

Fostering Homelessness In Yuba County

A lady called to ask for an ‘intervention.’ Her teen daughter with a one-year old is an opiate addict. She spends her Welfare and ‘Food Stamps’ on narcotics. The teen mother dropped out of Yuba City High when she became pregnant.

The caller, frantic about her daughter and the baby’s well-being, contacted the alphabet soup of agencies pleading for someone to do something. Child Protective Services, Welfare and the Police Department had no immediate solution for her.

Then the caller asked if she should be paying the apartment rent and utilities for her daughter as the girl uses the citizens’ ‘charity’ on drugs? Her question highlights bad versus good charity and the government’s sentimental but fatal approach to ‘helping the poor.’

Since government is funding this addiction, who is responsible when she or her baby dies? Actually it is far easier to go through withdrawals from Oxycodone and Norcos than get free from dependence on government hand-outs.

Is it compassion for the welfare department to ignore tax monies being used for drugs? When will we get it that both drugs and government charity harm the brain?

Dan McMurry, a Tennessee sociology professor, did ‘participant observer’ research where he posed as a homeless man. In city after city homeless people merely had to line-up to receive. No questions asked.

In many cities the homeless could acquire housing, towels, blankets, soup, medicine, dental care, stamps, newspapers, and a long list of other products. McMurry notes, “I was never asked to do anything, not even remove my tray after eating. Of all the places I ate, I was never asked to bow my head; only once was I asked to take off my cap.”

McMurry wrote how he once intentionally made a mess tearing-up Styrofoam cups, tossing them to the ground while standing in line. A kind elderly volunteer came along collecting the pieces, smiled and moved on. Was it compassion to ignore McMurry’s feigned rudeness? Should this ‘compassion’ model be recommended as a new child-rearing technique?

Homeless advocates are not compassionate when they pitch the myth that the homeless are ‘people like us,’ only victimized by situations beyond their control. Most are not ordinary citizens who are victims of bad luck, unless the ‘us’ are alcoholics, addicts, criminals, rebels and the mentally ill.

Touting large estimates of the homeless as mentally ill should be taken skeptically, as well. Mental illness is not the same as alcohol and substance abuse though these habits are now listed in the Manual of Mental Disorders. Mental health budgets depend on diagnosing clients as mentally ill.

Today, someone who is nasty or aggressive is no longer just nasty or aggressive. He has Intermittent Explosive Disorder. Drug addicts are labeled under Dysthymic Disorders to be detoxed at hospital psychiatric units. Rarely are patients noted as No Pathology.

Street people who are truly insane, being a danger to self or others belong in a facility where they are safe and receive treatment. However, this approach lost favor when mental health doctrine was influenced by the novel and movie “One Flew Over the Cuckoo’s Nest.” You remember, the sane are actually insane and vice versa.

In the 1960’s, a massive expansion of welfare payments caused many of the working poor to choose instead idleness for a check. The numbers of people considered ‘poor and unemployed’ increased by the millions over night.

Sociologist McMurry notes that in any city some people are “barely hanging on.” Providing more free street services will “pull the weakest loose from the fabric of the community onto the pavement.” The greater the services offered, the larger the number of homeless. More of those living on the edge begin considering homelessness a viable option.

Many of the homeless would prefer a permanent residence with rooms and a view, but they are subsidized to not seek the skills nor make the sacrifices needed to obtain such housing. Instead, cute tool sheds for shelter and added benefits are available if a body breathes.

Hardworking taxpayers have not created homelessness nor should they be forced to subsidize it. Government policies and programs create an unhealthy environment where behaviors leading to the streets thrive.

Once again bureaucrats are euphoric, chasing their tails and spending precious tax dollars increasing the benefits of homelessness.

Yuba County Addresses Homeless Issues

A growing health and environmental crisis along Yuba County’s rivers brought on by an exploding homeless population inspired Yuba County to take on a unique and hopefully game-changing approach to help people move toward permanent housing.

