Foothill Residents Want "Pot Emergency" Declared

Hill residents turned out at the August 8th meeting of the Yuba County Board of Supervisors. Approximately 10 individuals spoke to the Board requesting protection and enforcement of the Marijuana Laws. "Outdoor grows are illegal!" Approximately 50 people mostly from the foothills seemed to feel that it took the shooting of two Yuba County Deputies to shine the light on what is going on in the Foothills. Speakers expressed fear, and intimidation of their grower neighbors. One participant said there would have been more people complaining if this had been a night meeting and yet many are fearful of speaking out.

Buck Weckman founder of FACT (Families Against Cannabis Trafficking) presented the board with a resolution demanding the Supervisors adopt a "State of Emergency" because of illegal Marijuana activities. The speakers let the board know that they wanted them to take action and to support the reso-

lution. The other sentiment that came through clearly was that the residents did not blame the Sheriff but that the Board of Supervisors needed to give the Sheriff what he needs to solve the problem. Marcia Cecil of Browns Valley suggested the board needed to cut the budget 1% across the board and give it to law enforcement for deputies and equipment.

Randy Fletcher the Foothill Supervisor acknowledged there

was a problem and said they will be working on it.

Editors Note: The Yuba County Marijuana Ordinance is not a law enforcement ordinance it is a code enforcement ordinance. This must change; we have three new Supervisors and a new County Council. Government's number one responsibility is to keep its citizens safe, even though we live in California.

New Cannabis Grow Revealed

As Yuba County officials seek to calm frustrated and fearful residents by explaining that the hill country is safe, families have second thoughts. No one questions Sheriff Durfor's integrity or the lower crime statistics for the rural areas.

However, residents are aware that illegal growing is occurring nearby, buildings are erected without permits, agri-chemicals are used without supervision, and honey oil labs and illegal electrical installations present a volatile fire threat. Add to this people brandishing weapons and making threats. There are no crime statistics for feeling unsafe, intimidated and fearful.

Last week, the Rastafarian 'Church' illegal marijuana farm at 9015 Marysville Rd., Oregon House and a much larger operation on 429 acres at 10874 Marysville Road, Dobbins, were noted in the article 'Yuba Co Pot Chaos Life Threatening' about Yuba Co deputies being shot protecting an illegal grow.

County records show the larger acreage owned by BBNR LLC, Lance Bates, Adam Bates, Mary Bates and Scott Bates. However, BBNR LLC attorney Courtney McAlister called to say his clients sold the property on an unrecorded contract of sale to new owners who may not want to be identified. McAlister was to call back with a yes or no regarding the new owners' names, but had not by this paper's

A third plot has now been revealed located just behind the Dobbins Catholic Church with access at 14143 Terra Rojo Lane. It's a 5-acre parcel that supports at least 3 separate plantings (See aerial photo). This grow has been reported to county officials numerous times over a number of years and yet, today it flourishes. Plants have been visible from the road and from the church property.

County records show the property is owned by Tosha Asker who uses 1410 Calistoga Rd., Santa Rosa, CA. 95409-2541 as an address of record. The Sacred Heart Parish is the structure and parking lot in the photo on Old Dobbins Road.

Last week's Supervisors' meeting was attended by concerned citizens asking that a state of emergency be declared and for federal authorities to be sought for help. Many residents also feel that enforcement of illegal cannabis activity laws should be handled by

The supervisors are on their third marijuana ordinance. They are the policy makers of the county and need to draft an ordinance that helps law enforcement do their job. Unarmed code enforcement people do not have the ability to handle this problem.

Yuba-Sutter **Political Notes**

On August 9, the Sutter Butte Flood Control Agency (SBFCA) in charge of managing more than \$200 million in levee upgrades disbanded the Citizens' Assessment District Advisory Committee (CADAC). It did so after promising to establish and utilize the 'watchdog' group in exchange for the public's support for the 2010 levee improvement assessment measure.

Two previous measures had failed until public assurances were given that a citizens committee would examine the finances and ongoing management of the revenues from stiff property assessments on more than 30,000 parcels and continuing for 33 years. The public did not trust huge property assessments handed over to an unelected and unsupervised agency.

CADAC people receive no pay, even for travel. However, CADAC members created an immediate stir in the beginning when SBFCA employees wanted to spend \$80,000 for a junket to Washington D.C. to lobby for flood insurance changes. CADAC members felt this expense was outside the scope of repairing levees. The request was then reduced to \$10,000 and then withdrawn altogether.

