

Draft Horse Classic and Harvest Fair in Grass Valley

Join the beautiful Draft Horses for the 30th annual Draft Horse Classic and Harvest Fair, September 22 – 25, 2016 at the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley. Featuring six performances by the beautiful Draft Horses, this event has grown to become the premiere Draft Horse show in the western United States.

The Classic spotlights a variety of horses, teams, rigs and performances; featuring everything from farm wagons, carriages, and driving competitions to dancing horses and racing mules. The stars of the show are the horses, and with more than 120 horses stabled on the grounds, the Classic offers a unique chance to observe them in a multitude of settings.

In between classes, enjoy showcase specialty acts like Gladius the Show, an acrobatic equestrian production that incorporates aerialists, fire, and Roman riding. There's also the California Cowgirls, chariot and chuck wagon races, and the Bobby Kerr Mustang Act.

Also taking place at the Fairgrounds during the four days of the Classic is the Harvest Fair, which features musical entertainment, a clogging jamboree, food vendors, Art at the Classic, horse shoeing demonstrations, a chance to visit with the horses, and hundreds of community exhibits.

There are six performances featuring the beautiful Draft Horses – Thursday and Friday at 6:30 pm, Saturday at 10 am and 6:30 pm, and Sunday at 10

am and 4 pm – and there are a variety of ticket prices available. Ticket prices are \$19 for reserved seating or \$16 for general admission at the evening and late afternoon performances; \$15 for reserved seating or \$12 at the morning performances; and \$13 for reserved seating or \$10 for children's tickets. YCWA Awards \$300,000 to Local Reclamation Districts

The Yuba County Water Agency last month awarded \$300,000 in grants to three Reclamation Districts (RD 10, RD 2103 and RD 817) to strengthen nearly 30 miles of flood control levees in Yuba County. YCWA's grants will provide the local cost-share for \$1.5 million in construction repairs, and will benefit Yuba County farmers, ranchers and residents.

"Whenever possible, YCWA is willing to support our partners such as these Reclamation Districts," YCWA Chairman Tib Belza stated. Belza added, "Our grants will help these communities strengthen their levees and reduce their flood risk."

Reclamation District 10 includes 12,000 acres of land along the east bank of the Feather River extending from Marysville to the Butte County line. The District maintains levees along Jack Slough on the east and south, the Feather River

on the west, and Honcut Creek on the north. The District is primarily devoted to agriculture, with 31 farms, 13 agriculture-related businesses, and small businesses along Highway 70, which transects the District from north to south. There are about 320 residences within the district with a population of 1,260 people.

The District applied for and was approved grant funding from DWR's Flood System Repair Program (FSRP) to repair 21.7 miles of levee crown gravel patrol roads at an estimated cost of \$1.05 million. DWR's funds will cover 85 percent of the cost for these repairs.

Construction is scheduled to begin this month. YCWA's \$200,000 grant will cover the local cost-share of these repairs.

Reclamation Districts 2103 and 817 maintain a combined 17.4 miles of levee along the Bear River and Dry Creek protecting the City of Wheatland and

surrounding agricultural areas.

RD 2103 is responsible for levees upstream of Oakley Lane and has a jurisdictional area of 4,544 acres. Because the RD 2103 levees are upstream of RD 817 they also provide protection for the 2,200 acres of agricultural lands in RD 817. The two Districts often cooperate in their operation and maintenance activities due to the interconnected protection from the levees.

The Districts applied for and were approved grant funding from DWR's FSRP to repair a combined 8.9 miles of levee crown gravel patrol roads at an estimated cost of \$475,000. RD 2103 is acting as the lead agency and the work includes 3.4 miles in RD 2103 and 5.5 miles in RD 817. FSRP funding provides 85 percent of the funds for these repairs. Construction is scheduled to begin this month. YCWA's \$100,000 grant will cover the local cost-share of this work.

A Morality-Free Society

Conversations about morality are unpopular. They make people uncomfortable. America's take on right and wrong began evolving during the 1960's Sexual and Cultural Revolution.

Today, most folks don't like their values based on the Bible. Most prefer a do-it-yourself designer spirituality, a moral buffet.

