# Woman of the Year at State Capitol

Chico Police Officer Sophia Maggiora

Assembly Member James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) honored Sophia Maggiora, a Police Officer with the Chico Police Department as the 2016 Woman of the Year for the Third Assembly District. Ms. Maggiora was honored during a special Assembly ceremony at the State Capitol for her dedication to protecting her community in the Third Assembly District.

Born in the East Bay, Sophia Maggiora attended Pleasant Valley High School. While at Pleasant Valley, she became a Police Explorer with the Chico Police Department. She continued as an explorer from age 16 until the age of 20. During this time, she went on many ride-a-longs and received a considerable amount of police training. It was during the time as an explorer that she solidified her desire to become a police officer.

Sophia quickly rose through

the ranks of the Chico Police Department and by October of 2015, she received her first CHP-180 Award for recovering stolen vehicles. In November of 2015, she became an Arrest and Control Tactics instructor and in January 2016, she was appointed as a Crime Scene Investigator. Sophia recently submitted statistics for her second and third CHP-180 Awards. In addition to her work as a police officer, Sophia also volunteers as a law enforcement liaison connecting victims of domestic violence with valuable services offered through Catalyst Domestic Violence Services in Butte County. Her future career goals include becoming a body crimes detective and promoting within the depart-

Gallagher stated, "I am proud to honor Officer Sophia Maggiora as the 2017 Woman of the Year for the Third As-

sembly District. Sophia has quickly established herself as a valuable member of the Chico Police Department and does an outstanding job protecting the residents of my district"

# Yuba Co. BOS Amend Ordinance

**Cut Number of Board Meetings**

The February 28th agenda of the Yuba County Board of Supervisors (BOS) presented an ordinance to cut the public meetings from four times a month to two times a month. This was the first reading of the ordinance with the second reading coming on March 7, 2017.

Pursuant to a consensus of the Board, the County Counsel was directed at the February 7th meeting to draft an ordinance amending the regular meetings of the BOS to twice a month, on the second and fourth Tuesday at 9:00 a.m.

Chairman Randy Fletcher indicated that since the Yuba County Water Agency (YCWA) was operating on its own and no longer dependent on P G &

E, the work load had increased creating an issue with overlap meetings. (The five members of the BOS also serve on the YCWA.) Fletcher said, "This will create a more efficient use of time.

County Clerk Recorder and Registrar of Voters, Terry Hansen, told the BOS that she was concerned that she had not been contacted for input and this decision would have impacts on her department. County Administrator Bendorf assured her that they would make corrections as issues arise.

The March 7th meeting was attended by approximately 20 people including county staff. Chairman Randy Fletcher was absent.

Three people spoke against

the meeting change, stating their concerns of lack of accessibility for the public and especially concerns of no night time meetings being scheduled. The question of the increased work load from the Yuba County Water Agency (YCWA) was also raised. Supervisor Leahy said there was no increase in the work load (despite what was said at the February 28th meeting), this change is about more efficiency and less impact to the staff.

After more discussion, the board voted to amend the proposed ordinance to one morning meeting, the fourth Tuesday of each month and one evening meeting the second Tuesday of the month. The second reading of the amended ordinance will take place on March 21, 2017

# Yuba-Sutter Political Notes

Kevin de Leon, California Senate President Pro Tempore, backed out of an apology to Senator Janet Nguyen who was removed from the Senate chambers when she began reading a statement critical of the late Senator Tom Hayden. At a rally in support of Nguyen, when challenged by the Vietnamese crowd to apologize, De Leon said "She got her 15 minutes of fame."

De Leon gets the "Indian Giver Award" since he initially acted contrite over actions by puppet Senator Ricardo Lara who was shouting down Nguyen while being coached by a staffer. Obviously Lara, in charge of the Senate that day, had no idea how to carry out the premeditated hit on Nguyen.

