Innocent Blood and Poor Priorities News/Commentary by Lou Binninger

Humans have a knack for killing. When investigating a potential homicide, detectives look first to the victim's family for a suspect. They then look elsewhere. Investigations with no resolution become cold-cases.

The first murder recorded in the Bible is Cain killing his brother Abel (Gen 4:8). It is God rather than the siblings' father that confronts Cain. "Your brother's blood cries out to Me from the ground." The blood of the innocent who are murdered speaks to the community, as well.

Deuteronomy 21:1 says if a murder victim is found in a field and the perpetrator is unknown, then the government and spiritual leaders in the nearest city must take responsibility. They are to conduct a detailed ceremony and wash their hands declaring "Our hands did not shed this blood; our eyes did not see it." Then, they ask the Lord not to hold the shedding of innocent blood against the community.

God tells leaders that by doing this they are doing what is what is right in His sight. Although God imparted codes, culture and rules of conduct to the Hebrew people His "way" was a mandate for all humankind. Jewish society was the 'floor model' for living. Maybe community leaders should approach unsolved homicides God's way.

Most jurisdictions of any size have 'cold-case' homicides. They are troubling to the soul of the community and can be a bane to law enforcement, particularly if children are victims. Although closure is a myth, cracking cases is very powerful because not-knowing is tormenting to family and citizens.

The arrests last week of William Harbour and Larry Patterson in the 1973 abduction, rape and shotgun slaying of Doris Derryberry, 13 and Valerie Lane, 12 caused a community-wide gasp and resurgence of grief for two of Olivehurst's most vulnerable citizens.

The reopening of Yuba County's 43-year-old case also raised the level of seriousness felt about nearly 40 men free on bail in Sutter County for attempting to engage girls of 9, 13 and 14- years-of-age for sex. Not all molests and sexual assaults stop there.

Larry Patterson was found guilty of putting a noose around the neck and raping two Chico women three years after the abused middle school girls were found dead along a quiet dirt road. If convicted, it appears Patterson had a taste for raping and killing females.

California Farm Bureau Expresses Deep Disappointment with Signing of Agricultural Overtime Legislation

Paul Wenger, president of the California Farm Bureau Federation, said that the agricultural community is very dismayed that Gov. Jerry Brown has signed the Agricultural Overtime bill, Assembly Bill 1066 (Lorena Gonzalez – D, San Diego).

President Wenger issued the following statement:

"We are extremely disappointed that this legislation was signed into law, as it will be harmful to farm employees, farmers, consumers and the environment. Those who work on California farms will see reduced paychecks and have their lives disrupted as these new worker overtime rules come into play. California consumers will have fewer opportunities to buy California-grown farm products that are produced under the most stringent food safety, employment and environmental rules in the world.

"Legislation such as AB 1066 only works if California consumers buy California farm products and opt not to buy cheaper food products from sources outside of California that do not meet the same labor and environmental stewardship standards that our farm products do.

"It is unfortunate that those who will suffer the economic consequences of this ill-conceived statute are not the ones that wrote it and passed it into law."

Senator Jim Nielsen remarked, "Farm workers will end up working for one farm in the morning, getting back in their cars to drive to another farm to work the afternoon shift. "I am disappointed at the insensitivity to this vital industry. And sadly I say, stay tuned for loss in salary for workers and higher prices for consumers."

Assemblyman Gallagher Responded by saying, "It's the same old story of a government that is out of touch with the reality of living, working, and doing business in California. I wish that the voices of farmers and farm workers would have truly been heard in this discussion. Instead, the ruling party placated to one union group and the chronic and ignorant misconceptions of a few legislators who have no understanding of the industry and its people. If you understand agriculture, you know that this new law will result in lost wages for farm workers. There are no real winners with AB 1066."

The community should be grateful that the evidence in the Derryberry / Lane case was properly maintained. Who knew in 1973 that old evidence combined with new science could lead to suspects?

Detective Karen Howard going on light duty allowed the extra time to work with Diane Tubandt in the homicide department to give new life to the case. An attempt was made years before but the demand of daily calls consumed the detectives' attention.

It should give taxpayers pause when they hear of understaffed law enforcement agencies and district attorney offices. The public is incurring a cost much greater than dollars and cents to go lean on protecting itself.

