Sexually Violent Predator Offender

Information from Yuba County Sheriff's Website

Marysville, Ca.

The State of California Department of State Hospitals is recommending residential placement for 63 year old Eldridge Lindsey Chaney Jr, a Sexually Violent Predator, at the proposed address of 645 Ellis Rd in Marysville (District 10), Yuba County, California. On December 1, 2016 pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 6608.5, Yuba County Sheriff's Department and District Attorney's Office were informed by the State of California Department of State Hospitals of Mr. Chaney's court ordered release and proposed relocation to our county from the Coalinga State Hospital in Fresno County, Ca. Offender background: Eldridge Chaney Jr was convicted of rape and attempted burglary in 1978. In 1988 he was convicted of sexually assaulting a 16 year old female and also of assault to commit rape of another woman. His crimes occurred in the city of Seaside, Ca. Chaney used the element of surprise in all of his assaults



and has twice used a weapon to overcome his victim's resistance. Chaney Jr. served over ten years in prison and was then committed to the state sex offender program in June of 2000. He received treatment at both Atascadero and Coalinga State Hospitals. Chaney Jr. suffers from diagnosed mental disorders including Antisocial Personality Disorder, Alcohol Use Disorder, and Other Specified Paraphilic Disorder, Non-consenting Adults. In 2010, Chaney petitioned and DSH recommended him for conditional release into Monterey County

after completing the first four phases of the state sex offender program. Phase five of the program is transitional release into the community where he would be monitored while continuing treatment. At that time the request was denied by Monterey County Superior Court, ruling that Chaney Jr would be a danger to the health and safety of the community if he were released. In October 2014, Monterey County Superior Court ordered the conditional release of Eldridge Chaney Jr (case #SC006639A), a Sexually Violent Predator, to begin outpatient treatment and supervision by Liberty Healthcare. • A review of suitable housing by Liberty Healthcare that meets the requirements of Chaney Jr's registration as a sex offender and abides by Jessica's Law regulations has led Liberty Healthcare to recommend placement for Chaney Jr at the Ellis Rd, Yuba County residence.

Don't Be Bullied – Say Merry Christmas

Their descendants will be known among the nations and their offspring among the peoples. All who see them will acknowledge that they are a people the LORD has blessed."

However, for many, this seed of heaven planted in earth was a threat to the status quo, to those in religious and political control. The elite were comfortable with their gig. 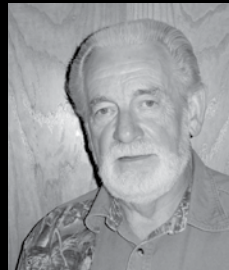

Sixth Team Joins Great West League for 2017

Big-Time Baseball Returns to Yuba City

Portland, Oregon Yuba City, California is back in baseball after a long absence and looks to resume its historic rivalries, as it was announced they will be joining the Great West League for 2017.

The soon to be named ball club will be the league's sixth franchise, making its home at Colusa Casino Stadium in Marysville, where it will share venue headquarters with the league counterpart Marysville Gold Sox.

"This is great news for baseball fans all over our area," stated Marysville Mayor Ricky Samayoa. "We were eager to continue the long-standing tradition of baseball in Marysville. When the league suggested that their newest club in Yuba City would call Colusa Casino Stadium their home field, too, along with the Gold Sox, we knew that we had a winning recreational combination to offer our residents. We're delighted to be able to help the new Great West League establish itself and provide quality entertainment for the whole family." A joint news confer-

ence by Yuba City and Marysville city officials, the team owners and league officials will be held in early January to make further announcements regarding the upcoming baseball season at Colusa Casino Stadium.

"We're excited to add a sixth market to our growing league for 2017," said GWL President Ken Wilson. "The expansion gives our league four teams in Northern California, creating a solid foundation for the league."

The Yuba City Baseball Club will be owned and operated by Yuba-Sutter Community Baseball, Inc. Each team in the GWL will compete in a 60-game regular season schedule in addition to playoffs. The final 2017 Great West League schedule will be released later this month. The Yuba City club will play all 30 home games at Colusa Casino Stadium in conjunction with the Marysville Gold Sox.

