Vet Clinic on Wheels Will Help Unhoused Pets

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Bradshaw Animal Shelter will pioneer a mobile pet clinic this fall to address the healthcare needs of pets belonging to unhoused individuals in Sacramento County. This initiative, named PAWS (Pet Aid and Wellness Services), will be the first of its kind in the region. Offering vital veterinary care on the go, the clinic's foremost focus will be on spaying and neutering as many pets as possible. Additionally, PAWS will be equipped to provide vaccinations as well as medical care and diagnostic services for ill and injured pets.

"By bringing essential veterinary services directly

to unhoused pet owners and making spaying and neutering surgeries accessible, we hope to make a positive impact on both the pets and the individuals who love them," said Annette Bedsworth, Director of Bradshaw Animal Shelter.

The mobile clinic will operate at least three days a week, traveling to different locations throughout Sacramento County, strategically identifying and adapting its schedule to serve areas where these services are most urgently required.

In addition to the clinic removing the barrier of transportation, PAWS will also remove the financial barrier of essential veterinary care. All services will be sponsored by Sacramento County

with funds provided by the federal American Rescue Plan Act.

Dr. Cynthia Metcalf, who joined Sacramento County as a veterinarian last month, will be dedicated to the mobile pet clinic full-time. This work resonates deeply with Dr. Metcalf, who understands firsthand the importance of the bond between pets and their human companions, especially during challenging times. She shared that her tremendous passion for PAWS stems from her father, a Vietnam veteran who became unhoused and was diagnosed with schizophrenia. In addition to her love for animals, Dr. Metcalf is compassionate about the complex reasons that can lead to people experiencing homelessness.

"This is very personal for me," Dr. Metcalf said. "I know what it's like to have a family member who has been unhoused, and I know how important our family dog was to him and how their bond helped him, so this program really resonates with me."

PAWS represents a significant milestone in ensuring that the region's most vulnerable pets are able to receive medical care, and will help reduce unwanted litters, pet overpopulation, and preventable diseases in the County.

FBI Announces Results of Local Operation Tied to Nationwide Sex Trafficking

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)- The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Sacramento Field Office, working with its state and local partners, identified, and located two victims of sex trafficking during a nationwide enforcement campaign, called “Operation Cross Country.” The FBI-led nationwide initiative, in partnership with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), focused on identifying and locating victims of sex trafficking and investigating and arresting individuals and criminal enterprises involved in both child sex and human trafficking. Law enforcement agencies conducted targeted operations to identify and apprehend offenders, dismantling criminal networks and preventing further harm to victims. Those suspects identified will be subject to additional investigation for potential charges.

In the greater Sacramento area, FBI agents worked collaboratively with law enforcement partners from Sacramento Police Department, Sacramento County Sheriff’s Office, California Department of Justice, Sacramento County District Attorney’s Office, Yolo County District Attorney’s Office during the two-week



operation. Two adolescent victims and more than a dozen adults who are possible victims of human trafficking were identified during the operation were provided access to services coordinated by operational partner Community Against Sexual Harm (CASH). Five individuals were also arrested for charges related to commercial sexual exploitation. “The FBI’s primary focus is ensuring every possible victim of commercial sexual exploitation has the opportunity to connect with service providers and move beyond the cycle of exploitation and violence,” said Special Agent in Charge Sean Ragan of the FBI Sacramento Field Office. “We are grateful for the support of our law enforcement partners to provide the victims of human trafficking with the dignity they deserve and ensure their exploiters face justice.

The FBI remains steadfast in its commitment to combatting child exploitation and human trafficking. Operation Cross Country is just one facet of the Bureau’s ongoing efforts to protect the most vulnerable members of society and hold offenders accountable. The FBI encourages continued vigilance, cooperation, and reporting from the public to help identify and recover victims and bring perpetrators to justice. ★

How Misguided Drug Pricing Policies Worsen Drug Shortages

More than 300 medicines are in short supply across the United States.

It’s no great mystery why doctors and patients face an unprecedented dearth of essential medicines, especially generics. Today’s shortages were created by a faulty drug marketplace and have been exacerbated by ill-considered government policies.

Shortages tend to arise when there are few suppliers in a marketplace. Consider that, if a given product is made by multiple producers in different locations, each with its own processes and inputs, then a single event, such as a hurricane or earthquake, probably won’t shut them all down.