Nguyen's speech was on behalf of the millions of Vietnamese killed and tortured by communists and for the refugees who fled their homeland. Hayden was a communist sympathizer who brought encouragement to the enemy of US forces and democracy-seeking Vietnamese.

Nguyen was strong-armed just a few feet from Senator Jim Nielsen (Yuba-Sutter County) while Nielsen did nothing. No model of chivalry and courtesy here. Nguyen says that Nielsen has been more supportive since the incident.

That's like a fellow's wife being insulted and slapped by a drunk as the mousey husband stands by. However, the spouse later sends her flowers and a card. Outside of three Republicans and one Democrat that rose to speak against the Senatorial tyranny, the rest of the Republicans need the testosterone pills.

There was an 'Oroville Dam Spillway Incident and Evacuation Feedback Session,' Tuesday March 14 for local representatives from both counties and the cities therein to hear from constituents. If officials do not somehow answer concerns and questions they probably will add to the citizens' angst.

Experts know that traumatized people need honest, reliable information updated every 20 minutes. Double-speak and mixed messages during emergencies infuriate highly- stressed victims. Government agencies are quite skilled at collecting information, but struggle to deliver it.

Sutter County and Yuba City sending different evacuation alerts caused family rifts and controversy between employees and employers.

Big emergencies bring out character or lack thereof, factions

and egos leading to bad management. Excuses like "we don't have emergencies very often" and "we'll get better at this" are insulting. A sincere apology is more appropriate.

Sutter County spends more than \$300,000 annually and Yuba County over \$600,000 to fund fulltime offices to coordinate, collaborate, plan for emergencies and seek grants. In rough figures, \$20 million dollars were spent since the 1997 flood. There should be no excuses in terms of a plan and decision-making protocols.

Emergencies are chaotic, tension-filled and rarely predictable in spite of the best plans. They include loss of life, property and peace. Government agencies are funded to be their best along with volunteers to meet the unique challenges that the particular crisis creates.

The 1997 flood in Yuba County caused needless loss of life and property due to leaving the evacuation decision to the supervisors rather than Sheriff Gary Tindel who encouraged a preemptive evacuation order. An angry county ignorantly blamed Tindel and voted him out of office. The evacuation protocol was then changed to the sheriff making the decision.

Hopefully, the officials will do something constructive with the Tuesday night event and not consider it a 'bitching' session. Some transparency and a public statement would be helpful.

The recent 3-2 vote to hire California Forensic Medical Group (CFMG) to replace Sutter County employees for jail medical services appeared divisive, but instead involved some chicanery. All supervisors expected one another to vote to hire the outside medical provider and support Sheriff Paul Parker's wise recommendation.

CFMG offers a more highly accredited medical service at a lower cost with reduced liability. The jail has had several inmates die with the county settling lawsuits with survivors for around \$800,000 per incident. It is a win for taxpayers, inmates and the sheriff's department.

Board Chairman Jim Whiteaker confirmed his expectation of a unanimous vote for CFMG in private prior to the 2/28/17 board meeting.

However, at the meeting as fellow supervisors expressed their wishes to go with CFMG Whiteaker then proclaimed his preference to continue with county employees.

Ron Sullenger made the motion to go with CFMG, seconded by Mat Conant. Sullenger, Conant and Dan Flores voted to go with CFMG.

Whiteaker and Larry Munger knew the other three supervisors would vote for the outside corporation and actually wanted that outcome themselves. So, Munger and Whiteaker saved face with employees by voting against CFMG knowing that the contract would be approved with or without them. True politicians, they were deceptively 'for the employees' and wanted to replace them at the same time.





