# **Senator Janet Nguyen to Visit Yuba County**

Senator Janet Nguyen (R-Garden Grove) will attend a special reception in support of the Yuba County Republican Party. Senator Nguyen first came to the attention of Northern Californian's in an article in eterritorial.com (2-27-2017) by Lou Binninger. Mr. Binninger said, Republican State Senator Janet Nguyen of Garden Grove found she was the wrong minority (Vietnamese), the wrong

party (Republican) and had the wrong position on the Vietnam War to address the Senate on Thursday 2/23/17. If she were Black, Mexican, homosexual, from a Muslim country, or a democrat and opposed to the war she was good to go. She wasn't, so she was silenced."

Senator Nguyen stood, on the floor of the Senate of the State of California, to inform the Senate of the Vietnamese view of the late Senator Tom Hayden. "Today I recognize in memory the millions of Vietnamese and hundreds of thousands of Vietnamese refugees who died in seeking freedom and democracy. On Tuesday, you had an opportunity to honor Senator Tom Hayden. With all due respect, I would like to offer this historical perspective....." At that point Nguyen was interrupted and her microphone silenced by Sen. Ricardo Lara (D-Bell Gardens), presiding over the Senate, who then gave the floor to Sen. Bill Monning (D-Carmel). Monning repeatedly exhorted Nguyen that she was out of order.

Senator Nguyen was then escorted from the Senate floor by the sergeants-at-arms.

# The Stark Bill - SB 292

Orange County Auditor / Controller (A / C) Eric Woolery considers former Sutter County Auditor / Controller Robert Stark a hero. Woolery presented Stark with the Orange County Taxpayer Watchdog Award at the State Capitol for jeopardizing his freedom and wealth to uphold the law and protect the citizens of his county during 30-years in office.

Woolery and other County A / Cs were at the Capitol to testify before the Senate Government and Finance Committee on the need for Senate Bill (SB) 292. Woolery is the instigator of the bipartisan legislation and refers to it informally as 'The Stark Bill.' SB 292 would provide a procedure for A / Cs to obtain county-funded legal help when the A / C and the Supervisors or department heads are at an impasse over the proper management of the people's money.

Woolery was Chief Financial Officer for the Riverside County District Attorney's Office when he was elected and became Orange County's A / C in January 2015. Woolery says working for the District Attorney heightened his appreciation for ethics, good government and abiding by the law without reserve.

As Woolery moved to the A / C position he encountered conflicts with the Supervisors when he questioned the propriety of some decisions. Supervisors wanted to approve a retroactive pension for

a fellow board member. Taxpayers were also paying for Supervisor mailers that looked suspiciously like campaign mailers. He took issue with the citizens picking up the tab.

In 1995-96, Woolery was an Orange County resident when the County Treasurer Robert Citron utilized speculative and illegal investments that bankrupted the county. It was the largest Chapter 9 municipal bankruptcy in history. 'Barrons' financial journal called Citron's investment strategy using billions of public monies a 'Ponzi' scheme. Four thousand county employees were laid-off to begin paying back creditors. Woolery witnessed a government debacle caused from a lack of oversight and accountability.

Woolery began doing research about A / Cs experiencing difficulties and stalemates with Supervisors. He discovered the More on Page 12

"Each year the Yuba-Sutter Pow Wow is held to honor the academic achievement of American Indian students in Yuba and Sutter counties. Those students who achieve "A" or "B" Honor Roll status are recognized for their academic success. All American Indian K-12 students in Yuba and Sutter County are eligible; this includes traditional public schools as well as: Charter

School students, County School students, Home School students, Alternative School students, Private School students and Public School students. The average number of American Indian students to be honored is 250.

The Master of Ceremonies is Val Shadowhawk who will oversee the POW WOW contests including, hand drum, flute, and dancing. All ages and styles are welcome. The opening on Saturday will begin at 11:00 a.m. with the Open Gourd and close at 9:00 p.m. Sunday festivities will run from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The POW WOW is full of colorful Indian Dress with lots of fun dances and drum and team dance contests. Most of the day's events are centered around the dance circle. There will be Craft and Food Vendors. If you want to take pictures you must get permission from the person whose

picture you want to take.

The Pow Wow began thirtyfive years ago in the room of the Title IV Program of Marysville Joint Unified School District. There were a few youth dancers and the music was played on a tape recorder. A few years later the Pow Wow moved outside and a few more dancers came and we had our first live drum. Over the years the Pow Wow has grown. Eighteen years ago collaboration began with Yuba College to help produce the Pow Wow. This connection completed a longheld dream to connect with an institution of continuing education beyond the 12th grade. Four years ago the Pow Wow moved its venue to Marysville Joint Unified School District's complex. This year the POW Wow is held at the Yuba Sutter Fairgrounds in Yuba City.

