

Water Content Still Below Average

Despite Late Winter Storms

Sacramento, Ca. – Following one of the driest Februaries in California history, late winter storms increased the Sierra Nevada snowpack but were not enough to put the state on track for an average year.

As of April 2, 2018 the snow survey by the California Cooperative Snow Surveys Program indicates that water content in the statewide mountain snowpack increased from 23 percent of the March 1 average to 52 percent of today's historical average. This figure does not include last weekend's storms. The early-April snow survey is the most important for water supply forecasting because the snowpack is normally at its peak before it begins to melt with rising spring temperatures.

"These snowpack results – while better than they were a few weeks ago - still underscore the need for widespread careful and wise use of our water supplies," said California **Department of Water Resources** Director Karla Nemeth. "The only thing predictable about California's climate is that it's unpredictable. We need to make our water system more resilient so we're prepared for the extreme fluctuations in our water system, especially in the face of climate change."

The snowpack normally provides about a third of the water for California's farms and communities as it melts in the spring and summer and fills reservoirs and rivers.

Yuba County Decisions

When longtime Yuba County foothill resident Buck Weckman began complaining about massive grows of marijuana, illegal construction, pollution from ag chemicals and pesticides, and dangerous people with weapons, supervisors rolled their eyes. Then, Weckman asked for Supervisors to declare a State of

Emergency to solicit state and federal law enforcement to stop lawlessness involving marijuana grows and trafficking. Other counties like Siskiyou had done so with success.

Supervisors' spokesperson Randy Fletcher from the 5th District hill area proclaimed his territory safe in spite of Weckman's concerns. However, residents were not feeling that way with many giving-up even reporting incidents due to no response from the county.

Then, on August 1, 2017 two Yuba County deputies, Phillip Bronson, a 14-year veteran, and Andrew Everhart, a 10-year veteran, were shot at a grow near Oregon House by felon Mark Sanchez, 32, of Gilroy. They survived, but have not returned to work. San-

Following the shooting, law enforcement agencies began to step-up raids on marijuana grow-operations. They were successful but are barely getting started with some people estimating 1,000 illegal sites.

Finally, in December 2017 Supervisors relented and declared the State of Emergency. Federal agencies now claim that three Yuba County properties involved in marijuana raids in 2017 are connected to an international Chinese crime network.

Agents from the DOJ, FBI, DEA, Homeland Security, IRS and other agencies along with local law enforcement have now seized

Rogues and Thieves

A local employer wondered whether he should still complete an I-9 form when hiring a new worker. The US Customs and Immigration Services (USCIS) I-9 is for Employment Eligibility Verification. The USCIS website says "All U.S. employers must ensure proper completion of Form I-9 for each individual they hire for employment in the United States. This includes citizens and noncitizens."

Certain noncitizens have permission to work but not illegal aliens. An I-9 completed honestly by an illegal could bring ICE calling.

However, this employer is in California, a rogue state that is now picking and choosing which federal laws to obey. Is it still illegal to hire an illegal in California? Politicians are ordering law enforcement to release border busters and ignore requests from Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to detain the lawbreakers.

The state college system including nearby Yuba College ordered staff to pay the \$495 fee for DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) students. And, DACA student out of state tuition fees have been waived. They would qualify for hardship benefits.

Campus personnel were told not to cooperate with immigration authorities. All this may create resentment among hard working overregulated and taxed parents who pay their property taxes, college bonds and the cost of tuition and books for their children.

While the state endorses and advocates lawlessness, a politically bipolar Attorney General Xavier Becerra announced legislation to root out the state's underground economy and bring it to justice According to a 2013 University of California Los Angeles (UCLA) Labor Center report, the state's black market is estimated at \$60 to \$140 billion annually, depriving the state of \$8.5 billion in corporate, personal, and sales and use taxes each year.

