North Yuba Water District *Maintenance and Repairs to Irrigation Ditches*

Brownsville, Ca
North Yuba Water District (NYWD) will begin maintenance, grooming and a series of repairs and piping projects to their approximately 22 miles of irrigation ditches.

In addition to domestic water service, NYWD provides irrigation water to 119 customers in Dobbins and Oregon House. Irrigation customers were informed last month that there would be no irrigation water this season due to a number of reasons, including onerous contractual obligations with neighboring South Feather Water and Power (SFWP), significant water losses along the unpiped Forbestown Ditch and continued drought conditions.

While the irrigation ditches are dry this summer, NYWD will perform a series of maintenance and repairs:

- Inmate work crews are set to start this week clearing

overgrown areas.

- The District's recently purchased excavator will be put to use to de-silt and shape the irrigation ditches.

- The excavator's flail mower attachment will be used to remove debris and vegetation.

- Ten sections of the irrigation ditch that traditionally experience the greatest seepage issues, totaling approximately 1,700 linear feet (about 1/3 mile), will be piped.

- "Walter's Y," the convergence point of the three sections of irrigation ditches, will be rebuilt with reinforced concrete and larger head gates.

"It's important that we make productive use of this dry season and complete as many maintenance and repair projects as we can for our irrigation customers," said Maupin, "so if Mother Nature gives us a good year again, we can stretch supply a little

further."

Through a \$500,000 State grant, NYWD is currently in the planning and engineering phase to pipe the full ten miles of the Forbestown Ditch. Moving to a piped Forbestown Ditch would save a significant amount of water lost from seepage and evaporation, eliminate a vast majority of dirt, trash and contamination from entering the treatment pond and increase the amount of water available for irrigation customers. The total project is estimated between \$8 Million and \$14 Million. Potential funding sources for the construction phase of the project include Prop 1 grants and financing through the Yuba County Water Agency.

Check 7 If You Really Feel Scammed

This week, Yuba County residents received a "survey" asking 7 questions about their priorities for public safety. The survey is disingenuous and a bit of a scam. It is set-up by the county to sell an upcoming sales tax increase.

The questions ask if you prefer adequate law enforcement, curbing child and elder abuse, maintaining roads and veteran's services, having professional fire protection, supervising high risk offenders and finally do you care how fast police and fire show-up?

Of course, this survey is designed to scare the hell out of people unless they cough-up more cash while ignoring other options to reform government.

If this fake survey addressed health and quality of life issues it would ask whether you would like to remain cancer-free, check 1 for least important and 7 for very important. Next, would you prefer tap water without arsenic? Answer 1 for whatever and 7 for a little arsenic is OK. How about eating each day? Mark 1 if kind of important and 7 means I really love to eat. Finally, check 1 if hitting your finger with a hammer is no big deal or 7 if you like all your fingers.

Did Yuba County tax payers pay for this survey? No wonder we're broke.

According to Transparentcalifornia.com, in 2016 Yuba County had 1013 part and fulltime employees to serve fewer than 75,000 residents. Four "public servants" earned over \$250,000 each. Eleven earned more than \$200,000. Forty-four made in excess of \$150,000 and 81 received over \$125,000. Finally, 197 earned over \$100,000. (Median Yuba Co household income is \$48,739 (2016) which includes all working family members.)

Once county employees retire they get pensions funded not by their investments alone but backed by the citizens' taxes in the general fund. With Cal PERS (retirement fund) failing, that means current taxes will pay for past supervisor promises to retirees. Thus, the county wants more local taxes to continue living beyond its means.

Former LA County Sheriff Lee Baca was found guilty of lying to the FBI to hide abusing inmates in his jail. He now gets a \$342,000 annual Cal PERS retirement. Public employees convicted of felonies keep their retirements.

The Yuba Co survey is like sending your son to the store with \$50 to get groceries to feed the family. He spends half the money on unauthorized items then you get a text. If lettuce is really important, check 7. If it can wait, check 1. How about potatoes - 7 or 1? Mike, eggs, and so on. The kid never suggests what may have happened with the missing funds.

