

Caltrans District 10 Project is Not a Done Deal

Caltrans had proposed bringing State Route 70 to current highway standards from 0.2 miles north of Laurellen Rd. to South Honcut Creek Bridge at the Yuba County/Butte County line. The project, promoted as a necessary safety project would take farm land, houses and increase traffic speeds. The stretch of highway to the Butte County line has more accidents and deaths than the state average.

Caltrans had two public meetings on the project, April 11, and Nov. 9, 2017. The November 9th meeting was packed with District 10 residents, who strongly expressed their concerns. The feeling at the end of the meeting was that the project was a done deal. The only thing left was for Caltrans to meet with property owners and establish a price for their land and homes.

However; residents of District 10 organized and requested that they be able to make a presentation of their concerns to the Yuba County Board of Supervisors.

On January 23, 2018 the Yuba County citizens of District 10 made a

well organized presentation to the board. With the theme “Let’s Do It Right”, the presentation began, recognizing there was a safety issue that needed correcting. They pointed out that most of the accidents on that stretch of highway come from people breaking the law, speeding, drinking and unsafe lane changes. What they really need is law enforcement. The question of whose safety was being protected was brought up. The project would impact 200 driveways with cars trying to safely get out in the traffic. This is

an agricultural area with large trucks filled with produce trying to get on the highway and it takes time for them to get their speed up to the flow on the traffic. The suggestion was made that the project could be rerouted to the east along the railroad tracks with far less impact to the farming community of District 10. A map showing their proposal was submitted to Caltrans.

Mr. Cameron Knudson Project Manager for Caltrans at this time said, “This Safety project is to add a Two Way Left Turn Lane(TWLTL) in the mid-

dle, one 12 ft. lane in each direction, 8 ft. shoulders and a 20 ft. clear recovery zone(CRZ). The 8 ft. shoulder is part of the CRZ. Additional width will be required for utility easements and drainage beyond the CRZ.

The ultimate design for the Hwy between Marysville and Oroville is 5 lanes and this will be included in the environmental studies for the project.”

The Board of Supervisors all agreed that they needed more information. Caltrans will now do a full blown Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and when completed will present it to the Board of Supervisors for comment.

Mr. Knudson said, “The next step is to continue to do studies to complete the draft environmental document. When those studies are completed and the draft environmental document is prepared, it will be put out for public review and comments. There will be meetings during this time, we don’t have a schedule when they will take place yet but we will be meeting with the public to further discuss the design of the project.”

Students More Than a Meal Ticket

Yuba City High School placed teacher Jim Whiteaker on administrative leave pending an investigation into accusations of inappropriate behavior with a female student. Information identifying the teacher was not officially provided by the district to parents.

Concerned parents had to discover the teacher’s identity through other sources. They needed to know what was happening and they have a right to know.

The fact that union employees are granted confidentiality in cases of possible misbehavior is wrong. Whether the accusations have been investigated yet or not, parents have a right to know what is going on with those in authority over their children.

Unions and districts protect teachers to the detriment of students and their parents. Who is responsible for protecting students? What rights do students and parents have? In the current government system students and their families are left in the dark and vulnerable while a covert process creeps along to resolve accusations against trust-breakers in authority.

Parents of teens are told to keep quiet. Bureaucrats panic when parents ask questions or request copies of records or investigation findings.

If a teen became a crime victim off-campus they would be afforded Victim Services assistance while the accused is being investigated and possibly tried for the crime. They would learn the name of the accused. It would be in the media. There are laws protecting victim’s rights--- the right to be properly informed by the system, free filing of restraining orders, how the judicial process works, someone is appointed to assist the victim etc.

Bundy, Ranchers and Federal Takeover

Political prisoners are normally thought to be in Cuba, Vietnam or China. Allen Yuan was arrested and sentenced to life in a Northern China hard labor camp and then released after 22 years. A pastor, he was accused of “counter revolutionary” crimes. After his release he was on house arrest until his death in 2005. His wife raised all 6 of their children without him.

However, the US government has political prisoners of its own. They are ranchers and farmers that resist the tyrannical policies of the federal government. Clark County, Nevada rancher Cliven Bundy, his sons and others were arrested and held for nearly 700 days without bail.

