Ongoing Monitoring of Events at Lake Oroville

Marysville, Ca. – Public safety officials learned Thursday (2/9/17) that water from Lake Oroville was once again being allowed to flow over the damaged spillway and that flow would continue as long as engineers monitoring the flow determine it is safe to do so.

They also learned that DWR was stepping up releases from Lake Oroville to keep it from reaching its maximum capacity. As the lake was nearly full.

"We want to make sure our residents know that we have people here in the community keeping an eye out on the situation," said Scott Bryan, Emergency Services Manager. "So far, the flood control efforts we completed a few years ago are doing an excellent job of keeping our residents safe."

As a contingency plan, on Thursday brush and trees were removed from below the emergency spillway. If the spillway is needed this would minimize the amount of debris that might cause more problems downstream. The spillway has never been used although it came close in 1997.

Friday evening all that changed as the spillway began spilling for the first time ever and Oroville Lake was completely full for the first time.

On Sunday afternoon a hole was discovered in the most northerly part of the emergency spillway, by the rate of erosion it was determine that failure of the spillway was eminent and mandatory evacuations were in place from Oroville to Gridley and the low lands of Yuba County. Hours later after further monitoring it was determined that the rate of erosion had lessened and a plan was begun to place boulders or large rocks into the hole using helicopters. As of Monday morning the plan was to lower the lake, do temporary repairs to the spillway and the emergency spillway before the next rains Wednesday evening.

Marysville, Oroville and the Dam

To the casual observer it is no surprise that Marysville was ranked last among 511 counties and cities in fiscal health by the California Policy Center. Yuba City, Live Oak, Sutter County and Yuba County did fairly well with Yuba City ranking lowest at 367 and scoring an 86 in fiscal strength among this group.

Oroville, a city that once was considered similar to Marysville in demographics and economy, has moved on up. Oroville scored a 99 in fiscal strength and ranked at 152, higher than any jurisdiction around here. Good for them. They have wrestled with high unemployment, poverty, drug abuse and done well.

With Oroville receiving national attention due to the Oroville Dam debacle, the city may experience a financial rush. The initial estimate of \$200 million to fix the dam may end up being just a down payment.

The clean-up, correcting the environmental damage, repairing the power plant, redoing connections to the power grid and building a new spillway system may cost a half a billion dollars or more before it's over. Oroville should receive some nice collateral benefits from the activities to make the dam whole again.

Marysville, contrary to Mayor Samayoa's quote in the Appeal Democrat, is not headed in the right direction. A few months after the new 8.5% sales tax took effect citizens learned that the city will pay penalties of \$288,000 for not filing 4-years of quarterly reports to the State Department of Water Resources. Who is taking responsibility for that?

Does anyone know why the 12th and J Street improvements were not completed as promised? On February 28th a \$700,000 loan plus 1% per annum and a \$7,000 administrative will be repaid to Yuba County. The loan was to enable the city to collect \$1.8 million in grant funding for street and drainage repairs. However, no work was done. More money wasted, nothing accomplished and whose fault is that? City Hall has holes in its pockets.

To add salt to the eye of the public, city management wants a 7% raise. Why, because they are still breathing? This is exactly what the opponents to the sales tax increase warned. There were no restrictions on how the new taxes could be spent.

Just a few months since the sales tax increase and the new

revenue stream is mixed into the general fund to raise salaries and pay for management blunders. Pro sales tax voters were easy prey for the bait and switch bureaucrats.

Governor Edmund G. "Pat" Brown's (1959-1967) legacy includes the California highway system and the statewide water project. Both accomplishments when created were nationally renowned. The innovations enabled California to become an international economic powerhouse, but today they are a laughing stock. Pat Brown's son, Governor Jerry Brown, has dedicated himself to undoing his father's work.

New highway development has been nil, road repair underfunded and though population has doubled in the state no new water resources have been created for over 40 years. Today, Californians are dealing with a decaying infrastructure designed for half the population courtesy of a spoiled heir to the Brown legacy and fortune.

