Gloria Bozza Retirement 40 Years With The Postal Service



Brownsville, Ca. – Born and raised on Long Island New York Gloria moved to California after graduating from Farmingdale High School and Grace Downs Secretarial School. She taught shorthand and typing at Heald's Business College in Oakland and in San Francisco. In 1972 she moved to Dobbins, California, Yuba County, with her husband Bill and sons Billy and Nick. She immediately got involved with the community working as a teacher's aide at the Dobbins Elementary school for a couple of years and in the Planning De-

partment at Yuba County.

Gloria and her husband Bill volunteered in the building of the Dobbins/Oregon House Volunteer Fire Department in the late 1970's

Gloria's career with the U.S. Postal Service began as a clerk in Camptonville in 1976, then secretary at the Marysville Post Office. Her next move was supervisor at the Oroville Post Office and Officer in Charge at the Olivehurst Post Office.

In 1993 Gloria became the Postmaster in Brownsville where she has been for the last 23

years.

She now resides on 4 charming acres in Rackerby. Friday July 1, 2016 will be her last day before beginning retirement.

Gloria has always been active in community affairs and most likely will continue during her retirement. Her most recent venture/adventure was running for Sheriff of Gold Trader Flats in Forbestown. She won the election (at \$1 a vote) last year and is fulfilling her duties as the first saloon girl/sheriff.

Yuba County Incumbents Battered in Local Races

The local political landscape in Yuba County was rearranged by a tumultuous surge of anti-incumbent sentiment in the June 7th primary.

With approximately 1800 votes yet to be counted on Monday, January 13th, it appears of the three supervisors up for election, two will soon be gone and a third must face a runoff in the November Presidential Election.

In the 2nd supervisorial district, incumbent John Nicoletti was easily defeated by political newcomer Mike Leahy by a margin of 60% to 40%. In the 3rd district, Mary Jane Griego, suffered a 59% to 41% beating from newcomer Doug Lofton. In the 4th district, although he had come out against and was a leader in the fight to stop the contentious Magnolia Ranch Project, incumbent Roger Abe only collected 47% of the vote, short of the 50% plus 1 required, and now must face a runoff with second place finisher Gary Bradford who collected 36%

Griego was elected to the Yuba County Board of Supervisors in 2000, re-elected in 2004 and 2008, and served as Chair for 2005 2010, and 2015.

Supervisor Nicoletti was elected in November of 2004, re-elected in June 2008, 2012, and served as the Board of Supervisors Chairman in 2009 and 2014.

Supervisor Roger Abe was elected to the Yuba County Board of Supervisors in 2008, took office on January 5, 2009, and was re-elected in 2012. Supervisor Abe served as Board Chairman in 2011 and is the current chairman.

It seems there was a growing distrust of this Board of Supervisors to do what the people consider the right thing that created this turnover. There were the bungled attempts at passing a new marijuana cultivation ordinance complete with the allegations of Brown Act violations. Although, under this ordinance cultivators suffer no penalties, property owners pay the price for cultivation. While this pleased many, it angered enough voters to become an issue the three incumbents could not overcome.

Perhaps the biggest contribution to their demise, Griego and Nicoletti were strong proponents of the Magnolia Ranch Project north of Wheatland and recipients of campaign contributions from the developer. Voters have become prone to believe the campaign contributions sway the elected to vote for projects that favor the contributor. They have become jaded and believe that, no matter the intention, the supervisors, and their appointees, are in office to serve themselves and the government.

When the Board, with the strong support of Griego and

Nicoletti, voted for the Magnolia Ranch Project, it set in motion a voter initiative that soon forced the board to rescind the vote. It is from those efforts that much of the organized opposition to Griego and Nicoletti grew.

Another long-term incumbent, Thomas "Tib" Belza, current Chairman of the seven member Yuba County Water Agency Board of Directors, was overwhelmingly defeated by rice farmer Charlie Matthews by a margin of 59% to 41%.

Belza, whose service with the Agency dates back to 1989, faced an uphill battle with Matthews whose campaign was bolstered by his introduction of a voter initiative known as the Groundwater Fairness Act. Matthews claims if the initiative is qualified and passed by the voters in November, the Act would dictate a set of terms and conditions whereby proceeds from groundwater sales would be equitably distributed to entities and taxpayers within Yuba County.

It was anticipated with the interest in the campaigns for president, and with two marijuana initiatives on the ballot which were defeated soundly, Yuba County's electorate would have turned out in high numbers. It was anticipated the vote would run as high as 60%. However, as the vote count nears a final tabulation, it only hovers at close to 49%.

