Stonyford's Superb Seventy-Fifth Show

Superb in every way describes the 75th Annual Stonyford Rodeo held on May 5 and 6, 2018. The weather on both days was balmy and slightly overcast. The crowd--estimated at over 2,050 fans on Saturday and 1,400 on Sunday--filled the stadium with their cheering and clapping. The amateur and professional contestants delivered exciting action with their riding and animalhandling skills. The bucking stock made the cowboys work hard for their small victories. The entertainers-announcer Don Jesser, clown/barrelman J. J. Harrison and specialty act, John Payne delighted the crowd with their professionalism—especially, the one-arm Payne with his superb riding and whip-handling skills. And, the rodeo professionals bullfighters, pickup men, Queen girls, and gate-handling cowboys—demonstrated their remarkable skills in protecting the cowboys, clearing stock from the arena, and otherwise keeping the rodeo running efficiently.

The rodeo began on both days with the Flying Cossacks entering and circling the arena. They were a locally grown team of eight trick-riding children, seven of whom are members of the extended Moore family. An earlier generation of Moore family members was instrumental in starting this rodeo 75 years ago, in 1943. Carmel Moore Ellerman, her four daughters, and niece represented the Flying Cossacks. Carmel was the team's teacher, coach, mother, and aunt. Daughters Mette Ellerman Jones, Tami Ellerman Thompson, Fawn Ellerman Mendoza, and Jozell Ellerman, along with their niece, Karen (Gay) Moore were performers. The other three performers not present were Carmel's son Troy Ellerman, her niece Debbi Moore Ingram, and their friend from Paskenta, Casey Weston. As a team, the Flying Cossacks last appeared in Stonyford in 1987—they finished their trick-riding careers at the 1991 NFR (National Rodeo Finals) in Las Vegas.

Also on both days, Stonyford honored local area veterans with a horizontal unrolling of a large Stars-and-Stripes flag being held by members of the Maxwell American Legion Post. On Saturday, Senator Jim Nielsen presented the Stony Creek Horsemen's Association with a framed California legislative resolution honoring the organization for its 75 years of rodeo.

Following these ceremonies, the rodeo began with novice bull riding that was followed by bareback riding, team roping, junior steer riding, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding, tie-down roping, WPRA barrel racing, and bull riding. Intermixed with all this rodeo action were the dedication to Barry and Sandy Corbin, the crowd-pleasing Mutton Bustin' and the exciting specialty act: John Payne, the One-Arm Bandit. His act showcased his one-arm riding and bullwhipping skills while herding two shaggy American buffalo onto the top of a long stock-hauling trailer.

Eight cowboys competed in the Novice Bull Riding, three on Saturday and five on Sunday. They rode hard but none was able

to remain on their bulls for the eight seconds needed to qualify. Seven men wrestled steers on Saturday and another seven on Sunday. The most memorable contest was Saturday's Johnny B. Fruiht, of Santa Rosa, who rolled over with the steer three times before emerging upright and wrestling it to the ground. Unfortunately, he broke the barrier, which added ten seconds to his remarkable 14.4-second time. Three cowboys on Saturday and three on Sunday successfully subdued their steers. Sunday's Blaine Jones won \$1,465 with his 5.5-second time. Three others finished in the money: Dillon Hushour, 2nd place; Dane Browning, 3rd place; and Ryle Smith, 4th place.

Four riders on Saturday and five on Sunday competed in Junior Steer Riding. The steers got the better of both days' events, with only one contestant qualifying on each day. Braedyn Schweninger won the event with an 89-point ride, and Hughes Hunter came in second at 72-points.

Bareback riding, always exciting, was especially so this year. Four men rode each day, and seven of the eight qualified with good scores, the lowest being 64 points. The eighth man, Sunday's Cauy Pool, delivered the most unusual performance. On the third buck after leaving the chute, his horse, Black Berry Juice, went to ground, then rolled upright with Cauy still aboard. Cauy stayed with this bucking fool through the 8-second buzzer and bucked on for another second or two before a pickup man lifted him off. It was a hell of a ride, but no score. He got a re-ride later in the rodeo, but finished out of the money. Sunday's Grant Denny won \$940 with his 82point ride. Wyatt Denny, at 79.5 points; Casey Meroshnekoff, at 79 points, and Brent Bannon, at 75 points, finished in the money.