Ironically, a root cause of the current crisis is a “shortage” of drug buyers, rather than suppliers. Just three drug purchasing intermediaries known as pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) control 80% of drug transactions, extracting enormous discounts and rebates from manufacturers. This near monopoly has distorted the generic drug market considerably.

Then there’s the increasingly unworkable margins generic drugmakers face.

Together, PBMs and unrealistically tight margins are putting maximum pressure on manufacturers of generic drugs,

which make up over 90% of all prescriptions filled in the United States. Unfortunately, lawmakers have done little to address PBMs, and have adopted strict drug price controls that could make it even harder for generic drugmakers to operate.

Through mergers with one another and other companies, PBMs have amassed enormous power. For example, CVS Health Corporation owns not just a chain of drugstores but also Aetna, an insurer, and Caremark, one of the biggest PBMs, as well as Red Oak Sourcing, one of the big three wholesale distributors of generic medicines.

A system with just a few buyers picking their suppliers purely based on cost with little to no consideration of supply chain strength, manufacturing redundancies, or multi source contracts quickly becomes a race to the bottom, driving many competing suppliers away.

A manufacturer can only lose money on a product for so long before they abandon that product altogether. That can leave just a single producer of many generic drugs, with no competitors to fill the gap in the event of interruptions.

Lawmakers have made matters worse by adopting strict price controls, like those included in last

year’s partisan Inflation Reduction Act. Some progressive members now want to expand the IRA’s policies before they’ve even taken effect.

Even worse, as price controls for branded medicines take hold, some generic manufacturers could decide to leave particular therapeutic areas. Fewer suppliers would mean more single-source drugs. Patients could face new shortages, including for brand-name drugs as a result.

The first price controls will be set starting this year and take effect in 2026. But critical market entry decisions will be made well before that. Generic drugmakers are already watching their future markets dry up.

Patients are in trouble, faced with rationing doses, substituting medicines, or simply waiting for the treatments they need. Tragically, between the nefarious behavior of middlemen and the price controls coming down the pike, this crisis will get worse before it gets better.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County’s Department of Child, Family, and Adult Services (DCFAS) hosted its first post-pandemic Resource Family Appreciation Picnic. The last time the event was held was in 2019. On Saturday, July 22, staff took time out of their weekend to show their support and gratitude to dozens of resource families at the picnic. Over 70 staff members volunteered at the event, which took place at William Land Park.

There were kids' activities, games, and raffles during the picnic. DCFAS provided meal and dessert tickets for food trucks and families were given tickets to the Sacramento Zoo, Funderland, and Fairytale Town. Several community partners also attended the event and provided information and educational materials to families.

Resource Families, also known as foster families, provide loving homes to children who are unable to be safely maintained with their parents. While reunification is always the primary goal, many resource families also provide legal permanency for children when reunification

cannot be achieved. Sacramento County recognizes the tremendous contributions of resource families and all the ways they make a difference for the children and families in our communities.

“The impact our Resource Families make on the lives of the children and youth we serve is immeasurable. They are both a safety net and a bridge for healing and are often our greatest facilitators of change. We appreciate our partnership with our Resource Families on behalf of all efforts being made for the kids and families we serve,” says Sacramento County's Deputy Director of Child Protective Services Melissa Lloyd.

The picnic celebrated current resource families, however, DCFAS also wants to take this opportunity to acknowledge the need for more families to provide this critical service. While there are many homes in the community prepared to care for very young children, the areas of most need are for our adolescent and teen populations, as well as for sibling sets and children with medical needs. CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - A nonprofit, PRIDE Industries and MealPro in Citrus Heights have teamed up to help provide disabled youth an opportunity to gain valuable culinary job skills they will need to enter a commercial kitchen, and quickly get to work.

The first three students completed their training last week and more are expected to enroll soon, said MealPro chief executive Officer and Chef San Catanio, founder and chief executive of the Culinary Staples Foundation (CSF) who taught the course at MealPro’s Citrus Heights headquarters at 7749 Greenback Lane.

“We’re especially proud of our first three course participants who have received their completion certificates,” said Catanio.