They hurt no person or animal and stole no property. They were first tried in Portland, Oregon for a large protest that occurred at the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge. They were arguing that federal agencies were illegally controlling state lands and they needed to surrender those lands to the states.

Portland juries found them innocent. However, Bundy and associates were returned to jail and sent to Clark County, Nevada to face charges for the 2014 armed stand-off over the Bundy cattle operation there. Bundy’s property was damaged and many

Helen Loffland works as a biologist for the Institute for Bird Populations (IBP) overseeing their Sierra meadows restoration and monitoring program.

She has a Bachelor of Science degree in wildlife biology from U.C. Davis, and a Master of Science degree in Biology from CSU Sacramento. She spent the last 20 years studying Willow Flycatchers in meadows of the central Sierra Nevada and developed the survey protocol used for this species throughout much of the state of California.

Through her work on the Willow Flycatcher demography study (1997-2010) she explored factors relating to survival, reproduction and dispersal for this declining species. With IBP, Helen expanded her work to assess response of meadow dependent bird species to meadow restoration

projects through ongoing monitoring of all species in general and Willow Flycatcher specifically. Recent efforts with Willow Flycatchers include compiling multi-agency records to create a unified Willow Flycatcher status report and identify dispersal buffers where management activities and restoration are most likely to benefit flycatchers.

Helen, and others at IBP, recently completed an experimental study examining whether Willow Flycatchers could be attracted to re-colonize restored habitat if we broadcast their song during spring migration.

Students More Than a Meal Ticket

Government employees – teachers, school administrators, coaches, counselors, probation officers, social workers and law enforcement have unique access to children and there are too many examples of children being sexually violated by those in a place of trust and authority.

There have been incidents in Sutter County where law enforcement has had sex with a victim, a probation officer had sex with the child of his client, a teacher groomed a student to eventually move in with her, and other faculty had inappropriate sexual contact with students.

When the school district has the authority to discipline and detain students, cite parents and tell parents what they can and cannot do, there is a sense of intimidation and fear when coming against this lawyered-up bureaucracy. Parents as taxpayers pay twice for legal counsel, both for the system and for their child to get due process.

Any laws that may protect students are only as good as those charged with enforcing them. Are accusations against teachers properly investigated, officially noted and archived for further examination? If not, why not.

Last year, more than 100 students and parents filled the Piedmont School District board chambers to demand the firing of a social studies teacher. The district had him on administrative leave, found the accusations true and then planned to reinstate the instructor in spite of his violating sexual harassment policies.

The complaints involved inappropriate behavior toward students, including four recent female graduates on a school trip with the accused to Europe. The incidents included asking girls about their sexual activity, inviting them alone to his room at night and making comments about students' physical attractiveness, officials said.

The teacher eventually resigned. Lisa Sherman, mother of one of the victims argued that if nothing is done girls will stop speaking out against abusers and boys will consider it acceptable behavior toward females.

Rachael Denhollander, now an attorney, was the first female to file a complaint in 2016 against Larry Nassar, the doctor for gymnasts who molested her when she was a 15-year-old athlete. In coming forward Denhollander said she "lost her closest friends, every shred of privacy, and her church." She was accused of "looking for a payday" and "being an ambulance chaser."

She wrote in a January 26, 2018 New York Times Op-Ed "Predators rely on community protection to silence victims and keep them in power. Far too often, our commitment to our political party, our religious group, our sport, our college, or a prominent member of our community causes us to choose to disbelieve or to turn away from the victim."

Denhollander's legal skills and bravery together with her willingness to pay the cost of bearing her soul and the shame of it opened the door to hundreds of fellow female victim-athletes to join her in the case against Nassar.

Denhollander writes, "Ask yourself: How much is a child worth? Every decent person knows the answer to that question. Now it is time to act like it."

Government schools need to consider students more than a meal ticket for teachers and administrators. They need to be put first where they belong.

Bundy, Ranchers and Federal Takeover

cows killed before the government retreated.

