A colorful parade in historic downtown Nevada City and the Sierra foothills' largest aerial fireworks display top the 2016 Fourth of July celebration in Nevada County.

The parade will be Monday, July 4th at 11am which will include approx. 75 entries. The festive parade makes its way down Broad Street in downtown Nevada City. Parade-goers are advised to bring lawn chairs and arrive early to find a good vantage point.

The Nevada County Concert Band performs a curbside pre-parade concert an hour prior to the parade, and continues to provide intermittent music throughout the parade.

Following the parade is a traditional family celebration under the pines at the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley. Live music and entertainment, food and refreshments are offered. The fireworks spectacular blasts off at 9:30 p.m.

Fairgrounds gates open at 3 p.m. and entertainment begins at 4 p.m. 2016 Admission rates TBA.

No alcohol, glass, pets, barbecues or personal fireworks may be brought onto the fairgrounds.

## Judge Rules On Yuba County Marijuana Ordinance

A lawsuit in which patients pleaded Yuba County's current medical marijuana cultivation ordinance is unconstitutional and discriminatory failed in Superior Court, Thursday, June 23rd.

Following the presentations of Plaintiff's attorney Charnel James, and Yuba County's Chief Deputy County Counsel, Vacek, Judge Benjamin Wirtschafter granted the County's request for a summary motion.

The hearing and the Judge's ruling, which at times, seemed to be more

about the timeliness of the plaintiff's filings of documents and pleadings than the specific constitutional issues, effectively ended the matter when Judge Wirtschafter ruled in favor of Yuba County.

The ruling, which can still be appealed, brings to an end the current questions over the constitutionality of the county's ordinance which bans all outdoor cultivation.

James argued the ordinance which became effective in March of 2015 discriminates against those who

can't afford to comply with the requirements for growing marijuana in accessory buildings.

Afterwards, Vacek said the decision "is a ruling the ordinance is constitutional, not just a dismissal."

On the courthouse steps, James said "I am frustrated, disillusioned, and I am going to recommend to my clients they appeal the ruling."

The matter was brought before the court by the Yuba Patient Coalition and several individuals.

## Stadium Use Settled

*Marysville and Gold Sox Baseball Team Reach Amicable Settlement*

The City Council last evening, June 22nd, agreed to a settlement offer from the owners of the Gold Sox baseball team for the use of Bryant Field municipal stadium. In March, the City filed a request in Superior Court for a judicial determination regarding the expiration of the lease agreement under which the team has played in Marysville since 2003. No court date had yet been set for a hearing on that request when lawyers for the team

approached the City Attorney, proposing a settlement. That settlement has now been accepted by both the owners and the City.

"Whenever a dispute can be settled amicably between the parties, that's a lot better than having to be in court," stated Mayor Ricky Samayoa.

Under the Compromise and Settlement Agreement approved by City Council, the 13-year old lease agreement allowing the Gold Sox to play at the City-owned stadium

on Highway 70 in Marysville will terminate at the end of the current baseball season and the team will pay the City \$30,000. In return, the City will dismiss its request for court action. "Today, we believe that both parties have cleared the air on an unfortunate episode in our long association with each other. With this settlement, we have resolved our immediate differences and can concentrate on a new future relationship," the Mayor added.

## Measure C Tax Money to Increase Salaries

The City of Marysville posted the proposed 2016-17 budget on its website and council members were to debate the elements this week. City management is euphoric over a majority of voters approving a 1% / 10-year tax increase on goods sold in the city and vehicles purchased anywhere by Marysville residents.

Bureaucrats are hoping for an extra \$1.5 million take per year from the tax hike starting October 1, 2016. Budget documents say that much of the tax revenue "will be paid by non-residents of Marysville," which is nonsensical, much like the ruse used to garner Measure C yes votes.

Anti-Measure C people argued that the new money can be used anywhere. They had a point. Employees will now be getting raises and the unfunded pension debt incurring 7.5% in interest annually will be paid down over 6 years while incurring \$497,000 in interest.

City Administrator Walter Munchheimer argues that most of the 57 employees have gone 6 years without a raise. However the city did absorb more of police pension costs during last contract negotiations and also gave the chief of police a raise. Paying employee pension contributions commits taxpayers indefinitely to the broken defined-benefit retirement system.

The budget assigns \$202,950 to add 3 police officers and \$172,765 to ensure minimum fire department staffing after the current federal SAFER grant expires in mid-year. Funding is added to restore a Monday through Friday work week vs. current 4 days/week for employees, starting January 2, 2017.