# Is the Voting System **Trustworthy?**

A small card in the mail recently from Yuba County Clerk-Recorder Terry Hansen was a reminder of the effort and cost to maintain a voter system that is trustworthy. In this case Hansen was trying to save taxpayers thousands of dollars by cutting waste.

The notice informed voters that if they wanted their sample ballot booklet in Spanish they needed to sign and return the postcard. In prior years, all booklets were bilingual and sent to everyone, an expensive product, most of which was wasted.

Hansen estimated that the county spends around \$40,000 to print them. Possibly half or more could be saved by printing Spanish versions for voters by request.

The thick document contains arguments for propositions and measures along with candidate statements. Provided by law to keep voters informed, unfortunately few people read the up to 40-50 page offering.

In spite of new citizens being required to demonstrate basic proficiency in English, law mandates that ballots and ballot booklets are prepared in a variety of languages depending on the percentage of residents speaking minority languages in the home. Some jurisdictions could have more than a dozen languages on the election docu-

Hansen assured that the actual ballots will still be printed in Eng-

lish and Spanish in Yuba County. Talking with the clerk gave opportunity to discuss voter fraud. The United States has a history rich with tales of voter fraud and election fixes. How much is truth or myth is sometimes tough to tell. Before Hansen's tenure charges were filed against a city council candidate for registering numerous individuals using a pool hall address. Voter registrants must provide a residence address.

During the Obama Presidency arguments raged about voter fraud.

Reports tell us the striped bass fishing is still in full swing on the Feather and Sacramento Rivers. The best bet at this time is above Colusa on the Sacramento River and above the Yuba River on the Feather. Minnows are the name of the game and this also includes the dved ones. Apparently there are products available which dye the live minnows which enable the striped bass to see them more quickly that the standard natural color. What next?

Many trout streams and rivers are coming into shape and will continue to get better for fishing as May leaves and the month of June is upon us. Catchable fish have been planted by the Department of Fish and Wildlife in the following areas: BUTTE CREEK: Slv Creek Reservoir and Desabla Reservoir; EL DORADO COUNTY: Stumpy Meadows Reservoir, Silver Fork of the American River, Icehouse Reservoir and Union Valley Reservoir; NEVADA COUN-TY: Fuller Lake, Donner Lake and Prosser Reservoir; PLUMAS COUNTY: Sly Creek Reservoir; SIERRA COUNTY: Lower Sardine Lake; SISKIYOU COUNTY: Lake Shasta and Kangaroo Lake; YUBA COUNTY: Sly Creek Reservoir.

We recommend,

those who head for the lakes, reservoirs streams of Northern California to be extra cautious in regard to water conditions, snakes and wild animals. The past wet winter has changed some of the usual areas we intend to visit this time of year. Expect creek channels to be somewhat different in certain areas and other locations to be deeper than previous years. If you catch




Linda and Tim taught me," said Tracey.

Vote Act (HAVA) outlines identification requirements and procedures for registering to vote in federal elections. These requirements apply to all Attorney General Eric 50 states, as well as the President District of Columbia, the Obama were adamant that Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, and the United States Virgin Islands. If a state accepts any type of federal funding, it must comply with HAVA. However, states can have additional requirements, as well.

> Hansen explains that you must be a US Citizen to vote. To register, people need to supply a DMV identification and Social

Security number. Noncitizens with a CA Driver's License have a unique number noting them as such. The clerk says there is now a state voter data base called VoteCal which is connected with the HAVA federal system. The systems can track voters moving and registering in new communities.

When someone registers in person or online their name and ID numbers are confirmed by HAVA and VoteCal and the county is notified of any problems. The elections clerk then does follow-up to resolve the issue.

As Yuba County residents move to different counties or states and register to vote Yuba County would be notified. Returned mail to the elections clerk gets personal attention to determine what happened.

It is more difficult to know when a citizen dies in order to update the voter list. If they die in Yuba County, County Clerk personnel may note an obituary or be informed by the health department which records deaths. If a Yuba County resident dies elsewhere in the world that may be more difficult to learn about.

It all seems fairly simple listening to Clerk Hansen talk about managing the small voter population in Yuba County. How diligent other counties are with a half million or millions of voters is unknown.

In any system, there are criminal types wanting to beat the safeguards. The national debate continues on what requirements are reasonable and prudent to preserve confidence in elections.

## **Sutter County Evacuation Route SPECIFIC TO OROVILLE DAM EMERGENCIES**

Sutter County, Ca.