Notes – Commentary

This primary election may be remembered as unmatched in intensity, chicanery, and lawsuits. The trouble preceded campaign season with the anti-Magnolia Ranch movement having thousands of referendum signatures disqualified by the Yuba County Board of Supervisors (YCBOS). The supervisors were then twice overruled in court before CEM Investors withdrew the Magnolia Housing Project, denying an election.

The question remains on who picks up the legal costs of county counsel defending Magnolia Ranch against thousands of Yuba County citizens. CEM said they would. Did they? And does the anti-Magnolia Ranch group get reimbursed for legal fees defending their constitutional right to put a measure on the ballot.

The Pro and Anti-Magnolia Ranch people will get to vote after all when incumbent Roger Abe faces challenger Gary Bradford. Abe opposed Magnolia Ranch favoring a vote of the people. Abe says, "Magnolia Ranch is big money for the developer, but terrible for the people of Wheatland and Plumas Lake. It would be a traffic nightmare, destroy farmland and jobs, and is too close to Beale AFB."

Plumas Lake, a beautiful subdivision with attractive schools, did not build out nor create promised businesses and on-going employment. Abe was not on the board when the project was planned but believes supervisors should work to facilitate promises made.

CEM'S Al Montna, Supervisor Griego, pro-Magnolia Ranch forces and unions are going after Abe. Their candidate, pro-Magnolia Ranch Bradford is on the Olivehurst Public Utility Board but has a record of not attending meetings and being confused on what benefits Magnolia Ranch will produce.

Measure A, drafted by citizens to replace a badly flawed county code governing marijuana growing, lost. Supervisors have twice approved codes that are either cumbersome to enforce or too expensive to comply with. Measure A proponents filed a lawsuit against opponents.

Although Marysville council members colluded to approve a marijuana dispensary ordinance, Yuba County residents rejected Measure B to permit dispensaries. City dispensary zoning favors developer David Lanza's properties. Lanza backed the council's desire to raise sales taxes on purchases in the city. Crony-capitalism comes natural to politicians who have too much power.

The 2017 YCBOS faces two huge financial black holes ... pensions / health benefits and the Tribal Casino. County employee pension / health benefits are unsustainable and will bankrupt the county. The BOS by not renegotiating the 2002 Memorandum of Understanding gave the tribe a 50% discount on reimbursements to the county for services rendered.

Supervisors Roger Abe and Andy Vasquez twice asked the board to open negotiations since 16 years have passed since the original MOU. Supervisors Stocker, Griego and Nicoletti opposed. The outcome will be the taxpayers underwriting county services to the casino. Griego and Nicoletti have served the tribe well.

With the defeat of Nicoletti, Griego and Yuba County Water Agency (YCWA) Director Tib Belza, 3 of the 7 member board will be new. After staying the course for fifty years working with PG&E paying off bonds and managing water flows it is a different world now. The agency is producing and selling power and water, responsible for all maintenance and deciding how to manage all revenue.

How should "excess" revenue be spent? Does including all five supervisors on the YCWA board create a conflict of interest with the BOS? The make-up of the YCWA board hasn't always included all five supervisors.

Should a handful of business people make millions of dollars from pumping water, a resource many believe belongs to all Yuba County residents? Adding three new board members, including rice farmer / water pumper Charlie Matthews who has been an adversary of YCWA could lead to some turbulent board discussions.

Gold Sox Win Series Against Chico Heat

The Marysville Gold Sox opened their 2016 season with a strong series win, taking two of three from the Chico Heat to kick off their first season in the Great West League.

On Opening Night at Colusa Casino Stadium on Friday, June 3rd, the Gold Sox turned to starter Jack Cushing from Georgetown University who pitched five strong innings of one-run ball on just two hits. His nerves were probably calmed as the Sox scored early and often, putting up eight runs in the bottom of the first, and twelve runs over the course of the game. Joseph Zimmer, Adrian Vela, Dalton deVries, Chris Papapietro, and T.J. Dove all had big hits during the game, and helped to chase Heat starter Stuart Bradley during the first inning. The final score was 12 - 4 as the Heat chipped away at the lead but gave up four more runs in the bottom of the fifth.

1,384 fans watched the opening night win at Colusa Casino Stadium as the Gold Sox improved to 13 - 1 in season openers since 2003. New Gold Sox Manager Mike Walker also won his first game as Gold Sox Manager starting the season strong.

