Brown's Dam Disaster

The current life-threatening ecological disaster at Oroville Dam spawned by Governor Brown and his liberal accomplices inflicted damages on Yuba, Sutter and Butte County residents. No one drowned but some with fragile health conditions died while being moved in the sudden evacuation order. Lost business income, wages and money spent to relocate is in the hundreds of millions of dollars.

Citizens need no engineering degree to see the sore condition of roads, bridges and dams. In Oroville Dam's case the negligence and misappropriation of funds certainly is unethical if not criminal. The governor played stupid at his news conference claiming no knowledge of past scathing critiques of the dam's readiness to handle a taxing storm event.

Brown described the current crisis and the government's response as standard operating procedure. Something breaks, you fix it. Brown's tortured logic means replacing your roof after water is pouring through rather than when you notice the shingles fraying. Someone wipe the drool from his chin.

Engineering analyses of the auxiliary 'faux' spillway reveal it not just to be a joke, but a fraud. The fact that mature trees and shrubs were allowed to cover the spillway terrain indicate a belief that the element would never be used.

Friends of the River, the Sierra Club and the South Yuba Citizens League — filed a motion with the federal government on Oct. 17, 2005, as part of Oroville Dam's relicensing process, urging officials to require that the dam's emergency (auxiliary) spillway be armored with concrete, rather than remain an earthen hillside.

Feds at the time said the emergency spillway was designed to handle 350,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) and the concerns were exaggerated. On Sunday February 12, with light flows of only 6,000 to 12,000 cfs — water only a foot or two deep and less than 5 percent of the rate that the feds said was safe — erosion was so severe that officials from the Department of Water Resources ordered the evacuation of more than 185,000 people.

The fear was that the erosion could undermine the 1,730-foot-long concrete curved lip along the top of the earthen spillway allowing billions of gallons of water to pour unchecked down the hillside toward Oroville and Yuba-Sutter Counties.

Butte County Sheriff Kory Honea's blunt dire call describing the dam's trouble prompted a mandatory evacuation order by Yuba and Sutter Counties, but only a "strongly recommended" exhortation from Yuba City.

In Yuba County today, the sheriff makes the evacuation order. That is a change from the 1997 flood when the Board of Supervisors made the decision. In that event Sheriff Gary Tindel's request for a mandatory evacuation early on to give people enough time to move themselves, their assets and livestock from the threatening rivers was rejected.

Days later when the levee gave way 3 people drowned, 322 houses were destroyed, and 407 other homes sustained major damage. The flood inundated 1,000 acres of residential, 15,500 acres of agricultural and 1,700 acres of industrial land. Nearly all livestock drowned and all business inventories lost as 38,000 people relocated. People fled with water at their backs.

Yuba County Sheriff Steve Durfor said there was no ques-

THE *Brownsville Bailiwick & Beyond*



On February 22, 1732, George Washington was born in Westmoreland County, Virginia. He served as Commander-in-chief of the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War and later presided over the 1787 convention that put together the United States Constitution. When victory had been finalized in 1783, he resigned as commander-in-chief, proving his opposition to dictatorship and his commitment to American Republicanism. He was unanimously elected president by the Electoral College in our nation's first two elections. While serving as President, Washington established many precedents that are still in use today; the cabinet system, the inaugural address and the title Mr.

President. His farewell address was a lesson on civic duty, with warnings against partisanship, sectionalism and involvement in foreign wars. Some of his quotes are: 1. If the freedom of speech is taken away then dumb and silent we may be led, like sheep to the slaughter. 2. Associate with men of good quality if you esteem your own reputation; for it is better to be alone than in bad company. 3. Be courteous to all, but intimate with few, and let those few be well tried before you give them your confidence. 4. To be prepared for war is one of the most effectual means of preserving peace. 5. Labor to keep alive in your breast that little spark of celestial fire, called conscience. Washington died on December 14, 1799 and was eulogized as "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen." To this day he is still considered the "Father of the Country".

