Yuba Co. Board Discusses Tax Increase

Marysville, Ca. – The Yuba County Board of Supervisors had a workshop at their December 12th meeting to discuss community public safety needs and local funding options.

The hour and a half meeting consisted of law enforcement and fire officials discussing the state of their individual departments and the decline of services due to a decline in revenues. This discussion centered around General Fund Revenues; revenues that the Board of Supervisors have the ability to control. In this current budget 70% of the General Fund is allocated to Public Safety Departments. County Administrator Robert Bendorf said, " Our county simply does not have the financial resources necessary to effectively address urgent current and future public safety and life-saving needs for our communities."

The board was told that the options to correct this issue range from further changes in the allocation of the General Fund Revenues to securing local funding (local sales tax increase.) A 1% sales tax increase in the unincorporated areas of the county would potentially generate \$4,315,543.00.

If the board should opt to put the tax increase on the ballot, requiring a majority 50% +1 vote, there would be no guarantee that the tax would be used for

public safety needs. However; if they should choose to put the tax on the ballot as a "Special Tax" clearly defining what the tax would be used for, it would require a 2/3rds majority vote for passage.

At the end of the discussion and at the suggestion of Mr. Bendorf, the board asked that staff look into putting together a professional survey/poll to determine the public interest in supporting the tax increase and bring that information back to the board.

Govt. – Your Boss

Ronald Reagan liked to say, "The taxpayer – that's someone who works for the federal government but doesn't have to take the civil service examination." Americans once revolted over taxes but now pay them on every move they make. Many citizens are losing more than 50% of their income to the government.

When the federal income tax was introduced in 1913 a little more than 100 years ago, most Americans were taxed at a rate of only 1 percent. Then, Tax Freedom Day was on January 22. In 2017, it was April 23rd. Tax Freedom Day is the first day of the year in which the nation as a whole has theoretically earned enough income to pay its taxes.

Just over 75 years ago the instructions for Form 1040 were two

pages long. In 2014, it took 189 pages.

In 2011, Wheatland's Bartholomew brothers were arrested on the Erle Road overpass while holding a banner saying 'Taxes Are Theft.' They were correct, were arrested and lost their case in Yuba County court. That's the wrong message when you aren't in charge.

Politicians and bureaucrats get themselves into financial trouble then insist taxpayers are stingy. Below are 97 various taxes, fees, tolls and charges the public pays. Not every person

pays every tax. Yet despite all of these funding streams, local, state and federal governments are all drowning in debt. Hold that thought.

Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association says, "Local governments ... like to play budgetary shell games in which they place a sales tax measure on the ballot to fund a politically popular purpose, and if the tax passes, it would enable the local government to free up money from the general fund that can then be spent on the pet

Creeps and Crooks

Americans, though knowing what is right, have a tendency to do wrong. Cain, after hearing from God himself, still murdered his brother Abel.

God providing just Ten Commandments to guide society sounded simple except the clientele was flawed. Commodities

Since the 2008/09 crisis few would argue the stock market general trajectory has been up. More than tripling since the crisis, the most watched index is approaching a quadruple should it hit 26,000. Witnessing this historic rise, an observer would likely conclude the economy is firing on all cylinders and business is brisk. If this is the case, the building blocks of business should be rising as well but when one looks at those building blocks, something seems amiss in the metrics that measure them.

Commodities are a commonly traded asset class and when it comes to the simplicity of composition, few things are easier to understand than commodities. They include food stuffs like soybeans, corn, wheat, milk and sugar among others. Energy fuels like natural gas, oil and propane are considered commodities and a variety of metals as well as agricultural items. Basically it's the stuff that we make stuff out of. One could also conceptualize commodities are the tangible items used in manufacturing.

Since the economies of the world are made of up both service and manufacturing companies and even those in the service industries use tangible items in the implementation of whatever service they might offer, if the economies of the world are indeed booming as a rising market would imply, why have commodities basically gone nowhere since the crisis was rumored to have ended almost 8 years ago. In a Feb 20th, 2017 article by Forbes entitled "Commodities have been down for so long..." , author Daniel Fisher, the stark reality of commodities is summed up nicely: "The U.S. Commodity Index Fund, not surprisingly, has a five-year record of negative 8.4% a year".