Was anyone missing or complaining about city government being off on Fridays? When it comes to government, less is more. It is not clear from the budget how much it will cost to return to a full work week.

Munchheimer's salary and benefits go up from \$134,666 to \$155,317. Total salary / benefits spike from \$197,916 to \$299,098 for two positions in Administrative Services. The City Clerk's salary increases to \$132,183 from \$118,444. Fire and police chiefs' salaries are not separated for review.

The budget puts \$125,000 in a General Reserve for Economic Uncertainty. Only a veiled reference is made to the city's Achilles Heel, the B-Street Boondoggle that sent the town into a financial ditch. City residents owe \$15,539,102 to be paid off October 1, 2036 for 5-acres of land across from Ellis Lake.

The upcoming annual \$636,875 B-Street payment was the tipping point igniting the city's rhetorical razzle-dazzle to convince voters that Measure C was all about public safety. Pro-Measure C voters, like most Californians, suffer from the 'Stockholm Syndrome' when it comes to tax measures. They are endeared to those who abuse them.

A budget bright spot is eliminating the city maintaining its own vehicle fleet in favor of out-sourcing. And, the city will get out of funding Marysville cemetery maintenance.

Munchheimer's beef in the document that there are \$700,000 in unexpected hikes in workers compensation, insurance and pension costs should cause council members to consider replacing more city employees with outside contractors. Contracts are fixed and can be terminated. There are no life-long exorbitant employee costs and liabilities are minimal.

Major sewage / storm water work, some road improvements and bike lanes are set for 2016-17 with more noticeable infrastructure upgrades postponed to fiscal year 2017-18 since increased tax revenues begin later in 2016-2017. Having more police officers will not be noticed by the average citizen since the Pro-C campaign claim of Marysville having a high crime problem was bogus.

The city proposes to acquire and restore the State Theater with \$2 million and spend \$550,000 on the Bounce Back Plan in 2017-18. Installing wells in some city parks is planned in 2018-19 to once again afford water to irrigate. Upgrading park irrigation systems by spending \$150,000 in both 2017-18 and 2018-19 is scheduled.

More infrastructure improvements will occur in 2017-18 and beyond – renovations at Ellis Lake and Riverfront Park, Yuba Park tree removal, sidewalk replacement, and facility upgrades.

Whether citizens favored raising taxes or not few will be able to follow the numbers to hold city government to their campaign rhetoric. As people come and go and city council members change, the 1% fund becomes another political pork barrel.



# Gold Sox Sweep Stealth

Improve to 13-2 on the Year in the Great West League

The Marysville Gold Sox swept the Sacramento Stealth over the weekend to continue their streak of victories in the Great West League. They remain undefeated at home in Colusa Casino Stadium at 8 – 0 and are 13 – 2 overall on the season.

General Manager Michael Mink commented on the series saying “This was a great weekend both on and off the field with over 6000 fans in attendance for the weekend series. The Stealth have a great team and these were close and exciting games to play and watch. But I’m proud of our players for pulling through some gutsy wins and staying undefeated at home, and I’m proud of our fans for showing up all weekend and cheering our team to victory.”

The Sox started off on Friday night in front of their largest home crowd of the season with 2,680 fans cheering them on to a 4 – 2 victory. Starter Shinpei Kanamori made his home debut and threw five strong innings of scoreless ball to earn his first win of the season. Catcher Hunt-

er Stratton delivered a solo homer in the game, the first by a Gold Sox player at home this season. The Gold Sox celebrated Faith Night at the Coliseum featuring former Miss America Leanza Cornett with a celebration of all faiths sponsored by the Christian Business Alliance.

On Saturday evening, the Gold Sox featured some late-game fireworks with a three run home run in the eighth inning by Hunter Stratton before an after-game fireworks display sponsored by Feather Falls Casino. The Sox won 6 – 1 over the Stealth in a game started by Ryan McCarthy who threw six innings of one run ball, giving up just two hits while striking out five in his first start of the season to get the win. The Sox also had RBI hits off the bats of Ryan Weisenberg, Taggart Baxter, and Chris Papi-pietro. But it was the blast by Stratton, his second in two nights, that sealed the victory for the Gold Sox. The stadium remained full after the game as 3,280 people stayed to watch the first fireworks night of the

season.

