, wines, oranges and grapes will be affected. The report will be discussed at a news conference scheduled Thursday at a Lodi-area winery.

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

#### Are commodities waking up?

Simply put, commodities are the things that the things we might buy are made of. They include items such as certain food stuffs, energy fuels, metals and precious metals. You might assume that a booming economy would increase demand for commodities. It seems a logical conclusion but note I didn't say a booming stock market, although a rising stock market is sometimes mistaken for a booming economy. The fact remains sometimes it is and sometimes it isn't.

Look at the stock market since 2010. Although measured by the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) which has more than tripled from late spring 2009 to where it is today, these basic items called commodities have languished. In a Feb 20th, 2017 article by Forbes entitled "Commodities have been down for so long...." author Daniel Fisher summed up the stark reality of commodities performance by saying "The U.S. Commodity Index Fund, not surprisingly, has a five-year record of negative 8.4% a year"

This would cause some to ask: why, if the market is rising for so many years, are commodities not participating in the increase?

That was a question I answered in my December 13, 2017 article entitled "Commodities- Is the rally for real" which basically put forth the argument the stock market rally might not be because of the increased demand for stuff, but rather just an increase in the demand of stock ownership.

Fast forward to today and in taking another look at commodities since that article hit the airwaves, there is indeed some signs some might argue that the bungee cord type of relationship between the stock market and commodities might finally be reaching its snap back point.

In a recent article by Greg Guenther entitled "Revealed: A New Commodity Rally has Arrived", he makes the argument that commodities may finally be being pulled upwards by real demand by manufactures who in turn are responding to a real increase in demand by consumers buying more stuff. Energy prices have popped

higher in April along with the precious metal gold whose price is stealthily approaching its January 2018 highs. The next milestone so says Mr. Guenther, is gold's next stop of the July 2016 high of \$1,377.00 an ounce. Meanwhile Guenther notes that shares of companies that mine the metal have yet to confirm an upward trend in the yellow metal of Midas and therefore commodities in general. The industrial metal

copper also plays an important part to trying to predict where things might go or so some analysts believe. Dr. Copper as copper is sometimes called for its purported relationship to future market movements. is also rising and testing its January highs. It is believed by some that copper, being used in many an industrial application, and will rise in price as industrial products become more in demand. Copper it is thought can therefore sniff out a coming rally in the stock market. Copper popped 3% on April 20th causing those that believe Dr. Copper is indeed a precursor to market movement to sit up and take notice. As indicated in my above referenced December article on the validity of the stock market rally and its relationship to commodities, I am of the opinion that if this market rally is for real, the rise in commodity pricing will eventually have to follow.

Only time will tell if Dr. Copper will continue its ascent and follow the recent rise in the energy and gold

sectors, but if not, it won't be the first convincing head fake that fools those believing in such relationships and it likely won't be the last. Once again we realize hindsight is foresight and only in hindsight will we know if recent price increase in certain asset classes are indeed telling us which way the markets will go.

Keep in mind no one can predict future market movements with certainty and that includes Dr. Copper and its followers or any other asset class one may tend to look at.

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
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