CADAC members continued to question expenditures and the size of some budget items including the fees of outside contract employ-

What is the Veteran's Stand Down?

The original Stand Down for the homeless veterans was modeled after the Stand Down concept used during the Vietnam War to provide a safe retreat for units returning from combat operations. At secure base camp areas, troops were able to take care of personal hygiene, get clean uniforms, enjoy warm meals, receive medical and dental care, mail and receive letters, and enjoy the

camaraderie of friends in a safe environment. Stand Down afforded battle-weary soldiers the opportunity to renew their spirit, health and overall sense of wellbeing. Stand Down is an intervention that was conceived from the ground up specifically for veterans. It is designed to transform the despair and immobility of homelessness into the momentum necessary to get into recovery, to resolve legal issues, to seek employment, to access health and benefits, to reconnect with the community and to get off the streets...A very tall order for a three-day event. Stand Down is a belief in the triumph of the human spirit over extraordinary odds. It grows out of a conviction that the overwhelming number of homeless veterans on the streets of America is unacceptable and that the veteran community itself must respond. Each year the Yuba-Sutter Veterans Stand Down has grown, been refined to meet the needs of our veterans, homeless or not, all active duty personnel and their dependents. There are organizations / agencies and more than 2,800 and growing volunteers from all walks of life that make Stand Down happen. Some never set foot on the Stand Down field; others are there from the first day of set up until the site is returned to its original form. Perhaps the hallmark of success is that each year more and more of our volunteers were once participants who have made the courageous move to change their lives.





FISHIN' TALK

Our latest report on salmon in local rivers shows that the run has not gotten here yet. Granted, there are a few fish in the rivers, but the main run is yet to be seen. Old Timers, who have chased after the salmon over the years, tell us to expect a bumper year in all rivers which will start the last part of August and continue through September and probably into part of October. Our weather source

advises there will be a cooling off period for the Sacramento Valley on August 14th or 15th but do not expect it to be around very long. He advised this is not the end of the heat, but a break in the action and to expect the hot weather to return as we continue into August and into September.

Apparently most of the planted trout ended up in lakes, streams, rivers and reservoirs in Inyo County last week with around 50 plants throughout the county. Northern California received some fish, but it was just a drop in the bucket compared to what took place further south.

Reports from Stampede Reservoir advised anglers are catching lots of kokanee salmon. Bullard's Bar Reservoir has also had good results with these landlocked salmon.

Collins Lake has been good for pan fish and catfish with trout being

taken down deep. When the action (boats, wave runner, skiers and etc.) hit the water anglers might as well leave fishing alone until the early morning hours.

Local anglers Kyle Caldwell and Ted Johnson, along with several friends headed down to Bodega Bay last week. They caught halibut and sharks. In fact apparently they got into a school of sharks and could not hold on to some of them. Ted said it was a different fishing trip but they had a ball. Lots of fish were caught with fish in the fridge and freezer at home.

Little Grass Valley Reservoir, located above La Porte, finally got a good sized trout plant. The fish were the usual size, between 10 and 12 inches and were reported to be all rainbow trout. We imagine anyone camping there who fish hit the water pretty hard when the planter trucks dumped their loads at several boat ramps on the lake and left the scene.

Boots fishing tip for the week: "When fishing reservoirs drop down deep this time of vear and also fish the shoreline with top line lures before or at first light."










Malakoff's French Connection Festival

Malakoff Diggins State Historic Park. Nevada California-On County, Saturday, September 9, 2017, from 11 am-4 pm, Friends of North Bloomfield & Malakoff Diggins and California State Parks will jointly commemorate the French heritage of the park, and unveil two new interpretive panels that are the result of recent research into its French and French Canadian pio-

neers. 162 years ago, the French army toppled the impenetrable Malakoff Tower, thereby ending a 10-month siege by French and English forces upon the Russian naval port Sebastopol. French people all over the world celebrated France's victory in the Crimean War. A mock Malakoff tower was created in the streets of San Francisco, and French miners drawn to the Sierra during the Gold Rush gave the name to their claims. Hundreds of thousands of French-speaking immigrants were lured to California to participate in what has been called the greatest migration in history. The famous Malakoff Mine is testimony to their presence.