Sunday night featured heartbreak for many Bay Area sports fans, but the Gold Sox in front of 628 in attendance sent their fans home happy with a 5 – 2 win to complete the sweep. The Father’s Day game featured a solid start by Tyler Waldrop who pitched seven strong in-nings of five hit, one run ball. The Sox stayed undefeated at home and lengthened their five game winning streak on the bat of Hunter Stratton’s two RBIs and two runs by Billy Mason.

The Gold Sox have Monday off before starting a home and home with the Chico Heat on Tuesday at 7:05 p.m. Tuesday night’s giveaway will be a Blood Source rally towel for the first 500 fans, with tickets available online at [www.GoldSox.com](http://www.GoldSox.com).

# Closure of Pine Creek Boat Ramp for Ramp Improvements

CHICO, Ca. – The Pine Creek Boat Ramp Repair Project will begin July 5th and should be completed by the end of September. The ramp and parking lot will be closed to the public during this period. Pine Creek Boat Ramp is a sub-unit of the Bidwell-Sacramento River State Park; this will be the only portion of this park unit affected by the project during this time. Visitors wishing to launch their vessels are encouraged to use the Irvine Finch Boat Ramp.

The purpose of the Pine Creek Boat Ramp Repair Project is to improve the safety and efficacy of the facilities at the Pine Creek Boat Ramp and to bring the facilities into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The Proposed Project includes:

- Removal of silt and organic material that has accumulated under the existing ramp
- Removal of vegetation on the east and west sides of the ramp
- Placement of a new ramp, which will be expanded from its current dimensions of 20 feet wide and 122 feet long, to the proposed dimensions of 24-feet wide and 142 feet long. (The greater length is needed to allow year-round use of the ramp, and the greater width is needed in order to provide room for possible future installation of a boarding float on the ramp, while still providing an 18-foot launch lane)
- Construction of a wheelchair-accessible ramp between the bathroom and the top of the boat ramp to be ADA compliant;

During the closure, the facility will be significantly improved. Upgrades will include expanded and repaved parking, repaired gangways and new solar lighting.

Visitors are reminded to exercise caution after the boat launch is closed, as the closure may temporarily increase vehicle

and pedestrian traffic in the Lakes Basin Recreation Area.

Valerie caught the first fish, which was a nice mackinaw which measured 26 inches. She also caught the second fish and her limit by 8:00 A.M. Her second fish was not as large as the first but measured a nice 23 ½ inches. I caught my first and only fish at around 9:00 A.M. and it was smaller than Val’s coming in at around 21 inches.

I talked to the captain of the boat and he advised we would be traveling all the way to North Shore (we started out at South Shore) due to the fish not cooperating in South Shore waters. As it turned out the fishing across the lake was not much better.

We did talk to a fellow from Santa Clara who caught a nice 7 pound brown trout off the dock. He took pictures and released the fish. I asked him what he was using when the big boy hit and he advised he was casting with a castmaster lure.

We have reports of stripers still hanging around in the Feather River. The river is in great condition and is flowing blue/green and clear.

We arrived back in town from our weeks’ vacation at Lake Tahoe to hear about the problem on the Yuba River. Mudsnaills have been discovered. New Zealand Mudsnaills are in Yuba and Nevada counties. Areas of discovery included the Sycamore Ranch Park and Campground at Brown’s Valley and also at several locations along the Yuba River above and below the State Highway 20 bridge. The Department of Fish and Wildlife are concerned and will or already have issued information and will be posting signs.

when he hooked a beautiful 3 pound rainbow trout while fishing off a houseboat in Skippers Cove Marina at Englebright Reservoir recently. He was fishing with a night crawler when the big trout hit. Kudos, David!

Little Grass Valley Reservoir, located above La Porte, was planted last week with catchable rainbow trout. Deer Creek, above Chico was also planted along with French Meadows Reservoir located in Placer County.

The trout bite at Collins Lake has finally slowed down a bit with bass, catfish and

crapped cooperating with those who fish for these species. **Logan Tapia**, who came from Clearlake to fish at Collins, caught a beauty, a 3 pound 4 ounce rainbow trout on worms. Also, **Addison Seino** handed a giant redear sunfish while fishing from shore with worms. Congratulations to you both!

