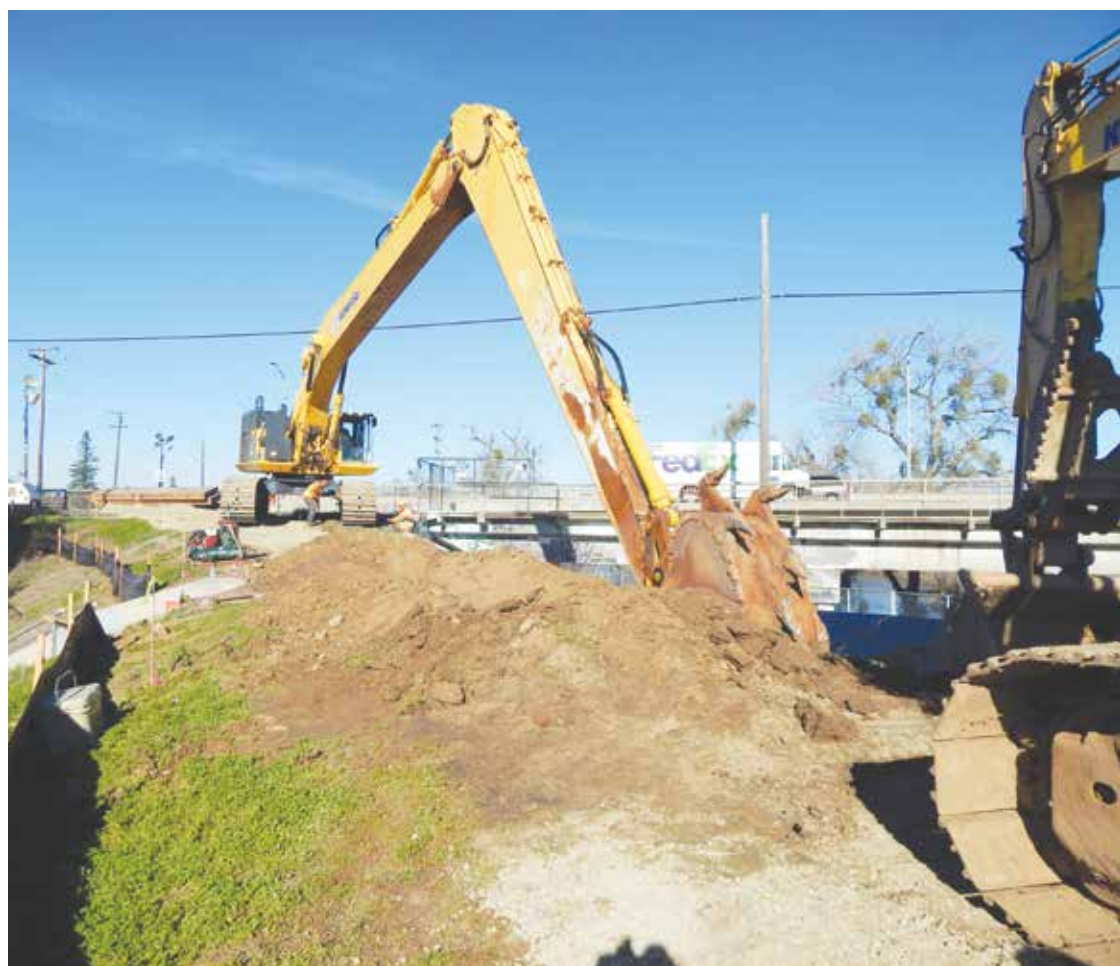

State and CalPERS Ruin Loyalton

The town of Loyalton may be the first city to go into default with Cal PERS, the state's employee pension plan. Loyalton is a story of pioneers settling the area in the 1800s alongside the nomadic Miwok and Washoe Native Americans. It is also a story of how regulations, special interests and a corrupt mismanaged Cal PERS ruin communities.

California became a state in 1850. Loyalton, once called Smith's Neck, was renamed in 1863 to reflect loyalty to the Union during the Civil War. The town and the region now called Sierra County were part of a larger Yuba County.

However, after two years, the area proved too difficult to govern from Marysville. The only officials venturing the long distance to the snowy high country were tax collectors. Downieville became the seat of the new county.