A study with findings that general sounds contrived, bought and paid for or just plain trash talk. However, you don't need to be an illegal alien to be someone willing to work "under the table" in the once Golden State. The egregious and burdensome regulations together with fees, taxes, surcharges and fines are creating criminals out of honest folk. The state has passed the tipping point where people are bothered by a conscience that says they need to pay more for these "wonderful" benefits.

Rising water in the Feather River had lots of anxious anglers dropping boats in the water at Mosquito Beach and the Yuba City Boat Dock. Last Saturday the area from Riverfront Park down to where the Yuba River enters the Feather had boats everywhere, including bank fishermen. The water level has been going up and down so much that the fish have not been cooperating. The opener of trout

for the Sierra Mountain streams, rivers and creeks is just around the corner. The best time to score on trout is in the last hour of light. Evening fishing has always been a favorite with veteran trout anglers. This is the chance to catch a big fish and is usually not crowded due to most all anglers being back in camp sipping suds or cooking dinner. This special hour will have the wind slow down, the heat of the day disappears and as stated above, the area is not crowded.

Thousands of trout will be planted throughout the spring, summer and fall. Trout plants are done for anglers to catch the fish, but there is always some that do not get caught. These holdover trout will learn very quickly about hiding, feeding and everything else a wild

trout does. These fish will also firm up and be much more difficult to catch. This is why it is a good idea to target these trout after all the anglers go home. Some people feel the streams, rivers and lakes are fished out, but there is still fish there for taking and they make it a

challenge because they are no longer stupid planted fish but experienced, wary trout that have learned how to stay away from the angler's creel.



more than 100 homes and searched 74 properties in the Sacramento area. The network received nearly \$100 million in electronic transfers from China to purchase properties and set-up grows.

Maybe this will confirm the board's decision to declare the State of Emergency. Hill deputies have done their best and Neighborhood Watches are great but all fall short curbing organized crime.

Now, Supervisors are mulling over what to do about cooperating with Sanctuary California policies undermining the work of the Border Patrol and the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). Yuba County jail is one of ten ICE facilities in California holding detainees until the court adjudicates their immigration cases.

Inmates are fighting deportation after committing crimes in the U.S. and completing their sentences. ICE employees are embedded in the local jail and buses come and go moving new inmates to the jail and back and forth to Sacramento and San Francisco for hearings.

If you ever thought that illegal immigrants think

were 549 TJ homicides in the first quarter of 2018 and most will not be solved according to the Baia government. Of the first 132 homicides this year only five resulted in arrests with a total of 11 suspects detained.

In Mexico, the drug cartels control and if not control then kill politicians, judges, journalists and anyone else that hinders them. Their manner of killing can be eccentric. They utilize public shootouts and decapitate and dismember folks to make a memory.

Mexico, ala Trump, sent 400 of its Army troops to the border city not to deal with lawless Americans but to stop their own murder-mania. It rages on.

San Diego has a population of 1.4 million compared to Tijuana's 1.8 million. In 2016 and 2017, TJ finished with 910 and 1,734 homicides while San Diego accounted for 50 and 34 for each year.

Many illegals from Mexico and Central American do not share the importance of obeying the law, respecting life or the innocence of underage females. Three teen illegals shot an Olivehurst boy that they never even knew in the face. Sexual assaults of underage girls are common.



Unfenced open borders welcome the mayhem into America's lap. The current fence along the border has helped immensely in curtailing rampant crime that once flooded into San Diego and other California border cities.

Supervisors and new sheriffs-to-be in Nevada, Yuba and Sutter Counties will have some anarly decisions to make as to whether they plan to honor their oaths to defend the Constitution or will bow to the demands of rulers in Sacramento.



Pacific Rim: Uprising

Starring: John Boyega, Scott Eastwood and Cailee Spaeny. Rated: PG-13, Runtime: 118 minutes.