Since the Constitutional mandate of a county is to provide emergency services why wouldn't county leaders assume that

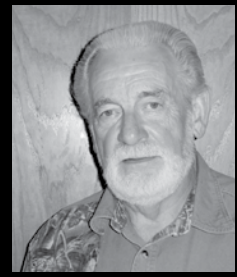

Reclamation Districts' Levee Roads to Receive Much-Needed Repairs

MARYSVILLE, Calif. (May 17, 2018) -- The roads used to maintain the levee that reduces flood risk to agricultural land in southern Yuba County will receive much-needed repairs

with the help of a grant from Yuba County Water Agency. The \$50,000 grant, approved this week by the water agency, will cover the local cost-share for repairs to the deteriorat-

ed levee patrol roads in Reclamation District 817 and Reclamation District 784, which provide all-weather access on the levee and enable effective emergency response for managing residual flood risks.

"Reducing flood risk for farmers and ranchers benefits Yuba County and the economy," said YCWA Board Chairman Brent Hastey. "These repairs will ensure access for the reclamation districts, so that they can continue to effectively maintain the levee that provides valuable protection for agriculture."

This funding will supplement an additional \$420,000 from the California Department of Water Resources for both districts to repair seven miles of levee patrol roads. The total project is expected to cost approximately \$470,000.

"This is a great example of how we use YCWA grants to leverage state and federal dollars," added Hastey.

Reclamation Districts 784 and 817 are responsible for maintaining the levee that reduces flood risk to agricultural lands in south Yuba County on the east side of the Western Pacific Interceptor Canal and north of Dry Creek and the Bear River.

"These patrol roads provide crucial access that allows us to monitor, inspect and maintain the levees protecting our farmland," said Reclamation District 817 President Joe Conant. "This grant will cover the local cost of the gravel road repairs necessary for us to be able to access the levees year-round, regardless of the weather."

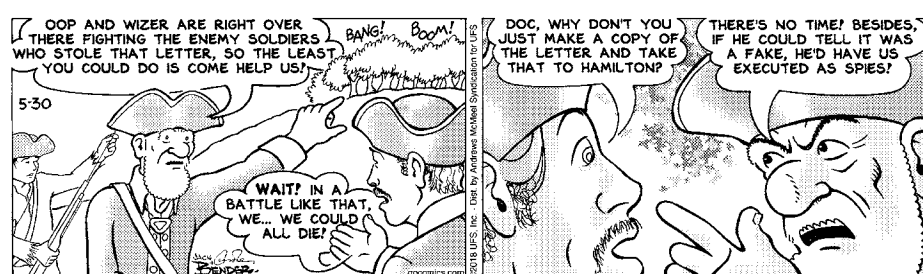
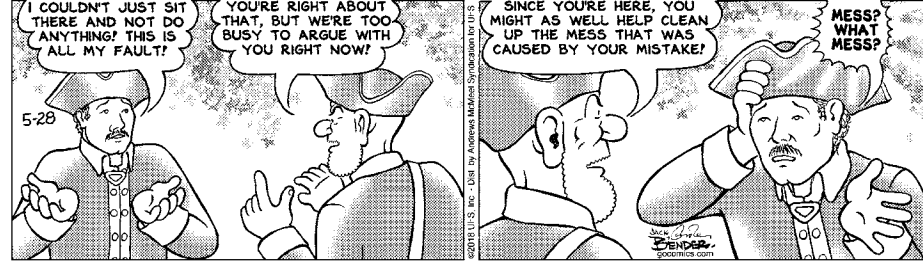
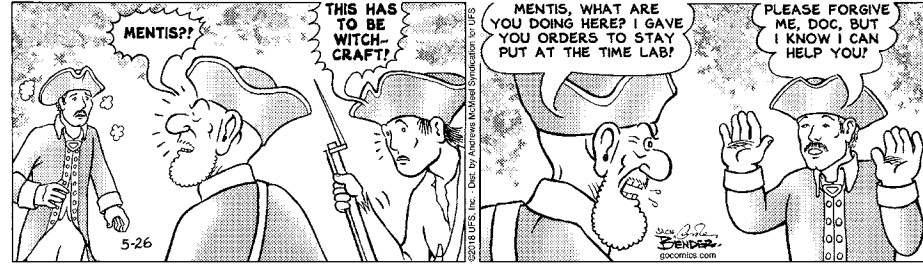

Yuba Feather Museum Opening Day and Chili Cook-off

Saturday, June 2, is the Opening Day for the Yuba Feather Museum and Gold Trader Flat with festivities from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The Museum is located at 19096 New York Flat Road in Forbestown. You will not want to miss the special events we have planned.

