Sutter DA Office Renewal

For years, gang shootings occurred primarily on the Sutter County side of the river. Gang members figured they would face less severe consequences for their crimes. Relations between the District Attorney's (DA) office and law enforcement were not harmonious, benefitting criminals.

Crime victims felt abandoned as Victim Witness (VW) funds were siphoned-off by DA Carl Adams for his department. A token VW staff often left an office vacant to attend court hearings while Yuba County had 5 times the workers.

In October 2013, longtime DA Carl Adams announced his 'retirement' after admitting to an affair with an 'escort' given immunity for her role in the 2010 murder of one of her clients, a local medical doctor.

California Office of Emergency Services would then audit Victim Witness funds after whistleblower Elizabeth Pollard reported a culture of misappropriation of state grants. Pollard then received a settlement for a sexual harassment suit against Adams after being intimidated and fired for providing evidence to the state.

Department attorneys in extra-marital affairs with other county employees and using office computers to play Dungeons and Dragons, this was not your model DA office doing the people's business.

When current DA Amanda Hopper took over on January 1, 2015, the office was divided between Adams and Hopper supporters. When there is a new department leader, the employees cannot be changed unless there is cause for termination. Hopper inherited the existing staff.

However, in spite of Hopper starting with a tense office laden with immorality, dishonesty, poor morale, a spotty work ethic and a token VW department, there are signs of renewal today.

Young focused attorneys have been hired replacing others who moved on. New investigators have been recruited by Chief Investigator Jason Parker. The DA 'detectives' led numerous agencies in a successful sting of 40 men seeking sex with minor girls 9, 13 and 14 years of age.

Recently, the DA's office submitted a peremptory challenge to Judge Brian Aronson handling a November 28 sentencing on an attempted rape case. This was after Aronson rendered a 'Brock Turner' style 60-day sentence for felony sexual battery. Already considered by law enforcement as weak on criminals, Aronson removed himself from the Nov 28 case.

The next week, DA investigators arrested a mother and son for murder. There appears to be a new DA's office in town.

A respected Tony Kildare has been secured to rebuild the VW unit. Two more victim advocates have been hired to join two other workers plus volunteers. The objective is to have a full-service office to assist victims. Other workers with different skill-sets may soon be brought aboard. VW is moving across from the courts on Civic Center Blvd.

When Hopper was asked about the revenue to fund the VW expansion, she indicated there is plenty of money when it is not misappropriated.

The DA's office has created controversy in county government by exposing a broken General Services Department and an ineffective County Administrator. Former CAO Jim Arkens hired Megan Greve to run General Services and then took over county purchases.

lots that may have coffee spilled on them or other foreign matter and take longer to process. This year many of the mail in ballots that would normally come in before the actual election date were dropped off at polling places on election day, creating a larger than normal amount to process.

It is likely that this election will be very close and the losing candidate will have five days to request a recount at a cost to be determined.

In the primary two incumbent Supervisors lost and one Yuba County Water Agency Director (YCWAD). Since the Board of Supervisors also serve on the water agency potentially the Board of Supervisors could lose three of the five incumbent supervisors and four out of seven incumbent YCWAD's. This can



be seen as a parallel to 1994 Presidential election where Ross Perot as a third party presidential candidate ran on "Sweeping out the Barn" "Throw the bums out" in this perfect storm 60% of all incumbent supervisors in California lost. Ed Rollins was Ross Perot's campaign manager and is President-Elect Trump's Strategist.

PG&E Announces Applications For At Least 170 Scholarships

San Francisco, Ca. Applications for scholarships from employee associations at Pacific Gas and Electric Company are now being accepted for college-bound high school as well as current college

and continuing students. The awards from the company's employee resource groups (ERGs) will mean that at least 170 students in PG&E's Northern and Central California service area will receive from

\$1,000 to \$10,000 next year for exemplary scholastic achievement and community leadership.