Ten years after closing off an alien portal in the middle of the Pacific Ocean the world finds itself under attack yet again by the nefarious Precursors, a species that is trying to colonize the planet. Little do they realize that we not only have giant suits of armor but we have an uncanny resolve to fight against alien invaders. Even our lowest street urchins can fight their monsters to great effect.

Characters are plucked from around the Pacific and put in the cockpits of the giant Yeagers, machines crafted to defend the world from the organic based Kaiju. The acting is pretty good and the effects department did a great job.

Pacific Rim: Uprising, earns three out of five, Scrapper Monkeys. This isn't a great movie, but it is entertaining and really cool to see on the big screen. YCWA Supports Airport Drainage Project

Marysville, Ca.

Yuba County will be better able to address drainage concerns and expand the services at the Yuba County Airport with the help of a grant from Yuba County Water Agency.

The \$191,000 grant will fund the local share of a Federal Aviation Administration grant leveraging a total of \$4.2 million for the project, which will repair cracks and erosion on the airport's apron, caused by inadequate drainage.

The airport apron is the area used to tie down and park aircraft for temporary storage, maintenance and refueling. Currently, inclement

weather and heavy rains cause water to pool on the surface, contributing to the deterioration of the apron.

"The current drainage issues restrict access to a crucial part of the airport during and after large rain storms," said YCWA Director Doug Lofton. "These repairs are necessary so the airport can retain its current businesses and lease operations, but also to potentially attract new, additional business."

The project will replace the existing surface with concrete; install new, larger inlets and grates to better drain surface water from the pavement; and add more than 1,500 feet of new piping that will carry the water away from the area.

YCWA is able to fund the local match of this project because of the subsequent flooding caused by the drainage issues, hindering the full use of the airport.

"The Yuba County Airport is a valuable asset to the Sacramento Valley and has great potential to bring additional revenue to the county," said Yuba County Administrative Services Director Tim McCoy. "This grant allows us to fix the current drainage deficiencies inhibiting the airport from being fully functional year-round."

Re: Who's Waging a Secret War

I am writing in response to Scott and David Kuhnen's letter RE: Who's Waging a Secret War Against a Family Owned Business." No one questions the value of recycling or is challenging Recycle Industries (RI) right to exist. What is disputed is their claim "The quality of life for our neighbors will not change as a result of our modest expansion."

Everyone knows business does not "expand" to maintain the status quo; it expands to increase capacity. RI's so-called "Modest" expansion will transform a small-scale business into a big-time operation capable of servicing the entire Recyclable waste stream of Yuba City. If RI's location was not in such close proximity to my home I'd be RI's number one supporter.

RI operates in an industrial area on Epley Drive off Garden Highway and is surrounded by residential areas. The only way to get there is to drive on two-lane streets through residential areas. Along the way are Public and School bus stops, small businesses and thousands of residents all sharing the same roads. When the

Transfer Station becomes operational, expect to see a large fleet of Garbage collection trucks traveling on Bridge, Franklin, Lincoln, Teesdale and Bogue Roads to and from RI on a daily basis. Our residential streets are going to take a severe beating.

Garbage Trucks are

the heaviest vehicles on the road, routinely weighing more than 25 tons each. According to an Engineering Analysis cited by the Bay Area Metropolitan Transportation Commission, "A Garbage Truck puts more strain on a street than just about anything else." As a matter of fact, "Garbage Trucks stress the pavement more than 9,300 times as much as an SUV does" according to Clark Mason of the Press Democrat (May 15, 2011). Countless municipalities struggle with road repair costs caused by these massive vehicles, and Yuba City will be no exception. Collec-

tion trucks are only half of the logistics footprint.
Once the "Collectors"
DUMP their loads at the transfer station, larger and heavier trucks will transport the compacted materials back over the same roads and residen-

tial areas to their final destination. These outbound trucks will weigh about 80,000 pounds (fully loaded). Daily operation of these massive vehicles in residential areas gives rise to legitimate concern for public safety and the unavoidable destruction of public roads that will lower quality of life and property values.