Read that again. With the Dow standing at 7062.00 February 1st, 2009, and last weeks close on November 22, 2017 at 23,576.00, the comparison between what the Dow has done since 2009 and what commodities have done is indeed baffling.

With more than a tripling of the Dow, one might ask: where have all the commodities gone?

Apparently not into the companies that make up the stock market and indeed, looking at the drop in commodity prices as detailed by Forbes, why haven't commodities gone anywhere at all?

The exact answer to puzzling lack of concerted movement with the markets is likely a multifaceted answer but on a much more basic level, it doesn't take an experienced market analyst to come to the conclusion that if companies are doing so well as the stock market would indicate, why haven't they been consuming commodities in the process?

The possible explanations could be many but are they convincing. Is there a glut of commodities and if so, is even possible for every commodity to be in an oversupply condition. Could speculators be keeping the prices down and if so, could they suppress prices for so long over such a wide market? Could falling currency values reflect lower prices because of the price is only a function of the currency it's priced in? Accepting that would mean accepting a worldwide appreciation of all currencies relative to each other, a nearly impossible scenario that indeed has not been the case.

The fact that the stock markets of the world have been headed in a concerted upwardly direction since 2009 is baffling enough, but for commodities to be going in the opposite direction almost the entire time is even more mysterious.

What may be the root of this conundrum may be some unpalatable causes of a stock rally that is fueled by something else besides basic demand that should also cause the consumption of commodities to rise along with the markets: the rally is fu-

eled by demand but not the kind of demand that consumes commodities. Instead the demand is fueled not by the demand of products, but by the demand of stock ownership. In other words, stocks are rising due to investors, flushed with cash, simply want to own stocks. Additional demand could be also coming from the companies themselves, whom being also flushed with cash, are buying back their own shares by the boat loads. Either that or another explanation could be the easy money and low interest rate policies of the last 8 years by central bankers could be causing a glut of paper dollars, and those dollars are chasing stocks, driving their prices ever higher. Although higher stock prices without commensurate sales to back up those prices would sniff out the inconsistency, inaccurate inflation figures reported by the Fed whether purposely or otherwise could be the curtain that masks that aspect very nicely.

Regardless of what the reasons are for the unrelenting rise of markets, one thing stands out: the commodity markets could be telling us there is more to this eight year rally than meets the eye.

FISHIN' TALK

It was around this time of year back in 1992 that my Uncle Tom called and advised the sturgeon were on the bite at the mothball fleet. He only had to ask once and I was going to accompany him and his fishing buddy Verl the next morning.

We pulled out of Yuba City way before first light in my Uncles pickup which was towing his 21 foot fishing boat. The boat was an inboard V8 and was well equipped for all types of fishing, including a small stove and coffee pot. We arrived at the boat ramp and got into the water rather fast, considering there were boats preparing to launch ahead of us.

Uncle Tom had a favorite spot near the mothball fleet next to a smaller navy vessel. He did not have a fish finder, but a sound device that he used all the time in locating the bottom, the condition of the bottom such as sand, soft or hard and depth. He located the spot and we began fishing in 32 feet of water using sturgeon gear and ghost shrimp. He had just got the coffee on when I got a pull down. Verl stood by as I fought the fish. Suddenly the fish came out of the water right next to the back of the boat. It was so close Verl got splashed with water as the fish landed sideways on the surface of the water. It was a kick to see a sturgeon that close to the boat and I immediately had the hair on the back of my neck standing straight out. The sturgeon went straight

to the bottom and all the action stopped.

Verl was an experienced sturgeon fisherman and he told me to keep a tight line, hold fast for a minute and then he grabbed the line with his thumb and index finger and told me to get ready. As he "twanged" the line and the vibration reached the fish lying on the bottom the sturgeon took off as the reel screamed as the line followed the fish. The sturgeon cleared water about thirty yards on the starboard side of the boat before he began to tire out. Uncle Tom netted the fish and measured it which proved to be too small to keep.

I was the only person on board that day who caught fish. I caught another sturgeon an hour after the first fish was

released. That fish was a little larger than the first, but still not legal to keep.