Judge Gloria Navarro dismissed the Nevada case against Bundy and stated that the government lied, was prejudiced, biased, and withheld more than 3,000 documents from the defense. The Bureau of Land Management’s (BLM) police-state actions at the ranch were exposed due to former BLM Special Agent and whistleblower Larry Wooten, whose report describes the agency undermining the rights of the Bundys.

Wooten wrote that “... the investigation revealed a widespread pattern of bad judgment, lack of discipline, incredible bias, unprofessionalism and misconduct, as well as likely policy, ethical, and legal violations among senior and supervisory staff at the BLM’s office of Law Enforcement and Security.”

Wooten said that the BLM had photos of Cliven Bundy and Eric Parker on its “arrest tracking wall,” but with an “X” marked through their faces and bodies, as if they were to be eliminated. Wooten also reported that the Special Agent in Charge, Dan Love, boasted that

his actions in a previous BLM controversy led to three ranchers committing suicide.

Wooten’s report reveals telling statements by officials such as, “Go out there and kick Cliven Bundy in the mouth (or teeth) and take his cattle.” The report also says the agents commonly referred to the Bundys and their supporters as “rednecks,” “retards,” and “douche bags.” One agent even boasted about “grinding” a Bundy family member’s face into the gravel.

There were also descriptive titles given to body cam videos taken of the Bundy ranch, such as “Are you f–king people stupid or what,” “Pretty much a shoot first, ask question later,” and “Shoot his f–king dog first.”

The Wooten report exposed agency personnel as arrogant government hacks who think they are better than the rural folks they detest. This is reminiscent of the attitudes of ATF and FBI agents at Waco and Ruby Ridge according to former California Assemblyman Steve Baldwin. Wooten wrote that he thought the Bundy ranch confrontation could have turned deadly

due to the attitude of the BLM agents.

While the Obama Presidency coddled criminals and fostered urban rioting, its rogue agencies destroyed the lives of thousands of farmers and ranchers forcing them off properties they have worked and managed in some cases for more than 150 years. The feds and politicians (Harry Reid, the Clintons, Obama) had other agendas for the land and good citizens were in the way.

“The federal government is controlling 640 million acres— nearly a third of the nation’s land. The majority of land in Nevada, Alaska, Utah, Oregon and Idaho is controlled by the feds. In Arizona, California, Wyoming, New Mexico, and Colorado, federal ownership exceeds a third. If all 11 Western states were combined into one territory, the feds would own nearly 50% of it. This land is primarily administered by the United States Forest Service (USFS), the National Park Service (NPS), the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and the Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS). The Department of Defense also owns 20 million acres,” according to an article by Baldwin.

Sovereign states did not join the union to surrender their acreage to federal agencies. It’s time for states to take back their lands to manage for their people’s benefit.

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Big Brothers/Sister

Big Brothers-Big Sisters is a nationwide organization that matches children who for one reason or another might benefit from being paired with a mentor. The mentors are called “Bigs” and are older adults who have pledged their time and effort to helping these children (called Littles) by providing companion-

ship and guidance facilitated by spending a certain amount of time each month with them for one on one personal interaction.

It is estimated there are 9 million children who might benefit from such a relationship.

Statistics reveal the need:

- 46% of those in the program versus those not were less likely to use illegal drugs
- 27% less likely to begin using alcohol prematurely
- 52% less likely to skip school and 37% less likely to skip a class
- 33% less likely to physically assault another person

Other benefits from

participating in the program and hanging out with a Big include more self-confidence and better personal relationships with family members.

These figures are derived from a 1995 study by Public/Private Ventures, an independent Philadelphia-based national research organization.

Whether put at risk from single headed households, parent incarceration, abuse or other factors detrimental to their development, these children have a better chance of making better choices by having someone to “roll” their life challenges and questions off of.

It is clear these one on one relationships where littles are matched with suitable bigs can make a big difference in the lives and futures of these children.

With safety as an utmost concern when matching adults with children, the Big Brothers Big Sisters’ program is carefully administered and held to the highest of standards. The program strives for matches that are not only safe and well suited to each child’s needs, but also harmonious, highly beneficial and structured for long term viability.

