JAMES (JIM) KENNEDY 1947-2018

James (Jim) Kennedy, longtime pillar, leader, and mentor in the Yuba-Sutter community, passed away at the age of 71 at The Fountains in Yuba City on Feb 3, 2018 after a long battle with Parkinson's disease. His loving wife Wendy and sons Josh and Jake were at his side. In addition he leaves behind Lauren Hull Snowden (Phil), Christopher Hull, and six grandchildren: Taylla, Matthew, Shelby, Andrew, Luke, and Joey as well as nephew Mike and niece Jill. Jim was born in Watsonville, California, one of two sons to James and Dorothy Kennedy. He is proceeded in death by his older brother Robert, and by granddaughter Kylie.

Jim was a fiercely devoted husband, father, and grandfather who could never pass up a game of tummy pokey-pokey when one of the grandkids zeroed in for a hug. Additionally, all efforts at childhood artwork were proudly displayed on his bulletin board, window, ceiling, bathroom mirror, etc. While afraid of little in life, he met his match facing a brisk Scottish wind while wearing a kilt of the Kennedy tartan prior to their wedding along the west coast of Scotland. He rapidly developed an appreciation for the immediate benefits of a tot of Scotland's national drink. He and Wendy were fortunate to have traveled to New Zealand, Australia, Alaska, Ireland, and Scotland as well as many places stateside. Perhaps his favorite of all was simply the front porch at their home in the foothills of Browns Valley, watching the sunset over the Sutter Buttes while enjoying a glass of wine with friends. Jim graduated from Watsonville High School in 1964, going on to earn business degrees from Cabrillo College in 1966 and San Jose State University in 1968. Involved in



municipal and county government since his college graduation, Jim started his career in the Auditor-Appraiser's office of Shasta County, moving on to similar positions in San Benito and Siskiyou Counties before ultimately landing at the Yuba County Treasurer & Tax Collector's (TTC) office in 1979. Starting as assistant to Clifford Irish, he was appointed by the Board of Supervisors to succeed Cliff as Treasurer-Tax Collector in 1980, was elected to the position in 1982, and served in that position his until retirement in December 2009.

During his tenure as the Yuba County Treasurer, Jim was a force in navigating Yuba County and other municipalities through some of the most pressing financial matters in the state's history. He had the job of implementing California Prop 13, fought for Yuba's many water rights issues, guiding the county through multiple bond issues, and maintaining its financial solvency and credit rating. He was especially instrumental at the local and state level in guiding many counties through the aftermath of the Orange County public bankruptcy in 1994. He worked thousands of hours with other county treasurers and state legislators to maintain solvency of numerous

across the state. He and a handful of County employees were the core of emergency services during the 1986 floods, and Jim was a force in long-term levee improvement plans for our area. On a lighter note, many in the community will forever remember getting the green envelope from his office to pay their annual property taxes. For his long and outstanding services in public finance, Jim served as the President of the California Association of County Treasurer-Tax Collectors in 1987-1998, and was honored as Person of the Year by that association in 1998. He was also honored with the Victor E. Martinelli Award in 1997 as the Outstanding County Treasurer in the United States, for which only one other Californian has been so awarded.

While Jim's professional accomplishments alone are notable, it was his volunteer and leadership work across the Yuba-Sutter that defines his legacy. While his sons were young, he coached Little League Baseball and in the Yuba-Sutter Youth Soccer League. Both he and Henry Reimers were the driving factor in starting the soccer program at Marysville HS, where Jim helped coach the first two years until turning the reins over to a full-time coach. He served with the Yuba-Sutter United Way, ultimately being honored with its prestigious Pedro Award. He was a long-time member and past chairperson of the board for Sierra Central Credit Union, where his visionary work enabled SCCU to become one of the finest communitybased credit unions in the USA. He was a past board member and chairperson of the Rideout Hospital Board of Directors, as well as Peachtree Clinic. Late in his career he was elected to the Yuba College Board of Trustees. His professional volunteer service is almost too long to list, but the highlights demonstrate his lasting impact to our community. Jim was cared for by the staff at The Fountains for the final two years of his illness. As the end approached it was with great respect, sadness and obvious love that they helped carry him through his final journey. The kindness and generosity of spirit they showed will always be remembered with great thankfulness. During his last week many friends gathered in his room to share stories, to hold his hand and to tell Jim how much he had influenced their lives. At his request there will be no funeral services. In lieu of flowers, the family suggests donating in his name to the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank, Rideout Health Foundation, the Parkinson's Foundation, or the Stanford Movement Disorders Center. Jim's family will host a celebration of all things Jim at Peachtree Country Club later this spring.