The founding fathers didn't believe a nation large on freedom and small on regulations could survive without a self-governing 'religious' people. However, the farther the nation moved from the founding principles and Biblical morality, the more rules and regulation have been used to control and manipulate the citizenry.

Last week, at a Marysville Council candidate forum, incumbent Bill Simmons exhorted the audience to ignore the moral questions when considering establishing two marijuana dispensaries in the city. Both city and county residents twice voted against dispensaries before Simmons led the council to approve them.

Simmons had generated community support for his council appointment by speaking out against the egregious water rates of Cal Water Service and the Measure W 1% sales tax increase. Once sworn in he flip-flopped on both issues.

Some are suspicious of how the Marysville marijuana dispensary zoning was massaged to benefit certain property owners. But then, maybe this is just being hyper-moral.

Last week, Stanford University rapist Scott Turner left jail after 90-days, hampered with 3-years probation and forced to let authorities know where he is living. Santa Clara County Judge Aaron Persky may be recalled for being protective of Turner and his promising athletic / scholastic future.

How wrong is it anyway to sexually assault a no-name 22-year-old female particularly when she is drunk, unconscious and probably a slut per Turner's defense? Do unimportant victims count? Who gets to establish the moral plumb line here?

Sutter County District Attorney's sex sting nearly broke its nets hauling in 35 - 40 men hoping for sex with 9, 13 or 14-year-old girls. If minor girls want it, what difference does it make? That remains to be determined by Sutter County Judge Brian Aronson.

Many of the perpetrators were offering drugs for sex. That offer seems ho-hum today, but there may be more to the drugs and sex connection.

California's Emerald Triangle (Humboldt, Mendocino and Trinity Counties) billion dollar marijuana industry now is gaining notoriety for a flourishing and very profitable sex trafficking movement.

Women believe they are getting hired for trimming work, and then they're drugged and raped," Maryann Hayes Mariani, a coordinator for the North Coast Rape Crisis Team, told Cosmo. "Everybody looks at (the region) like it's the Land of Oz. I'm just so tired of pretending like it's not happening here."

The male dominated industry "prefers to hire female trimmers (known as 'trimmigrants') because they're supposedly more dexterous and thus more efficient workers. But over the past five years, young women have begun emerging from the woods with tales of being forced to give their bosses blow jobs to get paid or are asked to trim topless for wage increases."

Many women have gone missing. In 2015, Humboldt County, population 135,727, reported 352 missing people, more per capita than any other California county. "Humboldt Domestic Violence Services answered more than 2,000 crisis calls last year, an increase of about 80 percent in four years. Executive Director Brenda Bishop attributed the increase to a surge in sexual abuse and trafficking on marijuana grows."

One female trimmer said she could make much more selling her body than her farm skills. Growers reportedly pay up to \$500 / hr. for sex. Elle Snow, a trafficking survivor from the pot industry, posted fake escort advertisements on the classified ad website 'Backpage.' She received over 400 inquiries from interested clients in Humboldt County over two months. Sounds like Sutter County.

"Traffickers call Humboldt County not just green for the weed, but green for the bitches," Snow said, referring to the money that traffickers can make selling women and sex.

Earlier this year, grower and volunteer fire department captain Kailan Meserve became the first in Humboldt County to be charged with raping a 'trimmigrant.' In July, he was found guilty of 15 felony counts, three counts of forcible rape, six counts of forcible oral copulation, false imprisonment, assault by means likely to produce great bodily injury, criminal threats, two counts of sexual battery, and sexual penetration by a foreign object. He was sentenced to 23 years in prison.

Some argue that legalizing marijuana is the same as eliminating prohibition of alcohol. Maybe. Maybe not.

One trend seems clear. A morality-free society is not a happy place unless you're corrupt and in charge.

The “Big One” That Got Away

Let me tell you a story.....A story about fishing the Feather River a couple of years after the 1955 flood. We had decided to try our luck fishing after work on a Friday afternoon. The fishing party consisted of myself, Co-workers Bob and Steve. We arrived at the spot, which was in the vicinity of Mosquito Beach. For those folks who are unaware of this location it is below the Current Yuba City Boat Ramp on the west side of the Feather river. In those days no one had a pickup or boat, so we would be fishing from the bank.