Former Caltrans director Will Kempton says he's never seen the state's road system any worse. Starting work at Caltrans in 1976, Kempton served five years as head of the agency under Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger.

California's roads are considered 48th poorest in the union. Similarly rated are our schools, both of which were known as the nation's best in the 1960's.

With the calamitous failing of the Oroville Dam spillway nary a word has been spoken about Governor Brown being stingy on dam maintenance. Repairs were reportedly made after cracks appeared in 2009 and 2013. Obviously the dam is not performing as designed and in its present condition.

The fact that the power house outlet could not release water without being connected to the power grid is a system that should have been modernized long ago. The power lines draped across the face of the dam and over the failing spillway is strategically lame. The auxiliary spillway is a mess.

The entire fiasco reeks of neglect and a misallocation of the state's resources undermining the safety and well-being of the taxpayers. This is what the citizens have come to expect from Brown and cocky liberal legislators.

A deadly virus that reanimates dead flesh and mutates it into various frightening forms that dredge images of out our darkest nightmares, is loosed on the world. The Umbrella Corporation wanted to corner the market on everything so set about to destroy the world. Now they are the only company in business but their sales are down, I am not sure they understand why.

The story is shaped with little regard for past story lines and molded to put the heroes into various situations where they can make great kicks and punches and slide along the floor while shooting monsters. The actors did a great job putting themselves in the alternate state of a mid-apocalyptic world. The effects I am sure were awesome and took many years of man hours to perfect for the big screen. Several months ago we were praying and hoping for rain. After four years of drought the water picture, which included fishing, was bleak. Fast forward several months and we are now hoping the rains stay away and the snow in the mountains stay in place until spring. Sadly, this is not the case. Our weather source advice us to expect rain on the valley floor and foothills starting on Wednesday or Thursday and continuing through the weekend with snow above 6000 feet.

The current high water will certainly benefit those of us who fish. The high water will bring more fish into the Feather River as well as the Yuba River. Striped Bass fishing on the Feather right in Yuba City should be great and black and spotted bass should be first hand in local reservoirs. Trout in reservoirs will be on the bite once the water clears.


The last four years of drought has taken its toll on lakes, reservoirs and rivers in Northern California. The Department of Fish and Wildlife rearing pens for trout took several hits with disease caused by the lack of water and with the water being too warm. The trout planting program really slowed down because of the drought. Some streams, which were spawning areas for salmon almost dried up.

With all the water now in local reservoirs which is rushing down the Feather, Yuba, Bear and American Rivers we will be seeing many changes. Some of those changes will be the depth of water, the removal of obstructions and the additions of other trees

and debris which was not it that certain spot prior to the high water.

Once the Feather River stabilizes and is fishable I would not be surprised to see anglers hooking onto that prehistoric sturgeon. These monsters are bottom feeders and there is usually a striper Fisherman in the Sacramento River getting surprised with a sturgeon. The high water in the Feather will make this a chance as well. So folks, if you see the end of your pole move slightly, twitch a little and then slowing pull down it might not be a crawdad but one of the big guys. If this is your day set the hook hard and hang on for a wild ride.

Closing thought: "Be calm and crazy....laugh, love and live it up because this is the oldest you have been, the youngest you will ever be again."

A professional photographer will work with small groups of Veterans and enable them to make photographs of each other within a basic studio environment. Professional photographers will oversee the technical aspects of each session. 