Water Bonds Burn Taxpayers

Since liberals took over the California legislature they have been concerned about water – storing less, using less for humans, and letting more go untapped to the ocean. In the last 50- years there have been no dams built while the population doubled and farms were abandoned after being deprived of a water allotment.

As liberals "re-wild" California and prepare the state for Governor Brown's Global Warming Armageddon, conservatives have been smitten with the Stockholm syndrome. They repeatedly vote to borrow billions via water bonds and get no more water storage or water for farming.

Finance counselors advocate saving in good times to survive future difficulties. However, liberal legislators see no sense in holding back more water during winter to prevent drought or deluge.

In November 2006, 64% of voters passed "Proposition 1E -The Disaster Preparedness and Flood Protection Bond Act authorizing \$4.09 billion in borrowing to rebuild and repair California's most vulnerable flood control structures to protect homes and prevent loss of life from flood-related disasters, including levee failures, flash floods, and mudslides and to protect California's drinking water supply system by rebuilding delta levees that are vulnerable to earthquakes and storms."

On the same ballot, 53.8% said yes to "Proposition 84 - The Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act" creating an additional \$800 million in debt.

None of these nearly \$5 billion included work at Oroville Dam but there was money to spend on "Sustainable Communities & Climate Change Reduction, Planning and Design Protection of Rivers, Lakes, and Streams, Forest and Wildlife Conservation, Protection of Beaches, Bays and Coastal Waters, Parks and Nature Education Facilities."

It's now 12 years later and some of the 2006 funds have yet to be spent.

However, in 2014 after a severe drought, neglected dams and insufficient water storage more than 67% of fearful voters approved "Proposition 1 -The Water Quality, Supply, and Infrastructure Improvement Act authorizing \$7.545 billion in general obligation bonds *More on Page 8*

EPA Formally Suspends WOTUS

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) officially suspended implementation of the agency's Waters of the United States rule last week to comply with last year's Executive Order issued by President Trump.

EPA Secretary Scott Pruitt filed the legal documents on Tuesday required to suspend the rule for two years while the agency seeks public input on a redrafted version of the rule.

Opponents of the rule suspension, including the Natural Resources Defense Council, have already vowed to pursue legal action against the move saying that the rule suspension denies protections to public health.

However, supporters of the move nationwide are applauding the suspension of the rule in light of the controversial nature of the original rulemaking process, as well as questions still surrounding the actual water quality benefits that would result from the measure.

Many, such as Rural County Representatives of California, opposed the rule as a jurisdictional overreach and inappropriate expansion of federal authority over bodies of water not previously controlled by the federal government.

The expansion of federal authority over these waters could result in delays in important local public works projects such as maintenance of flood conveyances that could ultimately endanger public safety. about the Trump Administration cutting the size of government you may think the nation is collapsing. These people think they and their ideas are indispensable.

It was a thrill to hear federal employees threaten that up to 25% of them would quit if Trump was elected. It is even better to see some keep those promises. Those leaving and even trash talking on their way out is a sweet sound.

Trump recently authorized millions of dollars to do an audit of military spending. People gasped at the expense. However, the law mandates an annual audit that no one has been doing. It is one thing to honor the military and properly fund it, but being a watchdog for the taxpayers is new for Washington.

A few politicians have weak stomachs. The waste in Washington makes them sick. Oklahoma medical doctor and Senator Tom Coburn was so put-out he created 'The Waste Book' annually highlighting some of the most bizarre and embarrassing uses of money forcefully taken from hard-working Americans.

