On Monday, the Territorial Dispatch posted an opinion piece by Mr. Lou Binninger that presented an incomplete depiction of my colleague Senate Republican Caucus Chair, Senator Jim Nielsen for his actions during the events that led to my forcible removal from the State Senate Chambers.

Following my removal for offering a different historical perspective on Tom Hayden, Senator Nielsen immediately directed his staff to notify the press and obtain a recording of the event. Since then, he has been a source of personal advice to me and has been in front

of the cameras and behind the scenes drawing attention to this incident, which was not a rules violation but rather an assault on dissenting opinion and free speech.

During this ordeal, Senator Nielsen has been a leader. He helped initiate the formal letter to the Senate Daily Journal to chronicle for the history books what happened and how the majority party treated me, the first Vietnamese-American in the United States elected to the State Senate.

On Monday, February 27, the letter to the Senate Daily Journal calling for a full public hear-

ing on this matter was voted into the official Senate record. This effort, I hope, will result in a change in Senate procedures that will prevent future Senators from being silenced for representing their constituents.

I appreciate the support that I have received from the community at large but I especially appreciate the support I have received from my Senate colleagues, like Senator Nielsen who continues to provide leadership in the fight to ensure that events like this will never happen again.

Formal Apology Yet to Come

According to the Sacramento Bee California Senate President Kevin de León (Democrat) on Monday took full responsibility for a Republican senator's controversial ejection from the floor in the Senate's first session since the incident last week.

"Members, last Thursday

was not one of the finest moments of the Senate," de León said. "Like many of you, I was troubled and unsettled by the actions last week. As the leader of this body, I take full responsibility for what transpired and for making sure it never happens again."

De León said all members

need to understand the rules of the floor and agreed to a full review of the incident by the Rules Committee. At the conclusion of his speech, the pro tem offered Sen. Janet Nguyen, R-Garden Grove, the opportunity to make the comments she attempted to on Thursday.

Northern California Sports Association Will "Flood the Hall" with Local Legends

The Northern California Sports Association "Hall of Fame/Scholarship Dinner" will add some local highly-recognized coaches and athletes to the Hall of Fame on March 25th. This event will be held at the Marysville Elks Lodge. They will also give away \$17,500 in scholarships to students from local high schools pursuing college degrees, and for the first time, award a junior college graduate a \$2,500 scholarship to pursue their education at the University level.

From the immediate local area, Thea Post, Dave Rottman, and Hap Richie (posthumously) will be inducted into this prestigious Hall of Fame

for their past accomplishments in sports and coaching. Thea Post excelled in numerous sports at Sutter High School, later became an all-conference volleyball player for the Aggies at UC Davis, and retired from coaching after over 20 years as Yuba Volleyball coach, is still a professor at the college. Dave Rottman, a graduate of Marysville High School, still holds numerous records both at the high school and Yuba College in baseball. One of the hardest throwers to ever come out of here, Dave was also one of the best hitters locally and went on to coach hitting and pitching at Yuba for the late Gary Engleken (Head coach). The late Hap

Richie, one of the most talented athletes ever out of Marysville High School, completed an outstanding career in professional baseball. After retiring from AAA baseball with the Hawaii Islanders, Hap returned to play for the local Marysville Giants along with Browns Valley teammate Ray Webster.

In addition to the above, other athletes/coaches to be inducted that evening will be Dan Hawkins who played football at UC Davis, then pursued a career in coaching at Boise State (preceded our own Chris Petersen) and University of Colorado. He just recently

Yuba-Sutter Political Notes

Former Yuba County Supervisor John Nicoletti may be in danger of violating the Rules on Leaving Public Service by serving Habitat for Humanity as public relations officer. The Political Reform Act places a number of restrictions on certain activities of officials when leaving government service.

The Fair Political Practices Commission states "While there are subtle differences between the various one-year bans, generally, the bans restrict officials, for one year after leaving governmental service, from being paid to communicate with their former agency in an attempt to influence certain actions or proceedings."

According to a Yuba County source, Habitat for Humanity does business with and receives funds from the county.

"The local one - year ban prohibits specified officials, for one year after leaving local government office or employment, from representing any other person, for compensation, by appearing before or communicating with their former agency in an attempt to influence the agency's decisions in an administrative or legislative action, whether quasi-legislative or quasi-judicial, or any action involving a permit, license, contract, or transaction involving the sale or purchase of property or goods. (Section 87406.3; Regulations 18746.2 and 18746.3.)"