They maintain a central office in Truckee and an office in western Nevada County.

The Big Brothers/Sister program is funded by local support through grants, general contributions, corporate sponsorship and fund raisers. There are two events on the near horizon. Bowl for Kids Sakes will take place on March 17 at Prosperity Lanes in Grass Valley and the Gourmet Gravel Nevada City 2018 Bike ride happens on Sat May 12. Information on both of these events can be found at their website: bigsofnc.org.

The Big Brother/Sister program is a viable and valuable organization which is helping solidify our future by helping our youth gain greater access to positive role models which they otherwise might be lacking. The relationships not only help our youth mature in healthier ways but the relationships themselves can be rewarding beyond expectation. I speak from experience. In 1993 I became a Big Brother to a potentially troubled teen who was 16 years of age at the time. We still keep in touch today and have every year since. This year my “little” turned 40 years old and my “little brother” and I are forever bonded as family. He was a gift to me then and still is to this very day. I recently decided to further the experience and have once again joined the program to be matched with yet another little and I couldn’t be more thrilled to once again begin such a rewarding experience.

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Alfalfa fields show promise for groundwater recharge

A two-year study demonstrates that flooding alfalfa fields shows strong potential for refilling groundwater supplies. University of California specialists who conducted the study flooded fields near Davis and in the Scott Valley of Siskiyou County. In each case, most of the water percolated into the water table, and the practice had only minimal impact on the crop. The university has studied similar projects in California orchards and vineyards.

UC assesses potential for elderberry production

In California, they're grown mainly to act as a windbreak or attract beneficial insects, but elderberry plants also produce fruit--and the University of California wants to learn if elderberries could succeed as a crop. UC researchers have planted elderberries at four farms in the Central Valley, to assess farming practices and market potential. Elderberries are now used in jams, syrups, wines and liqueurs, but most commercial production occurs in the Midwest.

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Yuba County Board of Supervisors are being manipulated

The Yuba County Board of Supervisors and especially Supervisor Gary Bradford need to recognize they are being manipulated by Supervisor Leahy and his marijuana sponsors.

Recently, he asked the BOS to form a Special Committee to research what other Counties are doing with Commercial Marijuana. Actually this is just a smoke screen to cover his concealed objective of forcing commercial marijuana onto Yuba County residents.

The indicators of his unethical intent were evident at the first so-called public meeting on January 19th. This Month In Your Garden

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January 2018 has come and gone and bare root season has come to a close, provided the weather is somewhat normal. If the weather is still quite cold by the end of January, we can extend the season a bit because the trees stay dormant a bit longer, and conversely, should it be warmer than a usual winter and the trees start putting out roots and new leaves, we can no longer sell them bare root. Our best choice is to start planting them into 5 gallon containers to be offered later. They will grow a nice set of roots throughout the spring and will be offered when they are ready. So, if you were interested in bare root trees, check things out in early February to see if there are any left because they won’t be there for long.

Now we need to deal with things that we need to do in February. One of the most necessary things to be done is the third and final dormant spraying in mid-February with a copper based fungicide. It is important to keep ahead of the fungal pests that might occur on fruits and nuts, as well as some vegetables and ornamentals. Rose are very susceptible to black spot, powdery mildew, and rust. Copper spray is well known for its use for curly leaf on peaches and nectarines. Once a fungal disease is started it is difficult to control because the spores produced are easily blown to neighboring plants that might become infected. Because of its variable uses, it is a good product to have on your shelf for gardening needs. It is a good idea to mix it with Neem Oil to help the spray spread evenly and cling to the foliage. Neem

Oil has many good uses. It is an excellent insecticide as well as controlling some fungi, to a lesser extent than the copper spray.

