Sutter Sups Hire Mitnick for CAO – Makes Sense

Sutter County Supervisors voted unanimously January 3rd to hire Scott Mitnick as their County Administrator. Just over 5 months ago, July 7, 2015, Thousand Oaks (T.O.) City Council voted unanimously to fire him as their City Manager.

After serving Thousand Oaks in Ventura County for 16 years and with friends on the City Council he was fired for lying, being manipulative and deceptive, and using his job time and business email for personal benefit.

His position as city manager was used to persuade corporations doing business with the city to financially support his sons' high school baseball team. He pressured school officials to replace personnel in the athletic program while withholding a \$20,000 city athletic grant to upgrade baseball fields as leverage. He asked city and school district personnel to conceal his unethical behavior.

The Sutter County windfall for Mitnick is like the traveler hand-cuffed and arrested for driving while intoxicated. His car is towed and he's heading to jail in the back of a cruiser. He's pondering the horrible consequences and financial loss. However, to his surprise, when he gets to booking, everyone starts clapping, blowing horns, they hand him a gavel and declare him mayor. What a city!

Supervisors are so enamored of Mitnick that they spiked his pay for the job to \$230,000 plus benefits, most ever in Sutter County. Benefits fit for a king include a \$500 / mo. vehicle allowance, all professional dues and subscriptions paid, the "cafeteria plan" of health / dental / vision / life / accidental death and dismemberment insurance, \$500 / mo. for deferred compensation increasing to \$1,000 in 2018, and a \$250,000 life in-

surance policy. He also gets all county holidays and for starters 100 hours of vacation and another 100 hours of sick leave. To quote from an article by

Mike Harris, writer for the Ventura County Star, "Your termination is for cause — dishonesty, as set forth in ... your employment agreement," TO Mayor Joel Price wrote in a July 7 notice of termination to Mitnick."

"You ... failed to honestly and

swer questions of the City Council and staff, violated city policy, and did not effectively perform the duties of city manager," Price wrote. "Your actions are an embarrassment to the organization."

"As a result of your dishonesty, the City Council has lost confidence in your ability to fully and effectively discharge the duties of city manager," Price wrote. "Trust and credibility are an essential element in the city manager's relationship with the City Council, the community, other governmental agencies, the executive team, and city staff."

'Mitnick's actions also "erode public confidence in the city, negatively impact many aspects of city operations, and are inimical to public service," Price wrote.'

Mitnick did not initially own up to the whole truth when 'confessing' that his blunder only amounted to using his business email for personal communication. In fact, the council seemed understanding at first.

However, information uncovered by two newspapers, the Thousand Oaks Acorn (TOA) and the Ventura County Star (VCS), via Freedom of Information Act requests for emails led to Mitnick's firing.

Emails show Mitnick happily thanking businesses for base-ball sponsorships and assuring a good word when they come before the city council again. Emails also show his interference with the school district.

Section 1, Chapter 10 of the Thousand Oaks city code states: "Officials or employees . . . should avoid even the appearance of conflict between their public duties and private interests."

Mitnick made extreme demands of the school booster

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Never lose money

Losses and negative balances when they occur can be an unwelcome aspect of investing but they can actually tell us a lot about what kind of strategies are being used and whether they are appropriate for a particular investor's situation.

In my humble opinion, the words of famous investor Warren Buffet apply first and foremost:

"Rule No. 1: never lose money; rule No. 2: don't forget rule No. 1".

Investors would be prudent to heed such advice. Limiting losses when the market moves against you is more important than how much you make in up markets.

Looking at the percentage amount of your losses in down markets may be an indication of how much at risk your portfolio might be. On the flip side, how much you make in up markets also can indicate the level of risk.

Suppose an investor sees a general market increase of 50% and

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his portfolio moves up by the same amount or even exceeds the percentage and gains even more. The investor is thrilled and perceives the strategy a sound one and that he or his advisor is a genius.

Standing back and analyzing that result with more thought however may yield a different opinion.

If the portfolio rises in lockstep with the market, it could also fall in lockstep. In our example, a 50% gain may feel great, but if the market falls 50%, would a 50% loss in your portfolio feel as good?

Probably not. Most investors I know would not tolerate such a setback. A 50% loss is a gigantic hole to dig out of. To recover from such a loss would then require the market to double from the lower level due to the math involved just to break even. Many investors might think the market only has to recover 50% from such a loss but a rise of 50% gain from the lower level would still yield a 25% loss.

A portfolio that moves up in lockstep with the market may mean you are over exposed for your level of comfort should the market move against you.

A more conservative approach may mean you

make less in up markets but you also won't be subject to violating rule No. 1 as badly.

Think back to the markets of 2009. Many investors took losses in the double digits and some lost significant amounts and still haven't recovered. Had the losses been limited to single digits however, recovery is much quicker and a lot less stressful.

If you are seeing huge profits in your portfolio in up markets, that may indicate a level of exposure you may not comfortable with once the markets move against you. Generally speaking, a more conservative approach will mean you won't make as much when markets run, but it also means you won't lose as much if markets fall.