Coburn retired from office in January 2014. Since then, Arizona Senator Jeff Flake has taken on the cause of waste to produce Wastebook: PORKemon Go that lists the top 200 shameful examples. Here are a few.

Flowers plentiful for Valentine's Day, despite challenges

Flower farmers in the Carpinteria Valley largely dodged two disasters this winter: the Thomas Fire and subsequent mudslides. As Valentine's Day nears, the region called the "flower basket of the world" is returning to normal and ready to fill customers' vases. Roses are often the holiday's go-to flower. One farmer says his hydroponic roses have carved

a niche for themselves in a market dominated by imports.

Wildfire lessons spread statewide

Lessons learned from the North Bay wildfires could help other regions prepare for and respond to disasters, according to farmers and officials who met last week in Sonoma County. One agricultural commissioner spoke of arranging escorted access to farms and ranches in evacuation zones

during the October fires, and of being contacted by a Southern California counterpart for advice on how to accomplish that during the Thomas Fire in December.





Democracy vs Freedom Which Do We Have?

Freedom is so often confused with democracy and more so in recent times. I would rather use the word "liberty" as in "give me liberty or give me death". Patrick Henry's famous utterance did not contain the word freedom nor democracy but precisely the word liberty and I put forth there exists a definite difference between the three words.

Democracy can be said to be majority rule and that didn't work out so well for many a minority group throughout history. Its deficiency is best illustrated in the case of two wolves and a lamb deciding by democratic vote what to eat for dinner. Democracy doesn't work out so well for the lamb as dinnertime arrives. Liberty and freedom are said to go hand in hand but they do not. To establish and clarify the opaque areas of the two. the Bill of Rights was established together with the U.S. Constitution and herein lies the essence of the explanation and interpretation as set forth by the authors of both documents. The right to bear arms, the right to vote, the right to trial and many other rights we humans deem basic and necessary were detailed by our forefathers. By insuring ones liberty to act freely constrained by the prohibition of infringing on another's rights does liberty and freedom truly reign. All other attempts

Alexander Fraser Tytler (1747-1813) said; "a democracy cannot exist as a permanent form of government. It can only exist until the voters discover that they can vote themselves largesse from the public treasury. From that moment on, the majority always votes for the promising candidates the most benefits from the public treasury with the result that a democracy always collapses over loose fiscal policy, always followed by a dictatorship. The average age of the world's greatest civilizations has been 200 years".

Is not there enough of a warning here, indeed a prognostication, that seems to encompass most of the attacks we see on our reverent Constitution?

Defending our country from foreign enemies is often quoted as the price of freedom, but democracies, or should we call them nations of individual liberty, are more often destroyed from within.

Those that exist within the borders are more dangerous than those outside of them for outsiders can be clearly defined and defended against. Those that dwell within the borders however, can destroy by subterfuge, propaganda or by appealing to the masses, promising ev-

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

Pets and livestock/ poultry all require the same basic things; a method to control them (leashes, collars, halters, leads); a safe place to keep them; food and water for a minimum of a week; medications; proof of ownership (photos and papers); vet records; identification tags on the animals and a method to transport them (crates). You also need cash and


a full tank of gas. Cats should have identification tags, break away collars and harnesses; litter; litter boxes; and a crate. For safety and to prevent escape in cars, crate your cat (small dogs too). Only transfer cats from their carrying cage to a larger cage behind closed doors, even the friendliest cat can be terrified and try to escape. Dogs should be in crates or on a leash.


Bird cages need to be covered with a blanket for drafts; uncovered when hot, reptiles also have difficulty with the cold temperatures and must be in cages. Make sure you bring what they need for their care.

It's your responsibility to feed and clean up after your animals while at evacuation shelter or

someone's home.

Make a mutual agreement with friends who live outside your community that when a disaster occurs they will shelter your pets and livestock. If there is a fire or flood danger it is wisest to remove your animals early, prior to the evacuation order. Better to be inconvenience for a few days then regret you did not get them out. If you are notified during the night or have to get out immediately - load your animals in secure cages (if possible) or trailers, take what food you can. Grab your papers and leashes or rope and go.

