Yuba County Jail Inmates Earn High School Diploma

Five Yuba County Jail women recently earned high school diplomas while incarcerated. The graduates were Angela Villa, Amber Williams, Thi Nguyen, Carla Rincon and Marygen Matta.

The ladies benefitted from a partnership between Yuba County Office of Education (YCOE) and the Yuba County Sheriff's Office (YCSO) to not only offer an adult education curriculum but

a high school diploma option starting with the 2016-2017 school year. YCOE has offered adult education in the jail for years along with English proficiency and basic skills classes.

Assistant Superintendent Bobbi Abold and Captain Brandon Barnes put the project together and veteran YCOE instructor Carol Holtz assisted the students.

The expanded program also received help from

the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and its Educational Services Division. The agency helped streamline the process of obtaining transcripts so prior credits could be evaluated to see what each student needed to complete.

The course of study complied with California State Standards and College and Career Readiness Standards. The students were required to earn credits in English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and Health as well as Life Skills.

In order to serve inmates that leave custody but still need a diploma, the program is also offered at the Day Reporting Center (DRC) run by the Sheriff and Probation Departments. The DRC is a service center for people on probation and parole to obtain needed skills to succeed.

The jail offers additional classes as well on the following topics: computer keyboard, parenting, sewing, sexual and mental abuse, anger management, health and tobacco cessation, sexually transmitted infections, life skills, relapse prevention, the supernatural and Celebrate Recovery.

Presentations are made by Child Support and Child Protective Services. Local rehabs and shelters explain how to access their facilities. One Stop Jobs assists inmates and a new employment skills class will soon be offered by a retired businessman.

Other services are also available. Since 2008, Sutter-North Medical, Dr. Joseph Cassady and the jail have provided tattoo removal for both jail and juvenile hall residents. The program seeks to remove barriers to work and eliminate offensive messages leading to violence. More than 4,300 treatments have been performed in the jail, juvenile hall and the Sutter-North Surgery Center.

For years, the Sheriff's Department has funded a fulltime substance abuse counsellor, Randy Inman, to interview and educate inmates to link them with residential rehabs, clean and sober living homes and shelters. Having an in-house advocate has eliminated a major communication barrier to those incarcerated.

The legislature's decision to house more inmates in county jails versus prison presented an opportunity for local agencies, nonprofits and volunteers to help. Eventually, all inmates are going to return to the community. Community members have an influence in how that happens.

"Fruit Jar Pickers" The end of a musical era in Rough and Ready

"Seventeen years is a heck of an inning," said one of the Fruit Jar Pickers' founding members. Red Sagraves. "but all good things come to an end." Sagraves was referring to the 17 years the Fruit Jar Pickers have been entertaining Nevada County with their bluegrass style of sing-along music. "Originally, a few of us got together on the front porch of the Rough and Ready Market," he recalled. "Soon more local musicians joined in, including DoBro player and anchor, Everette Burkard. His skill, patience and generosity helped us become something of a local fixture. We moved to an abandoned car-repair garage across the street where both the band and the audience grew in numbers. It wasn't unusual to have retired Lake Wildwood residents singing songs like "Motorcycle

Mamma" with bike club members." The band sometimes had as many as 28 musicians of varying expertise, and the audience was often over 200; many from all over America and all over the world. Eventually, the garage became the site of what is now the Rough and Ready Fire Station, and the band moved to the nearby Grange Hall. "We will miss each other - as well as our many loyal friends who'd sing along with us each Sunday," Sagraves reflected.

The band experienced its fair share of slice-of-life challenges, changes, romance and passings. In addition to playing each Sunday morning, the Fruit Jar Pickers played again in the afternoons at one of Nevada County's retirement homes or convalescent hospitals. "Over the years, we got to know many of the resi-

dents and patients," Everette Burkard explained. "Their willingness to sing along and connect was inspirational, and something we will always remember fondly. Many said we helped them get through a tough patch in their lives."

The last performance will take place on Sunday, June 18th from 10:00 a.m. to noon in the Rough and Ready Grange Hall. "As always," Sagraves added, "it will be free of charge - and fun."