Legal matters were settled by locals and the area is known for the state's only hanging of a female. On July 5, 1851, a young woman named Josefa Segoria was hung from the Downieville Bridge for stabbing a man to death while resisting his advances.

Newcomers developed farms and ranches, the timber industry, and gold mines. Their beef and butter were prized in Sacramento, San Francisco and Reno. Hundreds of millions of dollars in gold were extracted. Four major sawmills providing life-long employment were a boon to the county. A railroad moved the lumber prior to the development of the trucking industry.

Eventually, gold mining tailed off. Extreme state regulations and socialist control of the dairy industry made the county's well-known but small dairy operations unprofitable.

Environmental extremists leveraged liberal lawmakers in California and Washington DC until the Clinton Administration shut down the timber industry. Anti-timber forces got their way pitching junk science about an owl. The Spotted Owl's decline continues today in a people-free forest although the Bard Owl was the real culprit killing off its weaker cousin.

Three quarters of the land around Loyalton is owned by the federal government and to "protect the Spotted Owl" the forests were declared off-limits to loggers. The last sawmill and

Bridge Street Levee Work

Yuba City Side of The River

Yuba City, Ca.

The Fifth Street Bridge will be closed some evenings from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. through mid-January as construction crews close a 500-foot "gap" in the levee from north of the bridge to south of the bridge. The work is some of the final remaining in the initial phases of the West Feather River Levee Improvement Project undertaken by the Sutter Butte Flood Control Agency.

Work on the levee near the Fifth Street Bridge in Yuba City is not related to the bridge replacement that will begin next spring.

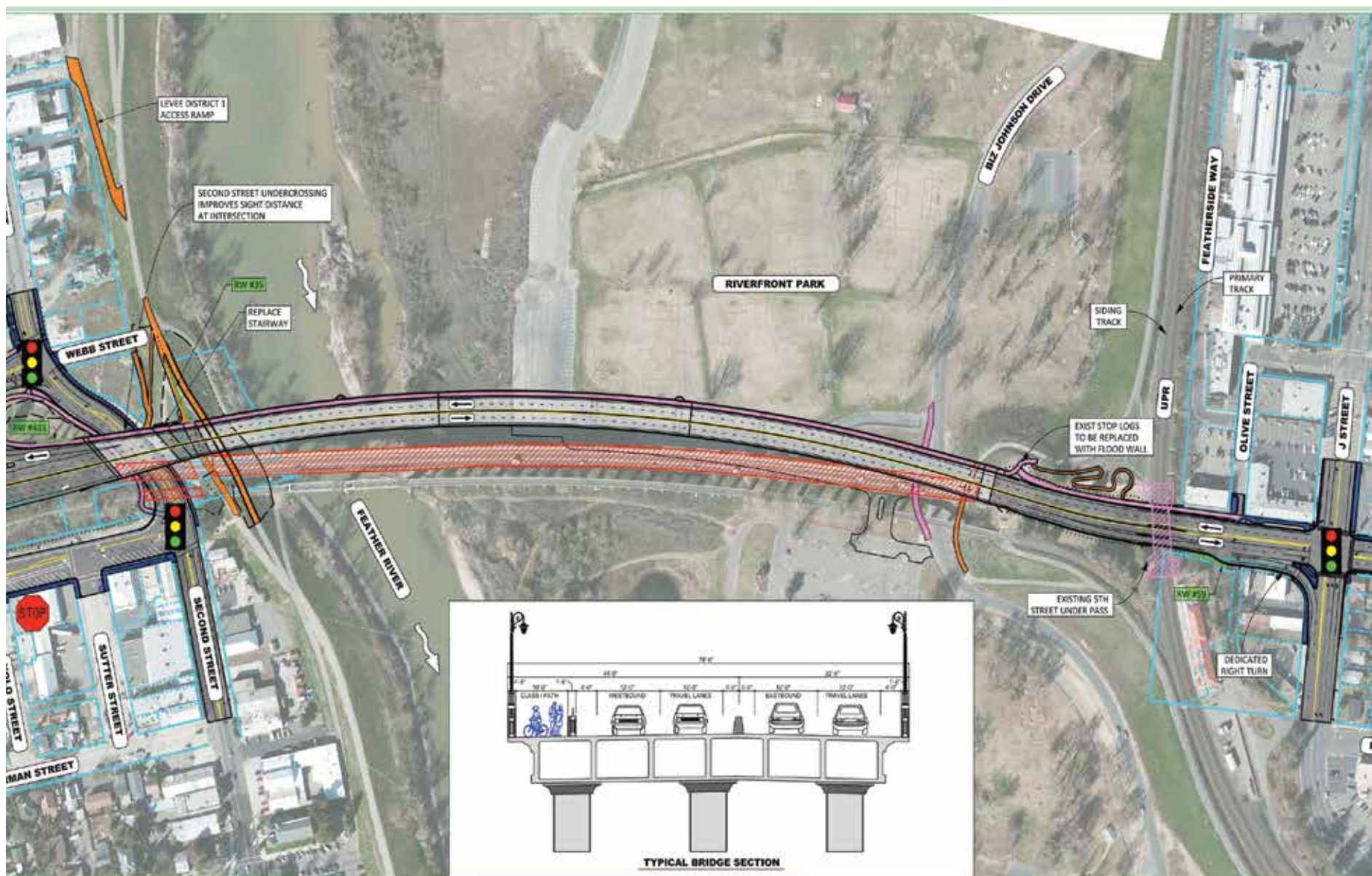
SACOG previously awarded \$17.1 million in federal funds for the final funding