February 28 is Fat Tuesday, also known as Mardi Gras Day (French for Fat Tuesday), or Shrove Day. The idea is for people to eat as much as they want of anything they want because the next day is Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent which begins a period of fasting for Christians that ends on Easter Sunday. Marysville, Ca. Yuba Sutter Arts has a strong commitment to bringing a variety of live music to Yuba-Sutter. It will continue its broad musical outreach by hosting "Caitlyn's Rock, Punk, Ska Party" at the Burrows Theater on March 3rd. The doors open at 7:00pm and the show starts at 7:30. Tickets are \$8 at the door. Four great Northern California bands will be performing; Student-Led, 80HD Society, Ants in My Eyes Johnson and The Kelps.

Local musician, Catilyn Warwick, is producing the show. "We haven't had a show like this for a while here at the Burrows Theater which seats about 120 people," said Caitlyn. "I'm hoping to have more shows so our locals can perform alongside some popular outside bands," she added.

Caitlyn was born and raised in Northern California and has long been an aspiring musician. Starting on violin, she was drawn to the "dark side," the deep sound of the double bass, and never looked back. Unfortunately, the bass was too large to carry so she shrunk her bass in the dryer, turning it into a cello. 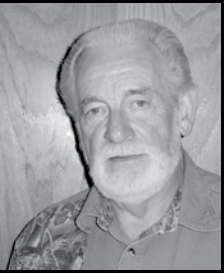

FISHIN' TALK

We start off this week's column with a big "HATS OFF" to the hard work done by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. While Oroville, Marysville, Yuba City, Olivehurst, Live Oak and Gridley were in the process of evacuation of their homes and businesses employees of the DFW were removing eggs and salmon fry from the fish hatchery on the Feather River. These dedicated state employees rescued 8 million little baby salmon and steelhead from the dirty rising water. Over 60 hatchery workers from all over the state were responsible for rescuing millions of spring chinook and another three million fall king salmon so they could be transported by truck to the Thermalito Hatchery. You people, as far I am concerned and those who salmon fish, are part of the heroes during this time of emergency last week and maybe into the coming months.

Well folks, here we go again. It appears there are people in Sacramento who want to protect the Yellow legged Frog. We went through this in the past with the red legged frog with many lakes and reservoirs either poisoned or placed on a list forbidding the

planting of any trout. I believe, and correct me if I am wrong, that ban finally was attributed not to the fish eating the frogs or the tadpoles but a fungus which was doing the killing of so many frogs before they reached the adult size. We suggest all of you out there who fish for trout in the foothills and the Sierras keep an eye on this situation.

Look for the striped bass run to be late this year and it will probably run into June. This must bring back some memories for those who have fished for these fish in the past. We do not expect the run of stripers until mid-march. For the last four years, during the drought, we have seen fish showing up as early as the middle of Febru-

ary. This year will more than likely be like old times with a chance to catch stripers and shad at the same time.

Expect higher water conditions for the opening weekend for trout in the Sierra Nevada Mountains. With all the water including the snow pack, the opening the end of April will probably have high and murky water. There might even be changes in the streams in regard to the filling of pools with sand and maybe a change in some small creeks natural beds, especially in the sharp curves of the water flow.

Farmers welcome lifting of evacuation order

The Oroville Dam evacuation order brought logistical headaches to farmers and ranchers within the affected area—but little damage was reported. The evacuation order,

which was lifted Tuesday, also disrupted operations at food-processing plants. Crops grown in the area include peaches, prunes, walnuts, almonds, olives, kiwifruit and rice. Cattle ranchers say their animals have been safe on high

ground.

Change in Shasta operations could cut supplies

Storage in California’s largest reservoir, Shasta Lake, has swollen to 135 percent of average—but proposed constraints on water releases could reduce the amount available from the reservoir this summer. A federal agency recommends changing temperature-management guidelines for Shasta Lake to help salmon. Water agencies say the potential change could reduce supplies for food production, city use, wildlife refuges and other purposes.

Wine exports post record value

The value of U.S. wine exports set a record last year, according to figures released Tuesday by the San Francisco-based Wine Institute. The group tallied wine exports valued at more than \$1.6 billion, up slightly from the previous year. But the volume of wine exports declined about 10 percent, in part due to trade barriers imposed by other nations. About 90 percent of U.S. wine exports come from California.