"We can make a party out of nothing," is a line from one of the songs they sing - and probably sums up the spirit behind their earthy music. The Fruit Jar Pickers are likely to be remembered more for their big hearts than their musical expertise. However, that's probably exactly what they want

Munchheimer On The Move

Marysville City Manager (CM) Walter Munchheimer emailed his notice of 'retirement' the day after the council rejected on a 4-1 vote, his paying a headhunting firm \$22,000. The County of Yuba offered instead to find a Finance Director for \$2,000. Munchheimer already hired the firm with \$25,000 to fill the Community Services position. Now, the city council has 3 slots to fill. Munchheimer will be gone by October 31.

Munchheimer, if remembered, it will be for costing taxpayers. He launched a Bounce Back (BB) economic plan with a Blue Ribbon Committee of citizens that never had any bounce, though spent hundreds of thousands of dollars. Remember the outside consultant that was to present a BB report after months of waiting? When the CM called to set the presentation date, the fellow never got around to doing the work. The bid winner then found a friend to complete the contract. Is there a new shelf to hold that report?

And, there was the Measure W Sales Tax Increase Measure, the one that failed. The city was touting being broke. The CM in the middle of the propaganda campaign bought three thousand dollars of new furniture for his office. When they went to furlough Fridays to save money the citizens realized they really didn't need a fulltime administration after all. Hold that thought.

Munchheimer considered the city council's directives as suggestions and basically did his own thing. The council in turn lacked the 'Spauldings' to hold him accountable. Under his management philosophy the city stopped enforcing basic decency laws allowing the place to become a sanctuary of vagrants.

The CM took no responsibility for those working under him as the Community Services Director decided to stop completing quarterly reports to the Department of Water Resources, twelve of them. The state fined Marysville \$3 million. The new sales tax increase that finally passed brings in at most \$1.5 million annually to "save police and

North Yuba Water District Utilizing Inmate Work Crews

Oregon House, Ca. As the rainy season finally winds down, the North Yuba Water District (NYWD) is employing Yuba County inmate work crews to clear the irrigation ditches in Dobbins and Oregon House. The crews will remove invasive plants, brush and weeds.

Work began late May and will continue for approximately one month, through the end of June. NYWD Manager, Jeff Maupin, said recent rains have propelled the growth of weeds throughout the irrigation ditches.

"Weeds reduce the flow of water in the ditches during the irrigation season and they become a fire hazard after the irrigation season," he said.

The inmate work crews include nonviolent. non-sex offenders who have earned a place in the program. Yuba County Sheriff, Steve Durfor, said the program is a partnership between the Sheriff's Department, Yuba County Fire Department and organizations like NYWD. The work crews provide a cost-effective labor source for budgetstrapped districts like NYWD.

"It's a win-win," said Durfor, "Work programs allow our inmates to make a positive difference in our community, while giving the inmates iob skills and a sense of self-worth and dignity that comes from a productive day's work."

The NYWD provides irrigation water to over 100 parcels in Dobbins and Oregon House, and provides domestic water service to approximately 2500 residents in Brownsville, Forbestown, Rackerby and Challenge.



fire?" The city has holes in its pockets.

The multi-million dollar street and drainage overhaul at 12th and J languished though the city had a grant and borrowed \$700,000 from the county with interest and a \$7,000 administration fee. No explanation for this blunder

Though city and county residents voted twice against marijuana dispensaries the CM and the council forged ahead to 'save' the city by taxing the sale of bud. The process of soliciting and vetting dispensary operators was an ethical and legal fiasco replete with violations of the Brown Act and city ordinances, crony capitalism and pay to play. The council is still ditching ordinances and cancelled a June 8 appeal on the dispensary decision to get the rules to comply with their decisions.

It's a shame the average business doesn't get this type of coddling. The city wouldn't have any vacant buildings left.

Recently the city has been making gifts of public funds in the 'spirit of helping businesses.' However, just certain people are getting hand-outs. In most places that's illegal.