“Over 150 years ago in a remote part of the mountains of Northern California, a complete society grew up. In Plumas and Sierra counties alone were numerous communities, La Porte, St. Louis, Howland Flat, Pine Grove, Poker Flat, Onion Valley, Thistle Shaft, Poverty Hill, Scales, just to name a few. History tells us the reason for the rise of these communities: the Discovery of Gold! However, there is less known about the communities and especially the buildings themselves.”

people want these services and then ask what services they don't want at all or want to cut back on?

How about asking should we reduce all budgets a certain percentage and transfer those funds to emergency services? What about asking should we cut supervisors pay (currently \$80,000) by 75% and end their retirement benefits? Could we ask about cancelling all junkets? Let's ask about stopping crony capitalism? All the savings would go to public safety.

Crony capitalism in Sacramento County got the county sued. Two gravel companies were hurt financially due to the county's unethical dealings. The court awarded \$100 million in damages to the affected companies.

There is waste and corruption throughout government. Auditors found legislators spending more than \$3 million on mail to constituents, much of which was sent immediately before elections. Politicians were scamming tax dollars for their political campaigns.

Five officials from the Panoche Water District were arrested and charged for the misuse of taxpayer dollars on personal expenses such as home remodels, housing, and concert tickets. The Attorney General's office estimated that the officials spent as much as \$100,000 of the public's money.

How about those expense and per diem accounts? The new gas taxes apply to everyone but politicians. State legislators used taxpayer-funded credit cards to pay for their gas. From January 1, 2016 to April 2017, legislators charged more than \$137,000 in gas to the taxpayers. That occurs locally as well.

Building a home in Yuba County is nearly impossible due to egregious fees and regulations. And, buying in the newer subdivisions creates financial bondage. An existing 3 bdrm/2 bath, 1360 sq ft Edgewater house will cost \$3803 in taxes and fees annually. A 4 bdrm/3 bath, 3151 sq ft Plumas Lake home has annual taxes and fees of \$5233.

Government today is like going into your favorite restaurant and your \$14 dollar salad is now \$35. Government is way too costly for the average Yuba County resident. In real life the restaurant goes out of business. With government, there is a tax increase to maintain the poor service you used to get for half the cost.

Although solar stocks have gone up and down and down and up with no real clues as to where they might go next, and with a spotty history of success as to returning investor dollars with any positive returns, the latest statistics might point to a change of direction in the future for those throwing their hard earned investment dollars in the sun's direction. California ranks number five in the world geographies in solar capacity. Not too surprising given the number of tree huggers living in the state, as well as having lots of sunshine and also being geographically ginormous. The statistic certainly adds an even a brighter light to

an already sunny state.

Adding even more fuel to the solar fire (pun intended) is the latest ruling from the California Energy Commission which mandated all newly constructed homes have solar panels. There are of course hooks, crooks and stipulations surrounding the new regulation but in a nutshell the amount of solar powered homes is expected to jump six-fold by the year 2020. Putting that in real numbers, today about 15,000 new homes and 135,000 occupied homes are fitted each annually. Those numbers jump to an estimated 100,000 new systems and overall about 235,000 in total.

Of course, few things come without a cost and new home owners will pony up an additional ten grand or more to comply with the mandate. The homebuilders meanwhile aren't too wild about having to raise prices to the home buying public, especially sensitive to the latest figures just out on the number of homes being sold coupled with interest rates on the rise. All this likely spells more difficulty for the homebuilders and it remains to be seen just how these companies will cope with the challenges. Of course there is cheering and jeering on from both sides of the room once again as governmental mandates which alter costs and charges to consumers and companies always manage to stir the pot of debate and this latest regulation is no exception.

No doubt the environmental advocates will cheer on the regulation as a victory for their side while the free market proponents will tout this is just another example of government interference and meddling all the while adding to the ever rising cost of living for the average Joe, not to mention the loss of jobs in the homebuilding industry should sales slow because

of it.