We planned to stay through the evening and into the night so we brought sandwiches and flashlights. Our fishing gear consisted of steel bait casting rods and level wind reels. The poles were telescopic and the reels did not have a drag and each had a heavy piece of leather mounted so it would work as a drag. The idea was to

place your thumb on the leather, apply pressure to the line on the spool to slow down a fighting fish. It worked great most of the time. For bait we all tied a chunk of sardine on our hook.

About sundown Bob got a hit and set the hook. He muttered something under his breath and as I looked over his pole was doubled over. I yelled “Snag?” and he nodded his head in the affirmative movement. Suddenly the snag moved. Bob let out a yell and I could hear the line rubbing against the leather drag setup as the heavy fishing line quickly left his reel. He cursed a couple of times and screamed as the leather got hot and he continued to mutter as his thumb began to hurt from the heat. Suddenly all the action stopped. Steve, wide eyed during the short excitement yelled, “Did he get away?” Bob responded with several obscenities that whatever was on the end of his line was still there. By this time both Steve and I had reeled our lines in to stay out of the way.

Silence fell upon the scene as Bob gritted his teeth, held a tight line with his pole bent over double. It was like watching a television program and hitting the pause button. Suddenly, as if on

cue, the fish moved and headed upstream, turned and headed straight for us. Bob reeled as fast as he could and somehow managed to keep the line fairly tight. Suddenly the fish rolled out of the water about 20 yards in front of him. By this time Bob’s face was flushed and then quickly turned pale white when he saw that huge sturgeon. Steve and I were both speechless and watched the big fish head downstream. The sturgeon never slowed down and spooled Bob’s reel, burning the leather and his thumb in the process. We all got a fantastic view of the monster and figured it was over six feet long.

We stayed until around 10 P.M. and built a campfire, ate our sandwiches and talked into the night about the experience. By around nine o’clock or so the fish had gotten bigger and bigger.

This story was told over and over for years. Bob is gone now, passing away several years ago. I can just see him telling his fish story over and over in the Kingdom of Heaven, to all who will listen, about the big sturgeon that got away that Friday night in March of 1959 on the Feather River.

Be careful out there and don’t forget to take a child on your fishing adventures this year.

Salmon are being caught in both the Feather and Sacramento Rivers. The fish per boat has increased some, but we are still looking for the big run yet to come. We have seen mostly male and Jacks taken. Stripers are still in the system, but are mostly small fish. As the old saying goes, “If you are catching shakers stay put due to larger fish accompanying the little guys.” This was the always the rule when I was invited to fish with my Uncle Tom in the Sacramento River. We caught many “legal” stripers by sticking it out and putting up with small fish. In fact, on one trip, I watched him put a 32 inch female in the net, which he quickly released. Uncle Tom is gone now, passing away a couple of years ago. I certainly hope he is having a great time fishing for all those different species of fish in the Kingdom of Heaven.

As usual, all the trout plants last week went south. As far as lakes and reservoirs go here is a run-down: Bass are being caught at Bullard’s Bar, but you must fish deep, down to as deep as 60 feet; The

trout bite at Englebright is very slow; The catfish at Collins Lake are still hitting a variety of bait with some fish over 10 pounds; Fishing has improved at Scott’s Flat Reservoir since Labor Day Weekend, but the bite is still slow; Lake Almanor reports fishing for brown and rainbow trout has been good on the east side of the lake (East Basin); Fish are being caught at Bucks Lake by trollers using all kinds of different lures; The bite is slow at Jackson Meadows, but a big brown trout was caught last week. The fish was reported to weigh around five pounds.

We hear from Lake Tahoe. Mackinaw Lake Trout are hitting at the North Shore ranging from 3 to 8 pounds and are being caught down 140 feet to 190 feet depending on the time of day. Kelsey Erben who is six years old did not need to fish on a boat or down deep when she caught a beautiful five pound rainbow last month. She landed the fish while fishing at Sawmill Pond near South Lake Tahoe. Kudos, Kelsey!!

Closing thought: “Cell phones bring you closer to the person or things far away from you, but take you away from the person sitting right next to you.”

