

Gold Sox Stay Hot, Sweep Portland Pickles for 6th Win In A Row

Marysville, Ca.

The Marysville Gold Sox swept their series against the Portland Pickles over the week-end retaining sole possession of first place in the Great West League and improving to a 8 – 1 record on the year.

The Sox picked up right where they left off in Game 1 of the series against Portland on Friday though it took extra innings and a rain delay to come out on top. The Gold Sox were up 6 – 2 in the third but a Portland comeback cut the deficit and then tied the game in the seventh. With the score tied in the top of the 10th, Ryan Weisenberg hit a two-run single which would provide the winning margin. Gold Sox starter Justin Giovannoni pitched six innings of two run ball and T.J. Dove went 2 for 6 and chipped in an RBI and two runs scored.

The Sox kept rolling on Saturday with yet another extra inning win. With the game tied 4 – 4 after nine, the Gold Sox doubled their run output scoring four more in the 10th inning to secure an 8 – 4 victory. The Gold Sox sent Japanese pitcher Shinpei Kanamori out to start the game on the road. Kanamori pitched strong early before giving up two runs in the bottom of

the fourth. With the score tied 3 – 3, Ryan Weisenberg executed a steal of home timed perfectly when the Pickles' catcher threw the ball back to their pitcher. All told, the Gold Sox had 17 hits in the game including three straight RBI singles by Austin Call, Dalton DeVries and Randy Post. Kyle Merkel earned the win in relief.

On Sunday, after two straight extra inning wins, the Sox decided to give it one more go winning another extra-inning affair 10 – 7 to complete the sweep of the Portland Pickles. Brad Bonnenfant started for the Sox and ran into trouble early laboring through two innings of five run, six hit and three walk ball. He was relieved by Kyle Baranowski who delivered a gutsy effort, holding the Pickles to two more runs in five innings. The Gold Sox hitters were silenced early, but gradually fought back after Pickles' starter Declan Kearney left the game with a line allowing one run on two hits through seven. The Sox jumped all over the Pickles' relievers, fighting back from a 7 – 1 deficit featuring a three-run blast by Austin Call which silenced the Portland crowd and tied up the game until the Sox could score in the tenth for the third straight

night. A Hunter Stratton double, Austin Call walk, Adrian Vela hit by pitch and bases-loaded Darren Doll double capped the Gold Sox improbable win. Zach Kornely held the Pickles for the final three innings to earn the victory in the game.

The Gold Sox improved to 8 – 1 overall on the young season. They will finish a six-game road trip this week facing off with the second-place Medford Rogues starting on Monday. The Sox will be back in town June 17th for a three game series against the Sacramento Stealth featuring Faith Night at the ballpark on Friday night.

Also occurring this weekend was the MLB Draft. Two former Gold Sox players were selected in the draft echoing the "Gateway to the Pros" mantra for the Sox organization. Former Yuba City High pitcher Chandler Eden was picked by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 25th round and former Gold Sox infielder Dalton Blaser was selected in the 8th round by the New York Yankees.

FISHIN' TALK

This time of year always reminds me of the outstanding bass fishing myself and friend Bill Bagget enjoyed many moons ago, catching largemouth in the dredger ponds near Hallwood and the Honcut area and fishing the lagoons in the Feather River for smallmouth.

Years ago, and I cannot remember when, spotted bass were introduced into California lakes and reservoirs. Prior to that time in history we always caught our share of bass, both smallmouth and largemouth (some folks called them bucket mouth). Of course, it depended on which species you were after where you fished. I believe the largemouth can be found in ponds, including farmer's private ponds and dredger ponds. Smallmouth are more popular in rivers, lakes and reservoirs. Now don't get me wrong, you can find these fish in the same waters, but I am referring to where the fish seem to like to be.