No matter where you stand on the issue, no doubt there will be more solar systems sold and that means the companies that make all things solar may reap the rewards. That being said, investing is never that easy, and be aware that the news is already public and that means it could already be baked into the proverbial cake of stock prices. Additionally the history of solar upstarts is littered with dead bodies and one only needs to look at the last time government dipped its hands into solar when the Obama administration in early 2009 loaned Solyndra 535 million of stimulus money only to see those funds disappear down the rat hole of a bankruptcy filing.

Opps.....

More often than many care to admit, where the government goes, private business often follows in straitjackets meaning central planning and private enterprise usually don't mix well. Investors should heed the not so obvious caveats and use more than due diligence before following the governments lead into solar with their investing dollars.

Food and Farm News

New vote to be held on farm bill

A second vote on federal farm legislation has been set for next month in the U.S. House of Representatives. The bill failed passage last week amid disagreements on immigration policies and nutrition programs. Members of a California Farm Bureau delegation who visited Capitol Hill last week say they will continue to advocate for farm bill programs including those focused on research, conservation, rural development and promotion of agricultural trade.

Study computes economic impact of citrus production

Citrus-fruit production in California contributes more than \$7 billion a year to the state's economy,

according to a study commissioned by the Citrus Research Board. The study computed the value of the fruit itself, the value of materials and services sold to citrus growers and packers, and the household spending of those employed in the citrus business. Citrus production also generates more than 21,000 full-time jobs.

Project looks at adding seaweed to cows' feed

Under a theory being tested at the University of California, Davis, adding a hint of seaweed to cows' feed could help reduce methane emissions from dairy farms. An animal-science professor at the university will demonstrate his project this week. The research tests how a small amount of seaweed in feed affects

cows' digestion, and also whether it has any impact on milk production and flavor. Early results from the study will be published next month.

Foothill farmers cultivate vegetable markets

In the foothills north-east of Sacramento, Nevada County farmers say they're succeeding in finding pockets of land on which to grow vegetables. Farmers produce a variety of vegetable crops while coping with uneven terrain, thin soils and temperature extremes. But cooler summer temperatures allow growers to extend the season for lettuce and other greens. The farmers sell their crops at farmers markets and other direct-marketing outlets.

hired another Frenchman, Augustus Le Plongeon, a surveyor and topographical engineer to lay out a beautiful city, like the ones he was famous for in France.

In planning the new city 11 green spaces, squares and parks were included. They were named after American and French dignitaries. These open spaces gave the infant city great appeal to weary travelers and businessmen alike.

One more scamper around the mulberry bush on the European immigration chaos evolving in Sweden, especially in the coastal Swedish city of Malmo (27 miles from Copenhagen, Denmark to Malmo via a five-mile stretch of bridge and tunnel).

A retired Malmo police chief has noted that Malmo crime has skyrocketed due to uncontrolled immigration and problems in No-Go Zones.

According to Breitbart London, Chief Superintendent Torsten Elofsson retired from police work in 2014 after 42 years on the Malmo police force, but he retains a key interest in the security of the city.

The population of Malmo has grown by 50 per cent in 20 years, but the amount of crimes committed has increased out of all proportion—and the number of officers available to police the streets has halved. Elofsson explains, as Malmo becomes a less easy place to police, officers with any experience request to transfer elsewhere, leaving the force with mainly rookie cops.

"Living here you can see a lot of the crimes are committed by people originating abroad. Look at the unemployment here — you have 15 per cent in Malmo, which is twice the rest of Sweden".

Elofsson further commented, "I live in Malmo and I love this city. But of course it has changed — now we have the bridge from Copenhagen, this is a border town. Most of the drugs going to the rest of Scandinavia comes through here — this is a key route for smuggling drugs, weapons, people, and so on.

Michael Qazvini, in a separate article in part, said Malmo, this once quiet city, is now overrun with violence. The culture of fear is so palpable that parents are no longer

comfortable sending their children out to play.

"You have to look over your shoulder when you go out at night now. I don't let my little brother go out at night any more," said one high school student at a protest in front of city hall. "I hope that the politicians actually view this as a serious problem and start to solve this in Malmo."