component of the \$70 million Fifth Street Bridge Replacement Project. The funding serves as a local match for Yuba City, Marysville, and the counties of Yuba and Sutter. However, the federal funds had been delayed, and at a meeting in early December the SACOG Board voted to loan the project the \$17.1 million to guarantee construction funding is available to keep it on track for construction in the spring of 2017, according to Sutter County Supervisor Dan Flores.

Built in 1958 to replace the overpass destroyed by a flood in 1955, the current two-lane bridge connecting Marysville to Yuba City

does not meet modern lane width requirements or earthquake standards. The City of Yuba City estimates roughly 33,000 motorists cross the bridge daily with that daily number increasing to 95,000 by 2035. Construction to widen the bridge to four lanes could not commence until all of the funding had been secured.

The replacement bridge will be built north of the existing bridge and will connect to the existing approach points on the levee. City officials anticipate the project to begin in 2017 and will be completed sometime in 2018.



Gold Sox Hire Former Player Nick Hudson as Pitching Coach



Former Marysville Gold Sox pitcher and current assistant coach for the Cal State East Bay Pioneers has been hired to lead the 2017 pitching staff of the Gold Sox Baseball Club. Hudson is in his second season as the assistant Coach for the Pioneers and his primary focus is on pitching and coordinating training programs for the pitching staff. "We are trying to unite the history of this team with

the new highly competitive Great West League format. Nick was a proven player here and well respected by the community. We look for big things from him on the coaching side now and we expect nothing but great things" said GM Michael Mink.

Hudson competed for the Pioneers for two seasons in 2013 and 2014 after transferring from UC San Diego. During that time, he pitched 153.0 innings and helped lead the team to a 62-38 record. Hudson went 8-2 with a 3.25 ERA as a senior, leading the CCAA in innings and complete games during conference play and earning All-CCAA Second Team honors. When he graduated, he ranked 11th in program history with a

3.18 career ERA.

As a starting pitcher for the Gold Sox, Hudson posted a 7-1 record in 12 appearances, compiling a 2.18 earned run average to rank second on the team. Hudson struck out 61 batters in 70.1 innings of work and held opposing batters to a .214 average. The Benicia product even capped his summer league campaign with a 108-pitch no-hitter against the Sacramento Legends on Aug. 4. "I am looking forward to having Nick join our staff as a strong leader who is hungry to win and more importantly develop our pitching staff and send them back to their programs both healthy and improved" said Field Manager Dallas Correa.

This will also include the Sacramento River. We have no reports of steelies in the Feather or Yuba Rivers.

Stripers are on the bite

in the Delta area hitting a variety of baits and lures. Some fish are in the thirty pound range. Myself, I have never caught a striped bass that big, but always have my hands full and my heart skips

a beat with a ten pound striper on the end of my line.