Back to the spotted bass.....these fish were basically planted in reservoirs. The reason for this is the spotted bass lives differently than the other two. By this I mean spots like deeper water to live in and to spawn. Black bass prefer shallower water. This is why you will find smallmouth next to the bank in rivers. Most of the fish can be reached within five feet of the bank. Black bass do not like deep water so they hang out in shallow water and this is why black bass suffer in reservoirs when the water level recedes. Their spawning beds end up high and dry while the spotted bass, down deep-

er, never has to worry about running out of water. I believe this is why we have so many spots in reservoirs today.

We called up at Lake Tahoe to verify our reservation on the boat charter for next week. Folks up there are really excited about the big mackinaw lake trout being caught. Apparently the big fish and I mean huge lake trout, are on the bite and are being taken on a regular basis. We will be fishing on Lake Tahoe next Thursday and I will

report on the success in the next issue of the Dispatch.

Ice House Reservoir and Loon Lake both received trout plants this past week. These two bodies of water are located in El Dorado County.

Boots fishing tip for the week:" If you see birds flying around and/or landing on the water it is a good indication there are fish near the surface. Even though the fish are probably minnows, the big boys are more than likely nearby."

Board of Forestry Eschews SRA Fee Increase


On Wednesday, June 15, 2016, the California Board of Forestry and Fire Protection decided against considering an increase of the annual fire prevention fee paid by California residents living in the designated State Responsibility Area (SRA) for fire prevention and suppression, also known as the SRA fee. After a report from Acting Executive Officer Matt Dias on the condition of the fund, Board members decided that revenues continue to be robust enough to avoid a fee increase for the 2016-17 fiscal year.

The SRA fee, established as part of the 2011-12 State Budget Package, requires owners of habitable structures in the SRA to pay an annual fee to fund State fire prevention services in the SRA. The Board is required to review the fee annually and make adjustments if necessary, with the current fee rate assessed at \$152.33 annually. Rural County Representatives of California (RCRC) has opposed the SRA since its imposition on the grounds that residents outside of the SRA benefit from State fire preven-

tion and firefighting efforts; however, in recent months the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection have been issuing grants from the SRA Fund to local entities for fire prevention

efforts that include tree mortality mitigation and other vital activities.

PLUMAS RESOURCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBERS NEEDED

QUINCY, Ca.— Plumas National Forest officials are seeking to fill 15 seats on a federal advisory committee (RAC) responsible for selected projects on federal land within Plumas County.

“We have received interest from about ten individuals since January but need at least double that to fill existing vacancies and alternate slots,” said Acting Forest Supervisor Daniel Lovato. Deadline for applications is July 15, 2016.

Once appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture, the RAC will review projects to recommend for funding consideration by the Plumas National Forest Supervisor. Just under \$500,000 will be available for projects to be initiated by September 2017 and funding obligated by September 2018.

RACs were established as a provision of the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000. By law the four-year term, 15-member committee is composed of a wide representation of national forest interests organized into the three categories. An additional member is also appointed as a replacement should a committee member leave for any reason.

RAC projects must have broad community-based support with objectives that may include, but are not limited to, road, trail and infrastructure maintenance or obliteration; soil productivity improvements; improvements in forest ecosystem health; watershed restoration and maintenance; restoration, maintenance and improvement of wildlife and fish habitat; control of noxious and exotic weeds; hazardous fuels reduction; and reintroduction of native species.

Projects must be on public land but can occur on private land if it can be demonstrated that there is a benefit to public land resources.

Applicants must complete a cover letter, interest form and an FBI background check form prior to being considered for the committee. Yuba County Tops Sutter County

In Total Weight Loss in Big2Little Healthy Weight Loss Challenge

Final results show Yuba County participants achieved greater total weight loss than Sutter County participants in the recent Big2Little Weight Loss challenge. Sutter County participants achieved a higher percentage of weight loss, however.

Yuba County participants lost 482.2 pounds and Sutter County participants lost 405.5 pounds, according to final results released this week. Those who completed the challenge from Sutter County averaged a loss of four percent in body weight, compared to an average of 3.5 percent in Yuba County.