Over the weekend, the Sox traveled to Chico and split their two games there, losing Saturday and winning

on Sunday.

On Saturday, the Sox lost 10 - 1 thanks in part to Chico designated hitter Clayton Hubbard who drove in six runs on the night. Chico starter Ryan Byrd limited the Gold Sox to just one run on seven hits and two walks, getting bailed out by great defensive plays including several double plays to end Sox rallies.

But it was a different story on Sunday, as the Gold Sox prevailed 9 - 6 to win the rubber match and the series, improving to 2 and 1 on the young season. The Sox jumped on the Chico starter in the first inning for the second time in three days as they scored five runs to start the game off of the Heat's John White. Marysville turned to starter Shinpei Kanamori, newly arrived from Japan for the season. Shinpei lasted 4 1/3 with 3 earned runs, 1 strikeout and 5 walks. Though the final line isn't pristine, Kanamori gutted through some tough outs and induced many rally-ending ground balls in the 100 degree heat for an impressive American debut in front of a hostile Chico crowd. The Gold Sox traded runs with the Heat for the rest of the game, holding on to win 9 - 6, ensuring a happy trip home (with celebratory In-N-Out burgers for all).

Gold Sox General Manager Michael Mink said "It was a great

weekend with a win on opening day and a strong start to our season. Our guys battled on the road Sunday to capture the series, and we're excited to be back home on Tuesday to play in front of our fans."


The Sox will have a day off Monday before starting their first series with the Lodi Crushers on Tuesday. All three games against the Crushers will begin at 7:05 PM and the Sox have three exciting events planned. On Tuesday, the Sox are having an election night party where fans who wear their "I Voted" sticker get buy one, get one free general admission tickets. Wednesday night, the Gold Sox are whitening out the stands with a "White Out Wednesday" planned. Fans who wear white will get in for \$5 general admission. We also will have \$2 beer and hot dogs to cool you down and fill you up as you cheer on your Gold Sox.

FISHIN' TALK

We hear the snow is melting quite rapidly up in the high country which is causing a rise in streams, rivers and creeks on the way down the hill. Be aware of the possibility of higher water in areas you go trout fishing and usually find summer like conditions.

With open season on all areas of water for trout we must be prepared for the unexpected. What does a person do when fly fishing and find no hatch, no activity on the surface of the stream with nothing flying to copy or imitate? Well folks, I believe in a couple of famous flies which will work well when there is no indication what the trout are feeding on. One of these is the famous wolly bugger, which we believe was derived from the wolly worm (think a fat caterpillar). This fly can be tied short or on long shank hooks. The latter is good for imitating, according to color, large insects, small shiner minnows or small trout minnows and even crawdads. We have also tied this artificial with a bead or split shot at the head.

I recall my friend Don, who lived above Nevada City. He had a fly he tied and claimed was the best anywhere. He tied it black except for the tail which was bright red. One opening morning many years ago I accompanied him on a trip to fish the South Fork of the Yuba River. I caught the first rainbow, a feisty 12 inch fish and was turning him loose when Don

let out a yell. I watched him fight the fish as it ran up and down the river. He was waist deep in the water when the big fish finally gave up the fight. He was sitting on the rocks, a smile as big as he ever had when I pulled out the DE liar scale. That fish measured a hair less than 30 inches. I never doubted Don's fly tying again...in fact I talked him into tying me a couple of those black devils.

Another fly is known as the streamer fly and most of the time is tied on a long shank hook using various colored feathers and so on. A favorite on mine used to be the pheasant colors. As per the fly described above, including the streamer, these are designated as a "wet fly" and are usually fished on or near the bottom of the stream or river.

While on the subject of fly fishing how many out there who read this column have trolled with flies? I was introduced

to this idea back in the 80's by a friend while fishing the Umpqua River in Oregon. We used float tubes and fins to fish parts of the slow water and caught some nice rainbows.

Shad fishing has slowed down considerably as the fish are winding down on their yearly run into local rivers. Stripers are still around but this run is also on the last part of the run this year.

A report from the Eagle Lake area tells us the fishing has improved some since the opener when the place was overrun with boats, people and vehicles. Once this area gets back to normal in regard to activity we hope the fishing will improve.

Boots fishing tip of the week: If you get skunked at a favorite lake or reservoir be sure to try again. Many bodies of water, which hold trout, have unsuccessful days which turn into limits the next day.



Assembly Approves Cannabis Excise Tax

The Trinity Journal reports Assemblyman Jim Wood's proposed excise tax AB 2243 won a major victory last week, passing the Assembly with 60 votes. Any new tax in California requires the support of two-thirds of each house (54 votes in the Assembly) necessitating support from both Democrats and Republicans.