Islamic Relief USA Donating Over \$75,000

to Help Yuba County Families Impacted by Wildfires

Alexandria, Va. -Islamic Relief USA is contributing more than \$75,000 to provide financial assistance to residents whose homes were destroyed or classified as uninhabitable by the American Red Cross.

Much of the assistance will assist residents living in Yuba County, which has one of the highest poverty rates among the impacted counties. Some 151 homes in that county alone were destroyed. Each family will receive \$500 in direct assistance, in the form of cash cards. Collectively, \$75,500 will be distributed to area families.

Assistance in identifying homes that were

damaged or destroyed was provided by the American Red Cross and Yuba County Emergency Management.

"This is our way to help during a very difficult time," said Anwar Khan, president of Islamic Relief USA. "While many material possessions have been lost, not the least of which are houses where so families had lived in for many years, this direct assistance can help them find another place to live. In addition, it can also help them rebuild their lives emotionally."

Wildfires that broke out in the Northern California area in early October killed 43 people and destroyed more than

200,000 acres and 8,900 structures.

and Sonoma Napa counties saw some of the biggest conflagrations. Fires also broke out in Mendocino and Lake counties. One wildfire, the Tubbs fire in Santa Rosa, took some 23 days to contain.

Islamic Relief USA dispatched its Disaster Response Team during the response phase, providing assistance by operating a mass shelter in the Sonoma County Fairgrounds. IRUSA collaborated with the American Red Ross, the Salvation Army and the National Guard, among other groups.

Water Bonds Burn Taxpayers

to fund ecosystems and watershed protection and restoration, water supply projects. infrastructure including surface and groundwater storage, and drinking water protection." This act also included "Climate and Drought Preparedness," code words to address the governor's climate disaster phobia.

Breitbart writer Chriss Street wrote in a September 4, 2014 piece "that a close look at the language in the proposition reveals that the initiative is another legislative 'bait and switch' that will not complete a single major water storage or delivery system." The \$2.7 billion for water storage in essence offers to fund 25% of a project and only if it can prove a payback or "public benefits to taxpayers in recreation, ecosystem improvements, water quality and flood control."

These benefits (\$1 per \$1 of state contribution) are defined not as how much water a reservoir can hold, but rather how much it improves recreation - boating or hiking, flood control and environmental conditions, such as helping endangered salmon populations come back by providing cold water to streams during dry periods.

The bond also states, "A project shall not be funded...unless it provides measurable improvements to the Delta ecosystem or to the tributaries to the Delta." Any submitted proposals to use the funds must clear Governor Jerry Brown's select California Water Commission.

"We're not paying for water. We're paying for public benefits," said Chris Orrock, a spokesman for the California Water Commission. "As defined in Prop 1, water is not one of those benefits that we are funding. We've been very clear at every step."

Four years later and they are just beginning to vet proposals for storage increases. Remember, the Empire State Building was erected in a just over a year. As Street wrote, the political game is rigged against new dams, plain and simple.

Now, environmentalists and their poll takers believe the voters racked by a 5-year drought and then torrential rains are still up for more bait and switch borrowing for water. In June 2018, the Legislature's new \$4.1 billion ballot measure will fund water recycling, construction of flood-control levees and cleanup of polluted

waterways.

However, close to half the bond money would have little or nothing to do with water projects. Some would go to park acquisition and maintenance, much of it in Southern California. Money would be allocated for trail construction and land conservation in the Bay Area. Low-income communities would be given priority for the funding.

An \$8.9 billion measure if it qualifies for the November 2018 ballot would not add storage. It would support more recycling, groundwater and cleanup programs. It would also pay for traditional water projects such as improved canals for farm irrigation in the Central Valley with a spiff of \$200 million for Oroville Dam repairs and millions more for other reservoir upgrades to persuade Nor-Cal voters.

With \$12.43 billion borrowed already and 2006 funds remaining to be spent and no sincere effort to build new dams, why do citizens keep voting yes? The voters are ideological hostages and joined the perpetrators to survive. It's called the Stockholm syndrome.



