Election Observations - Commentary

Though county clerks are still sorting votes most outcomes are certain. The densely populated centers of California bucked national voting trends that elected Donald Trump.

Californians (61.6%) overall wanted Hillary Clinton. She led in 32 counties and Donald Trump dominated 26.

Of the 26 Trump-leaning counties, 17 have filed declarations to join the State of Jefferson. Four Jefferson counties tipped to Clinton. Jefferson has declarations from 21 counties in all.

By the percentages, Clinton-leaning counties are more liberaldominated than the Jefferson Trump counties are conservative. San Francisco County voted 85.3% for Clinton while 71.9% of Lassen County residents wanted Trump. Of course, San Francisco County also has nearly 25 times the population as Lassen.

Most of the Trump counties were in the sparsely inhabited far north compared to the state's heavily populated southern counties. The top ten populated counties (1 million or more) all went to Clinton. San Francisco and San Mateo counties, both in the Bay Area also went 85.3% and 76.3% for Clinton and are not included in the ten counties above.

If the 21 Jefferson counties were a state their Electoral College votes would have been in the Trump column with fewer California votes going to Clinton. So, the proposed 51st State of Jefferson would have bolstered Trump's win.

The election showed that Californians' take on crime is fickle. There has been a death penalty for years but few sentenced to death are killed. Convicts use a generous appeals process to survive and die by natural causes. Too bad their victims missed that benefit.

So, voters said they wanted to keep the death penalty by rejecting Prop 62 to repeal it. And, it looks like they passed Prop 66 to modify the appeals process making it easier to kill those who earn the death penalty, thereby affecting 750 inmates on death row.

However, don't hold your breath until the next execution. There have been just 13 since the 1970s.

These same death penalty voters ignored the warning of district attorneys and law enforcement to pass Prop 57 allowing violent, dangerous and adult career criminals out of prison early. They also passed Prop 63 adding more regulations to buy guns and ammo.

Many counties fail to properly fund law enforcement due to outrageous health and pension costs and unfunded debt. Releasing more criminals could be the tipping point to put the public and officers at serious risk.

Californians act like they are more and more comfortable cohabitating with rapists, sex traffickers, perverts, arsonists and abusers of the elderly. By disarming themselves maybe citizens plan to offer perpetrators a scolding rather than a bullet.



Voters are suckers for pitches to raise taxes on their "neighbors" who have a habit or lifestyle they envy or feel self-righteously put-off by.

So, nonsmokers have stuck it to smokers again by adding \$2 more in taxes per package of cigarettes (Prop 56). This will make criminals of reputable citizens who smoke and resort to black market cigarettes trucked in from other states or nations. Cigarettes can be purchased in Vietnam for 80 cents per pack.

Most voters pay little or no state income taxes. The majority are for sucker-punching those who already pay 77.2% of all state taxes. People filing single are assessed a 1% increase to 10.3% on income over \$250,000. And, there is a 3 percentage point increase on earnings over \$500,000 to 12.3% (Prop 55.) Those who pay the bulk of all state taxes are the most able to move out of state to avoid the highest state taxes in the nation.

Then there are the renters who voted for billions of dollars in school bonds (Prop 51, D, Q, X) that will be assessed on property even though the owner may have no children in school and maybe never had children at all. Renters and voters living rent-free with parents escape the bond assessments.

Finally, Prop 64 legalizing recreational marijuana use rips off ill people who have found relief in the medical attributes of cannabis. This proposition egregiously taxes all marijuana at every step of the process, cultivating to sales. Medicinal users should get the product they need cheap and tax – free. Politicians show themselves spiteful and uncaring in ripping off the afflicted. They should be ashamed and amend the law.



Fishing for Pyramid Cutthroat Trout

Reservations are not necessary to attend the breakfast, but attendees are encouraged to arrive by 7:00 a.m. for a good seat.