If Yuba County Sheriff's Department had more personnel could this crime have been solved a decade or more ago? The technology was there. The employees were not.

Sutter County District Attorney (DA) Amanda Hopper got an additional investigator recently to hunt down the types that prey upon the Derryberrys and Lanes of our community. It was not an easy go with a 3-2 vote even after explaining to supervisors that she returned \$330,000 of unused DA monies to the general fund. Supervisors Munger and Whiteaker preferred to further analyze the budget.

The founding fathers intended that the primary purpose of government was to defend against foreign invaders and provide local public safety. That's it. All else is government expansion and social agendas that could be addressed another way if really needed.

God ordained that law enforcement (and the judicial system) keep a lid on the gnarly side of human kind. That should be the priority.

How many programs costing hundreds of thousands and millions of dollars could be ended or departments sent to the private sector to save enough money to properly fund law enforcement? It is something to think about and work on.

In the meantime cold-cases are securely filed away while perpetrators are free to hit-up young girls on social media.

Forest Service Thinning

Project Receives Grant Award

Quincy, CA.

A 340 acre Bucks Lake hazardous fuels reduction project has been selected for \$464,000 in funding by the Sierra Nevada Conservancy Board.

The project includes reducing hazardous fuels on Plumas National Forest (PNF) lands surrounding Bucks Lake to reduce the wildfire risk to residences and water and power infrastructure. The project is the last phase of a multi-contract effort to complete the 1,511 acre Bucks Lake Hazardous Fuels Reduction Project.

According to Daniel Lovato, PNF Supervisor, the project would not have been funded without the efforts, commitment and partnership of a work-

Together the organizations identified & prioritized work that was ready to be implemented on the national forest. "The fruits of these efforts demonstrate the importance of partnerships between the PNF and collaborative groups such as the Feather River Stewardship Coalition," said Lovato.

This is the second grant award that the working group, led by the Feather River Stewardship Coalition, has received this year. In June, another \$465,000 was awarded for approximately 500

acres of fuels reductions on PNF lands surrounding Round Valley Reservoir and Lake Davis to reduce the wildfire risk to municipal watersheds.

The Feather River Stewardship Coalition was initiated by the Plumas County Fire Safe Council using funding recommended by the Plumas Resource Advisory Committee (RAC) and approved by Lovato.

This current award from the Sierra Nevada Conservancy was part of over \$2 million dollars of Proposition 1 funding for various grant proposals that focus on reducing hazardous fuels and improving forest and watershed health across the range of the Sierra Nevada.

Congratulations go out to Ken Moorehead, a resident of Vallejo, who fished Collins Lake last week and caught a huge 14 pound catfish. Other folks also had luck with the whiskerfish, some up to six pounds.

These cool mornings and evenings tells us it is time to start thinking of autumn and the fall season. As most avid anglers know, the big fish become active when the weather cools. They will cruise the shoreline of lakes and reservoirs looking for food in order to fatten up for the upcoming winter months ahead. Yes. this is the beginning of outstanding fishing for larger fish of all species. However, the thought of the brown trout always sinks into my mind.

We have enjoyed many

trips on the water after the big brown trout and have had considerable luck in the past. One memory a long time ago had to do with Lake Oroville. We put the boat in at the dam and immediately began trolling next to the shoreline. Ted and I both had rapala lures without any flashers. We had not gone more than two hundred yards when Ted had a pull down. I netted a beautiful five pound brown and he in turn, about a half hour later, netted another brown for me which weighed in at three and a half pounds. Both fish were taken this time of year early in the morning and both fish were caught next to shore where they were searching for breakfast. On that day we both also managed to put some nice rainbow trout in the cooler, but the two brown trout made it a day to remember.

We will be camping above Chester looking for the elusive deer and also fishing the North Fork of the Feather River. If a friend shows up with his boat we will more than likely fish Lake Almanor as well. Near camp there is a meadow and a spring. Brook trout live here and they are wild and cautious, which makes me want to try my luck and my expertise with the fly rod. Perhaps this year I will

do just that and see if I can fool a native trout into tak-

ing my fly as I did several years ago. Of course, if I am successful a couple of the beauties will be in the frying pan. The rest will be carefully released to fight again. Boots fishing tip of



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

Elected Officials Offer Mediator to Teachers Union, School District

City of Yuba City and Sutter County Officials Offer to for Pay Retired Judge to Help Mediate

Yuba City Mayor John Buckland, Council Member Kash Kill and Sutter County Supervisor Dan Flores have extended an offer to Yuba City Unified School District and the Yuba City Teachers Association for the City of Yuba City to pay for retired Sutter County Judge Thomas Hill to serve as an impartial mediator in contract negotiations in hopes of returning students and teachers to the classroom as quickly as possible. Hill is available immediately to help find a solution to this critical community issue.

