“Over 150 years ago in a remote part of the mountains of Northern California, a complete society grew up. In Plumas and Sierra counties alone were numerous communities, La Porte, St. Louis, Howland Flat, Pine Grove, Poker Flat, Onion Valley, Thistle Shaft, Poverty Hill, Scales, just to name a few. History tells us the reason for the rise of these communities: the Discovery of Gold! However, there is less known about the communities and especially the buildings themselves.”

So begins Heidi Sheehan-Marsh's new book about the Sugar Pine Shake industry of the Sierra Nevada Mountains. Dedicated to the memory of her father, Forest Sheehan, the last of the historic shake-makers, and written with the help of her brother Ormonde Sheehan, this richly illustrated volume tells the story of the three-foot, handmade shakes that formed the roofs and sidings of the homes and buildings of the early mining communities.

We are thrilled to host Ms. Marsh on our Opening Day. She will be available to autograph her books and answer questions in the Museum along with a working model of a Shake Tree adjacent to the lumber exhibit. In addition exhibits related to mining, ranching, native Americans, and daily life of Gold Rush Era

including a vast collection of 19th-century photos and documents from the local towns are on display. A genealogy area is available for those interested in researching their own ancestry or the families that settled here.

Just outside the Museum proper, visitors can relive the life of the old-timers in Gold Trader Flat, a replica village of an 1800s gold mining town. Stroll along the boardwalk from chapel to saloon with our costumed docents. At the blacksmith shop, smithy Jeb Swart will be demonstrating his remarkable craftsmanship while, in the mining area, kids will have the chance to pan for gold themselves. At the Mercantile, an assortment of old-time toys and novelties and homemade baked goods will make for fun shopping refreshed by ice cold bottles of sarsaparilla.

A highlight of the day is the Chili Cook-off held between 11:00 am and 1:00 pm. Five dollars buys a complete tasting kit for this intensely competitive event where local chefs and amateur cooks vie for Judges' and People's Choice Awards. Want something to go with the chili? Our Pantry has hot dogs, great burgers, and snacks to fill every tummy.

A warning to visitors: You are entering the Old West, and outlaws may be lurking. Gun fights have been known to break out between the miscre-

ants. Fortunately, Sheriff Andy Hill can be relied on to settle any disputes and the jail is always waiting to accommodate law-breakers.

Despite the rough and tumble atmosphere of the gold rush, the Liberty Hotel maintains high standards for the comfort of its guests. Check into the lobby and tiptoe upstairs to imagine yourself spending a night in one of the guest rooms.

You won't want to leave without touring the amazing display of early gas engines in Forbestown Park adjoining the Museum. Preserved and cherished by members of the Foothill Fly wheelers, century-old technology was put to good use by our forebears in settling the west and building the early communities. Come and join us in celebrating the gold rush history of our beautiful Sierra foothills.

Admission to the Museum and Gold Trader Flat is always free. Donations and proceeds go towards the Museum and interpretive village both of which are supported entirely through private memberships and donations and maintained by volunteers for the benefit of the community. Illegal Marijuana Grow Found in Loma Rica

Loma Rica, Ca.
Yuba County Sheriff's Marijuana Enforcement Team executed a search warrant on an illegal marijuana grow just after 7:00am on Wednesday May 17, 2017 in the 12000 block of Krosen's Way in Loma Rica. Discovered during the search were 2,166 marijuana plants, \$5,335.00 in US cur-

rency, scales, and packaging indicative of illegal sales.

Three subjects were located on the property and arrested. The individuals arrested were Jiawen Guo age 47 of Sacramento, Shauhua Ding age 55 of China, and Qian Shi age 56 of Loma Rica. Each was booked into Yuba County Jail for 11358(d) H&S.

A search of the property revealed several large trash piles, and chemicals being leaked into a nearby creek bed. Also discovered was a large pipe running from the residence to the creek for illegal water diversion causing contamination of the natural habitat.

Our trip to Bodega Bay last week was a blast in regard to limits of crabs for all. The wind played havoc with just about everything and everybody during the three days we were camped. The wind was so strong the night before we left it shook the toy hauler all night. Other than the wind the weather was ideal with cool mornings, nights and warm days. However, once the wind came up it was downright cold.

The latest announcement from the Department of Water Resources tells us the water release from Oroville Dam will be much lower. This is due to the level of water in the lake being low enough for no discharge from the spillway. They can still release water from the bottom of the reservoir, but not near as much as we have been experiencing since the high water. Expect the Feather River to stabilize and all should be aware of the hazards once the water is at its normal level. Meanwhile the shad have arrived and the strippers are active. Drifting minnows has been the ticket for striped bass. Shad darts, spinners and spoons are the way to go for the shad early in the morning and late in the evening.