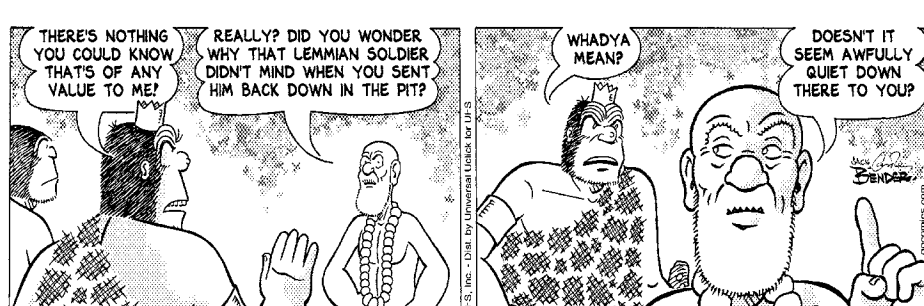

Permits Now Available for Beckwourth Riverfront Park Boat Launch Facility

Annual permits for the Beckwourth Riverfront Park Boat Launch Facility will be available at Marysville City Hall located at 526 “C” Street, Marysville, California, beginning Wednesday, September 14, 2016. Regular office hours are Monday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 1:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. City Hall is closed on Friday. Daily use permits will be available at the boat launch facility beginning on Wednesday, September 14, 2016. Daily launch fees are \$5.00. Annual permits for Marysville residents (inside City limits) are \$50 per year. Annual permits for non-residents are \$100 per year. Reduced fees are available for those who qualify, with the proper documentation. Permits will be required beginning Saturday, October 1, 2016. 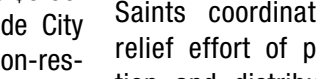

The second day (Saturday) saw good crowds of adults and families enjoying the battles. The hillside overlooking Rosser Arena was filled with spectators taking pictures and visiting the encampments between battles. "The crowd was good but there was a lot going on this weekend that impacted the turnout,



said one of the organizers Ken Freeman. "We are very happy with the response for our first year."

The third day the weather could not have been better, the crowd was smaller than Saturday but the enthusiasm from the spectators was every bit as great.

Mary Aaron Historical Museum

Tours of the Mary Aaron Museum on Saturday and the Civil War re-enactment were fund raisers for the museum and the re-enactors. "The tours of the museum were mostly adult couples. Usually the tours have more families, but it was a good turn out," said Peppie Schrader Museum Curator.

Voter Alert

Norwalk, Ca.

The California Association of Clerks and Election Officials (CACEO) is responding to concerns from voters across the state who may be receiving solicitation mailings erroneously indicating that residents of households are not registered to vote.

The letters are from the Voter Participation Center, a non-profit organization whose published mission is to "register and mobilize the rising American electorate." Some of the mailings are addressed to current registered voters at the address and others are addressed to non-existent residents or to variations of names associated with the residence.

"Whether by accident or otherwise, it is clear that the organization that sent out these mailings used bad data at least in part and failed to compare that data with the existing voter file," said Dean Logan, CACEO President. "As a result, the mailing has caused unnecessary concern and confusion for voters."

The Voter Participation Center indicated to the Secretary of State that more than 4.6 million of the letters were mailed statewide. While some of the letters may have been sent to eligible, but not-registered citizens, the surge in calls to Registrars has indicated clear discrepancies in the data causing confusion and concern for Californians just months before the Presidential Election.

County Registrars urge voters to verify their registration status

prior to Election Day with their local Registrar of Voters office or website. A listing of county resources for verification is available on the California Secretary of State's website at: <http://www.sos.ca.gov/elections/registration-status/>.

Registrars begin mailing Sample Ballots for

the election early next month. Any voter receiving a Sample Ballot can be assured that they are listed as active on the voter file. Only voters who have a change in address or name need re-register prior to the October 24, 2016 voter registration deadline.

2nd in 3 part series on inflation

In first of our three part series on inflation, we covered how inflation devastates income classes because of the simple economic fact that wage increases always lag the increases of prices of the things we buy, putting us farther and farther behind with each passing day we experience inflationary pressures. In today's column we will explain how one particular income class not only avoids the ravages of inflation but actually profits from it.