"Mediation between both parties can begin immediately, if they accept this offer," Buckland said. "Our goal is see a resolution of this conflict so that students and teachers can return to the classroom."

At the Mayor's invitation, the parties came together for 16 hours on Saturday and Sunday to meet and bargain in good faith, with the elected officials present. The two sides met again Monday night for an additional five hours, but as the teachers strike entered its fourth day today, the City and County representatives realized another step may be needed.

"Children, families, community members, businesses and countless relationships continue to be affected by this impasse," Flores said. "We are hopeful that the teacher's union and school district will accept our offer to have a neutral party to step in and drive productive conversations to bridge their disagreements."

Improvements to Local Transit Center Nearing Completion

Yuba-Sutter Transit will soon be finishing a project to significantly expand covered seating and improve passenger amenities at its North Beale Road Transit Center in Linda. He even went further and analyzed the writings of the Framers, the tax writings of Adam Smith, the ratification debates in the states, and observations by early justices and members of Congress. From this he concluded that it was well understood that "all taxes on real estate or personal property or the rents or income thereof were regarded as direct taxes." Since direct taxes must be apportioned by state population under the Constitution. the 1894 laws attempt to tax income was void.

The Marriage of Agriculture and "Intelligent Growth"

I moved to Yuba City 38 years ago and have lived through many of the changes the Sutter County community has experienced. Observing political campaigns for many decades, not only on the national scene, but here as well, has brought up a question we have probably all asked ourselves. Why would anyone want to run for public office in this day and age with politics most often representing disappointment when it comes to our goals and dreams?

Something has become painfully apparent. The act of falsifying facts for the benefit of slandering an opposing candidate has risen to a highly skilled art form, but not a desirable one. Farmers are being battered with more and more government regulations imposed on them regularly. The costs

of farming have risen to exorbitant highs and many crop prices are currently suffering. We must support our farmers and never lose sight of who grows our food. But can we have "intelligent growth" operating alongside our local agriculture? I think we can and should.

South Sutter County is an attractive area for "Intelligent growth" due to its close proximity to the Sacramento Airport, access to major highways which all intersect, excellent water rights, lack of seismic activity, good weather, and it being a central location for commuters to Roseville, Sacramento, Woodland, and Yuba City. This area is right in the path of growth which is flowing northward from Sacramento towards Sutter County.

When the economy was at its last high point, developers put Measure M on the ballot which asked if the citizens of Sutter County wanted to approve a planned development (Sutter Pointe) that would offer commercial, residential, and industrial zoning. It was approved by Sutter County VOTERS in 2004. Final results showed the advisory question winning, 14,087 to 9,777, or 59 percent to 41 percent.

Barbara LeVake does support well-planned development for our county while simultaneously supporting agriculture. Opponents of Barbara are claiming some sort of "unethical behavior" has taken place on her part and that she had something to do with supporting "dirty development" when in fact it was the VOTERS who spoke loud and clear with the passage of Measure M. which is the wonderful part. This is an opportunity for everyone in the region, including Sutter County. But..... what if Amazon had located just north of the Sacramento County line into Sutter County where the VOTERS approved the Measure M/ Sutter Pointe development? What would that mean to the tax base of this county? It would mean better roads sidewalks, schools, more law enforcement, people shopping here, eating here, mostly.....staying and here to live.

Barbara's opponents are also making an issue about the Riego Road/State Route 99 Interchange. For over a decade local residents complained about the safety of Hwy. 99 and Riego Road, due to the increased commuting out of the area to their jobs. Again, Barbara LeVake was not even on the Board of Supervisors when this agreement was approved. Just to be clear, some of the same developers who placed Measure M on the ballot, helped pay for the Interchange. How can anyone criticize an improvement which helps save lives on a major highway? Water District and the availability of irrigation water this year.