Former officials are forbidden to converse by telephone or in person, correspond by writing or electronic communication, attend a meeting, or deliver or send any communication to the former official's agency on behalf of a new employer.

The Act also prohibits all public officials from making, participating in making, or influencing a governmental decision that directly relates to a prospective employer.

Nicoletti was quoted as "public relations officer" in the Appeal Democrat describing the mission of Habitat for Humanity. A Yuba County source indicates the organization has collaborated on the 14 Forward homeless camp and other projects.

Sutter County Community Services Director Danelle Stylos, 60, was due in court on Monday, March 6 to answer charges that she committed perjury while registering to vote, applying for a concealed weapon permit and completing other government documents.

It is alleged that Stylos misrepresented where she was living. Her employment contract stipulated she live in Sutter County. It appears that some county officials were aware she was out of compliance by residing in Sacramento while giving her address as the residence of the former Sutter County Fire Chief.

Stylos is on administrative leave collecting her \$196,805.72 (yr 2015) salary and benefits. Expect her case to be continued, a common defense strategy to negotiate a better deal with the district attorney.

Marysville City Council after raising the sales tax rate to 8.5% as of October 2016 on purchases in the city voted to increase personnel and department head salaries retroactive to January 1, 2017. There have been no employee salary increases since 2010. However, tax hike supporters did not dream that the new sales tax cash flow would go first to salary increases as the city is in shambles.

Yuba County Supervisors have introduced a couple dicey topics. They want to reduce the number of monthly board meetings from four to two and make them daytime gatherings. Their argument is the Yuba County Water Agency meetings on the same day are longer since there is more business to address after assuming the Colgate hydro-power oversight from PG and E. The two gatherings once fit nicely back to back and Supervisors are on both boards.

"Public servants" tend to organize their work to serve themselves rather than the public. Reducing the number of meetings limits the opportunities for citizens to speak to the board. And, daytime meetings are a barrier to working people attending. Are elected officials and department heads helped or hindered by this proposed change - probably hindered?

If the supervisors are able to do their work with only two meetings a month why are their salaries so high? Their combined supervisor and Water Agency salary and benefits exceed \$80,000 each annually.

Is it time to change the water agency board from 7(5 supervisors and 2 community members) to 5 community members with no supervisors? There is a conflict of interest when the Supervisors need money for a project and then change hats, become the Water Agency and vote to tap the funds from Agency revenues.

Having different members on each board would enable the supervisors to focus on their work at a convenient time for the public. And, separately elected Water Agency Directors could more fully attend to water and power issues while having an independent perspective on the Water Agency spending.

A check of reservoirs, boat ramps and other areas this past week tells us fishing and access is still a factor. With the release at Oroville reduced or shut down the Feather River is fishable. Don't expect a lot of action until the water stabilizes and gets away from being murky. We are told the Yuba City Boat Ramp has been cleared for launching. Lake Almanor, up Chester way, is beginning to clear but is still high and muddy. Clear Lake, the last time we asked, was still closed. Englebright Reservoir off of Highway 20 above Marysville is closed. The high water has messed up local rivers for steelhead. We recommend you check ahead for conditions before planning any outing for boating or fishing at this time.

There is a bunch of snow in the high country which will be melting as spring approaches. We pray for a normal spring runoff this year and not warm weather or rain to soon. There has been

enough high water this year. Besides, a normal runoff will be good for fishing.

We wonder how many anglers, in the madhouse of evacuation, released all lines on their boat which secured it to the trailer and then tied a line to a tree or stationary object. During the 1997 evacuation I did this to my boat and again it was done two weeks ago during that evacuation. Some boats will float attached to the trailer, but some will sink.

I do not know why the

spillway failed at Oroville. We all know the emergency spillway should have been concrete, not dirt. However, we all made it without a disaster, one which would have been much larger than any flood in my memory, which goes back to the flood of 1950, followed by 1955, 1986 and 1997. We send out a big "thank you" to all the people who worked so hard around the clock to keep us safe.