As the prices of things rise in an inflationary scenario, most income classes see their purchasing power decline, meaning it takes more of your money to buy things, lowering your actual standard of living. Not so for the wealthy.

The very wealthy can afford higher prices as they make so much, who cares if their food or other bills climb a few hundred dollars or even a few thousand? This is basically pocket change to the super rich, if that.

While the low and middle income families struggle with day to day living expenses and have to either cut back or make more money to keep up, the very wealthy, who own many assets see their actual wealth increase. The super-rich own stocks, real estate, indeed entire companies, and I am not talking about those local mom and pop stores on your local street corner. The super-rich own companies such as the huge conglomerates you buy most of your goods and services from.

As inflation raises prices on all things, the value of stocks, real estate and companies (along with most everything else) goes up in prices as well. If a low income person sees a two percent inflation rate, they must cut back or earn two percent more to just tread water.

But if a wealthy in-

dividual owns a 100 million dollar company or piece of real estate and that climbs by two percent because of inflation, in our example, they see an increase in their wealth of two million dollars. Increase the rate of inflation higher and the profits only grow from there.

The equation is a simple one: owning massive amounts of an asset or multiple assets not only protects one against inflation, it increases your wealth at the same rate. The more you own the more you make. The higher the inflation, the higher your wealth goes.

Simply put, the leverage the super-rich have by owning large value assets makes inflation one of their best friends while the rest of the populace winces under the higher prices of the things they must buy to survive.

It's the reason we see investors like Warren Buffet and Carl Icahn (among the many other high wealth individuals) buying entire companies. If they see inflation on the horizon, or know inflation will be government policy (and it is) they only stand to gain from such a policy.

Even those that may not qualify as super-rich but own significant amounts of wealth in the form of real assets like

stocks, real estate or other assets will survive and even prosper from a higher inflation rate.

The problem here is the majority of consumers fall into the lower and middle income classes. This means as inflation progresses, these classes fall further and further behind as those in the upper tiers amass even more wealth.

It's the main reason the rich are getting richer and the poor are getting poorer. Inflation is working its magic, and depending on where you stand in the income strata, this could be a good thing, but for most people, it is very, very bad. That the Federal Reserve targets inflation at a two percent inflation rate (stated in the minutes of every Federal Reserve meeting since the crisis) you have to wonder just whose side they are on.

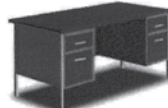

No Increase in Fire Fee

The California Board of Forestry and Fire Protection recently decided against considering an increase of the annual fire prevention fee paid by California residents

living in the designated State Responsibility Area for fire prevention and suppression, also known as the SRA fee.

Last year, Fire Prevention Fee bills were mailed out to more than 800,000 rural Californians, many of whom received that bill for the fourth time. About 17,000 of the bills were sent to Eastern Madera County.

After a report from Acting Executive Officer Matt Dias on the condition of the fund, board members decided that revenues continue to be robust enough to avoid a fee increase for the 2016-17 fiscal year.

The SRA fee, established as part of the 2011-12 State Budget Package, requires owners of habitable structures in the SRA to pay an annual fee to fund state fire prevention services

in the SRA.

The board is required to review the fee annually and make adjustments if necessary, with the current fee rate assessed at \$152.33 annually.

The Rural County Representatives of California (RCRC) has opposed the SRA since its imposition on the grounds that residents outside of the SRA benefit from state fire prevention and firefighting efforts - however, in recent months the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection have been issuing grants from the SRA Fund to local entities for fire prevention efforts that include tree mortality mitigation and other vital activities.

Negotiator stresses benefits of trade agreement

Working to solidify support for a 12-nation trade agreement, a U.S. negotiator says the backing of farmers will be key. In a meeting with California farmers, the chief agricultural negotiator for the U.S. Trade Representative's office said the Trans-Pacific Partnership offers "huge opportunities." The agreement would open foreign markets for agricultural products. Most farm groups

support the TPP, which must be ratified by Congress.