“We’re not interested in kicking this can down the road,” said Yuba County Administrator Robert Bendorf. “Our goal is to help these people get closer to the services they need, so they can move away from homelessness and into safer environments.”

Over the past several months, Yuba County has been reaching out to various private and public organizations to create a coalition dedicated to moving people out of homeless camps and into permanent homes. As part of the effort, the county constructed 20 shelters on a piece of land beside the Twin Cities Rescue Mission in Marysville that will provide short term housing for up to 40 adults. The project is being call “14 Forward,” a reference to its location at the western end of 14th Street in Marysville.

To plan for this project, Yuba County contracted with a homeless advocate to make sure the approach taken to address the homeless issue has the best possibility of success.

The county will move forward with Code Enforcement measures in the coming weeks and months to close down riverside encampments that have been associated with growing piles of debris and health risks from raw sewage. Before closing those camps, however, Yuba County officials say they want to make sure services

for the homeless are in place to give them someplace safe to go.

Those who move into the 14 Forward shelters will have access to health care, employment assistance, mental health counseling, legal assistance, clothing, and other services. The Rescue Mission next to the site will have showers available and partner with the Salvation Army to provide meals.

The shelters are only intended for stays of about 30 days or so, while teams of service providers work with those staying at the site to get them into permanent housing. The clearing of homeless camps by Code Enforcement officers will be done in measured steps, to ensure the ability to provide services will not be overwhelmed by the number of people seeking help.

The 14 Forward program is part of a larger effort in the Yuba Sutter region to address homelessness. Services for homeless individuals and families are also available from the Salvation Army, Twin Cities Rescue Mission, Hands of Home and other organizations. Yuba County socials workers work to place homeless with children directly into permanent housing, when possible.

The Yuba County Board of Supervisors committed \$100,000 to construction of the 20 Tuff Sheds at the 14 Forward site. Habitat for Humanity is building out the inside of each structure with bed frames and other features, as well as building a shade structure and picnic benches in an outdoor common area. The site will also have a kennel, to accommodate one pet per person. The “Tiny House” approach was taken, a somewhat pricey solution for a cash-strapped county, but Yuba County believes the community will ultimately benefit. July 15th is “Move Day” (when homeless encampment will begin to be closed down).

A GoFundMe account has been set up to help the community participate in development of the 14 Forward project. Last week, Yuba County began reaching out to the community via social media. More than 20,000 have been reached through Facebook and Twitter with an overwhelming positive response. Offers of donations – both of items and funding – have been pouring in.

Predictions for the upcoming salmon run by the Pacific Fisheries Management Council said last year's salmon run would be dramatically increased over prior years, when in fact the 2015 migration turned-out to be a dismal. This year, PFMC is saying that due to the effect of last year's drought conditions, the anticipated salmon run 'estimated ocean counts' of salmon holding off the coast is low. However fishing guides in the know are predicting a banner 2016 for salmon based on the large number of salmon currently being caught by the commercial ocean

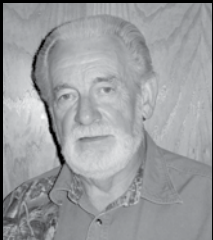
fishing fleet. This is a better prediction of presence of salmon in the rivers and Delta. So what does this all mean for the Rooster Tail member pursuing river salmon this year? It means being aware of how and where you fish will be probably be a lot different this year with you needing to employ new tackle rigging, new techniques and new strategies for landing fish.

Up Lake Almanor way, this past July 4th holiday, found boats, anglers and vehicles all over the place and the town of Chester. All campgrounds were full and the lake was congested with boats. With all this activity the fishing was great and many anglers came into camp with smiles on their faces.

With the middle of July fast approaching we have heard of nothing but excitement and good news in regard to fishing in lakes and reservoirs throughout the North State. However, according to our weather source, expect the cool spell to disappear this week bringing hotter weather near 100 degrees by weeks end.

