Marysville Trestle in Danger of Collapse

On the evening of March 23, 2018 it was noticed that the Union Pacific Trestle had begun to sag.

In a Facebook post by Austin Herbaugh Yuba County Supervisor Mike Leahy said that the trestle had sunk 30 inches. Emergency Repairs are underway to fix the train trestle reportedly in danger of collapse in Marysville. Leahy shared a photo of the trestle on Fa-

cebook, warning residents to stay clear of the of the area of the Yuba River just east of the E Street Bridge.

Leahy says this is the same location where crews did extensive work last year. The Yuba County Water Agency has shut off the spillway at New Bullards Bar Reservoir. According to Leahy, there is enough emergency space at the reservoir to hold the extra water during the repair work.

On Monday morning Yuba County Office of Emergency Services was up-dated by the Union Pacific. They were told that no diesel from the pipeline on the trestle was lost. They pumped it out before any spills.

The cause of the sag was a pier that was sinking and pulling the trestle down. They cut the pier loose and put in a temporary pier.

that needed correcting.

Mr. Knudson, of Cal-trans,

said, "The next step is to continue to do studies to complete the draft environmental document. When those studies are completed and the draft environmental document is prepared, it will be put out for public review and comments. There will be meetings during this time, we don't have a schedule when they will take place yet but we will be meeting with the public to further discuss the design of the project." The environmental draft should be available by the end of the year.

Now two months later the

Chico Enterprise-Record reports that \$ 400,000,000 in funding has been approved to widen the dangerous stretch of highway 70 between Oroville and Marysville. The funding will allow widening the highway to five lanes from Oroville to the Yuba County line. From the county line south to Laurellan the road will be widened to three lanes, and back to five lanes from Laurellen to Marysville including the widening of the highway under the railroad tracks.

Sanctuary Laws Illegal and Dangerous

The city council of little Los Alamitos in Orange County, a town of under 12,000 people had the courage to announce their resistance to Gov. Brown and the La Raza Government Sanctuary State law. These legislators are the same moral bottom feeders that prosecuted the undercover reporters who discovered Planned Parenthood was selling body parts of aborted babies.

The city council voted 4-1 to defend the constitution and law enforcement rather than protect foreign criminals in the U.S. The 4.09 square mile city is represented in the state legislature by Republican Senator Janet Nguyen (Vietnamese Immigrant) and Republican Assemblyman Travis Allen.

About 160 people showed up to the City Council meeting, a monthly event that usually gathers little interest to ever fill the tiny 40-seat chamber. Many citizens addressed council members before the vote was taken.

Some History of Loma Rica

Have you ever wondered what Loma Rica was like before the 1920s? I learned the town of Loma Rica --even before Florentine Veigne bought it--was called Colony Cannstadt. The different land owners in the area enticed the folks to live in Cannstadt.

The land was fertile enough to grow grapes. The Germans came out here first, arriving from the city of Cannstadt. Cannstadt Colony had a great blacksmith in town named August John George Sethe who came out here first of September 1884. He did horse shoeing, made drills for mining, and fashioned iron works for the railroads.

Another person that lived in the town back then was a German named Johann Freidrich Heinrich Anschlag. He went by the name of Fritz Anschlag. He was born in the city of Koeinsburg, east of Prussia in 1864. At the age of two years old he lost his mom. He was taken care of by a governess. He attended school at age five though

16. His father took him out of school to train him to work for a living.

A fall from a ladder caused Anschlag to experience a multitude of problems in his life. Mental problems arose, including depression, and caused chronic unemployment. His mental state degraded further at the loss of his father. His uncle took him home and put him to work on his ranch. Anschlag kept making mistake after mistake, and eventually left the ranch.

While searching for employment, Anschlag stole a gold watch and stuffed in his pocket. He paid for just one cheap watch. He thought of taking it back to the store but was afraid to be arrested. He then pawned the watch to a different store and was arrested. The courts signed him up for the military service, but he was unfit.

On November the 11th, 1886, Anshlag left home. It look 14 days to arrive in New York. He stayed for three days, then hopped a train to San Fransico. Anshlag received a very

large amount of money from home. He made up his mind to buy a farm to see if farming was his ideal work. He came across Bangor and then to a place called Colony Cannsdadt, where found some land and began negotiations for its purchase.

Anshlag made a day trip to the City to purchase some seed. While in town he happened to pass a store. Right outside by the store there was some fence wiring. He hopped off his wagon and brought four reels of wire into his buggy. Then drove on and stole some sacks of coffee. At another store he stole someone's packages that had names on them. He made the trip back home and discovered that he forgot to pick up the seed.