Reports from the Rio Vista area tell us the striped bass are on the bite along with sturgeon becoming active. The current storm under way will only improve the fishing as more fish move into the system from the massive delta waters. We were told the best bait was shad and/or grass shrimp with pile worms a second choice.

What always amaze me are the reports we get in regard to salmon being caught at Red Bluff. It is a fact that the fish must pass through the Sacramento Area on their way up the Sacramento River to spawn. So in reality, whatever the numbers, the fish are all over the system stretching from the Delta to below Shasta Dam.

The trout action at Collins Lake has improved considerably with the current cold front dropping the water temperature. In addition, the reservoir has fresh trout, which were planted recently and will be the last plant this year. These are nice sized fish and should give anglers lots of action over the Thanksgiving Holiday.

Trout fishing at Englebright Reservoir (known as the Narrows to us old folks) has picked up nicely and has produced fish for bank anglers and boats trolling along the shorelines. Best bet for bank anglers is near the launch ramps.

French Meadows has been good for rainbow trout trolling with a night crawler and flashers. Some nice browns have also been caught trolling rapalas or other lures

which imitate a small trout.

Bass are hitting at the Oroville Thermalito After bay. Best bet is to launch in the afternoon when the water is warmer. (The ramp is re-opened) Swim-baits seem to be the best lures at this time.

We hear from the Sacramento River near Colusa. Anglers are scoring on striped bass using various

lures, including bombers. Catfish are also being taken near Knights Landing using chicken livers, pile worms and night crawlers.

We wish all a Happy Thanksgiving filled with warm thoughts, good food and fellowship.

Doctor Strange

Yuba Feather Museum Celebrates Hometown Christmas

John Deere led the charge in providing a small tractor for the small farm using a two horse team with replacement animals. It took about 20 percent of the farm to provide food for the beasts. However, the farmer did not have to go to town for fuel or parts.

By 1937, the worst of the Depression was behind us. The Hindenburg had burned, Model A's were common, the Model B Ford was in replacement mode, and a more positive climate was developing. John Deere began their R and D effort in 1936. The target was a one 12inch plow tractor for the small farm using a team of horses or mules. A low cost was very important. They decided a vertical engine would improve vision as well as an off-set design. Off the shelf parts would reduce costs. Simplicity of operation was a focus. If one could drive a Model A Ford, they could drive

a tractor. Income from the extra farm production would come forth to cover the money required for purchase.

The first in the line was the Model Y and about 24 were produced. All but one was recalled and destroyed. The unit used a Novo motor, a Model A transmission, and a Model A steering box.

The summer of 1937 saw the 62 in production. Perhaps 78 were manufactured and sold quickly. The 62 used a Hercules NXA engine. Later, the NXB was used and the John Deere motor began in 1940. The Unstyled L was mostly built in 1937. Improvements were made along the way and would continue until the line ended in 1946.

The Hercules era produced 9.06 hp on the drawbar and 10.42 on the belt/pto. Maximum pull of about 1,235 pounds was claimed. The three speed transmission evolved from the Model A to a side

configured unit. A John Deere L weighed approximately 1,570 pounds. The Baby JD sold for about \$477 and grew to \$516 by 1946. The John Deere engine era lasted from 1940 to 1946, Ls and LAs were manufactured at the same time with the L ending in 1945. The Hercules can be easily identified by a vertical oil spout and the JD engine has a canted spout. The other quickly noticed difference is rear wheels. These tractors produced about 13.10 hp at the drawbar and 14.34 at the belt/pto. They weighed in the range of 2,285 lbs and costs were close to \$577. The LA was most popular because of the improvements and the nearly 25 per cent boost in power.

The 62 can be recognized by the JD logo at the bottom of the radiator. Dreyfus was hired by JD in 1939. He redesigned the tractor and the NXB was installed. The lineage of the small tractor was the Y, 62, Unstyled L, the L, and the LA. About 3,263 High Clearance were produced, but were not called Hi-Crop. A Low Clearance was also manufactured. An Industrial was made, and only later was it called the LI. The L series are popular today as parade tractors. They are small, light, can be easily hauled, and fit in a garage in a cull de sac.

