Yuba County Swearing-in

Voters in Yuba County have made their displeasure with their representatives known. The Yuba County Board of Supervisors lost all three seats that were up for re-election. Three out of five, or 60%, of the board was replaced. The Yuba County Water Agency (YCWA) board of directors is made up of five members of the Board of Supervisors plus one North Division and one South Division Director for a total of seven directors. The North Division Director, the only one up for re-election, also lost. The Agency has a seven person board; this means with the new Supervisors and the North Division Director the Agency has a change of four out of seven seats, with the other three directors up for re-election in two years. New Supervisors are, Mike Leahy, Doug Lofton and Gary Bradford. The new North Division Director for the YCWA is Charles Mathews Jr.

After the Swearing-in of the Board of Supervisors on

Monday January 9th, Supervisor Fletcher was voted in as Chairman of the board and Supervisor Vasquez as Vice-Chair. Fletcher asked the public to have patience as they built a "New Team."

The YCWA swearing-in of Charles Mathews was on Tuesday the 10th. The new YCWA Board voted Brent Hastey as Chairman and Randy Fletcher as Vice-Chair. The only comment coming from the new members was from Director

Mathews. He said, "I hope this board will be a board of individual thinkers."

It will be interesting whether the new boards will be Team Yuba or individual thinkers. One of the issues during the recent campaign was, what a good thing it was that the YCWA always had 7-0 votes. Representative government is not designed to run smoothly or be a rubber stamp for staff, thus the term representative government.

Marijuana Companies Want California to Issue Trademarks for Pot

Sutter County to Fix the Homeless

As Yuba County is ensnared in 14 Forward or Bendorf Zoo, Sutter County can't resist stepping into the homeless industry tar pits. Nancy O'Hara, director of Health and Human Services, is talking about first providing "brief" and "temporary" housing and services for those not chronically homeless.

This is a first. Which government program do you remember ever being brief and temporary?

Since neither Yuba nor Sutter County Supervisors have a clue about how to help a homeless person, Sutter County is hiring a consultant. Thurmond Consultancy, who also cashed-in on Yuba County, will receive \$3,400 per month not to exceed \$40,800.

When homeless folks hear about the consultant's pay they will wish they stayed in school. The homeless know quite a lot about their plight but lack the certificate to dip into the honey pot.

However, Thurmond Consultancy, LLC is no silver bullet to get people in buildings, back to their right minds and off the dole. Thurmond's website touts no experience in personally coaching people from homelessness to stability and independence.

Scott Thurmond's pitch is that he knows where our tax dollars are stashed, how to get and spend them, and how to create and manage programs. That is government language for addressing the "issue." No solution guaranteed.

In 1934, when Willie Sutton was captured, the FBI asked, "Why do you rob banks, Willie?" Willie responded, "Because that's where the money is." Scott knows where our tax dollars can be lifted.

That's what it's really all about. The state forcibly takes money from hard working people and gives it to self-serving politicians for bureaucrats to flit away on programs. Thousands are spent to swat a fly.

O'Hara wants to fund \$1,000 a month hotel rooms plus \$30 a month for transportation. She's also willing to provide emergency food, clothes, shoes, and hygiene products. Since most motels lack cooking amenities, maybe take-out will be necessary to be considered compassionate.

A housing resource specialist will be assigned as necessary. If we already have one or two specialists where have they been up to now? For years, Sutter County Welfare couldn't even teach budgeting to recipients of aid. Is it true that welfare recipients' addresses are no longer verified to prevent fraud?

There is no mention whether the homeless person will be responsible for anything except breathing and being present to keep the aid coming. If simply putting a troubled person in a building would change their life public housing would not look like a pigsty with graffiti décor. The government doesn't deal in accountability or a change of the heart. That is considered passé.

Good outcomes where a high percentage of hammered people become productive citizens are as rare as the yellow-legged frog. Those that really make out are politicians, consultants, and government workers.

A spirit of entitlement has swept the nation and undergirds all our government social programs. People have a right to stay high, be lawless, and benefit from the community largess.

Most church ministries sadly have become replicas of a failed government hand-out philosophy. The tragedy is that the Biblical approach to redeem troubled people works but is rarely tried by churches and is soundly rejected by government. When you have the wrong ingredients, the recipe never turns out.

O'Hara's approach lists some performance measures at the six-month mark; how many served; cost per participant; average time to secure permanent housing; were people able to become and/or remain employed; and did health improve.

The problem with government is that poor outcomes often trigger more money rather than killing the program. So far, at the Bendorf Zoo, neither the public nor supervisors know the outcomes or the real financial toll of the War on Homelessness. And, there is no end in sight.