A day later, the Sheriff

came, put him in handcuffs, and took him to the city, to see the Justice of the Peace. Anschlag was found guilty and placed into prison for 60 days. When released, he retuned to Bader's ranch again. After about a month, he got the urge to come up with a plan on how to kill his neighbor, Julius Fuge, and steal his land. Fuge was a single man. He came to Anschlag's property while on the way to the post office at Bangor. He asked permission to cross Anschlag's field to shorten his walk. At this time, Bader came to the house; the three men stood around talking for a short while. Then Bader and Fuge trod off to the post office before it closed. Anschlag joined them with his gun, pretending to hunt for hares. He crossed the field a short distance, Fuge to his left and Bader on his right. He carried the gun on his shoulder and said, "rabbit!" Ansclag drew his gun from his shoulder and, pointing it Fuge, pulled the trigger. The gun discharged its contents into Fuge's neck, killing him instantly. Bader and Anschlag stood for a moment, looking at each other. Then they looked around to see if anyone had seen them. Then Anschlag said, "let's us bury him." They promised not to tell a living soul about what had happened that day. A couple of weeks had gone by as Anschlag began to fear that someone would find out that he killed Fuge. He left Colony Canstadt to move

to San Louis Obispo, and








Sanctuary Laws Illegal and Dangerous

from notifying federal immigration officials in many cases when legal and illegal immigrants subject to deportation are about to be released from custody.

The Trump administration went to federal court to invalidate Sanctuary State laws, claiming they obstruct federal immigration law and thus violate the Constitution's supremacy clause. This clause gives federal law precedence over state measures. That case is pending. Los Alamitos leaders voted to file an amicus brief to the Justice Department's lawsuit.

Orange County, once a conservative stronghold, voted in 2016 for Hillary Clinton for President and also helped elect democrat rookie State Senator Josh Newman (D-Fullerton). Newman is facing a recall for voting to raise the gas tax.

Orange County officials led by Supervisor and former member of the State Board of Equalization Michelle Park Steel (South Korean immigrant) as well as leaders in Aliso Viejo and Buena Park said Tuesday they plan to push for various versions of the anti-sanctuary ordinance as well.

Steel said the first duty of government is to protect its citizens, and a law that prevents Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) from apprehending criminal illegal immigrants does just the opposite.

"We are not talking about law-abiding illegal aliens. We're talking about criminals on the street. It's very dangerous, and public safety is very, very important in Orange County," Steel said. "We just want to stop these criminals walking on our streets."

Steel hopes that California's 57 other counties join Orange County in rejecting the "bad law," because all Californians deserve to be in a safe environment.

Shasta County Supervisors approved a resolution declaring the county is not a sanctuary jurisdiction. Similar efforts to officially resist the sanctuary law fell short in Kern County and the City of Costa Mesa.

Local Third District **James** Assemblyman

Gallagher is encouraging cities and counties he represents to follow the lead of Los Alamitos and others in rejecting the bad law.

No official declarations have been made vet by local elected bodies in Yuba-Sutter Counties, but it is unlikely that Yuba County will act. The relicensing of Bullard's Bar Dam worth hundreds of millions of dollars in revenue is still unfinished and supervisors fear a vengeful Governor Brown could punish the county for opposing the Sanctuary Law.

Citizens in the 1800s formed this state to serve and protect counties and cities rather than be a dictator over them. State government is now corrupt, morally bankrupt, has too much control and too much power. The massive bureaucracy is an ineffective mess and harmful to the citizens. Cities and counties are now held captive by those who were supposed to serve them.

The State has gone from being a republic to a regime.



California celebrates Agriculture Day

Hundreds of people braved a light rain to gather outside the state Capitol in Sacramento Tuesday for celebrations commemorating National Agriculture Day. The event focused on the environmental stewardship shown by the state's farmers and ranchers. Coinciding with the first day of spring, Agriculture Day highlights the value of agriculture's contributions to people's daily lives. Agriculture Week celebrations will be held throughout the week in many parts of the state and nation.

Recovery from Thomas Fire could take years

More than three months after the Thomas Fire ripped through Ventura and Santa Barbara counties, farmers and ranchers continue to assess the long-term impacts. Avocado farmers say some fire-blackened trees have started to put out new growth, leading to hope they may recover. Cattle ranchers within the fire zone say it will take years for their herds and grazing land to recover fully. A lemon grower says Santa Ana winds caused more problems than the fire did.

California-grown asparagus reaches market

The state's remaining asparagus farmers hope shoppers will look for California-grown asparagus in markets before Easter. Asparagus acreage in the state has declined during the past 20 years, in large part due to lower-cost competition from Mexico. But California farmers still grow about 7,000 acres of asparagus, mainly along the Central Coast, in the San Joaquin Delta and the Central Valley. Harvest will continue through mid-May.

