"Pearl Harbor - May We Never Forget" **Marysville VFW Post 948 Remembers the 76th Anniversary**



USS Arizona Memorial

Marysville, Ca. Pearl Harbor is a U.S. naval base near Honolulu, Hawaii, and was the scene of a devastating surprise attack by Japanese forces on December 7, 1941. More than 2,400 Americans died in the attack, including civilians, and another 1,000 people were wounded. The day after the assault, President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked Congress to declare war on Japan. The single vote against Congress's declaration of war against Japan came from Representative Jeannette Rankin of Montana. Rankin was a pacifist who had also voted against the American entrance into World War I. "As a woman," she said, "I can't go to war, and I refuse to send anyone else."

Because American military leaders were not expecting an attack so close to home, the naval facilities at Pearl Harbor were relatively undefended.

Almost the entire Pacific Fleet was moored around Ford Island in the harbor, and hundreds of airplanes were squeezed onto adjacent airfields. To the Japanese, Pearl Harbor was an irresistibly easy target.

By the time the attack was over, every battleship in Pearl Harbor—USS Arizona, USS Oklahoma, USS California, USS West Virginia, USS Utah, USS Maryland, USS Pennsylvania, USS Tennessee and USS Nevada—had sustained significant damage. (All but USS Arizona and USS Utah were eventually salvaged and repaired.)

The USS Arizona is the final resting place for many of the ship's 1,177 crewmen who lost their lives on December 7, 1941 in Pearl Harbor. The Arizona was the most heavily damaged of all the vessels in Battleship Row. Contrary to popular belief, the USS Arizona is no longer in commission. As a special tribute to the ship and her lost crew, the United States flag flies from the flagpole, which is attached to the severed mainmast of the sunken battleship. The USS Arizona Memorial has come to commemorate all military personnel killed in the Pearl Harbor attack.

The oldest living crew member of the battleship USS Arizona to have survived the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor was Retired Navy Lt. Cmdr. Joseph Langdell of Yuba City. He died in 2006 at the age of 100. Langdell's remains were interred beneath the waters of Pearl Harbor, in the sunken wreckage of the USS Arizona.

President Roosevelt stated that the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 is a "Day That Will Live In Infamy". The Japanese raid on Pearl Harbor, is the day that the United States became involved in World War II.

The Marysville Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 948 will be paying tribute to

the 76th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, on Thursday, December 7th. This year's Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day will pay tribute to our military forces that underwent this horrific attack on Pearl Harbor. The Remembrance will be held at the Marysville Memorial Veterans Center, 211 17th Street Marysville at 7:00 p.m..

Last year was the first year Marysville VFW Post 948 held the Pearl Harbor Remembrance. Traditionally the Remembrance would be held at 7:00 a.m., the time of the attack on Pearl Harbor. VFW Post 948 has chosen to hold it in the evening at 7:00 p.m. to allow the community to come and remember those who gave their lives for our freedom. Refreshments will be served after the Remembrance. The community is invited to attend the Pearl Harbor Remembrance at the Marysville VFW Post 948.

Yuba-Sutter **Political Notes**

Longtime Sutter County Sheriff Deputy and current District Attorney (DA) Investigator David Williams plans to retire and run against his boss DA Amanda Hopper. Williams obtained a law degree while working as an investigator.

Others that may be interested in the job are Jennifer Dupre who opposed Hopper in the last election. Dupre lives in Yuba City and is a prosecutor for the Butte County DA. Defense attorney Chris Carlos who once worked in the Sutter Co DA's office is also talking about running.

Meanwhile, Sutter County Chief Investigator Jason Parker remains on administrative leave. The county is doing an investigation to determine Parker's sins, if any, against DA Hopper. Whether his dismissal is righteous or not, the feeling is that the taxpayers will again pick-up the tab when the government improperly fires him.

Anu Chopra, former attorney in the Sutter County District Attorney's office who was fired for lying in court after receiving complaints from defense attorneys has a lawsuit against the county. It looks like her pay-off will be postponed until after the District Attorney election in 2018 to avoid negative publicity from the settlement.

Some in Sutter County's \$5 Million Dollar Club are expressing relief that they can return to their normal duties rather than being sidetracked on one homeless proposal after another. The \$5 Million Dollar Club represents 30 Sutter County employees commissioned to solve homelessness. Their combined salaries come to about \$5 million annually or nearly \$3,000 per hour.

Though there is a new and more restrictive Sutter County camping ordinance to deal with squatters it is not being enforced. Yuba County Sheriff Captain Brandon Barnes, Chad Lizardo (retired Yuba City Police), Yuba City Police Sergeant Dennis Hauck and Sutter County Undersheriff Jeff Pierce are campaigning to inherit the problem since Sheriff Paul Parker is

Cracks in New Spillway meier, is unhappy with

Erin Mellon of the Department of Water Resources said," The integrity of the newly reconstructed Oroville spillway is not in question. The assessment of our experts is the concrete has cured as expected and is certified to handle flows of 100,000 cubic-feet per second or more this winter.

This is backed up in a

letter from the Federal Division of Dam Safety and Inspections to DWR The letter dated November 21, 2017 says "We have reviewed the letter and technical memorandum. We concur with your assessment that the current condition of the hairline cracking does not warrant repair at this time. We understand that you will continue to monitor and evaluate the hairline cracks throughout the 2017 flood season and the 2018 construction season. We also understand that you will be evaluating a number of construction measures this winter that might be implemented

next construction season that might reduce the likelihood of hairline cracking. " signed Frank L. Blackett, P.E. Regional Engineer.

