## Marysville Introduces New Management Team

At the December 19th meeting of the Marysville City Council, the Council voted 4 to 0 to approve an employment agreement with Marti Brown for the position of Marysville City Manager. Councilwomen McKenzie was absent.

Prior to 2014 Marti was a Councilwoman in the City of Vallejo, California. During her tenure, she spearheaded bringing Participatory Budgeting (PB) to the City of Vallejo for the first city-wide PB process in North America. PB Vallejo won the League of California Cities Helen Putnam Award for Excellence in September 2014. It was also honored as one of the Top Ten Programs in Government Awards in 2015 by the Harvard Kennedy School's Ash Center for Democratic Governance and Innovation.

Marti's experience includes: Community Development Director for the City of Arvin, she managed the Planning, Building, Code Enforcement, Maintenance & Infrastructure, and Parks & Recreation Divisions, as well as pitch hit for the City Manager on Economic Development projects. She has been featured on Fox News, CBS and California Forward. She's also interviewed with the Washington Post, New York Times, San Francisco Chronicle and Sacramento Bee on such topics as Participatory Budgeting, municipal bankruptcy and public employee pen-

# Fabulous Fords Part II – Ford N Series

John Froelich conceived the idea of placing a hit and miss type engine on a stationary steam frame wagon like device and engineered a forward and reverse ability. It was used primarily to belt up to threshing machines and was successful. Many give him credit for the development of the first tractor. The so-called Industrial Revolution of the late 1800s early 1900s was in full bloom. Steam farm power had been around for about a hundred years and was not going to last much longer. Otto was advancing the internal combustion engine and Rudolf Diesel was about to burst on the scene. The Wallis Company would develop the idea of making the engine and transmission part of the structure of the tractor thus eliminating the weight of a heavy frame.

Many manufacturing companies and blacksmith shops were trying to get into the tractor business with over 400 brand names in the United States. Europeans were producing units and the Aussies were introducing their ideas. India was hampered by the British presence and the Indian farm was using British products.

World War I was soon to explode.

There were two men on two different continents who would eventually discover each other and have a tremendous impact on the main farm machine.

fertile mind and was observing the kits to modify Model Ts into pulling machines. His brain became focused on the hitch and weight transfer.

This time frame provided a multitude of horse drawn machines in the US and around the world.

Henry Ford, the great American Industrialist viewed the farmer as one of the most noble occupations. His vision was, "To make farming what it ought to be, the most pleasant and profitable profession in the world." "His first experimental designs were completed in 1907, to be followed later by the Fordson - the most important tractor in the history of power farming." as viewed by the author Michael Williams. His little Model F fed England while the German Navy was causing havoc with supply ships. The low cost, ability to do the job, and the lessened costs of operation was a great stimulus in reducing the number of manufacturing companies of tractors.

The Depression of the early 1920's caused by over supply for the war effort and the development of the Farmall concept would play havoc on the Model F. Production of the Model F in the US was moved to England. Ferguson had entered a partnership with David Brown in England and they were producing a Ferguson-Brown tractor with the Ferguson three point hitch in 1936. The harmony between Ferguson and Brown was dwindling due to a difficulty in sell-

ing the product for a variety of reasons. Ferguson was invited to the US by Ford to demonstrate his tractor as well as an Allis Chalmers Model B, and a Fordson for comparison in the ability to perform. Ford was impressed by Ferguson's hitch. It transferred weight to the drive wheels increasing traction and had a "Draft Control" which automatically raised the plow some allowing the tractor to maintain speed.

They entered in to an agreement with a handshake on a multi-million deal which later proved to be a problem. Ford would manufacture and Ferguson would distribute. The tractor would be a Ford and for name recognition the Ferguson System plate would be placed under the Ford emblem. Thus the 9N came into being and was introduced in 1939. The launch price was \$585. Features included rubber tires, a power take-off, and an electrical system. Options were lights, steel wheels, and a belt pulley. The tractor was so quiet that some moves were made to include as an option a radio which was quite novel for the time. Power was supplied by a four cylinder flat head engine of L head design of 120cubic inches. The transmission had three speeds and was rated at 6mph at 1400 rpm. Because of the shortage of materials during WWII the unit came out with steel wheels, a magneto, and no lights and was called the 2N. Peak production was in 1946 with 74,004 and was the last year for the 9N. The tractor was immensely popular with women during WWII as it was quiet and easy to operate. An 8 year old boy was lifted into the seat during the original demo and plowed as straight as the experienced men (David McLaren). Edsel, Henry's son died in 1943, Henry took back control of the company but it was beyond his ability at 82. He later died in April of 1947.