Nineteen roping teams competed for money in the Team Roping events. Each team has two ropers, one for the animal's head (header) and one for its rear legs (heeler). Most failed in their roping; however, seven made the grade: five on Saturday and two on Sunday. Saturday's Doyle Hoskins (heeler) and Joseph Shawnego (header) won \$1,465 each with their 5.2-second time. Five other teams finished in the money.

Seventeen cowboys enrolled in Saddle Bronc Riding: seven on Saturday and ten on Sunday. Fewer than half had qualifying rides: four on Saturday and four on Sunday. In retrospect, after viewing the video, Saturday's Rowdy Stone had the most poignant ride: he made the buzzer but committed a disqualifying technical violation. The photo reveals his agony, as he squatted in the arena for a second or two, after gracefully leaving his horse. Johnny Espeland took home the 1st place money of \$1,147 with his 81-point ride. Three others

Yuba-Sutter Political Notes

Sutter County District Attorney Amanda Hopper in an Appeal-Democrat article accused her opponent Chris Carlos and her former Chief Investigator Jason Parker of conspiring together and making a You Tube video of her cousin Michael Bartschi. Bartschi says on the video that Hopper repeatedly molested him when they were children.

However, Bartschi never had contact with Carlos or Parker. He did initiate an ongoing interaction with a community member for 4-5 weeks before the video surfaced. The citizen says the emails from Bartschi were provided to writer Jake Abbott at the Appeal-Democrat showing the information and how it came to the community. Facebook messages, voicemails and emails to Abbott, Rachel Rosenbaum and the newspaper editor were never acknowledged.

The Appeal then published the story where Hopper falsely accused Carlos and Parker of creating the dust-up regarding Bartschi's molestation accusation. The paper not only ran the story but did not include the information sent to them contradicting Hopper's claim.

Does anyone recall US United Nations Ambassador Susan Rice lying on 5 Sunday talk shows saying the assault on the US Embassy in Benghazi, Libya was due to a video trailer mocking Muslims? Hillary Clinton, President Obama and the media also were complicit in that tale.

Whether Bartschi's accusations have any merit or not, a District Attorney concocting a story and the daily newspaper going along with it is not good news for the community however the election turns-out.

Farmer and water profits reformer Charlie Mathews won a seat on the Yuba County Water Agency (YCWA) in 2016 by saying to Yuba County citizens "Your Water, Your Money." His initiative to let the county voters decide how Bullards Bar Dam water and power sales profits would be divided more fairly among cities, agencies, districts and community members was illegally blocked by YCWA directors. The citizens were deprived of their constitutional right to vote on the profits but elected Charlie anyway.

Obama Ed Heads Say Boycott Schools

Arne Duncan and Peter Cunningham who served in President Obama's Department of Education think a mass boycott where parents remove their kids from schools would provoke Congress to make more laws restricting the purchase and use of guns. Their comments came after the latest school shooting in Santa Fe, Texas.

"This is brilliant and tragically necessary," said former Secretary of Education Duncan about the boycott idea. "What if no children went to school until gun laws changed to keep them safe? My family is all in if we can do this at scale. Parents, will you please join us?"

Mr. Cunningham, former Department of Education Assistant Secretary for Communications and Outreach and now the executive director of Education Post, wrote an article suggesting parents keep their kids out of school starting September 4 until Congress passes "background checks for all gun purchases, a ban on assault weapons and high capacity magazines, and funding for gun research."

"Maybe it's time for America's 50 million school parents to simply pull their kids out of school until we have better gun laws," Cunningham tweeted.

Duncan's 7-year tenure as Education Secretary was noted for lousy student scores and forbidding charter schools to poor families and minorities stuck in glorified childcare.

Neither Duncan nor Cunningham provided any logic or substance as to how their new restrictions would insure student safety. In fact, many political leaders and department heads at state and federal levels are protected by armed security 24-hours a day. Furthermore, anywhere other than schools in the nation where safety and security are required, armed officials are standing by.

Why there is a liberal blind spot and double standard regarding safety and guns makes one question whether students really are the concern versus dead children being used as an excuse to remove guns from law abiding citizens. Campus violence is being used to leverage an agenda to undermine the Second Amendment.