The Rooster Tails Fishing Club monthly breakfast will be held at the Auburn Elks Lodge on January 20. This event is open to club members, spouses, and non-member guests. Doors to the Lodge will open at 7:00 a.m. to share fresh brewed coffee. A fantastic \$13 wide-selection buffet breakfast is served at 8:00 am followed by a 9:00 am guest speaker, Pro Guide Brett 'Bones' Brady, Bare Bones Fishing Guide Service, who will give a special presentation on fishing for white sturgeon. Reservations are not necessary to attend the breakfast, but attendees are encouraged to arrive by 7:00 a.m. for a good seat.

One of 'Bones' Brady specialties is fishing for sturgeon on the Sacramento River from Verona to Colusa when they start moving up the river in January to spawn. These illusive fish are cautious and difficult to catch during daylight hours and the reason 'Bones Brady' prefers to fish for them at night. His clients enjoy top of the line equipment including a fully equipped 21' Design Concepts Jet Boat powered by a fuel-injected 350 hp Chevy engine cranking out 330 horsepower to get his clients to where the fish are in a hurry. Using state-of-arts electronics, 'Bones' locates holding-fish and provides quality gear including Gloomis and Lamiglas rods, Pflueger reels, and variety of lures and baits. He limits his evening boat trips to just two anglers providing all tackle, bait, special tags, and accommodations necessary for a successful trip. The boat limit is two sturgeon, however this could relate to multiple pounds of fish!

Sturgeon can live more than 100 years and weigh over 500 pounds

reaching in length of 15 feet or more! Sturgeons have been referred to as 'primitive fishes' since their characteristics have remained relatively unchanged since their earliest fossil records and are literally living dinosaurs. They are prized for their quality table-fare as well as for their roe (caviar) and their rod-bending fight when hooked. Anglers may take or possess any legally caught white sturgeon between a 'slot target' between 40 and 60 inches long measured from the nose to the tail-fork, all others must be immediately released unharmed.

FISHIN' TALK

The cold spell in the high country has not stopped access to Lake Almanor but we are told the fishing is slow at this time due to the temperature of the water, which is running between 36 and 41 degrees. One thing is for sure.....if you go and catch a trout it will more than likely be a large one. Fish that are being taken are running in the five to six pound range with browns being the larger fish. A slow troll with night crawlers, either with or without hardware, is the best bet. If a slow troll does not succeed with a fish in the boat you might try a variety of trolling speeds to catch the "big one".

Bullard's Bar has become a popular reservoir since the huge spotted bass was caught. Just last week reports came in with bass being taken up to nine pounds. With some reservoirs on the murky side this lake is clear. Fishing is tough, but those who are determined and are in the right spot are having success. However, be prepared to share the water with other boats. Some from as far as out of state.

The Department of Water Resources announced last week they were increasing the outflow at Shasta Dam. This will raise the Sacramento River and bring back the debris which made it difficult to fish for sturgeon. The worse thing is the debris, which has been plentiful since the high water. The second problem is the current. In order to keep your bait on the bot-

tom we are told anglers are using up to 16 ounces of weight. Wow! That is a one heck of a pound of lead, but then the big fish can reach 300 pounds.

We remind readers of the annual Sportsmen's Expos to be held at Cal Expo in Sacramento on January 19th thru the 22nd. This event covers just about everything outdoors including fishing. More info can be had on line at SportsExpos.com.

Now let us talk about gun current laws pertaining to magazine capacity. We realize this is a fishing column, but we also realize a lot of us anglers carry a firearm, especially in the bear and snake country fishing on stream and back area

lakes for trout. The new law in regard to magazine capacity has been put on hold at this time. This is good since one new law which is approved always bring another. I for one, carry a pistol or revolver when fishing in the remote areas of the Sierra Nevada Mountains and have, on occasion either dispatched a nasty rattle snake or scared off a serious mountain lion. I have other tales about protecting oneself in the wilds.....but that is another story.

Closing thought: "We cannot often choose the way living plays out our way of life. But we can choose the way we live it."




The Tractors Are Coming, The Tractors Are Coming.

I often wonder if I am one with a passion for which there is no treatment or cure. Do I flirt with being called weird or whatever is on the local outhouse wall? I find old tractors and the people related to their existence fascinating. I never cease to be amazed by the evolution of the machines and people who are the movers and shakers to get them to market.

The Harris Power Horse is no exception.

However, the literature, people who collect them, and their presence is not in large numbers. Therefore, my understandings are subject to debate.