Portfolios that don't move much may not seem as exciting or rewarding as your neighbors portfolio at times, but it may mean you will sleep a lot better than he will if the tide of markets rush out unexpectedly.

Portfolios that grow slowly over time but keep losses at a minimum when they inevitably occur, could help to keep rule No.1 at bay.

Heavy concentrations in stocks to gather fast gains may be enticing but there was a reason the tortoise beat the hare. Slow and steady may be the order of the day when it comes to long term investing and living within your risk tolerance level.



I was throwing sand bags at the base of the "D" Street Bridge when the water burst through the asphalt on the street. A lot of brave men refused to stop and actually stopped the water as it rushed down D Street. Many of those men, including myself, lived in Yuba City and lost everything.

These kinds of storms really put the brakes on fishing. Streams and rivers are blown out and lakes and reservoirs become dirty with runoff. The aftermath of the high water is devastation to the fish families, especially the rivers and streams in the foothills and mountains. I recall fishing the opening weekend in 1956. By the end of April the stream was still running high and the fish were not interested. Those trout I caught were all beat up with some

missing half a tail or a fin. When I caught the first trout, a 10 inch rainbow, I was overwhelmed with the damage to the fish and realized just how hard the raging waters can be to those creatures that live

If you want to wet a line during this storm I suggest you head down to the Delta. Reports tell us the stripers are cooperating as well as the sturgeon. Once the

high water stabilizes sturgeon will be the ticket in the Sacramento River. We will more than likely see sturgeon in the Feather and American as well. Of course, we cannot leave out steelhead, which are currently in local rivers.

Closing thought: "Life is short, so be kind, love your family and remember the basic things in life are the most important."

The Ghost of Stephen J. Field Returns Throwing the 167th birthday party for Marysville

Marysville, Ca. The ghost of Stephen J. Field, who plans to haunt Marysville until a statue is erected in honor of Marysville's first politician and first U.S. Supreme Court Justice from the American West, is throwing a party for California's Oldest Little City's 167th birthday on the evening of Wednesday, January 18.

Live music, comedic history, a light-hearted musical slide show documenting Marysville's past, and birthday cake will all be part of the program, which is a fund raiser for Yuba-Sutter Arts. Cost is \$5.

The celebration will occur at the Lee Burrows Center for the Arts theater at 7th and E streets in Marysville at 6 p.m.

"No one shares my particular perspective of the importance of Marysville in the development of California and the United States," said the ghost, who talks incessantly about his own significance in the founding of the city.

Field, who was born 200 years ago, came to California in 1849 at age 33, having left his brother's law practice in New York to explore opportunities in the American frontier. On January 18, 1850, just three days after arriving at what was then known as Nye's Ranch, and after convincing the property owners to form a city, he was elected its first politician: alcalde, under the Mexican



rule of law which was still common in the period between the Treaty of Hidalgo under which the United States took possession of California in 1848 and California statehood in 1850.

On the night of the election, they celebrated with champagne and decided to name the new city Marysville, in honor of Mary Murphy Covillaud, a survivor of the Donner Party and the wife of the largest property owner, Charles Covillaud.

Field taxed the gambling tables to form police department

and implemented the whipping post to compensate for the lack of a iail. He was later elected to the California Assembly and the California Supreme Court, before being named by Abraham Lincoln to the United States Supreme Court, where he served longer than all but one other justice in the history of the court.

Last year, the ghost

of Stephen J. Field emerged as a character personified by local history enthusiast Chuck Smith, a West Marysville resident who advocates the creation of statuary for Field, Mary Murphy Covillaud and two of her sisters, and African-American Mountain Man James Pierson Beckwourth. Mary Murphy's two sisters, Harriet and Sarah, walked for 32 days through knee deep snow from Donner Summit to Wheatland to alert rescuers to the plight of their families. Beckwourth discovered the lowest elevation pass in the Sierra Nevada and led the first intact wagon train down the Feather River canyon and into Marysville five years after the Donner Party was stranded at what became known as Donner Summit at the head of the Yuba River watershed.

The evening will begin with the talented his own arrest for murder and a famous court case that dramatically

expanded the power of the federal government.

The evening will conclude with the home made documentary, "A Story of Marysville," and a birthday cake.

The Club started due to a lack of a suitable gallery space to show the works of Rosa Bonhuer who painted an iconic image of Buffalo Cody on horseback. An exhibit of this famous work along with her animal studies had to be cancelled due to the lack of suitable display space in our area. And so the Club was formed with a mission to provide "enlightenment and education in the arts" including gallery space.

Yuba Sutter Arts (YSA) shares a similar mission. In its 30+ years of existence, YSA has also had a profound impact on the cultural wellbeing of the community. And what a year it was at YSA. We stabilized many of our longstanding programs and added a few new twists.

All of our efforts are in keeping with finding new means of arts-engagement with our community and finding areas of interest for everyone from preschoolers to students to adults and seniors.

A Happy New Year for State Workers

In a recent column, I commented on how joyous the holiday season would be for members of the state legislature and our constitutional officers who are seeing a four percent increase in their pay. California lawmakers were already the highest paid in the nation.