When we returned to the marina we were greeted by two coast guard officials who were inspecting all boats which were returning. Uncle Tom was always making sure his boat was legal and he passed with flying colors.

The boat behind us did not do as well. In fact, the boat, trailer and pickup were confiscated on the spot by the Coast Guard. The hold of that boat had several undersized sturgeons hidden under life jackets and other gear.

Closing thought: Be careful out there and have a safe, Merry Christmas and a prosperous Happy New Year.

Food and Farm News

Extent of agricultural losses from wildfire remains undermined

Avocados, forage and other crops and livestock have all suffered losses from the Thomas Fire in

Southern California, but authorities say it will take weeks for the full extent of the damage to become apparent. The Farm Bureau of Ventura County says the fire

raced through hills that feature many avocado groves and grazing areas for livestock. Fierce winds that propelled the fire added to the crop damage by blowing fruit off tree.

Coalition outlines steps to improve forest health

Calling it a "forest health crisis," a coalition proposes steps to address tree mortality in California. The California Forest Watershed Alliance recommends increased forest thinning, improved funding for forest management and other steps. The U.S. Forest Service announced this week that another 27 million California trees died in the past year, bringing the total number of dead trees in the state up to 129 million.

Choose-and-cut farmers say they have plenty of trees

Shoppers have reported reduced supplies and higher prices at Christmas tree lots this season, but California choose-and-cut tree farms say they have plenty of trees available. The California Christmas Tree Association says steady plantings at choose-and-cut farms have allowed growers to maintain their inventories. Growers say prices for choose-and-cut trees may have gone up a bit, due to increased production costs.

Research aims to slow citrus tree disease

Checking the chemical fingerprint of citrus leaves shows promise in diagnosing a deadly tree disease. Researchers at the University of California, Davis, say early identification of the tree disease HLB would help slow its spread. HLB has devastated citrus groves in Florida, but has been found so far only in residential trees in California. Plant breeders want eventually to create citrus trees that would resist the HLB bacterium.

2018 Fire Safe Council Awards – Call for Nominations

The Fire Safe Council of Nevada County (FSCNC) is calling for nominations from the community for the 2018 Fire Safe Awards to be given at the 11th Annual Culinary Adventure event on Friday, April 6, 2018. The awards program was developed by the board of directors to recognize those dedicated to protecting our community from catastrophic wildfire. The public is invited to submit nominations for consideration.

There are three recognitions to be given to individuals and groups meeting the criteria set for each award including exemplifying the Fire Safe Council's mission: "To provide Firewise education and programs to enhance emergency preparedness for catastrophic wildfire to all citizens in Nevada County in order to reduce the loss of life, property, and natural resources, and to create Firewise Communities/USA®; to network with other Fire Safe Councils, governmental agencies, and foundations for the benefit of the citizens of Nevada County."

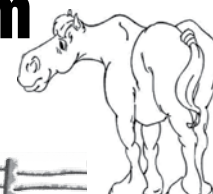
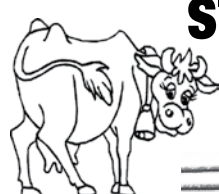

an FBI agent posing as a movie studio executive. His brother, Assemblyman Tom Calderon (D-Montibello) also pled guilty to money laundering and mail fraud.

Then, there is former San Francisco Senator Leland Yee (D-SF). Yee admitted to accepting an \$11,000 cash bribe in June 2013 from an undercover FBI agent to help sponsor statewide marijuana legislation. In addition, he laundered a \$6,800 contribution to his Secretary of State campaign in 2014. Overall, investigators identified more than \$100,000 in bribes directed at Yee.

A racketeering charge also alleged that Yee tried to arrange an illegal international arms deal through the Philippines in exchange for money. Yee, a former Child Psychologist, is an anti-gun advocate.

Assemblyman Raul Bocanegra (D-LA), is accused of groping a woman in 2009 when he was a legislative staff member. He announced he will not seek re-election next year then suddenly resigned.

That announcement came just hours before the Los Angeles Times reported allegations involving Bocanegra and six more women. He is accused of grabbing breasts, butts, and running his hand up the dress.