Henry Ford, the second, took over the company in 1945 and discovered they were losing money with every tractor as Ferguson was fixing the prices as the distributor. At the end of 1946, Ford announced they would produce an improved version, the 8N which was introduced in June of 1947. There were over 20 improvements which included a four speed transmission and an improved hydraulic system.

Ferguson decided to manufacture in the US and kept his distributing network alive with British built units. The TO 20 was later built in the US and the TE 20 was from England.

A major suit was filed by Harry Ferguson for patent infringement and it lasted for several years ending in 1952.

The 8N was a major commercial success as 100,000 were sold in 1948. Telling the difference of the series can be difficult. About half of the tractors listed on Craig's list are incorrectly la-

beled. A nice gentleman from Yuba City every now and then writes some general guidelines to assist those advertising. Generally speaking, the 9N was produced from 1939 to 1942. If it had an aluminum hood it is very rare and is an early 9N. The front hub is larger and has 6 nuts as does the rear hub. The brace from the transmission to the front axle will have an I beam look and will have a three speed transmission. The 2N came out with a tubular radius arm brace after mid- 1944. The serial numbers can be confusing as they began 9 N up through most of the 2N series. One little tidbit about the 2N is the hole for the crank will be somewhat elliptical to accept the crank for starting. An original hood is getting harder to come by.

The 8N will have a four speed transmission, both brake pedals will be on the right hand side to the transmission, the front hub and rear will be smaller and have eight

bolts. The dipstick will not be on the inspection cover as will the 2N. The lift lever will have a mid-point hold.

These hints are only about 80 percent correct as farmers have interchanged parts along the way. The purists will be disappointed and Henry would be proud. Calendar years and production years do not always match. A review of the literature from Ford shows an 8N with large hubs like a 9 or 2N. All gray paint is correct for the 9 and the

2N. Gray with a red chassis is correct for the 8N. Late 8Ns had a recall on the rear end and were recalled, fixed, and painted Ford Blue. Basic weight is about 2,400 pounds.

Production of the N series ended in 1952. The Historic Faire on February 10 the will feature Fords and if you have one please contact me through the Territorial Dispatch.

The book "Ford and Fordson Tractors" by Michael Williams was used as a major reference for this article.

# This Month In Your Garden

We wish everyone a "Happy New Year" as we enter 2018. Hopefully it will be an improvement over last year which was very difficult for many people in our nation. Think positively! We have a very dry and cold December. Check on plants to be sure that they are not excessively dry. That is especially important for containerized plants since dry roots will freeze more easily than wet ones will.

Bare root season is the big thing many people look forward to in January. We have many of the smaller bare root items that arrived November. That includes berries, rhubarb, asparagus, and artichokes. We are still well stocked on those, but roses and fruit trees come a bit later. They are now here ready to take home to be planted. We usually have some folks who are new to gardening and the term "bare root" may not be familiar to them. It is simply what it says. The trees have been taken out of the ground and the roots are exposed, thus, "bare root". They are less expensive since the pot, soil, and time and effort to plant them into a container has been avoided. It also requires that it must be planted right away, or otherwise stored in a way to protect the roots from dry-

ing out or freezing. We have availability lists at the nursery to help one to make decisions. Bare root season for fruit trees is usually considered very late December or early January to the end of February. By then the trees are beginning get too many new fragile roots and new leaves to handle them "bare root" without possible damage. There are advantages to planting your own fruit trees. You make the decisions of what fertilizers etc. are used and avoiding many of the unknowns of commercial grower's methods. Allowing the fruit ripen on the tree allows much better flavor to develop as the fruit ripens than that picked early and ripened in cold storage. Often kids and adults are encouraged eat more fruit just because they like picking it themselves and it is close by.

There are many questions about the fruit trees, one being, do they all need pollinizers? Some are self fruitful and don't need a different pollinizer and others do. Many of the peaches and nectarines are self fruitful, but not all of them. Most of the cherries need a pollinizer, but again, not all of them, and so it is with plums, pears Most fruit trees have a tag giving some of that information.

One thing that won't be found during bare root season are citrus and avocado trees. They are evergreen trees. They are semi tropical trees and need protection when the weather is very cold. They will be available in the spring.