Jim Sullivan



Children and Cell Phones

You've probably seen children, even toddlers on Television talking on a cellphone; they're in advertisements smiling and having fun. So how old do you think your child should be to have a cellphone? Do you think cellphones are safe for children? Before you answer these questions let's discuss some preliminary questions that you might not ask or know about like: How cellphones are tested for safety? What are they testing for? And why they use these tests? Federal Communi-

cations Commissions (FCC) allows two different methods for certifying cellphones, Specific Anthropomorphic Manneguin (SAM) and Finite-Difference Time-Domain (FDTD). Testing a cellphone with SAM they use a plastic head, patterned from a 6' 2" 180 pound man, representing about 3% of the U.S. population. A homogenized liquid containing 40 tissue samples of the head is poured into a hole at the top of this head and an electric probe is positioned within the hole. The cellphone to be certified is clamped to SAM approximately one-halfinch away from its head. They're testing electric field intensities for Specific Absorption Rate (SAR), or how much radiation is absorbed into the soup within the head. If the maximum absorption is at or below the exposure limit of 1.6 W/kg, a threshold for heating the body, the phone is certified for sale. There is a ±30% tolerance of the SAM certification process. SAM doesn't test for any specific organ, gland, or tissue just the soup. SAM doesn't differentiate between men, women or children and is the only test ever used

tion. FDTD testing is a

the amount of absorbed microwave radiation in tissues. In 1997 the FCC stated, "Currently, the finite-difference timedomain algorithm is the most widely accepted computational method for SAR modeling". The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) uses FDTD for testing medical microwave treatment devices. FDTD tests using the "Virtual Family" and can test for: any age either male or female, even pregnant with fetus; any body part or organ, eyes wearing glasses with or without metal frames; breasts in a bra with or without metal stays; glands and different tissues. FDTD costs less than SAM, and has never been used to certify cellphones. So why does the TCI choose a more expensive testing, one that is less accurate, can't test the difference between men, women or children, and can't test tissue, organs or glands? There's no way to know for sure so I can only speculate trying to use common sense and some facts.

The TCI's choice of size, inaccuracy, SAM representing only large males, it's reasonable to think they would rather test something that can absorb more radiation so their phones can be more powerful and still pass testing. Having a more powercellphone means better reception, less dead zones, and fewer dropped calls, creating a more desirable product.

If the TCI used FDTD and tested children and women, there could be cellphones that would not be certified or would have to have warning

labels for these population groups that have higher absorption rates than large men. If organs, glands and tissue were tested especially brain tissue and parotid glands warning labels might be required stating how close a phone is to be held to your head. It's reasonable to conclude that they're cellphones being sold today that couldn't pass the FCC "Safety Guidelines" if the FDTD testing was used. TCI uses the FCC "Safety Guidelines", which allows cellphone certification if radiation intensities don't heat your body within sixminutes of use.

May 30, 2011 The World Health Organization classified EMF/RF radiation a Class 2B Possible Carcinogen. May 27, 2016 our Governments National Toxicology Program completed \$25 million rodent study initiated by the FDA that connected cell phone use to cancer. All this coupled with the TCI's resistance to put warning labels on their cellphones denoting safe usage and in light of all the studies showing adverse health effects; it's now time to educate yourselves and take action for your children's safety. What True Democracy Looks Like

Congressman McClintock delivered the following remarks on the House floor



Our nation has come to a crossroads between two competing visions of the future that don't easily reconcile. At such times as these, emotions run high.

The good news is that our institutions are the best ever designed to resolve such political disputes. In other countries, the government is the sovereign and rights flow from it to the people. In America, the people are sovereign.

But in America, the sovereign doesn't govern. It hires help to govern during an election. In-between elections, the sovereign people debate how the hired help is doing. That's the real debate: the one that goes on every day wherever Americans gather. And after that family discussion, we decide whether to fire the hired help or keep it for another cycle.

As long as we are TALKING WITH each other and not SHOUTING AT each other, our system works well. Once in our history,

we stopped talking with each other. That was the election of 1860.

That election was marked not by reconciliation, but by rioting in those regions where the opposition dominated. The opposition party refused to accept the legitimacy of the election itself. Political leaders pledged resistance to the new administration

by any means necessary. They asserted the doctrine of nullification, the notion that any dissenting state or city that opposed federal laws could simply refuse to obey them. Finally came the secession movement the ultimate rejection of our Constitution and the rule of law.