Representatives of the City of Yuba City, the City of Marysville and Yuba-Sutter Community Baseball, Inc. reached agreement on a new

contract that will see the Gold Sox return to play in Colusa Casino Stadium in the 2017 and 2018 baseball seasons.

North Valley PG&E Employees Donate to Food Bank

It all added up to 2,775 pounds and consisted of frozen birds, canned oysters, stuffing mix and pasta.

In all, PG&E and employees donated 120 frozen turkeys, dozens of hams, and a variety of cans containing soups to nuts.

For the second consecutive year, employees from PG&E's North Valley Division organized



a food drive for the North State Food Bank in Oro-

ville. The agency serves an eight-county area and provides food to individuals, group homes for youth, seniors, soup kitchens and church pantries.

"PG&E employees are part of the community where they live and work. We give back to our communities and are proud to support the Food Bank," said Lia White, senior manager, PG&E's North Valley division.

On Monday Dec. 12 employees in a flatbed truck and trailer delivered the collected food, which was supplemented by a donation from the company's shareholder-funded community relations department that purchased the turkeys, hams and cheeses.

This food will get us through the holidays and into January," said Lisa Roehling, manager of the food and nutrition program for the Community Action Agency of Butte County, Inc., which runs the food bank and serves Butte, Colusa, Glenn, Plumas, Sierra, Sutter, Tehama and Yuba counties.

Sexually Violent Predator Offender

We will seek the same resolution in this case as the Fraisure Smith's case, but the outcome is not guaranteed. A hearing for Eldridge Chaney Jr's placement in Yuba County is scheduled for January 6, 2017 before the Honorable Lydia M. Villareal in Monterey County Superior Court in Salinas, Ca. Yuba County Sheriff Durfor and District Attorney Patrick McGrath will travel to Monterey County to represent Yuba County and our objection to the placement. Convicted Violent Rapist Should Go Home; Not to Yuba County

Senator Jim Nielsen and Assemblyman James Gallagher asked Judge Villarreal of Monterey County Superior Court to place convicted felon and Sexually Violent Predator, Eldridge Chaney, Jr., in his county of last legal residence, not in Yuba County. An excerpt of their letter is below: "Assemblyman Gallagher is a fifth generation Sutter County farmer and former Sutter County Supervisor. Senator Nielsen represents 19 Northern California counties including Yuba County. In addition, he served many

years as Chairman of the California Board of Prison Terms and was one of the authors of the Sexually Violent Predators Act (SVP) and subsequent strengthening legislation. "We write to entreat you to direct the Department of State Hospitals (DSH) to exert more vigilance to find placement for SVP Eldridge Chaney, Jr. in his county of last legal residence, not in Yuba County. "It smacks of simply dumping the problems of one county, held under the law, on another county less fortunate."