Chill hours may be noted on the tag. That refers to the cumulative number of hours required under 45 degrees during the entire winter season to provide normal fruit production and is generally not a concern in our area.

Many camellia plants have finished blooming for the year and the flowers have fallen causing a pile of debris at the base of the plant. That debris should be bagged and sent to the landfill rather than added to a compost pile you may have. It can carry a fungal disease that develops in the debris that then can scatter the spores and spread a problem that is easily avoided by the proper disposal of the debris.

Bare root roses are now available and have been pruned by the growers. If you have roses that are growing in your yard already, we suggest delaying the pruning until the danger of a heavy freeze is past. In our area roses usually don't go completely dormant. What happens when you prune a rose? It starts

putting out new growth at that point. That new growth is too tender to survive a hard freeze and dies back. We have lots of micro climates in the foothills, so consider the temperature range in your area and delay the pruning until freezing danger is past and do the pruning in early spring if it seems more appropriate. If by chance you do prune them and are then hit by freeze that damages new growth, no great harm has been done – the rose just has to expend more energy that might otherwise have been saved for its beautiful first bloom and has to start over again.

Some maintenance chores to be done in January – weather permitting –

Annual pruning of dormant deciduous plants – allow spring blooming plants to bloom, then prune

Prune dormant vines, grapes and cane berries

Rake up heavy litter of leaves and apply pre-emergent if weeds were a problem last year

Shop early for the best selections in bare root fruit trees.

# A "Big Year" for Yuba Sutter Arts


In the world of serious birders, a "big year" is an informal competition to see who can identify the most bird species by sight or sound in a single calendar year in a given geographic region. In artistic terms, I believe that Yuba Sutter Arts has experienced the equivalent of a really "big year" by virtue of the vast array of programs, events, exhibitions, festivals and presentations we "identified" as important and then provided for the community in 2018. And there's a lot more to come in the New Year.

In planning for our arts year, we start by laying in the basics, the foundational elements, the ongoing programs, cornerstones and other essentials for the year to come. This begins in the fall and continues right through the holidays. We survey the funding landscape, meet with our Board in a retreat setting, talk about what worked and what didn't and throw it all into a big pot to simmer.

We know we'll continue hosting the Women's Creative Circle and Shakespeare Readers Theater and sponsoring Press Play Lectures. We will continue the Very Special Arts festival in Yuba County and expand it to Sutter County students.

We will hold our ongoing annual events like our Day of the Dead festival, Harvest the Arts and the beloved Applause series of musical performances. We will continue to display the work of local artists and host monthly receptions in our home gallery in Marysville while providing exhibition opportunities to artists at our network of eight satellite galleries as part of our "Art Everywhere" program. Our theater will again be "alive with the sound of music" as we present musical acts ranging from Flamenco guitar to blues harmonica to free style jazz to folk and indie rock and piano jazz and everything in between.

During 2017, we kicked off some great new projects and programs like our singer/songwriter concert series under the creative direction of Tom and Gay Galvin. We created public art works including the ongoing Murals of Live Oak and Cover It! Utility Box Mini Murals - you know, like the cow at Butte House Road and Stabler and the proud rooster on Franklin near 99 and the Poppies and Bike in the Buttes in Marysville. "Umbrella



Sky", the 100-strong umbrella canopy in the courtyard at Yuba Sutter Arts, will return next summer.

We reinstated the Yuba Sutter Youth Choir with both summer and fall sessions. We expanded our Arts in Education programs with High School Theater workshops and by placing arts educators in rural school districts. We hosted student and faculty art shows for high schools as well as Yuba College. We are now the northern California regional affiliate for the national Scholastic Writing Awards program, and we continue to host our regional Poetry Out Loud competition at which more than 60 high school students participated in 2017.

Our Portraits of Veterans project involved photographing over 300 Veterans throughout the community, and we then displayed the 20x30 black and white photos in various public places leading up to and following Veterans Day. We held "Art Walks" in Yuba City and Marysville with artists and their work pre-positioned in businesses along Plumas Street and D Street so that guests could stroll, mingle and enjoy art talk along with refreshments at each location.

We began the year by placing artist/facilitators in Yuba-Sutter Juvenile Hall as part of a recidivism reduction grant and then later in the year funded artists in both the Sutter and Yuba County prisons teaching adult inmates some basic art skills. This was all part of an Art in Corrections pilot program in select counties statewide.