Analysts expect red-meat consumption to rebound

A "noticeable shift" lies ahead for meat consumption in the U.S., according to analysts who predict that Americans will increase their consumption of beef and pork in the coming decade. Higher retail prices for red meat have led to reduced consumption in recent years. But the U.S. Department of Agriculture says beef and pork production will expand steadily in the next 10 years--reducing retail prices and encouraging a rebound in consumption.

Farmers plant wildflowers to help bees

Planting strips of wildflowers along the edges of farm fields can benefit bees and the crops they pollinate. A University of California farm advisor

says strips of flowers provide nectar and habitat for native bees and other pollinators. In a related story, new research from UC Riverside indicates that flowers transmit bacteria to wild bees. The researchers say they believe the bacteria to be beneficial but will study that more closely.

Endowment aims to enhance rice research

Through a public-private partnership, the University of California says it will enhance its commitment to rice research. The university announced plans to create an endowed chair for California-grown rice within UC Cooperative Extension. The researcher will receive a five-year appointment to focus on enhancing California rice production through study of new varieties, water conservation, management of pests and weeds, or other topics

“Heads Up” Yuba Supervisors-Elect

Heads Up Yuba Supervisors-Elect Doug Lofton and Mike Leahy. You blew past Griego and Nicoletti by massive 15% and 19% margins, with Stocker crushed by Randy Fletcher’s 19% margin just 18 months earlier. And planning veteran, Wendy Hartman?

However, Stocker, Griego, and Nicoletti also politicized the staff infrastructure. Please remodel and replace it with transparent public servants. Neither County Counsel nor Planning, deserve any benefit of the doubt. Why?

Stocker, even in defeat, continues (with staff?) to push his political vendettas. Consider his recent printed praise supporting CDSA & Planning Director, Kevin Mallen: Mallen is a “long-term very dedicated, talented and resourceful leader, whom the county is lucky to have.”

Meanwhile, Mallen’s credibility was cut to shreds when Stocker’s own big-gun San Francisco lawyers, unleashed a 20 page legal opinion (warning?) letter calling Mallen’s Development Code Recommendations to the Planning Commission “flatly inconsistent with the General Plan policies” and failing “to comply with State Planning and Zoning Law .”

Stocker’s lawyers further disqualified Mallen and Staff by saying their recommendation “violates the California Environmental Quality Act, and the CEQA Guidelines and Regulations Code. . . rendering it insufficient as an environmental review document.”

Next, Morris-Jones’ Deputy John Vacek, is sent before the Planning Commission, persuaded(?) by Stocker’s lawyers, and advises Planning Commissioners he is summarily removing Mallen’s Recommendation from the agenda due to these issues of inadequacy. Morris-Jones gave no defense of Mallen or Staff, nor could Vacek even support his own action saying, “I really don’t want to make admissions on the record that may be held against us later...” Mallen offered no defense either.

Un-electeds Morris-Jones and Mallen pull down around \$213,000 each, and Vacek \$172,000! How does a poorly informed, 20-page scare letter from San Francisco

stop \$598,000 in salaries Yuba staff in their tracks? Answer: Stocker chose the same law firm that beat Morris-Jones, her staff, and the County on the Magnolia Ranch issue. However, it appears Stocker cherry-picked which “facts” he used to brief them by not mentioning that Staff was putting back ordinance wording that Staff had removed without due process.

Truthfully? Staff’s report is correct and their Development Code recommendations are in compliance with the General Plan, CEQA, and the EIR. It is Stocker, his lawyers, and Morris-Jones’ Office of County Counsel who cannot (or refuse to?) read the General Plan and are wrong.

Morris-Jones’ actions with Stocker, Griego, and others suggest favoritism, potentially unethical and possibly criminal misconduct.

The Grand Jury voted “no confidence” in her management of Yuba’s \$864,801 legal talent pool.

Mallen and Hartman’s actions in 2011, 2012, 2015 and now, deserve review regarding the public trust. More heads could roll.

“An abuse of discretion is established only if the [governing body] has not proceeded in a manner required by law, its decision is not supported by findings, or the findings are not supported by substantial evidence.” (Sequoyah Hills Homeowners Assn. v. City of Oakland (1993) 23 Cal. App.4th 704, 717, 29 Cal.Rptr.2d 182.)