February usually brings hints of spring with it. Buds for the spring blooms begin to form. I am always fascinated by looking at those bare stems on the deciduous trees and shrubs and seeing the buds form for spring blooms. All of the subtle changes are telling us that things are awakening in the plant world, and that is the time to begin fertilizing most things. The plants won’t utilize fertilizer when they are bare of leaves. If they leaf out soon following the application of fertilizer, they will utilize any fertilizer that hasn’t been washed away by rain or irrigation, but the usefulness of some has been lost. So- not too soon, but get on it when the signs of life show and give them a boost into spring. Use an appropriate fertilizer for the plants being fertilizes. There is a basic all purpose fertilizer that can be used on most things. It is often referred to as a “balanced” fertilizer since it has almost equal amounts of the three basic elements that are in moist formulas. Those three elements are N,P and K, or Nitrogen, Phosphorous and Potassium. They will frequently be seen on the front of fertilizer packages. Acid fertilizer is used on azaleas, camellias, rhododendron and gardenias, plus other things that do well in similar conditions. Other elements will have been added to the basic three to create the desired acidity. Citrus trees have a special fertilizer with nutrients needed by that species. There is an abundance of formu-

las available to meet the needs of differing plants, there is also an abundance of plants that do well on the basic fertilizers. All of the seasons have a beauty of their own. Seeing the seasons change has always been one of those things I enjoy. There are also many folks who would love to see it forever balmy and not have to put up with the cold or the hot weather.

Grasses are growing and weeds will be growing right along with them. Fertilize grasses with Weed and Feed to get rid of the weeds before they become a difficult pest in the yard. Weeds can be controlled quite well in flower beds, now before they have emerged, by covering the areas with 2” of mulch. That will also help with watering chores later by reducing the frequency of watering since evaporation will be slowed.

As the weather gets warmer, be on the lookout for slugs and snails. Irregular holes in leaves are a clue that they are out and about. They also leave a slightly shiny trail behind. Use snail bait to destroy them. I have had very good luck with Slug-go – it is granular and is sprinkled in the infested areas. It is safe around pets and wildlife. I never saw the snails, just their empty shells. Diatomaceous Earth sprinkled under shrubs will repel many insects, as well as the slugs and snails, it is not expensive nor toxic. Snails like beer and will be attracted to a bowl of beer cradled in a depression in the ground and will drown when they fall into it. Of course, it has to be emptied and wastes a bit of beer. Aphids are also one of the early pests that you will encounter. They produce a sweet and sticky substance that is left on the leaves. Ants are attracted to that and will farm the aphids and that compounds the problem, so look for ants at the base of a plant infested with aphids and bait for or spray them. Spring is on the way – enjoy it.

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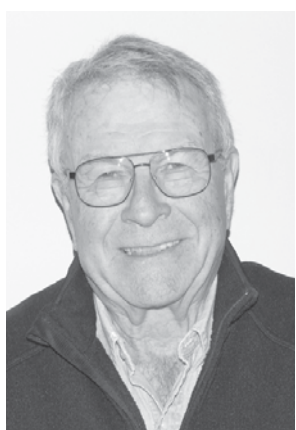

building permit for many projects. It didn't cost any money and it didn't take any additional resources. All it took was rethinking the existing process and trying to approach it from the customer's standpoint.

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Chris Haile and Flight 128

Airline stewardess Ellie Kurtock found herself in a field of snow, debris, and burning wreckage. She then saw little Chris Haile strapped in his airliner seat in the midst of the chaos. Five year old Chris looked up and saw the woman who would save his life. He said “Did we crash Ellie?”

Chris, his three year old sister Eileen, and their parents Richard and Kendall Haile had originally been scheduled to depart Los Angeles International Airport at noon on November 20, 1967. But there had been a problem with the aircraft and they were delayed for more than 2 hours.

Their father, Richard, was a construction contractor and the family lived in Sylmar, CA.

During their delay they sat next to stewardess Ellie Kurtock in the LAX

terminal. She got to know the family and helped entertain the children during their wait.

When they boarded a replacement aircraft, the Haile family sat near the back of the big plane not far from where Ellie was strapped in.

They finally departed LA International on Trans World Airlines flight 128 at 2:37 PM, traveling to Kentucky’s Greater Cincinnati Airport. The Convair 880 aircraft carried 82 passengers and crew.

Upon approach, the pilot and crew faced some challenges. The airport’s middle marker beacon, glide slope and runway approach lights were inoperative. But the crew still should have been able to make a safe landing. However the cockpit crew’s failure was their inability to maintain the height of 1,290 feet above

sea level until visual contact was made with the runway.