Recyclable waste streams are not 100% pure; if everyone cooperated they would be, but we all know that when the little gray bins fill up things get tossed in the Big Blue Bins that shouldn't be there. The inconvenient truth is any Transfer Station will also have to process some solid waste in addition to recyclables.

RI's "Modest expansion" is not yet a done deal. The Public must have a say in this matter. For the record, I do not represent anyone other than myself and my family. I really do not care who gets a contract with the City as long as we are not adversely impacted.

Recology's Contract

Before we begin I would just like to say that I met with the Recology community relations manager Jackie Sillman, who has been working at Recology for 18 years, in order to ensure everything I say is correct. Now, this is a topic I believe would affect not only all Yuba City residents but also our surrounding communities. The Yuba City Council is trying to end Recology's contract with Yuba City. You're probably thinking, so what, but if this were to happen, Yuba City would be thrown into turmoil. Here are iust some of the things that would happen: Recology currently employs 145 people of whom at least 40% would need to be laid off, meaning 54 hard working men and women from our community would be unemployed. The company that would likely take over Yuba City, Republic Waste Services, instead of hiring Yuba City residents, would likely hire Sacramento residents instead, due to the company being stationed in Sacramento. Recology provides \$190,000 to the Yuba City area per year in donations and fund raisers. Now, if Recology stopped servicing Yuba City, it would continue to provide donation, but not nearly as much as before. Recology even provides to non-profits

like schools.

If Republic Waste Services takes over Yuba
City a new dump would
be built right in the middle of a group of neighborhoods on Epley Drive.
This could hurt our
economy in a big way.
Those who live there will
be trapped, because no

one will buy their homes,

since no one wants to have a solid waste dump as a next door neighbor. This dump will bring odor, litter, rats, cockroaches etc. And besides that, it's extremely dangerous to wildlife because it's right next to a river. They said it would be done by 2019, but it will most likely not be since they didn't even finish writing out the application until 3/16/18. You're probably wondering well maybe Recology is just too expensive. If so, you're wrong. Twice, Yuba City Council has paid Sloan Vazquez McAfee, owner of Sloan McAfee, \$73,227 to come in and do a financial assessment on whether to renew the Recology contract or open Yuba City up for bids. Both times, McAfee said to keep Recology, yet Yuba City has still been opened for bids. On the second assessment they said this was because the rates between Republic Services and Recology were "essentially a tie". Although they didn't take into account the amount of charities and donations Recology does for the community.

If Yuba City were to get \$190,000 less per year in donations and charities for the next 10 years that would be \$1,900,000 and I really think the city will feel this loss.

During the past 20 months the people of Yuba City have tried to have their voices heard. During the meetings, when the public is invited, the overwhelming majority of residents and business owners tell city council that they would like to keep Recology, yet so far, they have been ignored. Ask yourself why this is happening, who caused this and I can assure you that someone caused this. So this someone decided to try and remove Recology and put many men and women out of a job, and have Republic Waste Services start with Yuba City, despite the Yuba residents saying City they want to keep Recology. I highly suggest that first, you find out who this man is. Then, call the council members and tell them that this is wrong, and that Yuba City needs to keep Recology.

Big T's Trees applied

for a use permit to consolidate their business (i.e., tree trimming and wood milling) operation at 10777 Live Oak Blvd in Live Oak. The property is located on the northern entrance to the city and adjoins an existing residential community called Premier Meadows. The property purchase was to be contingent upon the granting of a use permit. The LO planning staff was recommending approval to the Planning Commission until the residents of Premier Meadows objected and presented facts that showed several city codes prevented such property use. The Commission Planning meeting was subsequently cancelled.