Report shows gaps in

agricultural science teaching A study issued Tuesday points to gaps in training students for careers in agricultural science. The National 4-H Council and Bayer surveyed teachers and parents. Most respondents said they consider agricultural science important. But many high school science teachers said they don't feel qualified to teach agricultural science. An earlier federal study showed demand from agriculture-science employers greatly outweighs the number of qualified graduates available.

On Wednesday evening March 14, about 35 people showed up for a North Yuba Grown sponsored a Meet Your County Staff Town Hall Meeting at the Alcouffe Community Center in Oregon House. After a some brief introductions County Supervisor Fletcher, and North Yuba Grown spokesman Garv Hawthorne, the meeting got underway.

Leading off was Community Services Director Kevin Mallen. Mr. Mallen spent some time discussing the response to the recent Cascade Fire in Loma Rica. He said, of the 147 homes lost, 39 permits to rebuilt had been applied for, with an average turn around time of two weeks. He expected 2018 to be a busy year.

Next, Mike Lee, with Public Works spoke. He narrated that maintaining the 650 miles of public roads in the county had become challenging as

did emphasize that if SB-1, the Transportation Funding Act, came through as proposed, it would provide much needed money for road maintenance and repair. He provided a road proposed road resurfacing table for county roads through 2021.

Next to speak was Clark Pickell with Environmental Health. revealed that there has been a major change in how the state now considers what the capacity of a septic system can handle. In effect, previous built systems were over engineered by 50%. This means, a septic system designed for two bedrooms can actually handle four bedrooms.

Building Department and Code Enforcement Director Jeremy Strang spoke next. He articulated how many people, who have out of code structures, are reluctant to come forward to





Tariffs vs Tax Credits The media has been rife

with news about the Trump steel tariffs and the opinions run the gamut from full support to outright stern objection. The argument is not so much about whether our steel industries need protection as whole as an argument could be and has been made that China, the target of the tariffs, has been playing unfairly in the arena of free trade. Although most of the media coverage has centered around the specifics of the industry in question, the microscope of analysis should be explaining and detailing how tariffs are thought to work and whether tariffs in general are a useful and efficient remedy to such maladies. Simply put, this particular tariff is an additional tax placed on Chinese steel. Therefore the price of domestic steel would not be reduced.

The obvious reasoning is that by making an import more expensive though tariffs and thereby making American steel more attractive by comparison, our domestic steel industry would benefit.

The first question I would ask is wouldn't a tax credit offered to our steel companies serve the same purpose?

Think of it this way: by installing tariffs on imported steel, the price of domestic steel would not drop in nominal terms. The cost savings to the industries that use steel therefore would not be reduced. These steel consuming industries such as the auto and packaging companies to name a few would see no savings.

Meanwhile the tariff money goes into the coffers of those that initiated the tax, and that means into government coffers.

I have always made the argument that if the governing authorities want to help the bulk of the economy, meaning the consumer, a tax credit would serve the same purpose by giving our industries the needed break in question.

The difference is by allowing domestic steel companies to take a tax credit, they could offer their steel at lower prices to those consuming it. That in turn would mean lower steel prices to those that make the end products which is all the stuff you and I buy that use steel. This would result in a general price reduction in all products that use steel and its related products and that in turn would mean more money in the pockets of American consumers to spend on other items in the economy.

Conversely, when a tariff is used, there is no price reduction in the end product which means the consumer saves nothing. The

money which is the tariff tax goes into government coffers and that should be the end of the story but it's not. It is generally believed the import tariffs actually cause price increases in whatever end product is in question so you get a double whammy and not in your favor dear reader.

One could argue the government would use those additional monies to spend on whatever it spends its money on, but since the consumer is the driving force of all economies, putting that money into the hands of the everyday Joe would not only help a struggling constituency which is all of us, but get into the economy that much quicker.

It's believed by some, this analyst included, that money in the hands of consumers is more wisely spent with less waste than putting that money into an already bloated bureaucracy known as Uncle Sam.

In each specific case a tariff is implemented, the subsequently higher priced import does make the domestic product more attractive by comparison, but besides stuffing government coffers, the consumer would see no benefit from

reduced prices. In fact the consumer would likely see higher prices. Compare this to a tax credit which would have a similar effect on domestic steel demand yet have the additional benefit of lowering prices to the consumer.

That the powers at be wish to help domestic producers and assist in what arguably could be unfair practices is the obvious reasoning. That the money goes into the hands of Washington instead of into the American consumer is the larger issue and something few people are even discussing.



The weather has seemed quite unpredictable so far this year. We had to wait for quite some time for any snow to fall in the mountains, but it finally came - along with some very cold nights and finally some significant rainfall to calm the worries of drought.