Rogue One: A Star Wars Story
Starring: Felicity Jones, Diego Luna, and Alan Tudyk. Rated: PG-13, Runtime: 133 minutes.

Imagine: Sitting in a dark theater. Coke in one hand Reeses Pieces in the other and the chair is down right comfortable. Then music suddenly explodes in the dark and an orchestral cascade washes over you as STAR WARS scrolls up the screen in giant golden letters laid out on an immense star field. Instantly you are transported to a time when your world was full of wonder and your overwhelming anticipation has finally been realized. That trade mark moment that fulfilled months of waiting, doesn't happen in this film. It says right there in the title, A Star Wars Story, every word capitalized and everything. How could they forget the one thing that sets, Star Wars, apart from any other space movie. Kind of like dropping your steak in the cats favorite part of the sandbox at a barbecue. Hard to have a good time after that.

The story was constructed to put the Deathstar plans in the hands of the rebels in a compelling and moral challenging way. In true Disney fashion the lead characters parents die. The acting is not the greatest. The directing is certainly not the greatest the flow of the film is turbulent at best. The effects are really good even the odd explosions are really good. The droid K-2SO makes the movie worth it and his dialogue is the best.

Panel Clears Judge in Stanford Rape Case

The state agency that oversees judicial discipline in California ruled that Santa Clara County Judge Aaron Persky did not commit misconduct, nor was he biased when handing down a perceived lenient sentence against a Stanford University swimmer convicted of rape.

"The commission has concluded that there is not clear and convincing evidence of bias, abuse of authority, or other basis to conclude that Judge Persky engaged in judicial misconduct warranting discipline," the 11-member California Commission on Judicial Performance concluded.

Brock Turner, 21, was charged with three felony sexual assault counts for raping an unconscious female at a fraternity party. He was released from jail after serving 90 days though was originally sentenced to six months.

Turner is on probation for three years in his home state of Ohio and must register as a sex offender. The original recommendation was for Turner to serve at least two years. However, citing his clean record, youth and remorse for his actions, Judge Persky rejected the plea for tougher sentencing. Persky said he feared a longer sentence would have a "severe impact" on Turner, a champion swimmer who once aspired to compete in the Olympics — a point repeatedly brought up during the trial.

The female victim, now 23 and lacking Turner's persuasive credentials wrote the judge telling of the "severe impact" of the rape, publicity and

grueling trial on her. She writes, "The sexual assault had been so clear, but instead, here I was at the trial, answering questions like:

How old are you? How much do you weigh? What did you eat that day? Well what did you have for dinner? Who made dinner? Did you drink with dinner? No, not even water? When did you drink? How much did you drink? What container did you drink out of? Who gave you the drink? How much do you usually drink? Who dropped you off at this party? At what time? But where exactly? What were you wearing? Why were you going to this party? What'd you do when you got there? Are you sure you did that? But what time did you do that? What does this text mean? Who were you texting? When did you urinate? Where did you urinate? With whom did you urinate outside? Was your phone on silent when your sister called? Do you remember silencing it? Really because on page 53 I'd like to point out that you said it was set to ring. Did you drink in college? You said you were a party animal? How many times did you black out? Did you party at frats? Are you serious with your boyfriend? Are you sexually active with him? When did you start dating? Would you ever cheat? Do you have a history of cheating? What do you mean when you said you wanted to reward him? Do you remember what time you woke up? Were you wearing your cardigan? What color was your cardigan? Do you remember any more from that night? No? Okay, well, we'll let

Brock fill it in."

The Palo Alto community and people throughout the nation were incensed that someone could only serve 90 days for raping a woman. Protest petitions on the Internet asking for Persky's removal from the court have surpassed the million signature mark. If about 80,000 Santa Clara County registered voters sign recall petitions Persky's future would appear on the Nov. 7, 2017 ballot.

This past August, Judge Persky asked to be moved from hearing criminal cases in Palo Alto to handling civil cases. As of September 6 he has been serving in that capacity. Presiding Judge Rise Pichon honored Persky's request, though declared her belief that he was perfectly able to continue with criminal cases.