Have we not started down that road once again?

Even before this elec-

tion, we saw violent mobs carrying foreign flags, physically attack Americans for the sole reason that they wanted to attend a political rally for the candidate of their choice. The violence in Berkeley last week warns us that this behavior is rising. Some prominent

elected officials are again asserting nullification by declaring their jurisdictions "sanctuaries" where federal immigration laws will simply be ignored. And in California, a formal secession movement is supported by nearly a third of the population of my own suffering state. I have held more than

a hundred town hall meetings in my district throughout the last eight years spanning the entire life of the Tea Party and Occupy Wall Street movements. Through all those heated debates, the police have never had to intervene. Until this weekend, in Roseville, when the Roseville Police Department determined that the size and temper of the crowd required a police escort to protect me as I left the venue.

The vast majority of the people attempting to attend the meeting were peaceful, decent and law abiding folks sincerely opposed to President Trump, wanting to make their views known to

their elected representative. But there was also a well-organized element that came to disrupt - and disrupt they did.

In the last four elections, our country has turned dramatically away from the left. The Democrats have lost 67 House Seats, 12 Senate Seats, 10 Governors, more than state legislative seats and now the Presidency. That happened in large part because those who opposed their policies talked with their neighbors about the future of our country.

Instead of pursuing that successful example, the radical left seeks not to persuade their fellow citizens by reason, but rather to impose its views by bullying, insulting, intimidating -- and, as in Berkeley, by physically attacking -- their fellow citizens.

This is not a tactic likely to change minds, but if it persists, it could tear down the very institutions of democracy that have served us so well for so long.

I would ask the many sincere citizens who have been caught up with this disruptive element, do you object because the President is breaking his promises? Or do you object because he is keeping them? And if your objection is because the President is keeping the promises he made, is that not because the sovereign people - your neighbors and fellow countrymen - directed these changes over the last four elections?

If your love of our Constitution is greater than your hatred of our President, I implore you to engage in a civil discussion with your fellow citizens. That is what true democracy looks like.

Another Breach in the Forbestown Ditch

No Disruption in Service Anticipated

Brownsville, Ca. A new breach in the Forbestown Ditch was discovered 2/7/17. Ap-

proximately 200 feet of the ditch has washed out, about 230 feet downstream of the previous breach that occurred on January 11. No residents or structures are in the vicinity of the breach.

The ditch feeds the NYWD treatment pond, the source of water for approximately 2500 residents. The treatment pond stores enough water for 10-14 days of potable water production, and this current storm is producing enough runoff below the breach to extend this timeframe. While no disruption in service is anticipated at this time, customers are again being asked to conserve water. A call with this new information went to customers of NYWD 2/8/17.

"Again we are asking our customers to avoid all unnecessary waterrelated activates until the ditch is repaired," said Jeff Maupin, NYWD Maning is wise policy. Keep

ager. "The contractors

have been out there, but it's just not safe to begin any work until this storm passes. It's hard to express how saturated the ground is in that area." Northstar Engineer-

ing of Chico and Duke Sherwood Contracting Inc. of Oroville are again performing the work. The previous January breach was repaired ahead of schedule and below budget. As with the previous breach, the affected area will be piped as the repair method.

"Piping the entire Forbestown Ditch is really what's needed," said Maupin, "until that is accomplished, we will always be dealing with an open ditch, exposed to the environment and subject to complications like

this." The NYWD Board of Directors voted in December to pursue a \$500,000 State grant to begin planning and engineering to pipe the Forbestown Ditch. Moving to a piped Ditch would lower the possibility of breaches like those experienced over the past month. A piped Ditch would also save a significant amount of water lost from seepage and evaporation, increase the amount of water available for irrigation customers and eliminate a vast majority of dirt, trash and contamination from entering the treatment pond.

Additional calls will go to NYWD customers as updates on the breach become available.