One slice of Lemon Street worth \$28,000 according to Councilmember Whitmore was donated, not sold to the auto company moving to Tenth and H. Then, \$30,000 of rent was forgiven Armstrong Racing since their track was flooded in Riverfront Park this winter.

The Motocross contract specifically says the lessee rented the property knowing the state manages water levels and the city was not liable for flooding. Exhibit B Winter Operation Policy spends more than a page dictating Motocross responsibilities when the water rises. Item 27 of the contract explains the city would not suffer in the case of a loss of business when the facility is inoperable.

Furthermore, most en-

terprises carry insurance for business interruption and loss from disaster. The Motocross is in effect renting the property for a year around fee though only wanting to pay for the favorable months.

The city's law firm of Rich, Fuidge, Lane and Bordsen on retainer for nearly \$10,000 a month signed and probably drafted the contract. However, the firm's attorney gave no input according to council members as they voted to give away the public's revenue. Since the council will

make a decision about 3 administrative positions maybe the legal contract should go out for bid as well. Sometimes service providers become too comfortable and lack the diligence that a new firm may have.

Munchheimer's high performance scored a raise recently that will reward him with greater retirement benefits. And so goes the world of public employees.

Sutter Co Pilot for Voter's Choice Act

at any vote center instead Sutter County has been chosen as one of 14 counties to implement changes to California's system of voting based upon the legislature's Voter's Choice tions for voters. "This landmark law will

provide voters more options for when, where, and how they cast a ballot," Secretary of State Alex Padilla said. "SB 450 will increase civic participation and make our democracy stronger." Pilot counties can begin

using the new approach starting January 2018. The remainder of the counties can adopt the SB 450 retorms in 2020.

Sutter County Clerk Donna Johnston is presenting the old versus the new approach to the Supervisors at their Tuesday June 13, 3pm public meeting. They will ultimately need to approve implementing the reforms and how it will be done. Nevada County Supervisor's already approved their county's use of the new system.

Johnston is soliciting the public's input before going forward. The proposed changes will be presented through the media, mailings, meetings, and on the county website suttercounty.org/elections. She can be reached at my2cents@co.sutter.ca.us or by calling at 530-822-

The current voting system requires each voter to cast a ballot on one day, during limited hours, at one location, using one type device. Absentee voters either mail the ballot or can drop it off at one location prior to Election Day.

SB 450 vastly expands the voting opportunity. deployed, every registered voter would be mailed a ballot 28 days before Election Day. Voters would then be able to vote in-person at a vote center, mail their ballot, or leave it at a vote center or at a ballot drop-off location.

Polling places would be replaced by vote centers. Voters would have the freedom to cast a ballot

of being tied to a single polling location. Vote centers will look and feel like polling places, but provide additional benefits and op-

For example, citizens could register at any time and at any vote center on Election Day. They could also receive a replacement for lost or damaged ballots. People can access language assistance and translated materials. Vote centers would be connected to the clerk's office via technology.

Starting 10 days prior to the Election and through the Friday before Election Day, there would be 2 vote centers open (Live Oak and Yuba City). An additional 3-4 vote centers would open on Election Day and the Saturday, Sunday, and Monday before (locations to be determined).

There will also be 4 ballot drop-off spots in addition to the Election's Office throughout the county starting 28 days before the Election Day. The state mandates that drop-off locations be secure, accessible to voters with disabilities, and located as near as possible to public transportation routes.

Donna Johnston said that in the last election76% of voters received absentee ballots and 23% indicated they would vote at the polls. However, only 55% of all those receiving absentee ballots voted and 20% of the remainder went to the polls. Previous years have seen voting at polling places down to 8% and 15%.

State-wide voter turnout continues to shrink. Bill sponsor Senator Hertzberg said, "You can stream a movie over the internet or deposit a check with your phone at any time, but without this bill, many people still have to rearrange their busy schedules to get to a polling place on a single day and that has

hurt turnout." "For many working Californians it may make more sense to cast a ballot the week before Election Day at a location closer to where they work, or where they drop off their kids, or where they go to college," Padilla explained. "Why limit voting to one location on a single Tuesday?"