Sutter County residents aware of the Persky controversy have been concerned for the local judicial process of forty men caught in a sting attempting to have sex with 9, 13 and 14 year old girls. People considered Judge Brian Aronson's bail amounts too low and the District Attorney protested light sentencing.

Defense attorneys are using the ploy of repeatedly continuing cases for months to exploit the public's poor memory and hope the District Attorney and Judge Aronson will tire of the process. Meanwhile, those accused are free to continue their lives.

Suit to Enforce Political Reform Act

Today (Dec 12) Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association and retired State Senator and Judge Quentin L. Kopp filed suit against Governor Brown and the Fair Political Practices Commission to invalidate a new law that would allow public funds to be used for political campaigning.

In September, the Governor signed Senate Bill 1107 which provides that a "candidate may expend or accept public moneys for the purpose of seeking elective office" from a fund established to finance campaigns with taxpayer dollars.

In 1988, California voters amended the Political Reform Act by adopting Proposition 73. Among other things, Prop 73 outlawed public financing of campaigns and prohibited candidates from accepting

public funds for campaigns.

The bill signed by Governor Brown purports to amend the Political Reform Act without the voters' approval. It deletes the prohibition against public financing of campaigns, and replaces it with an express authorization giving candidates access to taxpayer funds to spend on political advertising. "California voters decided to prohibit taxpayer dollars from being used as political slush funds," said Jon Coupal, President of HJTA. "If politicians want to change that, they have to take the issue back to the voters."

Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association opposed SB 1107 and has consistently opposed public financing of campaigns. HJTA is joined in its lawsuit by Quentin Kopp, a co-author of Proposition

73.

The lawsuit, filed in the Sacramento Superior Court, seeks an order that the bill signed by Governor Brown is invalid unless it is placed on the ballot and approved by voters. The suit also requests that the Fair Political Practices Commission continue to publish the Political Reform Act without the new amendment unless voter approval is obtained.

HJTA and Kopp are being represented by Chuck Bell, a leading California political law attorney with the firm of Bell, McAndrews and Hiltachk; Anthony T. (Tom) Caso, with the Center for Constitutional Jurisprudence; and Allen Dickerson, with the Center for Competitive Politics.

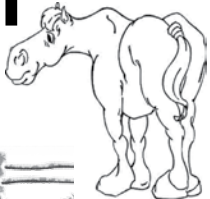
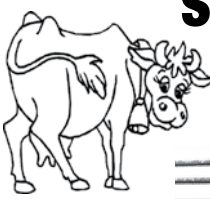

New Rules to Limit Medi-Cal ‘Death Fees’

Thanks to ObamaCare, people who wanted to get health insurance were instead told they qualified for “free” Medi-Cal. Wonderful they said, no cost health care. What was not explained to them is that when they die, their estate would then pay for the insurance premiums—so their children and grand children get nothing—except for photos and memories.

“The federal government requires states to recoup specific medical costs — mostly related to nursing home care

— from the estates of certain Medicaid beneficiaries after they die. California is among a minority of states that seeks repayment beyond the federal mandate.

Under current rules, the state can collect for nearly all Medi-Cal coverage you receive after you turn 55. In some cases, the state also can recover costs from Medi-Cal members under 55 who are patients in nursing homes.

For fiscal year 2015-2016, California’s estate recovery program collected close to \$70

million, says Tony Cava, spokesman for the state Department of Health Care Services, which administers Medi-Cal. That’s up from roughly \$53 million in 2011-2012.

Watch this collection raise to be billions, when the 12 million Californians, not a typo, forced by government on Medi-Cal die, the State will own homes, cars and estates, bank accounts, jewelry, etc. This is how government will own the people, by giving away free services and collect at the end. Sick.

New California Laws for 2017

A higher minimum wage and new restrictions on assault weapons are among the latest California laws taking effect with the new year:

SEXUAL ASSAULT

Sexually assaulting an unconscious or severely intoxicated person will become a crime ineligible for probation - a change prompted when former Stanford University swimmer Brock Turner was given a six-month jail sentence for assaulting an unconscious woman. AB2888 clarifies that a victim cannot consent to sex while unconscious or incapacitated by drugs, alcohol or medication.