The three students, Kobe, Isaac and Stephen, identified by first names, who recently completed the culinary staples training program that was taught by Catanio, received a thorough introduction to kitchen safety and the professional prep cooking skills needed to work in a fast-paced, modern commercial kitchen environment. The trio also earned their food handling certificates.

“Our goal is to help prepare our students with the confidence they’ll need for entry-level restaurant positions in the local Sacramento region and to encourage their success,” Catanio said.

PRIDE Industries and another nonprofit, On My Own Community Services, had made past presentations to the Citrus Heights Chamber of Commerce about their missions to help disabled workers obtain training and find meaningful work resonated with him, said MealPro founder and chief executive officer Andy Sartori.

“MealPro eagerly signed up to become an employer partner with PRIDE Industries, and we’ve since provided some internships to their participants,” Sartori said.

“That’s about when Chef Dan Catanio and I decided to create a specific program at MealPro to teach participants the basics of working in a commercial culinary environment,” he said.

MealPro itself has doubled the size of its Citrus Heights operations, as Sartori bought the building which houses its corporate headquarters and its commercial kitchens.

Catanio is a well-known executive chef in the Sacramento region. ★

His non-profit Culinary Staples Foundation (CSF) is headquartered at MealPro in Citrus Heights. Catanio, also a past executive producer of the “Culinary Magic Cooking Show”, has produced over 100, 30-minute cooking shows for a local community access cable channel.

In time, Catanio hopes to offer to the public a regular schedule of cooking classes in MealPro’s Greenback Lane commercial kitchens.

“We’ve now opened this culinary arts training program to the community at no cost,” Sartori said.

The recent two-week culinary training program for disabled youth in Sacramento and Placer counties was taught at MealPro’s corporate headquarters in Citrus Heights, Sartori said.

While MealPro provides on-site culinary training, the staff at PRIDE Industries in Citrus Heights will help provide job placement opportunities to the three recent program graduates.

The three students, Kobe, Isaac and Stephen, took courses in the fundamentals of food safety, kitchen equipment and customer service as well as receiving hands-on experience.

Participants must either be currently enrolled in PRIDE Industries, or if they wish to participate in the culinary arts training program without enrollment in PRIDE, must complete a required interview and drug screening.

Catanio said all participants should demonstrate a willingness to learn and a desire to seek employment in the culinary industry with an availability to attend in-person training from Monday through Thursday from 9 am to 1 p.m. at MealPro’s culinary center at 7433 Greenback Lane in Citrus Heights.

MealPro is focused on creating a custom approach to nutrition, the kind that helps athletes perform, and busy professionals stay healthy,” Sartori said. “We want to make custom nutrition affordable and accessible to everyone – everywhere. Social Security Matters

I'm a Veteran. How Do I Get My Extra Social Security?

Proposals In California Legislature Would Encourage Government Secrecy

Dear Rusty: As a military veteran, I was told that the final amount of my Social Security should be a little higher as a reward for military service. If so, I have two questions: 1. How much is the boost? 2. How can I know that amount has been applied? **Signed: Unsure**

Dear Unsure: We receive questions about this fairly often from our military veterans. I want to first thank you for your service to our country and then assure you that, as a military veteran myself, I have thoroughly investigated this subject - the so-called "Special Extra Credit for Military Service," which is widely misunderstood. Although someone suggested that your Social Security benefit "is supposed to be a little higher" because you are a military veteran, allow me to share how this somewhat obscure rule actually works.

Any extra money for military veterans does not come in the form of a special "boost" to their Social Security benefit because of their military service; instead, certain older veterans receive extra credit to their earnings for the years they served. Those extra earnings are applied only to those who served in specific years, as additional dollars added to their actual earnings record for their service-years. The amount added to the veteran's

true service-year earnings varies a bit depending on which years you served. For example, if you served between 1957 – 1977, your actual earnings for each service-year would be increased by \$300 for each full quarter you had active duty pay to a maximum of \$1200 additional earnings per service-year. The credit is computed a bit differently for those who served between 1978 – 2001, but the maximum annual earnings credit for those service years is the same - \$1,200. And, for clarity, those who served before 1957 get extra earnings credit under an entirely different formula, and those who served after 2001 receive no extra credits for their military service years.