What does Pro Fishing Guide Captain Michael Peckham do on his days off when not guiding on the Delta and Central Valley Rivers? As owner of MJP River Adventures & Guide Service, he takes buddies with him to fish for the spectacular Lahontan cutthroat Trout on Pyramid Lake, Nevada. Rooster Tails Fishing Club Member and a well-respected California guide, Micheal has taken the easy drive from the Auburn area to Pyramid Lake for many years. By not serving as a Pyramid guide, Michael has taken his time to leisurely experiment with a variety of both off-the-shelf as well as unique trout lures. Relying on his custom Rogue Jet Boat that is equipped with state-of-art electronics, he has perfected effective lure presentation speeds and an effective strategy to target trophy trout.




As owner of MJP River Adventures & Guide Service, Michael takes buddies with him to fish for the spectacular Lahontan cutthroat Trout on Pyramid Lake, Nevada, the home of the largest Cutthroat Trout in the world. These massive Lahontan Cutthroat Trout grow to fantastic sizes up to and over 20 pounds in the high alkali waters of Pyramid Lake. The PH at Pyramid measures over 8.5 on the scale. The staple food source for these monster fish are the Cui Chubs. Along with the giant cutthroat, the lake supports the rare Cui-ui fish that is found nowhere else on Earth except at Pyramid Lake. As part of his seminar, Michael has invited select tackle manufacturers to display Pyramid related lures for breakfast attendees to examine firsthand. Pyramid is a desert lake located approximately 30 miles northeast of Sparks Nevada. The lake is fed from Lake Tahoe via the Truckee River. Pyramid Lake is the last remaining water from the ancient Lahontan Sea of over 15,000 years ago. Pyramid has no outlet and the water levels go down with evaporation. The native people of the area are the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe. They inhabited the land for centuries prior to the arrival of John Fremont in 1844. The Paiutes lived off of the wildlife in the area eating the Cui-ui and the Cutthroat. Pyramid Lake is located on the Paiute Reservation and is governed by the Tribe. Unlike other fisheries, Michael will explain the lake's fishing regulations, permits, and slot limits, and other guidelines for enjoying your time fishing Pyramid Lake.

The 30 year old, 200+ members Rooster Tails Fishing Club of Northern California, Inc. is a non-profit organization that meets the third Friday of each month to educate, entertain, and enhance fishing experience. From what we have learned from Sacramento the trout plant program has mostly been moved to Southern California, with the exception of the Bay area. We remind you that both Collins Lake and Englebright Reservoir release their own trout from private holding pens.

Up Eagle Lake way the trout are cooperating with trollers. Apparently the best area is near Pelican Point. Fish are being brought to the net in the two to four pound range and are excellent fighters. The fish are hanging out in 8 to 10 feet of water.

With turkey day just around the corner it reminds us that the holidays suddenly are upon us. Fishing will slow down considerably in the coming months. A good bet now or in the next couple of weeks is to travel down to the Delta for some striper action, along with salmon as well. Also, keep in mind

that the sturgeon are on the bite down there. However with the "summer like daytime weather" I am sure it has slowed down the transition of fish changes throughout the golden state.

We checked with our weather source and he advised to expect the warming trend we are now into to go away next week (Tuesday or Wednesday) and bring cooler weather, including some cold nights and mornings. He predicts to

expect temperatures to drop into daytime 60's and nighttime 40's. If he is right this will change our weather considerably and make it feel like November is supposed to be instead of the warm days we have been experiencing.



Animal Disaster Assistance Drill

Yuba Sutter Domestic Animal Disaster Assistance recently conducted their annual shelter drill in conjunction with the Great California Shakeout Exercise on Sunday, October 30th. YSDADA, as it is known, is a local non-profit 301(c)(3) organization whose mission is to shelter companion animals in the event of a declared disaster. The drill was held in the parking lot of the Wilson Sports Complex due to the recent wet weather. Volunteers set up housing for dogs owned by other volunteers and a table top exercise with cats was set up in the Command Center Trailer. Communications within the shelter and with outside agencies and organizations was conducted by local Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES) volunteers.