Requests for a Special Council Meeting or Study Session have not

been granted, so in the

last two City Council meetings, residents have complained that Big T Trees tree dump in Yuba City is a preview of what it plans for Live Oak. This business presents a visual disparity with the planned multimillion dollar Highway 99 streetscape improvement project. Rats, mice, snakes, termites, and other pests will reside in the tree dump and migrate to the adjoining businesses and residences. Saws, diesel trucks, and unloading cranes are common tools used in this business. The noise and dust from this 24/7 business is not an appropriate use of this property.

In order to justify the property use by Big T's Trees, the city manager's description has morphed from a milling/lumber yard to a firewood yard. Big T's Trees website does not list firewood sales as a business. With this changed property use description comes the information that the subject property is now in escrow. Apparently, Big T's Trees decided to purchase the property based on information provided by the city.

The result is the city manager is not listening to the residents. Sixty-seven people have signed a petition protesting Big T's Trees property use. The city manager has advised the residents that our only recourse, once Big T's occupies the property, is to make a code enforcement complaint. The city manager is the chief code enforcement officer.

RE: Big T's Trees Proposed Use in Live Oak

Big T's Trees, a tree service currently based in Yuba City, proposes to site its business in Live Oak on a property fronting Highway 99 to the southwest and adjacent to a newer residential subdivision to the east. If Big T's current location on Garden Highway is any indication, and not to put too fine a point on it, the property will essentially be a tree dump. A building across the street is plagued by rats, presumably that migrate from Big T's yard.

The City of Live Oak has changed the project's use description three times. It was originally described as a milling operation and wood storage lot until we brought certain facts regarding that use to the city's attention. The recommendation to approve the original use was inappropriate because, among other things, a noise study had not been commissioned. The city has now settled on defining the business as a firewood lot. This mischaracterization is handy

because a firewood lot is an allowed use in the zoning district, thus not requiring a public hearing and eliminating the opportunity for the public to provide input at such a hearing. Big T's website does not advertise firewood for sale. The city also told us that Big T's will not use any noisegenerating equipment on the property, which seems highly unlikely given the nature of the business. We contend that the use as currently operating is different from an allowable use in the Employment zone in Live Oak.

The city appears committed to approving this impactful use directly abutting our neighborhood, even though the project is clearly incompatible with surrounding uses and is inconsistent with the city's General Plan. This type of use on the parcel is also contrary to the city's goals for beautification of the Highway 99 corridor through town, for which Live Oak was awarded a multimillion-dollar grant.

Residents of our adioining neighborhood are united in thinking a tree service yard in the proposed location is a terrible idea and a use incompatible with the surroundings. Sixty-seven residents have signed letters opposing Big T's Trees' use of the property and listing numerous specific objections. We have sent emails and letters to city staff, the Planning Commission, and the City Council, and have visited city hall on numerous occasions to express our concerns. A group of neighbors attended the City Council meeting last week to voice opposition. All of these efforts have been

to no avail. Rather than focusing on improving the appearance of other neighborhoods in Live Oak, the city has determined that diminishing a well-kept subdivision and dismissing existing residents concerns is preferable. The question everyone asks is: Why?

Two weeks or two months of irrigation water means so much more to the Dobbins/Oregon House community than no water.

It has been proposed that the supply of irrigation water, normally beginning April 15th, not be delivered to irrigation customers because there may not be enough to deliver the whole sea-

Irrigation customers in the surrounding community are being asked to do without two weeks or two months of water; asked to watch water pass us by that could be of beneficial use in providing water to farm animals, keeping their homesteads green, ponds full, orchards irrigated - instead watch their water flow by and given to BVID.

weeks of water, any amount would help. Two weeks or eight weeks less of fire danger, it's that simple and that beneficial. Providing the water allows customers to irrigate, keeping land green. Providing water keeps ponds full, providing water for fire, even if only for two months. Two months of water in the ditch is a source for fire

crews, a benefit for the

entire community.

The NYWD received approximately \$3,000,000 of revenue from power generation this past year. That revenue belongs to all the people of the district, not just the domestic water population. The tax revenue received from Dobbins/Oregon House is upwards of \$250,000

per vear. This money should be used to facilitate service to all customers and to benefit the entire district.