TEXTING WHILE DRIVING

Add using traffic apps or updating your Instagram account to the list of things you cannot do while driving. AB1785 by Assemblyman Bill Quirk, D-Hayward, updates California’s existing ban on texting while driving to make it clear that state law prohibits the use of any hand-held device in a way that distracts from driving - not just while texting. Motorists can still use devices that are mounted or voice-operated and hands-free.

MINIMUM WAGE

California’s minimum wage will increase from \$10 an hour to \$10.50 for businesses with 26 or more employees under SB3 by Sen. Mark Leno, D-San Francisco. It will eventually rise to \$15 an hour in 2022. The law delays the increases by one year for smaller employers.

ASSAULT WEAPONS

Lawmakers passed a package of bills to strengthen California’s already tough gun laws then voters reinforced them by passing even more measures. People who own magazines that hold more than 10 rounds will be required to give them up starting Jan. 1. Buyers must undergo a background check before

purchasing ammunition and will be barred from buying new weapons that have a device known as a bullet button.

Gun makers developed bullet buttons to get around California’s assault weapons ban, which prohibited new rifles with magazines that can be detached without the aid of tools. A bullet button allows a shooter to quickly dislodge the magazine using the tip of a bullet.

HANDGUN STORAGE

Law enforcement officers will be required to follow the same rules as civilians by securely storing handguns in a lockbox out of plain view or in the trunk if the weapons are left in an unattended vehicle. SB 869 by Sen. Jerry Hill, D-San Mateo, closed a legal loophole that had exempted authorities and concealed weapons permit holders from those rules. The move came after stolen guns were used in high-profile crimes.

SCHOOL MASCOTS

California public schools will be barred from using the name "Redskins" for sports teams and mascots under AB30 by Assemblyman Luis Alejo, D-Watsonville. American Indians regard the term as offensive.

CHILD SAFETY SEATS

Children younger than 2 must be in rear-facing child restraint systems unless they weigh 40 or more pounds or are 40 or more inches tall under AB53 by Assemblywoman Cristina Garcia, D-Bell Gardens.

EPIPENS

Businesses can stock EpiPens—used to treat people undergoing life-threatening allergic reactions—under AB1386, which allows pharmacies to dispense the devices to colleges, private businesses and other venues that have a plan in place for using them. Gov. Jerry Brown said he signed the bill because the move

has the potential to save lives. However, he called out EpiPen manufacturer Mylan for what he termed "rapacious corporate behavior" by rapidly raising prices.

BUILDING SAFETY

The state will attempt to better monitor potential safety issues in the wake of a fatal balcony collapse at a Berkeley apartment building that killed six young people in June 2015. SB465 by Sen. Jerry Hill, D-San Mateo, requires better information-sharing between state and local agencies about contractors, convictions and legal settlements. A working group will have one year to decide whether changes are needed to state building codes after several structure failures.

RIGHT-TO-TRY

Terminally ill California patients will be allowed to use experimental drugs that do not yet have full regulatory approval under AB1668 by Assemblyman Ian Calderon, D-Whittier. It authorizes but does not require health plans to cover investigational drugs and protects physicians from disciplinary action if they recommend them when other treatment options have been exhausted.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Young people under 18 cannot be charged with prostitution and will instead be treated as victims under SB1322 by Sen. Holly Mitchell, D-Los Angeles. It’s one of several human trafficking-related bills that include raising the age kids can testify outside a courtroom from 13 to 15, protecting victims’ names from disclosure and mandating that they have access to county services.

State and CalPERS Ruin Loyalton

Sierra County's biggest employer ended operations in early 2001. More than half the mills in the state are now closed.

As a result, most of Loyalton's businesses

have been boarded up. The hospital went bankrupt. In 2015, the population was at 733 down from 1,030 in 1980. People have relocated or travel to Reno and Tahoe for

employment. School officials wonder whether they can afford to stay open.

In March 2013, the city council voted to withdraw from CalPERS and cut salaries on their one full-time and four part-time employees. The city was going broke and could not afford its premium payments.

Recently, Loyalton received a Cal PERS bill for \$1.66 million for future payments, withdrawal fees and interest at 7.5%. That is \$2,264 per remaining resident. Dropping out of the mafia is less painful.