Groups from 12 to 100 can book luncheons from May through September. "We've hosted lunches for service organizations, historic societies, financial companies and private parties who want a venue that's unique," explained joint Coordinator Troy Hammer. "Groups seem to enjoy the historic setting, the gardens, as well as dining near the 1905 Clubhouse. It's also a perfect way to celebrate a birthday, an anniversary, a retirement party - or a surprise party for an unsuspecting friend or relative. We'll certainly help keep the secret," he said. the Cornish miners during Empire's glory days in the late 1800s and early 1900s, come with fresh salad, a cookie and an icecream dessert. Served by friendly volunteers in turn-of-the century attire, both the venue and the lunch are full of character and charm. Tables are arranged in an attractive way for a touch of style. often with flowers, centerpieces and favors. "Many groups want to include a tour of the mine as well," Bland added, "and that's easily arranged. The tours turn a tasty lunch into a experience, memorable rich in our colorful goldmine history."

In its heydays, Empire Mine ranked as one of the oldest, largest and most prosperous hard-rock gold mines in North America. "Todav we welcome around 100,000 visitors a year from all over America and all over the world," Hammer explained. "Clearly the lure of gold remains enticing – and these luncheons give people the chance to enjoy a pleasant mid-day meal, surrounded by a lasting legacy of gold, grit and glory."

The Park is now taking reservations for up to three luncheons per week. The charge of \$15 per person represents excellent value. If a group tour is included, the charge is \$26 per person. "Many warm to the idea that each luncheon helps maintain and improve Empire Mine State Historic Park," Bland said. "Empire Mine Park Association (EMPA) is the organization non-profit dedicated to supporting Empire Mine's future. They provide help in ways the State does not – and each luncheon celebrates the past, while it ensures the future of our much-loved local treasure." # **Holt Manufacturing**

Holt Manufacturing evolved from Stockton Wheel Company and from several brothers to Benjamin and Charles in the late 1800s. They were noted as a leading manufacturer of combine harvesters, which included a side hill version and steam tractors. They were perhaps the first successful producers of a continuous track vehicle. Their first satellite factory was in Walla Walla Washington which was followed by the purchase of Colean Manufacturing in East Peoria Illinois. In 1910, they filed and began using the trademark name of Holt Caterpillar.

There are books about Holt. available Some are dedicated to their steam units and others are focused on the gas engine tractors. If you have an interest, the Haggin Museum in Stockton and the California Agricultural Museum in Woodland are recommended places to visit. Lorry Dunning of the Woodland area has participated in presentations about Holt and is very knowledgeable. Some books have made errors about the evolution of Holt and the relationship to Best; however, though my background is minimal, I rely of the book Making Tracks by Ed and Sue Claessen for accuracy.

Trying to keep this article to just a few hundred words is only a brief overview.

The brothers moved from New Hampshire and Ohio to Stockton to deal in the lumber and iron business. Their focus was to build a variety of wheels. They possessed a keen interest in agriculture and by the late nineteenth century had a practical horse drawn combine. The harvester featured linkbelt drive, rather than large mechanical gears.

We learned in the Best Show on Tracks in 2008 that it takes a huge effort to hitch up 50 animals and a truck load of tack. Our forefathers also knew of the task. By 1890 Benjamin Holt developed a steam tractor with patented steering clutches.

Stockton Wheel became Holt Manufacturing in 1892.

The steam pullers were heavy. They required serious supply demands. Wheels grew in width so as to not sink in soft soggy soils which caused them to shift to tracks. Back east the Lombard Company was using track units in the

logging business and Holt bought the patent rights. There appears to be some question about the payment and this generated an unfriendly relationship between Holt and Lombard which would later come into play.

Holt built 133 steamers which became involved in plowing, planting, harvesting, logging, mining, and freighting.

Benjamin began working on tracked gasoline powered tractors. The early products used an Aurora engine and a five track roller system. Later units had a Holt Motor and four rollers. Most Holt tractors had two tracks at the rear with a steerable front wheel and a canopy over the motor and operators. They used chain steering and later used geared steering. Holt produced a variety of models. The Midget was the smallest followed by the Two Ton, Five Ton, Ten Ton, and the 75.These tractors provided a plowing of 30 acres a day and the harvest of over a 1,000 bags of grain a day.