We received a call informing us that we would be receiving water this year, unlike last year when we received water just a couple days a week. After two weeks or so of receiving water we were called again but this time we were told that there was no water -"Dry Creek" was dry. Just what changed n the 2 plus weeks between "you will have water and there is no water"?

We were told that if we wanted to "buy" water for the remainder of the irrigation season it would cost \$2,500.00! But I believed the North Yuba Water District when I was told that there was no water. Where is the \$2,500.00 water coming from?

My husband, a former Director of the NYWD, and I attended a special meeting for irrigation customers of the NYWater District in July. The manager came empty handed and when questioned he seemed to have no information for us. Buck Weckman, who is not an irrigation customer, was there stating that Jenny Cavaliere had "leaked confidential" information, just how would he know that this information was "confidential" unless someone else had "leaked" it to him!

jected to Mr. Weckman's remarks that Board Pres. Dale Skinner ruled that those remarks were out of place. Mr. Weckman continues to make dispiriting remarks about Director Cavaliere at NYWD meetings and in the Territorial Dispatch! Regarding the 2005 agreement with South Feather Water District, she was just one board member voting in favor. What Mr. Weckman refers to as "allegations" are nothing more than requesting information from the manager. And I won't even touch the "marijuana representatives" he brings up.

It is important to keep in mind that under the current management of the North Yuba Water District irrigation customers are being regarded as "second class" water users putting the purchasing of water in the future in jeopardy. Fire hydrants or stand pipes, when there was water in

should know there is a move underway to vote Director Cavaliere out of office at this November's election. River-Flow Plan Will Cause Needless Suffering

Water supplies dedicated to fish should be subject to the same efficiency standards as those affecting California farmers and homeowners, according to the California Farm Bureau Federation, which criticized a proposal released to require significant new amounts of water to be directed to the ocean.

CFBF President Paul Wenger said the proposal by the State Water **Resources Control Board** could idle as much as 240,000 acres of Central California farmland with no guarantee the redirection of water will help the fish it's intended to benefit.

"For years, regulators have been requiring increasingly more water in the name of environmental protection, but fish populations have continued to decline," Wenger said. "Regulators have no idea how many more fish-if any-would result from dedicating even more water to environmental purposes. But we do know one thing: This will hurt people."

Wenger described the basis for the board's approach as untested, unproven and unpromising, given past results.

"Turning our regional economy, our local communities and our livelihoods into a regulatory experiment is not a responsible way to manage our precious water resources," he said.

"Farmers have consistently improved the efficiency with which they use water to grow food and farm crops," he said. "It's time to apply the same standards to water dedicated to environmental flows. Those flows must be reasonable, useful and most of all, effective."

Wenger said Farm Bureau will urge the water board to revise the proposal and work with local water managers and communities to create "a balanced plan to help the environment without causing needless suffering" to people in the affected areas. He said the plan must also comply with the state's longstanding system of water resource allocation, must afford operational flexibility and must emphasize other factors affecting fish populations, such as predation and habitat.

"Forcing farmland to be fallowed-as this proposal would surely do-degrades the environmental unique resource represented by California farmland, and will hurt people and the economy throughout the region and state," he said. "It would create another area of chronic water shortage and economic distress, without any proven environmental benefit."

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Heavy Walnut Losses Lead to Drop In 2015 Sutter County Crop Values

A tough year for walnuts led to a 25 percent drop in Sutter County's crop values from 2014 to 2015, according to Sutter County Agricultural Commissioner Lisa Herbert.

The Agricultural Commissioner issued the 2015 Sutter County Agricultural Report to County Supervisors on Thursday, agricultural reporting production at \$544 million, down substantially from the record \$726 million reported in 2014. In 2014 high walnut values led to the crop replacing rice as the county's top crop for the first time in 24 years.

Walnut values in Sutter

County fell 60 percent in 2015 due to a decrease in acreage, production and price. The 2014 crop was estimated in value at \$192 million. The 2015 crop was estimated in value at \$77 million. Besides the unsustainable record prices of 2014, weather may have played a factor in production, and the port strike of 2014-15 may have contributed to loss of customers as product could not be delivered, according to Herbert.

Rice returned to its traditional spot as the top crop in 2015, with a value of \$142 million, a drop of five percent in value from the previous

year.

Dried prunes also suffered big losses in 2015, but remained in the third position in total value. In 2014, dried prunes in Sutter County accounted for \$108 million in total value; in 2015, the crop value was estimated at \$55 million, or a loss of almost 50 percent.