The beginnings of the Harris Harvester Company probably begins with George Harris and Stockton in the late 1800s. Wild Bill Hickok died in 1876. Billy the Kid in 1881, and Bill Cody received a Medal of Honor in 1872. The Midwest was in subsistence farming and Indi-

ans in the late 1800s. In this time frame, California was shipping 1000 ship loads of wheat out of the Central Valley to San Francisco and the world. California was ranked 2nd in the world of food export. Petaluma was followed by San Leandro and Stockton was the 2nd largest manufacturer of ag equipment and was in leading edge position. Holt, and Best were famous companies and Harris Harvesters were in wide demand

and their Side Hill Harvester were being used throughout the West. California had the capital, made new markets, and led in ag technology. Our state had mile upon mile of wheat fields. While many will debate the fact that the harvester may or may not be invented in the valley, it was certainly perfected and made practical here. The term combine infers cutting, threshing, and cleaning. Early units were pulled by massive teams and the evolution began using gasoline engines to reduce that number. Holt and Best engines were common. Harris began the use of Atlas Marine engines in 1918. Harris bought a plant in Eastern Washington to provide for the high demand for the side hill unit. This popularity even included a two railroad car shipment to Russia in 1931.

The Depression, war demands, over inventory acquisition, and a greater water availability became factors which led to beginning of the end for Harris.

Dave and Clinton Crockett conceived the idea of using a four wheel drive and steerable ballooned tired tractor to use in farming and industry because they would disturb the land less and had the ability to turn in their own length. This configuration could also travel faster to and from jobs and could till more quickly than a track layer.

They bought the rights from Allis Chalmers who had acquired the patents from the Bonham Brothers of Salt Lake who was using the Eimco plant to produce their tractor. The brothers produced the original tractor in 1937. Later units included many parts from an Allis Chalmers Model B.PTO and a belt pulley became available. The steering was modeled from managing a team of horses. Many horse drawn implements were available on farms around the Salt Lake area and farmers being frugal were reluctant to abandon them. Therefore, using a small power unit to pull this equipment seemed to be a good market. About 1,000 were built They weighed about 2,500 pounds and could pull nearly 80 per cent of their weight. Production was from 1937 to 1941. The patents were purchased

by Allis who built several prototypes. They gave up on the idea and sold to Harris in 1949. Literature suggests there may have been another owner of the rights for a short time between the brothers and Allis. Harris was invited to demonstrate the unit to the military early in the Korean War time frame for an interest as a carrier deck plane mover and construction. However, during the demo an axle was broken and interest dwindled. Design improved and the Model 40 and 53 were introduced.

These tractors were a great influence on the popularity of the present day "Skid Steers". The Historic Faire Parade on February 11 will feature two beautiful Power Horse units as well as other tractors. The Coppin Family of Pleasant Grove are fans of the Power Horse and have restored them to a high level of quality. Additional units will be led by an outstanding Rumley Oil Pull. The Rumley will be followed by the trend setting "Tractors for Humanity". This is not going to be just another parade, but a very special display that is not available anywhere else.



California Democrats Behaving Like Confederates

For fiscal conservatives and free market advocates, the national elections in 2008 and 2012 brought no small measure of disappointment. In its eight-year run, the Obama Administration imposed a host of new taxes – including several as part of the failed “Affordable Care Act” – and, just as egregious, nearly doubling the national debt from \$10 trillion to over \$20 trillion.

Those who advocate for lower taxes, property rights and less burden-

some regulation understood and begrudgingly accepted that “elections have consequences.” (As President Obama was known to brag). So it is now with amusement – if not outright schadenfreude – we are watching progressives across the nation, and especially here in California, melt down in shock and disbelief.

Particularly frustrating for Progressives is their growing realization that many of the policies and actions of the last eight years that they jammed down the throats of conservatives and center right citizens from “fly-over” country are now coming back to haunt them. For example, former Democrat Senator Harry Reid from Nevada changed longstanding Senate rules regarding how many votes it would take to stop the filibuster of a presidential appointee. Progressives imposed that rule to pack the United States Court of Appeal for District of Columbia Circuit, a powerful court because it reviews most legal challenges over federal regulations. The “Reid Rule” will now be used by the Trump Administration to fill his cabinet quickly over the objections and efforts to obstruct by Democrats and, more importantly, to seat a replacement on the U.S. Supreme Court for the late Justice Antonin Scalia.

Another example of their being hoisted on their own petard was discussed recently by Cali-

fornia political analyst Tony Quinn who noted that the federal courts struck down most of Arizona’s efforts to enforce border security. The U.S. Supreme Court noted that, in the area of immigration, federal laws pre-empt conflicting and even complimentary state laws. That throws into doubt any efforts by California and other left-leaning states to enforce any so-called “sanctuary” policies.

But all this hasn’t stopped California’s top Democratic leadership from posturing (mostly for the cameras) about how they will “stand up” to the federal government to protect “California’s values,” whatever that means. Apparently, Governor Brown and newly elected Legislative leaders have mistaken Sutter’s Fort in Sacramento with Fort Sumter in South Carolina which heard the first shots fired in the Civil War. They need to be reminded that things didn’t work out so well for the Confederacy back then and if, by taking on the federal government, they think they will get a better outcome, they’re probably wrong.