We added other new events like Art, Wine & Wickets, Art & Oysters and Jazz at Justins all while

remodeling our offices and art gallery. We continue to be active members of the Arts Consortia collective of all local arts organizations, and we added a new digital marquis sign right on E Street in front of our facility announcing local arts events in bright LED lights for all to see.

Then we ask ourselves questions like "What's new?" "What's needed?" "What are we missing?" "What's never been done before?" "What worked in the past, but hasn't been done for years?" "What does the community want or expect from us?" "What segments of the community have we not reached or attempted to reach?" You know, how do we "boldly go" where we've never gone before and what are our long-term goals? Public input is always welcomed and encouraged.

Here's a glimpse at a few of our 2018 projects in progress. We're looking for studio and gallery space in Yuba City to set up a Festival Arts workshop and showcase. We'll start a literary journal for local middle and high school students and publish some hard copies and an online edition. We'd like to provide an "arts for tots" program for 2-5 year olds in Yuba County. And, of course there will be the continuum of Public Art, Veterans' art projects, Arts in Education and on and on.

## What is driving the Market?

With the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) racing to new highs almost daily, one has to ask, what is driving this market?

Certainly there are enough Donald Trump haters to cast a dim light on anything financial, where even many are doubting the civilized world itself will survive if Trump continues as President. But one cannot deny that the DJIA has loved this President, as evident by the rally that has been in place since he was elected.

With the DJIA making news headlines with every milestone it passes, the news might entice some investors to review their statements and then call their advisors to see why they haven't doubled their money in light of this almost relentless rally.

Although the DJIA is the most talked about index in the media, it encompasses only 30 stocks of the thousands that are out there in the various marketplaces.

The question some may ask: is the Dow a realistic representation of

the market in general and the economy.

On the latter, I have always said the market will reflect reality eventually but its day to day movements are only the sum of the perceptions of all the players in it at any given time. For example, late in the housing boom cycle after Bear Sterns collapsed two funds tied to mortgage products (the proverbial first domino to fall in the real estate blow up), the reality was the housing crisis was already in its early stages of implosion. That was the reality. The perception however was that real estate never falls in value and any set back would be temporary. Housing stocks therefore continued to climb as the housing market was beginning its historic collapse. The perception that all was OK drove these stocks ever higher even though in reality the real estate market had already turned. The market did however eventually reflect that reality when all the indexes worldwide eventually cratered miserably.

That being said, the perception at least up until now, is the economy is strong and the stock market is justified in roaring upwards.

Certain things however might not add up and be confirming of the apparent strength of in the market meaning not all assets are firing on all cylinders.

If the economy is galloping forward in strength, one might expect the com-

modities and energy sectors to be in high demand and therefore screaming upwards as well.

Such is not the case, at least in the proportions the Dow has climbed. Indeed some energy and commodities have languished badly and or gone nowhere. (Yahoo.com). Since booming economies need energy and commodities, why have we not seen these asset classes go up in concert?

Additionally the Dow index is very limited in what is has in it. Remember it only has 30 stocks out of thousands and only seven stocks make up almost half of the index weighting (42%- Forbes.com) Some have even speculated the people who decide on what stocks go in the Dow rotate the losers out and replace them with winners in order to make it look better. This idea was put forth by QZ.com in an article by J.L. Zargosky. Matthew Yglesias of Slate.com goes so far as to call the DJIA a "nonsensical index" due to how it is purposely constructed to favor more positive results.

Indeed just the fact that the DJIA contains only 30 stocks might be enough to convince the investing public to better observe how the market in general is performing by looking at a variety of indicators and markets. Indeed many of those indicators are positive.

But because most investors hold a variety of assets in their portfolio which include assets that might move in opposite of a rising market, and because there are stocks in many areas that have actually gone nowhere or even fallen in the midst of this rally, its likely few portfolios have seen proportional increases their value that the DJIA has. Additionally because fixed income investments (bonds and preferred stocks to name a few) may have moved opposite of the rally, some portfolios may actually have lost value or remained anemic.

behavior is not a holiday problem but the new normal in Marysville. Sachs launched a 'Walking the Beat' program to address concerns. Since November 25, during 6 deployments, 11 arrests were made and 12 citations issued.

In the 1990s former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani and his Police Chief William Bratton stopped a major crime wave by arresting petty offenders. Somehow city officials here with far fewer credentials have a better idea, ignoring those same lawbreakers.