According to the Appeal-Democrat the Mayor of Oroville, Linda DahlDWR for not communicating with her town, just below the Dam, that the cracks were expected. Instead a "firestorm" was created for the people of Oroville.

Desert vegetable harvest gets early start

The official start of winter remains a few weeks away, but the winter vegetable harvest has gotten off to a quick start. Farmers in the Imperial Valley say their lettuce, broccoli and cauliflower have been ready for harvest up to 10 days earlier than usual. Warm Southern California weather played a role. One farmer says lettuce that typically takes 85 to 90 days to grow has been ready after 75 days this

Variations in citrus trees can lead to new types

It's called a "chimera"--a shoot from a citrus tree that produces fruit different from the other fruit on the tree. A University of California farm advisor says chimeras can lead to new fruit varieties, such as the multi-fingered Buddha's Hand citron. But most chimeras turn out to be of inferior quality. the advisor says, adding that both commercial and backyard growers should be aware of unusual-looking citrus that could be a sign of tree disease.

New food products show nutritional patterns

The constant churn of food products entering and leaving the market can indicate trends in people's preferences and in efforts by food makers to meet those demands. A new government study says more than 32,000 new food and beverage products debuted in the most recent year surveyed, while another 41,000 were discontinued. The new products demonstrated gradual reductions in sodium levels and other changes in nutrient content.

U.S. Census of **Agriculture kicks off**

To form the best possible picture of the nation's farms and ranches. the U.S. Department of Agriculture begins its next Census of Agriculture this week. Conducted every five years, the agricultural census provides information on the number and types of farms across the U.S. For example, the previous census, conducted in 2012, showed that the great majority of California farms and ranches continue to be owned by individuals, families and partnerships.



Boulder Creek, Ca. 5 students from Marysville High School participated recently in the 2017 Santa Cruz Forestry Challenge, one group of a total of 107 high school students from 14 schools from the Santa Cruz and Central California region. The event was November 15 to 18 at Redwood Christian Park, near Boulder Creek, California.

One of the highlights for the students this year was the opportunity to visit a redwood forest that will soon be harvested using single tree selection. Students collected data on how much the trees have grown since the last selective harvest 12 years ago, and used the

data to recommend the volume that can be sustainably removed in the upcoming harvest. During the Challenge, teams of students also completed field training, followed by a field test to assess their technical forestry knowledge.

"This event allows students to learn about the timber industry, view

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opportunities, career and become informed citizens about forestry issues," said Marysville High School teacher Bonnie Magill. Kaitlyn O'Dell, a Senior at Marysville, summed it up as follows: "It was an enlightening experience to learn about another area of agriculture; 'Timber is agriculture, too!""

Meanwhile Mexican illegal Sergio Jose Martinez. 31, was sentenced to 35-years in prison in Portland, Oregon. He sexually assaulted a woman in her home and attacked another in a parking lot.

Both assaults occurred on the same July day, a week after he was released from jail. He had been arrested for interfering with the police and providing a false birth date. He was released despite a request from ICE for the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office to hold him so the agency could take him into custody. The sheriff ignored ICE.

Oregon became America's first sanctuary state when it adopted a law in 1987 preventing law enforcement from detaining those who are in the United States illegally but have not broken other laws.

Martinez had been deported 20 times. He pled guilty to 10 counts including sodomy and sexual assault.

Border Patrol agents in Arizona arrested a Mexican illegal previously deported for a 2016 rape conviction in Contra Costa County, CA, a Sanctuary jurisdiction. Juan Sotelo-Carasco was discovered in the desert near Sasabe, AZ.

Agents working near Calexico observed a man who had illegally crossed the border from Mexico about 22 miles west of the port of entry. Agents arrested the man for processing.

A records check revealed the 44-year-old had a previous notice to appear from San Jose, CA for lewd acts with a child under 14. San Jose is located in San Mateo County which is also listed as a county with sanctuary protection policies.

Later that afternoon, agents observed another man who had illegally crossed the border about 11 miles west of the Calexico Port of Entry. Agents arrested the man. During a background check, agents determined that the 24-year-old Honduran national is affiliated with the MS-13 gang.

To stop welcoming foreign criminals California either needs more conservative politicians or the current crop of liberals to have some Kate Steinlestyle mishaps.

California's New Ammo Laws on Jan. 1, 2018

On Jan. 1, 2018, as most gun owners in the state are aware, new ammo laws will come into effect.

It's worth noting the new regulations again, as this will have a significant impact throughout the gun community, from mom and pop stores to someone just trying to purchase ammo.

The following will be incorporated into the law of the land per Laura Cromwell of Cabela's:

 Vendors must have Department of Justice approval to sell ammo. Current retailers with an ammo supply may stop providing ammunition altogether due to the process of getting DOJ consent. For hunters and shooters in rural areas who rely on momand-pop sporting goods stores, they may need to seek out a new supplier as well as plan on driving a lot farther to find the ammunition of their choice.

• Importing ammunition— Californians must go to an ammunition vendor that has been approved by the DOJ. If a resident orders ammunition from a website, the

ammo in question must be sent to an approved vendor for the consumer to pick up. Purchasing ammunition out of state and then returning to California runs the risk of carrying a misdemeanor charge of transporting ammo across state lines

 Transferring ammunition— For anyone who has ammunition they are looking to part with, you will need to enlist a DOJapproved vendor to complete the transaction, same way you would transfer a firearm to a new owner.
