Ehrlich's Snake Oil

This is the 50th anniversary since Bing Professor of Population Studies at Stanford University, Paul Ehrlich and wife Anne wrote "The Population Bomb." The book sold millions making Ehrlich an environmentalist god. He collected prizes and awards and achieved a life of academic luxury, now 85 years of age and still on the tax-payer's dime. Ehrlich's gibberish deceived millions.

Serving global warming nonsense, carbon dioxide lies and population panic as science have made students less intelligent. They ace the test but acquire the brain flu. Remember, for liberals it doesn't need to make sense, just sound amazing.

Ehrlich boldly lost his mind. He predicted imminent mass starvation, in the 1970s and 1980s. Hundreds of millions would die from lack of food in spite of any immediate rescue efforts. It was too late to prevent catastrophic losses.

Ehrlich also said life expectancy in the U.S. by 1980 would fall to 42 years. People on average made it to 73.61 that year.

Ocean levels were to rise by 250 feet. Ehrlich went all in warning about a "high water event" if the polar ice-caps started to melt. Yuba County Looks at Marijuana Pros and Cons

Marysville, Ca. The Yuba County Board of Supervisors formed an Ad Hoc committee to look into the pros and cons of commercial cannabis grows. Supervisors Bradford and Leahy are the two members that make up the committee. Supervisor Bradford said that their goal is to investigate how other counties have dealt with the issue and what kind of problems they have had. The intent is that the committee will be finished in 3 to 6 months and bring back to the board facts about the commercial growing Marijuana. The two Supervisors agreed that

while the public has voted down marijuana grows at every chance the votes have been very close and they believe the voters are split on their view of commercial cannabis grows.

The hour and a half meeting heard from both sides of the issue. Both sides agreed that the illegal un-regulated grows were the source of fear and environmental damage. The pro cannabis people took the position that 80% of the illegal grows would not be able to meet the regulation requirements. Those opposed to cannabis grows asked that the commit-

tee be dissolved and felt that the committee was pushing for commercial grows.

Both sides of the is-

sue requested that future meetings be a combination of some day meetings and some evening meetings.





At Yuba Sutter Arts, the literary arts are high on our list of priorities. So for the ninth year, we will once again sponsor the annual Poetry Out Loud competition in conjunction with the California Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts.

There's still plenty of time for our local high school English, Speech, Theatre and all teachers to encourage students to participate. In the past, some very creative English teachers have even told their students that they will award extra credit points or even accept student participation in the Poetry Out Loud competition in lieu of an assignment. This may help energize students and get them excited about memorizing a poem!

The structure of Poetry Out Loud is similar to a spelling bee. Yuba Sutter Arts works with local teachers, but students may compete independently regardless of whether or not Poetry Out Loud is part of the curriculum. All currently enrolled students in grades 9-12 are eligible. All poems must be selected from the Poetry Out Loud print or online anthology, which is updated every year. www.poetryout-Visit loud.org for the current list of over 900 poems and more information about the competition. Only versions of poems from the official anthology may be used in the contest.

This year, Yuba Sutter Arts will host two separate county competitions due to the high level of student participation last year. Yuba County students will compete on Tuesday, February 6th and Sutter County students will compete on Thursday, February 8th. Each competition begins at 6pm and will take place on stage at the Burrows Center for the Arts in Marysville.

Yuba Sutter Arts has increased the prize money for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in both counties. Third place winners will receive \$75, second place winners will receive \$100 and first place winners will receive \$150 and then compete at the state finals at the Capitol in Sacramento in March. 
Our county winners will be treated to an unforgettable two days at the California Poetry Out Loud State Finals in Sacramento in March. At the state level, one this exciting event.

Fish in the Classroom

For nearly 25 years, Greg and Kathleen Payne have been teaching Yuba County elementary school students about the life cycle of fish and the importance of a healthy watershed. That program got a boost today, with a grant from Yuba County Water Agency to fund new equipment for this unique, inspirational program.

As a part of the California Aquatics Education Program, commonly referred to as Fish in the Classroom, students help set up aquariums in their classrooms, receive salmon or steelhead eggs, maintain water temperatures to mimic river conditions, and observe the different life stages before releasing them into the wild.

"In doing this, the students are able to become bonded with nature and learn to understand the importance of salmon in the river, the watershed, and how their everyday lives can impact the health of the river," said Kathleen Payne, program organizer.