Of 443 individuals who initially weighed in for the three-month competition, 115 completed the challenge and returned for a weigh out.

Claiming a first place prize of \$250 sponsored by Harmony Health Medical Clinic of Linda is Philip Killion of Olivehurst, who lost 10.56 percent of body weight. Improved onion crop in Imperial Valley

As their onion harvest nears completion, Imperial Valley farmers report improved crop quality and market outlook as compared to last year. Weather conditions in other states, coupled with water shortages in the San Joaquin Valley, prompted a shift to the Imperial Valley, where onion acreage nearly doubled this year. Engle Disciplined by State Supreme Court

Julius Engle, an attorney with a long list of attempts at elected office, has been suspended from the practice of law by the California Supreme Court.

As readers may recall, Attorney Julius Engel unsuccessfully tried twice to be elected a Superior Court Judge in Sacramento County, and then in Yuba County, and tried in 2010 to defeat Jan Scully to become District attorney of Sacramento County.

Now, in a recent decision on a matter filed in November of 2015 and that went to trial this year, Engel was separately charged with and found culpable in a 22 page decision by the Supreme Court for six separate counts of attorney misconduct, including "(1) failing to perform with competence; (2) failing to refund unearned fees; (3)

failing to communicate with client; (4) failing to render accounts of client funds; (5) making misleading statement to a State Bar investigator; and (6) failing to report to the State Bar a civil action against him for fraud, misrepresentation, breach of a fiduciary duty or gross negligence committed in a professional capacity."

On 6/8/2016, the California Supreme

Court ordered Engle be suspended. He will be required to pay costs to the State Bar and notify all of the courts in which he has cases, his opposing attorneys, and his clients that he is suspended. Further, he is required to take and pass the Ethics Bar Exam within one year. In addition, he will be required to pay restitution to his clients

John Sites – Colusa County Visionary

John Sites founder of the town of Sites. Born in 1832

Nestled amid rolling hills just west of Maxwell was once the small community of Sites, a gateway from the valley to the coast range. The area is an interesting one with its narrow road, one-way bridge and a sandstone quarry site where for generations visitors have scaled the mountain side to sign their names. What is also unique about this special valley is the founder of the town himself--John Sites.

Born on October 4, 1832 in Hesse, Germany, John Sites was only two years old when his mother died. Soon after, his father Henry took him to America where they located in Missouri. It appears that Sites had a limited formal education. Instead he assisted his father on the farm and was eventually hired out.

At the age of 18, Sites left Missouri on April 16, 1850 with a man by the name of Fisher. An agreement was made that Sites would work for Fisher for nine months upon arriving to California. In early May, the two embarked on their four-month journey across the plains along with 25 other individuals and six wagons. They arrived in Hangtown (Placerville) on August 14. By June 1, 1851, Sites had fulfilled his nine month duties and was now able to set out on his own.

Although one source noted that Sites first arrived to western Colusa County with a herd of cattle as early 1855, other research indicates that he settled in the area in 1858 where he eventually took up residence in what was known as Antelope Valley. According to the first set-

ties, this land was "lush with wild grasses of oats and clovers, so tall an antelope could hide in it".

In 1862, Sites switched from raising cattle to sheep. In addition, he eventually accumulated 500 acres of wheat and 40 acres of barley along with an orchard which produced "choice fruit" during the summer. At one time, Sites owned a total of 6,000 acres.

By the mid 1880s, a sandstone quarry operation was started by Alfred Knowles. The stone was reputed to be of "fine quality" and slabs were cut and carried by train to Colusa. The timing was ideal for Sites who had "laid out a map of a dream town" on his property on July 21, 1886. When the Colusa and Lake Railroad purchased his proposed town site in January 1887 as a railhead, the Company reportedly honored his plan by recording it with the county clerk with streets and the town square clearly depicted.

With the opening of the stone quarry, the town of Sites grew at a rapid pace.