The L series were an important development in agricultural history. They were a significant catalyst to other companies: Farmall Cub, Massey Harris Pony, Allis Chalmers G, Oliver 44etc.

They sound great and are fun to drive.

ing for all departments. It's been a disaster.

Hopper describes centralized purchasing as cumbersome, wasteful, inaccurate and expensive. Though not giving-up names she said numerous department heads want out of the process.

Hopper told supervisors on October 25 that when she took office there were no plans in place by the county to move her department with the courts. Further, there were no arrangements to acquire county cars to carry attorneys, investigators and office staff back and forth to court. Two years and thirty meetings produced nothing but a massive waste of money.

Finally, after used vehicles were purchased from Yuba City dealerships, saving thousands of dollars, it was difficult to get checks cut by General Services. Previously, county purchasing had no mechanism for even doing auto business locally.

Hopper's mission to reform the DA and VW offices is uncovering costly county departments that produce few results except for some ire directed the DA's way. However, Hopper and associates are winning friends in the community faster than they are losing them in county government.

A Wheatland High School bus driver was placed on leave from his job according to parents, though district officials aren't talking. School Superintendent Vic Ramos confirmed they were addressing a personnel issue but would not provide any further information citing confidentiality to protect their employee.

A call to Board President Justin Guzman went unanswered. And, a message left for the Wheatland Police shift sergeant also generated no response.

Parents believe a male

bus driver was texting a female student. Other stories include the driver was caught with the student. Some parents heard that following a meeting with district officials the driver resigned.

The driver is active in youth sports. If he resigned and if there is no arrest and conviction he will remain eligible to coach / referee / umpire youth sports.

Although parents are mandated by law to send their children to school with many students using the schools buses, par-

ents must rely on rumors when suspecting their children may be at risk. Being exhorted to trust school officials to protect children is no comfort when no one is talking. And, if there is no arrest and conviction the person of concern could still have interaction with students.

Wheatland High buses serve Wheatland, Plumas Lake and Beale Air Force Base families. Union-designed rules protecting employees put children at risk and leave parents uninformed and angry.

He also stated, "If you rent property you do not participate in any portion of this." That is absolutely not true. Perhaps Supervisor Vasquez is not aware, if the Ground Water Fairness Act had been in affect during years 2013, 2014, and 2015, the \$84,942,052 in revenues generated by water sales would have been shared with these below listed agencies. This revenue would have been discretionary funds that could be used for public safety, water delivery, infrastructure repair, etc.

Report analyzes farm issues before new administration

Issues awaiting the incoming Trump administration include those affecting food and agriculture. A report from bank analysts says agricultural markets may be affected in the short term by postelection volatility in currency exchange rates. In the longer term, the Rabobank report says, analysts will focus on the new administration's policies on trade, labor, business regulations and the rewriting of federal farm policy.

Farmers anticipate farm-policy discussions

The periodic revision of federal farm policy is due in 2018, but farm organizations say they want to begin the dis-

cussions next year. An American Farm Bureau economist says farmers and ranchers want an early start to farm-bill negotiations. Farm Bureau has been gathering information and advice from members around the country. The farm bill includes nutrition programs as well as conservation, research and other programs affecting agricultural and rural life.

How much time do you expect to spend preparing meals today? The average is 37 minutes, according to a survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The survey says about three-quarters of women identify themselves as the usual meal preparer in their

households--and they spent an average of 60 minutes on meal preparation. Men who identified as the usual meal preparer spent an average of 32 minutes on the task.

More people report buying specialty foods

The millennial generation is helping to spur growth in sales of specialty foods, according to an annual survey. The Specialty Foods Association says millennials purchase the widest range of specialty foods, using the most diverse retail channels. Among all ages, 60 percent of people responding to the survey said they bought a specialty food or beverage in the previous six months, an increase from 47 percent the previous year.