The Voter's Choice Act is an effort to modernize a voting method that has remained the same except for voting machine technology. We've come a long way since 1776 when the right to vote began as a legal privilege almost exclusively available to white, property-owning, Protestant men. Now, all 18 year-old citizens and older of any ethnicity or religion are eligible to register and vote.

This proposed change makes it much easier for all to do.

Researchers hone drone use on farms

As they learn more about how unmanned aircraft can be used on farms, researchers also work to make drones more practical for gathering and analyzing agricultural data. A University of California farm advisor says, for example, drones can help farmers tell if trees suffer from water stress, but software needs to be perfected to make data easier to interpret. Several California universities are working on agricultural drone projects.

Flood damage in California orchards still being tallied

The extent of flood damage to Northern California orchards may not be known for months--perhaps years. Farm advisors are still finding signs of waterlogging in orchards affected by levee seepage and a collapsed riverbank. One orchard near Elk Grove, flooded in February, didn't drain until early May; the farmer lost a third of his walnut trees.

Wet winter contributes to larger bean crop

More garbanzos, limas and other beans should be coming from California fields this year. Farmers have increased their bean acreage by 10 percent, compared to a year ago. The state's wet winter receives part of the credit. Beans can be planted later in the spring than other crops, so farmers whose ground was too muddy to plant corn or other crops have substituted beans instead.

Prune crop rallies after lackluster year

Fans of prunes--also known as dried plums--can anticipate plentiful supplies. California farmers grow nearly all the nation's crop, and a government forecast of 105,000 tons for this year's harvest is more than double the 51,000 tons produced last year. Farmers report favorable growing conditions, resulting in more, and bigger, fruit.

MJ Dispensary Appeal Rescheduled W/O Comment

Recently Buck Weckman, founder of Yuba County FACT (Families Against Cannabis Trafficking) filed an official Appeal opposing a decision by the Marysville City Planning Commission granting a Conditional Use Permit for a marijuana dispensary located very near Ellis Lake Park. The Appeal was based on the proximity to the Park and several other violations of Marysville City Ordinances.

After Weckman met all the requirements for the Appeal, City Staff agreed upon a date of June 6th for presentation of the Appeal to the Marysville City Council. On June 1st Weckman received an email from the Marysville City Council Clerk stating that the Appeal needed to be rescheduled to a later date. No explanation was given. No explanation was given again on June 6th when Weckman appeared before the City Council protesting against the de-

The true reason for the Appeal Delay came out the morning of June 8th on the City of Marysville's Website. A special meeting of the Marysville City Planning Commission has been scheduled for Wednesday June 14, 2017. This is very unusual because their meetings are always conducted on the fourth Thursday of the month. The sole item on the agenda is to consider changing the Marysville City Zoning Ordinances eliminating any compliance with State or Federal Laws. The Ordinances City Staff is presenting to the Planning Commission recommending for change are the same ordinances that make up a portion of

the Weckman Appeal. Upon learning of these new details Weckman made the following statement. "After so many experiences of corrupt behavior by those that have succumbed to the ill-gotten financial gains of marijuana drug trafficking, I thought I could no longer be surprised. Well, Marysville has reached new depths. Not only does a bare majority of the Council approve of marijuana, but now they continue to try and manipulate the system and disregard normal standards of proper governance. No wonder Marysville is in such dire straits, what's next will Marysville become a Sanctuary City? "

Two days later the Marysville City Council received an e-mail from the City Manager, Walter Munchheimer, announcing his resignation or retirement. The June 6 meeting had also delivered a rebuke to Munchheimer's desire to spend \$20,000.00 for a headhunter. The Council on a 4 to 1 vote decided to work with the County of Yuba for a price of \$2,000.00. Gallagher Introduces Legislation for Equal Representation

Sacramento, Ca.

Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) has introduced Assembly **Constitutional Amendment** 16, which would reapportion State Senate Districts to ensure each of California's unique regions have a voice in the State Legislature.