Unshakable Faith in 2017

Discount Monthly Bus Pass Program Extended Through 2017

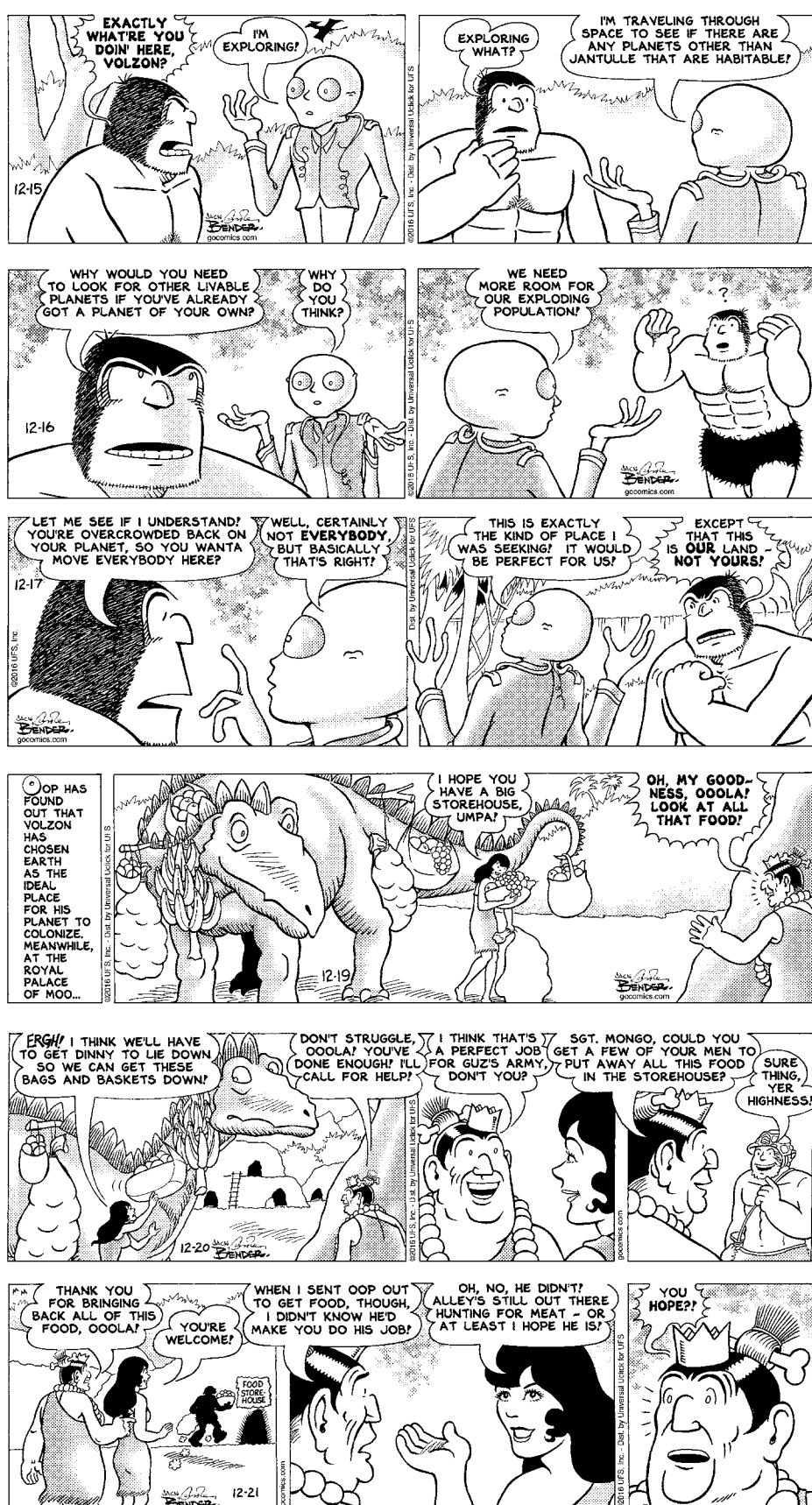

Patriotic State of Jefferson is No CalExit

Hundreds of thousands of Northern Californians are seeking a return to a representative government that serves the citizens and not itself.

California's northern most counties are suffering from a lack of representation in the state Legislature. Northern California holds only 3 out of 80 seats in the California Assembly, 3 out of 40 seats in the California Senate, and 2 out of 53 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives. The consequence is devastating and irrefutable: Elected representatives located in the Los Angeles Basin and San Francisco Bay Area make all of the decisions for rural California.

- Twenty Northern California counties have 6 total state level representatives,
- The southern 38 counties have 114 state representatives,
- The San Francisco Bay Area has 22 state representatives.
- There are 11 counties in the north state with one state senator,
- Los Angeles County alone has 11 senators.

Attempting to create a sovereign state out of Northern California, the State of Jefferson plans to remedy this lack of representation by seeking reforms, such as one senator per county, and by creating a new state—the 51st state.

State of Jefferson is a proposed U.S. state that would span the contiguous and mostly rural area of Northern California. Supporters of the State of Jefferson movement are interested in forming an independent state whose fundamental framework revolves around maintaining the integrity of individual liberties, and Life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

Should Jefferson become a state, it would hold a population of more than 1.7 million people and consist of 21 counties, according to the State of Jefferson committee.

State of Jefferson wants:

To return to the Federal Model of government that provided for 1 State Senator per county and the Assembly based on the population for the least populated county IE Sierra County whose population is 3,500.