- \* It eliminates coordination of operations between Narrows 1 and Narrows 2 powerhouses, creating greater efficiencies and minimizing overhead costs

- \* It avoids any possible conflicts or coordination issues with other future owners

- \* It maintains flexibility in how water is released from Englebright Dam

"YCWA is the natural entity to assume ownership of Narrows 1 Powerhouse because of its synergy to our current infrastructure," said

YCWA General Manager Curt Aikens. "We already balance all of our regulatory requirements for water releases below Englebright Dam, so from an efficiency standpoint, this purchase makes sense."

YCWA and PG&E plan to continue negotiations on the potential sale, and will work with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to determine how relicensing the powerhouse would work in this unique situation. The sale may take up to two years to complete.

## Congressman McClintock delivered the following remarks on the House floor on the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act:



Mr. Speaker:

I opposed the House version of the tax reform bill because the loss of broad-based deductions like state and local taxes would have caused significant tax increases on many of my middle-class constituents in the high-tax, high-cost state of California. It increased the marginal tax rate on high income earners and abolished life-line deductions such as casualty loss, medical expenses and student interest. I urged that we should leave no taxpayer behind.

I want to thank Chairman Brady, the Republican Leadership and the conference committee for heeding these concerns. Their final product exceeds my expectations, and on behalf of California taxpayers I can now offer my enthusiastic support.

The new version leaves the casualty loss, medical expense and student interest deductions intact. No family needs to fear being ruined by taxes after a major declared disaster or illness, and graduates can continue to plan their lives knowing interest on their student loans will not be taxed. The new bill eases the proposed limit on mortgage interest deductions and allows up to \$10,000 of state and local taxes to be deducted – all important improvements for Californians.

Most importantly, the

lower tax rates in this bill now more than compensate in almost every case for the remaining limits on state and local tax and mortgage interest deductions. Even taxpayers who lose tens of thousands of dollars of deductions will still pay lower taxes than they do today.

For example, a couple earning \$60,000 with a \$300,000 home and three adult dependents would have paid \$200 more in taxes under the old bill – but under the new version they will SAVE \$340. A couple earning \$150,000 with a \$750,000 home and one child would have paid \$1,200 of additional taxes under the old House bill. In the new bill, that same family will SAVE \$720.

The business tax provisions are especially important, because they will restore American workers to an internationally competitive position. According to economists ranging from Martin Feldstein to Arthur Laffer, these provisions alone will produce \$5 trillion of new economic activity over the next decade – that's \$40,000 per household -- including \$2 trillion of new tax revenues to all levels of government.

Last Friday I toured AMPAC, a local company making the active ingredient in several cancer and epilepsy drugs. Their product is then shipped to Ireland to make the actual medicine because the corporate tax in the United States is 35 percent and in Ireland it's just 12 ½ percent. Their CEO, Aslam Malik, told me that if they gave their product away for free, the final medicine could still not be competitively manufactured in the United States – solely because of our taxes. He expects their local company will grow dramatically because of this tax reform – employing hundreds more families both directly and indirectly as they expand everything from payroll to infra-

structure.

That's what the Marxists just don't understand. Businesses don't pay business taxes. Businesses collect business taxes from just three sources: from consumers through higher prices; from employees through lower wages, and from investors through lower earnings – usually pension plans and IRAs. We have the highest corporate tax in the industrialized world, and commerce and capital simply move around it – leaving our workers behind. That's one of the reasons why we averaged 1 ½ percent under Obama – worse than any President since Herbert Hoover – and lost an entire decade of prosperity.

The Marxists tell us that this is just trickle-down economics and it has never worked. In fact, it has ALWAYS worked. It worked when Warren Harding did it in the 1920's; when John F. Kennedy did it in the 1960's, when Ronald Reagan did it in the 1980's and lest we forget, when Bill Clinton approved the biggest capital gains tax cut in American history.

Concerns over the deficit are legitimate and must be addressed by spending reforms this coming year. We must always remember that both taxes and debt are driven by spending.

The proof of these policies will manifest itself over the coming year – and every American will be able to decide for themselves if this has made them better off. That's probably why the left has pulled out all the stops to defeat it. Their arguments are the same economically illiterate attacks filled with class-envy that they made against Reagan. When the American people awakened one day to find it was morning again in America, the left was discredited for a generation.

Let history repeat itself beginning today, with this vote.
