## Richard Webb Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award

Richard Webb of Browns Valley was awarded the prestigious Federal Aviation Administration's Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award at the Beale AFB Aero Club meeting on Saturday, March 24, 2018.

The Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award is reserved for pilots who for at least 50 years have practiced safe aircraft flight and have exhibited professionalism, skill and aviation expertise as "Master Pilots". Richard E Webb has flown safely for 65 years and has accumulated approximately 13,000 hours (nearly 1.5 years total time in the sky) in military & general aviation aircraft.

Richard began his flying career in 1953 in the USAF Pilot training program where he flew

the PA-18, T-6, T-28, and B-25 aircraft. After graduation, he became an Instructor Pilot in the USAF Pilot Training Program flying the B-25. He then transitioned into the B-47 six-jet Medium Bomber as Aircraft Commander. He then transitioned into the B-52 eight-jet Heavy Bomber and flew nine Airborne Alert Missions (24-25 hr. duration) during the Cuban Missile Crisis in the early 1960's. He spent five years as a Minuteman Missile Crew Commander during which time he flew the C-47 Gooney Bird twin engine transport. He flew the C-47 for one year in Vietnam. His final assignment was at Beale AFB flying the B-52 completing his USAF career as one of two Wing Standardization Crews. During this

time, he spent four months in Thailand flying 44 B-52 Combat bombing missions. He retired in November, 1972 with 8,292 hrs. in military aircraft, with 5,432 of those hours as an instructor pilot.

After retirement he became a Certified Flight Instrument Instructor and has instructed at Yuba and Sutter County Airports since 1979 in multiple Single Engine Aircraft. He especially enjoys giving Instrument Instruction. His flying friends fondly refer to him as "The Professor" because at the age of 87 he still gives flight instruction and is always teaching and training others to help them become better, safer pilots.

## "Unwanted" and "Offensive" Touching

The more information is made public about the Jim Whiteaker Yuba City Unified School District sexual assault case the worse it appears. Writer Bob Moffitt with California Public Radio (CPR) obtained a 1998 report from the district through a California Public Records Act request.

Thus far, ladies have accused high school teacher Jim Whiteaker of unwanted sexual advances when they were students. The newly acquired school records give details of reported sexual contact with a student, but also a school employee at her home. The report says Whiteaker engaged in "unwanted" and "offensive" sexual behavior.

The document indicates Whiteaker visited a school employee's home uninvited to comfort her during a difficult time. He became sexually aroused as he hugged her while running his hand down her side and touching her breast. Whiteaker says the lady initiated the hug.

Whiteaker is also quoted as saying he may have touched her breast accidentally. The school report describes the wom-

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## Liberals Love to Use Illegal's

Some California cities and counties are determined to be sanctuaries for their citizens rather than hide-outs for criminals illegally in the United States.

Orange County and a number of its cities (Los Alamitos, Orange, Westminster, Huntington Beach, Newport Beach, San Juan Capistrano, Santa Ana, Mission Viejo) are opting out of the California's Sanctuary State law (SB54) and advising law enforcement to cooperate with federal immigration officers. The Northern California cities of Ripon and Yuba City recently voted to abstain from SB54. San Diego County's Escondido opted out, as well.

On April 11, Westminster, the "All-American City," voted to reject Senator Pro-tem Kevin De Leon and Governor Brown's law. De Leon actually attended the council meeting and spoke in defense of the law.

The Westminster vote has an historic twist. Westminster has the most Vietnamese-Americans per capita of any city in the nation.

In 1975, with the withdrawal of American troops and the resulting fall of Saigon, the nation of Vietnam became a communist country. Millions of Vietnamese fled the former French colony by foot and by boat. Thousands died trying to escape. Some were shot by Vietnamese military while other freedom-seekers died from starvation, dehydration and drowning at sea.