By February 11, 1887, a 4th Class Post office was established with John A. McDonald as the first postmaster. Also, a two-story schoolhouse was built, replacing the old one constructed in 1871 on Sites land. In addition a store, depot, boarding house and a two-story hotel, which housed workers at the quarry, were added to the community. By 1889, a Methodist Church was established followed later in 1904 with a Catholic Church.

Over the years, several buildings in San Francisco were built from stone from the quarry including the St. Frances Hotel, the Flood and Shreve Buildings, the old Hall of Justice and the Ferry Building.

Unfortunately, cement began to replace sandstone. By 1917, all quarries were closed and the railroad to Sites ceased operation. Over the years, those remaining in the community continued to raise beef cattle as well as sheep and barley and grain crops.

Some readers may recall that in 1965 a forest fire overtook the small community of Sites eventually burning 65,000 acres. A half-dozen homes were destroyed along with other buildings, fences and a great number of sheep. However, one can still locate the wooden sign which reads: Sites Town Square--John Sites Founder 1887.

Now, nearly 130 years later, this area is making news again in the form of a proposed water project--the Sites Reservoir.

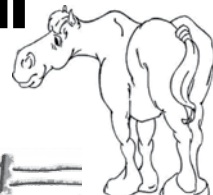

Interpreting Law

Article 6 of our (Federal) Constitution states “This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.”

In response to Houston Taylor's letter, I am appalled by judges that interpret laws to mean something that cannot be supported by the meaning of the words contained in those laws and the context in which they were written. Further, in conformance with Article 6 of our Federal Constitution, enforcement of law

of any State that is contrary to the supreme Law of our Land by “Judges in every State” is forbidden. As pointed out in Taylor's letter, as related to the 2nd Amendment, the actual meaning of many of the words contained therein is either ignored, or imputed to be different than that which those otherwise fluent in the language would understand them to mean. Also, it should be recognized that the 2nd Amendment is not the only victim of such unlawful judicial behavior.

ida, acting on behalf of law enforcement, requested information on the Islamic immigrants being inserted into his state, he was refused that vital public safety information.

While seeking to radically increase the number of Islamists being admitted to this country, this administration has failed not only to enforce our immigration laws but it has actively undermined those laws. WHEREAS, the scope of power defined by the Tenth Amendment means that the federal government was created by the states specifically to be an agent of the states; and

WHEREAS, today, in 2017, the states are demonstrably treated as agents of the federal government; and

WHEREAS, many federal laws are directly in violation of the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment assures that we, the people of the United States of America and each sovereign state in the Union of States, now have, and have always had, rights the federal government may not usurp; and

WHEREAS, Article IV, Section 4 says, “The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government”, and the Ninth Amendment states that “The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people”; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court has ruled in New York v. United States, 112 S. Ct. 2408 (1992), that Congress may not simply commandeer the legislative and regulatory processes of the states;

and

WHEREAS, a number of proposals from previous administrations and some now pending from the present administration and from Congress may further violate the Constitution of the United States.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE STATE OF JEFFERSON LEGISLATURE:
THAT the State of Jefferson hereby claims sovereignty under the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States over all powers not otherwise enumerated and granted to the federal government by the Constitution of the United States.
THAT this serve as Notice and Demand to the federal government, as our agent, to cease and desist, effective immediately, mandates that are beyond the scope of these constitutionally delegated powers.

THAT all compulsory federal legislation which directs states to comply under threat of civil or criminal penalties or sanctions or requires states to pass legislation or lose federal funding be prohibited or repealed.
THAT a copy of this resolution be distributed to the President of the United States, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate of each state’s



legislature of the United States of America, and each member of the State of Jefferson Congressional Delegation.

Protect Against Mosquito Bites

Marysville, Ca.

This year, the days leading up to summer have been filled with stories about the perils of mosquito bites, with particular attention given to Zika virus concerns coming out of South America. Although Zika has not turned up in northern California, Yuba County Public Health officials say there are still plenty of other illnesses carried by mosquitoes that should prompt people to protect themselves against bites.