The latest evidence that Democratic leadership has lost its moorings with reality is the hiring of Eric Holder, the disgraced and corrupt former U.S. Attorney General in order to “push back” against both the Trump Administration and the Republican controlled Congress. California Aims to Kick Coal-Fired Electricity Habit by 2026

Sacramento, Ca. Hoping to cement California's "global role" on climate-change policy and push it toward cleaner energy, a state lawmaker wants to bar electric utilities from buying and selling coal-generated energy by 2026.

Bay Area Democrat Marc Levine's clean-energy proposal would require California electricity providers to stop procuring coal-fired energy incrementally, and end the use of coal entirely by 2026.

The proposal was inspired by a recent California Energy Commission report that called for the state to taper off and eliminate its dependency on coal-generated en-

ergy by 2026. The report found that California's reliance on coal-fired electricity has steadily declined since 1996, and that it uses less than most other states.

Levine says AB 79 will codify the commission's recommendation and task regulators with requiring utilities to buy and sell cleaner energy.

While California and many other states have moved off coal-generated energy, states like Missouri, Arkansas, Ohio and Colorado still get more than half their electricity from coal-generated sources, according to the commission report.

Tapering California's carbon emissions has become a major policy

focus during Brown's fourth and final term. He's approved a variety of stringent climate-change and renewable-energy laws, including a 2016 bill that committed California to the nation's strictest greenhouse gas laws through 2030.

Polls have also shown that Californians don't mind paying more for clean energy. According to a 2016 Public Policy Institute of California survey, 59 percent of respondents said they were willing to pay more for energy to combat global warming.

Levine's bill is waiting to be assigned to its first Assembly policy committee and can't be heard until Feb. 4.

New Bullards Bar Reservoir Temporarily Closed

Due to security barrier issues, the Yuba County Water Agency has closed New Bullards Bar Reservoir to all boaters because of safety concerns and high water releases out of the dam.

As a result of the recent heavy storms, a log security boom that stretches across the reservoir to block and deter boats from getting too close to the spillway at the dam has broken, causing unsafe conditions.

YCWA is assessing the damage of the broken security boom so repairs can be made as soon as possible, but at this time, cannot determine when New Bullards Bar will reopen because the repairs can only be performed once the spill has stopped, due to the close proximity of the spill gates.

The gates at Emerald Cove Marina and boat launches around the reservoir will remain closed until the log boom can be properly fixed to ensure that it is safe for boaters, and that there is proper protection around the spillway.




* Supervises the administration of U.S. immigration laws abroad;

* Provides information to American citizens regarding the political, economic, social, cultural, and humanitarian conditions in foreign countries;

* Informs the Congress and American citizens on the conduct of U.S. foreign relations;

* Promotes beneficial economic intercourse between the United States and other countries;

* Administers the Department of State;

* Supervises the Foreign Service of the United States.

In addition, the Secretary of State retains domestic responsibilities that Congress entrusted to the State Department in 1789. These include the custody of the Great Seal of the United States, the preparation of certain presidential proclamations, the publication of treaties and international acts as well as the official record of the foreign relations of the United States, and the custody of certain original treaties and international agreements. The Secretary also serves as the channel of communication between the Federal Government and the States on the extradition of fugitives to or from foreign countries.

After reading this long list of the duties that the Secretary of State is obligated to fulfill, does anyone actually think that the CEO of Exxon/Mobil has the qualifications for navigating through all of the above or will America's foreign policy gravitate into a side show?





The new Great West League Yuba City Baseball team, the Yuba City Bears are ready to start the 2017 season.

The Yuba City Bears fielded a baseball team as early as 1932 with manager Fred Staufield and star shortstop Farol Staufield. In 1934, the Bears won the Placer-Nevada County League and then defeated Knights Landing, winners of the Peach League, in two straight games of a best of three series. In 1935, the Bears joined the tough Sacramento Valley League and finished the season at 12-6, going 6-3 and in 3rd place during both halves. The Marysville Giants won the 1st half with an 8-1 record while the Colusa Prune Pickers won the 2nd half with an identical 8-1 mark and later won the SVL championship. Yuba City was led by left handed pitcher Chub Ohleyer from Sutter City or Sutter as it is known

today. The Bears would spend two decades in the SVL winning their only title in 1948.

The Bears are ready to renew old rivalries with the now Marysville Gold Sox. "We are excited to start this new team and bring back some historic times to the community. It is important to our organization to make this area a strong united sports hub and what's not a better way than Baseball," said VP/GM Michael Mink.

At a press conference on January 12th the team announced their official name and 2017 schedule. Both the Yuba City Bears and the Marysville Gold Sox will play home games at the Colusa Casino Stadium, in addition to the games they play each other. The Yuba City Team 61-game slate includes a 31-game home schedule. An exhibition vs. the Gold Sox and Fan Fest will be held at Colusa Casino Stadium on May