Recent study has found that their influence at Malakoff Diggins State Historic Park was wide-Entrepreneurs spread. designed massive water systems and hydraulic ventures, opened hotels and businesses, and planted gardens. They dominated the local scene at the Park for 15 years, laying the groundwork to the nation's biggest hydraulic operation of the day, the North Bloomfield Gravel Mining Company, which was commonly called the French Company for years. The Malakoff Mine became so large that it was the defendant in the famous federal lawsuit that handed down the Sawyer Decision, the renowned injunction against the laissez-faire practice of polluting waterways.

Visitors are awed and humbled by the dramatic, multi-colored cliffs of the Park's main attraction—the remains of a hydraulic mine—a massive, manmade pit carved into the landscape by giant water cannons. 



"Ratepigs"

'Wealthyretirement.com slaps the term "Ratepig" on investors who only look at yield when evaluating a potential investment. One of my family members does this and has been burned multiple times when the underlying investment offering the yield got into trouble. Basically a Ratepig's most important criteria is how much they will get in dividends or interest no matter how economically healthy the entity offering the investment is. A Ratepig might be attracted to the junk bonds of poorly rated companies, municipalities or even third world countries. The high yield of certain investments may reflect the underlying financial strength or lack thereof of the borrower. The high interest may be offered due to its poor credit rating or ability to pay back the debt. For the most extreme example. think a deadbeat brother in law or shady investment deal that entices investors by ultra-high returns. The old adage "if its too good to be true it usually is" comes to mind.

to mind.

In the case of my family member, they received high interest payments (which they loved) until they didn't. Payments may have stopped or been reduced or the underlying stock or bond price may have plummeted, resulting in loss despite the high payments.

Borrowers pay high rates not because they want to, but because they have to, and that usually spells risk.

High returns do attract investors but what good is a 10% annual yield if the stock drops 20% in value? Or cuts the payment shortly after you sign on, or worse, defaults altogether.

Cash strapped Argentina has recently offered up a Ratepig's appetizer in a new flavor, a bond whose term

hits the century mark. What that means in laymen terms is the bond has a maturity date 100 years from now.

What????

On the surface it is easily understood by most of you that anyone who buys this bond has to live a long time to get paid back, like a REAL long time, like 100 years from when you buy it, but what the heck, whose counting.

The bond's 8 % yield is not too shabby for the near zero rate environment we find ourselves in today but waiting 100 years? If that's not enough to make you turn a blind eye to such an investment, consider this: The longer term the bond, the more sensitive its price is to interest rate moves. This means it interest rates move in one direction or another, the longer a bonds term, the more violent the move up or down in the price of the bond.

If you hold a bond to its maturity, the daily price won't affect what you get paid in interest and when getting all your money back when it comes due, but should you have to sell early (because you can't wait the 100 years) the chances are you might get your head handed to you when you try and sell the thing.

Seeing Ratepigs salivate at a 100 year sovereign bond paying 8% might make a good story over a strong martini by Wall Street stock brokers is one thing, but the fact that these bonds are real and up for sale is quite another. In fact Wall Street big boy Citigroup Inc along with HSBC took the deal as lead book runners while Nomura Securities and Banco Santander opted to be comanagers.

Cha-Ching.

Now wait just a minute you say, who would buy such a bond? Apparently enough investors (if that's the right word) saw it as a good enough deal to pony up 2.75 billion for these things. (CNBC) Apparently a lot of people expect to live a long time (pun intended).

Of course the reality of the situation is its likely none of the buyers intend to keep these bonds until maturity in the year 2117 and plan to off them to someone else at some point but seeing as worldwide interest rates are near historic lows and some say could only rise from here, if rates do rise, the bonds with the longest terms get hit the hardest because of the math involved.

No doubt some Ratepigs were among those that wrote checks to Argentina for the "privilege" of loaning them money, but seeing as this country has defaulted about 12 times since 1816 (Valuewalk.com) you have to wonder who else bought these things.

Of course it may all work out in the end, Argentina will gets its act together and do something it has been unable to do for about 300 years, which is to stay solvent for any reasonable length of time. And those folks that ambled up to the trough for the "juicy" yield of these century bonds will get all their money back. But it likely you and I will never know as we will be food for another kind of animal when these things come due

Certainly at least some investors believe the country is good for the money when it comes due in 2117 and all the interest payments in between and they may well be. But then again, a lot can happen in a 100 years, especially in a country like Argentina. 





ees. Two CADAC members, retired state auditor Elaine Miles and former school teacher Roberta Fletcher were dismissed for being too persistent in protecting the public's funds.