Reports tell us the Sacramento River is putting out limits of Striped Bass. Teasdale Boat Ramp is open as well as others along the river. Live minnows are the best offering at this time. Anchored boats fishing with cut bait and pile worms are also scoring.

We hear from Lake Berryessa. Bass are on the bite and we have a report of some fish topping the ten

pound and above score. Lake Oroville bass are also on the bite after the up and down water levels have finally subdued. Find a school of fish and they will hit just about anything thrown at them.

A primary pump at the Thermalito Facility of the Feather River Fish Hatchery at Oroville failed a couple weeks ago which resulted in the loose of some 200,000 to 300,000 small fall run Chinook Salmon. The quick response of Department of Fish and Wildlife personnel saved thousands if not millions of small salmon which will be released later on this year. These fish are the ones which were rescued in February during the high water at the main hatchery at the damaged Oroville Dam spillway and moved to Thermalito.

Those of us who have boats and fish the waters of California are reminded that we must have a lifetime California Boater Card when on state waterways. This card can be obtained by taking and passing an approved boating safety examination. This new law, which takes effect on January 1, 2018, will affect boaters 20 years of age and younger with the rest of us left to figure out when the date for those over 20 years of age will be required to take the exam and possess a card. Open House

Brownsville, Ca.

Ten years ago, Yvonne Scroggs retired from her lifelong career as a school teacher and decided to open a book store near her home in Brownsville. Over the next decade, Yvonne's initial idea of a little shop where residents and visitors could find something to read has developed into a veritable cultural hub and meeting center serving the foothill community.

In the days of the early settlers, it was overturned barrels around the potbellied stove at the gener-

Local groundwater agencies form

With an important deadline coming in a few weeks, counties, irrigation districts, farmers and other entities are finalizing agreements to form locally controlled groundwater sustainability agencies. The agencies will guide groundwater management in basins classified by the state as medium to high priority, under terms of a 2014 California law. Local agencies have until June 30 to notify the state of their formation.

Meat supplies should increase this year

Just in time for the traditional start of the outdoor grilling season, government forecasters said they expect larger supplies of most meats this year. A U.S. Department of Agriculture report predicted beef and pork supplies would rise nearly 3 percent, with production of chicken and turkey up nearly 2 percent. Veal and lamb prove the exceptions to the trend, with supplies of each expected to be down slightly.

Dairy groups launch new promotion

To promote the full range of dairy foods available to Americans, dairy associations have launched a campaign called "Undeniably Dairy." The multimedia campaign will include both online and broadcast videos, digital marketing and on-farm events. The campaign will discuss nutritional and environmental topics. For instance, it says dairy farmers have reduced the amount of water used for milk production by nearly two-thirds.

More new snacks contain nuts

Trends in snack products bode well for marketing analysis tracked by the Almond Board of California. The analysis shows that nuts account for a rising share of new snack products. More than 30 percent of the snack products that debuted last year contained nuts. The report credits the increase to greater availability of nuts, new research on their health attributes, and better ability to add flavorings to nuts.

Mueller was nominated for the position of FBI Director by President George W. Bush on July 5, 2001.

The vote on the Senate floor on August 2, 2001, passed unanimously, 98–0. He served as Acting Deputy Attorney General of the United States Department of Justice for several months, before officially becoming the FBI Director on September 4, 2001, just one week before the September 11 attacks against the United States.

In May 2011, President Obama asked Director Mueller to continue at the helm of the FBI for two additional years beyond his normal 10-year term, which was expiring on September 4, 2011. The Senate approved this request on July 27, 2011. On September 4, 2013, Mueller was replaced by James Comey.

The probe into Russian interference in the 2016 Presidential Election will address any coordination involving President Trump. There is no evidence that any crime has been committed which makes this investigation more like a “Witch Hunt”. In past Special Investigations crimes were committed and the purpose of an investigation was to determine who was guilty.

So much for a smooth transition of power; Dems acting more like third world country.

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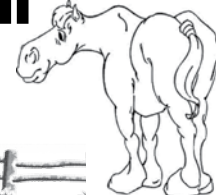
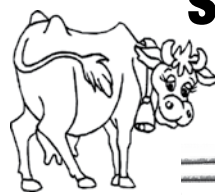


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University of California hid \$175.000 while raising Tuitions

An audit of the University of California, mid April 2017, revealed that the university President and former Obama Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano raised tuitions 2.7% while her office hid \$175 million.