The titled section, "Getting Lit at the Liquor Store," complains that the \$5,000 grant to a store called Newberry Liquors, in Newberry, Florida, went to an establishment that, "In addition to liquor, wine, and beer ... also serves cigarettes and tobacco products." Actually many rural liquor stores and other businesses and farms cashed in on the Rural Energy for America Program. Why do some businesses get welfare and not others? Good question. The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry was given a \$150,000 federal grant to develop "earthquake-proof gingerbread houses." Then, there is the "Spaceport to Nowhere" (\$80.4 million). The Pacific

Spaceport Complex-Alaska (PSCA) was founded in 1996 with an \$18 million earmark. It has been seldom used since its founding and is now in disrepair as a result of a 2014 failed launch. Last year, the Missile Defense Agency awarded a "sole source" contract for up to \$80.4 million to keep the base open.

The Department of Defense's Office of Naval

Diego Scripps Institution of Oceanography received \$1.5 million to study how well mudskippers, a fish that can survive long amounts of time out of water and can walk with its front flippers, could walk on a treadmill. More National Science monies (\$450,000) went for research to determine if dinosaurs could sing.

The National Eye Institute spent \$300,000 of

As a real estate appraiser, I have seen smallscale, discreet cultivation of Marijuana that had no direct effect on neighbors at all. In comparison, the Yuba County foothill communities median home price (for parcels of five acres or less) increased from \$181,000 to \$304,000, an increase of only 68%.

I presented these numbers to a number of local real estate professionals and they all agreed that the stigma associated illegal marijuana with grows was a major contributing factor, especially since the difference in values appears to correlate with the communities that are affected the most by illegal marijuana impact.





Mark Twain Live! Jail Break Tour

Special Guest Apearances by Black Bart and Stephen J. Field



Marysville, Ca. Yuba-Sutter loves its Gold Rush era history. Help celebrate that history when Samuel Clemens (aka Mark Twain) returns to Marysville on Saturday, February 24th

at 4pm on stage at the Burrows Theater at Yuba Sutter Arts.

Mark Twain first appeared in Marysville on October 15, 1866 as part of his Western lecture tour. On that auspicious



occasion, he delivered his "Our Fellow Savages of the Sandwich Islands" (Hawaii) lecture which included a discussion of the islands' geography, climate and customs and reports of cannibalism. Twain started the lecture with, "I have the pleasure of introducing to vou Mr. Samuel Clemens. otherwise Mark Twain, a gentleman whose high character and unimpeachable veracity are only surpassed by his personal comeliness and native modesty."

Mark Twain will be brought to life by actor Chris LeGate who has been performing his one man Mark Twain presentation since 1994. He started out by entertaining brunch quests at the Holbrooke Hotel in Grass Valley which he did for eight years, racking up a total of over 400 appearances at that one location alone.

Chris took his show on the road and began performing throughout Northern California at county fairs, schools, and special events and at theaters in Nevada City, Sacramento and Eureka. He even claims to have appeared locally at the Burrows Theater, although we are unable to substantiate that claim at this time.

The performance will be in the "stand up comedy" style used by Twain and his contemporaries during the late 19th century. The topics will range from his early life in Hannibal, Missouri, his time as a riverboat pilot on the Mississippi. his brief stint as a Confederate soldier and his time out west, including Marysville, whether he was really here or not!

To make the event even more fun, there will be quest appearances by other local Gold Country historic figures of note - an historic "mash up," if you will - with Charles Boles, aka Black Bart (1816 - 1899), and Stephen J. Field (1829 -1888), the first Supreme Court Justice from West of the Mississippi. They'll appear alongside Mark Twain (1835 - 1910) for some lively discussion in the second half of the show. Their lives overlapped for 30 some years and we'll explore any real or imagined interactions they may have had.

The performance will conclude with a guestion and answer session where the lecturer and special guests (Mike Moyers and Chuck Smith) are expected to answer with the truth, mainly.

Doors open at 3:30 and "the trouble begins at 4." At the Burrows Theater, 630 E Street in Marysville. Tickets are \$15 general admission and \$10 for seniors, military and students. Plenty of free parking is available on the adjacent streets and in the Umpqua Bank and Bank of America parking lots.