But as the song says, you ain't seen nothing yet. In a state the U.S. Department of Labor rates as first in pay for state and local government workers, one of the largest public sector unions has negotiated a pay raise of up to 19 percent for many of its members. Union leaders claim that many of the jobs their members perform are in high demand and, without the increases, employees will be lured away to the private sector. Therefore, a 19 percent increase for "financial experts" currently making between \$7,300 and \$10,000 per month, is warranted. However, everyone has been invited to the party. Even janitors will be getting an extra 3 percent on top of the standard 4 percent that has been negotiated for all the represented workers.

Other unionized employees, now negotiating pay increases with the state, will likely see similar raises. And it is important to mention that most of these "public servants" are receiving healthcare and pension benefits that most in the private sector can only dream of. In November, voters

said yes to new taxes and to the continuation of the highest income tax rates in the nation. The expensive campaigns that put these measures over the top were funded primarily by public sector unions, so it is not hard to guess where the bulk of the tax revenue will be going. Instead of state government providing more and better services, most of the funds will go to paying for raises for government workers. And let's not forget the need to fund nearly a trillion dollars in unfunded pension liabilities for which taxpayers will be picking up the tab.

This is not to lose sight of the fact that many public employees work hard and provide valuable service. Most citizens want to see these employees fairly compensated for good work.

However, because government holds a monopoly on most of the services it provides — there is no competition or alternative - much of the work actually provided is subpar. Anyone who must use government services cannot imagine that these across the board raises state employees are receiving are based on merit.

There are those who will justify the additional money as cost-of-living increases. But cost of living increases are based on inflation, which has been minimal due to the sluggish economy. Just ask Social Security recipients, who will receive an increase in their benefits of 0.3 percent (three-tenths of one percent) for the coming year. This translates to about a \$4 monthly increase for the average retiree, or about \$48 per year. Had the average recipient, who must get by on \$1,355 each month, been granted a four percent increase (the minimum for so many state employees) their monthly checks would bump up almost \$55, or \$660 annually.

But we shouldn't have to argue over how much government employees should be paid. Since union leadership worries that the private sector will hire valuable workers away unless they are paid more, why not let them go? In the private sector, they can join or establish companies that can bid on doing the work currently performed by government employees. Let them pay themselves whatever they want, but they will have to bid on doing the work they now perform on the taxpayers' dime. Government will hire the lowest qualified bidder and if their service is topnotch, they will keep their contracts. If not, the governor and Legislature can move on and engage



Hindus are urging all 1,025 public school districts of California to declare official holiday on Diwali, the most popular of their festivals.

They are also urging California's all 1,222 charter schools, all about 3,170 private schools and all independent schools also to adopt Diwali as an official holiday on their 2017-2018 school year calendars.

Hindu statesman Rajan Zed, in a statement today, pointed out that it would be a step in the positive direction in view of presence of a substantial number of Hindu students at schools around the state, as it was important to meet the religious and spiritual needs of these pupils. Some school districts in New York, New Jersey and Maryland had reportedly already declared Diwali as a holiday.

Precipitation up. snowpack down

Jan. 3 readings by the Department of Water Resources measured the water equivalent in the statewide snowpack at 70 percent of historic average. Total precipitation since Oct. 1 has been above average, but warmer temperatures caused more rain and less snow. Total water storage in state reservoirs is estimated at 98 percent of historic average. Acting Director Bill Croyle is "cautiously optimistic" about the state's water conditions, though it's still too early to determine the impact on the drought.

Board holds final hearing on river-flow plan

People again expressed concern Tuesday about a state board proposal to redirect more water to fish in three San Joaquin Valley rivers. The State Water Resources Control Board held a final public hearing in Sacramento on its plan for the Stanislaus, Tuolumne and Merced rivers. Irrigation-district and community leaders urged the board to look at alternative remedies for fish that would minimize the impact on people who depend on the rivers.

Marketers assess benefits of holiday demand

With the baking, feasting and toasting of the year-end holidays now concluded, people who sell holiday-related farm products say they saw demand swell for the season. Marketers say the holidays typically boost sales of products such as

eggs, butter, nuts, raisins, whole-body turkeys and sparkling wine. Some of those same products and others will also see demand rise in anticipation of lunar New Year celebrations at the end of the month.

club that was seeking the grant according to club treasurer Peri Fealy. First, the club provided 3 years of tax returns, by - laws and their IRS 501C3 application.

Then, Mitnick wanted two years of bank statements, two years of audits and two years of financial reports. Fealy said these documents are not required by any other regulatory body but were given to Mitnick in the spirit of full disclosure.

It seems that Mitnick is a master of the government rope-a-dope when he doesn't get his way.

A TOA editorial written before Mitnick was fired says, "Clearly this error was not born from inexperience, but perhaps too much experience: Has Mitnick simply grown too comfortable with his own power that he would so blatantly abuse his post and assume he'd get away with it?"

"The first time a person gets caught is rarely the first time they've committed the transgression. Which raises the question: How many other times has the most powerful figure in T.O. used his widespread influence to accomplish personal goals?"