It is our turn in regard to planted trout by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. Past weeks have shown most of the trout going south, but we now

have the following Northern California Lakes and Reservoirs being planted this week: **EL Dorado County:** Stumpy Meadows Reservoir; **Lassen County:** Upper Ash Creek, Caribou Lake, Crater Lake and Silver Lake; **Plumas County:** Lake Almanor and Bucks Lake; **Shasta County:** Baum Lake, Upper, Middle and Lower Burney Creeks, Upper and Middle Hat Creek, Hatchet Creek and the Sacramento River; **Sierra County:** Gold Lake, Little Truckee River-Perazzo Meadows and Lower Sardine reservoir and **Siskiyou County:** Cold Creek, Kangaroo

Lake, McCloud River, Sacramento River, South Fork of the Sacramento River, Siskiyou Lake, Squaw Creek and Wagon Creek.

Reports tell us the rainbow trout are cooperating on the American River near Auburn. Some of the fish are native fish and are being caught up to 16 inches.

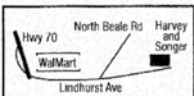

While America Burns Smoke N' Mirrors

With the new 2016 fire season upon the west, wildfires are in full swing again. And just one year ago the U.S. Forest Service said that for the first time in its 110 year history it spends more than 50% of its annual budget fighting fires at the expense of other programs. So no longer do we have a real forest service agency fulfilling its core mission. It has become the fire department.

While there is much talk every year about the expenses and the causes and the effects of forest and range fires, those very same state and federal agencies who are paid to protect the land, only offer us smoke and mirrors. They never talk about solutions on how to save at least 10 million pristine acres from being charred every year. Yet, all the while, management offers excuses such as “climate change”, “drought”, growing development or budget issues that hide the real problems. Where are their solutions? They are present but the government and the mainstream media backs away from the full story.

What is lacking in their responses is the truth and all of the key factors which has made fighting fires a billion dollar industry for all of those involved whether it be with dozer work, air tankers, helicopters, and firefighting crews. But let’s not forget the bogus “let it burn” policies that are part of the forest service’s mission which the media always skips over.

So instead of being responsible stewards of the public’s land and allowing logging contractors to thin the trees, so as to avoid infernos, the forest service spends more money fighting fires than they would if they brought in contractors that would buy the trees and mill them, while at the same time reducing the potential of out of control wildfires.

Since the year 2000, many of the western states have experienced the largest wildfires in their state’s history but the question is why? It is because the forest service policies were drastically changed under the Clinton administration during the latter 90’s which was subject to the endangered species act which also created forest road closures that are still in effect. By closing public and/or logging roads for a few years, the overgrowth, along with felled trees laying across these roads makes firefighting impossible. But then, the general public has not been educated with these facts



nor has the Forest Service or the mainstream media even revealed it. They carefully avoid the subject, but in the end, future generations will point their finger at a previous generation that was responsible for a political agenda that was never meant as a conservation policy but all along was used to rid the rural regions of people and force them to relocate into the major cities.

Here is an after thought. If there are fewer roads to travel on in forested areas, then how can endangered species be protected in a fire? Not long ago, one million acres in the Sierra Nevada Mountains was just set aside for the “Yellow Legged Frog.” There are already major forest fires in California right now taking out thousands of frogs and not just “endangered” ones. Thank the Fish & Wildfire Agency for their “expertise” on this one. Yes, their own hypocritical policies prevent hundreds of various endangered species from even being protected.

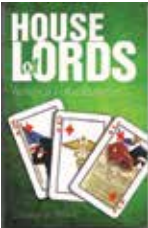
I had a conversation one day with a logging contractor in 2015 and asked him if he ever bid forest service thinning jobs and he told me that he didn’t because his company would have to put up a \$100,000.00 bond and then also navigate through all of the red tape associated with “environmental impact.” But besides even trying to make a profit, he would have to wait many months to get the approval to go ahead with the project. So welcome to one more Forest Service bureaucratic roadblock when preventing forest fires.