Patsy Jardin, 71, was notified that she may lose much (up to 60%) of her \$48,000 annual pension because the city failed to fund its long-term liabilities. John Cussins, 55, with a \$36,000 pension, is in

the same predicament. Two other retirees are also affected.

Loyalton council member Patricia Whitley, who voted to terminate the CalPERS plan, said a 50% pay raise that may not have been legal made pensions unaffordable. That sounds a lot like Sutter County Supervisors' 2004 deceptive 35% raise for employees retroactive to the date of employment. A manageable pension liability is now out of control. Yuba County also granted their employees a similar financial windfall.

CalPERS has been damaged by flawed politically correct investments, kick-backs taken by administrators and horrible returns. Rather than generating projected earnings of 7.5% annually they are getting under 1%. That has created a massive deficit that the state, cities, counties and agencies will have to make up since CalPERS needed a 7.5% return to meet their pension commitments.

Now what? Government services will be cut and new local taxes will be added to make up the deficit. Expect to pay more for less in the near future while government salaries continue to increase.



New Board at NYWD

The first meeting of the new Board of Directors of the North Yuba Water District was held on December 22. After the District's attorney Allan Lilly assured everyone the Board had the legal authority approve the minutes for the previous meeting, the Board got down to business.

The first thing to do was to elect a President. After a short discussion, Donnie Forguson was nominated and elected.

The next item was approving an amendment with South Feather Water and Power, negotiated by Manager Jeff Maupin, allowing revenue from sales of water to Yuba City to be channeled to a separate account managed by the Water District. This simple contractual change will potentially net the District an additional \$160,000 yearly.

A short presentation followed by Neil Grabor from the NorthStar Engineering in Chico. A \$500,000 state grant was available to develop a Planning and Specification Estimate for piping the Forbestown ditch. The motion to hire NorthStar to prepare this report passed, and now NorthStar is undertaking the task of preparing the engineering and environmental approval documents ready to hand over to a construction contractor.

After some discussion of adopting new rules of order at Board meetings, the Board voted to adopt the same rules in use by Yuba County. At a later date, the Board will review the rules to keep the parts most relevant to the District.

Then, Gary Hawthorne, the Director for Division 3, moved to put on the next meeting agenda an action that the Water District develop a community outreach program. Director Hawthorne briefly described his vision of a town hall style meeting

open to the public to ask questions and get answers about the District.

In summary, The North Yuba Water District is set to have an additional \$160,000 yearly income, and the

engineering documents necessary to build a dependable supply of irrigation water for the residents of Dobbins and Oregon House are being developed.

TIP Responds to Call 10,000

On December 11, 2016, Yuba-Sutter's Trauma Intervention Program (TIP) responded to its 10,000th call from emergency responders since beginning in December 1994. Linda Fire Department requested assistance for a "CPR in progress."

Yuba County Sheriff Gary Tindel, Sutter County Sheriff Art Brandwood, Marysville Chief of Police Jack Simpson, Yuba City Fire Chief Randy Lavelock, Linda Fire Chief Jim Brannon and Olivehurst Fire Chief David Haggard were instrumental in bringing TIP here.

The program started in San Diego County. The Oceanside Police Department was the first agency to welcome the new approach. TIP began to be replicated in 1991.

Yuba – Sutter TIP has provided emotional and practical support to 65,613 survivors of tragedy and assisted 46,725 emergency responders to date. Each year, TIP members serve an average of 40,000 hours and have completed 880,000 hours in the last 22 years helping their community.

TIP provides a 24/7/365 response to the scene within 20 minutes of being dispatched. Clients can reach a TIP person 24-hours-a-day for any follow-up questions or to talk. Yuba-Sutter responds to the highest number of calls per capita of the 15 TIP programs in the nation. TIP people here respond to every type of tragedy, 65% of which involve a death.

Since 1994, TIP has trained 396 citizens to respond to emergencies

in a 1,246 square mile service area with more than 170,000 residents. An annual 40-hour training academy is offered in February followed by law enforcement and fire department ride alongs, hospital orientation, and a 3 - month field training experience.

Each TIP person agrees to be on-call for three 12-hour shifts and attend a 3-hour continuing education meeting each month.