The audit found that the UC spent \$32.5 billion on expenses during the 2015-16 school year to fund 10 campuses, five medical centers, and its Office of the President headquarters. Although the UC states that its “fundamental missions are teaching, research and public service,” the UC only spent “\$6.7 billion (21 percent) on teaching, “\$4.6 billion (14 percent) on research” and “\$630 million (2 percent) on public service.” The other \$20.6 billion (63 percent) was spent on non-fundamental activities.

In addition, State Auditor Howle’s audit found the “Office of the President has amassed substantial reserve funds, used misleading budgeting practices, provided its employees with generous salaries and atypical benefits, and failed

to satisfactorily justify its spending on system wide initiatives.”

Howle ominously added that the “Office of the President intentionally interfered with our audit process. Auditing standards require that we disclose this interference and prohibit us from drawing valid conclusions from this portion of our work.” Napolitano apologized for actions in her office during an audit in which she hid \$175 million from state while demanding more money.

Abuse of taxpayer money: Napolitano’s office spent more than \$4,000 on one employee’s retirement party and thousands more on other going-away, staff-appreciation and holiday parties, perks that are not typically seen in the public sector and that raise questions about lavish spending practices as the university increases tuition and fees on students. Money that lawmakers said should have been disclosed to the public and the Board of Regents, which oversees the 10-campus university system. Napolitano’s of-

fice blocked the auditor from more findings however; The itemized records that were produced show that Napolitano’s office spent generously on employee retirement parties — including more than \$4,200 on a retirement party in 2015 for Laine Farley, who was then the director of the UC’s California Digital Library. The Chronicle identified 20 parties for departing employees that cost more than \$500 between 2014 and 2016. Ten of those were more than \$1,000.

Among the documents the auditor says UC never fully produced were those detailing foreign and out-of-state travel, catering, airfare and entertainment expenses. UC said auditors failed to ask for the right budget codes in making their request. The records that were turned over to auditors show that the president’s office paid for employees to attend meetings and conferences in Bermuda, Iceland, Germany, China, India, Australia, France, Italy, Mexico and many other destinations.

Funding Eliminated for Future Farmers

California Agricultural Teachers’ Association Comments on Governor Brown’s Budget Proposal Eliminating Future Farmers of America and other CTE Funding

In his 2017-18 State Budget released earlier in the year, Governor Brown proposed the complete elimination of funding for the Future Farmers of America program and other programs in Career Technical Education serving students throughout California. Also included in these cuts were the elimination of Partnership Academy Programs, the University of California Curriculum Institute for recognizing CTE courses for admission purposes, and Professional Development Activities for CTE instructors.

These programs have been funded by \$15 million in CTE Pathway monies that were provided to

the California Department of Education for supporting statewide Career Technical Education activities and programs. The Governor’s proposal for this year would eliminate this source of funds, directly them instead to the Community College Chancellor’s Office to supplement other workforce development funds already in existence.

“We are extremely disappointed that Governor Brown has proposed eliminating Career Technical Student Organizations like the Future Farmers of America and other CTE funding in California” said Jim Aschwanden, Executive Director of the California Agricultural Teachers’

Association. “The loss of these components of Career Technical Education will have a devastating effect on programs and teachers statewide. CTE programs remain vitally important to the economic well-being of our state, and this proposal eliminates highly effective programs that have proven their worth over time. We think this is a terrible mistake.”

The California Agricultural Teachers’ Association is a professional education association, representing over 850 instructors in Agricultural Education at the Middle School through University levels in California, with headquarters located in Galt, California.