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President to Reconsider WOTUS Rule

On Tuesday, President Trump signed an Executive Order requiring the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to review all aspects of the Waters of the United States Rule (WOTUS), a controversial measure finalized under the previous administration. The Rule will undergo review by EPA and other applicable agencies, including the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and then those agencies will be

required to revise or rescind aspects of the Rule that are economically harmful to impacted industries or cause regulatory uncertainty. WOTUS has been controversial since its introduction, with many stakeholders, including RCRC, Rural County Representatives of California, opposing it as a jurisdictional overreach and inappropriate expansion of federal authority over bodies of water not

previously controlled by the federal government. The rulemaking process itself was also derided as insufficient for receiving meaningful input from state and local governments, and even unlawful as the Government Accountability Office ruled EPA's social media campaign seeking public support for the rule to be "covert propaganda." A number of lawsuits were filed once the rule was finalized, and attempts have also been made to block implementation through the federal budget process. Implementation of the rule is currently enjoined until the Court reaches a final decision on a pending case against the rule.

The Buttermilk Bend Trail, which winds above the wild and scenic South Yuba River, is highly regarded for the many species that bloom on its hills and slopes. Each season observers are delighted with an everchanging tableau of spring color. Early season

walkers will find Western Buttercups, Zigzag Larkspur, and Shooting Stars. By mid-season, the hills turn gold and purple with Tufted Poppies and a variety of lupine. Mid to late season floral treats include Fairy Lanterns, Chinese Houses, and Birds-eye Gilia. Docents will share facts, legends and the many uses of the flowers and plants along the trail.

Docent led hikes last about two hours. The Buttermilk Bend trail is an easy 2 mile hike out and back. Meet at the trailhead in the South Yuba River State Park north parking lot. Follow Pleasant Valley Road north past the Visitor Center over the South Yuba River. Parking is \$5.00. Sturdy walking shoes, hat and water are recommended. A \$3.00

donation is requested and appreciated. (Dogs are not permitted on the guided walks as the trail is narrow and the groups can be large.)

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Anita Oberbauer, Professor and Chair of the Department of Animal Science at the University of California, Davis, spent Wednesday evening sharing her experience and words of advice with students from Nevada Union and Bear River. Anita served as a guest speaker at the Nevada County Fairgrounds Foundation's Speaker Series, which brings business education to local high school students.

Anita Oberbauer, Professor and Chair of the Department of Animal Science at the University of California, Davis, spent Wednesday evening with local students from Bear River and Nevada Union high schools as a guest speaker of the Nevada County Fairgrounds Foundation's Speaker Series. The series, now in its second season, brings business education – through access to business leaders and real-life leadership experiences – to local high school students.

Oberbauer shared stories from her “long and winding road” that led to her career path. Words of advice included to stretch yourself and be daring (but be safe and wear protective armor); always seek balance and goals (don't be

afraid to ask for things, but also be willing to give); and never be afraid to recalculate (a career path isn't always straight, so recalculate as necessary). She also shared a quote from Louis Pasteur – “Chance favors the prepared mind; and opportunity favors the bold” – and encouraged students to be bold in their choices.

Oberbauer joined the UC Davis faculty in 1989, and was appointed as the Chair of the Department of Animal Science in 2009. She has a Bachelor of Science degree in Zoology from the University of California, Davis, and her Ph.D. in Animal Physiology at Cornell University. She also completed post-doctoral fellowships in Perinatal Biology at Loma Linda

University and Biological Chemistry at University of California, Los Angeles. She was honored in 2002 with a prestigious UC Davis Distinguished Teaching Award, as well as the American Society of Animal Science Corbin Award in Companion Animal Biology (2004), the Distinguished Teacher Award for the Western Section of the American Society of Animal Science (2006), and the Outstanding Mentor Award from the UC Davis Consortium for Women & Research (2011).

The second season of the Speaker Series features six speakers, one each month, and will run through April. Upcoming speakers include Caroline Beteta, CEO of Visit California; and Julie Baker, Executive Director of Center for the Arts.

Make Time to Learn

Investing in one's education is time well spent and could be also a great financial move.

A better education can yield higher paychecks, higher self-esteem and greater possibilities in many parts of one's life.

When I finally took my tests, I finished the two hour initial test in 45 minutes and scored a 97. The second test was a 90 minutes test and finished that in 25 minutes. This included the time I used to go over every question at least twice. The other mini-tests went just as well. What I found was literally as close to miracle as one could get. I had discovered a new method of learning. By downloading the info my phone and listening, thereby downloading the material into my brain, I was absorbing literally tons of material consciously and subconsciously and without the grueling hours in front of a computer screen. I

am convinced I found the Holy Grail as to learning. I now believe I can learn anything utilizing the smart phone and a set of earbuds coupled with my blue tooth in my car radio for when I am driving.