- To elect its own 2 U.S. Senators and Congressional representatives;
- To elect its own Governor, State Senate and Assembly, based on Article IV, Section 4 of the Constitution;
- Make Jefferson a business friendly state with common sense tax laws and no state corporate income taxes;
- Property Taxes to stay in State of Jefferson and more specifically, in its counties;
- Laws to hold elected representatives accountable to its people;
- Reduce the 570 state agencies and bureaucracies currently in California;
- Constitutionally based laws;
- Utilization of its natural resources – timber, water, farming, mining, hunting and fishing; and
- A revamping of Social Services.

Mark Baird, the spokesman for the State of Jefferson committee, says the committee and supporters are focused on one single issue: Jefferson Statehood Sovereignty. “We want all counties who feel unrepresented to have a chance to join the State of Jefferson,” Baird said. “What we want is a state senator for each county, because once we changed to apportionment schemes for both houses, our debt skyrocketed, and we lost representation.” SOJ wants to return to the Federal Model of government, which existed in 30 states prior to 1964.

Baird hopes to be able to get one senator for each county, but doesn't hold out false hope this will happen via the California Legislature. So far, the California Legislature has largely ignored the State of Jefferson movement, despite support from 21 counties voting to join SOJ. Only nine county Boards of Supervisors voted for separation; the rest of the counties gathered the needed signatures of the citizens to submit their Declarations. Shasta County alone obtained more than 33,000 signatures.

“This is the day they can't ignore us,” Baird said, upon delivery of 15 more counties last January. And if the Legislature continues to ignore State of Jefferson, “they make the case for us by ignoring us,” Baird said. “We will force them to expand representation, or we will split from the state. Nothing less will do,” Baird added.

This Isn't CalExit

State of Jefferson is an Article 4 Section 3 Constitutional State split. SOJ is vastly different than the CalExit effort, explained Sally Rapoza in a Redding Searchlight article. “First, and most importantly we do not want to leave the Union. We want to add a star to our flag, not take one away. We love our country and want to return to Constitutional principles.”

There are major differences between State of Jefferson and CalExit:

1. SOJ is a grass roots effort – there is no large financier behind this movement.
2. The Jefferson proposal has historical roots. It was supposed to go through before World War I and boundaries were developed.
3. There are already 21 counties, which officially voted for and signed on to the movement.

“Those of us that live in the 21 Northern California counties also feel ignored, unrepresented and taken for granted,” Rapoza said. Evidence of how underrepresented the Northern California region is stood out in the recent election results:

- Sixteen of the 21 counties in the North State voted against criminal release Prop. 57, which passed statewide with 63 percent of the vote.
- Twenty of the 21 counties in Jefferson voted against Prop. 63, the gun-control measure. It passed statewide with 63 percent of the vote.
- Thirteen of the 21 counties voted against legalizing marijuana, Prop. 64, which passed statewide with 56 percent of the vote.
- Nineteen of the 21 Jefferson counties voted for Trump, but all 55 Electoral votes went to Clinton. In fact, 26 of the 58 counties in California were not represented in this election.

“Those of us who live here in the North State have many differences with our brothers in the south,” Rapoza said. “We want to have control over our borders. We want to have Voter ID. We want to keep our Second Amendment rights. We want to be able to wisely utilize our natural resources. We want to educate our children on a more local level. We want our Constitutional state sovereignty back.”

“The CalExit group is throwing a tantrum over the election of Donald Trump,” Rapoza said. State of Jefferson is a legal, Constitutional and patriotic movement.

PG&E Pays More Than \$205 Million in Property Taxes to 50 California Counties

Chico, Ca. recently made cover the Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) paid property taxes of more than \$205 million this fall to the 50 counties where the utility owns property and operates gas and electric infrastructure that serves 16 million Californians. The semi-annual property tax payments

period from July 1 to December 31, 2016. Total payments for the full tax year of July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017 is estimated to total more than \$410 million—an increase of \$25 million, or 6.5 percent, compared with the prior fiscal year. First installment

property taxes recently paid to North State counties by Dec. 12 Colusa, \$4,228,853, (up \$15,411, or 4 percent); Nevada, \$1,087,886; Sutter, \$1,151,431 (up \$44,257 or 4 percent); and Yuba, \$1,026,932 (down \$43,545 or 4 percent). One example of the many infrastructure in-

vestments PG&E has made locally was the completion of the Willows Service Center, a utility work center and warehouse in Glenn County. Work on the center was completed last spring.