Stocker/Griego’s deceptive Measure T in 2012 was radical liberalism pretending to protect farm lands while stripping farmers of their property rights long protected by previous General Plans and Ordinance Codes.

Morris-Jones “helped” Stocker craft Measure T, according to Stocker’s own public statements. This crafting work seems clearly illegal. Staff time can only be directed by the Board as a whole, and they had already refused to codify “T” in its Resolution form.

But what about radical Measure T’s CEQA and EIR adequacy, and General Plan compliance? Did Supervisors require an impact study back then in 2012, as allowed by law and demanded by opponents?

Answer: Unbeliev-

ably, Morris-Jones, told Supervisors at a July 17, 2012 meeting, “I did inquire of the Planning Department. . .and the impact study is pretty much the EIR. And Planning is of the opinion, and that’s Kevin Mallen and Wendy Hartman, that that study has already been completed as part of the [2030 General Plan] Environmental Impact Report (EIR)...

If you do want that study, and I’m not advising you one way or another. . .because it has already been done.” (Referring to the 2030 Gen. Plan EIR)

So, Morris-Jones had no problem giving Stocker/Griego’s “T” her legal OK. “T” was a departure from the General Plan so radical that it qualified as a controversial “amendment.” She stated no new EIR would be needed, no CEQA review, and she saw no problem with General Plan consistency either. To Morris-Jones in 2012, all of this seemed self-evident.

But in 2016, Morris-Jones’ office seems paralyzed, and unable to OK staff’s list of revisions to the Development Code that is not at amendment levels, but is actually, a correction that brings policy oversights and exclusions from the Code into compliance with General Plan Directive Action NR3.1, and therefore does NOT require additional CEQA or EIR reviews.

Smoking Gun: In 2011, staff, under Board questioning, admitted changes were made without Board approval, creating zoning consistency charts that specifically ignored Directive NR3.1, and incorrectly removed existing ordinance codes protecting grazing land rights.

Isn’t orchestrated subversion of due process abusive, unethical? Even illegal?

The Aftermath of Installing Cellular Antennas/Towers

If Verizon gets to install the antennas in Nevada Cities Historical District the effect could be devastating. It could affect everyone, our City, Historical District, property, businesses, the people who live, work, and shop here, and especially our children.

The law doesn’t allow discrimination against cellular companies so if Verizon gets in all carriers get in. With antennas on rooftops and buildings our Historical District will look like a porcupine. Studies show that properties around cell tower/antenna sites will devalue up to 21%. This opens the City and landlords of antenna sites to lawsuits from property owners. The devaluation around Friar Tucks could exceed \$10,000,000.

People who know they’re Electromagnetically Hypersensitive (EHS) represent approximately 10% of the population, but most people who are affected don’t know they have it yet. This could have a significant impact on businesses. EHS people have a hard time coming

to town now and if this increased microwave radiation impedes their access to town it will open up the City, Landlords and businesses to lawsuits under the American Disabilities Act. This Act protects EHS, on an individual basis, to access the City and stores the same as people confined to wheelchairs. The City and businesses may be forced to accommodate these people by shielding stores and access walkways; restrictions imposed on wi-fi and cellphone use; and cellphone users will be confined to areas similar to what smokers experience today.

This all pales when considering the impact on the health of the people, especially our children. The National Institute of Health’s National toxicology Program, recently published a preliminary report on their two year, \$25 million, rat study, designed to simulate cellphone use, using low level non-thermal microwave radiation. The reported statistics showed that cellphone use causes cancer in a

statistically significant portion of the population. This is a direct link to cancer that can change the liability around health concerns and cellphones, and cellular towers.

Cell tower cluster studies throughout the world show that living within 500 meters of a cell tower increases cancer 300%, along with a myriad of other degenerative conditions. The above study confirms these findings. This is why property values are declining. The cellular companies have been successful in keeping this quiet; but when this becomes common knowledge these properties could become worthless. It’s common scientific knowledge that children are at least two times more vulnerable to this radiation than adults. To make informed choices it’s time to educate yourself on the proliferation of this technology, if you don’t feel it now, you will.