One day I asked the previous Supervisor of Tahoe National Forest, Tom Quinn about the misgiv-

ings of basic forestry management and he explained to me that the present policies were “experimental.” In other words, there is no standard blueprint to go by when it comes to the public’s forest land? Isn’t it any wonder that the west is constantly on fire? I call it eco-terrorism with no accountability and there is no moral compass! I compare this to a terrorist who has no blueprint to make a bomb and then blows himself up. Essentially, what will America be left with after the smoke clears? And what about the health issues associated with all of this?

Fire smoke causes 21 different kinds of cancer. Is our government on a depopulation mission or just playing with fire? Grace LeMasters and her associates from the University of Cincinnati, in 2006 published a study which documented a link between fire smoke and cancer while sifting through 10,000 documents of firefighters. (Journal of Occupational Medicine and Environmental Medicine, p 48, 1189-1202 Nov. 2006.)

In summary, it is clear that there is an out of control environmental/ forest service policy which is not only affecting the health, safety, welfare and the livelihood of millions of people, it is a policy which will be affecting future generations to come. Join the effort to stop the rising inferno by knowing the truth and sharing it.

PLUMAS RESOURCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBERS NEEDED

QUINCY, Ca.— Plumas National Forest officials are seeking to fill 15 seats on a federal advisory committee (RAC) responsible for selected projects on federal land within Plumas County.

“We have received interest from about ten individuals since January but need at least double that to fill existing vacancies and alternate slots,” said Acting Forest Supervisor Daniel Lovato. Deadline for applications is July 15, 2016.

Once appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture, the RAC will review projects to recommend for funding consideration by the Plumas National Forest Supervisor. Just under \$500,000 will be available for projects to be initiated by September 2017 and funding obligated by September 2018.

RACs were established as a provision of the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000. By law the four-year term, 15-member committee is composed of a wide representation of national forest interests organized into the three categories. An additional member is also appointed as a replacement should a committee member leave for any reason.

RAC projects must have broad community-based support with objectives that may include, but are not limited to, road, trail and infrastructure maintenance or obliteration; soil productivity improvements; improvements in forest ecosystem health; watershed restoration and maintenance; restoration, maintenance and improvement of wildlife and fish habitat; control of noxious and exotic weeds; hazardous fuels reduction; and reintroduction of native species.

Projects must be on public land but can occur on private land if it can be demonstrated that there is a benefit to public land resources.

Applicants must complete a cover letter, interest form and an FBI background check form prior to being considered for the committee. Proposition 57:

Jerry Brown's Early Release For Violent Criminals

Just a week ago, California Attorney General Kamala Harris released an alarming report detailing how violent crime in California is on the rise, increasing 10% over the last year.

Violent crimes were up last year by about 15,000 to a high of 166,588. Homicides went up 9.7 percent, robberies 8.5 percent, aggravated assaults 8 percent. Rapes increased 36 percent!

It is in this environment that Governor Jerry Brown has placed before voters this November a ballot measure deceptively titled the Public Safety and Rehabilitation Act of 2016" - when it might be more accurately dubbed the "Let Violent Criminals Out Of Prison Early Act of 2016."

The measure, now officially Proposition 57, purports to allow for early release only of those inmates who have committed "non-violent offenses," but is written in a way that even a spokesperson for the initiative says will only prevent early release for those who committed 23 specific violent crimes.

Here are just some of the supposedly "non-violent crimes" for which early release would be possible if this measure is passed: rape by intoxication, rape of an unconscious person, human trafficking involving sex act with minors, drive-by shooting, assault with a deadly weapon, taking a hostage, domestic violence involving trauma, possession of a bomb or weapon of mass destruction, hate crime causing physical injury, arson causing great bodily injury, discharging a firearm on school grounds, corporal injury to a child, and false imprisonment of an elderly person. The list actually goes on and on.

In addition to significantly reducing the time a vast number of violent criminals would have to

serve before being eligible for parole, the Governor's measure actually allows bureaucrats at the Department of Corrections to give "time off for good behavior" to literally any inmate in state prison, including those convicted of the most heinous criminal acts, including first-degree murder.