“Property tax payments are one of the many important ways PG&E helps drive local

economies and support essential public services like education and public safety. This year's higher payments reflect the substantial local investments we are making in our gas and electric infrastructure to create one of the safest and most reliable utility systems in the country,” said Jason Wells, se-

nior vice president and chief financial officer for PG&E.

PG&E invested more than \$5.5 billion last year and expects to invest \$5.6 billion this year to enhance and upgrade its gas and electrical infrastructure across Northern and Central California.

Trump Rally is for real

Mom and Pop conservative investors may have received a nasty pre-Christmas present in the form of lower portfolio balances. Although pre-market indicators of market direction looked horrific on election night, the day the market opened on November 9th the market took off and has barely missed an upbeat. The most commonly watched indicator, the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DOW) climbed steadily over 19,000 for the first time ever and closed out the month there. This month end close is a significant indicator to some technical analysts and indeed an obvious indicator to many that the Trump rally at least for now is for real.

Not all stocks rose in value however as is the

case with market rallies and a handful of sectors reacted in the opposite direction and some sectors fell with relatively shocking speed and percentage. Technology sold off hard while defense and infrastructure soared.

Where the conservative investor got hammered is in the fixed income markets. Fixed income refers to things like corporate bonds, treasuries, municipal bonds, utilities, preferred stocks and just about anything else that pays a fixed interest rate or perceived as doing so.

This area of investment is generally thought of as more stable way to play the markets due to their fixed promise to pay out income in the form of dividends or interest and many conservative investors have been told these types of investment are less volatile than traditional stock holdings. As such, older investors or those with less risk tolerance usually hold a large percentage of fixed income in their portfolios.

Fast forward to the Trump rally and a wake-up call of sorts as to how markets can operate shocked many an investor. With a sudden spike in interest rates on November which continued during the following weeks, fixed income assets basically got creamed.

From CBC News: Bank of Montreal economist Benjamin Reitzes said Monday: "The price on 30-year Treasury bonds fell nearly five per cent on Wednesday, erasing two full years of coupon payments." The article released November 14th went on to say: "The bond market is supposed to be a dull, boring, stable place," said

Colin Lundgren, head of U.S. fixed income at Columbia Threadneedle Investments. "Instead, it's been at the centre of the storm."

An understatement to say the least. Across the board fixed income continued to bleed red in an uncharacteristic freefall that likely put a big dent in conservative portfolios likely causing many a phone call to advisors everywhere asking by their clients to explain just what the hell happened to holdings thought to be somewhat immune to such sell offs.

Luckily for fixed income investors, the nature of how fixed income works may be self-correcting. As the price of a fixed income security drops, their yields rise, so investors buying at distressed prices will get higher yields as prices continue to fall. This type of slingshot of rates versus prices can entice new buyers into a falling market and at some point yields get too juicy for new investors to resist. This is not to say prices can't keep falling. They can.

No one knows just when prices on fixed income might stabilize but for now the steep plunge witnessed seems to have at least slowed for now. But the damage has been done. Apparently the market perceived a Trump presidency as one which will let rates rise, a comment Trump himself indicated when he said during the first presidential debates "because of record low interest rates from the Fed, the country's economy is in a big, fat, ugly bubble....."

One might draw the conclusion and the market apparently did, that Trump believes low rates are a scourge to the economy that should be corrected, which means allowing rates to rise. When rates rise, fixed income goes in the opposite direction, and for now that direction is causing angst for many an investor.

As in most drastic markets movements however, selling into a panic is a practice that should be carefully analyzed before undertaking. Sometimes the market overreacts and throws babies out with the proverbial bath water. Patience may be the order of the day.

Open to Debate

How William F. Buckley Put Liberal America on the Firing Line

A unique and compelling portrait of William F. Buckley as the champion of conservative ideas in an age of liberal dominance, taking on the smartest adversaries he could find while single-handedly reinventing the role of public intellectual in the network television era.