Bocanegra shares a residence with Senator Tony Mendoza (D-Artesia) who is also accused by multiple female victims of sexual harassment. Some victims were his aides and claim they were fired after complaining. The dismissal letter was signed by Bocanegra and Mendoza's roommate Senate Pro-Tem Kevin De Leon (D-LA).

De Leon recommended Mendoza take a leave of absence during the investigation though Mendoza refused. De Leon admitted living with both men but claims he knew nothing about their sexual exploits before hearing the formal accusations. De Leon is running against Diane Feinstein for a United States Senate seat and has relocated away from the accused.

Then, there is former Assembly Speaker and current Senator "Huggy Bear" Bob Hertzberg. Fresno surgeon and former Assemblywoman Linda Halderman (R-Fresno) has accused Hertzberg of inappropriately hugging her on multiple occasions in a way that made her uncomfortable, even after she asked him to stop and reported him.

Halderman said "Huggy Bear" pushed his groin into her as he pulled her to him. "That was it for me," Halderman said.

She then contacted Jon Waldie, the Assembly Chief Administrator at the time, and told him about Hertzberg's antics. Nothing was done.

Jon Waldie was the subject of his own Capitol lawsuit when an "Employee maintained she was harassed for breast-feeding her baby at work." The settlement for the Assembly employee was \$540,000 in 2003.

In Memo: 25 Years of California Legislature's Sexual Harassment Settlements" by Tuple Legal, "the Legislature has paid out at least \$1.9 million for sexual harassment complaints in the past 25 years. In 2017 dollars, the amount is \$2.8 million."

Assemblyman Matt Dababneh (D-Los Angeles) and Assemblyman Devon Mathis (R-Visalia) have also been accused of sexual wrongdoing. Dababneh announced his resignation.

As they apologize while maintaining innocence, resignations are a not small matter. These creeps and crooks have tremendous power, massive egos, and the highest legislative pay in the nation. Sixty days after increasing gas taxes 12 cents/gallon (\$5.2 billion annually) they raised their salaries to \$107,238 annually plus \$183 / day in tax-free per diem. How about those roads?

I'm a Pediatrician. Here's What I Did When a Little Boy Patient Said He Was a Girl.

Lets get real. The Left believes in science. I agree. Take a DNA test of Caitlin Jenner and you will find Bruce Jenner. On a recently podcast Ben Shapiro noted that I a male can claim to be a female, people like me, 70 years old, can claim and be accepted as a 30 year old—if say I am 30 years old. You can want to be an apple, but you are still a human being, based on DNA, you are a male or female.

"Biological sex is not assigned. Sex is determined at conception by our DNA and is stamped into every cell of our bodies. Human sexuality is binary. You either have a normal Y chromosome, and develop into a male, or you don't, and you will develop into a female. There are at least 6,500 genetic differences between men and women.

Hormones and surgery cannot change this.

An identity is not biological, it is psychological. It has to do with thinking and feeling. Thoughts and feelings are not biologically hardwired. Our thinking and feeling may be factually right or factually wrong."

Should we enable folks with psychological issues? Do we help them by pretending they are not what they are? Is it good for them to continue being pretenders instead of finding the root cause of their issues—as in this case:

"I had one patient we'll call Andy. Between the ages of 3 and 5, he increasingly played with girls and "girl toys" and said he was a girl. I referred the parents and Andy to a therapist. Sometimes mental illness of a parent or abuse of the

child are factors, but more commonly, the child has misperceived family dynamics and internalized a false belief.

In the middle of one session, Andy put down the toy truck, held onto a Barbie, and said, "Mommy and Daddy, you don't love me when I'm a boy." When Andy was 3, his sister with special needs was born, and required significantly more of his parents' attention. Andy misperceived this as "Mommy and Daddy love girls. If I want them to love me, I have to be a girl." With family therapy Andy got better.

Today, Andy's parents would be told, "This is who Andy really is. You must ensure that everyone treats him as a girl, or else he will commit suicide."

Your One Minute News Digest

Schools Superintendent Dr. Dhillon to Run for Re-Election



Dr. Bal Dhillon, the current Sutter County Superintendent of Schools, announced she will run for re-election in 2018. Dr. Dhillon was appointed to the position last year when former Superintendent, Bill Cornelius, retired.