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# How Yuba Sutter Arts will Tackle Recidivism

*through creative self-expression*

Yuba Sutter Arts is pleased to announce an exciting new pilot called Color Up. Color Up will see local professional artists partner with Marysville Police Department and Yuba-Sutter Juvenile Hall in a teaching and mentoring initiative for young offenders as they approach parole. Designed to reduce recidivism, the initiative is the result of a successful grant application to Yuba County Community Corrections Partnership and Yuba County Board of Supervisors with funds from The Board of State and Community Corrections. Aaron Easton, Chief of Police for Marysville, says of the initiative: “One of the strengths of Yuba Sutter Arts’ application was its acknowledgement that recreational programs alone cannot solve the problems of our youth. In the context of reducing recidivism, we believe that Community or Problem-Oriented Policing is equally important – both as a philosophy and as an



organizational strategy. Color Up will allow us to work together to tackle the so-called ‘revolving door of recidivism.’” Eliza Tudor, Executive Director at Yuba Sutter Arts, says: “Together with Marysville Police Department and Juvenile Hall, we will also partner with Sutter Yuba Mental Health Services. As young offenders approach their probation, professional artists will visit Juvenile Hall to offer a series of group sessions in visual art. To-

gether with oversight by Sutter Yuba Mental Health Services, we will offer an opportunity for personal reflection, transformation and growth. Our aim is that, through healthy self-expression, we will encourage personal development and a better sense of orientation towards the future. Post incarceration, classes will continue both off-site and offer further opportunity for deepening connections between participants and community agencies.”

Easton continues: “There’s a vast body of research that points to the crossover between arts interventions and increased satisfaction with law enforcement. Art is known to be a focal point for municipal and service agency cooperation, and Color Up will provide a way to ensure that our philosophy of Community Policing is put into practice through meaningful partnerships with our at-risk youth.”

David Read, President of the Board of Directors for Yuba Sutter Arts, says: “Yuba Sutter Arts maintains an active membership of artists across multiple disciplines, which includes those that work within the educational and healing arts. Our membership gives us unparalleled access to a knowledge-base which can be fine-tuned depending upon programs which are a priority for us. Among our board of directors are key individuals with experience working on the interface between arts, education, health and wellbeing. With our recognition of youth as a priority for Yuba Sutter Arts, we have profound experience working with young people across our bi-county area.”

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**PLUMAS RESOURCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBERS NEEDED**  
 QUINCY, Ca. – Plumas National Forest officials are seeking to fill 15 seats on a federal advisory committee (RAC) responsible for selected projects on federal land within Plumas County.

"We have received interest from about ten individuals since January but need at least double that to fill existing vacancies and alternate slots," said Acting Forest Supervisor Daniel Lovato. Deadline for applications is July 15, 2016.

Once appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture, the RAC will review projects to recommend for funding consideration by the Plumas National Forest Supervisor. Just under \$500,000 will be available for projects to be initiated by September 2017 and funding obligated by September 2018.

RACs were established as a provision of the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000. By law the four-year term, 15-member committee is composed of a wide representation of national forest interests organized into the three categories. An additional member is also appointed as a replacement should a committee member leave for any reason.

RAC projects must have broad community-based support with objectives that may include, but are not limited to, road, trail and infrastructure maintenance or obliteration; soil productivity improvements; improvements in forest ecosystem health; watershed restoration and maintenance; restoration, maintenance and improvement of wildlife and fish habitat; control of noxious and exotic weeds; hazardous fuels reduction; and reintroduction of native species.

Projects must be on public land but can occur on private land if it can be demonstrated that there is a benefit to public land resources.

Applicants must complete a cover letter, interest form and an FBI background check form prior to being considered for the committee. 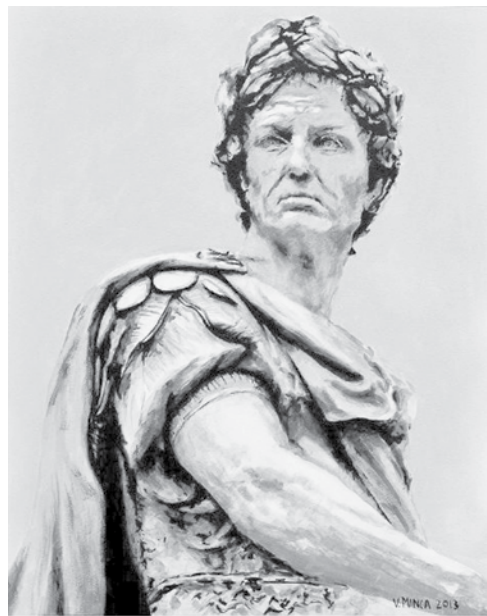