When Firing Line premiered on American television in 1966, just two years after Barry Goldwater's devastating defeat, liberalism was ascendant. Though the left seemed to have decisively won the hearts and minds of the electorate, the show's creator and host, William F. Buckley—relishing his role as a public contrarian—made the case for conservative ideas, believing that his

side would ultimately win because its arguments were better. As the founder of the right's flagship journal, National Review, Buckley spoke to likeminded readers. With Firing Line, he reached beyond conservative enclaves, engaging millions of Americans across the political spectrum.

Each week on Firing Line, Buckley and his guests—the cream of America's intellectual class, such as Tom Wolfe, Noam Chomsky, Norman Mailer, Henry Kissinger, and Milton Friedman—debated the urgent issues of the day, bringing politics, culture, and economics into American living rooms as never before. Buckley himself was an exemplary host; he never appealed to emotion and prejudice;

he engaged his guests with a unique and entertaining combination of principle, wit, fact, a truly fearsome vocabulary, and genuine affection for his adversaries.

Drawing on archival material, interviews and transcripts, Open to Debate provides a richly detailed portrait of this widely respected ideological warrior, showing him in action as never before. Much more than just the story of a television show, Hendershot's book provides a history of American public intellectual life from the 1960s through the 1980s—one of the most contentious eras in our history—and shows how Buckley led the way in drawing America to conservatism during those years.

Food and Farm News

Christmas tree farms face balancing act

As California Christmas tree farmers work to rebuild their inventories after years of drought, they're balancing that with trying to satisfy their customers. Some farms that typically allow people to cut their own trees are doing the cutting instead, to avoid overharvesting their properties. Other farms have closed early. The California Christmas Tree Association says fewer pre-cut trees from the Pacific Northwest have been coming into the state, as well.

Almond byproducts find new uses

Growing almonds produces more than the nuts themselves. Almond trees also produce the hulls and shells around the kernels--and researchers say they're finding new uses for those "coproducts." The Almond Board of California says materials created from hulls and shells show potential in

cosmetics, foods, pharmaceuticals and plastics. For example, the board said almond shells could be used to create a product suitable for strong, biodegradable plastics.

Projects battle invading pests, diseases

Efforts to combat invasive agricultural pests and diseases in California received a boost Tuesday, from grants announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Thirty-six projects in California will share nearly \$12 million in funding from USDA. Projects supported by the grants include a "detector dog" program to sniff out smuggled agricultural

products in packages, and an early-detection system for honeybee pests.

Radar tracks waterfowl to protect poultry

People are used to looking at weather-radar maps, but how about bird radar? A team of researchers is testing radar to track waterfowl populations in the Central Valley, to alert poultry producers of bird-migration patterns. The system uses the same radar as in weather observation. Because wild birds can carry disease to domestic poultry, researchers say the radar tracking could help farmers monitor waterfowl locations.

There are many ways to enjoy an old tractor. The joy of pulling one out of the blackberries or a tulle infected ditch and turning it into a beautiful piece of art is a special feeling. Showing it to a crowd during a parade and seeing thumbs up and smiles as you go by is unique. Driving a country lane in line with a bunch of friends and seeing what most people don't see at 60 mph is eye opening. Square dancing at the local county fair with a standing ovation from the crowd can make your heart smile. A special joy for me is to share my hobby with my Grandsons and playing "Grandpa" to the many people who come to my farm. I have quite a few who ask about my collection. Young and old alike of all ages and sex want to go for a ride. Some want to learn to drive a vintage tractor. The initial stress and anxiety look quickly becomes a smile. The "Wows and Thank you

Rod" is a bounty as great as any chest of silver. The reward is them wearing a John Deere or Farmall hat the next time they come.

I restored a Farmall BN and made it a side by side seating and included a platform for my wheel chair bound grandson. I soon learned is was a good use to accommodate the need for these requests. BNs are not common, however the extra wide rear assembly was ideal for side by side seating. Awhile back, I had a man with some mental needs who had not driven anything in his 47 years of life drive the tractor, I was glad I had installed a kill switch in the middle of the seats. His mother was quite ambivalent when I suggested she let me teach him how to drive the tractor, but the smile of his successful experience has become one of my treasures in life.

I began to wonder how I could achieve a similar



goal with another tractor. My daughter was visiting a friend in Kansas and sent me a picture of a side by side seated Farmall Cub. The creative juices began flowing and I came up with an idea for a Farmall A which are quite plentiful and not too expensive.