Miles has questioned the legality of some of the SBFCA board meetings when decisions about and changes in the board's composition were made. She also maintains there is lack of transparency in the finances including staff compensation.

The vote was 8-2 to drop CADAC with Stan Cleveland and Jason Banks opposing the move. SB-FCA's website states that "CADAC was disbanded by the SBFCA Board due to concerns about related staff time and duplication of effort. The information shared with CADAC members is also made publicly available at SBFCA Board meetings, on the website and via staff. The public is encouraged to ask questions, request information, attend community meet-

ings and board meetings, and communicate directly with Board Members and staff."

To suggest that community members are as SBFCA-knowledgeable as CADAC people and that citizens' have time to attend 1pm board meetings is elitist razzle-dazzle. Most all government meetings and county department schedules are designed to benefit employees and not to better serve citizens.

SBFCA is out of control and has violated its promise to the people of Sutter and Butte Counties.

When you drive through Marysville it looks like there is a drought. Most all grass and shrubs are dead or dying. However, the shortage is not water but money to pay the egregious bills to sustain one of the most profitable private water monopolies in the country, California Water Service.

Marysville rates run 3-4 times higher than in Yuba City, Olivehurst or

Linda where municipal districts manage the water. Cal Water Directors recently declared their 284th consecutive quarterly dividend and their 49th annual dividend increase in a row. Net profit for 2016 was \$48.7 million. Their stock price went from \$18.35 in 2012 to \$33.90 in 2016.

This would be a corporation to invest in, not buy your water from. Cal Water (CW) is also celebrating the corrupt California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) awarding them rate increases for 3 more years. While Marysville browns-out Cal Water gets greener.

Every three years Cal Water justifies rate increases to the CPUC with 'needed improvements' pitch, but the upgrades amount to window dressing. Cal Water's Marysville District was formed in 1930 with the purchase of Marysville Water Company. It has 55 miles of pipeline.

How many feet of pipeline are replaced each year? Currently CW Manager Robert Thompson is replacing 600 feet of 6 inch pipe that is more than 70 years old. For that, customers will get a 'small bump' in rates in 2019-2022 according to Thompson. A request was made to former manager Lee Seidel for a schedule of piping and its age throughout Marysville. There was no response.

With 55 miles or 290,400 feet of pipe in Marysville, to be ʻgood stewards' of the infrastructure replacing 600 feet each year it will take 484 years to upgrade every foot. No wonder all the CW board members and bosses are smiling on their website. Thompson says in a recent Appeal Democrat article that the newest pipe available lasts about 80 years. Seems like we

At some point Cal Water rates will completely break the residents of Marysville while the infrastructure is maintained by a slumlord.

Taxing Marijuana

I think we were all devastated when we learned of the shootings of two Deputy Sheriffs in Oregon House last week. My deepest and most sincere sympathies goes out to those officers and their families, but it was only a matter of time before things devolved to this level because Yuba County has failed in its responsibility to pass regulations to protect the community.

I lay this squarely at the feet of the Board of Supervisors who have refused to acknowledge that everything that has been tried to date has failed. Fear of federal raids, huge fines, life imprisonment, loss of family, and asset forfeiture has not stemmed the cultivation of cannabis.

The Yuba Co BoS have gone from a complete outdoor ban to contemplating grows as large as 40,000 plants. There must be a number in there someplace that will work for this county.

It is time for a different approach.

The ONLY thing that stopped alcohol bootleggers was regulation and taxation.

Truly, have you seen the regulations to comply with the new state laws? Trust me, this has the potential to stop grows (legal and illegal) more than anything

I can already hear the shouts that this won't stop them either. Perhaps not at first, but as the program gets established, it will provide the means to target those who choose not to comply. Even if you outlawed every last outdoor leaf, the county does not have the funds to eradicate these farms. Everyone knows this is true so they roll the dice hoping they won't be detected.

It is unfair to saddle our law enforcement officers with this burden.

The community has spoken loud and clear that they do not want large outdoor grows in Yuba County. The growers have themselves to thank for this because they pushed the envelope when given the opportunity to grow outdoors in the past. Clearly the "trust me" plan has not worked.

I don't think most reasonable people will object to a limited number of plants being grown outside for personal medical necessity. Whether you want to allow commercial cultivation is a whole other question. However, if it is allowed it should be a condition for getting a dispensary license in Marysville that they purchase all of their product from local farmers rather than importing it from outside areas.