Easter Sunday – what better way to start the month of April? April can almost always be counted on as one of our best months for gardening. Hopefully it won't disappoint us this year. Start checking the seed racks for your favorite summer annuals - this is the time to put them in the ground. Marigolds, cosmos, zinnias and sunflowers come to mind, and I'm sure that most of you have your favorites. If you are impatient and can't wait for them to sprout, go to your favorite nursery and see what they have to offer that is ready to gratify your need right now.

Following our long period of drought during the preceding years, we have all been challenged to be more conservative with our use of water. I think that most of us are very cognizant of the need for careful use of our precious sources of water considering all of the losses encountered last summer. I suspect that most of you already employ these conservation methods, but a review

- Check irrigation systems to be sure there are no leaking hoses or fau-
- Be sure that sprinklers are in good working
- Drip systems should be looked at carefully to see that emitters are working properly - this is also important for the health of your plants enough water or maybe too much?
- The use of mulch in garden areas will lessen the frequency of needed irrigation.
- Check on things throughout the season to be certain they are still working correctly.
- Keep the greedy weeds out of the irrigated area, they can soak up lots of water.
- Most of all, enjoy your yard, and feel good about your efforts to conserve!

Daffodils and other spring blooming flowers from bulbs have finished their delightful spring show, and we always wish it could last longer, but they don't. Be sure to treat them right so that they will do it all over again next year. Snap or cut off the spent blooms, but don't cut back the green foliage. That should be left right where it is until it turns yellow and eventually becomes dry, dead foliage. This is what would take place if

it were left strictly to nature. Some of us can't stand to see all that deteriorating foliage and will cut it back. To feed the bulb that has been quite depleted by the creation that beautiful flower, all of the green foliage should be left in place until it has gone through its whole life cycle. Then the bulb will have been nourished and ready start creating one or more bulbs for the next season's lovely show.

Young and newly planted fruit and nut trees should have the trunk of the tree painted with white interior latex paint that has been diluted with about one third to one half water. This helps to prevent sunburn on the still thin bark of the tree which can cause the bark to split leaving the trees vulnerable to insects and diseases. Paint them up to the first branches, or to where the tree shades the trunk. Do not use oil based paint. A latex paint in a very light color can be used, should you have some left from a project, but white is definitely best best because it will reflect more sun and heat.

This is also a good time to establish a new lawn. Don't put that off until the summertime heat is with us or you will find that you will be spending a great deal of time out in the heat trying to keep the emerging grass seed from being killed by the heat. It is hard to manage it if vou are not home to water frequently at that critical time. For an already well established lawn, the lawn mower blades should be set at about 2 inches. Many people like the grass guite short because it looks neater than the longer settings. but it requires more water to keep it green. Leaving it a little longer helps to shade the ground so that it will stay damp for a longer time helping to cut down on the irrigation frequency and thus conserving water. Every little bit helps. Spring is such a beautiful time of the year enjoy it!

PG&E Flying Low in Yuba, Butte County Foothills to Inspect for Dead Trees

Chico, Ca.

As part of its ongoing response to California's tree mortality crisis, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) will conduct aerial patrols in the foothills of Butte and Yuba counties on Thursday and Friday to identify dead trees that could pose a wildfire or other public safety risk. The flights were original scheduled for mid-March but were postponed due to weather.

"Five years of drought and bark beetle infestation in California have caused millions of trees to die or become structurally compromised. We've made significant progress to help reduce wildfire risk by removing dead and dying trees and we're not slowing down. We will continue this critical safety work in

2018," said Carl Schoenhofer, senior manager of PG&E's North Valley division.

In Yuba County the flights will occur over the communities of Loma Rica, Rackerby, Robinson Mill, Brownsville, Sunnyslope, Stanfield Hill and Oregon House.

In Butte County flights will occur over the communities of Bangor, Honcut, Oregon City, Pentz, Cherokee, Yankee Hill, Concow, Deadwood, Parkhill and Berry Creek. Depending on clear

weather conditions, flights will occur between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Every year, PG&E inspects and monitors

every overhead electric transmission and distribution line, either on foot or by air, with some locations patrolled multiple times. Since the tree

mortality crisis began, the energy company has increased foot and aerial patrols in high fire-risk areas to twice a year and up to four times a year in some locations. In 2018 PG&E expects to patrol over half of its overhead distribution lines at least two times.

PG&E is using a contract helicopter service to fly foresters over the area to inspect trees Patrolling by air allows the company to cover many miles quickly and efficiently, and reduces impacts on the ground. Residents are advised that the helicopter will fly low - at about 200 to 300 feet above the ground - along distribution power lines, and higher in areas where livestock are present.