I removed the left rear hub assembly and installed the housing and axel from the right side on a parts A on the left side and reattached the hub to the external extension. This achieved the ability to install a 44 inch wide bench seat. Seating for two and in some cases three became a reality. I added some features that have since become useful. Steps and hand holds made mounting easier. Including drink cup holders from three inch muffler pipe enhanced the touch on parades and long drives. Constructing a cover with a surrey fringe makes 4th of July Parades more enjoyable. Converting the starting system to push button style with a handy kill switch increases the safety factor. Mounting a fire extinguisher seemed

wise. Adding a box for tools and a tow strap could come in handy in case of a breakdown. The crowning diamond of the treasure chest is a small computerized music box with keyboard with lots of buttons to push. Kids love to push buttons! Flag holders were added for patriotic purposes.

Needless to say, when I showed up at the first parade the purists and curious took a second look!

Playing Grandpa with my own and with others is a great pleasure. Recently, at the Loomis Pre-Thanksgiving Day Parade while waiting for the parade to end, I gave a bunch of rides to the young at the end of the parade crowd. The other tractors had to wait to return to their trailers while I was able to capitalize on the gold of the little ones and their Moms riding on an old tractor! It made their day.

I am now started on a Cub just to see if it can be done to this model. May my vision be my bounty, peace and happiness the reward. I would lie to extend my apology to Briggs from KKC. In a recent article I misspelled his name. I have known him for years and I made an error. KKC is a stellar organization and provides much community support. Briggs does a great of parade announcing.

I then stayed in a motel for just a night. The next morning I wasn't sure what I was going to do but I was aware of just one fact. I was on my way to being homeless in Hollywood because I was nearly out of money. So, I went to a church nearby and found out that the janitor who had come to Hollywood from Chile was on a six month visa and was looking for a roommate. He took me in that very night. It was amazing.

The very next morning I went out to my car and

lo and behold, someone had done me a favor. They hotwired my car and stole it. Welcome to Hollywood. This left me with a few dollars in my pocket and a guitar which I had taken into the apartment the night before. I wasn't sure of what I was going to do next, and all I did for a few weeks was walk down to a nearby park and write songs. People would stop by and listen to all of the new material I was writing and this was truly comforting. One day while I was walking back to my place where I was staying I saw my car parked along the curb. I took a double take. Yes, it was my car, and thankfully, I had the keys in my pocket. I happily walked up to it and drove it away.

Now I began pursuing my music dream. I called a noted Hollywood producer to see if he was interested in listening to my songs but he told me that he was getting out of the business of producing artists. Hello! I then shifted gears and went to Columbia Records with a tape that I had made and dropped it off. A few days later I called to see if they were interested and the person said no. As time went along I wasn't finding any takers.

In the meantime I landed a really good job in L.A. and began making a lot of money with a company called Liberty Electronics. It wasn't long after that when I purchased my first 12 string guitar. I started writing a lot more songs after that and I ended

up doing a music set at a party that was held by the company that I worked for. Everything started looking positive and I was now part of a group that nearly got to play music in a Hollywood movie.

But then there was the day when I decided to look around in a gift store. I set my eyes on a fine collection of beautiful prints that had been sketched in color with pen and ink. Among these photos, which had been drawn years ago by the noted German artist Sulamith Wulfiing who survived the internment camps during W.W.II, was the most beautiful drawing I had ever seen. It was an incredible picture of the Christ child being taken down from heaven to earth by angels. I was so taken by the splendor of this I decided right then that if an artist could make such an impact upon me with that kind of talent, then I too would use whatever talent and songs that God bestowed upon me for his purpose. It was then that I decided to dedicate all of the music that I would ever write to God.

It was only a few days after this that I wrote a song reflecting on that drawing of the Christ child. I named the song "Birth of the Son." God was so pleased with what I had done that he gave me a fantastic dream a few nights later. In the dream I heard a magnificent choir of angels actually singing the song that I had written, "Birth of the Son", but it was being incredibly done in

the round with the most perfect angel voice harmonies and a sound unlike anything I had ever heard on earth.