"Many people do not realize that around the world mosquitoes are capable of carrying very serious diseases, including malaria, encephalitis, yellow fever, and the Zika virus, said Yuba County Health Officer Dr. Nichole Quick. "Around here, we are mostly concerned with mosquitoes spreading West Nile virus, which is capable of making people very sick."

Dr. Quick said there are steps the public can take to protect against mosquito bites:

Limit outdoor activities at dusk and dawn (when mosquitoes are most active)

When outdoors, wear loose fitting long sleeves and pants, and place netting over strollers and cribs or when sleeping outdoors

Apply insect repellent containing DEET, according to label instructions

Eliminate standing water, where mosquito breed Ensure windows and doors have tight fitting screens, and repair or replace any torn screens

Most who are infected with West Nile virus will not experience any symptoms. Up to 20 percent of infected individuals experience only mild to moderate symptoms, such as fever, headache, and body aches. Less than one percent of individuals will develop serious neurologic illness such as encephalitis and meningitis. The elderly and those with lowered immune systems are more susceptible to serious illness.

Yuba County Public Health is putting out information on mosquito borne illnesses as part of its health education program "Summer Fun Outreach Series 2016." Later in the summer, health officials will also provide information on sun exposure protection and water safety.

Warcraft: The Beginning

Graham Bradley

The spectators of the Historic Faire in Marysville were exposed to a treat that they did not understand. They received a special opportunity to stand next to a 1939 Graham Bradley Tractor.

The story behind the tractor is an interesting tale formed by the times, companies, people, war, and the trying forces of the Great Depression

The three Graham Brothers started their manufacturing with farm trucks. Farm trucks of the early teens and twenties were not necessarily well built and with many open chains and sprockets did not handle mud well. There was a great market for well designed finely engineered trucks. They built Graham Trucks and later built Dodge Trucks and sold the interests to the Dodge Brothers. They then went into automobile manufacturing and developed some fine autos. However, the Depression made it difficult to make a profit, so they decided to build tractors in 1937. They did not have a good distribution system and made an agreement with Sears Roebuck to sell and distribute the tractor. They

reserved the right to sell the tractors through their car dealerships.

Rural Free Delivery and the advent Parcel Post made mail order catalogs the "Big Box Store" of the time. Sears and Montgomery Wards became giants. "Monkies" was selling the Avery A as the Wards Twin Row so it was not unusual for Sears to sell tractors. They sold other tractors than the Graham.

Graham planned on making 10,000 units a year, but the agreement did not work. Actual machines made are elusive. Some say 200, others claim 300 while some suggest the real number might have been as high 2,000. Production logs suggest 2,243.

The proposal seemed a natural. Sears had great sales potential. They owned the David Bradley Equipment Company which was manufacturing equipment in Bradley III. This situation caused the name to become Graham Bradley.

The Model 103 was a Tricycle configuration and the 104 was of a utility design. The most common engine was the six cylinder Continental. It tested 30.38 horse-

power on the belt and 25.20 on the drawbar. It could easily pull two 14 plows and many claimed it could pull three 14 plows in a higher gear. The Bradley won many plowing contests including the Canadian International Plowing Match in 1938. The transmission was famous for it's high road gear and some farmers over ran the governor to attain speeds above 40 mph. Most of you have not driven a tractor with no camber and loose steering at 40 plus, but take my word for it the feeling is a bit scary. This gearing enabled the farmer to take crops to town reducing the need for a pickup. The tractor weighs around 4,955 pounds. The literature boasted a seat with a back, 6 cylinders, rear pto, electric start, lights, adjustable rear wheels, high road speeds, streamlining, and even hydraulic power cultivator lift. The GB had a lot of features for 1937. It is too bad production ceased in the summer of 1939.

The proud owner of this beautiful machine is Stu Wade of Chico and it is one of four believed to be west of the Rockies.