So how might this affect your Social Security benefit? Well, when your benefit is claimed, Social Security reviews your lifetime earnings record, inflates each actual annual amount to equal today's dollar equivalent, and selects the highest earning 35 years from your lifetime record to calculate your "Primary Insurance Amount" or "PIA" (your PIA is the amount you are entitled to at full retirement age). If your military service-years are among the 35 years used to compute your PIA when you claim, then the "Special Extra Credit for Military Service" will result in a somewhat higher PIA (a slightly higher monthly SS benefit). If the highest earning 35 years in your lifetime record do not include your military-service-years, then those extra credits added to your earnings for your military-service-years will have no effect on your Social Security benefit (because using those service-years would result in a lower benefit). How Social Security applies those

special extra credits to your service-year earnings also varies depending on when you served. Those who served before 1968 needed to show their DD-214 to get the extra credits, but those who served in between 1968 – 2001 were automatically given the extra credits based on their military service records.

So, if your military service was between 1968 and 2001, your earnings during the years you served were automatically increased by SS to reflect your "special extra" earnings and - if those years are among the highest of the 35 years used to compute your SS benefit - you are now receiving the extra benefit amount you're entitled to from those credits. If you have at least 35 years over your lifetime where you earned more than your pay while serving in the military, your current benefit is more than it would be if your military service years were included. If you have questions about your earnings during your military service years, you may wish to obtain a copy of your lifetime earnings history from Social Security to review those amounts (easiest way to get your lifetime earnings history is via your personal "my Social Security" account at www.ssa.gov/myaccount.

Bill McEwen, a columnist for San Joaquin Valley news site GV Wire, posed several of what he considered to be routine factual questions to the state Department of Public Health last week about a mysterious laboratory discovered in the small town of Reedley.

The laboratory, in an abandoned warehouse, contained mice, biological fluids and samples of dreaded diseases including HIV, malaria and COVID-19. Federal and state investigators are delving into the situation, which surfaced when a city building code inspector noticed a hose snaking out of a wall in the warehouse.

McEwen wanted to know how the department oversees laboratories, how often they are inspected and how illegal labs get discovered. But he got nowhere. Department officials refused to answer even the most basic operational questions and told McEwen to search their website to find answers.

"Administration of @GavinNewsom has zero commitment to transparency," McEwen tweeted in frustration.

It was an example of what reporters and others have increasingly experienced in recent years as they attempt to decipher what politicians and bureaucrats are doing.

It's not hyperbole to say that a wall of secrecy has been erected around the state Capitol and the surrounding complex of buildings housing state agencies.

It was beginning to happen before COVID-19 struck the state in 2020 but it worsened during the pandemic as Gov. Gavin Newsom wielded emergency powers that suspended many of the "sunshine laws" governing open meetings, open records and other forms of access.

Newsom and other officials became used to operating out of public view and even after the pandemic eased, they continued the same practices.

The post-pandemic syndrome manifests itself not only in politicians and other officials seeking to avoid the give-and-take of direct questioning by reporters, as McEwen learned, but in the proliferation of meetings that are accessible only via internet.

California's First Amendment Coalition, which attempts to preserve access to governmental records and meetings, may be fighting an uphill battle as the Legislature moves several measures that would reinforce closed door government, to wit:

- Senate Bill 544, which passed the Senate on a 26-3 vote and now pending in the Assembly, would amend the state Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act, which governs state boards and commissions, by permanently allowing them to conduct meetings without in-person attendance, allowing only internet or telephonic access by the public.
- Senate Bill 537, also pending in the Assembly after 32-8 Senate approval, would amend the Ralph M. Brown

Act, which governs local governments, to similarly allow "multi-jurisdictional, cross-county local agencies with appointed members" to meet via teleconference "without posting agendas at each teleconference location, identifying each teleconference location in the notice and agenda, making each teleconference location accessible to the public, and requiring at least a quorum of the eligible legislative body to participate from within the local agency's jurisdiction..."

- Senate Bill 411, approved by the Senate on a 30-5 vote and also pending in the Assembly, would allow such teleconference meetings by "neighborhood councils" without in-person access and is specifically aimed at 99 such bodies in Los Angeles.