I suppose another equally valid ballot title for the measure could be the "California Crime Victim Re-victimization Act," because the measure was purposely drafted to allow every prisoner currently serving time for the violent crimes listed above (and more) to be eligible for early release based on the new guidelines. Which means that all of the victims of these terrible acts, who had some degree of certainty as to the disposition of their attackers, would all have to wonder if suddenly their attackers would be back on the streets - much sooner than they had been promised by the criminal justice system.

Brown's measure, in one broadly written provision, would overturn a number of previous tough-on-crime measures passed by California voters, including key provisions of Marsy's Law; 3-Strikes-And-You're-Out - the Victims' Bill of Rights; the Californians Against Sexual Exploitation Act; and the Gang Violence and Juvenile Crime Prevention Act.

Brown has so far spent over \$5 million from a ballot measure advocacy committee he controls to put Prop 57 before the voters, and he still has over \$20 million in that fund. He argues that these "reforms" are needed to address prison overcrowding, and also says that he very much regrets his support in 1977, as governor, for establishing determina-

tive sentencing laws in California. These have led to the establishment of strict sentencing guidelines, mandatory minimum sentences, and enhanced sentences for certain crimes.

Brown also feels strongly that the current system provides no incentive for inmates to be exemplary while behind bars, and feels that with the carrot of reducing sentences that prison authorities can cause inmate behavior to change in a positive way, reducing recidivism.

A robust conversation about criminal justice reform is a good thing, and clearly some reforms are worthwhile to discuss, and even implement. However, in the case of this particularly dreadful ballot measure, its basic premise is a lie. Governor Brown wants to soften sentences and allow for early release of violent criminals - while trying to tell voters with a straight face that that is not what this measure actually does.

A final and disturbing fact: Attorney General (and United States Senate candidate) Kamala Harris is charged with writing an accurate title and summary for each ballot measure. As the state's top prosecutor, Harris knows full well what this measure does, but still placed before voters the sentence, "Allows parole consideration for persons convicted of nonviolent felonies..."

The question is whether general election voters, inundated with campaign messaging from not only a presidential election but from a boatload of other ballot measures, will understand this measure for what it actually is. Because if they just go by the ballot title and summary in front of them by Kamala Harris, thousands of very dangerous people will be back on the streets very, very soon.

My son and I have personal knowledge on several occasions wherein we have experienced Rideout's poor excuse for urgent care. The facility is understaffed, overcrowded and chaotic – to say the least.

We recently had the opportunity to visit UC Davis's ER facility and the difference is night and day. UC Davis has state of the art equipment, a welcoming and well trained staff and is only an hour's drive from Yuba City. I would highly recommend that anyone needing urgent care make the effort to drive there – after all, your wait at Rideout will be at least three to four hours before you

even get to see a doctor (unless you are visibly bleeding from every orifice in your body).

Why not use the savings in the cost of the bridge to build a community Emergency Room on the Sutter side of the river – using UC Davis as a role model? The people of Sutter deserve so much better than is being offered by the Fremont Rideout group.

Here's another idea – why not take the first floor of the old Fremont Hospital which is being used for maternity on the second floor and equip it for emergency care until a new, modern facility could be constructed. Anything would be better than having to depend on the ER “zoo” that Marysville offers.

Cluster Housing - Update

At last take, Yuba County's so-called "Cluster" Housing Project was put 'on hold," according to an excellent article by Elden Fowler in the June 1 Territorial Dispatch.

(In my opinion, Cluster Housing is just a sneaky attempt by the county to allow higher density subdivisions throughout the Yuba upper foothills, outside Community Boundaries, just to bankroll favored people and organizations.)

Well, thanks to John Vacek, Yuba County's Chief County counsel, the project is no longer "on hold". It is dead in the water. The county's awkward and illegal attempt to revise Development Code Chapter 11.21 is now rescinded, according to Mr. Vacek's announcement at the regular Planning Commission meeting of June 15.

The thing that turned the tide was a 20-page letter from a San Francisco law firm, Shute, Mihaly, and Weinberger, sent to the county on May 16. This firm has special expertise in land-use matters, and has been very helpful to Yuba County in working on problem project, such as Yuba Highlands and Magnolia Ranch.