Malmo, like Molenbeek, its sister city in Belgium, has become a breeding ground for criminals.

Tove Livvendahl in an article dated September 2016, "We've taken in far too many people and we're letting them down badly — especially the children:

For a British boy to be killed by a grenade attack anywhere is appalling, but for it to happen in a suburb of Gothenburg should shatter a few illusions about Sweden. Last week's murder of eight-year-old Yuusuf Warsame fits a pattern that Swedes have come slowly to recognize over the years. He was from Birmingham, visiting relatives, and was caught up in what Swedish police believe is a gang war within the Somali community. Last year, a four-year-old girl was killed by a car bomb outside Gothenburg, another apparent victim of gang violence.

Integrating adults into Swedish society has been tricky enough, but a much more difficult problem is how to deal with all the unaccompanied children. During the Iraq war, about 400 children arrived without their parents each year — and all of them needed a place to live, social support and proper schooling. In 2014, when the number of children arriving annually hit 7,000, there were serious questions about how Sweden would cope. Last year, just over 35,000 unaccompanied children registered with the authorities.

The children are ev-

ery age and arrive from all kinds of countries. Afghans and Somalis are currently the two biggest groups. Then come Syrians, Ethiopians, Iraqis, Moroccans and Eritreans. Some are fleeing war many are fleeing poverty and misery. Strikingly, boys outnumber girls by about five to one. And it's far from clear how many may in fact be adults — unlike other countries, Sweden doesn't test for age. Whatever age the applicant gives is accepted, unless it's 'obviously' untrue. The definition of 'obvious' is unclear. During one recent interview on Swedish radio, several asylum-seekers confessed to lying about their age to improve their chances of settlement. One, called Dawood, put it bluntly: 'If I say I'm grown-up, they'll deport me.'

'If you are not prepared, you are unprepared.' These are the words of Fredrik Reinfeldt, our former prime minister, and perfectly sum up Sweden's migration crisis. We still hear politicians defiantly claim that our country is a humanitarian superpower — but they don't do so as often, and they sound distinctly less smug when they do. The Swedish Way might not shine quite as brightly as a beacon to the world. But anyone who wants to find out how not to handle a migration crisis is welcome to pay us a visit.

Meanwhile, back to the future...here in the United States. One of the rallying cries by ALL four candidates for President of Mexico is, in part, "We will help anyone as much as possible to cross the border into the U.S."

Oh, Yeah, and our own Lt. Guv...Gavin Newsom running for Governor of California and promising Free HealthCare for all illegals. Now that's a couple of mouthfuls to chew on...THINK About That!

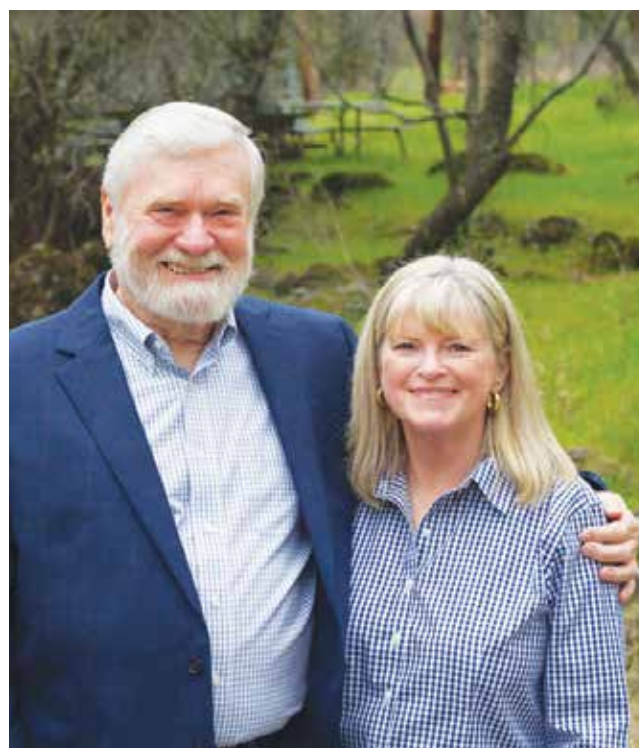

What We Are Made Of

“Once I prophesied that this generation of Americans had a rendezvous with destiny. . . . To us much is given; much is expected. This generation will nobly save or meanly lose the last best hope of earth. . . . The way is plain, peaceful, generous, just---a way which if followed the world will forever applaud and God must forever bless.”