The board of directors

of NYWD should call an emergency session. They should instruct the general manager to start the service to the irrigation system immediately. The board should instruct the general manager to request South Feather to agree to forgo a similar amount of water that they have agreed to in the recent past. It is unthinkable, unconscionable, unbelievable that water will be given free to others. It would be of great beneficial use to our community whether it be for two weeks or two months.



The Foothill Fire Protection District will be able to better treat sudden cardiac arrest in the Yuba County foothills and areas near New Colgate Powerhouse and New Bullards Bar Reservoir with the help of a grant from Yuba County Water Agency.

The \$5,000 grant, approved today by YCWA as a part of the Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, will help the Foothill Fire Protection District purchase three new automated external defibrillator kits, also known as AEDs.

"The Foothill Fire Protection District provides critical, life-saving services to the areas around New Bullards Bar and New Colgate Powerhouse," said YCWA Board Vice- Chairman Randy Fletcher. "We are so appreciative for their quick response capability and we are happy to support them by funding this new equipment."

An AED is a portable device that delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart, and can potentially stop an irregular heartbeat and allow a normal rhythm to resume following a sudden cardiac arrest.

The Foothill Fire Protection District is a completely volunteer department that provides emergency medical, fire and rescue services in the Yuba County foothills. The volunteer fire chief is also the YCWA employee for whom the grant is named.

"I am so honored that I could be a part of this grant program that puts much-needed equipment and training in the hands of Yuba County's first responders," said Foothill Fire Protection District Chief Bill Shaw. "We are very thankful to receive this grant that will allow us to replace our old AEDs."

This is the second agency to benefit from YCWA's Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, which was created in January, 2018. These grants are designed for first responder agencies in Yuba County and will cover the one-time costs of up to \$5,000 per applicant annually, associated with the purchase of rescue equipment or specialized personnel training. Grant funding requests must be connected to YCWA's missions of flood risk reduction, water supply reliability, hydropower generation, groundwater management, fisheries enhancement and recreation in and around New Bullards Bar Reservoir.

Free Waste Tire Disposal Coupons Available

Yuba and Sutter Counties, CA- Planning to do some spring cleaning soon? To assist in this effort, the Regional Waste Management Authority again h~s coupons available for the free disposal of residentially-generated waste tires. Yuba and Sutter County residents can now request a coupon for the free drop-off of up to 20 residentially-generated passenger car and light truck tires per household (for rims up to 17 inches in diameter).

Free tire disposal coupons are issued on a first come, first served basis while supplies last.

They expire 30 days from the date of issue and a valid coupon must be presented when the waste tires are delivered to the drop-off location. Tires do not need to be removed from the rims. Call the Regional Waste Management Authority weekdays between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon and 1 :00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. at (530) 634-6890 to request a coupon or for more information on the program. Please be prepared when you call to provide the number of tires that you have for disposal. This program is for residential use only- no businesses. Commercially generated waste tires are not eligible for this program.

If hauling more than 9 tires at one time, the Local Enforcement Agency conditions on the reverse side of the coupon must be completed. This program is funded by a grant from the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle).

California officials made no serious effort to verify any of these data. The OIG sample revealed that 18 percent of enrollees were clearly ineligible, and that another 9 percent are most likely in violation. All of these enrollees failed one or more of the above-noted requirements.

So, how did this happen? Obamacare removed the incentive to be thorough and honest. At present, 1 in 3 Californians are on Medicaid. As long as the "Affordable Care Act (Obamacare)" remains in place, the federal government will pay a minimum of 90 percent of California's Medicaid costs for new enrollees. Thus, state officials don't want to get it right.

If a doctor cashes-in on unallowable Medicaid reimbursements he goes to jail for fraud. In California, rulers can break the law at will with no consequences. Remember, this is a rogue state for those in charge.