On reading the letter from the lawyers, Mr. Vacek abruptly put a hold on the project, aborting any action by the Planning Commission, and announcing "study" of the letter. Then, within 2-3 weeks, the study was over and the project was off.

In their letter the lawyers pointed out a series of problems with Yuba County's own kindergarten version of a clustering plan:

"The project is flatly inconsistent with General Plan policies limiting density and prohibiting clustering outside Rural Community Boundaries."

And "scant analysis violates the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQUA)." There are "numerous inadequacies and omissions" e.g. and little consideration of "loss of agricultural land ,increased wildfire risk, and ground water supply." And this is just a small sample.

The 20-page letter is a real eye-opener. It certainly should be read by all hill folks who ap-

preciate what they've got. Never fear, the legalese is not so bad. The average person will understand most of it.

The obvious question : How did the county get into this mess? Who did it? It looked like this fiasco was going to be voted in by the supervisors with very little feedback and no vote by the public. It was a close call.

Nick Spaulding, 20-year member of the Fellowship of Friends (FOF), carried the ball for the most part, with letters to the local papers, and with free run of the Government Center to con people with his brand of eloquent (fishy) rhetoric.

Fifth District supervisor, Randy Fletcher played his part in pleasing benefactors (but not the public). At the Board of Supervisors meeting of July 21, 2015, Fletcher put his blessing on the cluster idea and let the staff know he wanted it done his way and soon and also thanked the FOF North Yuba Grown for their help in furthering the cluster concept. Fellowshippers Spaulding and Charles Sharpe made separate comments for the cause. All of this pretty much made for a FOF-oriented kick-off cluster meeting.

And all of this makes for a very unpopular program in the up-

per foothills. An informal mail survey a couple of months ago showed 97% of 107 local respondent residents in Dobbins-Oregon House and Brownsville area are against cluster development.

To counter the 104 local residents, Spaulding recruited some 3-4 "stakeholders:" 1. The Cattlemen's Association, 2. The Pacific Legal Foundation, and 3. Soper-Wheeler Timber Company. Apparently, the 3-4 stakeholders are supposed to carry more weight than 97% of the residents.

And yet, the word is out. The supervisors intend to bring this issue back to the Board, before too long, presumably to revive it.

It should be up to the PEOPLE !.... And not this Board.

It is up to the people to beware and watch out. Pay attention.

Those guys downtown in the fancy building may not have your best interests at heart.

You have the numbers. Let's see the activity.

Farm exporters assess Brexit vote

For exporters of California farm products, the British vote to exit the European Union could bring short-term disruptions and long-term promise. Trade experts say currency fluctuations caused by the Brexit vote will make California products more expensive in Europe. But they say the U.S. and Britain could ultimately reach trade agreements that would benefit farm exports. The top California farm goods sold to Britain include wine, almonds and raisins.

Board starts farm-bill discussions

In a few months, Congress will start work on multiyear legislation that affects nutrition programs and agricultural policies. The current "farm bill," as it's known, will expire in 2018, but the State Board of Food and Agriculture began talking about California priorities for the bill on Tuesday. A California Farm Bureau representative told the board farmers and ranchers will advocate for conservation programs, research, pest prevention and other initiatives.

Study tracks vegetable, fruit trends

Despite the advice of doctors and dieticians, Americans have reduced their consumption of fruits and vegetables. But a new report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture says those figures might be a bit deceptive. Most of the cut in vegetable consumption has come from potatoes. People have been eating more peppers, leafy greens, broccoli and cauliflower. Much of the cut in fruit consumption came from orange juice, while apple juice, berries and grapes increased.

Project aims to boost farm management

A project known as SmartFarm has earned a sustainability award for a computer scientist at the University of California, Santa Barbara, who aspires to help farmers manage their operations. SmartFarm would use sensing systems and analytics to inform farmers and ranchers as they make complex decisions. Once the project is complete, computer scientist Chandra Krintz says the software code will be open-source, so it can evolve as farming does.