They ended up crashing 6,878 feet short of the runway at 8:57 that evening. The plane had been going 220 miles per hour when it struck a row of beech wood trees and crashed into a pasture.

Of the 82 persons aboard, 70 died. Two crew members and 10 passengers survived.

The youngest survivor was 15 month old Tracy Smith. They found Tracy in a tree. She, understandably, has no memory of the crash.

Ellie, suffering from a gaping leg injury, unstrapped Chris and rushed him away from the fires and explosions. As she carried him away he asked if his parents were still in the wreck and if they were dead. She replied, “I think so”.

Elbert and Ida Stephens lived 200 yards from the crash site. Thanks to their family’s efforts and some passengers and crew, some of those who survived the crash, including Chris, were brought to their house for initial treatment. They were later taken to a local hospital.

Chris suffered a broken left leg and it took 330 stitches to close his head wound. He was in a wheel chair for several months.

Firefighter Hook Vines searched around the front of the aircraft and found Eileen Haile under a piece of battered aluminum. He placed her in an ambulance and rode with her to the hospital. Eileen was badly hurt and it took six months for the little girl to recover from her major

injuries.

Eileen resides in Yuba County with her husband. She is the mother of four grown daughters.

The custody of the orphaned children was given to grandparents who resided in the small Yuba County community of Hallwood.

Chris Haile recently sat down with me for an interview. I appreciated his willingness to talk about his traumatic experience and how it has affected his life. He said it was about time he did.

Since he came to live with his grandparents he has resided in Yuba County.

He graduated from Marysville High School in 1980.

Chris lives in District 10 with his wife Lynn and has two grown children; Skyler and Katey.

Chris pursued a 32 year career with the fire service; a career that his son, Skyler, has also followed.

Chris served the City of Marysville as an engineer from 1985 to 1997 and was a Division Chief for Calfire at the time of his retirement on December 30, 2017.

During his Calfire employment he served in many areas of Butte and Yuba Counties. He also assisted in Oroville during the evacuation in February of 2017.

From 2014, as a Divi-

sion Chief he served as South Division Operations Chief for Southern Butte County and as the Fire Chief for the Cities of Gridley and Biggs.

Chris has always been interested in aviation. He obtained his pilot’s license in 1982. When he was a Captain and Battalion Chief he periodically served as a Helicopter Coordinator on wildland fires.

The past six months have brought a death, and an anniversary that helped to reignite old memories for Chris.

One event was the 50th anniversary of the crash on November 20th. There was a memorial ceremony and memorial plaque unveiled in Hebron, Kentucky with rescuers and several survivors attending. The youngest survivor, Tracy Smith (Eby), attended the memorial.

But possibly the most emotional recent event was when Chris received word that Ellie Kurtock had passed away on August 2, 2017. She and he had reconnected in 2007 when her husband located Chris and she wrote him a letter. He does not believe that Ellie ever really recovered emotionally from the crash.

Shortly after the crash Ellie wrote Chris a 20 page document detailing the events of the night of the crash. Chris cherishes that document.

Chris says, “Ellie was my hero and now I’ve lost her. She could have run but she stayed and saved me.”

I asked Chris if he had any memories of the crash. He stated, “All I remember is boom, boom, bang and then fire. The pilot had over 12,000 flight hours experience and he had recently flown into that airport more than 50 times. He flew a perfectly good airplane into the ground”.

Chris says now that he is a retiree he will continue in his Ag and portrait photography business. That is something he has been doing for the past 7 years. He also plans to get back into agriculture; something he was involved in prior to his fire service career.

I pointed out to Chris that his career choices; fire service and flying, could make one think that his accident may have had an effect on his career interests. He replied, “I don’t believe that the crash had any influence on my career choices. It was an opportunity and I found something more exciting than farming that led me to where I ended up. I have no regrets and loved every minute of it. However, now that I’m out of the fire service, I find that agriculture is pulling me back to my roots. And that excites me!”