Roosevelt’s remarks were indeed prophetic as all hell immediately erupted into WW II. By the D-Day invasion of Europe on June 6, 1944, 12 million were in uniform and more than 16 million Americans would eventually fight. More than 6.5 million women entered the work force war effort and over 400,000 young Americans died.

What enabled this generation to endure a grueling depression, wage a barbaric fight for freedom and then rebuild postwar American society? A clue may be in what drove Congressional Medal of Honor recipient Mitchell Paige.

At the Battle of Guadalcanal, as all his fel-

low Marines were killed or wounded, Paige managed four machine guns to stop an entire Japanese regiment. A loss of the airfield Paige defended may have altered the war’s outcome.

Of course, Paige was often asked about the motivation for his extraordinary actions. He then would refer to the three room country school where the children were so steeped in the traditions of America that they believed themselves having a role in that heritage and legacy.

Paige said the teacher would start the day with a Bible verse and the Pledge of Allegiance. They memorized all the great documents that were foundational to America’s success, like the Gettysburg address.

“My undying love of country, and my strong loyalty to the Marines fighting by my side, gave me no choice but to fight on unswervingly throughout my battles, utilizing my God-given ability to make use of what I have been taught and learned,” said Paige.

When Paige left for the nearest Marine recruiting station in 1936 his mother packed him a lunch with a note: “Trust in the Lord son, and He will guide you always.” Paige said those words remained with him particularly when overtaken with fear.

After the noted all-night firefight at Guadalcanal, Paige was alone, bloody, burned, and surrounded by hundreds of dead bodies. He opened his pack looking for something to stop his bleeding from a bayonet wound.

Out fell a pocket Bible and providentially opened to Proverbs 3 and the verse reflecting his mother’s words: “Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and He will direct your path.”

Today, America may have lost its moral compass but any good and benefit that America still represents to the world is due to Mitchell Paige and millions just like him.

Pilot Project to Study Impacts of forest management on Yuba watershed

Marysville, Ca.

A healthier, thinner forest reduces fire risk significantly, and it also protects water quality and can improve water quantity. The Yuba watershed is about to reap all of those benefits, through a pilot project of the Forest Resilience Bond with Blue Forest Conservation and the World Resources Institute. The Yuba County Water agency will support this effort with a \$1.5 million cost-share contribution to help fund the planned restoration in the Yuba Project.

The agency’s board of directors today approved the cost-share contribution, which will help fund various forest management techniques and allow researchers to study the effects on the watershed. The pilot project protects 15,000 acres within the north Yuba watershed. The total restoration cost for the project is expected to be about \$4.6 million.

“As we learned all too well last year with the Cascade Fire, the risk in the Yuba County foothills is far too great,” said YCWA Vice-Chairman Randy Fletcher. “If this pilot project works as planned, it could mean really big things for our ability to reduce the fuel load by thinning the forest in a healthy, responsible way, thereby significantly reducing the fire risk to our residents, while bringing great benefits to the Yuba watershed.”

The U.S. Forest Service and National Forest Foundation, through funding provided by the Forest Resilience Bond, will deploy various forest management techniques, including different methods of forest thinning, meadow restoration, prescribed burns, and invasive plant

treatment. Researchers will then monitor the impacts on water content and quality in the watershed, providing critical data to quantify exactly how forest health benefits watersheds, which could help spark additional investment in forest management techniques in the future.

The board unanimously supported this project due to its benefits for Yuba County’s water quality, quantity, healthier forest, air quality, economy and environment, Fletcher said.

“This is a private financing mechanism for forest health, which will be effective in increasing the pace and scale of treatment for this project and across the Yuba watershed,” said Blue Forest Conservation Co-Founder Zach Knight. “We hope this project can serve as a template for the entire state for funding forest restoration work.”