Campus shootings could be ended immediately if states

However, Charlie survived the hit-mail and robo-call blitz and now farmers are boycotting his rice drying business. Someone said somewhere that the love of money is the root of all evil. So far, Charlie's former opponent Tib Belza, the YCWA directors and the pumpers believe the only evil one here is Charlie questioning the water and power cartel.

Life is a Gamble

I often ask people why they didn't sell out their stocks during the 2008/09 crisis and a concrete answer is usually not forthcoming. Many respond with a perplexed look like they themselves never asked the question. Indeed I know answer and it oddly can be best illustrated using the neon lit halls of a gambling casino and a slot machine

as a teaching aide. Not that investing is like pulling a slot machine handle although there are some that do draw the similarities but I am not one of them.

Suppose you go into casino and pony up to a slot machine and promptly lose \$100.00, something that not hard to do as some of you know. What most people do next is predictable. Not so much as to when but what most will eventually do is at some point get up and leave. They've basically lost enough and elect to not lose anymore. What they don't do is continue to drain their entire life savings and keep playing.

Fast forward to the investor and his life savings in a brokerage account. When markets fall a common brain disease may take place in both the advisor and investors mind at the same time and it's so common one might call it a plague when markets

It goes something like this: The investor sees his portfolio drop by say 5% and thinks "its not down far enough to worry" and his advisor, who is usually paid by how much he manages, confirms the investors thought and says the same. Now suppose the market continues to fall. Down 10%. The thought "You're not down far enough" is repeated by both parties, Ditto at 15%, 20%, and 25%, then something magical happens in the mid-brain and at some point the mindset changes from "you're not down far enough" to "you're down too far to get out now".

Sound familiar?

Now compare that to our gambling friend. Does he continue to think he's down too far to get out now and hit the ATM until it catches fire thinking all the while he's down too far to get out and should stay in and keep gambling?

No. What he does is exercise prudent money management, gets up and leaves.

Not so however when one gambles their life savings in a brokerage account. From not down far enough to down too far, our poor investor is actually worse off than the gambling addict. At least the addict leaves at some point while the investors straps himself in for the continuing ride downhill if it indeed continues to plummet with no exit strategy.

This is the reason why minor losses can turn into painful wipeouts and why many people still don't have plan for the next rout if it occurs and how they will deal with it.

Investing is indeed not to be confused with gambling on a slot machine but when it comes to calling it a day, the slot player may indeed have a better plan and a brighter future than the average investor.

finished with money.

Seventeen cowboys also competed in Tie-Down Roping. Thirteen got their calves successfully lassoed and immobilized. Jordan Ketscher, last year's All-Around Cowboy, won \$913 with his 9.3-second time. Five others finished with money.


Up to this point, it was a male-only rodeo; but women also competed near the end. Their event was WPRA (Women's Professional Rodeo Association) Barrel Racing Ten women competed on Saturday and nine on Sunday. Stonyford's own Vicky Cook took 1st place and \$910, with her 17.26-second ride. Seven other women scored cash prizes ranging from \$791 for 2nd place to \$79 for 8th place.

Finally, it was time for Bull Riding—professional rodeo's most exciting event. Stonyford divided this event into two sections in which ten riders competed on Saturday and another ten on Sunday. This year the bulls won two fewer contests than in three of the last four years. Four cowboys stayed up for eight seconds this year, as compared with only two in 2014, 2015, and 2017 Twenty-sixteen was a banner year for the cowboys: five of them hung on for the full eight seconds. This year Lon Danley's 83.5-second ride took the 1st place prize money of \$1,247. The other three qualifiers, Ryan McConnel (83), Chase Dougherty (81.5) and Colton Dougherty (71) took home decreasing amounts of \$970, \$727, and \$520, respectively.

If this was not enough for Stonyford's diehard fans, "slack" events followed each day's rodeo. Saturday had seven barrel-race and nine team-roping competitions. Sunday had eight barrel-race and twenty-five team-rop-

ing contests. This year's All-Around Cowboy was Doyle Hoskins,

who won \$1,623 in tie-down roping and team roping.

YC Needs Sales Tax Boost "Eat Sugar".

Another reason for a needed boost: Annexation of the South Area will cost all Yuba City taxpavers about \$300,000 every year. An annual subsidy to cover costs of additional YC police officers hired specifically for the new Beat 6. That beat is the "Key Hole" area and the Walton area. It will take about one year to transition to YC police from our county sheriff. Will YC will be able to hire and retain all these new officers? The startup cost alone tied to annexation is over \$1 Million.