The only way to keep growers in check is to issue them permits which gives the county the ability to revoke them if they fail to follow all of the requirements - and after buying expensive permits, I believe they will be more inclined to stay within the limits.

I object to taxing medicine on general principle, but I seem to be in the minority.

The state requires that the program to license and regulate cannabis be self funded, meaning that the licenses are going to be very expensive especially in the beginning.

This requirement should be adopted by Yuba County as well as surrounding counties. The permits should cost enough to hire as many officers enforcement as needed to eradicate the non-compliant grow sites.

We might be able to lure some federal officers here for a few weeks, but they have their own staffing problems and a lot of territory to cover now that 26 states have legalized cannabis in some form. We cannot count on their help to solve our local problem. This is an issue that we have to handle ourselves before

In Birth of New State Program, What's In A Name?

The Feds, under Obama set up a voluntary retirement fund called "myRA". It lost \$70 million, few wanted to participate and the average account was \$500. California has learned that lesson—so instead of making it voluntary, they are going to force 6.5 million Californians to participate in a government retirement program. Not mention is the \$1.4 trillion in unfunded liability of the current government pension program-collapsing and a disaster to local government. Now, Sacramento is looking forward to

abusing billions in family's assets to finance corruption, crony capitalism and financing money losing "green" companies—think Solyndra.

"The current name, Secure Choice, doesn't say much about a big new program that in five years could be a mandatory option to supplement Social Security for an estimated 7.5 million Californians currently not offered a retirement plan by more than 200,000 employers.

Secure Choice also has a kind of generic bureaucratic tone, not exciting or appealing to young people, said a staff report given to the Secure Choice board last week, and it has an "association with other sensitive policy issues," presumably like pro-choice on abortion.

First ObamaCare steals money from millennial's—now Jerry Brown wants to steal as well. Why are productive folks leaving the State? Programs like Secure Choice that steal from the young and give to the special interests and unions. Shame on the criminals in Sacramento.

Protect Our Children with Vaccines

Last April, the Cali-Department of Public Health reported encouraging results from the annual immunization assessment of children attending Kindergarten and Grade 7 in California in the 2016-17 school year. The report found that vaccination rates are at record levels overall in California, but the overall average in Sutter County has decreased from 90.0% up-to-date immunizations in Kindergarteners in 2015-16 to 85.3% in 2016-17. The 2016-17 Grade 7 immunization rates for Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis) declined similarly from 93.1% in 2015-16 to 85.3% in 2016-17.

All regular public schools and the public charter school with onsite instruction have excellent protective immunization rates for their schools. This provides important protection to their students, staff

and the community as a whole against serious preventable diseases. A few charter schools that are independent study account for almost all of the overall decline in percentage of immunized kindergarteners in Sutter County in 2016-17. We are looking closely at this data and for ways to improve the level of immunization protection for our children and our community.

When children are not vaccinated, they are at increased risk for getting sick and spreading diseases to students in their classrooms and other children and adults within their communities. Babies who are too young to be fully vaccinated and people with weakened immune systems due to cancer or other health conditions are especially susceptible. Dr. Lou Anne Cummings, Sutter County Health Officer, stated, "This is very concerning

because the decrease in overall school immunization rates reduces protection for everyone in the county, not just the child who isn't vaccinated."

California law requires students to receive certain immunizations in order to attend public and private elementary and secondary schools as well as licensed child care centers. Schools and licensed child care centers are required to enforce immunization requirements, maintain immunization records of all children enrolled, and report student immunization status to CDPH.

Sutter County Public Health (SCPH) supports healthcare providers and clinics through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program to ensure that vaccines available to all children. **Parents** can contact their children's providers for information about vaccines available through their offices and clinics. SCPH also holds regular immunization clinics to help kids get their vaccines and be protected. For information phone 822-7215 or check our website at www.suttercounty.org/publichealth.