Hundreds of thousands of survivors languished in resettlement camps of nearby Asian countries while applying for refuge in America and other nations. However, a young democrat California Governor Jerry Brown became a key proponent in a national campaign to reject the Vietnamese and even plane loads of orphans from coming to the US, and particularly to California.

Other prominent Democrats calling for the ban were Delaware's Senator and future Vice-President Joe Biden, former presidential "peace candidate" George McGovern, and New York Congresswoman Elizabeth Holtzman.

Julia Taft, who in 1975 led President Gerald Ford's Inter-agency Task Force on Indochinese refugee resettlement, said Brown's rejection of the freedom-loving and anti-communist Vietnamese was "a moral blow."

According to Taft, liberals were open as to why they were rejecting Vietnamese war refugees including the Hmong and other mountain people, "...they had too many Hispanics, too many people on welfare, they didn't want these people."

"They didn't want any of these refugees, because they had..... unemployment," Taft told NPR (National Public Radio).

When Brown took office in 1975 California's unemployment rate was 9.4%, and the country was in the midst of a recession combined with high inflation. In 2011, during President Obama's open borders everyone-is-welcome antics California's unemployment was at 12.4% and was in the midst of the Great Recession.

In 1975, liberals were no friends of immigrants or as they saw it people fleeing a communist ideology. Though hundreds of millions were dying from communist takeovers around the world liberals thought anti-communist Vietnamese should just

## Food and Farm News

### Farmers wait to see if water supplies improve

With reservoirs at or above average levels and the Sierra snowpack improved by storms in March, farmers await word on whether their water supplies might improve. Most farm customers of federal and state water projects have been told to expect 20 percent allocations. Operators of both projects say they're trying to determine if late-season storms could allow them to provide more water. Farmers say that might let them increase crop plantings.

### Exporters consider effects of Chinese tariffs

Long-term efforts to build sales of California farm goods in China may suffer from the ongoing trade dispute between

China and the U.S. Exporters of nuts, wine and fruit crops that now face new tariffs in China say they have been renegotiating contracts with their buyers there. Some products originally destined for China may be redirected to other locations, and exporters say competing products from other countries may now secure a larger foothold in China.

### Almond farmers watch for frost impact

One farmer says he has his "fingers crossed" as he monitors his Sacramento Valley almond orchards. The extent of damage from a February freeze remains uncertain. Farmers and agricultural commissioners say the effect appears to vary greatly, depending on lo-

cation, tree variety and other variables. In some cases, farmers may not know the full impact until close to harvest time. The first government estimate of the almond crop will be released next month.

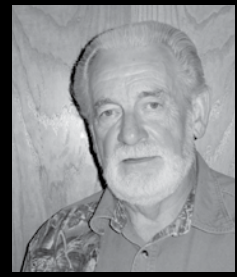
### Grape growers gear up for new season

California-grown table grapes will begin reaching stores next month, and marketers say they're preparing plans to promote the crop to customers in the U.S. and abroad. The California Table Grape Commission says about two-thirds of the state's table grapes go to the domestic market, with the rest shipped to customers in 59 countries around the world. California farmers sold more than 109 million boxes of table grapes last year.

# Smartsville and Timbuctoo Mining Tours

We expect our mining tours at Pioneer Day in Smartsville on Saturday April 28, to be just as popular as ever. This is our 11<sup>th</sup> year and, despite our best efforts, we have not been able to satisfy all our visitors' desires for a ride on a "hay" wagon pulled by an antique tractor, even with three concurrent tours running

nearly all day long. Our tour guides this year are Brian Bisnett, Chris Ward, and Chuck Scimeca, all very knowledgeable about hydraulic mining and local gold rush history. Each of them rides along on their wagon and explains the mining process and answers questions as the wagons travel through

the Sucker Flat mining areas.

Brian is part owner of the Blue Point Mine, one of several adjacent hydraulic mining claims where gold was recovered from sand and gravel in the "diggings" just north of Smartsville between the town and the Yuba River. Each of these mines had its own tunnel that served as a sluice box as well as a conduit to drain mining tailings to the river.