My next challenge when I have some free time is learning Chinese. After all the Chinese are said to be going to take over the world right?

My first complete couple of sentences I will plan on learning is "I give up, don't shoot, and did I tell you how nice you look in that army uniform".

Yes, I think learning Chinese by phone will serve me well and quite possibly save my life if not a limb. CVP supplies remain unknown for some farmers

A big snowpack and rapidly filling reservoirs allowed the federal Central Valley Project to announce full water supplies for some farm customers Tuesday, but those south of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta will wait another few weeks to learn their allocation. CVP representatives did say supplies for those customers would improve, perhaps to 50 percent. Farm groups say full supplies should be achievable in a plentiful rainfall year such as this.

Farm groups support action on "waters" rule

An executive order from President Trump to review a disputed Clean Water Act rule has won support from agricultural leaders. The president ordered review of a "waters of the U.S." rule that would have widened federal agencies' jurisdiction over land. The California Farm Bureau said it hopes the action leads to a more cooperative approach to environmental regulation. The American Farm Bureau said the existing rule had created widespread confusion for farmers and ranchers.

Farmers assess flooded orchards, vineyards

With a few days of rain-free weather expected, farmers with flooded land will work to patch and reinforce levees, and hope water can recede with minimal crop damage. But some farmers say they expect to suffer losses, including a San Joaquin County farmer whose young almond orchard has flooded three times in a month. Trees and grapevines that have been flooded can recover if the water drains quickly enough. If not, they could become vulnerable to root disease.

Congressional hearing focuses on exports

Describing exports as vital to preserving, protecting and promoting California agriculture, a farm leader told a House subcommittee Tuesday that federal farm programs play an important part in enhancing exports. California Farm Bureau President Paul Wenger testified before a subcommittee hearing in Washington, D.C. He said cost-sharing programs contained in federal farm legislation have helped California farmers find new foreign customers.

Farm Bureau Welcomes Executive Order on 'Wotus' Rule

Welcoming President Trump's executive order for review of a disputed Clean Water Act rule, the president of the California Farm Bureau Federation said he hopes today's action leads to a more cooperative approach to environmental regulation.

"California farmers and ranchers pride themselves in the care they show for the land, water and other resources entrusted to

them," CFBF President Paul Wenger said. "We want to work cooperatively to maintain and improve our land, not to be subject to confusing and sometimes contradictory rules from government agencies.

"We're encouraged by the Trump administration's action to roll back the 'waters of the United States' rule," Wenger said. "At the same time, we recognize the executive order as the

first step in what could be a long process to undo the confusion brought by the WOTUS rule.

"Ultimately, the goal should be to provide farmers and ranchers—in California and elsewhere—the freedom to farm their land productively and with environmental certainty, while pursuing compliance with the Clean Water Act through incentives rather than coercion."

CVP Announcement Shows Limits of Water System

Today's water supply announcement from the federal Central Valley Project shows the resiliency of nature and the limitations of California's water supply system, according to the president of the California Farm Bureau Federation. After a wintertime recovery in precipitation, CFBF President Paul Wenger said "it's a shame" the CVP can't assure full water supplies to all of its customers.

"Just look at the numbers," Wenger said. "The Sierra snowpack stands at 186 percent of average. Most key reservoirs hold higher-than-average supplies for the time of year. If the CVP can't assure full supplies to all of its customers this year, what would be needed for that to happen?"

"We understand this is a fish-first system now," he continued, "because federal fisheries agencies have the first and last call on CVP water. We know the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act that Congress passed last year will help. But we obviously need to take further action to modernize our water system, our laws and our policies.

"One wet year won't erase our long-term surface water deficit, and the current fish-first policies have also harmed groundwater supplies—an impact that is both serious and inexcusable.

"Farm Bureau remains committed to achieving a water system that benefits both our environment and our economy. We believe that can be achieved and we believe we can learn from wet years such as this one as well as from dry years. We will continue to work with elected rep-

resentatives and agency officials with that goal in mind."

The California Farm Bureau Federation works to protect family farms and

ranches on behalf of more than 48,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of more than 6.2 million Farm Bureau members.