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Yuba City High School Teacher Removed from Campus

Yuba City Police responded to a battery complaint at the Yuba City High School on Wednesday January 17, 2018. On January 19th a teacher was removed from the school grounds and placed on administrative leave for inappropriate conduct.

A letter to parents from the Yuba City Unified School District also served as a press re-

lease stated.

"A Yuba City High School teacher has been placed on leave following an allegation of inappropriate conduct when intervening in an interaction between two students on campus.

The District will investigate this matter, and has referred it to other local agencies.

The laws governing employee privacy pre-

clude our district from providing additional information or discussing this case in detail.

Student safety is our greatest priority. We take any allegation of improper conduct by an employee extremely seriously and will investigate the matter thoroughly."

The matter has been turned over to the Sutter County District Attorney.

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“Faces of Interment” Gallery Exhibition at Yuba Sutter Arts

February is a significant month for the Japanese American community locally and across the nation. “Day of Remembrance” events are held every February on or around the 19th as a reminder of the impact the incarceration experience had on families, communities and the country. It was on February 19th, 1942 that President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066. It led to the forced removal and incarceration of 120,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry living on the West Coast including hundreds from the Yuba-Sutter area who had lived in the area since the late 1800s.

As a way to commemorate those individuals and families impacted by the internment camp experience, Yuba Sutter Arts is proud to be able to offer as its February main gallery exhibition, “Faces of Interment, Historic Photos of Japanese Americans.” These remarkable black and white photographs were created by Marysville

photographer Clyde Bush in 1942. The collection is comprised of identification photos made by Mr. Bush just prior to the individuals being sent to Tule Lake, Amache near Granada, Colorado and other internment camps. This is a very unique collection and sheds additional light on this dark part of our nation's history.

“The photographs are like individual glimpses into the lives and souls of people faced with a very uncertain future,” said David Read, YSA Executive Director and exhibit curator. “There are such a range of expressions from a smiling young girl with no idea what she is about to experience to older residents who clearly show the emotional wear and tear they are experiencing as they head off into the unknown,” he added.

Yuba Sutter Arts collaborated with the Yuba County Historic Resources Commission and the Sutter County Community Memorial Museum in the development of the exhibit. Mr. Bush was a photographer in Marys-

ville for 25 years. He photographed weddings, high school graduations, babies and families in addition to producing these unique photographs. The collection has been in the community since its creation and was well preserved. It was even rescued from the 1955 flood.

The photographs have been enlarged to 20” x 30” so the experience is quite profound as the viewer encounters a room full of the large format images. Some of the 100+ photographs are identified with at least the subject's name, but many are not. It is hoped that the community will help reconnect some of the photographs with their families.

The exhibition will be open to the public starting on Wednesday, February 7th. A special reception will be held on Saturday, February 17th from 2-5pm featuring guest speakers including Mr. Jim Tanimoto of Gridley who will share his vivid memories and speak about his experiences at the Tule Lake Internment Camp where he lived with his family during World War II.

The Gallery at Yuba Sutter Arts and the Burrows Theater are located at 624/630 E Street in Marysville.

The exhibition and reception are free and open to the public.

I met Mike Osumi in the line at a local store and he asked about the tractor I had on a trailer in the parking lot and invited me to see his Dad's tractor. It was an Farmall AV which his father, David, bought from Henry Miller Sr. In 1948 when Valley Truck and Tractor began business as an International Dealer. Like many businesses VT and T went through an evolution and are now a major player as a John Deere Dealer. I love

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opening barn doors to discover what's inside .When the sunlight shone on this tractor the pigeon droppings, dust, junk, and pallets were hiding a true diamond in the rough. My smile as they say could be seen a country mile. Bad tires, no radiator, no grill, and rust everywhere highlighted the task ahead. This was the first tractor David was able to purchase after his internship in Arizona. Can you imagine having dinner with your family, a knock on the door, and you and your family removed? His thumb immediately found the hole and he turned and looked at me with a look I will never forget! We both nearly had tears coming.

The third tractor (not pictured) is a John Deere Model 60, which replaced the A. owned by my friend Jim Escherman of Browns Valley. It is a beautiful restoration and "Runs like a Deere".