Nonprofits provide billions of dollars in services to communities each year. In 2015, the national average value of a volunteer hour was \$23.56. That amounts to a \$942,400 Yuba-Sutter TIP contribution in 2015. This does not include the many resources, blankets, stuffed animals, coloring books and crayons etc. offered

free for those experiencing the worst day of their lives.

TIP is supported by fundraisers, grants, service organizations, Ride-out Health and Bi-County Ambulance, emergency responders, businesses and individuals that believe in the TIP mission.

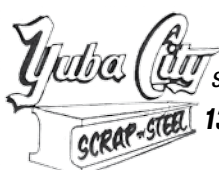
The weekly schedule beginning January 3 is as follows:

Godfrey's Tractor

James, in one of his writing efforts, declared that the greatest use of our life is to share it with those who outlast us. This slightly edited version is my understanding of the contribution. I came to this realization in my early 40's and it changed my outlook on the meaning of life. It explained much of my existence. When I was able to say it to others without any reservations my contributions to others had a different meaning. I had a greater appreciation for those who influenced me.

One such person was a man by the name of Godfrey Humann. Godfrey lived between the towns of Tehama and Gerber California. He was famous for Steam Threshings and the South Shasta Lines. He was doing tractors shows in the mid 1950s when I was a young boy

growing up in the little town of Tehama, "Little City of the Big Trees". One of his large steam tractors had a great whistle. When he had a head of steam, he would blow that monster and you could hear it for miles. It seemed like the sound settled over the valley and bounced along the mountains. A sound you never forget. His museum grew from a yard full of farm equipment to barns of awe. I was honored to be invited to make deposits on his collection when he was 92. He made it easy for me to procure most of his gasoline powered tractors. The pictured John Deere was one of his favorites, a 1945 JD B0.

Mr. Humann placed an ad in the LA Times for a bride and married on his 93rd birthday.

When I was about in the 2nd or 3rd grade my fam-



ily was invited to see his model trains. The growing Humann family lived in a small house on the farm. The trains wandered throughout the walls and around the rooms. This grew to become the South Shasta Lines, a model train layout taking up the whole basement of a new house. He created the engines, cars, mountains, bridges and built in scale and grade the Southern Pacific from Gerber to Dunsmuir. People from all over the United States and other countries visited his creations.

His articles appeared in many notable magazines regarding model railroad-ing and tractor literature. It is with great pride that I have his 29 John Deere GP and plow that he used

to help Sid Campbell plow fields west of Tehama and referred to in one of his articles that is displayed in the Tehama County Museum. As a teenage young man, I helped Sid haul hay from those fields.

Godfrey was a friend and mentor, such an honor to be influenced by him. During his celebration of life ceremony, the hearse and each following car was blessed by the sound of the whistle of his Russell Steamer. Not a wonder that his favorite hymn had a line, "Keep your hand on the throttle and your eye on the rail"

Godfrey's Tractor is a 1945 John Deere B0 (orchard). The B was the most popular lettered tractor built by John Deere. Over 300,000 were sold. Roughly 5,083 were B0s. The B and it's several versions were manufactured from 1935 to 1952. Theo Brown is the main designer and later received the Dreyfus touch in 1939.

1,645 B0s were sold to the Lindeman Brothers in Yakima who installed tracks for working in soft soils and slopes.

The B0 produced 14.03 hp at the drawbar and 18.53 at the belt/pto. Max pull was rated at 2,088 pounds. Horsepower increased with the passage

of time. The unit had a four speed transmission and weighed about 3,390 pounds depending on options. The all-fuel engine workhorse sold in the range of \$780. The B0 had two wheel brakes for sharper turns in the orchard. A downward exhaust, sheet metal bumps over the gas cap and intake were standard. Flowing fenders over the rear wheels were an option. They are considered a Five Star Collectibility rating.

The B0 was used in

the Yuba Sutter Basin and I have seen one in a yard in Hallwood. Each year at the Colusa Farm Show I often get comments about their presence in Lake County as they must have been common in the pear orchards. Spring is just around the corner and I am anxious for a drive on back country roads among the almond orchards with Godfrey's "Johnny Popper" .

Some of us grew up playing with tractors, the lucky ones still do!