The Forest Resilience Bond deploys private capital to help make forests more resilient to changes in climate by investing in restoration projects that protect forest health and mitigate wildfire and drought risk. The pilot project will actually take place in Sierra County, but the planned activities will directly benefit Yuba County. If the pilot is successful, the planned second phase includes a much larger area, within the Yuba County boundary, near New Bullards Bar Dam and Reservoir.

“Yuba County Water Agency continues to lead the way in all aspects of water challenges,” said Fletcher. “We are likely to be the first community to reach the state’s requirement for urban area levees to be certified at the 200-year level, and now

we could be the first watershed in California to get healthy as well. The future of our county depends on water, and I continue to strategize and plan for that bright future.”

This Month In Your Garden

We greet June knowing that the warmer weather will soon be upon us – June 20 is the first day of summer. It also brings the end of the school year, graduations at all levels from kindergarten (in some schools) and on up to college. Summer vacations are anticipated along with the feeling of freedom from the daily routines. And it is still a great time for gardening. Time does need to be given to care for the new plantings. It's always nice to get out in the cool of the morning and tend the garden. Or evenings checking watering. Because we usually have very warm weather during our summer months, maintaining adequate moisture to the

newly planted additions is a must. Every year at this time of vacations, I try to emphasize the importance of having a good understanding between you and the person you rely on to care for your yard – so if you have heard all this before, forgive me. It is just that every year we seem to hear a sad story of what happened to some plants while some folks were away on vacation. The person chosen should come to see the yard and be made aware of any special care needed, how any watering system you might have works, and all those quirky little things that might be encountered by that person. If you write or type it so that

no important details are missed, there should be no reason for mishaps. If you can laminate the instructions, all the better – they are not as likely to get wet or torn, etc., and all should end well.

The most frequent cause of loss of plants sold by our nursery during the warmer weather is inadequate water. Most of us have learned quite a bit about watering adequately with care during the drought years and all those lessons still apply. Deep watering and mulching garden beds and around plants is something that everyone should do. Mulch keeps the moisture in the soil and the roots of the plants cooler. Watering can be done less frequently because about two inches of mulch when dampened while watering will help retain the moisture in the ground much longer. It also helps to discourage weeds. Of course, drip systems have long been known to save water and discourage weeds by delivering the water just to the base of the plant and not all of the surrounding area. The emitters require some checking and maintenance occasionally.

Some vegetable gardens got off to an early start this year because we had a lovely warm February. But then we had some cooler weather with a couple of freezes which often come along and probably undid all

that February planting. In April there was a flurry of vegetables being sold, so I would guess that there some very nice vegetable gardens out there with those folks beginning to enjoy all of the tasty fresh bounty! Home grown fruits and vegetables that ripen on the plant have such wonderful flavor. Tomatoes have to be the favorite. Keep watch for tomato worms – they like those tomatoes as well as we do and can be controlled with *Bacillus Thuringiensis*, better known as B.T., or Caterpillar Killer.

Roses have been spectacular this spring. The blooms have been large and beautifully shaped. When the hot weather comes, they will still be lovely, but the blooms usually shrink in size. Take care of any fungal or insect infestation quickly when noticed. Dead head them frequently and fertilize them every 4 to 6 weeks to encourage more blooms and keep them green and healthy.

It is recommended that fertilizing be done three times a year – February or March, June and September. The early months are getting them off to a good start, June is maintenance, and September is preparing them for fall and the coming dormancy of winter. These are guidelines and reminders that plants in our area will do much better with occasional feedings, especially in areas with the heavy clay soil that many of us deal with. Using organic fertilizer is generally a bit more expensive but much better for building the soil. Some use a soluble fertilizer frequently all season. You can see that there is no one definite right or wrong way – just listen to a group of gardeners. Each thinks his or her way is the best way – but whatever methods they use, they are all fertilizing their gardens! Two especially nice plants that love the hot weather and bloom happily bloom all summer are Crape Myrtles and Rose of Sharon. They both are available in several different colors. Both can be found in either bush or tree form, and they are not excessively thirsty. Both are quite drought tolerant once they are established. Perennials also are good for summer bloom and they come back year after year.

We hope you all have an enjoyable summer and pleasant summer mornings tending your gardens.