## This Month In Your Garden

### BALD MOUNTAIN NURSERY

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We have recently passed the mid mark of the year 2016. The last half of the year is ushered in by the Fourth of July, a carefree and celebratory holiday with swimming parties and barbecues and fireworks being some of the fun activities. Cooking vegetables from your own garden along with the meat of your choice has become a commonplace thing to do. Toss a salad, put out a bowl of fresh fruit and serve it up on paper plates and you have lots of good eating without too much fuss and bother or clean-up. It can be satisfying to think that much of the dinner was from your efforts in your own garden. Continue to enjoy the bounty from your vegetable garden by fertilizing monthly using a vegetable fertilizer. It is best to avoid high nitrogen fertilizers because they create too much just green growth at the expense of more fruiting. Be alert for the big tomato worms – they blend in so well making it hard to see them and they can defoliate a plant quickly. Spray them with Bacillus Thuringiensis (or BT for short) to kill them. It is specific for caterpillars and is organic. Some people hand pick them, others cut them in two with their pruners. Personally, I prefer the BT method.

A common summertime pest is the budworm that seems to prefer geraniums and petunias, making holes in the buds and the stems. They, too, can be controlled by BT. It is a good product to have in your supply of garden pest control items. Lady Bugs and Praying Mantis are two great insects for controlling the bad guys. Many garden supply stores have them to sell earlier in the season, but they may be harder to find now. If you have them in your yard, try to avoid them when spraying insecticides.

July, is a typically hot month, but it is still okay

to plant. Many people are enjoying vacation time and want to take advantage of the time to plant a tree where the summer sun has made it obvious that a tree is needed for shade to make an area of the yard more usable. Of course, it will be necessary that anything planted when it is hot will need to be watered more frequently and adequately than normal to help establish new roots. Using a product called ‘Superthrive’ at the time of planting and then once a week or so will help make the transition from container to the ground easier. If you really need to transplant a well established plant, some root is usually lost and ‘Superthrive’ will certainly help that, too. It is best for the tree to be planted in the evening as the temperatures are cooling off. It certainly can be done, but don't neglect them and you will both be happy. The ground should be moist at planting, then use deep watering practices.

Obviously keeping your plants well watered in order that they survive the heat is the most important chore needed now. Most people learned some useful methods during our several drought years. Drip systems are water savers since they are targeted at the plant and not all of the space around. That also helps to keep the weeds down since the whole area isn't always being kept wet. Most weeds can use just as much water as the plants, so keeping them cleared away will save water. Mulching around the base of plants will help

prevent evaporation reducing the need of frequent watering, also helping to keep them weed free. We find that trees on drip systems are sometimes short on water just because the owner doesn't think to give more time on the watering cycle. We all drink more liquids during the hot weather – so do plants, and especially trees. We have customers bring a small tree branch with droopy leaves that are dry around the edges fearing that the tree has a disease. Those are actually the first signs of not enough water. It is best to give trees a good deep watering less frequently than to water them daily with a lesser amount of water. We have a handout sheet “Are You Providing Enough Water” that is available at the nursery. As a general rule it is better to water new plantings or plants in containers in the morning so they have moisture to draw on all day. That is not an option for many of us who leave for work early in the morning. In that case, later in the evening may have to do and usually works out well since they don't transpire much moisture in the cooler night environment. If you have an automated system so much the better – check it routinely to be sure it is working properly. Enjoy your July 4th holiday. We will be closed!

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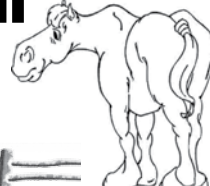
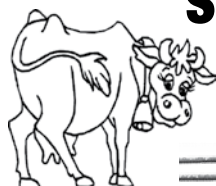
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# THE Brownsville Bailiwick & Beyond

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## Food and Farm News

**Outlook bright for California table grape crop**

California table grape production for 2016 is poised to surpass last year's record high, weather permitting. The replacement of older vines with newer, higher-yielding varieties has resulted in the boost. The newer varieties have also helped farmers extend the table-grape season, which recently has started as early as April and has continued into February.

**Santa Barbara County fire threatens farmland**

Damage from the ongoing Sherpa Fire in Santa Barbara County includes ranch land plus groves of avocados, lemons and olives. Firefighters have been coordinating with farmers and ranchers to protect properties, with many landowners plowing firebreaks for protection. The total damage to farms and

ranches has not yet been tallied, though two properties have reported significant damage so far.

**Americans confused over good and bad fats**

Two-thirds of Americans try to consume healthy fats--though they're not certain which fats qualify as "good" or "bad." For example, a survey by the Hass Avocado Board shows one in five people mistakenly considered trans fats to be good. The board says the survey shows the need for more information to help people identify sources of heart-healthy mono- and polyunsaturated

fats, such as salmon, olive oil and avocados.