"I have worked from day one to ensure our rural communities have the resources we need to prevent, and clean up the environmental catastrophe currently under way in our forests and watersheds," Wood said. "This excise tax was part of AB 243 last year and was ultimately pulled at the last minute; this victory today is a huge step

forward."

AB 2243 would levy a \$9.25 per ounce tax on cannabis flowers, a \$2.75 per ounce tax on cannabis leaves and a \$1.25 tax on immature cannabis plants from nurseries. The tiered approach is modeled after the way alcohol is taxed based on the potency of the product, and is designed to ensure funding goes to the most impacted communities.

"AB 2243 imposes a reasonable tax on the production and distribution of commercial cannabis and will focus revenue on the communities, forests, and rivers," said Hezekiah Allen, executive director of the California Growers Association.

AB 2243 is projected

to raise nearly \$80 million annually. These funds will be distributed as follows:

30 percent to fund the Watershed Enforcement Team;

30 percent for local law enforcement;

30 percent for environmental cleanup on public and private lands;

8 percent to restart state funding of the Williamson Act;

2 percent to fund inter-agency regional enforcement coordinators within the Department of Justice.

"Last year the Legislature took important steps to create a regulatory and licensing structure for medical marijuana," said Paul A. Smith, senior legislative advocate with the Rural County Representatives of California. "AB 2243 fleshes out the Legislature's work by providing the financial resources to preserve the integrity of the regulatory structure, with a special emphasis on addressing the environmental impacts associated with marijuana cultivation."

AB 2243 will now go to the Senate to be heard next in Senate Rules Committee.



1946 BNH John Deere

The Colusa Farm Show claims to be the oldest Farm Show in California. A few years back the Stockton Farm Show ceased operation and many of the vendors came north and made a difference in size of the Colusa Show. The largest show is in Tulare. The Colusa Farm Show is a showcase for improvements in agricultural technology: new tools, techniques, time saving machines and a spectrum from traps to GPS are present. Even if you are not into farming, it is a highly recommended visit in early February.

I am also most appreciative to Valley Truck and Tractor for giving me space to take some Vintage Machines, make some old fashioned noise, visit, hear stories from the old timers, and every now and then get

a lead on an old tractor. Such is the case of this 1946 BNH John Deere. B meaning model B, N meaning narrow or single front wheel, and H meaning Hi-Crop.

Tim Hansen stopped by a few years ago to visit about my display. As the conversation advanced, Tim suggested he had a tractor he did not want and thought I might have a trade I knew there were not many BNHs, so that night I went into my library and looked into the John Deere Production Log and discovered there were 446 built. I called Tim in Oakdale and told him I was interested. He said it was rough, didn't run and I would need a winch to move the tractor. I accumulated what I thought I would need and drove to Oakdale. We opened

the doors to Tim's Barn and I saw the BNH. "Rough" is a relative term. "Shocked", seemed more realistic. It took about an hour to remove the pallets, wire and junk to get the tractor into a towing position.

I immediately discovered the brakes and engine were seized. I removed the brakes. I took on out my "Snatch Block" and rigged it into the line of my 9,500 pound winch and with some effort got it on the trailer.

As we began the restoration, it became quickly evident the tractor had sat outside and in the barn for years. The effort to get the barrels off required a cutting torch to cut the rods and a 55 ton press to get the pistons out. Josh Truchak of Oregon House and Dax Kimmelshue of Durham were very helpful in the year and a half to complete the job. The rear tires were a particular scary issue. They are 40s which are not readily available and are \$1,000 a piece. They had been flat for years. One of the lucky things that happened with the tractor is that they have held air since I pumped them full. I therefore don't drive it much. The BNH is rare and all the money and effort were spent wisely.

The tractor was built on November 6 and shipped to San Francisco on November 8 and on to Hayward. The unit was sold by the Hoyt and Buettner Tractor Company on Meekland Avenue. Most likely the first owner was Ermine Theodore. The most active operator was Art Abbott who lost his right arm. I did not remove the modification of the clutch lever for Art's foot nor the hangers for easier mounting the cultivators in honor of Art. The John Deere spent most of its' life in the Pleasanton-Livermore area cultivating



the numerous vegetable crops that used to exist in that region.