"The Representation Equality Act would provide an important check to tyranny of the majority by allowing every region to have an equal say and representation in important policy issues. This would ensure no one region can dominate others, and would help build a consensus that better reflects the interest and concerns of all Californians," said Assemblyman Gallagher.

Both State Senate and State Assembly districts are currently drawn based on population. This results in different regions having vastly different levels of representation in the State Legislature. For example, Los Angeles County is represented by 14 different State Senators. On the other hand, the nine counties of Alpine, El Dorado, Lassen, Modoc, Nevada, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, and Siskiyou share one Senator.

"Rural communities throughout the valley and foothill/Sierra have long been underrepresented. This Constitutional Amendment will help balance the scale for the citizens in these regions so that our needs and concerns are equal to those who live in Los Angeles and San Francisco," said Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), a co-author of the legislation. "Every region deserves an equal say, and this is a start," added Assemblyman Brian Dahle (R- Bieber) who is also authoring the legisla-

ACA 16 would divide the State Senate districts to better represent the diverse regions of California, while preserving the principal of one-person one-vote in the State Assembly. Specifically, the legislation would create eight (8) regions, with five (5) senators elected from each region. The five districts within each region would be determined by the Citizens Redistricting Commission in accordance to existing criteria, including population, geographic continuity, and common interests.

Sacramento Democrats Deny Funding for Critical Levee Repairs

Despite the support of a bipartisan coalition of lawmakers, businesses and local agencies, legislative Democrats in Sacramento rejected funding to repair the state's water infrastructure that was severely damaged as a result of the failure of the Oroville Dam spillway.

Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama) and Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) led an alliance to obtain money in the state budget to repair California's critical levees in Northern California, which are used by the State Water Project to deliver water to the Central Valley and Southern California.

"The failure to prioritize our state's infrastructure is incomprehensible," said Senator Jim Nielsen. "Millions of Californians depend on water that passes through these critical water conveyance systems."

Senator Nielsen added, "Our request would have provided for an investment in the state's water infrastructure, which would protect lives, preserve property and save the state billions of dollars in emergency re-

On February 7, the Oroville Dam spillway failed causing nearly 200,000 people and their pets to be evacuated. In addition, water system levees suffered significant damage that may prevent them from functioning properly in the next high-water event unless emergency repairs are completed this year.



Criminal Justice Reformers Target Punitive Traffic Tickets

California reformers seeking sweeping changes in the state's criminal justice system have a new target: burdensome traffic tickets.

The leading proponent of the proposal is California Supreme Court Chief Justice Tani Cantil-Sakauye. She is working on a plan to decriminalize minor traffic infractions by having them handled in civil court instead of criminal court.

Cantil-Sakauye told the Los Angeles Times that it is unacceptable that people who are too poor to pay tickets or who miss court hearings related to the tickets end up in jail or are unable to get to work, wreaking havoc in their lives.

But the change would also help the state court system by limiting how much time criminal courts spend on traffic cases. Reformers say that nearly three-quarters of criminal cases involve traffic tickets, more than 4 million of which are given out annually.

Poor seen as victimized by policies

The shift of such infractions as running a stop sign, illegal lane changes or speeding modestly (up to 15 mph over the limit) to civil courts would involve lowering the burden of proof from beyond a reasonable doubt to reasonable certainty - also a change that would save resources.

Momentum for the changes has built in recent weeks after the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights of the San Francisco Bay Area released a report showing unpaid traffic tickets took a heavy toll on the lives of poor Californians.

It noted that from 2006 2015. one-sixth of California adults - 4 million people - had their licenses suspended because of unpaid traffic tickets. It documented that nearly four out of five workers commuted in vehicles and argued that the punitive effects of Golden State traffic policies went far beyond reasonable punishments. That's because while the fines for certain driving offenses are relatively low - \$100 for running a red light - state lawmakers for years have added fees to the tickets to help fund state programs. The total ticket cost for running a red light is \$490 in California, vastly higher than other states. The result of this approach is state drivers being assessed nearly \$10 billion a year for their infractions.

The rationale that criminal penalties are disproportionately and unnecessarily harsh has driven the three other legal reform pushes seen in the state since 2014.