This grant will allow the program organizers to purchase new water chilling units necessary for keeping the classroom aquariums at the appropriate temperature for fish to grow. The YCWA Board of Directors unanimously approved the request, which would include additional funding in the years to come to replace the remaining chillers as they wear out.

"It's impressive to see that the students know all of the life cycles of the fish, and to have that education at such a young age is just phenomenal," said YCWA General Manager Curt Aikens. "We strongly support these type of programs to educate our kids on the importance of the environment."

YCWA has supported the Fish in the Classroom program for more than 20 years by helping fund the maintenance and costs of the aquarium chillers and transportation to and from the river, when needed.

Supports statewide water management project bonds

The Yuba County Water Agency Board of Directors unanimously expressed their support for two proposed water and park bond measures that will be on statewide ballots this year.

These bonds, if approved by California's voters, would provide critical funding for water projects including flood protection, groundwater management, watershed protection, habitat restoration and actions to improve safe drinking water supplies for communities in need.

Senate Bill No. 5, the "California Drought, Water, Parks, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018" is a \$4 billion bond approved by the California Legislature and Governor last year to fund water and park projects, climate change preparedness, coastal protection and other projects, programs and improvements.

The National Heritage Institute's initiative, the "State Water Supply Infrastructure, Water Conveyance, Ecosystem and Watershed Protection and Restoration, and Drinking Water Protection Act of 2018" is an \$8.9 billion bond to fund a wide-range of programs including wastewater recycling, flood protection, water conservation and watershed improvements.

"Our board voted to support the two bonds because they would enable agencies like YCWA to leverage local and federal funds to cost-share essential water projects throughout California, including in Yuba County," said YCWA Board Chairman Brent Hastey. "This is a great opportunity to fund flood protection and habitat restoration projects here at home."

Both bond measures would additionally allow California to make significant investments in improved water resources management and infrastructure and to be better prepared for potential future droughts and floods.

The SB 5 bond measure will appear on the June 2018 statewide ballot and the National Heritage Institute's initiative measure is targeted for the November 2018 statewide ballot.

Funding for Ellis Lake pumping station approved

The Yuba County Water Agency Board of Directors today approved a grant for the City of Marysville to fund emergency construction at Ellis Lake.

The grant, worth up to \$175,000, will allow the city to perform interim repairs on the Ellis Lake storm drain pump station and a pipe that goes from the pump station, under the railroad embankment and through the levee to Jack Slough. Jack Slough is a stream located to the north of Ellis Lake and is a tributary of the Sacramento River.

The heavy winter storms in 2017 required operation of the pump system to move water out of the lake, but when activated, the pipe transferring that water showed evident signs of leakage, creating a potential for levee failure.

"This emergency repair really needs to be done before we get high water," said Curt Aikens, YCWA general manager, as he explained the grant to the board of directors, who approved the funding unanimously.

"YCWA provides flood protection for the people who live and work in Yuba County," said YCWA Board Chairman Brent Hastey. "It's crucial that these repairs are done quickly to maintain the integrity of the levee and to protect the residents of Marysville."

The interim repairs will provide the city time to develop, permit, fund and construct full repairs of the entire Ellis Lake drainage system, which is estimated to cost approximately \$1 million and take a few years.

Marysville's new city manager, Marti Brown thanked the YCWA board and staff for their support and partnership in this project. "I don't have to tell you how critical this kind of infrastructure is in order to prevent flooding," she said. "Having this kind of financial support is essential to our long-term success, while the city continues to rebuild its fragile budget and financial reserves."

As Marysville prepares to award a contract for the emergency construction, YCWA's grant will further provide a buffer for unanticipated issues and help facilitate quick repairs.

Grant to aid first responders, fire districts

The Yuba County Water Agency launched a unique grant for first responder agencies and fire districts, based on a suggestion from a severely-injured employee who wanted to help those who helped him.

The Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program is designed for first responder agencies in Yuba County and will cover the one-time costs of up to \$5,000 per applicant annually, associated with the purchase of a piece of rescue equipment or specialized personnel training. It was established in recognition and dedication of an employee, Bill Shaw.