Craig and Harteis Wed

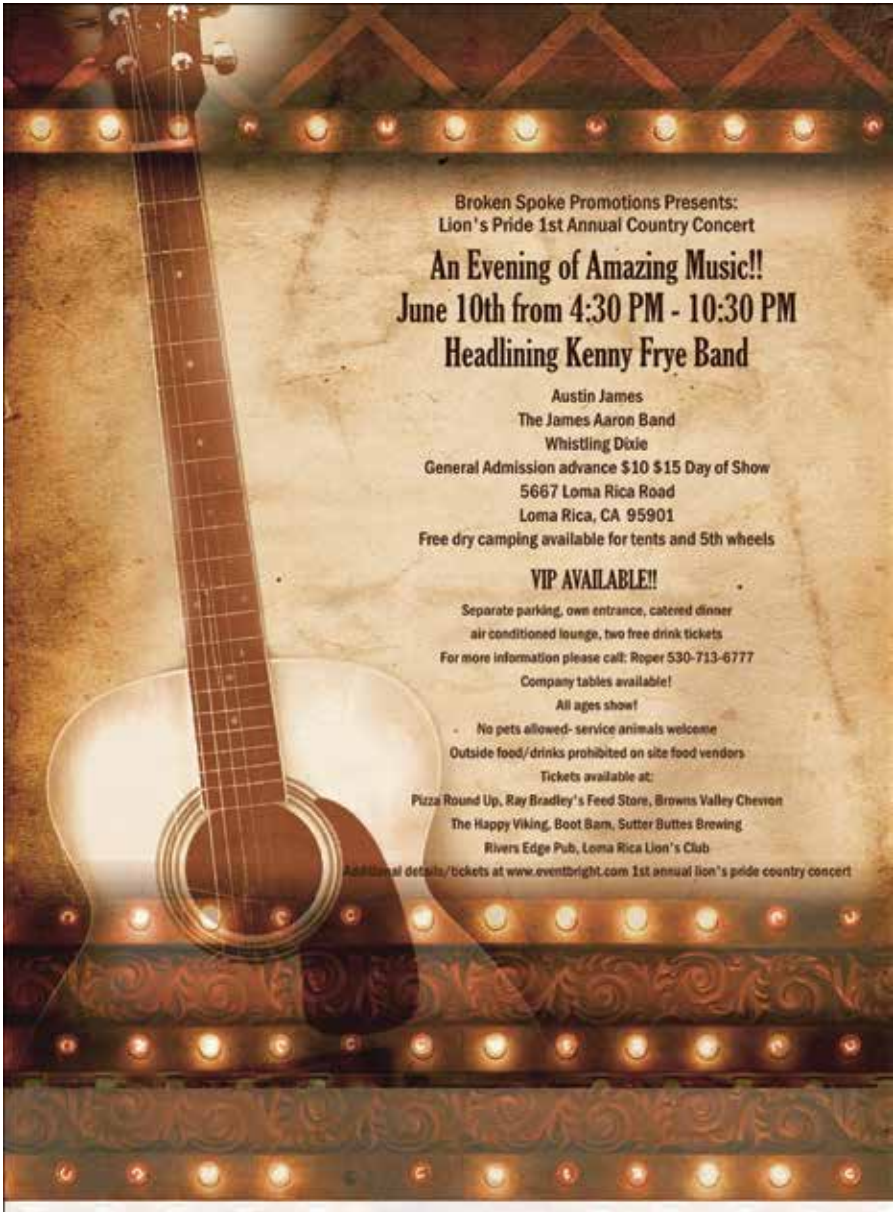
Katherine Craig and Thomas Harteis were married on May 13, 2017. The ceremony was held at the Badlands Bible Camp near Medora North Dakota.

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Trump Tax Reforms on the table

The Trump tax reforms are finally on the table. Well, sort of. Big in rhetoric but lacking in real detail, the rough draft is predictably causing the usual rifts between parties. Although his ideas on reform seem to be changing weekly as public response is measured by the White House, the stated mission is the often used term, Tax reform.

Don't confuse this with simplifying the tax code which implies reducing the approximately 74,000 pages in the IRS code book. This might be one of few concepts most everyone would agree on yet Trumps tax reform is not reducing the actual tax codes but reducing the actual tax paid. The initial proposals in Trumps reform will no doubly be altered if and when it actually gets through the political process, here they are in condensed form:

- Cut corporate tax rates from the current 35% rate to 15%.
- Increase the standard deduction 100% to \$25,000.00
- Repeal the estate tax in its entirety
- Eliminate the 3.8% surcharge on dividends and capital gains which fund Obamacare
- Simplify by reducing the existing personal income tax deductions. The implementation of this reform means eliminating all personal deductions now currently allowed. The exception being mortgage interest paid, charitable deductions and retirement contributions. These three are the most commonly used deductions by the majority of Americans. (It's no wonder Trump did not target these).

Since most of these are revenue negative events for the U.S Governments income sheet, many are questioning how this loss will be paid for. The printing press notwithstanding, real solutions on how to make up the losses are a subject of hot debate. Treasury Secretary suggests lost revenue will be

paid for by an increase in economic activity. This is the proverbial trickle-down effect, where an increase in economic growth will yield more tax revenue over time. Advocates of the Trump proposals may be referring to the Laffer curve, a theory which demonstrates there exists an optimum tax rate for the highest revenue. **The Laffer Curve** was developed by supply-side economist Arthur Laffer to show the relationship between tax rates and the amount of tax revenue collected by government. Increase the tax rate past a certain point and revenue actually decreases. To low of a tax rate also yield a figure less than optimal.