YSDADA encourages all pet and livestock owners to be prepared in the event of a disaster to evacuate with their animals or make arrangements to lodge them elsewhere. The organization maintains a Resource List of ranches in the Yuba foothills where large animals could be sheltered in a disaster. Consult the website (www.ysdada.org) to find an Emergency Packing List for pet owners or to obtain more information about the organization. Information is also available on the Facebook page.



Cattle ranchers report improved pastures

One factor has improved for California cattle ranchers, but other factors point to continued tough times. Above-average rainfall in October helped pastures in Northern and Central California in particular. While welcoming the rainfall, ranchers say more will be needed to assure both plentiful grass and water for their

animals. Meanwhile, cattle markets remain depressed by large supplies of beef and other meats. Commission says groves produced a "nice-sized crop" in 2016, but volumes may drop by half next year. Growers say avocado trees tend to bear lighter crops in alternate years, but that weather and other factors may cut production more than usual.

#### Researchers report progress against avocado pest

There's a new way to combat a tree disease that has killed avocado trees in Florida and could cause severe losses if it reached California. The disease, laurel wilt, can be spread by an invasive pest called the "redbay ambrosia beetle." Now, researchers have learned how to detect and control the beetle. They developed a moreeffective lure to trap the beetles, and have begun producing the lure commercially.

## Tests evaluate new pomegranate varieties

New varieties of pomegranates could eventually arrive on the market, as a result of trials underway in Southern California. A doctoral student at the University of California, Riverside, has planted a dozen pomegranate varieties in both coastal and inland locations, to check their commercial potential. Currently, more than 90 percent of the pomegranates on the market come from one variety, known as the Wonderful.

## Farm Bureau Outlines Issues for New Administration, Congress

Facing urgent issues including water supply, trade, immigration and regulatory reform, the California Farm Bureau Federation said it looks forward to working with the incoming administration of President-elect Donald Trump and with the 115th Congress.

farmers "California and ranchers have seen, on many occasions, how federal government policies can affect their ability to provide food and farm products to customers around the state, nation and world," CFBF President Paul Wenger said. "We will provide the Trump administration and the new Congress with our best advice on how federal policies can benefit the economy and environment in rural California." Wenger noted that President-elect Trump has spoken frequently about both trade and immigration.

"We'll make the case to the Trump administration and the new Congress about how reducing trade barriers benefits the rural economy," he said, "and we'll discuss ways to assure that farmers and ranchers who depend on an immigrant workforce remain able to provide jobs to those who want them."

Wenger said the elections renew hope for reform of estate taxes to assure family farms and ranches can be passed smoothly from one generation to the next, and for appointment of federal judges who administer laws fairly in the

interest of all Americans. He said Farm Bureau will also ask the new administration and Congress to reform regulations that constrict water supplies and place unnecessary burdens on land management.

"Regulations must be flexible enough to encourage continued production of food and farm products while maintaining the stewardship of our land, air and water that farmers and ranchers pursue every day," he said. "For example, the Environmental Protection Agency has overreached with a 'waters of the United States' rule that greatly expands its authority over farmland, and we hope that regulation will now be withdrawn."

Five students from Marysville High School participated recently in the 2016 El Dorado Forestry Challenge, one group of a total of 84 high school students from 13 schools from northern a "Brown's Transect", a California. Students entered the data into a fire behavior computer modeling program to determine optimum conditions under which to conduct a prescribed burn in the project area. During the Challenge, teams of students also completed field training, followed by a field test, to assess their technical forestry knowledge and data collecting skills.

"This competition requires teamwork and critical thinking as students learn about a precious natural resource," said Marysville High School teacher Bonnie Magill. Leilani Chavez, a sophomore at Marysville High School, summed it up as follows: "Overall, it was a great experience, broadening my horizons in agriculture, that forestry is a part of the industry."

# **UNSOLVED HOMICIDE** \$50,000 Reward Offered