Last year, Shaw was involved in an accident while operating a construction vehicle near one of YCWA's more remote facilities. His injuries were so severe, he was unable to return to work for several weeks. A fire chief in the foothills himself, while Bill was still in recovery, he suggested that YCWA create a grant to support the first responders and fire districts that the agency relies upon during incidents

"It was important that the folks that showed up to help me that day were well-trained and knew how to deal with my injuries," said Shaw. "In recent years, I've seen call volumes increase and the number of responders and volunteers decline. The costs are increasing, but the budgets aren't, and it's a serious problem that we have county-wide. So, anytime that YCWA can step forward and help pay for training for new personnel or buy new equipment as needed, is a real benefit."

Many different public agencies within Yuba County provide first-responder rescue and safety services for employees at YCWA's Colgate Powerhouse and New Bullards Bar Dam, and people recreating at New Bullards Bar Reservoir, the surrounding areas and associated agency facilities. Agencies will be able to apply for the funding as long as the expenditure is for equipment or training that is within YCWA's authorized missions.

"These grants will ensure the first responders can purchase and train on the specialized equipment that we might need in an incident," said YCWA General Manager Curt Aikens. "And, this way, they are available for others in the community who may need them, too."

Following the accident, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration conducted a thorough inspection of the incident, but it did not result in any fines or violations. Shaw was cleared earlier this month to return to work for YCWA without any restrictions.

The grant program was unanimously approved by the board of directors.

Mudslides add to Southern California farm losses

In the wake of the deadly mudslides that hit Santa Barbara County last week, officials have begun to gauge the impact to agricultural operations. The California Cut Flower Commission says a number of flower farms in the Carpinteria Valley have been affected--either directly from the slide or indirectly through loss of power to greenhouses and through road damage. Groups representing growers of other crops say they are still trying to assess any losses.

Walnut business prepares for increased production

Anticipating larger crops in coming years, people in the walnut business have been adding facilities and marketing plans to handle and sell the crops. The California Walnut Commission says it plans to focus on enhancing demand in domestic markets, in part by stressing the nutritional benefits of walnuts. The commission will also work to develop new products featuring walnuts, including in confections, spreads and sauces.

Dairy marketers follow dietary trends

Do you drink your milk, or eat it? Americans have been eating a higher proportion of their milk intake by consuming dairy products such as yogurt, cheese and butter. In response to the trend, California-based dairy processors say they're working to create new products and different blends of existing products. The California Milk Advisory Board says it sees potential in incorporating dairy foods more frequently into snacks and at breakfast.

USDA reports on crop condition

With more rain and snow due in Northern California during the next week, farmers may be able to ease back on wintertime irrigation of developing crops. The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports that farmers have been irrigating a variety of crops this month, due to dry conditions so far this winter. Rain that fell last week benefited lettuce, pasture and other crops, but USDA says additional rain will be needed.





Improving the Yuba River's Ecosystem

Like many Sacramento Valley rivers, the Yuba was once amazingly productive. Hundreds of thousands of salmon and steelhead would trek up the river each year to spawn, and benefit from the vast riparian vegetation and marshlands that also served migratory birds and wildlife. But with the Gold Rush, came hydraulic mining, blasting away mountainsides with high-pressure water so the miners could sift through the sediment for gold. Incredible amounts of sediment and debris washed downstream, impacting (riverboats navigation were a primary transportation mode back then) and causing massive environmental damage, devastating the fish population. The fix was the government's construction of Daguerre and Englebright Dams debris dams, to prevent the remaining sediment from flowing downstream. This impacted the fish even more, because Englebright

passage to historic habitat, while Daguerre impairs fish passage.

Fast forward to the 21st Century. The Yuba County Water Agency and the US Army Corps of Engineers are working together on a plan to improve habitat conditions of the Yuba River. The draft plan recommends the restoration of approximately 178 acres of aquatic and riparian habitat along the lower Yuba, between Englebright Dam and the confluence with the Feather River, downstream of Marysville. The plan is now available for public review. I encourage you to read it and submit your comments for the record. Let the Corps know if it meets our community's needs.

YCWA appreciates the suggestions restoration included in this draft report, but we continue to encourage the Corps to do even more, including reexamining fish passage

Natural disasters can occur at any given time and in any given area. The size, duration and damages are usually unpredictable. The devastation, destruction and cost of California wildfires are increasing annually. In 2017, more than


1,500 wildfires burned over 640,000 acres on National Forest System lands in California, including the Thomas Fire which is now the largest in California history. Although the fire is fully contained, the surrounding communities are presently dealing with debris flows caused by a now charred and barren landscape that no longer has the protection of trees, grass and other vegetation for a stable ground. To date, 17 people have died, several others are still missing, and more than 100 homes have been destroyed as a result of

these mudslides. Additionally, in early October, a series of winddriven wildfires burned more than 200,000 acres across Northern California. The fires destroyed thousands of structures and killed 44 people. Although the fires did not occur on Forest Service lands, the agency worked closely with state and local cooperators on fire suppression efforts.