Contradicting that opinion is the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget (CRFB) stance which tags the hit to Federal balance sheets at about \$5.5 Trillion over the next decade or so. Ouch.

No doubt opinions dif-

fer depending on what side of the aisle you reside in and to which economic theories and models you believe. This analyst is of the opinion the Laffer Curve is to be believed. The trick however is knowing exactly where on the curve we are at before and after the proposed cuts.

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Industrial John Deere's – They Weren't Always Green

It is always fun to have someone come by a tractor display of John Deere Vintage Tractors which include an Industrial and make a comment, "If it's not green, it's not a John Deere," "The unknowing join in the laugh and the knowing smile inside. A similar situation occurred at The Dream Machine Show as a father was trying to explain the use of "streamlining" to his son about my 620 Orchard.

Offering you the two articles to gain knowledge about John Deere Industrial Vintage Tractors may save you an embarrassment and improve your knowledge of our agricultural heritage.

John Deere modified tractors for industrial use as early as 1925. Changes included such things as lowering and shortening frames. Making frames stronger, including hand brakes, adding road gears, modifying PTO for winch use, and allowances for swiveling seats were common variations. Most were painted yellow with black lettering.

The world-famous D began seeing alterations in 1925 and there was no

special designation of Industrial at this time. It was about ten years later that this occurred in December 1935. The D firmly established JD as a major tractor company. The D was an evolution of the Waterloo Boy.

The D was built from 1923 to 1953. About 160,000 were manufactured. Drawbar hp was 22.5 with the PTO rated at 30.1. Weight ranged from 4,000 pounds to around 5,100 pounds. Price in 1924 was about \$1,000 and ranged to \$2,400 by 1953.

The DI was built from 1927 to 1940. The Production Log book indicates 38 were manufactured. A 1925 DI would have solid rubber tires and a 28 or 22 tooth sprocket to give it a higher ground speed of an astonishing 3.75 to 5 mph!. Rear extension wheels were available as was a swinging Drawbar. Low pressure dual tires would be options at a later time in the run. The Industrial D was never "Styled" and the last one was released on March 5, 1941.

The John Deere A was manufactured from 1934 to 1952. About 300,000

were built. Drawbar hp was rated at 18.7hp and the PTO produced 24.7. Weight ranged from 3,525 to 4,909 pounds. The price of an A in 1952 was in the range \$2,400.

The AI was approved for production in February 1936. Most of the AIs were built in 1936 with 49 being produced. The total number made was 60 in the run from 1936 to 1941.

The AI was a utility type format with a stronger front axle which allowed for front end attachments. The shorter wheelbase provided for quicker turns and provided a better balance with heavy front end loads. These two modifications improved stability and created greater operator choices. AIs were not "Styled" by Dreyfuss. Colors were Industrial Yellow, gray, blue, orange, green, and lettering was usually black. Production ended in 1941. The popular John Deere B was manufactured from 1935 to 1952. Approximately 300,000 were produced. Drawbar hp was 11.8hp with the PTO rated at 16hp. Weight was from 2,700 to 4,000 pounds. You could buy a B in 1952 for about \$1,900.

166 BIs were built with 64 in 1936 and 43 in 1937. The original B was produced in March 1, 1936. The front axle housing had holes tapped for mounting attachments. The front axle was moved back to improve balance with heavy front loads and create a smaller turning radius. Low pressure tires were standard equipment. The cushioned seat with a backrest could be adjusted fore and aft. Exhaust was deflected downward for better operator comfort. Colors were light red, gray blue, oranges, green and other yellows.

Some of the Industrials had cabs which provided for all weather use.

The AI and the BI had


rubber bumpers to soften attachment contact. Rear wheel independent brakes enhanced turning. Side power takeoff options were used for cranes and hoists. Street Flushers and Sprinkling equipment became available. Van Brunt provided Grading Equipment and LaPlant Chodate made cranes. Parsons produced Snow Plows while Hyster manufactured Hoists. Detroit rounded out available equipment with their sweepers and snow brushes.

These rather primitive beginnings became the stepping stones for the wide variety of machines available today. I will bet that if one of our ancestors got to operate a machine

of today with a multiple directional control valve with a joystick a smile would come to his face. Will we be primitive with GPS guided spraying? What will agriculture, be like in the next 50 years?

This beautiful BI was restored and is owned by Dax Kimmelshue of Durham. It was purchased from an auction in Montana and did not have all the parts. Dax and his family have done a beautiful job in the restoration.

The book (Original John Deere Letter Series Tractors 1923 – 1954) by Brian Rukes and Andy Kraushaar was used in the preparation of the two articles on Industrial John Deeres.



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