Chris is a professional archeologist specializing in the gold rush era and has written a book on local cemeteries. In his youth he roamed the Rose Bar and Yuba River area and his knowledge of the history of Smartsville and Timbuctoo is personal and impressive.

Chuck was a California State Park Ranger and worked at the Yuba River State Park at Bridgeport. He developed natural history and cultural interpretation programs and taught history classes for docents and volunteers. His personal interest in historic transportation brings a unique perspective to life during the gold rush.

As great as our mining tours are, there is much more to do at Pioneer Day. We have live music on stage, arts and crafts vendors, activities for children, yummy food, and exhibits such as gold panning, acorn grinding and native American flute playing. Historic impersonations present life during the gold rush, and the church under restoration will be open to the public. Father Twomey (Leroy Prindle) inside the church tells tales of early Smartsville.

Admission is free and all proceeds from Pioneer Day benefit the restoration of the historic, former Catholic Church, by SCRFI our non-profit 501(c)3 corporation.

Sandy has been actively involved with the rodeo since serving as Queen in 1979. Over the years, from then until the present, she has competed and served both on committees and as an officer. She was president in 2011-2012 and is currently vice president. Fans know Sandy as the patriotically attired equestrian who carries Old Glory into the arena during the Opening Ceremony, and in the parade.

an as "big-busted," but does not say whether that was a description of Whiteaker's or its author, former personnel director Brian Sevier.

Moffitt and CPR's documents also describe the 1998 incidents that student Andrea Foster reported to school officials, the district and Yuba City Police. She described being touched by Whiteaker on three occasions. Whiteaker denied the accusations saying they weren't worth commenting on.

Personnel Director Sevier recommended a letter of reprimand be placed in the physical education teacher's file and that "Whiteaker's behavior be monitored and that he be provided with appropriate guidance/assistance in the expression of his feelings in more appropriate ways."

Whiteaker has been terminated by the district pending an appeal. Two lawsuits against Whiteaker, Yuba City Unified School District and its leadership have been filed on behalf of students.

Moffitt says state law does not prevent Yuba

City or its police department from releasing reports or information on investigations. However, the police department and the city have opposed information requests from victims and the media saying they are not legally compelled to comply. This resistance does not instill confidence in the police or the city in future assault cases.

Recall proponents and others in government believe Clerk/Recorder Donna Johnston looked for a way to slow or block the recall of Jim Whiteaker from his seat on the Sutter County Board of Supervisors. However, Johnston denied this perception last week explaining that recalls are complicated with every detail needing to be exact.

With many recalls occurring throughout the state each year and the steps clearly set forth at the Secretary of State's (SOS) website it doesn't look complicated. The SOS is there to assist the election clerks.

Sutter County Counsel Jean Jordan said by email that her interaction with the supervisors

and elected officials is confidential when asked if Johnston was inquiring as to whether the recall could be stopped. Some believe that thousands of taxpayer dollars in unnecessary legal research was done for Johnston pertaining to the recall.

A voice mail to County Administrator Scott Mitnick to ask about his knowledge of how the recall was handled received no response. Recall proponents have been circulating another petition to ask the Supervisors to censure and remove Whiteaker from taking an active role on the board.

Politically and practically, Supervisors may be unable to act. Whiteaker's fate on the Board may have to wait on the recall. His teaching future resides with an appeals board solidly tilted in his favor. He may not return to his classroom but he will likely remain on the government payroll. The attorney for his defense claims neither lawsuit has merit.

There is more to come out, but victims are leery when realizing they are on their own. The city, the police department, and the school system have not been cooperative and accusers are intimidated by Whiteaker.

This 20-year saga of non-action by authority figures should remove any doubt why most victims of sexual assault never come forward.