The popular John Deere Model B was built from 1935 to 1952. The unstyled was manufactured from 1935 to 1938. John Deere hired an Industrial Designer by the name of Dreyfuss and beginning

in 1939 he changed the machines to be more streamlined in appearance, more efficient, having greater comfort and more ergonomically correct. Unit production accrued to about 300,000 by the end of the run. Original Bs produced 14.03 horsepower on the drawbar

and by 1947 power had been boosted to 24.62. A basic B in 1939 could be purchased for \$786. Bs would weigh about 3,390 pounds depending on options.

The Production Log shows 446 BNHs were built. 1946 saw 37 built and in November 46 production was 7.

These anonymous



Bernie Sanders Model, Venezuela

According to CNN Money, soda icon Coca-Cola announced May 24th that it had temporarily stopped production of its flagship drink Coke and relate sugar based beverages due to sugar shortages from Venezuela. The halt in production was confined only to plants located in the beleaguered country and is just another in a long line of troubles the South American country has found itself in due to its extreme economic

problems. The nation's government can't afford to pay many of its bills because of rampant and ongoing overspending by an obviously misguided ruling class.

It was just a few months ago when we told you the Venezuelan government had to fly in cargo planes full of its paper currency because its own printing presses couldn't keep up with the governments rampant spending. Inflation is in high gear and likely going higher in a country that has simply promised more than

it could produce. The country's authorities has curtailed government employee work hours to two days a week to save on power and it can't afford to pay for basic imports such as sugar, milk eggs and flour.

This is causing empty super market shelves amongst critical shortages of many foodstuffs including the sugar Coke needs to makes its product.

The company said it will continue to pump out its water and non-sugared products as long as

its supply lines stayed intact and that the production cuts would cause some workers to become idle.

Making matters worse, Venezuela's main source of energy, the El Guri dam is not producing as much electricity as designed due to what the government claims as low water levels blamed on drought, but experts say mismanagement is the main cause of the power shortages. Rolling blackouts lasting four hours a day are taking place in many cities and government official pushed its time zone ahead by 30 minute to accommodate working hours.

Because of its massive inflation, the Venezuela's economy is in tatters and thought to be one of the worst in the world by many economists. Inflation is expected to rise to nearly 500% annually with many experts saying actual inflation is much worse.

According to the IMF, its economy shrank by 5.7 % last year and forecasts that Venezuela will be in recession until at least 2019. Sounds like a shortage of Coke is the least of Venezuela's problems.

Food and Farm News

Farmers harvest more apricots – Things look better in California apricot orchards this season. Farmers and marketers say production has improved, in part because apricot trees received enough chilly weather during the winter. An official estimate is due out next month, but farmers say they expect to see an average-sized crop in the range of 50,000 tons. Apricot harvest will continue for the rest of this month in the San Joaquin Valley.

Sunflower acreage recovers – More sunflowers will be blooming across the Sacramento Valley this summer. Plantings have rebounded after falling last year due to reduced demand overseas. Most California sunflowers are grown for seed, which is sold to farmers in other parts of the nation and world who grow the crop for sunflower oil. Russia and Ukraine represent two key markets--and political tensions in that region may have contributed to lower demand a year ago.

Weather losses cut prune crop 58 percent – This year's California prune crop could be the smallest in nearly 100 years of record-keeping. Cold temperatures, high winds and heavy rains hit Sacramento Valley prune orchards in March. That, combined with reduced acreage, will cut the state's prune production by 58 percent compared to last year, according to a new estimate. If that comes true, it would be the smallest prune crop since the state began official estimates in 1920.

Study tracks Americans' eating habits – As the recession eased, Americans resumed eating out more: That's the conclusion of a new federal study. The percentage of food prepared away from home dipped for four years beginning in 2007, roughly corresponding to the recession. Researchers said Americans economized by preparing more food at home. But the proportion of food prepared away from home has since returned to pre-recession levels: about 34 percent.

PG&E and Division of Boating and Waterways Warn of Higher, Colder Flows

Sacramento, Ca. – With more snow melt this year than in recent years, California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW) and Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) are warning water enthusiasts to be aware of colder and higher river and stream flows, and to take precautions when in or near water.

Snow pack measurements this winter and spring were greater than last year. The additional spring snow melt means more and colder water than California has seen in several years. The swift water can create treacherous conditions for all recreationists – waders, swimmers, paddlers, boaters, anglers and hikers cooling off at the water's edge.

"While the drought is not over, we have the best snowpack in years. We ask those enjoying the outdoors to be careful near mountain streams, rivers and reservoirs. Water flows can fluctuate as snow melts faster on warmer days, so always be prepared for a change in conditions," said Ed Halpin, senior vice president of generation and chief nuclear officer for PG&E.