The Pacific Southwest Region has spent over \$500 million preventing or suppressing wildfires

ing for suppression efforts performed by the Forest Service comes from the overall agency's budget based on a 10year rolling average—a model that is simply unsustainable, given the last several years of unprecedented fire seasons. When wildfire suppression funding is insufficient, the Forest Service is forced to shift money away from other investments designed to build healthy, resilient forests and communities. We must find a permanent solution that restores the balance between fire prevention, fire suppression and resource restoration.

As mentioned above, many residents in California have suffered significant harm and loss from recent fires and mudslides. We see and empathize with those affected, and are working to reduce the potential for future loss by performing hazardous fuel reduction treatments. In Fiscal Year 2017 alone, we performed fuels reduction treatments on over 310,000 acres of Forest Service lands across the state, but there is more to be done. To date, 80 million acres of National Forest System lands are currently at moderate to high risk of insects, disease or fire. Of these, 10 million acres are located in California. Essentially, the more acres we treat,




the healthier our forests become, contributing to safer and more resilient communities. The science, data and monitoring shows that hazardous fuel treatments and thinning positively affects fire behavior and lowers the catastrophic risk of fire damage. A fire funding fix will allow the USDA Forest Service to invest more in this critical work.

We are appreciative of the ongoing work of USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue and Congress who have acknowledged the funding issue and are working hard to help resolve these challenges.

Fortunately, there is bipartisan support from key leaders in Congress toward legislation to reform the way wildfire suppression is currently funded. Finding a permanent solution to fix the fire funding problem will go a long way in sustaining the health, diversity and productivity of our Nation's forests and grasslands for current and future generations.

Legislation Honoring Marine SSgt Sky Mote Signed by President

Congressman Tom Mc-Clintock announced that the President of the United States has signed H.R. 381, designating a mountain in the John Muir Wilderness of the Sierra National Forest as "Sky Point." The bill honors Marine SSgt Sky Mote of El Dorado, who was killed in action in Afghanistan on August 10, 2012.

On that day, SSgt Mote was at his post in the tactical operations center of the First Marine Special Operations Battalion in Helmand Province. When an Afghan police officer opened fire on the Marines at the operations center, Sergeant Mote was in an adjoining room. According to the

Navy's citation, "He instead grabbed his M4 rifle and entered the operations room, courageously exposing himself to a hail of gunfire in order to protect his fellow Marines. In his final act of bravery, he boldly engaged the gunman, now less than five meters in front of him, until falling mortally wounded."

SSgt Mote was awarded the Navy Cross for his heroism in defending his fellow Marines. In addition, SSgt Mote had earned the Purple Heart, the Navy-Marine Corps Commendation Medal, the Navy-Marine Corps Achievement Medal, two Combat Action Ribbons and three Good Con-

duct Medals during his nine years of exemplary service to our nation.

The peak was chosen in consultation with the Mote family because it overlooks a region where Sky Mote often camped and hiked.

"We will not allow the young men from our region who perished in service to our country to be forgotten," said Congressman McClintock. "Nor will we ever forget the daily anguish of the Gold Star families they leave behind. This bill is a small token of the commitment of our country and our community to remember the fallen and to grieve with their families."

DMV Will AUTOMATICALLY Register Illegal Aliens to Vote

For many years illegal aliens received full blown drivers licenses from the California Department of Motor Vehicles—all they had to do, is what they do every day, LIE. "Although black Americans were 13.5 percent of the nation's native-born population, they were only 7.8 percent of the foreignborn population in 2000," Briggs noted. export food.

Vardy reports that Charles Maurice and Charles W. Smithson at Texas A&M University studied the history of natural resources over 10,000 years and discovered that temporary shortages in resources are the norm. However, these scarcities led not to catastrophe but to an improved substitute.

The Greeks' transition from the Bronze Age to the Iron Age 3,000 years ago was caused by a shortage of tin. The rise of coal-use followed a lack of timber in 16th-century Britain. A scarcity of whale oil in 1850 led directly to the first oil well in 1859.

Obama, either the idiot or the liar, boringly lectured about running out of fossil fuel resources.