## Luncheons Served with Cornish Cuisine and History at Empire Mine

One of Nevada County's better-kept secrets could be the Pasty (pronounced "pass-tee") Luncheons served outside Empire Mine's stately 1905 Clubhouse. It's an ideal venue, surrounded by the famous gardens and stately, shady trees. "These luncheons offer a unique experience for all kinds of organizations and groups," said Luncheon Coordinator Jane Bland. She and Co-coordinator Troy Hammer have been hosting such weekday luncheons for the last seven years. "Each year from May to September we welcome organizations such as Hospice of the Foothills, teachers, book clubs, car clubs, hiking and dog-walking groups, as well as tour buses," Bland explained. "Diners enjoy sitting in the same places where mining magnate William Bourn, Jr. entertained prominent guests from all over the world. Here's where deals were discussed that changed history," Hammer added.

Each lunch includes a traditional Cornish pasty, coleslaw, ice tea, lemonade, a cookie and a Klondike Bar – all served by volunteers dressed in traditional serving-staff attire. A special group tour of Empire Mine is also included. Bland has been visiting local thrift shops and purchasing china plates recently. "While the

plates may not match," she explained, they will add a little more tradition to these popular lunches."

It's entirely possible that the Cornish pasty is the world's first convenience food to feature an entire meal in one wrapping. According to a 2006 BBC article, author Les Merton, author of the Official Encyclopaedia of the Cornish Pasty, (English spelling) maintained that evidence of the Cornish pasty could be found in Cornwall cave drawings dating back to 8,000 BC. These primitive drawings depicted pasties wrapped in leaves with the edges crimped. The traditional pastry wrap was introduced later, probably in the early 1500s. The Cornish pasty, a favorite miner's meal, made its American debut in the 1840s.

Now from May to September groups from 12 to

75 people can enjoy these Cornish Pasty Luncheons, as well as the history behind each serving. The cost is \$15 per person, and those interested can phone the Visitor Center at Empire Mine State Historic Park on (530) 273-8522 for further information. Luncheons are presented by Empire Mine Park Association (EMPA), the organization dedicated to maintaining and improving this treasured Park that welcomes around 100,000 visitors each year. Nguyen and her family fled with other boat people when she was five, making it to California in 1981. Ironically, Governor Brown aggressively opposed Nguyen and her kind. Today, Brown claims to welcome foreigners no matter how they entered the country including protecting dangerous criminals. A communist leaning California Senate leadership shouted down and removed Nguyen when she tried to recognize the sacrifice of the Vietnamese fighting alongside

Americans for freedom. Maybe liberals did not see thousands of Vietnamese and tribal minorities as an easy voting block for democrats. In 1975, entitlement freebies for immigrants were not as plentiful as today. And, these immigrants were anti-communist.

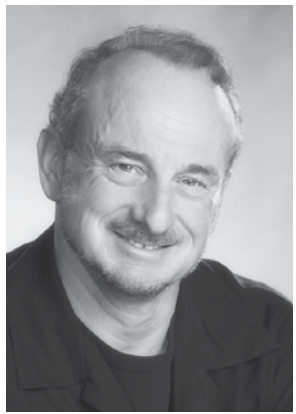




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## Importance of Budgeting

Daily budgets are rarely made by families but doing so can be highly educational as it highlights what one spends and where the money is going. I don't know of anyone that can't benefit from a detailed budget written down on paper and then reviewed by all members of the family. Actually sitting down and doing it seems a daunting task but biting the bullet and doing one will likely pay healthy and needed dividends.

I can almost guarantee taking the time to perform this task will be akin to finding money in your mailbox. How much you find will depend on how much you spend each month and how accurately and honestly your budget is. Yes, honesty is a weird word to use here but if you think about it for a bit, you can conjure up a few instances why one might not be 100% honest on a budget. The reasons for dishonesty might run the gamut from a harmless hobby you don't want to give up on to a more ominous reason such as feeding an addiction that consumes funds.

Whatever the details, making a budget will always yield something worthwhile and so it's a great exercise to do. If you or your family is struggling to make ends meet, this is all the more reason you should consider doing it.