"As we enjoy getting back out on and in the water, it is critical that we exercise extra caution and awareness, especially if venturing into unfamiliar waterways, or areas impacted by the drought. Know the Law

- Every child under 13 must wear a Coast Guard-approved life jacket when on a moving recreational vessel of any length.

- A Coast Guard-approved life jacket must be carried for each person

on board a boat. This includes rigid or inflatable paddlecraft.

- Every person on board a personal watercraft (popularly known as "jet skis") and any person being towed behind a vessel must wear a Coast Guard-approved life jacket.

- It is against the law to operate a boat or water ski with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of 0.08 percent or more. You can be arrested even when your BAC is less than 0.08 percent if conditions are deemed to be unsafe.





Breaking the Promise

Congressman McClintock delivered the following remarks on the House floor in regard to H.R. 5278, June 9, 2016 – "PROMESA"



The House is expected to take up the "PROMESA" bill today, June 9, 2016, with serious implications to every taxpayer in the country.

This bill applies a form of Chapter Nine bankruptcy to the general obligation bonds of Puerto Rico that are guaranteed by the commonwealth's constitution.

Article VI, Section 8 of Puerto Rico's constitution explicitly provides that "interest on the public debt and amortization thereof shall be paid first." PROMESA ignores the Puerto Rican constitution and breaks that promise.

Here's why this is so important to the rest of the country. Every state government has similar constitutional provisions that guarantee their general obligation bonds. This is what allows them to borrow at extremely low interest rates, because their debt is constitutionally guaranteed and therefore the risk of default is extremely low.

If Congress is willing to undermine a territory's constitutionally guaranteed bonds today, there is every reason to believe it would be willing to undermine a state's guarantee tomorrow.

This, in turn, invites credit markets to question such guarantees as being no longer secured on constitutional bedrock, but rather dependent on the shifting whims of Congress. And this, in turn, means

the value of those bonds is devalued and interest rates paid by taxpayers on that debt will increase.

The governors of six states have already raised this warning. And the U.S. Virgin Islands, whose credit is directly undermined by this bill, wants out of the bill for that reason.

PROMESA could have respected the \$18 billion of constitutionally guaranteed debt and focused instead on restructuring the \$54 billion of Puerto Rican municipal debt that is not constitutionally guaranteed. After all, there is no reason to treat San Juan's municipal debt any differently than San Jose's. But constitutionally-issued debt is fundamentally different, and its reliability must be maintained. Tellingly, supporters of the bill voted down just such an amendment in committee.

Supporters say they have addressed this concern by inserting instructions to the control board to "respect the relative lawful priorities in the constitution, other laws, or agreements." Ironically, one of those "other laws" the control board is instructed to respect is the government's repudiation of its debt.

Furthermore, the same section instructs the control board to "provide adequate funding for public pension systems," and includes other contradictory instructions. The only possible interpretation of these provisions is that the sanctity of the sovereign debt is subject to balancing – and therefore subordination to junior claims -- by the control board.

Just last week, Treasury Secretary Jack Lew and the White House admitted this was the intent of the bill.

Meanwhile, another provision of PROMESA prevents lawful bond holders from enforcing their claims in court for a period of six

months, but does not prevent the government from paying out other junior claims during this period.

Indeed, in anticipation of this bill, the new budget for Puerto Rico INCREASES general fund spending while it radically reduces its debt service payments.

Honoring the rule of law and maintaining the commonwealth's full faith and credit guarantee would be a powerful signal to bond markets that the United States stands by its promises, even when it is inconvenient.

Under current law, it is in the interest of both sides – debtor and creditor – to work out terms that both can live with to restructure and repay this debt. Indeed, until the prospect of a congressional bailout arose, Puerto Rico was negotiating terms of a debt restructuring with the mutual consent of its creditors.

It is also in the interest of the people of Puerto Rico to uphold the full faith and credit clause in their constitution, which will be vitally important for them to re-enter the credit market once their affairs are put back in order.

Puerto Rico faces both a crisis and an opportunity: a crisis born of slavish devotion to failed leftist economic policies and an opportunity to replace those policies with proven free market solutions that can create a fresh start for the people of Puerto Rico and shine as a beacon of hope for other similarly afflicted states.

I fear the net result of this legislation will be to spread the crisis to other states with heavy debts by increasing their debt service costs, while squandering the opportunity to revive the Puerto Rican economy and to restore the American dream to that beautiful island.