Agricultural Cannabis Growers Now Eligible for PG&E Ag Rate and Programs

San Francisco, Ca. – While recreational marijuana cannot be sold in California until January 2018, existing medical marijuana growers and future recreational marijuana growers will be eligible as of March 1 for PG&E's agricultural energy rate.

The passage of Proposition 64 in November 2016 allows the state to license and regulate recreational marijuana cultivation and businesses.

"Cannabis is a legal crop in our state, like almonds and tomatoes. Agricultural growers now will be eligible for the same rate and energy efficiency programs as farmers of other crops," said Deborah Affonsa, vice president of Customer Service at PG&E.

PG&E customers are eligible for agricultural energy rates if they have received a permit from their local jurisdiction for the cultivation of cannabis and if 70 percent or more of the annual energy use on the meter is for agricultural end-uses such as growing crops, pumping water for agricultural irrigation or other uses that involve agricultural production for sale which do not change the form of the product. The agricultural energy rate applies both to customers who grow cannabis outdoors and those who grow indoors in commercial greenhouses.

The agricultural energy rate does not apply to residential customers who can legally grow up to six marijuana plants inside a private residence per the state Adult Use of Marijuana Act.

Previously, medical marijuana was not considered an agricultural product by PG&E, and growers were not eligible for the agricultural energy rate. Because medical marijuana can be grown and sold in California currently, licensed growers of medical marijuana are immediately eligible for the agriculture energy rate.

Cannabis growing operations can use an extremely large amount of electricity and are considered to be equivalent to other energy-intensive operations such as data centers.

"We've met with representatives of the emerging legal cannabis industry and listened to their needs. We are here to help our customers make smart, efficient and affordable energy choices. Now that cannabis is in California's future, our next step is to work with these new agricultural customers and make this industry as energy efficient as possible," said Affonsa.

PG&E's agricultural rates are under the jurisdiction of the California Public Utilities Commission and the state of California.

CSU Student Fulfills Longtime Dream of Studying Abroad

Raeann Magill had big dreams to study abroad. A junior soil and crop sciences major with a minor in Spanish, she first started studying Spanish in high school and had always thought about going abroad at some point after college. But as she followed her journey through Spanish at CSU, she had an epiphany: "I could go now, I don't have to wait until I graduate."

Magill's journey started in Argentina, where she studied at the University of Belgrano through a CEA study abroad program.

But the journey into another world only served to whet her appetite for adventure. While in Argentina, Magill began exploring additional opportunities to travel abroad, and found the perfect

opportunity through WorkAway. WorkAway is a cultural exchange program where travelers stay with host families in exchange for service performed in their business.

Magill found the perfect fit for her next adventure: A 3,000-hectare sheep and cattle ranch in Uruguay. She hopped on a ferry that took her across the Rio de la Plata and into Uruguay, and then a five-hour bus ride from the capital city of Montevideo to Mariscal, described by Magill as "the middle of nowhere."

"The town was small, but had all the basic necessities," she notes, adding that it might not be the ideal place to get hurt, on the other hand. "The hospital was two hours away."

She spent much of

her time there working on the ranch, communicating with gauchos to accomplish a variety of tasks around the property. The towns in the area are filled with community spirit and cows, lots of cows. Magill estimated that there are probably three cows for every person in Uruguay.

Uruguay was not short on surprises, from kissing people on the cheek to greet them to dinners that started considerably later than they do in the U.S. Magill said Uruguay did not disappoint on good food. One of the more memorable highlights for her was the weekly asado, a weekly social barbeque featuring all the meat you can ask for. "You have a ton of meat, so much meat, more meat than anything else on the table."

Part of Magill's preparation for the journey included taking the Spanish for Animal Health class at CSU taught by Shannon Zeller. The class is part of a relatively new initiative by the Department of Languages, Literatures and Cultures called "Languages for Specific Purposes." As Zeller explains, the courses are aimed at real-world practicality. "The course will give them the skills necessary to communicate in a professional context," she said.

"I learned the foundations from Shannon," notes Magill. "The class was really engaging."

The "foundations" included everything from giving instructions to describing the animals to asking everyday questions like "Which horse am I going to ride today?"

In addition to an unforgettable journey, Magill also saw her Spanish improve. "Last spring, I was in Spanish 200, now I'm in 400," she said.

What's next for Magill?

"I know I have to be back down there," she states with purpose. "CSU has prepared me, and I am so ready to go back!"