Yuba City certified they had the financial ability to provide services to the new area of Yuba City. In the last two years Cal Pers has greatly intensified demands on the Yuba City budget. Those demands could not have been anticipated mainly because Cal Pers lowered their expected rate of return. Yuba City should simply admit their future budgets will not support this annexation. Ah-ha! Here is where the possible sales tax

comes in. Without a sales

tax boost you can count on service cutbacks in a few years. Possibly less police officers, not more? YC financial certification is now untrue.

The possible 1% boost in sales tax was revealed in a document published by Yuba City senior staff related to a March workshop and a May 1 council meeting. It needs council OK to advance to a November ballot measure.

We are urging YC council to consider this very soon so there will be plenty of time for YC shoppers to tell council their views. YC taxpayers should also know that any tax measure will carry a hefty charge from the Sutter County elections office. Not to mention the charge to taxpayers for the study already done by FM3 of Oakland. Is there no local firm can do that study? What about "shopping local? Yuba City wants you to "shop local". Does YC senior staff follow that ap-

SR 70 Safety Project?

Caltrans seems bent the future and to increase on what they term a safety project; widening State Route 70 through District 10, north of Marysville to the Butte/Yuba county line. Their initial goal is to make the new highway three lanes, one each way, with a continuous left turn lane in the center. They call this a safety improvement but it will not be safer. There are three lanes now between Noble Road and Woodruff Lane and residents of District 10 refer to this middle lane as a "Suicide" lane due to the fact that so many impatient drivers use this as an illegal passing lane. This is particularly problematic during the fruit, nut and rice seasons, with 40 ton trucks; as many as 200 per ag station per day entering and exiting the highway. It is also a huge problem in the fog. Also, there are over 200 driveways, connecting roads and farm roads entering or crossing the highway.

Caltrans' stated position is that they intend to buy enough right-ofway now, to expand the highway to five lanes in the speed limit to 65mph (which will of course, in reality, mean 75). This will move more traffic, faster into the bottleneck of Marysville. Frequently, traffic is backed up now from the intersection of highways 20 and 70 on the east side of Ellis Lake, north three miles to Saddleback Drive and south from the E Street bridge to Erle Road. Highway 20 quite often backs up to 17th street. Having this stop-and-go traffic, both cars and trucks, adjacent to Marysville High School and 1 block from Covillaud School will be an increased health risk for our students and the residents of Marysville. As it is now, people don't come into our city unless they have to, or to pass through it to get from one

place to another. Caltrans is willing and intends to spend 141 million, plus, of taxpayer money on a "Bandaid" that won't even cover the wound. Even they call it a temporary fix. Marysville will surely have to be by-passed in the very near future. In the meantime, it is ludicrous and irresponsible to squander that much hard-earned, taxpayer money on a temporary solution that is not a solution at all. AND, to ruin the agricultural community of District 10 and the City of Marysville in the process. This is a bell that cannot be unrung. It is estimated that 35-40 homes will be affected in Historic District 10 alone.

It seems that the collective ego and mismanagement of Caltrans will not allow them to even consider any other alternatives, such as a by-pass. Very sad. With a proper by-pass, most of the problems would be solved and motorists would be able to travel from Chico and Oroville to Sacramento and beyond, unimpeded. Also it would provide a true escape route from Oroville Dam problems and possible flooding of the Feather River, and not into a flood plain, where the levees are the only levees in the county that are not certified.

Sweden has the most welcoming asylum policies and most generous welfare programs in the European Union.

So how are things working out in the most immigration-friendly country on the planet?

Not so well, says Tino Sanandaji. Mr. Sanandaji is himself an immigrant, a Kurdish-Swedish economist who was born in Iran and moved to Sweden when he was 10. He has

In Sweden, where equality is revered, inequality is now entrenched. Forty-two per cent of the long-term unemployed are immigrants. Fifty-eight per cent of welfare payments go to immigrants. Fortyfive per cent of children with low test scores are immigrants. Immigrants on average earn less than 40 per cent of Swedes. The majority of people charged with murder, rape and robbery are either first- or second-generation immigrants.