World Ag Expo opens 50th show

Tens of thousands of people converge on Tulare this week for an event billed as the largest of its kind. The World Ag Expo began its three-day run on Tuesday. Show organizers say the expo hosts 1,500 exhibitors who display new technology, equipment and services for farmers and ranchers. The event also features a variety of educational seminars, including a listening session" on upcoming federal farm legislation.

Questions About Ditch Problems

The recent communications about the Forbestown Ditch problems and the proposed \$20K public communication's campaign are shaping up to look more like publicity spin to make Manager Maupin look good.

Back slapping and applause (delivered at the January Board meeting) for repairing the ditch are a thinly veiled scheme that appears to be hatched by several board members trying to dispel the long-standing, poor, public image of Manager Maupin.

"One has to wonder about the recent ditch issues, which were originally reported to be quite substantial and remote, and that over a holiday weekend were miraculously completed. Did Manager Maupin knowingly inflate

the original \$100,000 budget requisition in order to make the project appear like it came in under budget?" – The North Yuba Water Alliance

Why didn't Manger Maupin act with the same sense of urgency to fix the ditch crisis last summer when it became the excuse for ending the irrigation season early? 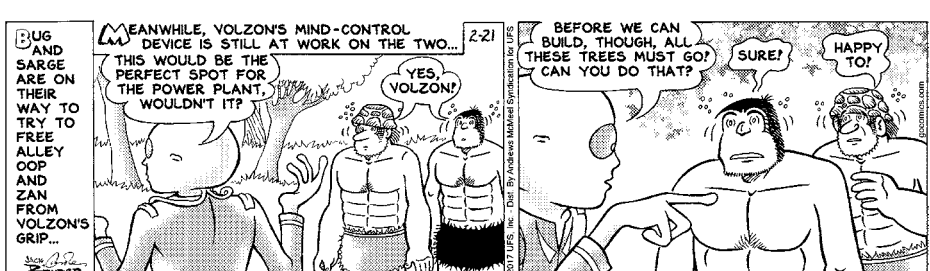

To celebrate Black History Month, the Storytailors present their dramatic version of “Freedom Stories” at the Community Memorial Museum (Ettl Hall)-1333 Butte House Rd. Yuba City- at 7 p.m. Friday February 24, 2017, and at the Arts Council Gallery -624 E Street Marysville- at 2 p.m. Sunday February 26, 2017. Free admission; donations accepted. tion what to do when he received the call from Sheriff Honea on Sunday. Durfor said Honea’s description of a potential breach in the dam would be an unprecedented disaster incomparable even to Yuba County’s sudden levee breaks in 1986 and 1997.

Emergencies are never easy, often described as managed chaos. In this case our counties

were not in charge of the cause but were responsible to protect the citizens. Other complicating factors were that evacuees don’t all respond the same to crisis. Some panic and others give-up. Some are givers and others are takers. There are those who are sick, fragile or immobile and need assistance.

Emergency personnel, churches, nonprofits and

Good Samaritans worked around the clock to cope with a difficult and trying emergency.

There was some dysfunction. The mixed evacuation message between Yuba City and Sutter County created confusion for a highly stressed populace. Facebook ‘scientists’ and ‘news’ mavens caused panic with their ‘inside information.’

Our high tech devices were not always the best information delivery system. Did anyone get the “flash flood” text on that sunny Sunday?

Many older people don’t have smart phones or computers. All the technology and social media have yet to replace ‘low-tech’ live radio broadcasts giving instructions and updates around the clock derived from those managing the emergency.

As thousands of cars waited hours to get to high ground, a designated radio station keeping everyone focused might have brought calm and taken pressure off the phone banks and 911 dispatchers. It certainly could have exposed the frustrating rumors.

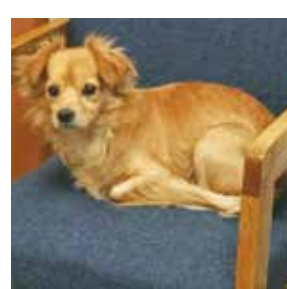