When making out your budget, its best to have

your checkbook and credit card statements handy as these could highlight something your memory might fail you at. The point here is you want to list everything you spend money on, both reoccurring and the one-off expenditures. Those one-off expenditures are obviously scrutinized in hindsight since they may not reoccur. They may however illustrate whether a good decision or bad one had been made for the expenditure.

Start by listing every dollar that went out whether reoccurring or not. Do this for several months in a row if you have the fortitude to do so, otherwise a one month review is better than nothing.

After listing all your expenses, list your incomes for the family or yourself if doing this on your own. You will end up with a conclusion, of which you already may realize, of whether you're operating in the red (spending more than you take in) or in the black which means you make more than you spend.

No matter what side of the spending aisle you fall on, the goal here is to be able to actually see and compare where your money is going.

Next determine what spending is discretionary and which is mandatory. A mandatory spending destination might be a mortgage payment (paying the minimum required) while a discretionary one might be a movie or date night. I like to list the items in order of summation meaning the largest expenditures in order to the smallest. Then list the semi-discretionary items such as cable TV, an optional data plan on your phone or fancy steaks in lieu of hamburger when you grocery shop.

First, take your monthly income and subtract the mandatory items. The remaining amount will be what is left over for discretionary and semi-discretionary spending. The first items to then review for cutting is the purely discretionary spending. This is where will you find the easiest "mailbox" money.

Do you spend a lot going out to eat, buying three pairs of shoes or going to five movies a month with candy and popcorn? It's not rocket science to think of ways to cut. Buy your candy out (the theaters won't like it buy hey), forego the sodas (your body will thank you) and try renting a movie at home once in a while. DVD's are free at the library don't ya know.

In any case, discretionary spending is usually higher than people think and once illustrated in an "in your face" spreadsheet, the "red face" of embarrassment over where your money is really going usually appears.

Don't be embarrassed. We all get a little "frowny faced" when we see just what and where we are possibly wasting our money on.

One can also usually find money in the semi-discretionary column as well. Larger than necessary phone plans or excess luxuries like dry cleaning or cell phones for the 7 year old also can steal funds that may be needed elsewhere for more basic needs.

Once in a while a mandatory large item is found to be the main culprit and a major change must be made. This might be too large of a house or car, too long of a commute or other item that may seem mandatory. But considering a onetime major overhaul in this area could significantly improve one's financial condition and find the largest amount of money. This might include moving to a smaller house or closer to work or getting rid of the extra car.

The point is to make a budget first and worry about what's on it once it's made. Making a few small changes in your spending habits can make big differences over a long period of time. Look for pennies and the dollars will find you.

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# ICE CREAM MACHINE. I'll Be There, Will You?

The passion strikes again. Most will not understand the need to discover what some consider junk and turn a sow's ear into a silk purse. The magic of opening an old barn door, looking in a dusty corner, pulling pallets off of a pile, or lifting some old tires to discover what is under the pile can be discussed, but the message may not be received. I would not drive several thousand miles to go to a national convention of quilters, but some do. More power to them for having a hobby that provides joy. Hobbies of all kinds enrich our lives, give us pleasure and help us discover new friends.

Recently, I had the pleasure of visiting the farm of John Mistler, owner and editor of the Territorial Dispatch. He showed me a device that had not been moved in at least twenty years. It belonged to his father, a White Mountain Ice Cream maker! My heart started pounding as I thoroughly enjoy restoring something that belonged to "Grandpa".

The White Mountain Company had its roots in Laconia, New Hampshire in 1872. Thomas Sands was the inventor and White Mountain began as a company in 1888. There were some fires and changes of ownership. Alaska Freezer Company gained control and sold their interests in 1974. White Mountain became the name again. They are known as the premier ice cream maker in the US. Most of their models are smaller than the five gallon unit I now have. They make hand crank and electric powered units. I contacted them for a brochure and parts availability but nothing is available.