A great stimulus to the was the sale of a number of units to work on the Los Angeles Aqueduct.

Some sources suggest Holt had ties in the War Department and Holt agricultural efforts shifted to become a major effort in supplying tractors for WWI. The Five Ton was widely used to tow heavy cannons and transporting supplies. They spent money and explored making special units with mounted artillery. Holt had a significant impact on the

development of the tank. The war ended and that left Holt with a lot of inventory and a large debt. These handicaps and the Depression of 1920-21 severally impacted the company.

As Holt was growing, so was the Best Company in San Leandro producing crawler type units. Benjamin filed suit for patent infringement and other complaints. Much money was spent on legal fees and Dan Best sold most of Best to Holt. C.L. Best, Dan's son, went to work for Holt as a business manager and decided to

leave in 1910 and set up C.L. Best Traction Company with a loan from his Dad and some Woodland farmers. Best purchased the pre-dated patent rights from Lombard and exhibited the Best Tracklayer in 1915 at the California State Fair. C.L. "Leo" Best was a special person who believed in roller bearings, head-hunting, metallurgy and had to produce a better quality unit for logging, ag, and construction while Holt relied on the war effort. The end result was Leo had the money to buy Holt and formed Caterpillar in 1925.

The term Caterpillar used by Holt and cast into the radiator has had some discussion as to the origination of the term. However, most suggest that in 1904 a reporter type person commented that "She crawls like a Caterpillar!"

The Holt 111 pictured is a fabulous story of passion and persistence. Don Hunter, from the LA area, started with a crank shaft of this steam tractor. He did much research of the archives and pictures that became available. He designed and replicated the remaining parts over multiple years and logged about 20,000 hours in the restoration process. The tractor was a real hit at the Best Show on Tracks in 2008.

Holt did not have model names, but referred to the units by serial number.



It Takes All Kinds

Spinners, Earthmovers, Doer's, Dawdlers, Talkers, Slugs, Fakers, Weasels and Crooks. What does it all mean? Fancy words or animal decryptions? Actually these are my own classifications of different types of people as they relate to their own career path. Sounds confusing but read on and see if you recognize any of the work types described below.

The easiest to spot are the Earthmovers and Crooks. Earthmovers start those incredible companies that revolutionize how we live in some way or another. They may or may not be college educated, and many attend lvy League schools only to drop out midway through because they know their ideas don't need degrees to make them work. Bill Gates, Mark Zuckerberg, Steve Jobs and Elon Musk come to mind. Billionaires all of them and they have changed the way we live our lives through their genius. As for community, Earthmovers usually operate alone or in pairs.

Crooks are also easy to understand and identify. They are basically, well, crooks. They lie cheat and steal to make a living and are usually a victim of a personality disorder or two. Crooks operate alone but if you find two of them in cahoots, the con is usually much bigger in scope.

Easy enough but now

let's look at the others. Doer's are good folks. They are the pragmatic ones. They start small businesses that usually succeed. They also make good employees and know the value of a buck. They work hard and treat others fairly. They are usually honest and live fruitful lives that contribute to society and they rarely take handouts unless badly needed and then only do so temporarily. Most of the working class fit in here and likely you do too. Doer's operate solo or in groups of any size.

You can recognize Dawdlers, Talkers and Slugs because they have many similar characteristics.

Dawdlers just don't want to work and think the world is one big jelly bean field where they can lie around and write poetry. None of this "conformist working nonsense" for them. Dawdlers idle away their hours in coffee houses, hiking or hanging out at the river during the day while everyone else is working.

Talkers, like Dawdlers also don't like working much but spew forth verbal diatribes to counter their low self-esteem which got that way by not working. Talkers might make up many of the people you see during a daytime protest rally. They're there because they're not working. Talkers often end up as activists or working a few hours a week at a non-profit to convince themselves their unemployment is necessary so the world can hear their point of view. Like Dawdlers, they are often on the public dole while complaining about the very system that gives them their checks. Dawdlers and Talkers can't make it in the private sector where performance is actually expected so they operate around the fringes of normal society. Both Dawdlers and Talkers are usually found in large groups.