Processing tomatoes (\$49 million), processing peaches (\$49 million), and nursery products (\$40 million) rounded out the top crops.

Walnut supply up, prices down

The California walnut business is working to develop new markets and increase domestic demand for the nut as a healthy snack and ingredient, as growers cope with lower market prices for this year's harvest. For some, expected prices have fallen to about half of the record high from 2013. Increased supplies, reduced demand from China, a relatively strong dollar, high import duties and the 2014 port labor dispute have all affected the walnut market.

Winegrape harvest indicates high quality, slightly lower yields

As an early California winegrape harvest begins, growers report yields ranging from average to slightly below average, while quality remains high. In the 2016 season, growers have faced challenges such as water availability and market prices. Winegrapes and wine represent a powerful economic engine in California, contributing \$57.6 billion annually to the state's economy.

Study looks at how light affects grapes

Can wrapping grapevines in cloth mesh of different colors change grape quality? Vineyard specialists are testing that theory at an experimental vineyard in Napa County. University of California researchers say the different colors of shade cloth manipulate the light reaching the grapes, and that could lead to subtle differences in fruit flavor, color and aroma. UC specialists say they're still evaluating the practice.

Students breed a more perfect popper

People might soon be able to buy bigger, better jalapeño "popper" peppers, thanks to University of California students. Since 2012, students at UC Davis have been breeding crosses between jalapeño and bell peppers, to feature bigger cavities suited for stuffing with cheese and other ingredients, and to thrive in organic growing conditions. The studentrun project has become a model for other programs, and may result in the release of a cultivar within three years.

Inflation

In our Money Matters series on inflation, we have discussed how inflation destroys most income classes because the prices of things we buy accelerate faster than our wages. We then covered how the super wealthy not only don't suffer from inflation but actually profit from it by their ability to hold large amounts of assets that increase in price with inflation. This enriches them far more than the increases they experience in what they might buy.

Today we will cover why the government also loves inflation and how they also profit from the general increase in prices.

First off understand that the government, through the Federal Reserve's policies, cause most types of inflation and have stated through their meeting statements they prefer inflation (versus stable prices or even deflation) and aim for a two percent annual inflation rate.

If they are successful at causing inflation (and they have all the tools to do so), many things happen, most all of them in their favor.

The policies at their disposal include quantitative easing (QE), low interest rates and government stimulus, all of which are inflationary.

By setting low interest

rates, the government is able to finance more of their debt (U.S. Treasuries and other government IOUs), cheaper than if rates were higher and the government has a lot of debt. The lower interest rate they set, the less interest they have to pay on that debt and therefore the more they can afford to borrow.

When implementing another tool, QE, they buy assets (like mortgages) from the banking system so the banks have more money to lend out. The additional lending increases the money in circulation which causes more inflation (more money floating around in the system = higher prices).

In their third tool, by using stimulus money on things like infrastructure projects and more social program spending, they put even more money into the system causing even more inflation (remember our equation above).

When inflation causes prices to rise, it also causes wages to rise (albeit more slowly than general prices). When wages rise, more income taxes are collected. Wage earners also move into higher tax brackets, increasing tax revenue yet again. The caveat here is that although workers may make more money, the higher taxes coupled with the increase in prices of what they buy actually put them farther and farther behind the longer the inflation exists.

Finally, by causing inflation, the Feds weaken the U.S. dollar relative to other currencies, which causes our multi-national corporations to sell more to overseas consumers (exports) which increase their taxable income as well, bringing in even more money to Uncle Sam.

It is said that inflation punishes savers through the loss of purchasing power from the money they have saved while rewarding borrowers because borrowers will be able to pay back their debt with cheaper dollars. As the largest borrower in the world, it's not hard to see the incentive to foster inflation over stable prices (no inflation).

Couple with this the fact that revenues to the government increase with higher taxation on inflated sales and wages, their ability to sell more debt AND finance that debt at a lower cost, and then seemingly please the public with more spending to boot, it's easy to see why the government prefers inflation over any other monetary environment.

The bad news reverts back to our first illustration in our three part series of inflation. The fact that inflation hurts all but the very upper class. While that miniscule group profit handsomely from rising prices, all the other income levels beneath them slowly fall further and further behind.