Ginny LaRoe, advocacy director of the First Amendment Coalition, captured the essence of these measures in her comment on SB 544: "SB 544 rewrites the Bagley-Keene Open Meetings Act to allow officials serving on any state body – think CPUC, POST, State Bar and many more – to never again show up in person to a physical meeting location. This is government by telephone."

The three bills have garnered a string of critical newspaper editorials – reflecting the fact that journalists are particularly affected by creeping official secrecy – but they nevertheless continue to advance.

In California, sunshine is giving way to darkness.

- Inform Family & Neighbors – Share the map and checklist with household members and neighbors, then plan your evacuation

route and meeting point.

Prepare Your Emergency Go Bag – A checklist is provided with each map and your go bag should include essential items like food, water, chargers, a radio, a change of clothes, medications, and important documents for everyone in the household, including pets.

Sign Up for Emergency Alerts – Visit Sacramento-Alert.org to receive emergency texts, calls, and/or emails to your device.

Maps are accessible, downloadable, printable, and available in nine different languages. County residents will also receive a printed copy of their evacuation zone maps in the mail. Individuals with livestock can view livestock evacuation maps and routes online as well.

Firescaping Your Home

We have had a hot few weeks and just about everything has become like hay ready to burn. Let’s face it, forests and homes have no protection against wild fires...except perhaps you. **Dr. Adrienne Edwards**, a plant botanist with **Rachel Schleiger**, a plant ecologist, came to together to help us with “**Firescaping Your home.**” They shared some tips on my POPPOFF Radio Show.

1. FAMILY FIRST. Know that being prepared to evacuate saves your family and that is more important than your home and landscaping. Have “Go Bag” that includes your wildland fire action plan (house preparation, packing lists, evacuation plans, and contact numbers) so when an emergency arises you and your family are ready to go.

2. STRUCTURES. Assess your house and any other structures where you live for fire vulnerability. Then prioritize fireproofing on those structures with respect to degree of hazard, and costs for upgrades. They provide lots of tips in their book, but you can also consult with a professional or contractor with experience in how to make homes fire resistant.

3. LANDSCAPES. Noncombustible Zone (0-5 Ft). No more “no more foundation plantings”. During fire season (depending on conditions) nothing combustible should be within 5 feet of any structure. That includes wood fencing. Lean, Clean, and Green Zone (5-30 Fr), or more depending on slope. Research indicates that thinning fuels within 30 Ft of structures, and maintaining a noncombustible zone next to structures, are far more important than anything you might do beyond the Lean, Clean and Green

Zones. Plants should be kept healthy and clustered plantings can be punctuated by noncombustible areas of rock, bare ground, and inorganic mulches etc.

4. HABITAT SUPPORT. Think about your neighbors, that is, your plant neighbors, your wildlife neighbors, and your human neighbors. The more land we develop, the more we need to provide oases for native plants. Pollinators and other wildlife need food, shelter, and water. Learn more how to provide those resources in your yard and when. The timing of when you clear vegetation can have huge impacts on pollinators and birds in particular. In a cooler, wetter year, you should leave flowers, seeds, branches and other habitat in in place longer prior to fire season to allow organisms to reproduce. In a hotter, drier year you might have to clear vegetation sooner, but many of your wild-life neighbors can be a weak link in the firescaping chain, so fire resilience also should be coordinated at the community level. For example, fences may make good neighbors, but wood fences shed embers like crazy. When attached to houses, fires can burn house-to- house following fence lines toppling like dominoes.

5. ENJOY. Enjoy the natural beauty of your region with the confidence you have prepared for evacuation if needed and reduced your fire risks while continuing to support the habitat around you. You can check them out with more at www.firescapingyourhome.com. Wherever you live, checking some of the boxes for safety can’t hurt. Stay safe.

Proposed Rules For Irrigation Runoff Raise Concerns Among Winegrape Growers

Winegrape growers in Mendocino and Sonoma counties say proposed water-quality regulations for waste discharge requirements for vineyards are burdensome, costly and often duplicate work by growers participating in sustainability certification programs. Mendocino County winegrape grower Frost Pauli said vineyard farmers are concerned about proposed grower monitoring and reporting mandates being developed as part of the state’s Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program. Proposed new rules focus on nitrogen applications and removals.