Slugs have similar characteristics as Dawdlers but Slugs just can't catch a break. They rarely hold jobs longer than a few months and constantly blame others or circumstances out of their control for their plight. When you catch up with a slug, which is easy to do, they will always tell you how hard their life is and how bad luck follows them like the plaque which is usually true. Although the world is full of Dawdlers and Talkers, you won't run into many Slugs. Their lot in life is so sorrowful apparently God didn't make many of them and that's a good thing. Slugs live solo except for the rare occasion where a mate is found that takes care of them.

Fakers are like Talkers as both usually have outward personalities. Fakers attempt to appear like Doer's but much of it is illusion and therein lies the difference. Fakers usually have long resumes with many jobs listed and their spotty work resume shows a nomadic quality to it. They move jobs and locations often and may attach self-made titles after their names. A variety of letter designations you likely have never heard of trail their signature page. These people may end up end becoming the proverbial life coach or a consultant of some kind. They also can move in and out of careers where a few months of study can yield an impressive sounding certification like realtor or physical trainer. No offense meant to vou hard working folks in these careers of course. It's just that Fakers are the type that enter your field then leave when the going gets tough and muck up the business for the rest of you. Heaven help the people who follow the advice of such characters. They are where they are because they can't hold a real job for any length of time. Fakers usually operate alone but support each other to further each other's illusion.

Weasels are similar to crooks but don't actually break any laws, at least most of the time. Weasels are a sort of con artist but use legal techniques to borrow or garner money from others and then just don't pay it back. The excuse is the investment or whatever didn't work out and your money is then gone. The living expenses of the weasel was usually taken from such "investment" money. This is how the Weasel survives. Like monetary locusts, they move from sucker to sucker all the while telling a good story. Many Weasels are not real crooks but just delusional to the point of believing their own schemes. Even with a history of failed endeavors the delusional mind of the Weasel never makes the connection. Weasels almost always operate alone.

Last but not least come Spinners. Spinners come from a wide variety of backgrounds and they are a common bunch. They may hold good day jobs as a main source of income or they may spend their life on the eternal treadmill of their spinning.

Spinners are like cars stuck in the mud. The wheels turn but they don't go anywhere. If they do, they usually don't go far. Spinners have grandiose ideas and go whole heartedly into each endeavor. The problem is Spinners aren't pragmatic, usually don't possess the common sense or diligence of the Doer' and don't have the fortitude to make their projects stick for any length of time.

Spinners usually start business after business or website after website. If working real jobs, they often use their salaries to finance their "ideas" which rarely go anywhere, which is why most Spinners will never get rich. Spinners tire easily of the nitty gritty work necessary to make a real go of things and eventually get bored and then move on to next project or idea. One month they're selling vitamins, the next month opening up a restaurant. They usually have many failed websites and businesses to their name because each one eventually peters out in lieu of the next new idea.

If the spinner doesn't hold a day job, he or she is usually broke or worse yet, in heavy debt.

Spinners are vast in number and are one of the reasons new businesses have such a high failure rate. Spinners are also responsible for many a failed marriage or friendship as funds are usually needed to start each endeavor and the money disappears down the rat hole of the Spinner's latest failure. Spinners can operate alone or in groups but the grouping of Spinners usually results in enough blame to go around for everyone as the inevitable happens. In a comedic twist. two fakers operating together can be mistaken for a pair

of Spinners. In conclusion, there are many variations of each classification and sometimes people can possess multiple qualities of each in differing degrees. Also keep in mind these are my own classifications. I am not a psychologist or an expert in human behavior. It's just my attempt at explaining common traits that I have witnessed over the course of 45 years of being in the