Prior to her appointment, Dr. Dhillon served as District Superintendent for Cascade Union Elementary School District. Her background includes over 29 years of education experience including Principal and Curriculum Director for Plumas Lake Elementary School District, and teacher and Assistant Principal for Tierra Buena Elementary School in Yuba City.

Dr. Dhillon moved to the United States at the age of 9. She attended Yuba City schools while working

as a farm laborer picking peaches and prunes. Her parents are big advocates of education and encouraged their five daughters to pursue their dreams. Dr. Dhillon went on to earn five degrees from California State University, Sacramento, including a Bachelor of Arts, Teaching Credential, Administrative Credential, a Masters and a Doctorate in Educational Leadership.

During her first year as Sutter County Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Dhillon restructured the entire organization, saving the County over \$50,000 annually. She decided to have the Superintendent’s Office cover the fees for all 8th and 9th grade students to take the Pre-SAT, revamped the “dual enrollment” program so more high school students can get a head start on college classes for free, and obtained a \$600,000 Adult Education grant to offer more classes.

The County Superintendent of Schools Office serves a myriad of functions for the 14 Sutter County school districts,

including budget oversight, running the Special Education programs, running the ROP and Career Technical Education and handling credential analysis and support for new teachers.

“My job is to give our students the tools to prepare for college, career and life,” said Dr. Dhillon. “My goal is to recruit and train the best teachers possible, help our school districts squeeze every penny to the fullest and keep our local community leaders engaged and accountable in the process. I absolutely believe in the old proverb that it takes a village to raise a child.”

Dr. Dhillon is an active member of the Rotary Club of Yuba City, Yuba City Kiwanis, Soroptimist Sutter-Yuba, Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way and the American Association of University Women. She has been married to Sukh for 29 years. They have two children, Josh, currently in his fourth year of Medical School, and Sabina, graduated from San Diego State and is currently applying to law school.

“Know Your Limit” Campaign

The Yuba City Police Department will participate in the “Know Your Limit” Campaign in the upcoming months.

The “Know Your Limit” program involves police officers visiting various drinking establishments in the early evening hours. These officers mix and interact with patrons in a friendly, non-threatening way in an effort to educate them on the effect of alcohol on the body. The officers hand out educational materials that contain information about the alcohol content of various drinks, DUI penalties, and suggestions for alternatives to driving while consuming alcohol. The officers also answer questions while interacting with the patrons and staff. The officers do not ask for identification, but for statistical purposes they may keep records of gender, age and the city of residence of those they contact. Patrons are asked how much they’ve had to drink and if they think they could safely drive. These patrons are then offered the opportunity to test their perception by voluntarily checking their potential impairment with a Preliminary Alcohol Screening Device (PAS). Anyone with a higher Blood Alcohol Content is shown how easy it is to reach a level that can impair and are warned not to drive. The program’s primary purpose is to educate drinkers on being responsible.

The Yuba City Police Department invites the participation of representatives of community service programs and other agencies such as Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) who have a vested interest in the goal of reducing DUI drivers, collisions and fatalities. These exchanges promote learning, the sharing of successful techniques and procedures, and increases teamwork between agen-

cies that have a mutual interest in alcohol related problems.

The “Know Your Limit” program has proven to be an effective way to reach the public; it makes officers more approachable, provides more transparency about how the PAS devices work, and ultimately provides a greater impact than past enforcement practices. For example, if the Police Department arrests three people in one night, only those three people are affected. If the Police Department contacts 30 to 50 people in a night, they stand to have a greater impact on reducing DUI deaths and injuries. In addition, the contacts are positive and a more pleasurable experience for both the citizens and the officers. Drinking establishments have the added benefit of seeing officers in their businesses more

frequently, assisting their employees with education, identifying potential problems and addressing concerns with patrons. This facilitates communication between officers and business owners, creating a more comfortable and professional working relationship. The fact that police officers are interacting more often and more closely with businesses allows them to have a better relationship with the community, to keep abreast of developing trends, and to identify problems earlier.

Funding for this program is provided to the Yuba City Police Department by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reminding everyone to “Report a Drunk Driver - Call 9-1-1.”



• The use of “super delegates” by the Democratic Party in its nominating process shows conclusively that the vote of the people means little to the so-called party of the people.