Study: Production Costs Soar For Processing Tomatoes

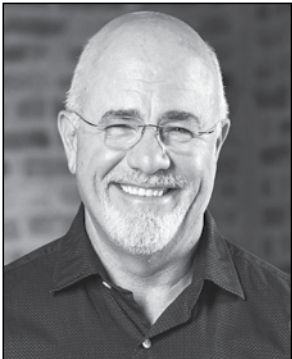
Costs to produce processing tomatoes increased substantially in the past six years, according to a study released in July by researchers at the University of California and UC Cooperative Extension farm advisors. Based on the 2023 cost analysis for growing processing tomatoes in the Sacramento Valley and northern delta, researchers found that growers face surging input costs for expenses such as water, labor, fuel and fertilizer. Rising production expenses translate to a 76% increase from 2017, the last time the UC conducted a cost analysis on farming processing tomatoes.

Quarantine Ordered In Los Angeles County After Tau Fruit Fly Discovery

The California Department of Food and Agriculture has placed a portion of Los Angeles County under quarantine for the Tau fruit fly following detection of more than 20 flies in the unincorporated area of Stevenson Ranch near the city of Santa Clarita. The fly is native to Asia and is a serious threat to agriculture and natural resources, with a very wide host range, including numerous fruits and vegetables and a select range of native plants in California. The CDFA asked residents living in the quarantine area not to move any fruits or vegetables from their property.

Cattle Ranchers, Dairies Promote Conservation Efforts

In a region dominated by vineyards, those who raise cattle for beef or milk production have looked to innovations and solutions outside the box to help keep their businesses viable. A Napa County cattle operation and a Sonoma County organic dairy shared how they do just that while also helping to preserve the land and natural resources around them. They offered an on-the-ground glimpse of their operations last week as part of an educational tour hosted by the California Farm Bureau and California Bountiful Foundation, with funding from the California Cattle Council. ★

Even then we didn’t go crazy with things.

Still, the biggest problem you and your husband are experiencing is a communication breakdown. Your husband should stop being so impulsive, and grow a backbone where the kids are concerned. Drought-Stricken Farmers to Participate in Rice Commission

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assembly Bill (AB) 454 by Assemblymember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D-Winters), which provides greater flexibility to the California Rice Commission to maintain district representation of all rice farmers, has been signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom. The California Rice Commission, established in 1999, functions as a quasi-governmental entity within the Department of Food and Agriculture, providing for the orderly production, milling, and marketing of California rice and the associated environmental benefits. The Commission’s board is made up of rice producers and handlers. Previously, each board member had to actively produce or handle rice to maintain board eligibility. Extreme drought and water shortages have severely constrained rice production in the Sacramento Valley. As California farmers confronted a third year of catastrophic drought impacts in 2022, less than half the state’s typical 500,000 acres of rice were planted. Due to the massive drop in rice production, many producers and handlers were no longer eligible to serve on the Rice Commission’s board. Likewise, because of reduced acreage in production, the allocation of Commission board seats by district was poised to be dramatically impacted. AB 454 allows the Rice Commission to annually review and evaluate state drought conditions and, if warranted,

issue a drought declaration. Under a drought declaration, a Commission member who is a rice producer or handler would be allowed to continue serving on the Commission and vote to issue a declaration if they historically produced or handled rice or if they participated in the Prevented Planting Program at USDA. “Year-after-year, our rural family farms, agricultural communities, and businesses face mounting pressure from unprecedented climate events,” said Aguiar-Curry (D- Winters). “It’s imperative that we not lose the input of our farmers and handlers because of catastrophic droughts that they can’t control. I want to thank the Rice Commission for continuing to be a close partner on public policy that affects our agriculture and rice industry communities. Their leadership is incredibly valuable to our State Department of Food and Agriculture, and to me as I continue to serve my farming constituents. The Governor’s support will help us maintain the rural voices that are so important to instructing decisions made by our state government.” “We greatly appreciate Asm. Aguiar-Curry’s support of the rice industry. We are still feeling the impacts of last year’s drought and this bill will help us include growers on our board who were not able to plant last year due to the lack of water,” said Tim Johnson, President and CEO of the CA Rice Commission. Assemblymember Aguiar-Curry represents the 4th Assembly District, which includes all of Yolo, Napa, Colusa, Lake Counties, and parts of Sonoma County. www.asm.ca.gov/aguiar-curry ★