That year, California voters approved Proposition 47, championed by Gov. Jerry Brown. It made state sentencing policies less punitive by classifying many crimes considered "non-serious" and "nonviolent" as misdemeanors instead of felonies, unless the defendant had criminal histories of major crimes.

In 2016, California voters approved Proposition 57, once again at Brown's behest. It made it easier for felons to win parole if they have constructive records in prisons and also gave judges the decision-making authority on whether juvenile suspects should be prosecuted as adults, not prosecutors.

They provide ongoing education in environmental compliance, best management practices and safety in all operations.

Long Bar (Part 1)

Browns Valley, Ca. Roiling through the crevices, canyons, and flats in winter, smoothing to a placid calm in summer, the Yuba River makes its unpredictable way to Marysville where it empties into the Feather which meets the Sacramento River and then on to the sea. With a mainstem 40 miles long and headwaters split into North, Middle, and South forks the river is thought to be named by Spanish explorers for the Maidu village on its banks in 1844 which was spelled in early records as Yubu.

170 years ago small towns had sprung up along its banks after the discovery of gold, long before California became a state. These towns could be as wild as the river, bubbling with crime, crops, and entrepreneurs. Fourteen miles east of Marysville just 2 miles above Ousley's Bar (now Hammon Grove and Sycamore Ranch) was Long Bar, one of the richest and longest last-


ing bars on the river. Men were mining here all along the creeks and river with pick and shovel and pan in the mid and late 1840s. Efforts were individualized, men worked alone with no financial backing except what a person could put together for himself.

That all changed in 1848, a watershed year for mining and growth in the new town of Long Bar, the Yuba River, and all of California. James Marshall discovered gold in Coloma in January, Jonas Spect found it on Deer Creek near Rough and Ready in the summer, and in late summer John Rose found gold in the main Yuba River one mile below what is now Englebright Dam. Repercussions spread across the country . Gold mining activity exploded up and down the rivers of the Sierra Nevada. In September according to historians Thompson and West, 4 Indians washed out \$1400 worth of gold

in one day at Rose's Bar

and handed it over to their white employers who had watched them work. Indians at first did not share the white man's reverence for gold; it was said they would trade a cup of gold dust for a cup of sugar. As they became more savvy about its worth, they worked for themselves.

Long Bar began to feel the effects of the strikes on the Yuba and all over California. According to Days of Gold by Malcom Rohrbough "When Peter Burnett and partners arrived at Long Bar in 1848 and bought the rights to a place to work they paid \$300 in gold dust for 1000 square feet including 20 feet of river frontage." Long Bar was one of the first camps to recognize a "claim"; a miner's exclusive right to work a piece of ground. As gold fever spread, men and some women arrived from all over the United States and from the countries of Chili, China, Mexico, even Ireland. By late 1849 it

was estimated 50 bars were being worked along the Yuba from Marysville to Downieville, making fierce competition, squabbles, and work for lawyers.

Three young females were such a novelty it is said that men hungry for a womanly presence came from up and down the river to view them. described the area "It is emphatically the land of flowers, the whole surface of the earth is a gay pasture, every hill, every vale." This family did not stay long, Fall found them living in Marysville where Mr. Berry resumed his law practice. Not all residents found the town appealing. Women who could be potential wives were scarce. A correspondent to the Marysville Appeal newspaper in 1851 noted "Parks Bar has some good and pretty women which we just now do not. We

elor life. But if we have no

pretty women we have the gleeful Yuba dashing over rocks, and hills studded with flowers."

As would-be miners poured in from all over the world, newer techniques and tools increased productivity; cradles, sluice boxes, and Long Toms allowed several men to work together. The Long Tom remained stationary, water flowed through with gold falling to the bottom. Some of the Long Toms were hooked end to end to hold more gravel which allowed men to work all along their length. (next week Outside money from faraway investors)


In Concert – Singer, Songwriter, Satirist Tom Galvin



3.7 million U.S. citizens live there and with countless numbers of attempted but failed conversations and proposals behind it to restructure its debt, the time arrived where the Government there decided enough was enough. 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