Legislature Votes to Extend Emergency Tax Relief

Sacramento, Ca. Legislation sponsored by Board of Equalization Member George Runner and fellow BOE members cleared the Legislature today when the State Assembly voted unanimously to approve AB 1559.

Authored by Assemblyman Bill Dodd, AB 1559 gives the Board of Equalization authority to extend emergency tax relief by up to three months in the event of a disaster.

"The last thing people need to worry about during a tragedy is taxes," said BOE Member Runner. "This bill will

provide much-needed relief to those who have been affected by the recent fires and other emergencies."

Current law allows the BOE to provide a one-month extension for tax payments, and relieve any late payment penalties. AB 1559 extends that period to up to three months, provided the taxpayer files a request for relief before or within the allotted time frame.

"This bill is good news for taxpayers, especially during this disastrous time. As residents continue to put

their businesses and lives back together after these fires, I want them to know the BOE is here to help," said Chairwoman Fiona Ma. "During this terrible ordeal, BOE is doing everything we can to provide information about tax and fee relief to those affected by these fires."

AB 1559 now heads to the governor's desk. The governor has until September 30 to sign or veto the bill. As an urgency measure, the bill would take effect immediately.

Farmall Cub

Editors note: The August 31st issue had the story about the Farmall Cub but showed a picture of a Farmall BN.

Most of the major tractor manufacturers sought to produce units that fit the diverse needs of the farm. Soil types, weather, climate, water availability, and acreage availability were all factors with which farmers dealt. John Deere produced the L series, Massey Harris made the Pony, Allis Chalmers contributed the G, Oliver presented the 44, and International Harvester manufactured the famous Cub.

These were designed for the small farm that needed a tractor for a variety of tasks .Mowing raking, pulling trailers, plowing, and cultivating garden crops were

among the jobs. The one horse or one mule farm were the targets. Remember, that the highest number of farms in the late 30's and early 40's possessed 40 acres or less. It also took about 20 percent of the farm to produce food for the work animals.

The Farmall Cub was envisioned before WWII, but did not come to market until 1947. Production continued with evolutionary designs until 1981.

A so called "Super Cub was built in St. Dizier, France from 1955 to 1964.

The Cub was first known as the "Farmall X" or the "Baby Farmall". A two cylinder engine was considered for the 2/3 A. They planned to sell the Cub for \$400 while their costs were \$225.It was announced in 1945 and

serial number 501 was the first Cub.

A L Head motor of 1.0L with four cylinders producing 10 HP was the final candidate for power. It was a smooth running engine, somewhat quiet, and the engine was manufactured in house. Horsepower rose to 18 by 1975. It weighed 1477 to 2891 pounds depending on options.

There were about 245,000 Cubs and or variants produced. Base price was \$545.

Woods made a 5 foot for the Cub and it was a big seller.

Most Cubs had the manual lift and hydraulic lift was an option. Extra mounting brackets could be purchased for "Touch Control", or midmounted hydraulics for a forward cultivator.

International Harvester decided to purchase the Curtis Aircraft plant in Louisville, Kentucky and spent about \$55 million to redesign and modify the plant. It was close to the tobacco belt and had 48 acres under roof. Cubs, Super As, and Cs were manufactured at this site.

The Cub immediately became an international favorite. 501 was sold in Wisconsin and numbers 502,503,504,505, and 506 went to Mexico.

The Cub was one of the longer lasting American Manufacturing Models rivaling the Beechcraft Bonanza. In 1975 it was sold as the International Cub and in 1979 the presentation became the New International Cub.

Evolutions of the Cub were the LoBoy, the Cub Cadet, an Industrial in the late 50s, and it was painted red, yellow, and a white demo came on line. A Variant Hi Crop was also available.

It was always a treat when Mr. Jensen or his oldest son would drive their Cub into my Dad's little corner store to buy gas . I never did get to drive but hope was eternal. The large Stahl family pooled their money from prune picking, walnut gathering, and almond shaking with one of those rubber padded handles to buy a Cub. It was certainly with a deep sense of pride for the Stahl family. I let Jim Stahl drive my Cub a few years back and he was practically overcome. What a joy!

IH had other tractors produced in larger numbers, but the little Cub lasted longer and just wouldn't go away.