Sutter County over the weekend posted a map on its website depicting evacuation routes specific to an emergency at Oroville Dam.

The map breaks Sutter County into 11 zones, incorporating zones identified on evacuation maps previously created by the City of Yuba City, and has recommended evacuation routes for each zone.

If there is an evacuation necessary as the result of an emergency dealing with Oroville Dam, no highway traffic will be allowed to travel north toward the dam. In addition, it is assumed that the bridges between Yuba City and Marysville will be closed to allow the residents of Marysville to evacuate, as was the case during the February 12 evacuation. All highway traffic instead will be routed on highways west via Highway 20 through the Meridian Ba-

sin toward Colusa County and Interstate 5; southwest via Highway 113 through the Robbins basin with access to Woodland, Davis, and Interstate 505; and south via Highway 99 with access to the greater Sacramento Region and Interstate 80.

Evacuation routes are subject to change at any time, depending on conditions on the ground. The nature of the emergency and the availability of open roadways will determine evacuation routes.

These routes were developed in cooperation with the City of Yuba City, Sutter County, and the California Highway Patrol.

#### **Pest increases** following wet winter

The wet winter in California has helped a pest establish a greater foothold in coastal berry fields. A University of California farm advisor says he's seen an "uptick" in light brown apple moth damage. Rainy weather prevented farmers from entering their fields to treat against the moth, and the pest took advantage. Discoveries of the light brown apple moth make it more difficult for berry farmers to ship their crops to other states and nations.

A brighter outlook for both crop prices and water supply leads California farmers to plant more cotton. In some cases, farmers have planted cotton on land where they had grown tomatoes, because prices for tomatoes have declined. A survey by a cotton growers' association estimates farmers will plant more than 250,000 acres of cotton in California this year, up about 15 percent from a year ago.

#### Seaweed-based gel may improve ant control

Using a biodegradable gel based on seaweed, researchers say they may have found a new way to control ants. Experts at the University of California, Riverside, say the ant bait appears effective at controlling invasive Argentine ants. The researchers have tested the ant bait for home use, and say it may have advantages compared to current ant-control methods. The bait will be tested at commercial citrus farms this summer.

#### **Creating Money**

The term Quantitative Easing refers to a government's ability to create currency with the touch of a keystroke and is commonly called Money Printing. This ability to create something for free while the rest of us have to work for it is deemed necessary in order for the powers at be (The Federal Reserve) to control the economy. That the economy can be controlled by a central body is a subject for another day but the issue of money creation brings into play many market dynamics.

When governments print dollars, it causes the quantity of dollars in the economy to increase. Much like a bumper crop bananas. increasing the quantity of bananas causes the price of bananas to fall. The same goes for dollars. Increase the quantity of dollars and the price of each dollar falls. They are, for the most part, measured against each other. Hence when the U.S. dollar goes down in value, the Swiss Franc would likely go up. This is not exclusive or automatic and there are many factors at play but you get

the picture A product bought using U.S. dollars may rise in price while the same product purchased in Swiss Francs may fall. This inverse relationship of currencies has a unique effect when it comes to exports (what we sell to foreigners) and imports (what we buy from foreigners).

If the U.S. prints more dollars and thus causes inflation here, it is said our currency gets weaker, making our imports more expensive. But conversely, it makes our exports cheaper to foreigners. By printing more dollars, our corporations tend to make more money because they sell more overseas but it also causes you and I to pay more for everything we buy as we use U.S. dollars.

For you conspiracy buffs out there, if the government was for the corporations, by the corporations and of the corporations, a money printing propensity would seem to confirm

this theory. Of course, it is all up ones interpretation isn't it.

By printing more U.S. dollars, our corporations do sell more, but since this inverse relationship works against a foreigner's currency as well, foreign goods then get more expensive causing foreign corporations to sell less to us.

These foreign corporations then go to their governments and demand they print their currency as well, to keep up with our printing. They in turn weaken their currency by printing so their goods get cheaper again, and grand "tit for tat" encompasses monetary policy makers' worldwide.

It all adds up to a grand money printing race, with the U.S. being the leader as it is the largest consumer of goods in the world. In essence, when the U.S. embarks on massive money printing to fund itself, it forces the rest of the world to do the same.

In a grand race to devalue each others currency against the others so everyone corporations sell more stuff, the populace of each nation is doomed to higher prices caused by all those created dollars.

In conclusion, the U.S. is the biggest importer in the world, but is also the biggest exporter of its currency. An argument could be made that the end result is that the U.S. is exporting its inflation through its massive money printing machine.