A first glance on the internet gives credit to the invention of ice cream to the British in the early 1800s. However, some further research suggests something much different. The Greeks were mixing snow and honey by the 5th century BC. A hundred years later the Persians were mixing rose water, vermicelli, with snow. The

Chinese were experimenting with milk rice, snow, saltpeter, and syrup in 200 BC. The East Indians had a related dessert "Kulfi".

Recipes were available in the colonies by 1744. Thomas Jefferson, George Washington, and Benjamin Franklin enjoyed the delight by 1768. The small hand crank machine we now enjoy appears to have been created by Agnes Marshall and Nancy Johnson around 1840.

Power for this machine is provided by a John Deere "Hit and Miss" engine manufactured by The Waterloo Gasoline Engine Company. This organization was formed by a group and led by John Froelich who is credited with the first practical portable power machine which would later become known as the tractor. They produced the Waterloo Boy tractor and built small portable power engines for the farm in the early 1900's.

There were a large number of companies that

manufactured engines with several basic designs. Some of the companies grew to names you would recognize such as John Deere, McCormick, Maytag, and Cushman. Many others were absorbed to larger companies and quite a few disappeared. Other companies such as Allis Chalmers produced giant machines that powered cities with electricity. Eight large engines powered the New York subway system. Some of the giant engines had 36 inch pistons and 24 foot flywheels. A common energy savings concept was use of the inertia of the flywheel to keep it running, balance, and smooth out the operation.

The power for this device is a small John Deere "hit and miss". The basic design has a governor that maintains a rpm range. The engine fires speeding up the engine. A mechanism keeps the valves open so no compression occurs. The inertia for the flywheel keeps it going. When the rpms drops, the engine fires again. This explanation is over simplified. I would encourage you if you have an interest, to visit some of the local tractor shows and county fairs where they are on display and ask an exhibitor about the process. Be prepared for them to "talk your leg off".

My daughter is very excited to be the first to make some ice cream with the machine. I need to have a test run to see how and if it will work. Belt tightness and rpm are important for a successful run. Many thanks to Dick

Watson of Gridley for fabrication. I spent about a week sandblasting, wire wheeling, painting, staining, and cleaning. I also consulted a representative from a County Environmental Health Department for internal cleaning guidance.

I plan on having the unit at the Oregon House An-

nual Vintage Tractor and Farm Craft Show on May 5 and 6. I hope to have product available at designated times. It should be a unique experience.

### Schmitz v. Younger

[L.A. No. 30844. Supreme Court of California. April 26, 1978.]

[2] The right of the initiative is "precious to the people and is one which the courts are zealous to preserve to the fullest tenable measure of spirit as well as letter." (McFadden v. Jordan (1948) 32 Cal. 2d 330, 332 [196 P.2d 787].) "To preserve the full spirit of the initiative the submission of issues to the voters should not become bogged down by lengthy litigation in the courts." (Perry v. Jordan (1949) 34 Cal. 2d 87, 91 [207 P.2d 47].)

In furtherance of the people's power we have narrowly circumscribed the rights of ministerial officials to impede or delay the initiative process. Speaking of an acting registrar in Farley v. Healey, 67 Cal. 2d 325, 327 [62 Cal. Rptr. 26, 431 P.2d 650], this court stated: "It is not his function to determine whether a proposed initiative will be valid if enacted or whether a proposed declaration of policy is one to which the initiative may apply. These questions may involve difficult legal issues that only a court can determine. The right to propose initiative measures cannot properly be impeded by a decision of a ministerial office, even if supported by the advice of the city attorney, that the subject is not appropriate for submission to the voters." (Italics added.)

[3] The duty of the Attorney General to prepare title and summary for a proposed initiative measure is a ministerial one and mandate will [21 Cal. 3d 93] lie to compel him to act when the proposal is in proper form and complies with statutory and constitutional procedural requirements. (Warner v. Kenny (1946) 27 Cal. 2d 627, 630-631 [165 P.2d 889].)