**School kitchen grants improve meals for students**

Helping schools buy new kitchen equipment has allowed schools in California and around the country provide healthier foods, according to a recent study. Researchers with the UC Nutrition Policy Institute found that federal grants for equipment such as refrigeration, appliances and serving stations have helped schools "cook a greater variety of fresh and healthy dishes, boost student participation in meal programs, and reduce operating costs."

# 1946 John Deere A

The Historic Faire provided an opportunity to explore many aspects of the history of the Yuba Sutter Basin. The individual efforts of people, their families, and the descendants are full of effort, persistence, sacrifice and dreams. Sometimes, their machines provide a powerful story that is also quite interesting.

One such tractor to me is this 1946 John Deere A.

I am a member of the Two Cylinder Club. One of the reasons to belong is that for a small fee they will go through the records of John Deere and provide a certificate of production on a tractor if you send them a serial number. I do that on my John Deere's when I can. this particular tractor has a warehouse date of December. 2 and was shipped to San Francisco on December 6 and on to Colusa. The certificate also tells what Special Equipment was included.

It is one of my favorite for many reasons. I put a chrome straight pipe on it so it is loud and brings smiles to old timers, Harley Guys, and young people. I



put air horns on and an Og Ah horn which are regularly used in parades. It is easy to drive and is about as classic John Deere as you can get for the 40s.

I have had the tractor for quite awhile and it has been used for a variety of efforts. The tractor has been the stimulus for great stories as people interact with it. I attend the Colusa Farm Show and try to take tractors that are related. Being sold in Colusa in 1946 certainly is a commensurate relationship. Every now and then I would start up the engine and let it run for a few minutes. Crowds would quickly gather about to hear the "Johnny Popper". Old timers would mimic the hand start process to their Grandchildren. People begin to clear out after lunch on Thursday. I thought I would start it up around three o'clock and let it run for some time, and finally shut it down. Through the crowd came an older man on crutches with a

heavy overcoat. Sweat was pouring off of his brow. He exclaimed "..... it, I guess I missed it". "What is that", I replied. He returned, "I am parked on the other side of the grounds and when I heard that old Johnny I knew what it was and I tried to get here as fast as I could". I responded, "Well, I'll make your day". I fired old Johnny. He stood there and I imagined stories running behind those smiling eyes. The crowd was greatly diminished by this time, so I offered him a chance to drive it. He declined, but asked if he could set on it. I stacked his crutches against a wheel and helped him up on the seat. On the steering wheel at the 11 o'clock position there is an indentation of a thumb print of somebody who spent hours on this machine in the basin. His left thumb quickly found the imprint and he turned and looked at me with a look I will never forget. We both nearly came

## California Water Service Eases Water-Use Reduction Requirements for Marysville District

*Utility Sets Conservation Targets Until State Update Conservation Standards in 2017*

MARYSVILLE, CA. — California Water Service (Cal Water) today announced an interim water-use reduction requirement of 10% for customers in its Marysville District, which previously had a 24% reduction requirement, effective until the State Water Resources Control Board (State Board) issues its framework for permanent conservation standards in early 2017. This follows a recent decision by the State Board to allow water suppliers to set their own short-term reduction requirements based upon local water supply conditions.

Customers' conservation targets will continue to be based on 2013 use, except for unique situations; however, the company will suspend surcharges for all customers, at least temporarily.

"Marysville customers have worked hard to reduce their use during this historic drought, and we appreciate their efforts thus far. It is critical that our customers continue their excellent conservation efforts in order to ensure that we have enough water to meet long-term needs," said District Manager Lee Seidel.

These changes must be approved by both the State Board and the California Public Utilities Commission before they become effective on August 1, 2016.

Prohibited uses of water, water waste violations, and irrigation schedules will remain effective. Customers can visit [www.calwater.com/drought](http://www.calwater.com/drought) for more details. Cal Water will also notify customers by mail of these changes to its drought response program.

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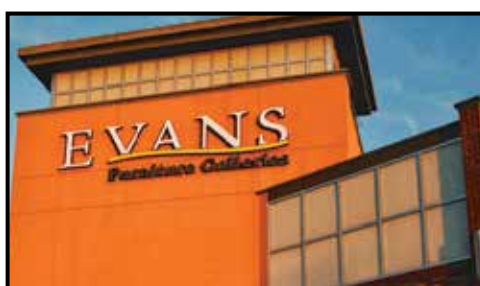
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