One of the outcomes of learning about the problems facing bees these days, is the research done by the scientists around the world and published on a regular basis in Bee publications, Bee Symposiums, and local classes which are ongoing.

We know about Colony Collapse Disorder and the factors which surround this devastating condition, of which there are many, from pesticides, mono-agriculture, poor forage and a host of other causes. UC Davis hosts a gathering of

bee researchers each vear which present data gathered thru scientific method to interested beekeepers thru out the country.

The factor I want to

emphasize is the statement that this CCD problem will not go away until the commercial industry stops moving bees from place to place for pollination. It is disturbing to see local land owners hosting commercial bees on their land in exchange for a fee or in exchange for honey. The effect on the local bee population, backyard bee keepers bees and what few bees still exist in the wild is devastating. The influx of commercial bees in late

spring, following orchard pollination, overwhelms the environment by the sheer numbers of bees placed on these local land owners property, which in turn posses risks to the health of our local bees.

The responsibility of local residents to forgo the profit gleaned from hosting these commercial bee in favor of preserving the welfare of local backyard bees as well as the bees in the wild must come before it is too late to help our bees survive.

#### Up In Smoke – The Path of Our Transit Funds

One cannot help but notice the passenger vans of the Colusa County Transportation Commission driving around the County and that these vans are practically empty, practically all the time. For years citizens have joked about these empty vans and their waste of public funds. The unfortunate truth is that this is not a joke; these vans carry little to no passengers and operate on lots of taxes.

The Transportation Commission's vans carry an average of 4 passengers - that is 4 people in a 19 passenger van - at a cost of nearly \$1 million a year. These vans have remained this empty and this costly for years.

That is what was reported in March to the Colusa County Transportation Commission in its Colusa County Short Range Transit Plan and was approved by the Commis-Also approved by the Commission at this meeting were the replacement of these

empty vans with new empty vans at a cost of over \$100,000 each, the practice of the delivery of flowers, and more years of wasting approximately three quarter of a million It is uncomfortable to report misuse by a government body, however, the size of this

waste, its open display, and its continued approval is compelling. These facts are a matter of public record and are hard to ignore. This is what is on the record - The Colusa County Transportation Commission,

through its Colusa County Transit Agency, operates this transit program of five vans five days a week at a cost of nearly \$1,000,000 a year. There are many communities throughout the State that have similar size million

dollar local transportation systems. According to the American Public Transportation Association here are what similar transit operations provide in a year with million dollar budgets:

**Antelope Valley Transit** 381,888 passenger miles

City of Corona 325,127 passenger miles City of Elk Grove 170,982 passenger miles City of La Mirada 154,516 passenger miles Roseville Transit 136,489 passenger miles Placer County DPW 89,021 passenger miles City of Lodi 82,542 passenger miles City of Petaluma 82,345 passenger miles Colusa County Transit Agency 48,906 passenger miles (A passenger mile is measure of one person traveling one mile on public trans-

portation) From APTA.com, American Public Transportation Association 2017.

As can be seen, typical small transit agencies provide significantly higher service; up to hundreds of thousands of passenger miles a year. Colusa County provides a fraction of what other transit agencies provide with the same budget.

On the average, the County's vans drive with 15 empty seats. This is a vacancy rate of 79% which equates to over \$750,000 a year for empty seats - literally sending our tax dollars up in vehicle smoke. If the Commission converted to cars, it would save hundreds of thousands of dollars a year.

Similar size counties like Placer County, Nevada County, Shasta County use profit or non-profit organizations to provide their local transit service. These agencies competitively bid their transit service to provide the most efficient use of their transportation dollars. The County Commission does not bid or contract this service. Another odd fact is that the Commission will pick up and deliver objects other than

people - including flowers and drug prescriptions. The Commission says it attempts to coordinate deliveries with passenger rides. Nonetheless, spending public resources delivering flowers is not public policy and is not the reason we pay taxes. These facts were brought to the Commission's attention at their March meeting -

the annual three guarter million dollar waste, the expensive empty vans, the practice of competitive bidding, the flower deliveries - all of which were dismissed by the Commission and the Plan was approved. This Colusa County Short Range Transit Plan covers a period of the past seven

years. Based on the vacancy rate of their transit, this Plan documents a waste of over \$5 million during this period. The Commission is responsible for road maintenance and is responsible for

transportation matters, including transportation connections to other parts of the State. Given the condition of our roads and given that Colusa County is essentially a transit island, there are obvious ways to gainfully use this \$5 million. What will happen with the next \$5 million of planned waste?