Sweden's fantasy is that if you socialize the children of immigrants and refugees correctly, they'll grow up to be just like native Swedes. But it hasn't worked out that way. Much of the second generation lives in nice Swedish welfare ghettos. The social strains – white flight, a general decline in trust - are growing worse. The immigrant-heavy city of Malmo, just across the bridge from Denmark, is an economic and social basket case.

Sweden's generosity costs a fortune, at a time when economic growth is stagnant. The country now spends about \$4-billion a year on settling new refugees – up from \$1-billion a few years ago, Mr. Sanandaji said. And they keep coming. Sweden automatically accepts unaccompanied minors. "We used to take in 500 unaccompanied minors a year," he said. "This year we are expecting 12,000."

Sweden is a cautionary tale for anyone who believes that Europe is capable of assimilating the hundreds of thousands of refugees and migrants who are besieging the continent, or the millions more who are desperately poised to follow in their wake. The argument that these people are vital to boost the economy - that they will magically create economic growth and bail the Europeans out of their demographic decline - is

a fantasy.

It's really very simple, Mr. Sanandaji explained. You can't combine open borders with a welfare state. "If you're offering generous welfare benefits to every citizen, and anyone can come and use these benefits, then a very large number of people will try to do that. And it's just mathematically impossible for a small country like Sweden to fund those benefits."

Things will get worse before they get better. As Judy Dempsey, a senior analyst at a Berlin think tank, told The Wall Street Journal, "Europe hasn't seen anything yet in terms of the numbers or the backlash."

Meanwhile, Sweden's neighbor, Denmark, has cut the benefits for refugees in half, and has taken out ads in Lebanese newspapers warning would-be migrants to stay home. The Danes don't want to be a moral superpower. They can't afford it.

Arts Festival Is Coming to Live Oak

The Murals of Live Oak (MOLO) project is entering its second year of creating crowd-pleasing works of public art throughout the City. Have you seen the giant train in "Railroading Away" on the back of the Live Oak Pharmacy, the nostalgic mural "Looking Back" on the Broadway Lounge or the new epic mural underway on the Live Oak Library called "Connected"? MOLO represents an ongoing collaboration between the City of Live Oak and Yuba Sutter Arts with the goal of inviting residents and visitors to "take a second look" at the hidden treasures in the community.

This mural season, Yuba Sutter Arts will "up the ante" by conducting a Mural Marathon. Five outstanding local mural artists will each paint a 10'x14' mural in 48 hours from start to finish. The artists were hand-picked by the MOLO Committee based on the renderings they submitted. The images are breathtaking and won't be revealed until the event. All five murals will be painted on the same wall which is on an unoccupied building at the



corner of Elm and Broadway. The wall contains five distinct, framed sections that will provide the perfect backdrop for the murals.

The participating artists are Rebecca Wallace -Yuba College Art Instructor, Whitney Still - River Valley High School Art Instructor, Rodney Herrera - Owner Elegant Arts Tattoo Studio, Roberto Valdés Sánchez -professional artist and Aaron Burks - US Navy and Army Veteran and professional artist.

Start time for the Mural Marathon will be 4pm on Thursday, June 14. Yuba Sutter Arts will provide lighting so that artists who so choose will be able to work through the night. "Brushes (or spray cans) down" will be at 4pm on Saturday, June 16. Winners will be announced between 5 and 5:30pm on

the 16th during the adjacent Live Oak Mural and Art Festival. All mural artists will have received a stipend of \$750 for supplies and materials. The first place winner will receive an additional \$2,000, second place - \$1,000 and third place - \$750. Each mural will include an image of a live oak tree and a hidden, non-sequitur object to encourage the viewer to take a closer look. The concurrent Arts Festival to be held on Saturday as part of the wrap up festivities from 3 - 8pm will feature other local artists displaying their work, along with music, food vendors, and other businesses and community organizations. The event is free and the community is invited to come out and cheer on their favorite muralist right up until the completion countdown.

"For a number of years, Reno has held a Mural Marathon and we asked 'why not here?'" said David Read, YSA Executive Direc-"The Reno event is massive, the murals much larger and the artists only have 24 hours to complete their designs, but we didn't want to hurt anyone so decided on a more humane 48 hour time frame," he added.

Live Oak recently received a \$10 million federal Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery or TIGER grant for its Live Oak Streetscape Project that will help transform the Highway 99 corridor into a boulevard-like main street. The Murals of Live Oak are a component of this renaissance in the community.