Citizens for Fair Representation's Court Case Moves Forward

Last week, Federal Court Judge Judge K. Muller, asked the Chief Magistrate to form a 3-judge panel to hear the case; Citizens for Fair Representation vs Secretary of State Alex Padilla. In May, Citizens for Fair Representation (CFR) filed the lawsuit against the State of California, for lack of representation and dilution of vote. The lawsuit was filed on May 8, in the United States District Court, Eastern District, Sacramento Division. The significance of the three-judge panel is paramount, according to the legal team representing the CFR. Issues decided by three judge panels have the right to appeal directly to the United States Supreme Court. Mark Baird, one of the CFR spokespersons, said, "the case will ask important questions: Can one State Senator properly represent one million people? Can one State Assemblyman properly represent one-half million people? Baird added, Californian's have no representation in the state house. The lobbyists and the unions own California and we intend to put the people back in charge of the government through smaller districts where it is cheap and easy to get rid of an incumbent who fails to serve the people. California has the worst representation ratio in the United States and we will prove that to be unconstitutional." Citizens for Fair Representation is supported by the people of 22 Northern California Counties.

He has been instrumental in coordinating carcass quality programs for Fair animals and working with exhibitors and leaders to understand the data and to use it to improve their

Additionally, from 2006 – 2011, Roger gave a series of agriculture-related presentations at the Fair as part of the series of workshops coordinated by the Nevada County Resource Conservation District.

Roger became the UCCE Livestock and Natural Resources Advisor in 1993, and the County Director in 2007. During this time, he helped with the development of Nevada County Grown, worked with local meat producers on marketing and processing issues, and worked extensively on agricultural policies and regulations. He has also been involved with the Nevada County Farm Bureau, Nevada County Agricultural Commission, Nevada County Grown, Tahoe Cattlemen's Association, and Gold Country Sheep Producers Association. Roger retired earlier this year.

"For decades, Roger has been an advocate of local youth in agriculture, particularly the youth at the Nevada County Fair," said Rea Callender, CEO



Constitution Day Parade Nevada City



The 51st Annual Constitution Day Parade tops a weekend of festivities Sept. 9 & 10, 2017 in this historic California Gold Rush town. Nevada City's Constitution Day Parade has been a local tradition since 1967 and is reported to be the oldest and largest Constitution observance in west-

ern America.

The 2 p.m. Sunday parade features more than 100 entries and culminates other activities including Revolutionary War Living History in Pioneer Park, the Gold Country Duck Race on Deer Creek.

The parade through the downtown historic

district includes marching bands, floats, antique autos, equestrians, politicians and the perennial crowd favorites the Famous Marching Presidents of Nevada City, a humorous but reverent group that portrays each U.S. president.

Yuba County Military Spirit in the Civil War

From the earliest days Yuba County has possessed the military spirit. During the Civil War, several well-drilled companies were maintained. These not only were of value at home as a safeguard against disorder, but also furnished from their ranks a great many disciplined soldiers to fight for the old flag in the field. The City of Marysville and surrounding hills provided several military companies.

Yuba Guards were organized in 1855 with a membership of 65 young men from the elite city of Marysville. During its existence of several years, this company received \$520.00 appropriation from the Board of Supervisors for armory rent and supplies.

Marysville Rifles. This company was organized with about 40 men in 1859 and continued in a flourishing condition until the end of the Civil War. They numbered as high as 80 men, but were constantly reduced by members going to the front. Among their officers was 2nd Lt. Emil Sutter, son of John Sutter.

Downey Guards were organized in Sucker Flat in 1861, with 36 men and officers.

Marysville Union Guards. Another prosperous company organized in 1861 with a strength of about 65 men, but this quota was hard to maintain on account of the great number who enlisted and went to the front. In 1863 it had been re-organized as an artillery company, and mustered out in 1867.

Yuba Mountaineers were organized in 1863 and had its rallying point in Oregon House

Marysville Zouaves. This was a French company organized in 1863, with strength of 50-60 men. They only existed for about one year.

Yuba Light Infantry...
Organized in Camptonville
in 1863 with 80 members.
The company was supplied with the regulation



Springfield breech-loading muskets. The local armory was enlarged from time to time and used as a dance hall and theater. Two balls were given by the Company each year, in May and September. They had a military band of nine pieces organized in 1878 as the Camptonville Brass Band. The 1st troupe to play on the new armory stage was the Wilbur and Mills Minstrel Troupe.

Marysville Light Artillery. When the Union Guards disbanded some of the members formed a new company. This resulted in an artillery company in 1867 with the strength of 116 men. They were equipped with 2 six pound and 2 twelve pound guns (cannons). They mustered out in 1869

Sherman Guards. They organized after the Civil War in 1872, with strength of about 60 men. They disbanded in 1875 only 3 years later.

Grants support fruit and vegetable consumption