Other questions arise from the Commission's actions: who are these Commissioners that approve these "empty, costly" vans?, and what is the role of the agencies that allocate the tax funds given to the Commission?

The answers are surprising. The County Commission is comprised of 1 member from the city of Williams, 2 members from the city of Colusa, and 3 members from the Colusa County Board of Supervisors, for a total of 6 members, essentially making the Commission a branch of the County and not independent. As for supervising the allocation of funds, these tax dollars are rendered to the Commission by various departments of the State and the federal governments with little to no supervision. With nominal amount review by the State and federal agencies, the waste and practices of this Commission could have been revealed and corrected millions of dollars ago.

These empty vans are a reflection upon all levels of government, the federal, the State, local governments, and, ultimately, on us; and it is not a good reflection. As the record shows, this issue is not going to be addressed by the Colusa County Transportation Commission. This waste of these public funds needs to be brought to the attention of the State and federal agencies responsible for fund allocation.

As a resident, taxpayer, and public office holder I am only committing to paper the joke that has followed these vans for years. Wasting public funds, millions of public funds, is no joke. How long will it be until we hold the local officials accountable?

from Colusa High School in 1965, and two weeks later married Ann. Ann worked at the Colusa County Library while he attended Yuba College and then Chico State.



Malakoff Diggins State His-

toric Park is a state park unit preserving the largest hydraulic mining site in California. Visitors can see huge cliffs carved by mighty streams of water, results of the mining technique of washing away entire mountains of gravel to wash out the gold. The Malakoff mine pit on the San Juan Ridge is the impetus for one of the nation's first environmental protection measures.

In 1850 there was little gold left in streams. Miners began to discover gold in old riverbeds and on mountainsides high above the streams. In 1851 three miners headed northeast of what is now Nevada City for a less crowded area to prospect. One miner went back to town with a pocket full of gold nuggets for supplies and was followed back by many prospectors. These followers, however, did not find any gold and declared the area "Humbug", thus the stream was so named "Humbug Creek". Around 1852, settlers began to arrive in the area and the town of "Humbug" sprang up. These miners could not decide how to move the dirt to a place where there was water.

# The Stark Bill - SB 292

story of Robert Stark and his assistant Ronda Putman being arrested, charged with numerous felonies and misdemeanors, prosecuted and isolated by county officials. News articles quoted county officials portraying Stark to be a buffoon, incompetent and difficult.

For ten years, Stark funded his legal defense costing more than \$300,000 and Putman spent over \$60,000. The people continued to reelect Stark until he retired after three decades. Once Stark announced his retirement, District Attorney Carl Adams dropped all charges saying his goal all along was to cost Stark a fortune and force him from office.

Stark asked the supervisors for help with his legal defense since he was being attacked for doing his job, protecting taxpayers. He was turned away. The Supervisors were a major part of the problem and therefore had a conflict of interest in Stark's request.

The irony is that the major charge against Stark

was misappropriation of funds. Stark never personally benefitted from his accounting watchdog decisions, the taxpayers did. Sutter County Supervisors, County Administrator Larry Combs along with elected and appointed department heads deceptively passed a 35% pension increase retroactive to employee hire dates. This move created massive debt for the county budget - today amounting to \$130-150 million in unfunded pension liabilities.

The District Attorney was misappropriating funds. Stark accused the county leaders of wanting inappropriate transfers of funds violating commonly accepted accounting standards.

When Supervisors removed the internal auditor position from Stark's budget as retribution, department heads were free to do as they wished. Auditing firm Cohn Reznick declined to continue serving the county as departments would not provide proper documents for review.

Woolery's experience in Orange County and learning from the abuse of Stark and other A / Cs led to Woolery seeking legislation to protect the independence and integrity of the taxpayers' watchdog. If the bill becomes law, A / Cs can ask a Superior Court Judge to decide the merits of whether the A / C needs outside legal help in an impasse. If so, then the county pays those costs. Currently, only the Sheriff and Assessor have these options. Forty-four of 58 county auditor / controllers support the bill to preserve the independence of the A / C.

SB 292 passed the Appropriations Committee and will soon go the Senate for a vote. Local Senator Jim Nielsen is on this committee and voted for the bill. If the Senate approves the bill it will go to the Assembly where Yuba-Sutter's James Gallagher serves.

Gallagher's office said they did not know of the bill since it hadn't made it to the assembly. His staff suggested that if the Republican Caucus supported SB 292 then Gallagher would probably concur. However, Gallagher was a Sutter County Supervisor when the Board refused to assume Stark's legal defense bills even though the District Attorney dropped all charges and then resigned while under investigation for arson and misappropriation of funds.
